

'Oil Crisis Could Bring Global War'

DETROIT (AP) — Raising the specter of possible global war if oil price and supply problems are not solved, President Ford said today. "Sovereign nations cannot allow their policies to be dictated or their fates decided" by artificially

rigged and distorted oil markets. Ford raised this warning flag to Arab oil producers at a 69-nation World Energy Conference here that drew participation by Arab representatives. Ford said:

"It is difficult to discuss the energy problem without lapsing into doomsday language. The danger is clear. It is severe. I am nevertheless optimistic. The advantages of cooperation are as visible as the dangers of confrontation. And that gives me hope as well as optimism."

Ford underscored the strongest language yet used by an American president in discussing the consequences of massive price hikes by oil-producing nations with a reminder that "throughout history, nations have gone to war over natural advantages such as water, or food, or convenient passages on land or sea."

But he said that in the nuclear age war presents unacceptable risks for all mankind because "any local conflict may escalate to global catastrophe." Outlining five principles that he said could guide international cooperation in meeting energy problems, Ford listed this as his final point:

"A global strategy must seek to achieve fuel prices which provide a strong incentive to producers but which do not seriously disrupt the economies of the consumers. We recognize the desires of the producers to earn a fair price for their oil as a means of helping to develop their own economies. But exorbitant prices can only distort the world economy, run the risk of worldwide depression, and threaten the breakdown of world order and safety."

The President welcomed Friday's Brussels agreement by 12 major consuming nations to deal with such emergencies as embargoes by sharing available oil, cutting consumption and using reserves equitably. In effect, Ford's address expanded on a theme he struck in appearing before the United Nations General Assembly last Wednesday when he linked problems of food, energy and inflation.

Ford flew to Detroit from Andrews Air Force Base, Md., following a sun-up breakfast at the home of Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana. The President planned to return to the White House later today and arranged a meeting with bipartisan congressional leaders and ranking members of key Senate and House committees at an evening working dinner.

Job Plan Backing Sought

WASHINGTON (AP) — Spokesmen for the nation's cities urged President Ford today to support a proposed federally funded \$4-billion public service jobs program to deal with rising unemployment.

The National League of Cities and the U.S. Conference of Mayors said the type of program discussed earlier this month by Ford "is a far cry" from what is needed to take the sting out of inflation. In a statement prepared for today's state and local government conference on inflation, the two organizations endorsed a proposal first made by Arthur F. Burns, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, for providing 800,000 public service jobs.

"Such a program should be advocated by this administration," declared the two organizations, which together represent 15,000 municipalities. The conference is one of a series leading to the economic summit at the White House later this week.

The mayors offered a ninepoint program for curing the economy. In addition to the jobs program, their proposal included tax reform, expanded urban economic development, increased federal subsidies for public transit and re-enactment of general revenue-sharing programs. They also warned against excessive cuts in the federal budget, saying that "if the knife is employed too freely, there is a strong possibility that the current economic recession will deepen — unemployment will rise, economic output will further decline and profits will be lost."

Nixon In Sick Bay

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Former President Richard M. Nixon, ailing with pleuritis, checks into a bright, new hospital wing today. Preserving the same secrecy which surrounded him in the White House, Nixon and his aides declined to reveal his expected arrival time in advance. A hospital spokeswoman and nurses said the staff had no idea when he would arrive. According to the hospital schedule, Nixon was to go directly to his room after check-in. There, hospital personnel will take blood samples and complete other diagnostic procedures.

Kennedy To Sit Out Presidential Race

BOSTON (AP) — Sen. Edward M. Kennedy said today he would not be a candidate for president or vice president in 1976. "I will not accept the nomination. I will not accept a draft," he said, adding: "My primary responsibilities are at home." The Massachusetts Democrat said his decision was final and unconditional. He said, "I would be unable to make a full commitment to a campaign for the presidency."

Kennedy, 42, brother of the late President John F. Kennedy and the late Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, both of whom were assassinated, said he made the decision after discussing it with his wife.

He made the announcement at a Boston news conference. His wife Joan, who has been in rest homes twice in recent months, was at his side.

