Hance Receives 95 Pct. Margin

VOTERS IN OUR state and area witnessed one of the closest political races ever conducted in the state of Texas last weekend, in the battle for the nomination for the U.S. Senate.

Congressman Kent Hance led the voting, by the slimmest of margins. The final totals gave the Dimmitt native a total of 455,583 votes, to 454,610 for Lloyd Doggett and 453,559 for Bob Krueger. Hance received 31.25 per cent of the vote, Doggett 31.18 per cent, and Krueger 31.11 per cent.

Krueger, the South Texas native who before the primary was expected by many political observers to lead the voting, missed out on the runoff by only 1,051 votes.

Early in the evening on election night, Krueger was interviewed on television, and was asked what he thought about the early returns, which had Hance in the lead. Krueger came up with one of those statements we all make at one time or another, that we wish later we could erase.

"Well, the early returns are evidently from West Texas. If they were from South Texas, I would be in the lead. I am positive I will be in the runoff; I just don't know at this point who I'll be running against," was the statement, which turned out to be wishful thinking.

Krueger's missing out on the runoff by the margin of 1,051 votes underscores the value of a vote. When you consider the fact that less than one more vote for this candidate from each of the state's voting precincts would have put him in the runoff, then the thought that "my vote doesn't count much" doesn't carry much weight.

By the same token, if just one voter from each precinct across the state, who voted for Kent Hance had thought "Hance will win this election without my vote" and not bothered to go to the polls, his campaign would have been over.

The West Texas area gave Hance a remarkable majority of the vote in the May 5 primary, and this was another factor in the close state-wide finish. It will behoove every Hance supporter who voted last Saturday to return to the polls on the June 2 runoff.

"I don't think they will give me the nickname of 'Landslide,'" joked Hance on Monday. However, longtime political observers may recall that the late president Lyndon B. Johnson won a race by a similar small margin, prompting a reporter to call him "Landslide Lyndon." He went on to become a U.S. Senator, vice president, and then president.

WE HAVE HEARD considerable support for our suggestion for the elimination of the precinct caucus, in favor of a binding party primary, in selecting presidential delegates.

At the precinct convention this writer attended, a resolution was adopted calling for such a change, and will be presented to the county convention on May 19.

In Amarillo, Potter County Democratic chairman Mel Phillips said he thought the caucus method of selecting delegates was the most unfair aspect of politics, and he plans to submit a request for a change to the state democratic leaders.

When you stop to think about it, all of the party conventions, from the precinct to the national level, could be eliminated by a national primary date, after which the party nominees would be known (or perhaps have a runoff system).

Considering all of the progress which has been made in various phases of American way of life, with the advent of computer technology, it's amazing, and somewhat frustrating, that in areas such as our political organizations, we still have methods which resemble the horse and buggy era.

Friona voters were about as neighborly as you can get in the Democratic primary, for the U.S. Senate race last Saturday.

Three Friona precincts gave Dimmitt native Kent Hance a whopping 94.5 per cent margin in his race, with 397 votes, to only 23 for the other five candidates in the race.

In precinct 2-1 (high school), Hance received 248 votes, to seven for Doggett and six for Krueger. This was 94.6 per cent of the total. His margin in precinct 2-2 (Community Center) was even better, with 69 of the 71 votes cast, or 97.1 per cent. Hance received 80 of the 87 votes tallied in precinct two (Fire Station), 91.95 per cent.

Hance received better than 90 per cent of the total vote in Parmer County, including all 41 of the votes cast in the Senate race in the Rhea precinct box.

His county total was 1184, to 40 for Lloyd Doggett; 40 for Bob Krueger, 10 for David Young, four for Robert Sullivan and three for Harley Schlanger.

In the race for the U.S. Congress nomination, Friona and Parmer County voters went for Don Richards, who led the ballot and made it into the runoff for the nomination.

Richards carried Friona with 260 votes, to 55 for Thomas M. Richards, 40 for Gary Condra and 28 for John Selby.

Countywide, Don Richards received 687 votes, to 170 for Tom Richards, 165 for Condra and 97 for Selby.

In the sheriff's race, Friona voters gave longtime local lawman Bill

Morgan a good margin in his successful bid for re-election. The three local voting boxes went for Morgan, 351-53.

Morgan carried every voting precinct except for challenger Steven Hillock's home box of Oklahoma Lane, which Hillock carried, 73-41. The Lazbuddie box was close, with Morgan winning by one vote, 47-46.

Ernest Anthony was re-elected county commissioner, with 251 votes to 98 for T.A. Kelley. Kelley won the box at Black, 25-9, but Anthony won in Friona, 196-58, at Lakeview, 32-15, and the absentees, 14-0.

Leland Gustin, unopposed, was named County Democratic Chairman. With no name on the ballot for precinct chairman in Precinct 2-1, Pat Fleming won with 11 write-in votes, as seven other people received votes.

At the precinct convention, where presidential preference votes were taken, Gary Hart received 14 votes, Walter Mondale three, Jesse Jackson zero, and 36 votes were left uncommitted.

In other state races, John Hill carried the race for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, with 284 votes to 79 for Sears McGee in Friona, and 852-183 countywide.

