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Embattled President To Resign? Ford Summoned To White House

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard M. Nixon, his 2,026-day presidency shredded by scandal, told Vice President Gerald R. Ford today he is resigning as President of the United States.

Word of his decision came from House Republican leader John J. Rhodes and from a White House aide who asked not to be identified.

Nixon arranged to address the nation over TV and radio at 8 p.m. Big Spring time.

A House Democratic leader said he was told that Nixon's resignation would go to Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger Friday, and that Ford would be sworn in at 5 p.m. CDT Friday as 38th President.

Rep. John McFall, D-Calif., the House Democratic whip, said he got that information

from Majority Leader Thomas P. O'Neill.

HIGH NOON

Other congressional sources said the resignation would be effective at noon Friday.

Nixon spent an hour and 10 minutes with Ford today, and a White House aide said the President told Ford then of his decision to resign.

The President then summoned Republican and Democratic leaders of Congress to the White House for an early evening meeting.

It was Rhodes of Arizona, majority leader of the House, who confirmed for the record that Nixon would indeed relinquish the Presidency.

No man has ever resigned from the presidency.

After days of intense speculation over Nixon's course in the

face of certain House impeachment, the only question seemed to be the hour at which the President's decision would be executed.

ADMISSION

Rhodes said Nixon would resign by late afternoon. The formal instrument of resignation would go to Kissinger as Secretary of State.

Since Nixon's admission Monday that he concealed Watergate evidence from House impeachment investigators, the public and his own lawyers, the pressure has mounted for the President to quit.

A haggard Ronald L. Ziegler, his voice choked with emotion, made only a brief announcement on the day's plans, and did not confirm the resignation.

Ziegler told a White House press center conference that it

was a difficult time, then announced:

"The President of the United States will meet with various members of the bipartisan leadership of Congress here at the White House early this evening."

"Tonight at 9 o'clock, the President of the United States will address the people of the United States by radio and television from the Oval Office."

A spokesman for Ford said the vice president would refrain from public comment until the President himself announced his action.

MIDDLE OF NIGHT

The ultimate decision apparently was made in the middle of the night in the solitude of the First Family's living quarters. A reliable source said Kissinger was instrumental in convincing Nixon his resignation was necessary in the national interest.

Nixon and Ford, the man he picked for the vice presidency after Spiro T. Agnew resigned last October, met alone in the Oval Office. The session began at 11:01 a.m. EDT on a gray, muggy summer day as the nation and the world awaited formal announcement of the embattled president's plans.

Hundreds of newsmen and photographers milled in the smoke-filled White House press room while the two leaders conferred in the guarded office 36 paces away.

Some sources said flatly Nixon had made the decision to step aside voluntarily rather than allowing the constitutional machinery to grind toward impeachment.

But those aides closest to the President refused to make such a flat assertion — as did official spokesmen.

Shortly after Ford's office announced he was postponing a scheduled 12-day political trip to the Far West, correspondents were called into the White House briefing room by Deputy Press Secretary Gerald R. Warren.

PRIVATE MEETING

Warren then announced that Nixon had "asked the vice president to come over for a private meeting."

A few minutes later, the meeting had begun. The two leaders were alone in the splendid solitude of the Oval Office.

Law requires that any presidential resignation be submitted to the secretary of

State. And Secretary Henry A. Kissinger was called to the First Family's living quarters Wednesday night for a private meeting with Nixon that lasted until nearly midnight.

SPECULATION

But officials denied speculation that the embattled Republican president had given Kissinger a letter of resignation. Kissinger returned to the White House before 9 a.m. EDT today, but aides said he did not meet again with Nixon.

A spokesman for Ford, meanwhile, said the Western trip was still on, and that the vice president would leave "late tonight or early Friday."

Ford was to attend a Republican telethon scheduled for broadcast to West Coast states

Alert Issued In Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP) — North Vietnam has alerted some of its six home-based Army divisions amid ominous signs of a possible countrywide Communist offensive in South Vietnam, U.S. officials report.

These officials said they are more concerned than at any time since the Paris agreement that was supposed to end the Vietnam war more than 18 months ago.

Some analysts suggested the Hanoi leadership may regard the Nixon administration's turmoil over impeachment as an opportunity to strike hard in South Vietnam.

WORRY

Officials denied their expressions of worry were intended to influence the Senate to restore a \$300 million House cut in U.S. military aid for South Vietnam.

They said North Vietnamese military pressure in South Vietnam has been building for weeks, with many firefights and heavy casualties on both sides. The current assessment speaks of a strong possibility that the North Vietnamese may widen their operations into a countrywide offensive.

Especially ominous to U.S. officials was the alert of home-based divisions inside North Vietnam, one of them stationed above the old demilitarized border. This raises the specter of another invasion of the South, as in 1972. Such an invasion would be a violation of the Paris peace accords.

INFILTRATION

Officials said there has been an increase in infiltration of troops from North Vietnam, some shifting of headquarters and other evidences of preparations for major moves.

Supply truck traffic has risen sharply, with about 4,000 trucks sighted in one recent two-week period.

Analysts said there are more North Vietnamese troops in South Vietnam now than ever before.

They estimated there are more than 200,000 North Vietnamese combat troops in 11 divisions throughout South Vietnam, along with another 100,000 to 150,000 support troops and guerrillas.

North Vietnam has another 300,000 to 350,000 troops inside its own borders, they said.

Furthermore, there are between 200 and 600 North Vietnamese tanks, more than 300 artillery pieces and better than 1,200 antiaircraft guns in the South, officials said.

DON'T KNOW

U.S. authorities claim the North Vietnamese have been pumping men and supplies into South Vietnam steadily since the cease-fire. Reconnaissance photographs show that North Vietnam has converted the northern part of South Vietnam into a huge supply complex.

According to U.S. officials, the nearly 400,000-man South Vietnamese army is much improved. "They ought to be able to acquit themselves well, but we don't know for certain."

White Receives Death Sentence

DALLAS (AP)—A Dallas jury returned a death sentence for Robert Excel White Wednesday after convicting him of murder earlier in the day in the death of a Collin County store owner.

The jury deliberated one hour before finding White guilty of murder, and four hours later the panel pronounced a death sentence.

District Court Judge Tom Ryan said formal sentencing will be pronounced in McKinney but he did not set a date.

White was charged with killing Preston Broyles at his store near McKinney on May 11. White also is charged with the deaths of 18-year-olds Gary Coker and Billy St. John, who both were customers in the store at the time of the shootings.

Killer Did Not Have Access To Prison Chaplain's Mail

HUNTSVILLE, Tex. (AP) — The Rev. Joseph O'Brien says convict Fred Gomez Carrasco did not have access to the prison chaplain's mail.

Prison officials have said they were investigating the possibility that the slain convict may have received weapons through the Roman Catholic priest's mail while Carrasco worked for the chaplain in the chapel.

10-DAY SEIGE

Carrasco, another inmate and two hostages were killed last Saturday night in an escape attempt from the state prison after a 10-day seige. O'Brien, also a hostage, was wounded in the incident.

"I always pick up my mail across the street from the administration office," O'Brien said Wednesday from his bed at the Huntsville Memorial Hospital where he is recuperating from two gunshot wounds.

"Any of the other mail (such as packages) is delivered to me by security. I don't think the weapons came through the mail."

However, Don Kirkpatrick, Texas Department of Corrections assistant director, said the possibility could not be ruled out.

NOT PROBABLE

"There is a tremendous amount of activity in this unit—boxes, books, supplies and many things coming in," Kirkpatrick said.

"We are looking at the possi-

bility that the guns came from inside the prison. They could have been brought in by a guard, a teacher or a chaplain, at least unknowingly.

"There are only three ways to get contraband inside the prison: by mail, by vehicle or by someone either on the outside or inside bringing it in."