Kennedy said he expected that he would have been able to win the Democratic nomination if he had decided to seek it.

Kennedy said his announcement "will permit others who have been interested in gaining the nomination the chance for exposure during this campaign."

He said, "The real question before the people is who's going to come up with some solutions to our economic problems."

Asked what effect the Chappaquiddick incident of 1969 had on his decision, Kennedy said: "This decision would have been made irrespective of the tragedy that happened in 1969. Were I to run, it would have been a factor that would have been raised."

Mary Jo Kopechne, a former secretary for Robert Kennedy, was killed when a car driven by Kennedy went off a bridge at Chappaquiddick Island off the Massachusetts coast.

Kennedy said "I can live with my testimony" about the Chappaquiddick incident and why there was a delay in reporting the accident and added: "Although I regret the incident I would have been able to focus the campaign on other issues."

George Weeks has been named as a new member of the Better Business Bureau's Permian Basin Unit, succeeding Bob Hickson, who was transferred by Hemphill Wells to San Angelo. His term expires December 1976.

Larry Willard and Tom Ivey are the other Big Spring directors. Weeks was named at the board meeting in Terminal today noon.

Weeks is chairman of the Chamber of Commerce retail committee, a member of the American Business Club, Shrine, Masonic orders, Quarterback Club, 14th and Main Church of Christ.

He was a co-founder in 1958 of Gibbs & Weeks Men's Store.

Weeks and his wife, Johnie, have two sons, Don at Howard College and John at ACC; one daughter, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Cook, San Antonio.

Brennan Well Known For Brevity, Simplicity

OXNARD, Calif. (AP) — Walter Brennan played many different personality types over a half century, but he was known for brevity and simplicity in his own life.

Brennan, who died at 80 on Saturday after a long battle with emphysema, was noted for playing the grizzled sidekick to the big stars of Westerns early in his career. He later gained national fame as the wise and wisecracking grandfather, Amos McCoy, in television's "The Real McCoys."

Brennan's first Oscar was awarded for his 1936 performance in "Come and Get It," in which he played a lumberjack who ages from 25 to 75.

Two years later, he won an Oscar for portraying an 84-year-old man in "Kentucky."

In 1941, Brennan won again for his role as Judge Roy Bean in "The Westerner," starring Gary Cooper.

The three Oscars were for best supporting actor.

The white-haired veteran appeared in hundreds of films dating back to 1923 and starred in four television series before retiring two years ago to his 11-acre grapefruit ranch in Moorpark, about 35 miles north of Los Angeles.

In 10 Years, Rocky's Income \$47 Million

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nelson A. Rockefeller told the Senate Rules and Administration Committee today he earned almost \$47 million and paid more than \$21 million in taxes over the past decade.