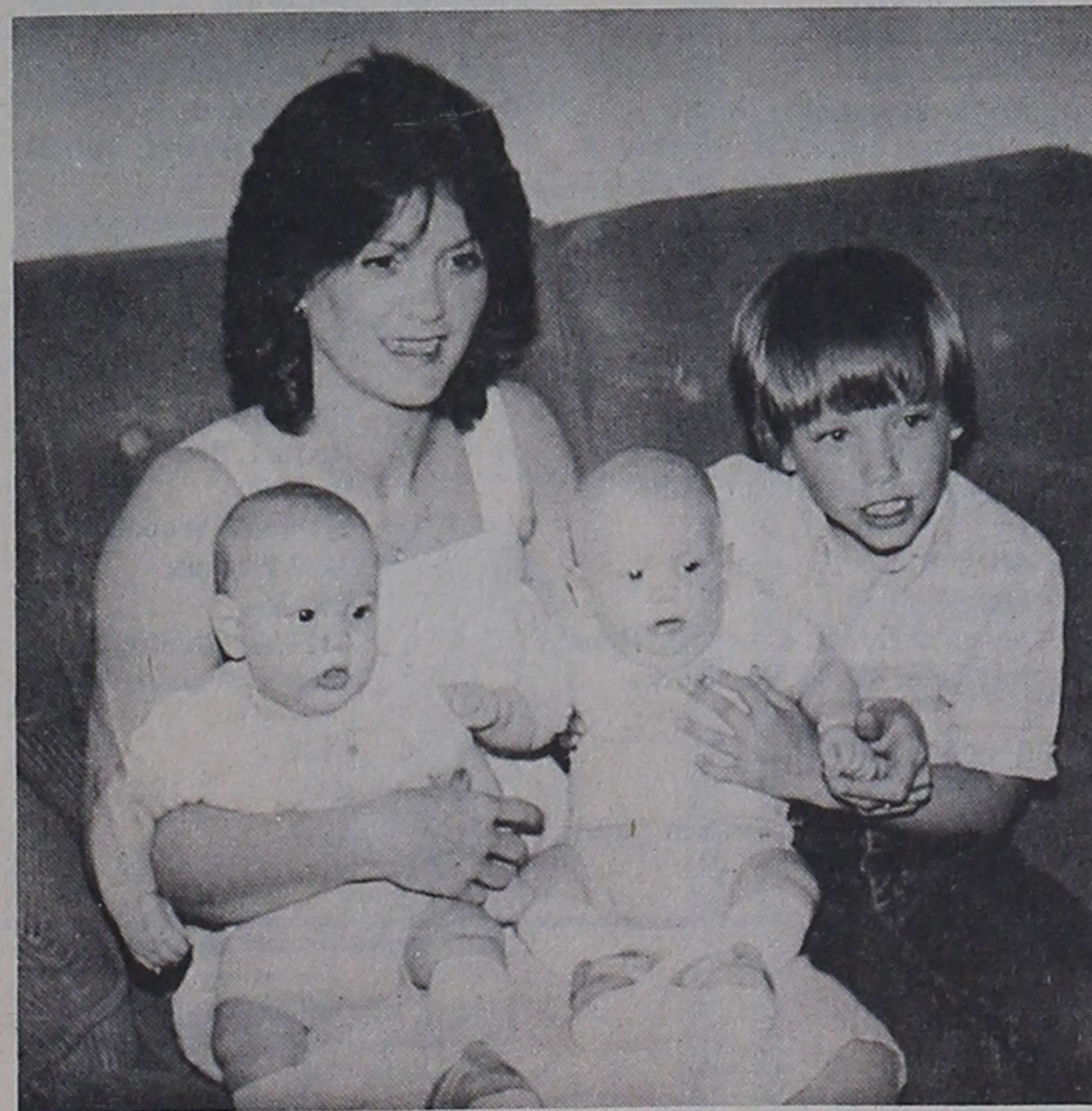
In the Supreme Court justice, place two, C.L. Ray led Friona voting with 167 to 136 for Shelby Sharpe and 36 for Texas Ward. County totals were: Ray 465, Sharpe 366, Ward 115.

For the court of criminal appeals, place one, Sam Houston Clinton carried the Friona precincts with 201 votes, to 101 for Oliver S. Kitzman.