Kirkpatrick said it was "a unit and classification committee decision to allow Carrasco to work in the chapel," and noted that it was "possible, but not probable that the guns were brought in by prison visitors."

O'Brien recalled the 10-day prison seige and its climax Saturday night.

"We all felt that if we got out of the (library) building we stood a 50-50 chance," he said.

More Court Action Due Here After Labor Day

With lawyers and court officials vacationing, little action was taken in Howard County's 118th District Court during July.

District Judge Ralph W. Caton was out of town for less than three weeks, mostly vacationing. Caton expects court activity to increase around Labor Day when most will be through with vacations.

In the criminal docket during July, there were listed four guilty pleas from defendants who waived indictment and were granted probation. Two dismissals were entered.

Pending July 1 were 180 indictments. With the four additions and six dispositions, the docket included 178 cases at month's end.

Among pending indictments were 17 for assault to murder, 22 for burglary, seven for felony driving while intoxicated, nine

for murder, two for rape, seven for robbery, 26 for theft and 55 for offenses involving drugs other than marijuana.

Caton and District Attorney Bob Moore serve Martin and Glasscock Counties in addition to Howard.

The Howard County district court civil docket grew from a book of 963 cases to one with 993 during July. There were 72 cases filed and 42 dispositions.

Of the total left, 246 were divorce, 18 tax and 22 suits for personal injuries and damages due to vehicle accidents.

In his capacity as juvenile judge, Caton took no action during July. There were four youths on probation and 16 cases taken under advisement.

The monthly statistical report to the Texas Civil Judicial Council was released to the Big Spring Herald today.

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Snakes' Urge To Get Away From It All

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) — It is not the warmth of the tarmac that lures snakes in to highways but an urge to get away from it all, says a university researcher.

"They seem to be just getting away from it all, probably from peer pressures and population problems," says Richard Franz, an associate at the University of Florida museum.

Every Monday night, Franz patrols U.S. 441, through marshland known as Payne's Prairie, collecting snakes killed by cars.

Franz, who studies the dead snakes to determine their sex, age and travel patterns, estimates 18,250 are killed along the 1.5 mile stretch of highway south of here every year.

"From the 1,200 specimens we've studied during the past year, fewer than 20 were poisonous," Franz says.

Police Network Receives Grant

AUSTIN—Governor Dolph Briscoe has approved two criminal justice grants totaling \$67,987 for improving law enforcement and justice in the area served by the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission, Midland.

A fourth-year grant of \$32,987 provides for installation and rental of landline communication equipment of the Permian Basin Law Enforcement Teletype Network.

Permian Basin RPC also receives a planning grant of \$35,000 to continue employment of a criminal justice coordinator.