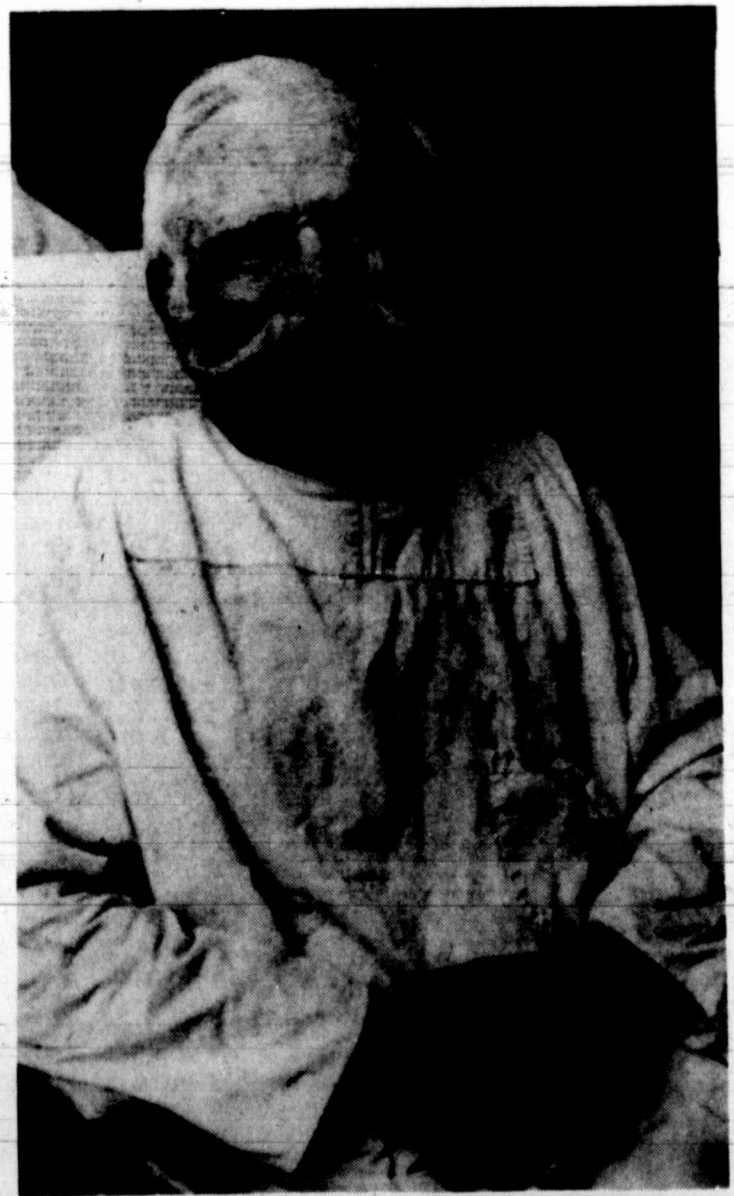
The former New York governor opened his vice presidential confirmation hearings with a 72-page statement, packed with financial data about the Rockefellers' worldwide investments plus tidbits of family and personal history.

Accompanied by his wife, Happy, Rockefeller arrived precisely on time for the 10 a.m. hearing in the vast Senate Caucus Room—scene of last year's nationally televised Senate Watergate hearings and many other historic investigations over the years.

In contrast to the Watergate hearings, only a short line of spectators was on hand. Some of the 200 seats set aside for the public remained unfilled, while others were occupied by congressional staff members.

Rockefeller disclosed that, in addition to \$62.5 million in personal assets and \$116.4 million in two trusts from which he receives income, his wife receives the income from a \$3.9 million trust while their children receive the income from a \$35.7 million trust.

He assured the Senate panel that "should I become confirmed and should Congress request, I will place immediately

WATER CHEST HIGH IN PLACES El Paso Woes Mount

Runoff in areas too waterlogged to absorb more rain sent water rising into homes and forced evacuation of areas on the southeast side of El Paso in far West Texas today.

Police estimated National Guardsmen in high-wheeled vehicles helped occupants to higher ground from possibly 100 dwellings in the Cedar Grove Park and Thomas Manor neighborhoods of what is known as El Paso's Lower Valley section.

While water rose chest high in places, authorities said there was no report of death or injury. The National Weather Service said the runoff came from three inches of rain in the normally dry area since Saturday evening.

Continuing downpours, which have spread westward across Texas over the past 10 days, also sent the Rio Grande spilling over its banks into low areas downstream from El Paso and threatened considerable flooding.

Area Lakes Leveling Off

Although rain fell for the ninth consecutive day — 10 for parts of the city and area — lake levels did not change appreciably from Saturday. Lake E. V. Spence, which has shown the best gain, was at elevation 1859.56, a gain of 5.52 feet for the week-long spell, or 28,000 acre-feet. It now has 128,500 acre-feet in storage.

Lake J. B. Thomas came up only slightly to elevation 2221.48, an increase of .58 feet, an increase of about 1,500 acre-feet. Big Spring picked up .13 today, adding to light rains Sunday. Parts of the city showed .30 Sunday

as far as Lake Amistad, on the Mexican border miles to the southeast.

At Presidio in the Big Bend of West Texas, the Rio Grande was reported nearing a crest more than 10 feet above flood stage, which is 12.5 feet. More lowland flooding was in prospect there.