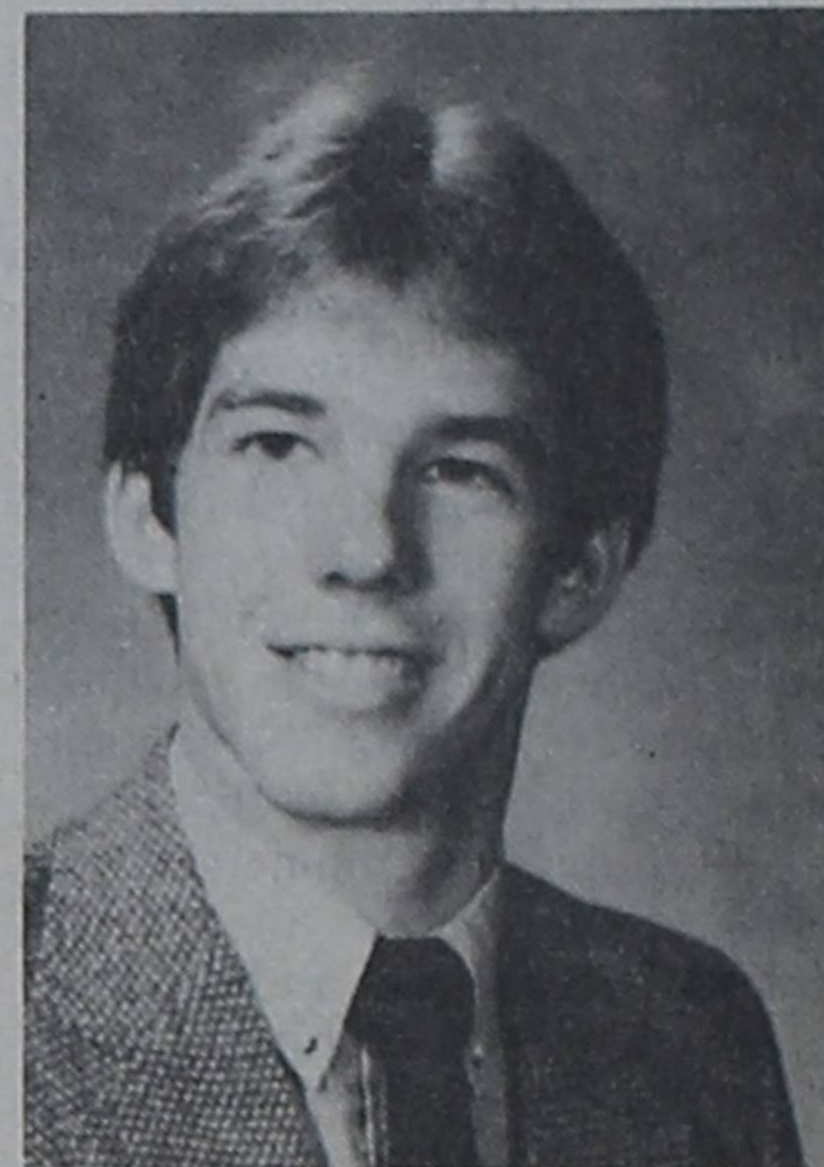

Hearings Set On School Issues

The State Board of Education is holding 56 public hearings across the state to receive citizen input on public education in Texas.

These hearings will focus on school finance recommendations currently under consideration by the State Board, other major education issues, and the recent recommendations by the Select Committee on Public Education. Marge West, District 13 State Board member, will preside at the hearings in our area.

In addition to the hearings, the State Board is also distributing a questionnaire that seeks opinions on major education issues. Interested persons are encouraged to attend a

hearing, complete a questionnaire, or both. The deadline for the receipt of written testimony by the Texas Education Agency is 5 p.m., Friday, May 25. Materials received after that date will not be considered.

Persons who intend to testify at the hearings are requested to pre-register with the contact person at the appropriate location by calling or writing. Please state your preference for the session you wish to attend. Testifiers will be placed on a list in the order registered. Persons who do not pre-register and wish to testify will be allowed to register at the session. Individuals may submit testimony either in writing on the form provided, orally at the time of the hearing, or both.

The form that must be used for written comments will be made available for citizens in the Friona School District at the Superintendent's Office. Since these forms must be reproduced, a call in advance might save time.

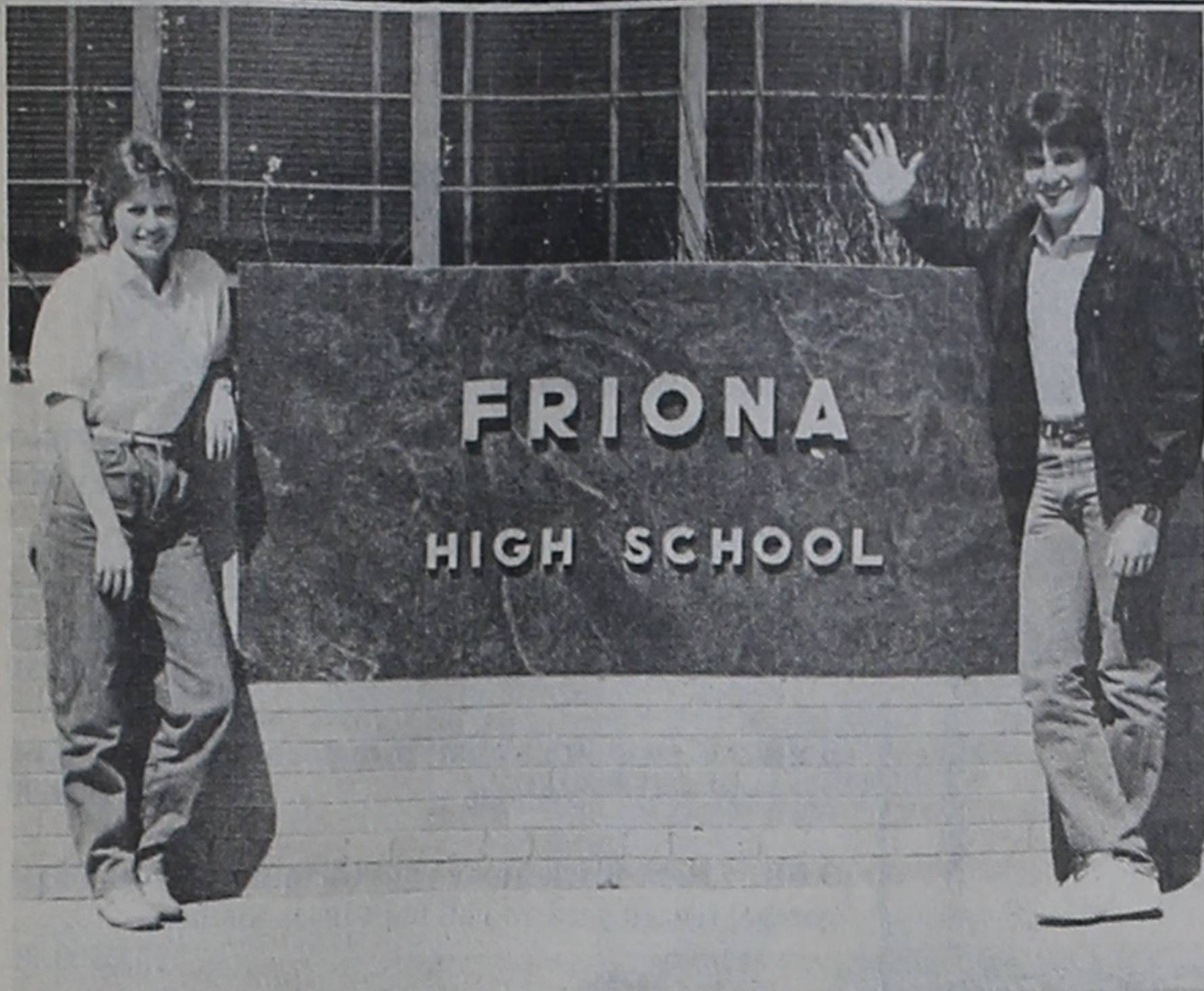

Permission slips will be handed out this weekend through the Friona churches, and must be signed by parents for the students to attend. A similar workshop is planned for this fall for junior high students.

