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## Mixed Tips For Ford At Economic Summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Declaring there is no miracle cure for America's economic ills, President Ford convened a summit conference on inflation today and promptly heard leading Democrats criticize his anti-inflation policies as inadequate.

**NOT ENOUGH**  
"Credit curbs alone are not enough. Budget cuts alone are not enough," said Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield after Ford predicted in his opening remarks that "we as Americans can and will win" the battle against inflation.

Ford hinted at tax cuts for the poor so no group is "called upon to carry an unfair share of the load." Both Mansfield and House Speaker Carl Albert agreed on this point, but they questioned other Ford administration economic policies.

"The administration in effect has spoken of the old-time religion" in coping with economic problems, Albert said, declaring that this falls "short of what the nation needs."

**PUBLIC WORKS**  
Mansfield said "in all candor I am not

too optimistic about the result" of the summit conference, called by Ford in response to legislation sponsored by the Montana Democrat.

Sitting at Ford's side, Mansfield outlined a nine-point program, that would include mandatory wage, price, rent and profit controls, a public works job program, and rationing of energy and other scarce materials.

The Democrats' criticism of Republican policies brought a mild rebuke from Senate GOP leader Hugh Scott. "We are here in

good faith, not to practice politics but to exhibit sensibility," said the Pennsylvania Republican.

Sen. John Tower, R-Tex., said it was wrong to blame the administration for economic problems.

"All of us are to blame," he said. "Congress as well as the executive, Democrats as well as Republicans, business as well as labor."

**REALISTIC**  
After Ford and the congressional leaders spoke, the hundreds of conferees in a hotel ballroom heard reports from members from a

panel on business and finance.

Treasury Secretary William Simon said the panel members "were all realistic about the cure. They know it's going to be a tough process."

Panel members indicated little interest in renewed wage and price controls, but did speak of the need for more jawboning and stronger enforcement power.

Harvard economist Otto Eckstein was blunt about the future: "The economy will suffer a recession, which seems to be the price we have to pay to bring inflation under control."

## Gets Prison Study Funds After Fuss

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Rep. Mickey Leland, D-Houston, got a dressing down from a House committee, but he also got some money he wanted to complete a report on reforming Texas prisons.

His request for an apology, however, was ignored. And Leland, in turn, said he would say what he pleases—about Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby or anyone else.

The House Administration Committee voted 5-1 Thursday to match a Senate appropriation of \$9,752 to finish a legislative study of Texas prisons. The House-Senate prison committee already has spent \$36,000 of a \$46,000 appropriation on its study.

**SHOOTOUT**  
Leland said he flew from New York for the meeting in keeping with the administration committee's orders that he be here if he wanted the prison committee to get its

Leland is vice-chairman of the committee, which is headed by Sen. Chet Brooks, D-Pasadena. At one time the prison committee announced it would probe the Aug. 3 Huntsville prison shootout in which two escaping convicts and two women hostages were killed. Brooks later said any information the committee received

ed would be turned over to the Walker County grand jury.

On Aug. 28 a Senate committee cut the prison committee's budget request from \$18,268 to \$9,752, and the House Administration Committee was only charged with matching the Senate money.

**SPURR CITES ERWIN**  
**Don't Blame Me, Says UT Regent**

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DALLAS (AP) — U.S. Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz says he will not use a "road tent" show, one of his aides has proposed to convince the nation that food prices are not unbearably high. Butz said here Thursday that there are no plans to implement the proposal Wednesday. The secretary said the idea, which called for a traveling show including music, prayer and sketches of early pioneer life, was blown "characteristically" out of proportion by the news media. Butz said, "I am constantly getting ideas from my staff. Some are good, some are not good." He said the tent show proposal was "not good."

**SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP)** — Five men armed with submachine guns today kidnapped Barbara Hutchison, director of the U.S. Embassy's information office, the embassy announced. A spokesman said the 47-year-old official was leaving her offices in Santo Domingo when the five seized her, put her in a car and sped away.

## The World At-A-Glance

DETROIT (AP) — Technical means exist to handle highly radioactive wastes from nuclear power plants but social and philosophical questions about the methods remain, an official at the World Energy Conference says. Chauncey Starr, head of a utility-funded research group, said on Thursday the technique involves concentrating liquid wastes, turning them into an insoluble glass and placing them in controlled storage. "But that doesn't remove the concern because the radioactivity — while it begins to die off with time — has certain elements in it which will last for hundreds of thousands of years," he told a news conference. "This becomes a sociological problem — whether you are willing to leave this as a problem to future generations," he said. "There are some people who trust the future and some people who don't."

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Former President Richard M. Nixon is responding satisfactorily to both oral and intravenous drugs used to dissolve the dime-sized blood clot in his right lung, his doctor says.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford faces a Senate test on his appeal to Congress against policy restrictions on foreign aid, with the question of continued aid to Turkey as a backdrop. Efforts are expected to cut off all military aid to Turkey as a consequence of using U.S. military equipment in the invasion of Cyprus in July. President Ford has urged congressional leaders of both parties to allow administrative flexibility in the foreign aid program.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The new Army chief of staff, Gen. Fred C. Weyand, is expected to push revitalization of the Army along the path blazed by the late Gen. Creighton Abrams. Although totally different in personality, Weyand and Abrams thought very much alike and together they drafted the policies credited with lifting the Army from its Vietnam-era slump in morale and readiness. The White House has announced that President Ford is nominating Weyand to replace Abrams, who died early this month.