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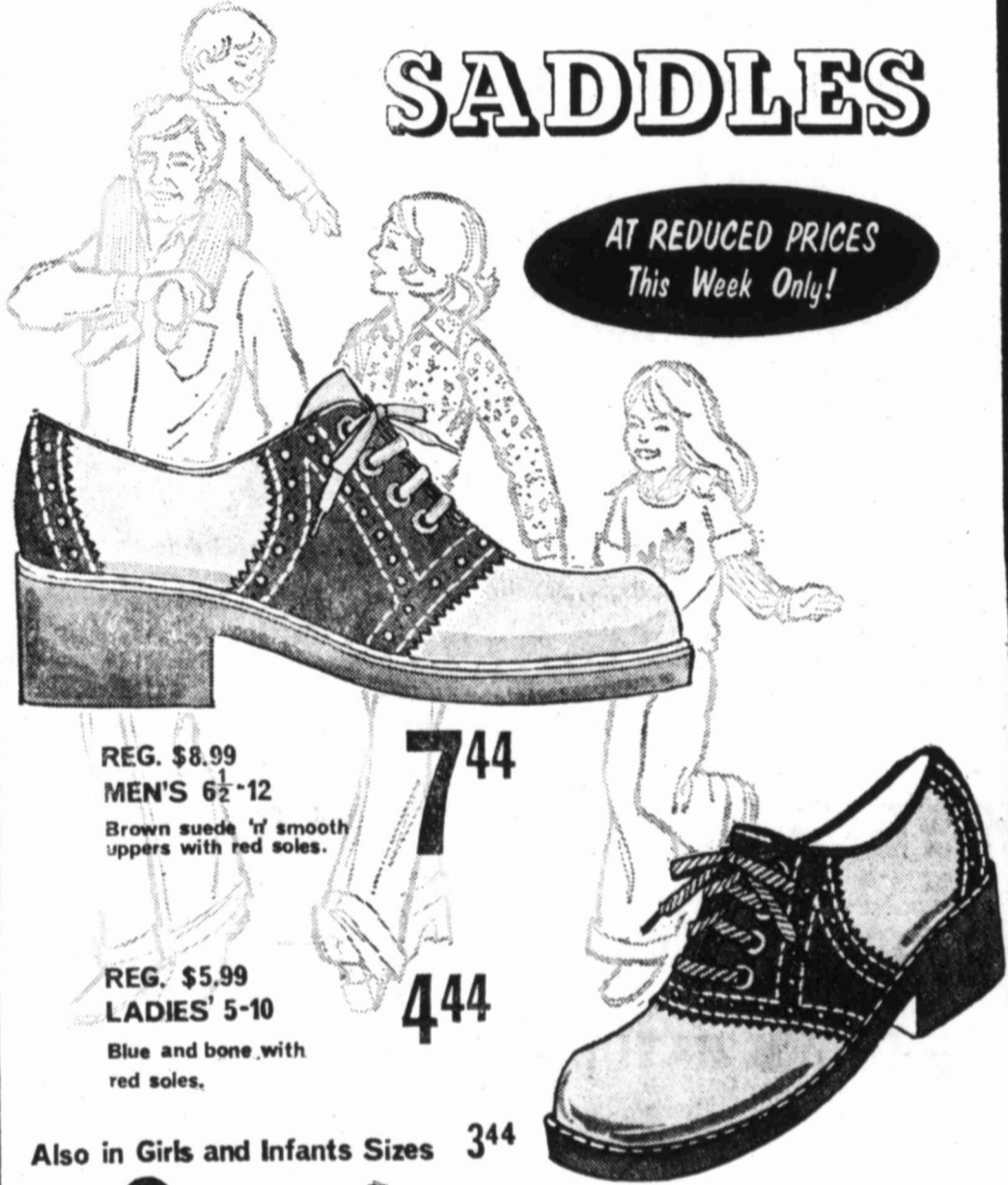
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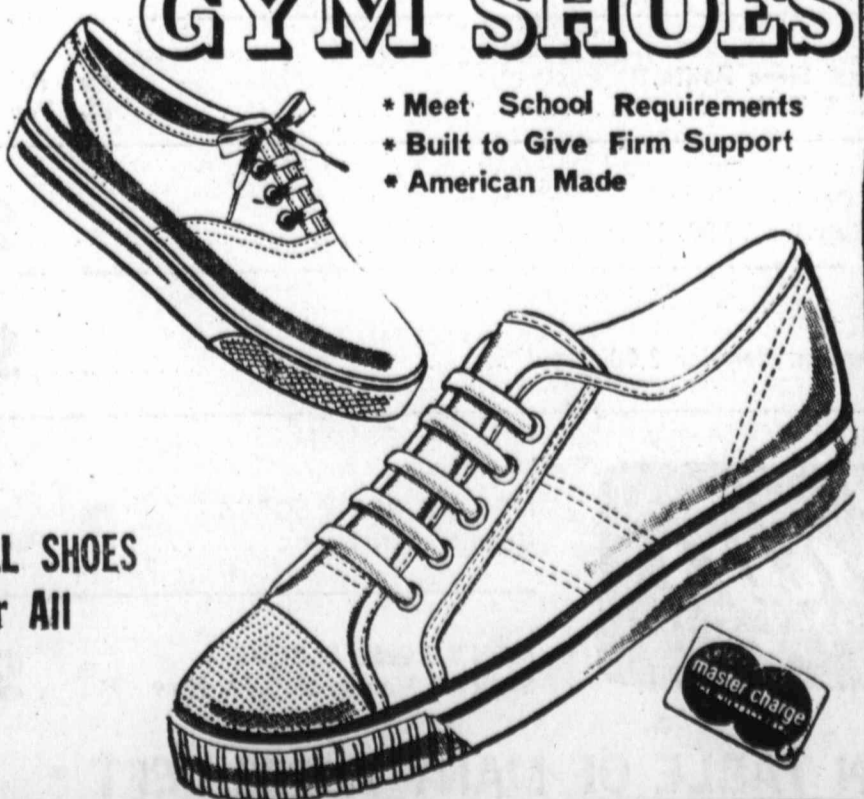
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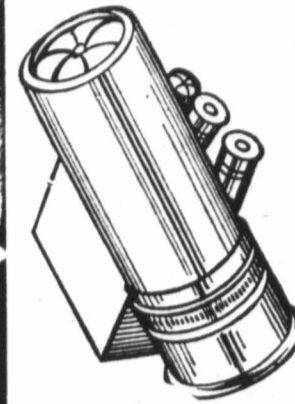
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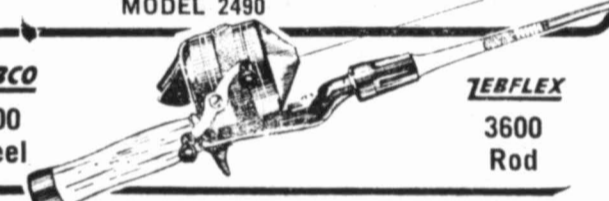
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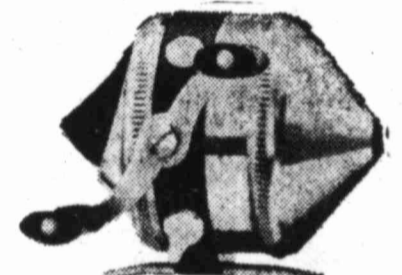
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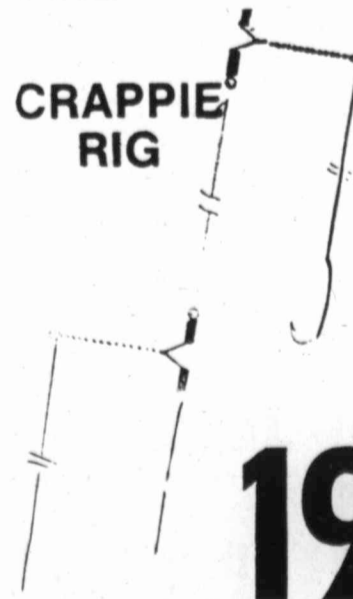
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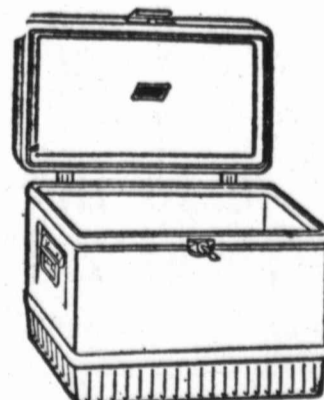
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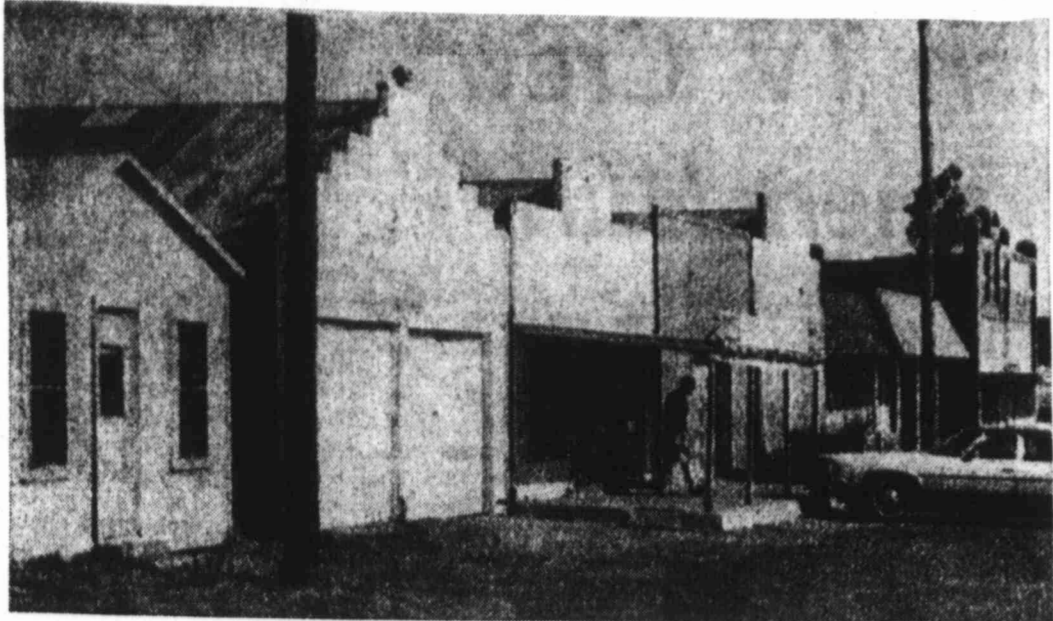

Most Texans Cinch To Buy Byers Functional Council

BYERS, Tex. (AP) — About the only things the 600 people here want from city fathers are clean water, good sewers and minimal interference with the game at the domino hall.

This North Central Texas town makes a claim some larger cousins can't: it has a practical use for both the city council and federal revenue sharing funds.

Both concern the water supply. The council was originally created in the 1930s to qualify for a loan for a water system to replace individual wells and cisterns.

DRILLING WELLS
About all the city government did until a few years ago was collect utility bills and buy a truck for the volunteer fire department.

But then the old water system went bad. Water had to be trucked in from Wichita Falls and the Wichita River. It was pretty awful, most oldtimers agree.

Then the city decided to construct a new system by drilling water wells in nearby Charlie and piping water back to Byers.

REVENUE SHARING
That was okay but expensive. Until federal revenue sharing funds, about \$1,200 a year, filtered down.

"It was kind of a lucky gift. And much appreciated," said Naomi Ham, who along with the water plant operator are Byers' only fulltime employees.

Residents still pay \$11 a month for water and sewer, but no one objects.

KIND OF BORING
The political leader of the town, more or less through default, is Mayor Clay Dunn Jr., a hefty farmer-rancher who generally shows up at city

Newly Arrived Man Is Jailed

Gary Wayne McCormick, who had been in Big Spring only a couple of weeks, was arrested Tuesday afternoon by Detectives LeRoy Spires and Richard Cantwell on an FBI warrant from Jacksonville, Fla.

McCormick, charged with crime on a government reservation (worthless checks) and bond default, was placed in city jail in lieu of a \$10,000 cash or surety bond set by Justice of the Peace Walter Grice.

A U.S. Marshall from Fort Worth was to arrive here Wednesday afternoon, and McCormick was to be transferred to his custody. According to an FBI spokesman, it was expected that the prisoner would be taken to the federal detention facility at Lubbock prior to being returned to Florida to face charges.

Texas Rice Farmers Hold Crops From 'Glut' Market

HOUSTON (AP) — Faced with what one exporter calls a world rice glut, Texas rice farmers are keeping their crops from market where prices have fallen by as much as half from last year.