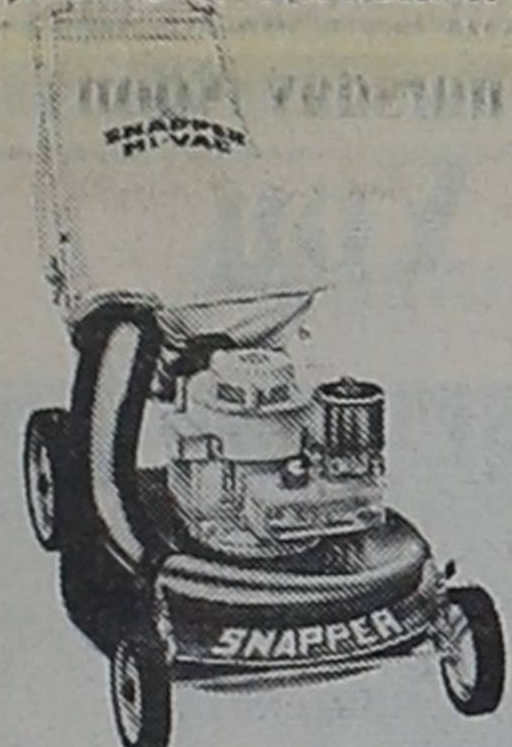

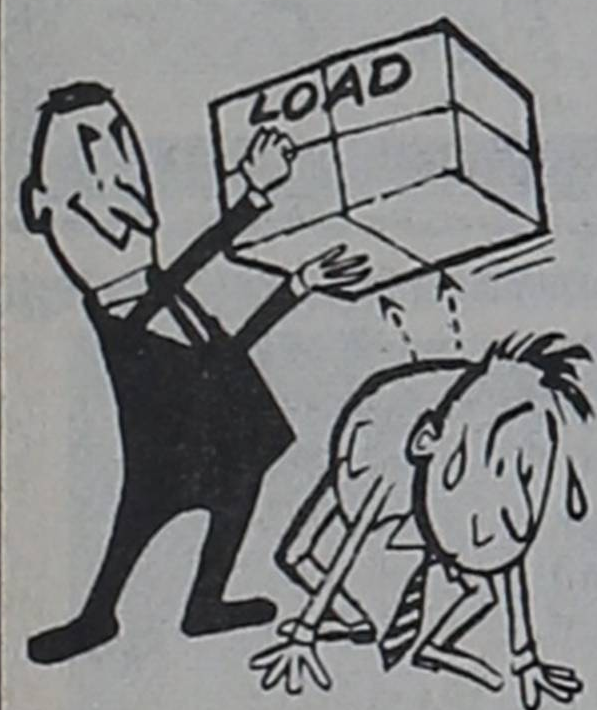

THROUGH THE EYES OF BABES

QUESTION: I watched my little girl pick up a flower the other day and hold it right up to her eyes. If I did that all I'd see would be a blur. How come?

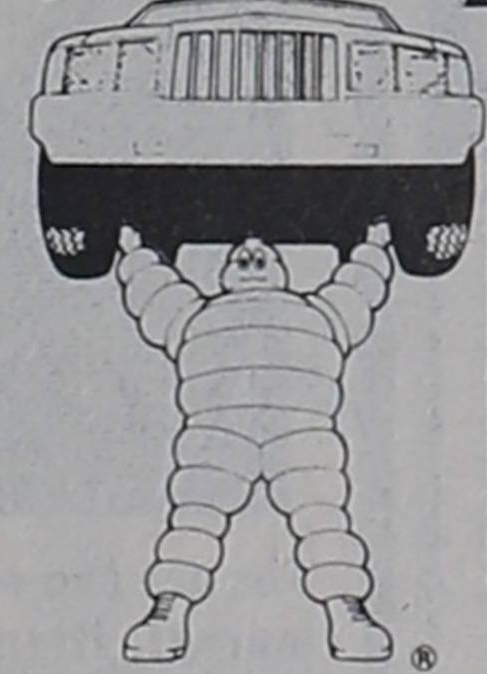
ANSWER: The answer is probably in the strength of your eyes' near-focusing muscles. As you grow older the point at which you can focus on an object gets farther and farther away. Sometimes it reaches the point where you can only read "at arm's length." It has nothing to do with structural errors of the eye. But it has a lot to do with your near-focusing muscles. These are the muscles that bend the lens of the eye to form a clear image when an object is close to you. They lose their strength with age. This problem can be corrected with properly prescribed glasses.