## ARAB OIL MONEY \$30 Billion To Head Off World Slump?

LONDON (AP) — A British leader flew to Washington today with plans for a \$30 billion fund of surplus Arab oil money designed to head off a world economic slump. Chancellor of the Exchequer Denis Healey left for the annual meeting of the International Monetary Fund, bearing assurances that leading Arab producing states are interested in his proposal, a high British source said. Healey will be meeting Saturday at Camp David with Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger and French, West German and Japanese ministers for informal talks before presenting his ideas to the IMF. Qualified informants said his plan for what experts call a "special petrodollar recycling facility" already has the informal backing of some major consumer nations. Healey's underlying idea is for an arrange-

ment that would permit the major consumer nations to lock up surplus oil funds that the Arabs now have on deposit in their commercial banks but may withdraw on a virtual overnight basis.

In return for putting their surplus money on medium term deposit in the fund, Healey contemplates the Arabs would be paid commercial rates of interest, which run about 12 per cent on the Eurodollar market.

# Bailing It Out

In the recent United Transportation Union, President Al H. Chesser notes that House passage of H.R. 1501 — the Railroad Retirement Board — "proves that we had a good case before congress."

More accurately stated, it means UTU had considerable stroke, and it used it effectively.

The measure authorizes \$285 million from the federal treasury in each of the next 25 years to keep the Railroad Retirement Fund solvent. By so doing, presumably this will assure payment of benefits now being received by retirees "with vested rights in both the railroad pension system and in Social Security." That is, of course, unless there is again blatant miscalculation, such as now prompts this big annual subsidy.

It would have been better to have left it at that, but Chesser said the reason for an overwhelming affirmative vote is that "the federal government does actually owe the Railroad Retirement fund this part of

the deficit. For years we have been subsidizing the federal government through the Railroad Retirement Fund by lending money from the fund to the government at a very low interest rate."

Nonsense, assume the government borrowed a billion a year at 2 per cent less than the going rate.

That is \$20 million. Make it 3 per cent, and that's \$30 million a year per billion borrowed. The government would have gotten out a lot lighter if it just paid the RR Fund the alleged interest subsidy over the years. The truth is that the RR system is busted, and the government is bailing it out.

## Only Hope Of Leverage

Although President Ford and Secretary of State Henry Kissinger have been taking a strong line against oil price increases — even hinting at need of a rollback — the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries continues its threat to raise prices.

Representatives will meet Oct. 23 to review the situation, and if they conclude the worldwide rate of inflation is 12 per cent, they plan to recommend a 12 percent increase in their oil prices, magnanimously

parceling this at the rate one per cent per month. Oil ministers of these countries then will meet Dec. 12 to announce pricing policies for 1975.

It is, however, not a foregone conclusion that they will hike the price of oil, at least not sharply. On the other hand, it is plain to see that if the United States is to have much leverage, this must come from revived domestic production bent on approaching domestic independence.

The drummers, being a hardy lot and the ones responsible for getting the show started by setting the pace with their own cadence, heard only "Go" and the show was under way, despite the mud and the downpour.

The West Texas weather provided the finale to the tale as just as the band got cranked up good, the clouds broke and the old sun started shining through, illuminating the rest of the halftime show.

Ever since that day, the Longhorn Band has held a grudge against the Red Raiders, because they believed that Tech showed them up on purpose. They probably won't believe this story.



## Wallace's Move

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — Confounding the hopes of Democratic leaders, Gov. George Wallace is slowly committing himself not to any ephemeral third-party presidential race in 1976 but to a drive for power within the Democratic party centered on 24 presidential primaries.

WITH THE SUDDEN power vacuum created by the "no draft" withdrawal of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, the spectre, so hideous to the national Democratic party, of Wallace rampant in the spring primaries begins to take threatening shape. Only Wallace now has a hard-core, dedicated national constituency.

At least, this distorts Democratic primaries across the country. At the worst, it means Wallace may well enter the convention with the largest single bloc of first-ballot votes — largest by far, perhaps.

IF SO, HE WOULD then be a Trojan horse inside the Democratic convention in position to make this demand: make me your vice presidential nominee — or else.

The "or else" is now being plotted by Wallace's top political operatives, headed by Charles Snider — not yet as a certainty but as a contingency. If the party refused to give Wallace the second spot on the ticket (a refusal which today would be assured), Wallace would then walk out and take his place on state ballots as a third-party nominee.

HERE ENTERS THE politically crucial question of when Wallace would bolt.

If he left the party in anger after the party's December midterm convention in Kansas City, delighted Democratic leaders would be spared Wallace in the primaries and would expect him to drain conservative votes from the Republicans, as in 1968.

But if Wallace bolts in the summer of 1976 after entering the national convention as front-runner following multiple primary triumphs, he could be perceived as a victim of party discrimination. In that case, the Republicans might well be helped in November. So, the Wallace threat is credible.