Although the harvest is at least 80 per cent complete in the rice belt west of Houston and a third finished to the east, only some 11,000 hundredweight of rice—production from about 250 acres—has been sold.

This year Texas farmers planted 565,000 acres in rice, up from 553,000 acres last year. Texas produced 22 per cent of the nation's rice crop in 1973. U.S. Department of Agriculture officials said a hurricane

held down the 1973 Texas rice crop.

TEXAS NO. 1
Texas is usually the No. 1 rice-producing state. The other big four rice states are Arkansas, Louisiana and California, an official said.

Texas farmers have been turning down bids by millers at sales that have been under way for a month, said Al Albrecht, sales manager for American Rice Inc., Houston.

American Rice is a marketing cooperative with contracts to handle about 40 per cent of the state's production. It hasn't sold a single pound of the new crop because of prices offered, said Ralph Newman, general

manager of the cooperative. Rice is also offered at sales held across the Texas rice belt with mill representatives looking at samples, then making sealed bids to farmers. So far all have been rejected, Albrecht said, with the single 11,000 hundredweight sale coming on private deal.

Last year there was a world rice shortage but now the supply channels are full, said Robert Wells, export sales manager for P&S Rice Mills Inc., one of the largest exporters.

"We're not trying to steal anything from the farmers," he said. Rice farmers here are in good shape to hold their rice from the market. About 75 per cent of the rice storage in the state is owned directly or indirectly by farmers and rice can be stored for as long as five years without damage.

NO SHORTAGE

No shortage at the retail levels is expected because there are ample supplies available, said Ben Baldwin, an official of Uncle Ben's, one of the largest sellers in the rice retail market. He said that company's mill here has been shut down because of lack of supplies.

It is generally a sound principle to return partner's suit when you are defending against a no trump contract. However, principles are no substitute for logical reasoning. If the cards and the auction tell you that there is no future in a particular suit, feel free to look for greener pastures.

Both North and South are absolutely minimum for their bids. The result was a game contract at no trump with only 25 points in the combined hands. Nevertheless, the contract would have rolled home with careless defense.

When East's king of hearts won the first trick, he paused

to consider the situation. It was obvious from the lead and the three of hearts in dummy that West could have no more than a five-card suit, which marked declarer with four hearts. From the bidding, it was also clear that he could expect to find 3 or 4 points at best in the West hand. Thus, even if the heart suit could be established, West would never be able to gain the lead to run his tricks.

To defeat the contract, the tricks would have to come from some other suit, and spades was the obvious choice. If West's holding included the ace of hearts and three spades, the contract could be beaten. Acting on this assumption, East shifted to the queen of spades at trick two! Whether or not declarer put up the king, he was doomed to defeat. Even if he won the king and guessed the club finesse, he could come to no more than eight tricks—one spade, four diamonds and three clubs. As soon as West gained the lead with the ace of hearts, he would play a spade thru dummy's jack. East would score three spade tricks to add to the defenders' two hearts.

Should South elect to duck the queen of spades, East must take care to continue with a low spade, so that West will still have a spade with which to reach his partner after he wins the ace of hearts.

Would Not Let Him Hear Tapes

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas lawyer Cecil Emerson, says he resigned from the White House staff last March because a top aide to President Nixon would not let him go about his assigned duties of listening to the White House tapes.

Emerson said Wednesday he now realizes he was not allowed to hear all the tapes or read their transcripts because of what he called "a coverup of a coverup."

Emerson was one of two chief advisers to White House counsel James St. Clair for six months, and represented Nixon during the Senate Watergate Committee questioning of White House personnel.

He said the tapes were withheld from him while he was White House coordinator with the Federal Bureau of Investigation during a probe into the original 18-minute gap in the Watergate tape recording.

Emerson said presidential counsel J. Fred Buzhardt, "wouldn't let anybody hear them but himself."

"I couldn't ever figure out who was concealing what," Emerson said. "But I knew something was being done between Buzhardt, Gen. Haig, Nixon's chief of staff and Nixon ... Buzhardt had to have known about these three missing tapes because he was listening to the tapes and providing the transcripts."

Last March Emerson said he believed Nixon was "innocent, totally and completely," of any impeachable acts. After read-

STEPPED ON MINE
The talks opened last week. On Cyprus, a member of a British television crew was killed by a land mine and four other foreign newsmen were wounded as a press convoy en-

terered the town of Lapithos. Newsmen in the convoy said Ted Stoddard, a soundman for the British Broadcasting Corp., was killed when he stepped on the mine. The wounded were Paul Roque, a French photographer of The Associated Press; Chris Morris, a British correspondent of the BBC; Lefkos Christodoulides, an American of Greek descent on assignment for the New York Times; and Simon Dring, another Briton with the BBC.

In New York, the Greek mission to the United Nations declared that Cyprus must be demilitarized in order to preserve its independence. The U.N. mission of the new civilian Greek government said Turkish withdrawal would be the "first urgent step" toward peace.

Greek officers on Cyprus led the coup last month that ousted President Makarios. The Greek U.N. mission added that Athens did not intend to negotiate at Geneva until Cyprus was made a party to the talks. Britain, Greece and Turkey — guarantors of Cypriot independence under a 1960 treaty — signed the July 30 cease-fire agreement.

UPROOTED TURKS
Rauf Denkash, leader of the Turkish Cypriots, is expected to join the talks on Saturday with Glafcos Clerides, a Greek Cypriot who is acting president of Cyprus.

On the Cyprus battlefields Wednesday, Turkish troops moved behind an artillery barrage to add three miles to their northern coast foothold.

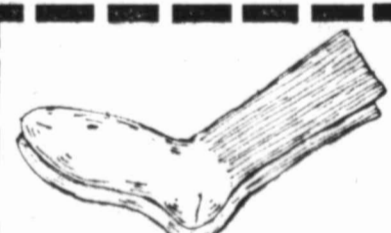

Nixon Faces Possible Criminal Prosecution

...sense had been committed," Stephenson said. "It would be an admission of guilt, first of all."

Another lawyer familiar with the issue said he believes that if Nixon pardoned himself, the action would be nullified if he were subsequently convicted by the Senate. Any self-pardon also could be tested in the courts.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon faces possible criminal prosecution should he resign or be removed from office, but several escape routes may be open to him.

Congress or special Watergate prosecutor Leon Jaworski could take steps to save Nixon from a criminal trial. So could Vice President Gerald R. Ford if he succeeds to the presidency.

Some legal experts believe Nixon could even pardon himself of all crimes before leaving office, but that is viewed as only a remote possibility.

PLOT TO BLOCK

Most constitutional scholars concede that a president cannot be indicted while in office, although it is not an undisputed legal principle.

The Watergate grand jury ducked the issue when it chose to name Nixon as an unindicted co-conspirator in the Watergate cover-up.

Nixon was accused as a co-conspirator in the plot to block the original Watergate investigation and conceal the White

House involvement in the break-in at Democratic national headquarters June 17, 1972.

Monday, he admitted ordering the investigation halted for political reasons and concealing the information from his lawyers and the House Judiciary Committee.

FIVE YEARS IN PRISON

Some members of Congress say Nixon, in effect, confessed to obstructing justice, a crime carrying a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine. Multiple counts and related charges would increase the potential penalties.

If Nixon resigns, he would be vulnerable to an indictment. If he were convicted in an impeachment trial, he would be removed from office and similarly vulnerable because the Constitution states that "the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment according to law."

To avoid that fate, Nixon could attempt to strike a deal with Jaworski. The President

could offer to resign in exchange for the prosecutor's promise not to bring criminal charges. But the deal would not necessarily bind a grand jury.

The prosecutor's office refuses to comment on the possibility of plea bargaining. Atty. Gen. William B. Saxbe said on Wednesday he is not aware of any ongoing negotiations. Nixon's chief attorney, James D. St. Clair, said he is "not prepared to discuss it."