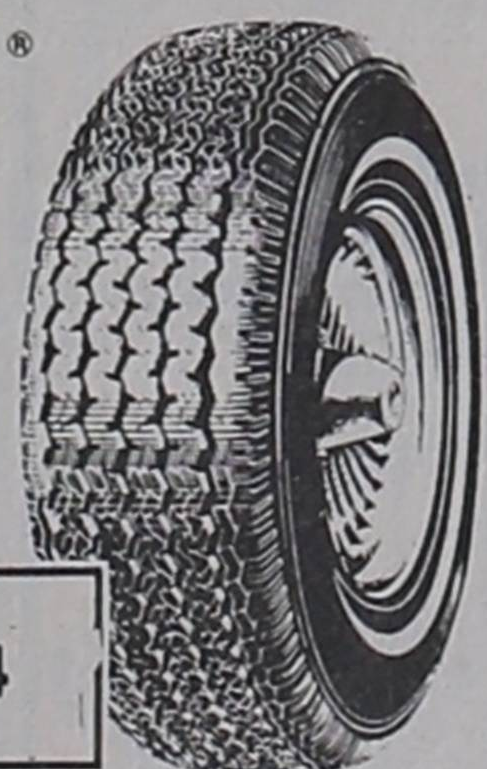

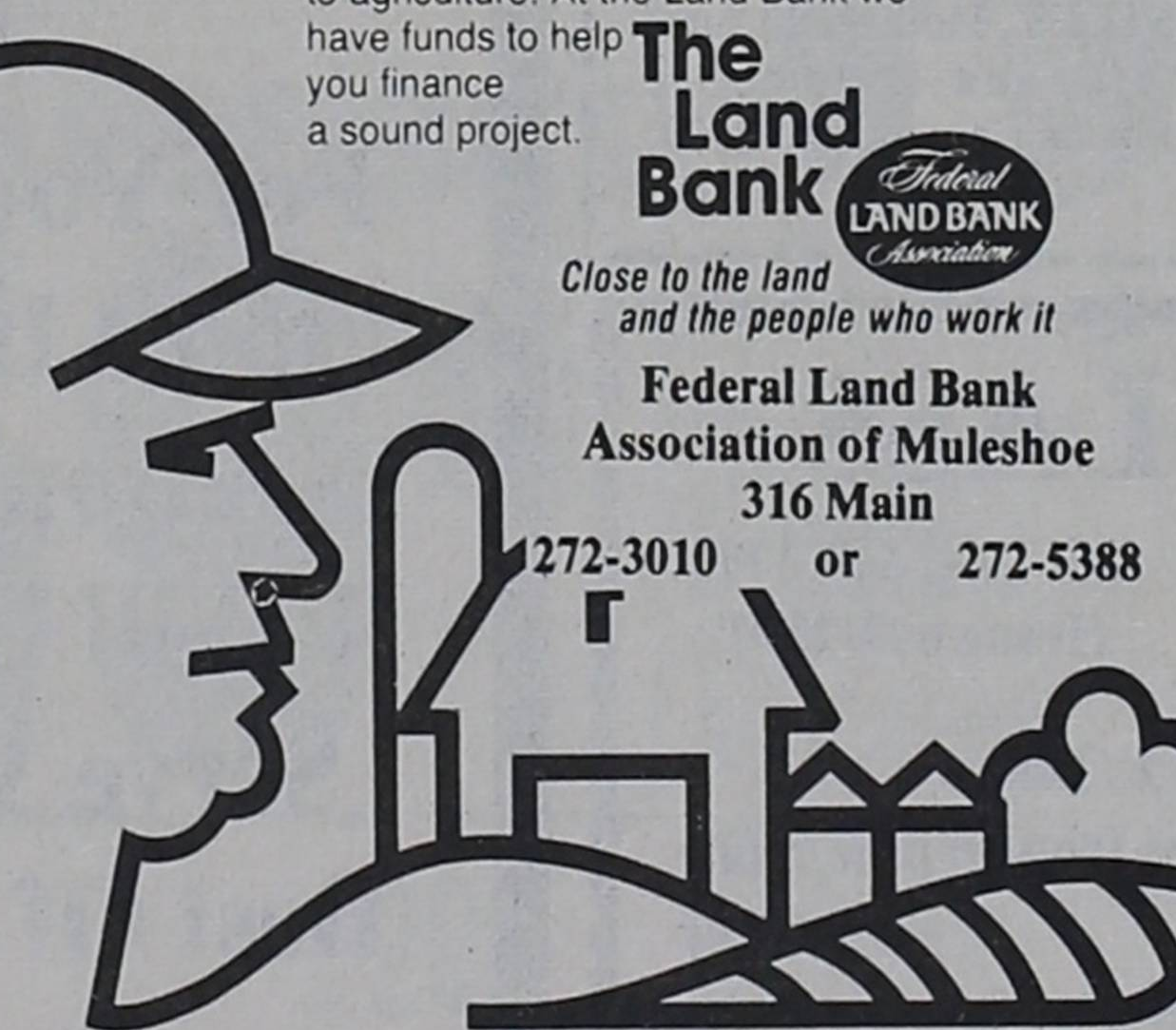

Hospital Employee Aids With Research

Laura R. Taylor, who is associated with Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona, and her husband Dr. Robert G. Taylor of ENMU, gave a presentation at the BioMedical Section of the Regional American Association for Advancement of Science meetings held recently in Lubbock.

The two evaluated a new technique for identifying disease causing organisms. Using data collected in cooperation with La Casa de Buena Salud of Portales and Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona, Mrs. Taylor was able to demonstrate that a newly developed and commercially

available test for rapidly identifying disease organisms could not be correlated to standard culture techniques.

Presently in the market is a new screening procedure for strep throat organisms that depends upon a 70-minute incubation and reaction with an appropriate material for identification.

"It would be great if it worked," Mrs. Taylor said. "It would allow quick identification for physicians of organisms that are responsible for a host of nasty infections including scarlet fever and rheumatic fever. The faster the organisms can be identified, the faster the physician can begin treatment," she continued.

However, when the organisms responsible for causing these diseases are checked with the present culturing techniques which take between one and two days before identification of the causative organism is possible, these researchers found that they would get false positives using the new procedure.

Additionally, the researchers were able to show the new quick one hour and ten minute test process missed several organisms that proved later to be positive by the longer standard culture techniques.

One of the physicians at the conference responded to Mrs. Taylor's presentation saying "it is refreshing to find common sense can still be applied to science."

Aguirre To State

John Aguirre was carrying Friona's colors into the state track meet in Austin this weekend, competing in the 400-meter dash.

Aguirre placed second in the regional meet at Odessa last weekend, turning in his best time of the season in his event, 49.7. He was slated to compete in the state meet Friday evening.

Eloy Caballero placed fourth in his event, the 300-meter hurdles, with a time of 39.1.