A less serious trouble spot developed Sunday at Pecos, where overflow rose nearly two feet deep in some houses and stores, forcing evacuation of three families. Water from 10 inches of rain within a week covered a number of farm roads in that area.

The downpours severed telephone service between Pecos and Balmorhea, 41 miles south. Continuing rains in far South Texas also caused street flooding in places, the National Weather Service reported. Showers and drizzle extended from the Texas Panhandle southward over about the western third of the state. Skies were at least partly cloudy in most other sections.

Forsan, which is one of the wetter spots during the prolonged rainy season, had another 6, making a two-day total of 1.8. So far, the total is 6.8 inches for the week. Ackerly had light showers and drizzle Sunday and Monday, and the total for the spell was well over four inches.

The Wilson Ranch on the central Howard-Borden line had 3 of an inch overnight, making 6.6 inches for the eight days. Virtually all of it went into the ground.

At Elbow, Bill Cregar reported 4.0 overnight, making 5.90 for the spell.

Rescue Teams Burning Dead Left By Storm

SAN PEDRO SULA, Honduras (AP) — Rescue workers are burning the dead left by Hurricane Fifi in northeast Honduras to prevent outbreaks of disease adding to the toll of one of the worst catastrophes in Central American history.

As refugees began straggling back to their devastated towns and villages and relief supplies started to arrive from abroad, officials said at least 5,000 bodies had been found. They estimated this toll would double when all reports were in.

They said the storm, which hit the region with winds of 110 to 130 miles an hour and torrential rains on Thursday night, drove 150,000 persons from their homes, wiped out most of the banana

crop and virtually destroyed the cities of President Oswaldo Cholem, Omoa and Lopez Arellano Trujillo. Floodwaters turned on Sunday and told the rich Uluva River valley from San Pedro Sula to the coast into a lake 20 miles wide at some points.

Thousands of persons were reported still stranded on rooftops or in trees, but a shortage of helicopters and fuel delayed their rescue.

Col. Ruben Villanueva of the National Emergency Relief Committee said damage from the storm was estimated at \$1.8 billion in the San Pedro Sula region alone. An executive of United Brands, one of the two major producers of bananas, the country's chief export, estimated that 90 per cent of the crop was

destroyed. The first plane loads of emergency aid, including a complete field hospital from Cuba, arrived at nearby La Lima airport on Sunday. U.S. Air Force C130 transports brought boats, lifejackets, food, drinking water and other emergency supplies from the Panama Canal Zone.

The United States also has sent trucks and helicopters, desperately needed in the search for stranded persons. Mexico sent 10 planes.

Braniff Planes Back In Air

DALLAS (AP) — Braniff International planes were in the air again today while contract disputes between the company and its pilots landed in the lap of a fact-finding board.

The resumption of flights after a two-day shutdown came after representatives of Braniff and its 1,328 pilots sent the unresolved issue of wages and retirement benefits to a board to be selected by Braniff and the Air Line Pilots Association (ALPA).

The agreement was signed Sunday. Pilots struck at midnight Friday.

An ALPA statement issued in Washington noted that if the new board does not produce an agreement acceptable to both parties, then both sides will resort to their former bargaining status and "Braniff pilots will be free to withdraw their services."

LONDON (AP) — The prediction making the rounds here is that whoever wins next month's election will fail to solve Britain's problems.

The Laborites and Conservative have tried for a decade without success to arrest Britain's long postwar economic decline. Once again the same men are offering much the same policies.

The Liberals and other small parties suggest new ideas, but they come from men with no governing experience.

Various coalition governments remain possible if, as in February, the British public denies a majority in Parliament to any one party. But a peacetime coalition governments in Britain have a poor record.

In short, wherever the British voter turns — to major parties, to minor ones or to coalitions — the prospects appear less than encouraging. Politicians in all parties agree that in the Oct. 10 elec-

tion the British democratic system could be on trial.

Part of the problem is beyond Britain. All parties cite Britain's annual inflation rate of 16.9 per cent as the issue in the campaign. Yet inflation is a worldwide problem and other countries have had little more success than Britain in slowing down soaring living costs.