MOREOVER, WALLACE can wait that long. Wallace planners say a dozen states have cleared legal third-party ballot positions for November 1976. The designated party varies, carrying such labels as American Party, American-Independent Party and Courage Party. There will be many others — perhaps in all 50 states by 1976.

Wallace professes ignorance. "I

don't know anything about it," he told us in his therapeutic exercise-bedroom in the governor's mansion here.

Ordered by his doctors to bed to cure an incipient infection from removal of a tiny stitch, Wallace nevertheless looked healthier than when we saw him last spring. Obviously, all plans depend on his still questionable health.

ASSURED OF REJECTION as Governor Nov. 5, he is talking more philosophically these days, particularly about the economic crisis. Let inflation continue its present course, he said, and it will lead to a calamity — "the radicalization of the great middle class." With the U.S. now urbanized, he warned that the "cushion" for younger unemployed workers and their wives to return to the family farmstead to wait out the crisis no longer exists.

Wallace is searching for a Wallace economic plan. He scorns what is coming out of Washington, both from the White House and from Democratic leaders. Comparing the American condition today to the decline and fall of the Roman Empire, he sees an evermore powerful Russia, a U.S. unable to affect the price of oil and at least two more years of runaway inflation.

WALLACE'S PLAN: an economic recovery program to take to the country. Considering Wallace's skill in offering simplistic, sugar-coated, sometime demagogic solutions; his plans could carry force! His list of 250,000 regular contributors is expanding at the rate of 100,000 per year. He too, in a million dollars in the last nine months. No other Democrat has such a base.

## Slow Cruise In Model A

## Lacking In Savvy

NEW YORK (AP) — Wall Street brokers, said Alan Greenspan, have probably suffered more from inflation on a percentage basis than anyone else. He said that to union leaders and others concerned with problems of the poor.

Greenspan, the new chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, is either lacking in political savvy or simply is doing what he feels must be done,

that is, talk bluntly. Any recovery from inflation is going to be painful, he has stated time after time. Inflation cannot be defeated quickly, he states flatly. And he scorns short-term solution, blaming them for creating long-term problems.

He has suggested that inflation is primarily a financial problem, and some critics think he might believe everything to do with inflation can

somehow be reduced to a mathematical equation.

This provokes the question: What role does leadership play? Many economists believe that part of the job of licking inflation is belief you can do it.

His solutions are, in the opinion of many economists, businessmen and labor leaders fighting to understand the problems straight from the book, device of innovation and political appeal.

## VD Tests Not Routine

Dear Dr. Thosteson: As part of prenatal care, if a blood test for syphilis is automatically taken, is the test for gonorrhea also given as a precaution? If a Pap smear is taken, wouldn't the results show any infection, not only cancer?—L.H.

A blood test for gonorrhea has been developed, and we have long needed such a test, but technical difficulties made devising such a test a frustrating problem.

I don't like to generalize, but would strongly suspect that the gonorrhea test is not yet routinely used. In some hospitals yes, in others probably not.

With gonorrhea, unlike syphilis, the principal danger to the baby is infection in the eyes, and the universal use of silver nitrate treatment takes care of that danger. (Without the treatment, that infection can cause blindness.)

However there is no question but that we should use every effort to discover gonorrhea among mothers-to-be for the sake of the mothers. And we are learning that gonorrhea infection can exist in many women (and some men) without being recognized unless a specific test (a culture is made for it.

Now for your question about the Pap test, the test is primarily designed to detect early cancer. The test may show distorted cells that indicate infections. But the gonorrhea germ is a tricky one; when a smear test is taken for that, special precautions have to be observed to prevent air from destroying the germ and upsetting the accuracy of the test. So no, you can't depend on a Pap smear to detect gonorrhea.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Can you explain mucosa of the mouth? Is it serious and what can be done? Can it become cancerous?—Miss E.N.

I think you missed the context in which you heard the word used, or possibly missed some word along with "Mucosa."

Mucosa, you see, is simply the technical term meaning the mucous surface or lining of mouth, nose, stomach, intestine, or genital tract.

"Having mucosa" is utterly normal. But it, for example, a doctor remarked that he noted "abnormal language booklet, 'Venereal Disease: How to Avoid It; How to Cure It.' For a copy write him in care of the Big Spring Herald, enclosing a long, self-addressed, stamped envelope and 10 cents. In the mouth, smoking is cents.

## Where Money Is

WASHINGTON — Kelly Cloman called me up and said, "Hey man, I've just been arrested for breaking and entering and I can get up to 20 years."

"Well," I said indignantly, "that's nothing to brag about."

"WHAT I'M calling about is to ask you what my memoirs are worth."

"Are you crazy?" I asked. "What kind of question is that?"

"Well, I've been reading about all these cats in the Watergate getting anywhere from \$100,000 to \$2 million for their stories, and that was just a third-rate burglary. Since the D.A. said I committed a first-rate burglary, I figure my story should be worth somewhere between Howard Hunt's and Richard Nixon's."

"I'M SORRY, KELLY," I told him, "that is not the way the publishing business works. The value of memoirs is figured on not what was done but who did it."

"That doesn't make sense," Kelly said. "From what I could read, everyone involved in Watergate was an amateur. I'm a professional. Shouldn't my memoirs be worth more?"

