WASHINGTON - It would be before him a memorandum of 38 hard to imagine any way by which the whole Watergate horror could have been given new life than by President Gerald Ford's precipitous blanket pardon of former President Richard Nixon

THE COUNTRY HAD BEEN happy to accept Ford as ushering in a new era of reconciliation when, contrary to previous statements, one given at his first press conference, he

that by a quick, decisive move he would put the whole thing in the past. After a flurry of controversy it would be seen that his compassionate pardon was the only way to clear the air and relegate the

whole matter to history. If this was his motive, he made a serious miscalculation. As he said nearly a year ago when asked about total absolution, "The public wouldn't stand for it." Nothing has happened in the intervening months to change that opinion. In fact the whole cycle of jail sentences, upcoming trials and the drama of Nixon's self-righteous resignation has strengthened that view.

ONE MAY QUESTION Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski's expressed opinion that the pardon will not influence the outcome of the Sept. 30 trial of the principal Nixon lieutenants. 'Chicano' Traced

Associated Press Writer ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP, The term "chicano" survived nearly five centuries in obscure corners) of the Spanish language before becoming a symbol of pride for young Spanish-Americans, says a college professor.

"The word has been with us since the time of the Conquest of Mexico in the early 1500's," said Dr. Sabine Ulibarri, chairman of the University of New Mexico's department of modern and classical languages. "IT WAS NEVER used very much because it had a sort of derogatory tinge to it," he said in an interview.

Ulibarri said the word, derived from the same Indian tribe that gave Mexico its name, the Mexicas, has been adopted by a generation of Spanish-surnamed Americans seeking a word that reflected their heritage and a new sense of nationalism. "The Chicanos learned something

from the blacks," said Ulibarri, a native of the predominantly Spanish village of Tierra Amarilla in northern New Mexico. "The blacks took the characteristic they were most criticized for havingtheir color-and turned it into a source of pride. "THE CHICANOS did the same

thing. They took a derogatory word from their own language and said, 'Chicano is beautiful.'

Most older-generation Spanish people in New Mexico refuse to buy

that term. They prefer to be Hispanos or Spanish-Americans.' Ulibarri said the term originated with the Mexicas Indians who were found "by the Spanish when they entered the valley of Mexico. At the time the letter 'x' in the Spanish language had an 'sh' sound, so the word was pronounced

Over the centuries, he said, "x' was dropped from the language and the "sh" sound disappeared. ULIBARRI said, "It became very difficult for Spanish-speakers to pronounce the 'sh' sound. They often pronounce shopping as 'chop-

So Mexicano became Mechicano in pronunciation. "Eventually, the first syllable was dropped and it became

Ulibarri said the new spirit of nationalism among many minorities is "causing certain problems in nomenclature.

In the villages of northern New Mexico, many of them peopled by descendents of Spanish colonists who fought their way up the Rio Grande from Mexico in the 16th Century, "the term Spanish-American suits them best. It was a term everybody was happy with for a long time, up until the time of the Johnson administration."

A decade or two ago, Ulibarri said, Latin-American was an acceptable term for Spanish-surnamed "In a sense, it's a fitting word. persons in this country. Today it has all but disappeared. blessing.

Pension Act Information Available

The Pension Reform Act of 1974 was signed into law shortly before noon on Monday, Sept. 2, bringing about drastic changes in pension planning. A complete clause by clause explanation of this new law and its effects on employes is now available on reference at the Howard County Library.

The new rules promise safer, better guaranteed benefits for workers, create new problems for employers and their advisors, and offer generous pension related tax breaks for the selfemployed.

Included in the new law are the following provisions: mandatory rules for coverage and vesting which features a three-way option; minimum funding standards backed by sharp excise tax teeth; tight fiduciary rules; audited annual financial statements; Benefit Guaranty Corporation to collect insurance premiums, employers and pay benefits when plans fail; IRS administration and enforcement with help from Labor and Commerce

Departments. IRS has also revised the Form 1024 Exemption Application. The new Form 1024 also replaces forms 1025, 1026 and 1027. The revised Form 1024 is available at the Howard County Library to be Xeroxed and used in place of