ESCAPE POSSIBLE

Congress also could act to save Nixon from criminal charges.

Sen. Edward Brooke, R-

Mass., reportedly was seeking Democratic support for a resolution declaring "it is the sense of the Congress" that if Nixon should resign, no federal officer "should bring, conduct, or continue criminal or civil processes against him."

The resolution would not have the force of law, but Brooke said he believes all law enforcement officials would abide by it if the Congress passed it.

If any immunity proposal survives in Congress, it would most likely be a resolution rather than a law.

A congressional grant of immunity by statute probably

would violate the Constitution, according to several legal experts.

In a related issue, the Justice Department has taken the position that Congress has no power to pass legislation granting amnesty to draft evaders. The pardon power belongs exclusively to the executive branch, the department contends.

PARDON CLAUSE

The Constitution's pardon clause may be vital to Nixon's fate.

Ford, once he became president, would have unquestioned legal authority to pardon Nixon

or to order that no federal charges be brought against him, lawyers say.

But he would "have to consider how it would play politically," suggested a former Justice Department attorney.

The most far-fetched option, but a legally feasible one, is the possibility that Nixon could pardon himself before leaving office.

"It's a highly theoretical and far-fetched situation, but yes, he could," said Deputy Pardon Attorney David C. Stephenson. "If he chose to pardon himself, we don't theoretically see any obstacle."

The Constitution's pardon clause says nothing about indictment and conviction as a prerequisite for presidential forgiveness.

FIRST OF ALL

The Supreme Court, in an 1868 decision, said a president's pardon power "extends to every offense known to the law, and may be exercised at any time after its commission, either before legal proceedings are taken, or during their pendency, or after conviction and judgment."

Funnel Clouds Near Amarillo

Black sheets of rain poured down across South Central and Southwest Texas again today, dumping more than a foot of water in some places.

San Antonio gurgled under five inches of early morning rain that virtually cut off city streets and forced residents to stay home.

San Antonio police reported hundreds of cars stalled and all underpasses flooded. Fire department units were dispatched to evacuate residents in low-lying areas.

Police asked residents to stay home unless absolutely necessary. No injuries or deaths were reported, however.

Flash flood warnings in the area were in effect until noon.

The heaviest downpour Wednesday was just west of San Antonio. Cotulla has received 13.93 inches in the last 48 hours. Garciasville and Batesville have also received eight or more inches.

Early today, Cotulla was inside the boundaries of a heavy thunderstorm system that stretched from near Austin to near Victoria, Corpus Christi, near Laredo and Uvalde. Thunderstorms dropped rains in excess of an inch per hour in the Cotulla area.

Funnel clouds were reported Wednesday at Victoria in South Texas and near Amarillo, Dumas and Dalhart in the Panhandle. A tornado warning was issued for a four-county Panhandle area until 11 p.m., and rains continued in that section until the early morning hours.

Predawn temperatures varied from 61 degrees at Dalhart to 81 at Corpus Christi.

KNOTTY SITUATION — Daniel Murphy, above, 32, a Chicago high school teacher, filed suit against the private high school he worked for after he was fired for refusing to wear a tie. Housing Bill Is Revamped

WASHINGTON (AP) — An agreement has been reached by Senate-House conferees on a \$11.3 billion housing bill that was revamped to avoid being vetoed by President Nixon.

The compromise measure announced Wednesday would continue two subsidy programs for the poor which Nixon had sought to end, but it does not require the administration to fund them.

The bill also would raise the ceiling on FHA-insured mortgages for single-family homes from \$33,000 to \$45,000.

In addition, it would combine major urban programs into a block grant system giving cities greater flexibility to use the funds, which Nixon requested.

In removing many of the administration's objections to a bill passed by the Senate last March, Senate conferees agreed to drop a key provision that would consolidate the multitude of housing assistance programs into a much smaller number.

Severity Of Drought Is Outlined To Lions Club

There's no discounting the severity of the drought, but timely and ample rain could shrink its impact.

In general "it's fortunate we have sources of income other than agriculture," said County Agent Bruce Griffith in a talk to the Downtown Lions on Wednesday at the Settles. "But that doesn't help the individuals directly affected. It's bad."

He predicted there will be immediate action to obtain disaster aid through the ASCS, and that additional disaster help may be sought through Farmers Home Administration.

Agricultural income amounted to \$210 million in Howard County last year. Only a fraction of that is in prospect this year, he said. Cotton acreage, cut in half from 1973, faces the prospect on only about a fifth as much per acre.

The grain sorghum crop is virtually nil, Griffith reported. Pasture forage is gone, and most stock water is depleted, and ranchers are faced with not

only "pulling calves green" (ahead of a desired stage), but also of having to sell off part or all of brood stock. Milo, which not so long ago was going at \$2 cwt, suddenly is up to \$6, so ranchers can't afford feed, even if they could find sorghum to buy.

This may mean a cattle glut on the market now, but it would sortend a serious shortage and much higher meat prices next year.

There's no easy answer, Griffith observed, and quipped that about the best advice to farmers and ranchers is "be nice to your banker."

This country, however, has a great resiliency, he noted, and can bounce back... and so can the people in agriculture.