"I know common sense indicates they should, but there are other things to be considered. For example, what did you break and enter?"

"A FURNITURE STORE."

"Ah, that was your first mistake. No one wants to read about anyone who broke into a furniture store. Had you broken into the Democratic headquarters at the Watergate — that might have been another story."

"Why would I want to break in there? They've got nothing but old pictures of F.D.R."

"Let me ask you this. What did you do when you got caught?"

"IT WAS MIDNIGHT, and they had me up against a sofa, so I had no choice but to surrender and confess."

"That was your second mistake," I told him. "Had you tried to cover up the crime by using various agencies of the government, then your story might have had some

interest for a publisher."

"What are you talking about?" "You can't get the money you're talking about for your memoirs unless you can involve higher-ups in the crime you committed. Now if there had been a White House conspiracy to cover up your breaking in of the furniture store, then I could introduce you to a literary agent."

"I must tell you, Kelly, if you're thinking of making money on your memoirs, you're going to have to get out of street crime and go into white-collar crime. There's where the royalties are."

## What Others Say

About a year ago, when successive devaluations brought the dollar to a historical nadir and when U.S. equities looked cheap relative to equities abroad, there developed a nagging fear that foreigners were going to come over and buy up the United States. Politicians, bankers, and even economists who had for a generation lectured foreigners on the benefits of American overseas investment suddenly began murmuring that "something has to be done" about foreign investment here.

That incipient, parochial panic ebbed when the dollar strengthened and when foreign stock markets followed the U.S. market down the chute. And Congress was distracted by Watergate and the energy crisis. But the issue is not dead. House passage last week of the Foreign Investment Study Act, by a 324 to 29 vote, indicates remaining anxiety about who owns what. The act authorizes the secretaries of Treasury and Commerce to spend \$3 million to study foreign investment here and report back in 18 months.

Congress is looking for trouble in the same sense as if it ordered a state-by-state study of ownership of direct and portfolio investment in the United States. If statistics were published showing that Pennsylvanians owned more of Montana than Montanans owned of Pennsylvania, or that New Yorkers owned more of California than vice versa, there would inevitably be a hue and cry for "equitable adjustments." A giant bureaucracy to oversee a political redistribution of investment.

The Senate has a chance to save a quick \$3 million and a lot of trouble by shelving this proposal. But it probably won't. The Senate version is sponsored by Sen. Inouye, who has been upset because Japanese investors have been buying up Honolulu hotels.

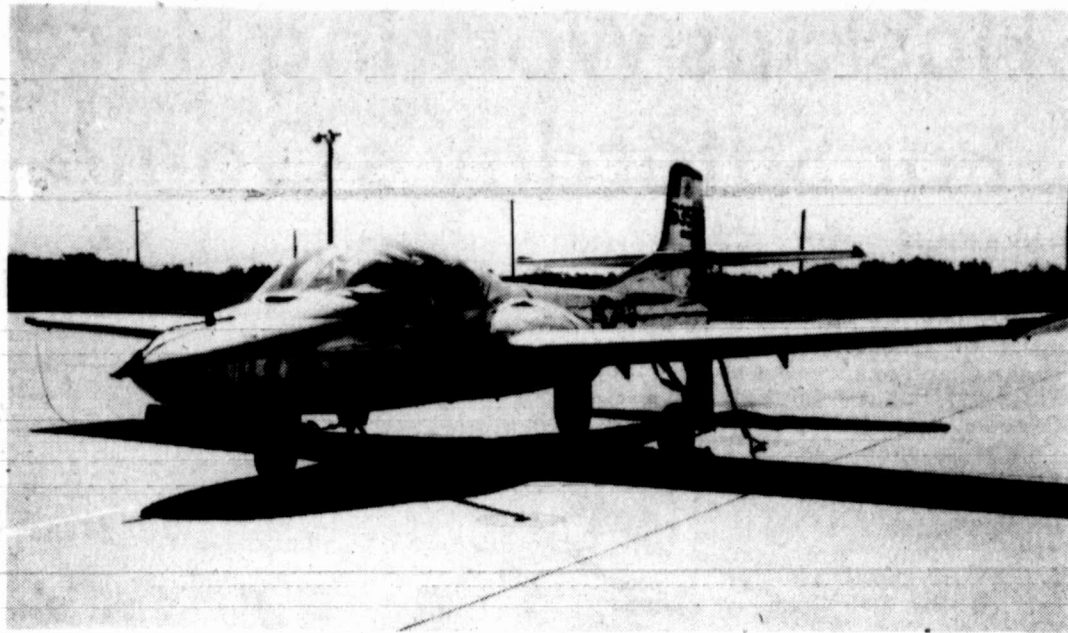
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### Webb To Display T-37 At Odessa Air Show