Charlie Morgan had a long jump effort of 20 feet, three inches, but failed to place. High jumper Daniel Gowens cleared 5-10, likewise missing out on the placings.

Wenetter Sets Marks

Wenetter Jackson competed in the state track and field meet in Austin last weekend, and compiled some good marks in the process.

In the discus, Wenetter had a throw of 121 feet, two inches, which broke her own school record. The throw earned her a fourth-place finish in the event.

In the shot, Wenetter threw it 38-0, to place fifth. She had set a school record in this event at the regional meet, with her toss of 40 feet.

Band Earns Division I

The Chieftain Band competed in the Sandy Lake Music Festival in Arlington last Friday, May 4, and received a "First Division" rating in the competition.

While in the Arlington area, the band visited Six Flags Over Texas, the White Water amusement park, and some band members had a try at ice skating.

Reception Tuesday To Honor Lee Witten

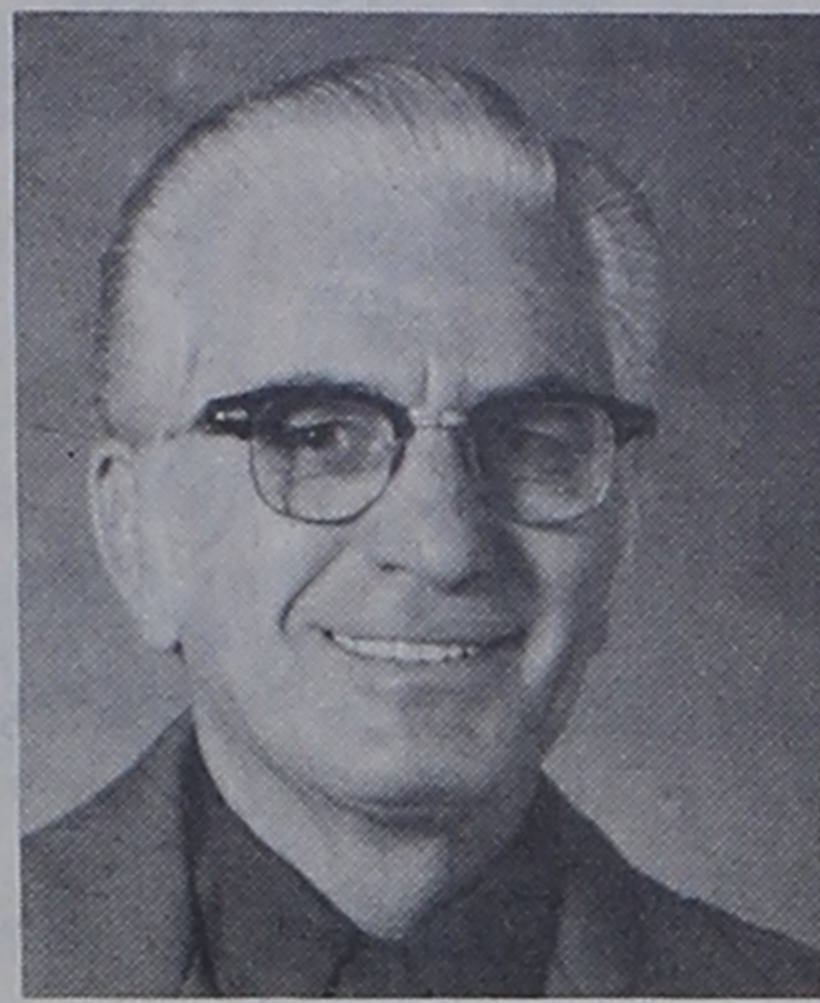

THE FASCINATING HISTORY OF EYECARE-PART V

During the 1800's many different fields of science began to make rapid advancements, and the field of visual science was no exception. The invention of curved lenses (not flat like the previous ones) came about in the early part of the 1800's...about 1804. Then trifocals were invented in 1826, the one-piece bifocal was invented in 1836, the pince-nez frame (eyeglasses kept in place by a spring gripping the bridge of the nose) came along in the 1840's, rubber frames arrived in 1866, plastics for frames were first developed in the 1860's, rolled gold frames were first used sometime about 1875, and curved steel temples that fit over the ears were invented in 1880.

The first contact lenses to correct vision problems were fitted in Europe in 1888 by two researchers working independently of one another. Using concepts first written about by Leonardo da Vinci in 1508, A. Eugen Fick, a Swiss physician, invented a small corneal contact lenses made of blown glass. Edouard Kalt, a Paris optician, invented a glass scleral contact lens that fit over the entire eye. By 1892, the Zeiss Optical works in Germany was able to grind and polish glass contact lenses to specifications. Not until the middle of the 20th century, however, would materials and knowledge make contact lenses practical for the general population.

Most of the Optical instruments used to examine the eyes for vision and health problems were invented in the late 1800's. By the 1890's, it was possible to give vision examinations. For the first time in history, eyeglass lenses and frames were sold separately. Most people still used the trial-and-error method to obtain their eyeglasses, some that had been pre-made and sold in a jewelry shop or sold from the wagons of travelling peddlers. Vision care was just beginning to become a profession and a science. By the late 1800's and 1900's there was an "explosion" of advancements in visual science. Believe it or not, we are in the midst of another "explosion" of advancements in the field of visual science at this time...TODAY! It is a most exciting field of study and we are enjoying every single advancement as it comes along.