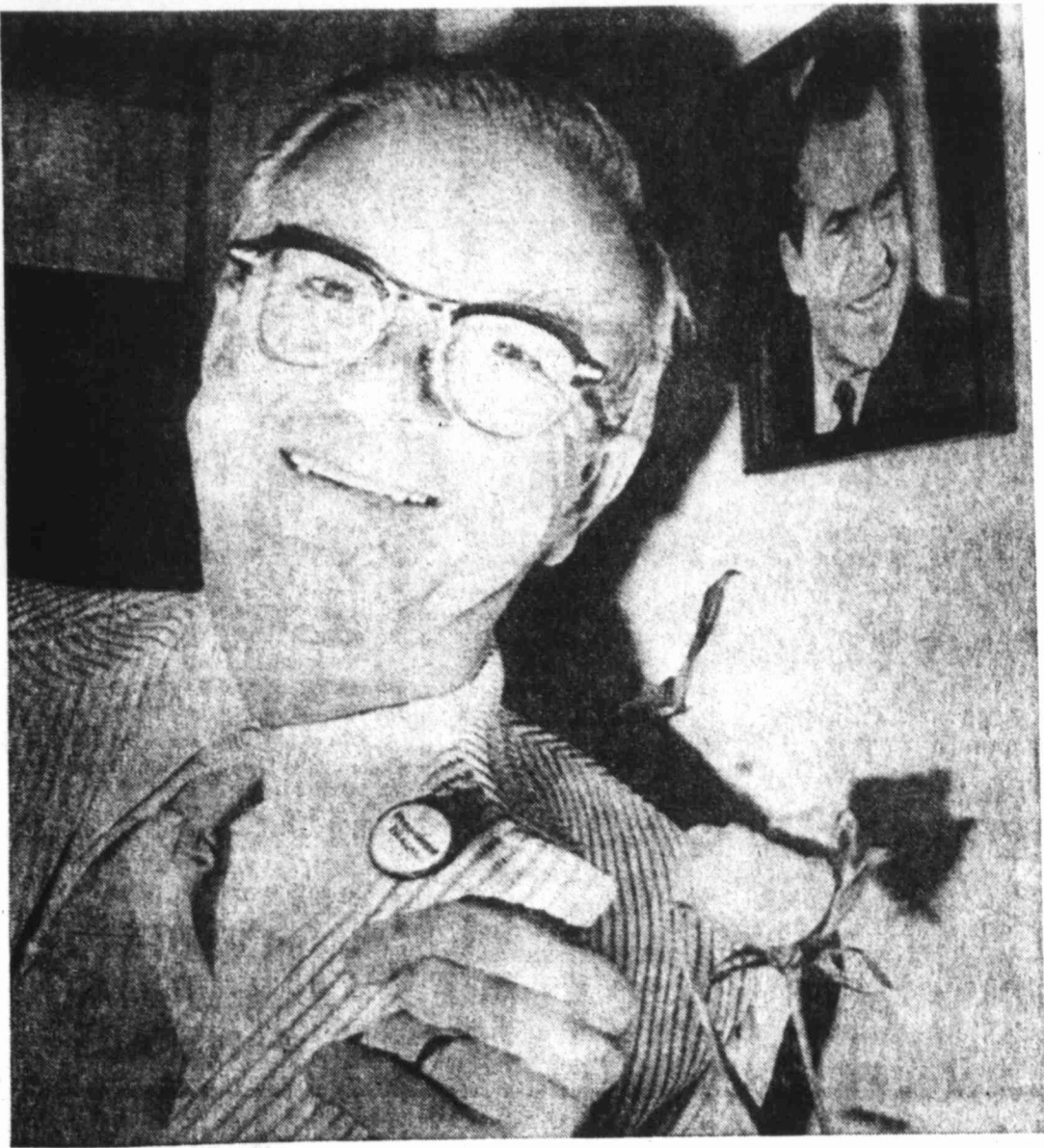

Fast Departure Would Aid Country, GOP And Nixon?

From Oregon to Louisiana, many top Republican officials want President Nixon to resign, saying his prompt departure from office would benefit the country, the party and Nixon himself.

Support for the President is virtually gone among the officials of the party that five times placed him on its national ticket, an Associated Press survey showed today.

The survey, which drew responses from party officials in 30 states representing a geographic and ideological GOP cross section, disclosed many think a Nixon resignation now would help GOP prospects in the November congressional and gubernatorial elections.

Many GOP state chairmen and National Committee members contacted at the national Wednesday expressed confusion over the proper course, saying it was up to the President to decide whether to stay on after admitting his involvement in the Watergate cover-up.

OWN GOOD

Nearly half of the officials in the 30 states favored Nixon's resignation, almost that many refused to state an opinion and only a few opposed resignation, generally on the grounds that the constitutional process of impeachment should proceed.

"I have been one of President Nixon's most loyal supporters,"

said Oregon Committeewoman Dorotha Moore. "But I have come to feel that for his own good as well as for the good of the country, he should resign."

"The President should not resign," said Missouri GOP Chairman Albert Rendell. "The abusive attacks from so many quarters have been so unfair that resignation would be a tragic development," he added. "The constitutional process is provided for and should be followed."

DISGUSTED
"Up until last night I was strongly opposed to having the President resign," said Missouri GOP Committeewoman Rosemary Ginn. "But now I really don't know what to think."

National Committeeman John Cade Jr. of Louisiana said, "Most Republicans would be relieved if he would resign." He called the current situation "intolerable for both the country and, secondarily, the Republican party."

"I am heartbroken, upset and completely disgusted by your actions," Colorado GOP National Committeeman and gubernatorial hopeful William Daniels said in a letter to Nixon.

New Mexico Republican Chairman Murray Ryan, while declining to take a stand on presidential resignation, said it would alleviate the adverse effect Watergate is having on the entire political process.

GO RIGHT AHEAD
"I think the President should resign immediately," said Tennessee National Committeeman George Ed Wilson. "By following the impeachment proceedings, the President is simply prolonging the traumatic situation the country is in at this time."

He added that "I think it would benefit Republican chances in November for the President to resign" and urged that the GOP National Committee be convened to consider the matter.

Beth Rogers, Kansas GOP National Committeewoman, said she thinks the President should resign but added "If he resigns, I don't think it will have a tremendous effect on the election in November. We'll go right ahead with Vice President Ford."

Wholesale Prices Up 3.7 Per Cent

WASHINGTON (AP) — The biggest wholesale jump in farm prices. A 6.4 per cent jump in July reversed four straight months of decline.

The Nixon administration had tied falling or at least moderating food prices to its predictions for getting inflation down to a 7 per cent annual rate of increase by year's end. Consumer prices are currently 11 per cent above a year ago.

The wholesale increase in food prices alone was 3.6 per cent on a seasonally adjusted basis, with meat pacing the increase. Processed foods and sugar also posted significant increases. Prices for milk and fresh vegetables declined.

Since wholesale price increases are usually translated into higher prices for consumers, the report cast a pall over hopes for any slackening in the nation's double-digit inflation. Foreshadowing possible future trouble for meat prices was an even larger rise — 3.5 per cent — for the processed

foods and feeds farmers must buy for their livestock.

Auto prices, usually stable at this time of year, also rose.

Industrial commodities moved upward, although not as steeply as farm prices. The increase for the industrial commodities was 2.7 per cent, compared to a 2.2 increase the previous month. Wholesale prices have been increasing by more than two per cent all year.

The increase for commodities was virtually across the board, with the strongest rises in iron, steel, petroleum and its by-products. Lumber prices, however, declined for the third straight month.

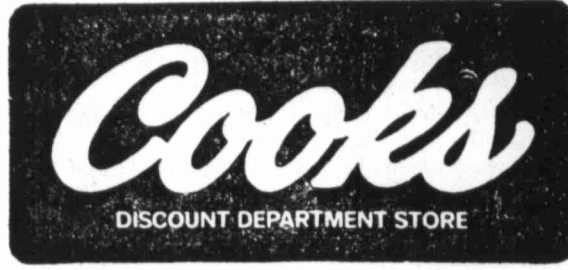

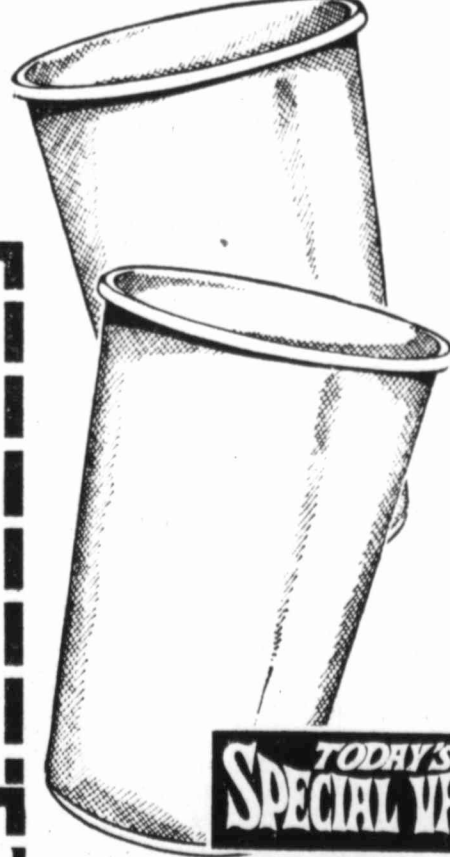

The fruits and vegetables of nature's summer bounty can be cooked for right-now meals or for those of the future. Or, if desired, they can be preserved for future gift giving. A jar of rum taffy peaches or fresh tomato and pineapple relish makes an acceptable gift for practically anyone.

The former can be served as a meat accompaniment or it can become a tasty dessert by serving warm or chilled with shipped cream or ice cream. The relish, zestily flavored with spices, is perfect with a hearty German meal, such as potatoes and sausages.

FRESH TOMATO AND PINEAPPLE RELISH

2 cups prepared tomatoes (about 1¼ lb. fully ripe tomatoes)
6 cups (2 lb. 10 oz. sugar)
1½ cups (one 13½-oz. can) crushed pineapple
2 tps. vinegar
2 tps. Worcestershire sauce
½ tsp. allspice
½ tsp. cinnamon
¼ tsp. ground cloves
½ tsp. salt
1 bottle pectin
First prepare the

tomatoes. Scald, peel, and chop about 1¾ pounds ripe tomatoes. Bring to a boil; then simmer 10 minutes. Measure 2 cups into very large saucepan. Measure remaining ingredients, except pectin, into saucepan, mixing well.