Webb Air Force Base will be represented in the annual Odessa Jaycees Air Show Sunday at Ector County Airport. A Cessna T-37 aircraft will be on static display throughout the day. The T-37 is officially without a designation, but commonly called the "Tweet" by those who fly it. Webb has 83 of the T-37s and flies them at a higher utilization rate than any other base in the Air Training Command (ATC) with its dual mission of

qualifying officers to perform the duties and assume the responsibilities of Air Force pilots as well as qualifying students from Allied Nations as rated pilots in jet aircraft under the Security Assistance Training Program (SATP). U.S. student pilots begin in the T-37 and then receive a secondary phase in the supersonic Northrop T-38 Talon. Allied SATP students are trained entirely in the T-37. The T-37 is a twin-jet

primary trainer, the first aircraft of its type with side-by-side seating for student and instructor. Powered by two Continental J69-T-25 engines, it is designed to give student pilots the feel of handling the larger, faster tactical jet aircraft used by the U.S. Air Force. Aircraft specifications: Wing Span, 33 feet, 9.3 inches; Length, 29 feet, 3 inches; Height, 9 feet, 2 inches; Top Speed, 360 MPH; Range, Approximately 809 miles; Service Ceiling, 25,000 feet. More than 750 T-37s are used by Air Training Command in primary pilot training at Undergraduate Pilot Training (UPT) bases.

# A's Clinch Tie For Crown

The Oakland Athletics moved to within the pop of a champagne bottle cork of their fourth straight division title Thursday night with a 2-1 victory over the Minnesota Twins.

The A's clinched at least a tie for the American League West Division title. Thursday's victory coupled with Chicago's 5-1, 7-2 doubleheader triumph over Texas took care of that.

Oakland now leads the Rangers by six games. The A's would have to lose their last five games and Texas win their last seven in order to force a playoff for the division championship.

The champagne is on order for tonight's game. Elsewhere, Boston beat Detroit 5-3 in 10 innings and Kansas Ci-

ty swamped California 10-1. Catfish Hunter hurled a seven-hitter for Oakland to notch his 25th victory, the most for an American League pitcher since Mickey Lolich won 25 for Detroit in 1971. Hunter, who has lost 12, struck out seven batters and didn't walk a man.

Oakland picked up its first run off loser Dave Goltz in the first inning when rookie Claude Washington singled with two out, stole second and scored on Sal Bando's single. The final A's run came in the fourth. Joe Rudi singled and came all the way home when Minnesota third baseman Eric Soderholm threw Gene Tenace's ground ball into right field.

Hunter lost his shutout when Bobby Darwin homered with one out in the ninth.

## Mustangs Watching

**COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)** — Southern Methodist can add to its reputation as a college football giant when it takes on No. 1 Ohio State.

The Mustangs have stunned nonconference opponents the last two times they have faced top-ranked powers.

In 1963, No. 1 Navy, with Roger Staubach at quarterback, fell to SMU, 32-28. Two years later, top-ranked Purdue, with Bob Griese at the helm, settled for a 14-14 stand-off.

"It would make SMU's season if they could beat us," admitted Ohio State Coach Woody Hayes. "We're simply not going to let that happen."

Odds makers agree. The Buckeyes are a 37-point favorite to make the Mustangs their 14th victim in Ohio Stadium, ready for another sellout of more than 87,000.

## Garden City Is Victor

**MCCAMEY** — The Garden City Bearcats put together an offense and a defense here Thursday night as they scored their first victory of the season 20-0 over the McCamey Junior Varsity in an 11 man game.

Coach Greg Henderson credited his hard charging backs, outstanding blocking of offense and a tough defense for the win.

Garden City opened up the scoring with six minutes gone in the second quarter as Wayne Hirt scored on a 75-yard run from scrimmage. After the try for extra points failed, Garden City led 6-0.

About a minute later, Garden City recovered a McCamey fumble, setting up a 45-yard scoring pass from Doug Blagens to Rusty Pendley. Hirt scored the extras and the Bearcats led 14-0 at half-time.

Garden City mounted an 82 yard drive in the third quarter, covering the distance in 14 plays and striking paydirt on an 11-yard pass from quarterback Norwin Bingham to Rusty Pendley. The extra point try was no good, to give Garden City a final 20-0 lead.

Kaat pitched a five-hitter at the Texas Rangers as the Chicago White Sox won the opener of a doubleheader 5-1, but Bibby was knocked out in the sixth inning of the nightcap as the White Sox completed the sweep 7-2.

Kaat, won 20-13, won 25 games in 1966 for Minnesota. Bibby, who stood 18-14 at one point but now is 19-19, is in just his second major league season. He will get one more chance to win his 20th game in the last week of this season.

The double loss by the Rangers, combined with Oakland's triumph over Minnesota, clinched at least a tie for the West Division crown by the A's.

Manager Billy Martin, who has led the Rangers to a winning record after they posted the worst mark in the majors in 1973, said, however, "I don't feel good about anything right now."

Kaat, who also passed the 2,000 career strikeout level, credited White Sox pitching Coach Johnny Sain and Manager Chuck Tanner for his comeback after he was waived to Chicago from Minnesota.

"When I won 25 at Minnesota, Sain really helped me and he's been big help this year," Kaat said. "He said I should quicken my motion, and that has made my pitches more 'live' and deceptive. I give Chuck a lot of credit too, because he gave me a chance to pitch."

Kaat has won six straight games during September, allowing only two earned runs during that stretch, but Tanner said, "He's done a good job not only this month but all season for us. I'd have to say that was quite an acquisition."