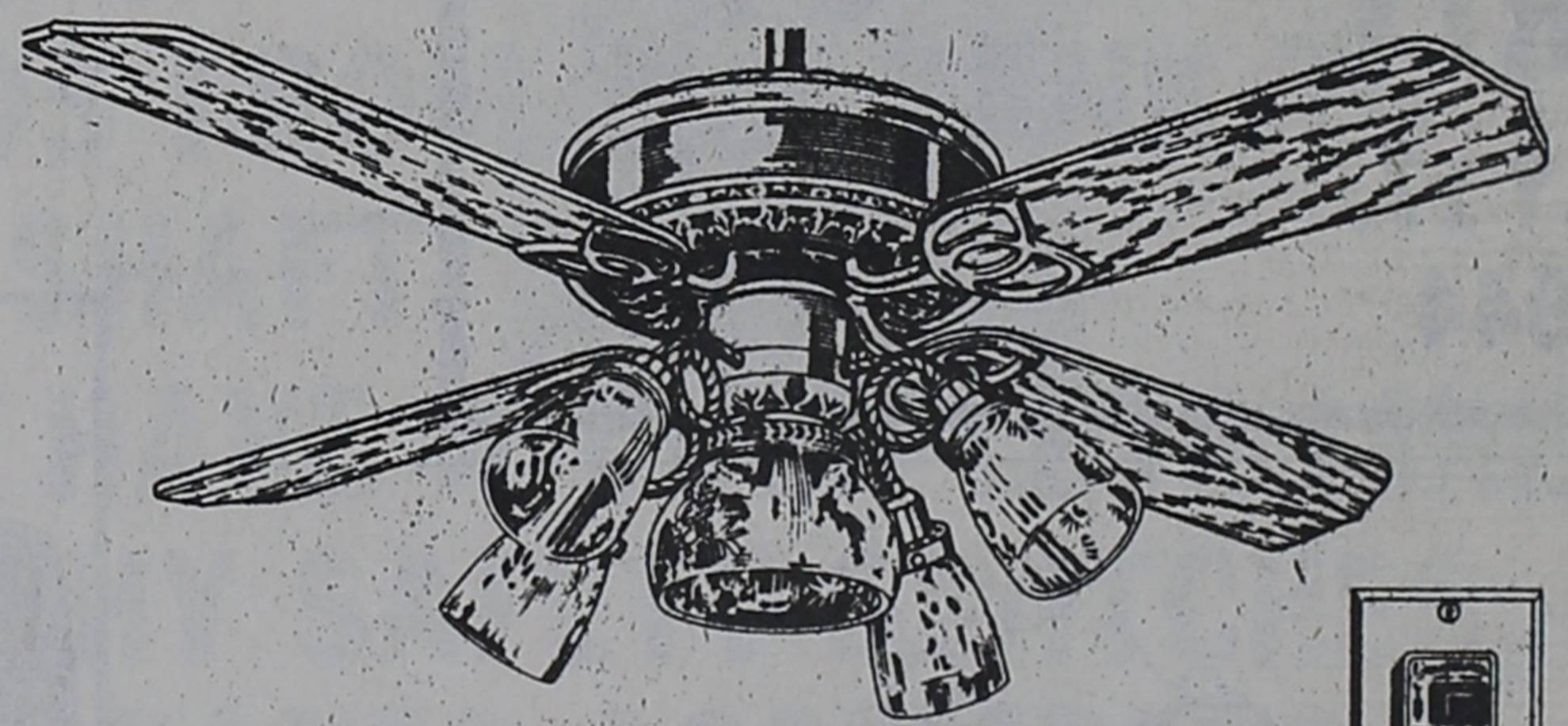

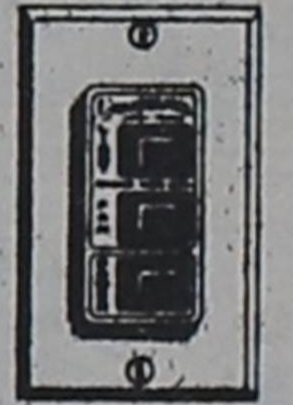

From coast to coast over 80,000 enthusiastic piano pupils of the nation will participate in this annual national piano playing event being held in 700 music centers in the