Then prepare the relish. Place saucepan over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil, and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and at once stir in fruit pectin. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim for 5 minutes to cool slightly and prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Cover at once with ¼ inch hot paraffin. Serve with roast beef or other meats.

Yield: 7 cups or about 9 (6-oz.) glasses.

RUM TAFFY PEACHES

½ cup unshuflured molasses
1-3 cup sugar
½ cup water
3 tps. lemon juice
2 tps. rum or 1 tsp. rum extract
5 large peaches, peeled, pitted and halved.
Combine molasses, sugar, water, lemon juice and rum

in a 10-inch skillet. Simmer 5 minutes. Add peach halves; allow mixture to come to a simmer again. Cover; cook 10 minutes, or until just tender. Serve warm or chilled with ice cream. Yield: 6 servings.

NOTE: If desired, 1 can (29 ounces) peach halves may be substituted for fresh peaches. Substitute peach syrup for water and reduce sugar to 3 tps.

Citrus Fruits And Melon Balls

Combine honeydew melon and orange sections and cover with the juice of lemons and limes, chill and you have a refreshing dessert or cocktail.

ORANGE-MELON CUP
3 C. honeydew melon balls
2 C. fresh orange sections
6 tps. fresh lemon juice
2 tps. fresh lime juice
¼ C. sugar

In large bowl mix honeydew balls and orange sections. Combine lemon juice, lime juice and sugar; pour over fruit. Cover and chill. Serve in sherbet glasses. Makes 6 servings.

Chasing Nixon Reports Like Being In Cave Full Of Echoes


WASHINGTON (AP) — Chasing reports that the President would quit was like being in a cave full of echoes. Everybody had heard something. Nobody was sure where it was coming from. It was a hunt for one of the biggest news stories of the century. Here is how it was Wednesday for reporters who didn't find it. Two newspapers, in Phoenix and Providence, said Nixon had decided to resign. White House spokesmen wouldn't give a straight answer. The game was afoot.

Reporters sought out Vice President Gerald R. Ford, who would be sworn in the moment the President stepped down. No clues there. Ford went ahead with plans to appear at a routine ceremony Thursday morning.

One White House aide reported that Nixon would resign, but wasn't sure when. Nothing said, "Don't write your impeachment speech, you won't get a chance to use it," Rangel said. "I tried to pump him, but he wouldn't say anything." Intriguing, but what did it mean? There was a rumor that Edward Cox, the President's son-in-law, had been summoned to Washington from New York. The rumor proved to be true. Then it was reported that the President had met with his family at the White House. But what did he tell them? A call to yet another Republican congressman brought this response: "I've been listening to the radio all afternoon. Nobody will tell me anything either." Another Democratic congressman, who asked not to be named, said a senior Republican colleague had told him Nixon would quit Friday. But there was no indication where the information originated. Various television news reports quoted various sources as indicating Nixon would resign. Finally, in late afternoon, Nixon summoned Republican congressional leaders to the White House.



'I Had Tears In My Eyes,' Nixon's Photographer Says

WASHINGTON (AP) "It was pathetic. I had tears in my eyes." The witness: Oliver "Ollie" Atkins, personal photographer to Richard Nixon in good times and bad since 1968. Nixon, seemingly poised on the brink of becoming the first American president to resign the office, was gathering his family for a private dinner after hearing gloomy tidings from Senate and House Republican leaders and party elder Barry Goldwater. Atkins was there, as on many occasions in the past — in Peeking and Moscow and at inaugural balls — to record a moment in history. Just a few minutes earlier he had photographed the beleaguered President walking in the White House Rose Garden with daughter Tricia Cox. The White House press office reported Nixon and Mrs. Cox just happened to meet as the President was walking home to dinner and that Atkins just happened to walk by with a loaded camera as father and daughter decided to take an evening stroll. In the past this explanation would, more than likely, have been the prelude to another public relation move — a dis-tribution, to the news media of official White House photos. In fact, two White House officials of Nixon's bedrock supporters indicated that was the plan Wednesday night. No matter. It was an evening to be recorded on film. Just two days earlier, the President had made public a transcript of a 1972 conversation with H. R. Haldeman that was judged damning by many in Congress.

Former Candidate Claims Charter Failure May Hurt

AUSTIN — Rep. Charles Finnell, Holliday, said the Constitutional Convention's failure to finally produce any proposed revision was a disappointing denial of the people's right to vote on key state policy matters.

"The basic charter the convention finally failed to accept was worthy of being sent to the voters," Finnell said of the revision proposal which fell three votes short of passage at the midnight hour of the Convention.

Finnell said he voted for the final proposal — which would have included letting the voters have their say on both the document and such special issues as right-to-work, prohibition on gambling, and a welfare ceiling limiting state expenditures.

"I previously voted against several earlier proposed revisions which were strictly urban-oriented because I was holding out for important provisions I believe vital to West Texans."

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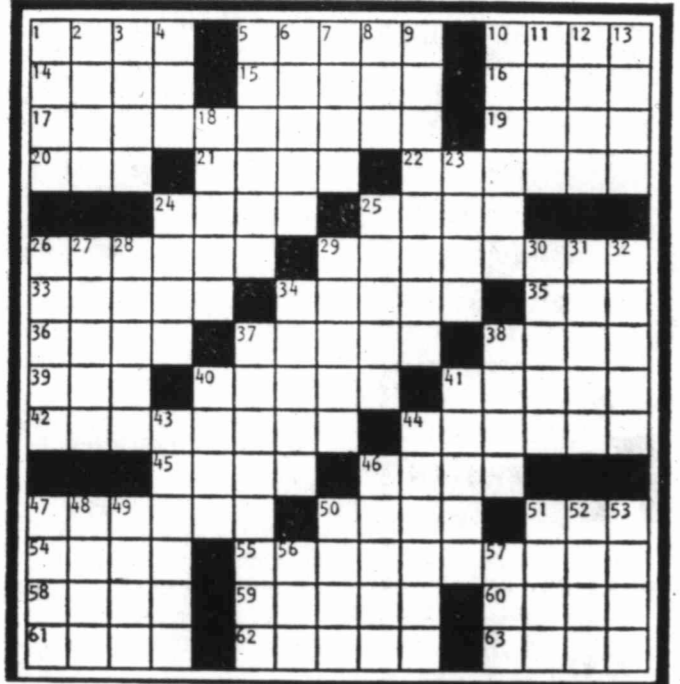