Texas' only run off Kaat in the opener game in the eighth inning on back-to-back doubles by Dave Nelson and Cesar Tovar.

Texas Coach Darrell Royal was holding court in 2001 of the Villa Capri in Austin after the Wyoming game and someone asked him about his defense.

The coach of the sixth-ranked Longhorns said, "We've got good morale and attitude but there just ain't a heck of a lot happening out there on defense. You don't hear any sound effects."

"Heck, you can turn your head and sometimes you don't even know you're playing."

The defense is one of Royal's prime worries going into Saturday's Southwest Conference football opener with Texas Tech before the regional television

Texas has thumped Boston College and Wyoming in two outings while the Red Raiders soundly whip-

ped Iowa State but were tied 21-all by New Mexico. "I think there's a real good chance they were looking past New Mexico," says Royal. "They had a great season last year and we were the only team to beat them and that was a tossup game... Understandably that was a bitter loss."

"It should be a tossup this year. They have exceptional running backs and they come about as close to being balanced between the run and pass as anybody."

Roosevelt Leaks, who was a first team All-American at fullback, will start at halfback for the Longhorns along with freshmen Gralyn Wyatt and Earl Campbell and junior Marty Akins at quarterback. Wyatt at halfback and Campbell at fullback have been early season sensations for the SWC champions who own six consecutive league titles.

Texas Tech Coach Jim Carlen says, "Texas has more backfield speed than it had last year. I sure don't see much of a dropoff in the offensive line and defensively their front people are bigger."

Royal says Tech quarterback Tommy Duniven has exceptional poise. "They (Tech) feel he's the best all-around athlete that's come to Tech in years," Royal says.

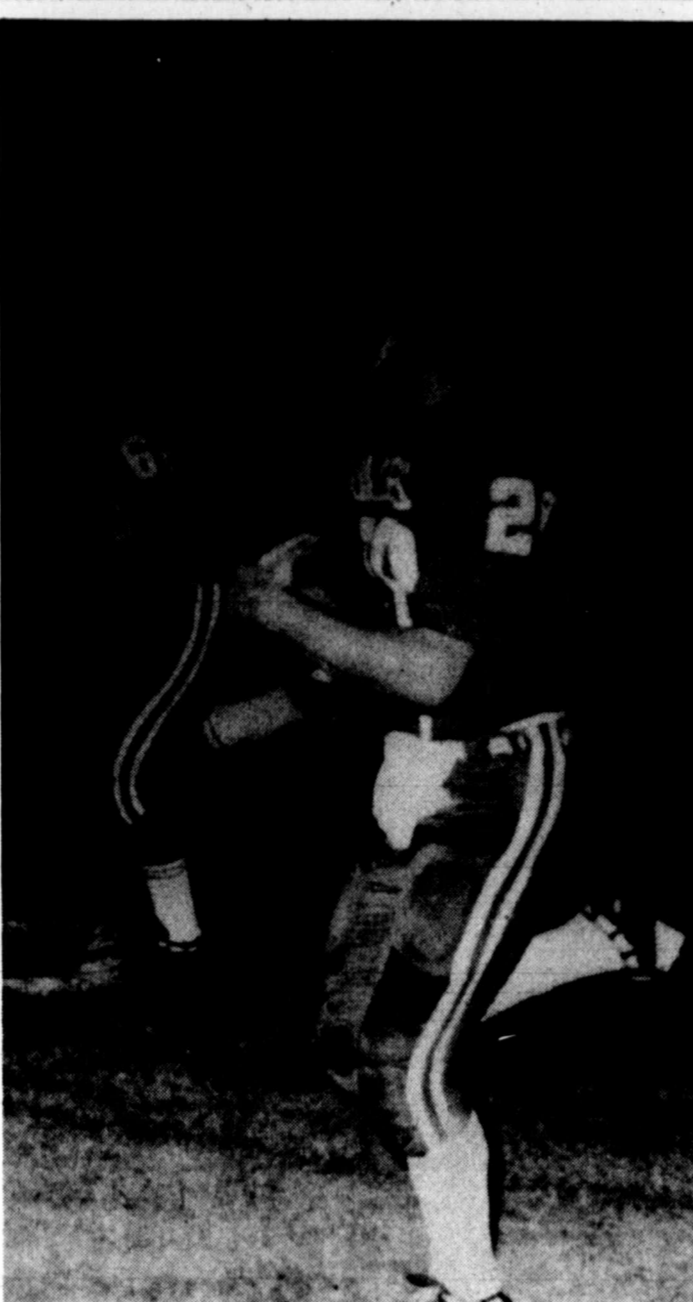

## Spring Drills, Turning Point

ARLINGTON, Tex. (AP) — Ask Billy Martin the turning point for the once laugh-a-minute Texas Rangers in 1974 and he snaps back: "Spring training."

Martin has made believers out of even the most hardened cynics who giggled when he predicted last winter that Texas would draw over a million fans in 1974 and whip Oakland in the American League West.

The Rangers were simply the worst team in professional baseball in 1973—losing over 100 games with the worst hitting and pitching around. They drew 686,150 die-hard fans.