As an island which imports half its food, Britain must trade profitably with the outside world to live. Yet the annual trade deficit is now running to some \$10 billion, which can only force living standards down.

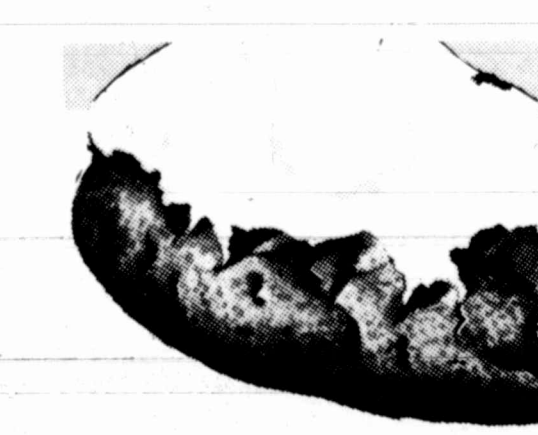

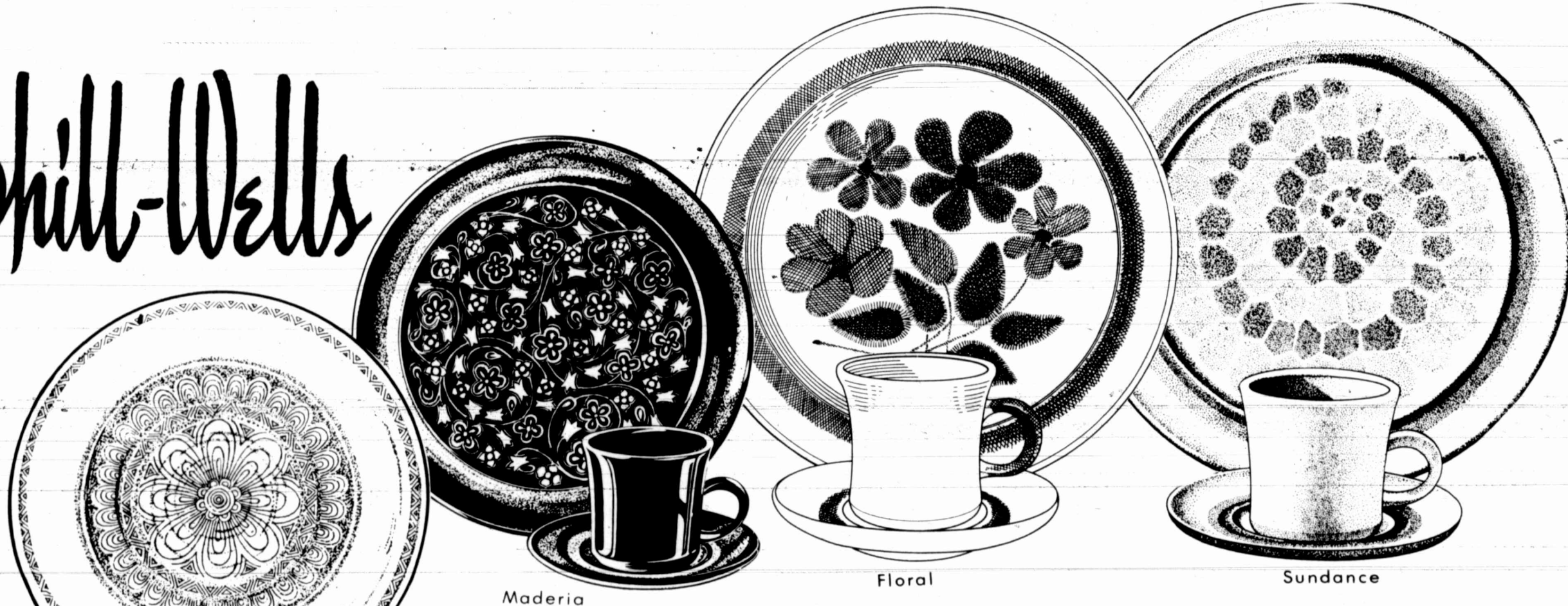