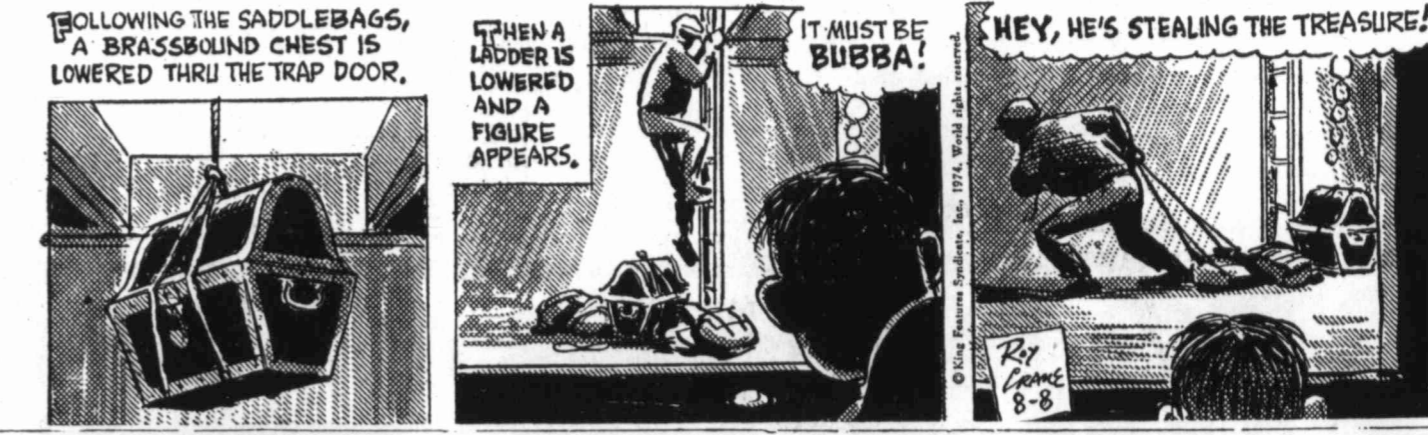

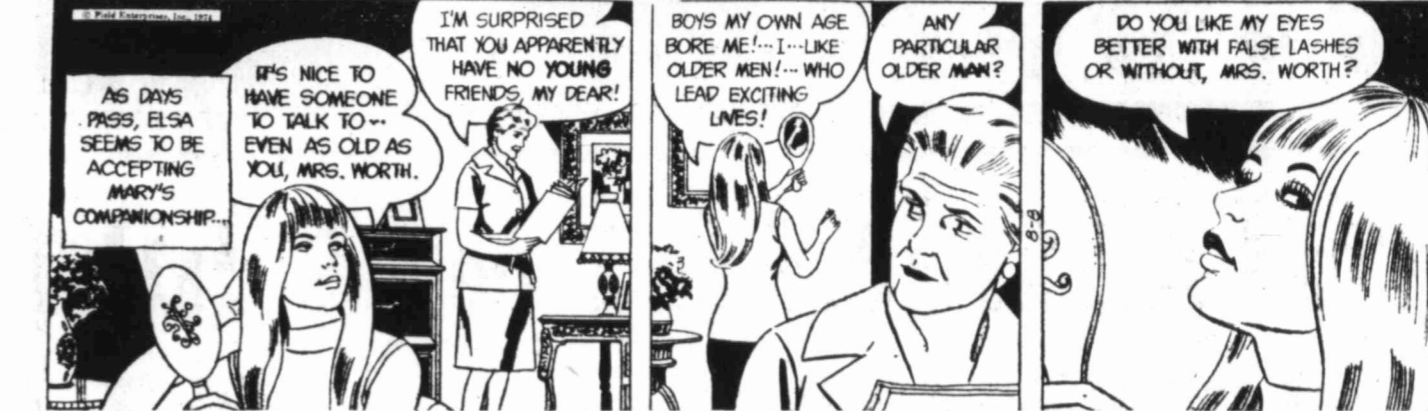

Charge Cocaine Woven Into Rug

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Customs officials have arrested a 74-year-old woman for illegally importing cocaine woven into a Colombian rug.

"Who could have done this to me?" Customs Inspector Charles Harvey quoted Madeleine Partlow of East Stroudsburg, Pa., as saying when the drug was discovered. Customs agents said one and three-quarter pounds of the cocaine was found in about 100 small plastic tubes woven into the wool rug that Mrs. Partlow brought into the country late Tuesday from Bogota.

"She said she went to Bogota with friends and they took her to the market and bought her this rug as a gift," said U.S. Marshal Melvin Mullis. Harvey said she carried three pieces of luggage into customs

and clutched the rug rolled up in plain brown paper under her arm.

He said he unwrapped the rug, poked at it and white powder spurted out.

"Cocaine," he said. "The woman's mouth fell open."

Officials said the half-inch diameter tubes ran the width of the carpet and were not visible except on close inspection.

Mrs. Partlow was released on a \$10,000 personal recognizance bond Wednesday. A preliminary hearing was set for Aug. 27.

Paige Movie To Be Made

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A motion picture company is preparing a two-hour movie for national television on Leroy "Satchel" Paige, the legendary pitcher of the black baseball leagues from the 1920s through the 1940s.

The \$800,000 project is planned for showing on CBS the week before the 1975 World Series, says Jim Hawkins, who is producing the film.

"We're working very carefully because we want to show the exploitation of this great man in his private and public life," Hawkins said.

"We're bringing in every phase of black baseball, the Indianapolis Clowns, for example. We want to show how pitiful it was in those leagues. The long bus trips. When it got really good they rode trains. They couldn't stay in hotels. They usually had to stay in private black homes."

Hawkins said he has been talking with Paige periodically for 3½ years collecting material for the film.

"We'll start filming in February on location in Mobile, Ala., Cleveland Stadium and all around the South where Satchel grew up and played. We'll tell the whole story of his rise to prominence and his helping to pitch the Cleveland Indians to a World Series triumph in 1948."

The flamboyant Paige was the best known and perhaps the best pitcher in the black leagues for two decades. He reached Cleveland only after Jackie Robinson had broken the major leagues' color barrier with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947. He kept his age a secret, but he was in his 40s and past his prime. Even so he posted a 6-1 record as a starter.

Joe Greene is writing the script. Hawkins says he's not sure who the leading man will be.

He said Paige will appear only briefly in the film, which will take him from age six until his appearance with Cleveland and possibly until the present.

Paige, now retired, lives in Kansas City.

ROAD BRINGS TOURISTS, MURDERS Sleeping Land Rumbles

TIJUANA, Mexico (AP) — At Punta Prieta, one-third of the way along Baja California's new transpeninsular highway, Mexican police say they counted 1,200 southbound vehicles during 24 hours of a recent holiday weekend.

At Colonia Guerrero, about 120 miles below the U.S. border, Roberto Sanchez is expanding his general store and building a 16-room motel.

"You see shops springing up all over," says Jim Crostini, who runs a trailer park nearby. The first paved road to cross the starkly lovely finger of land across the Gulf of California from the Mexican mainland is bringing the tourists—but not as many yet as predicted. It is bringing prosperity to those enterprising Mexicans who have been putting up gasoline stations, cafes and motels along its 1,050 miles.

It has also brought crime—two murders in Guerrero Negro where there were no killings since the mid-1960s, and a handful of reported roadside robberies by night.

CONGESTED BORDER There also are complaints of mounting litter, mainly at the few off-road places where motorists have parked to marvel at the primitive land which has lain dormant, by modern standard, since Anglos discovered it in 1533.

And death... The "Road of Dreams" which President Luis Echeverria dedicated last December is 27 feet wide, bold and free as it roars away from Tijuana's congested border. Within 200 miles, at El Rosario, it narrows to 19 feet. It twists sharply around mountains with 3,000 drops on the side. There are cattle, sheep and goats on the road at times—and often rocks and sudden dips.

"DREAM" ROAD Ramiro Zuniga Gonzales, commander of the Mexican Highway Police in Baja California, said there have been only 15 highway accidents and a single death along the 60 miles between Guerrero Negro and San Quintin.

But in El Rosario, where she has operated a cafe and gas-pinoza calls the "dream" road a traffic nightmare. Three townspeople have been killed by hit-run drivers since December, she said. Before the road came, there were not fatal accidents ever, says Mrs. Espinoza.

ports of widespread crime and death.

EXAGGERATED Says Mrs. Bowen: "Sometimes there are some robberies but it is a small number of incidents. We tell people when they are on the highway never to be isolated, never be alone. We've had some problems down there but it's exaggerated to a great extent."

Along the way, iridescent blue waters bounce their reflected beauty off the white beaches. The ocotillo flowers and purple sunsets offer a Reubens-like contrast to the sandy tones of desert. A Paradise, unmarred by civilization, is the description used by many.

Near Santa Ines, roadside boulders already bear the painted names of Americans passing by.