Well, as it turned out, the Rangers haven't beaten Oakland but they scared the world champion A's and in the process drew over a million fans—some 500,000 more than last season.

"How did I know the Rangers would draw a million?" Martin asked. "Well, I knew people would respond to winning baseball. Why shouldn't I say that if I thought we could win?"

Winning has been a way of life for Alfred Manuel Martin, who had a career batting record of .257 in the major leagues but batted .333 in the World Series and fielded like a demon at second base for the New York Yankees in the 1950s. After a brief managerial spin at Denver, Martin took Minnesota from seventh place in 1969 to the AL West Pennant.

Martin was out of baseball in 1970 because of one of his many controversial disputes with management and placed Detroit second in 1971 and first in the AL East in 1972. Last year Detroit was in third

Caswell was born in North Texas and his family later moved to West Texas near Tahoka.

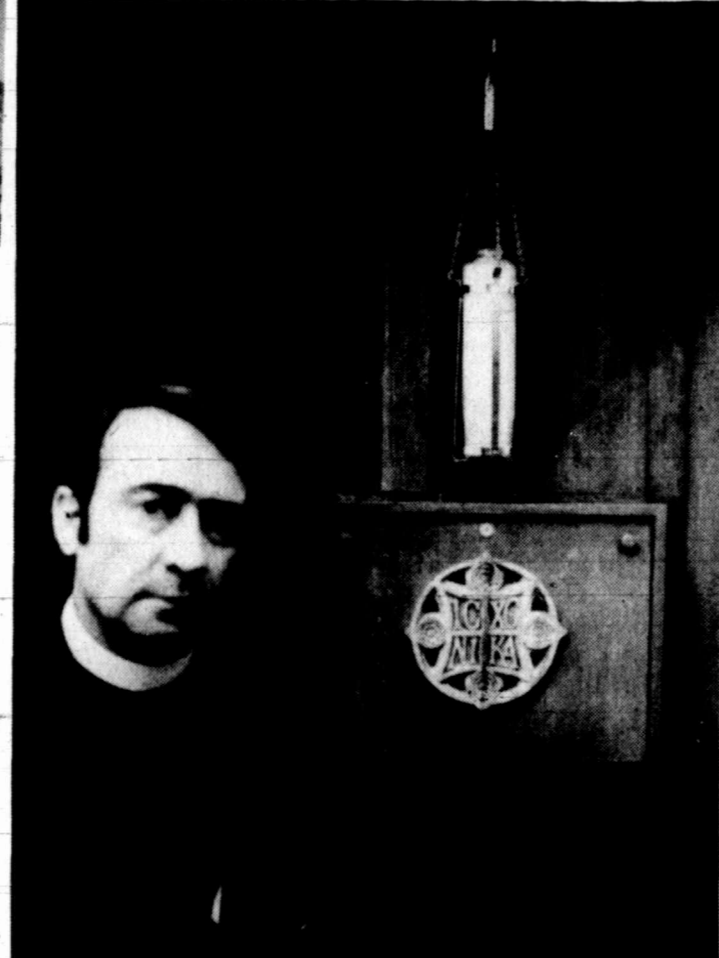

## Poplar Wood Is Back In Church

Over 68 years ago, a piece of poplar wood started a unique history. First, it became a bookcase for the First Methodist Church.

In the evenings after he closed his shop, Pettit whittled away and the results of his labor will be appreciated by those who visit St. Mary's for years to come.

The aumbry will be dedicated in memory of Nan Bell Philips and was given by Ellen Bell Ezzell. Pettit, who whittled the emblem for the front will be represented at this year's State Fair with twenty of his

musical instruments. This year he was top winner at the State Arts and Crafts Fair.