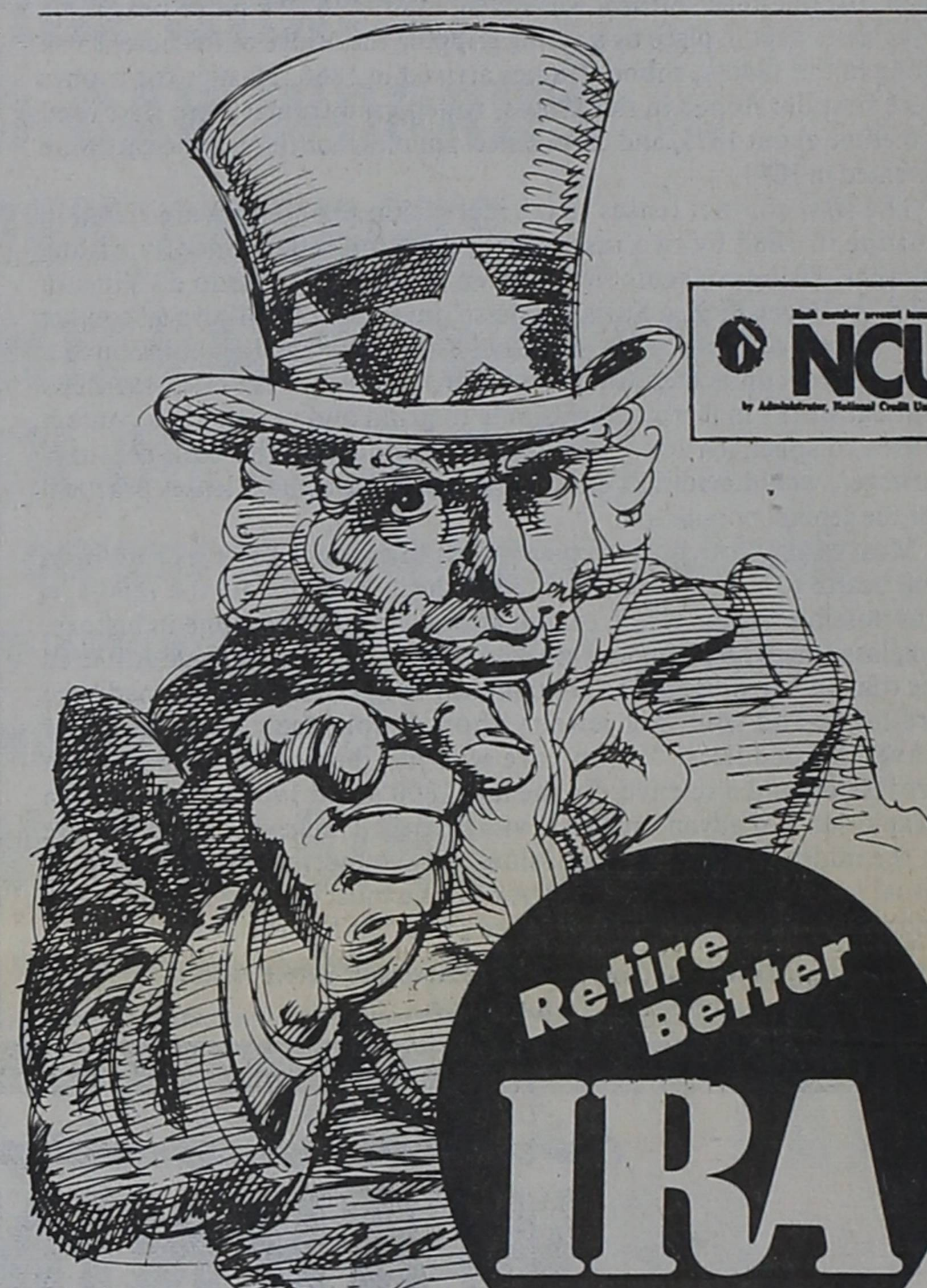

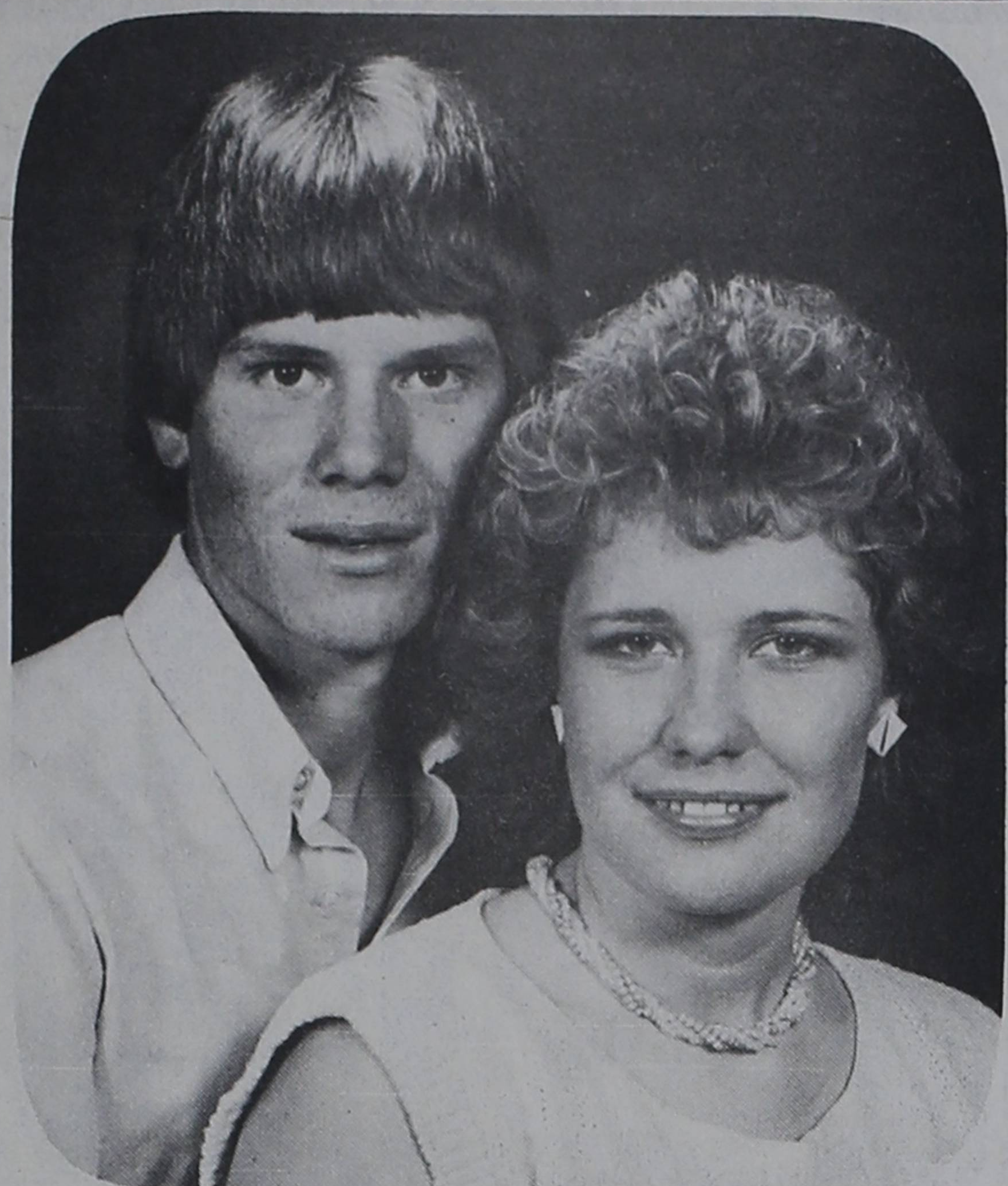