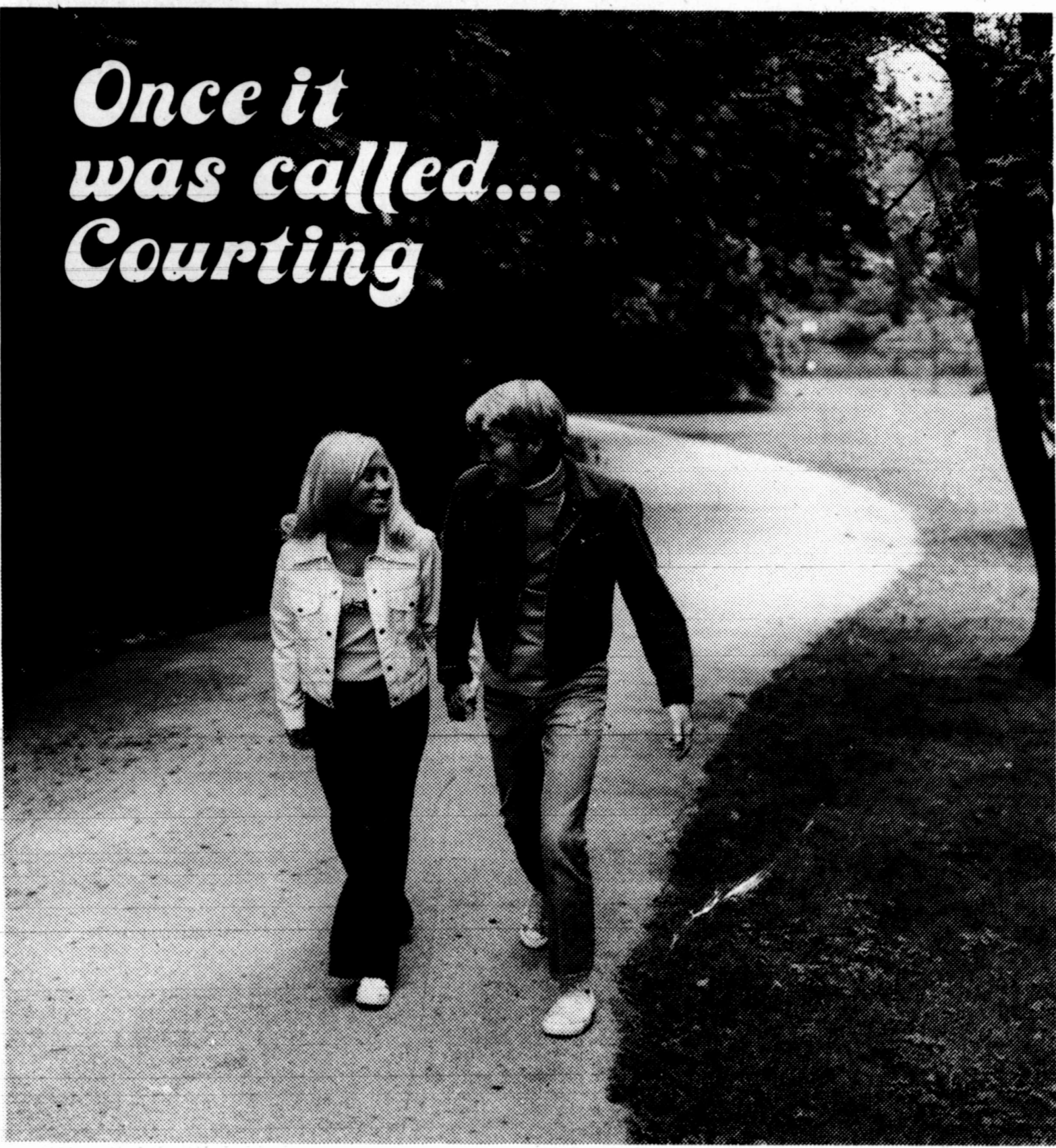

They are helping with the expenses of an eye operation on a 15-year-old lad who several years ago scarred the cornea of one eye when a rubber band gun backfired. The surgery, performed last week, apparently is going to restore vision, with help of a contact lens.

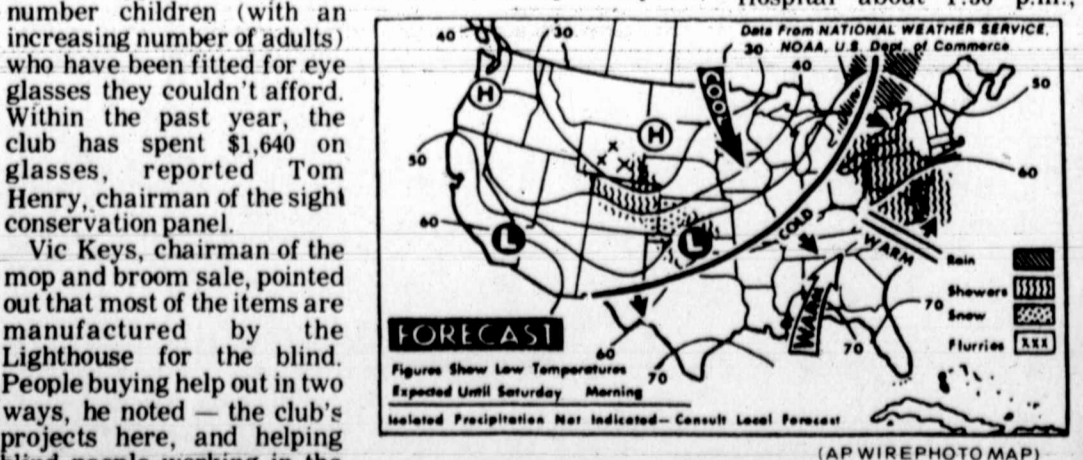

## 20,000 MILES Easy Rider Digs Buses

JANESVILLE, Wis. (AP) — Norman Watts is the easy rider of the geriatric set.

Watts, 66, has spent nearly 400 hours traveling almost 20,000 miles on cross country buses in the last two years.

He just packs up and heads for the bus station and parts unknown whenever he has the time and the money.

Using a \$150 monthly pass, he logged 10,399 miles in three weeks last year for only \$199, including meals and lodging. The pass allowed for unlimited rides and transfers inside the United States.

"I don't know why I do it, really," said Watts, a maintenance man at a hospital in Janesville, about 50 miles southwest of Milwaukee. "I think it has something to do with my lack of schooling."

Watts said he dropped out of school in the seventh grade, but finally passed a high school equivalency test 49 years later.

"I had become interested in history, and people had always told me things about other places that I wanted to see but never had," he said. "I finally just decided to go, as a treat to myself for getting that high school diploma."

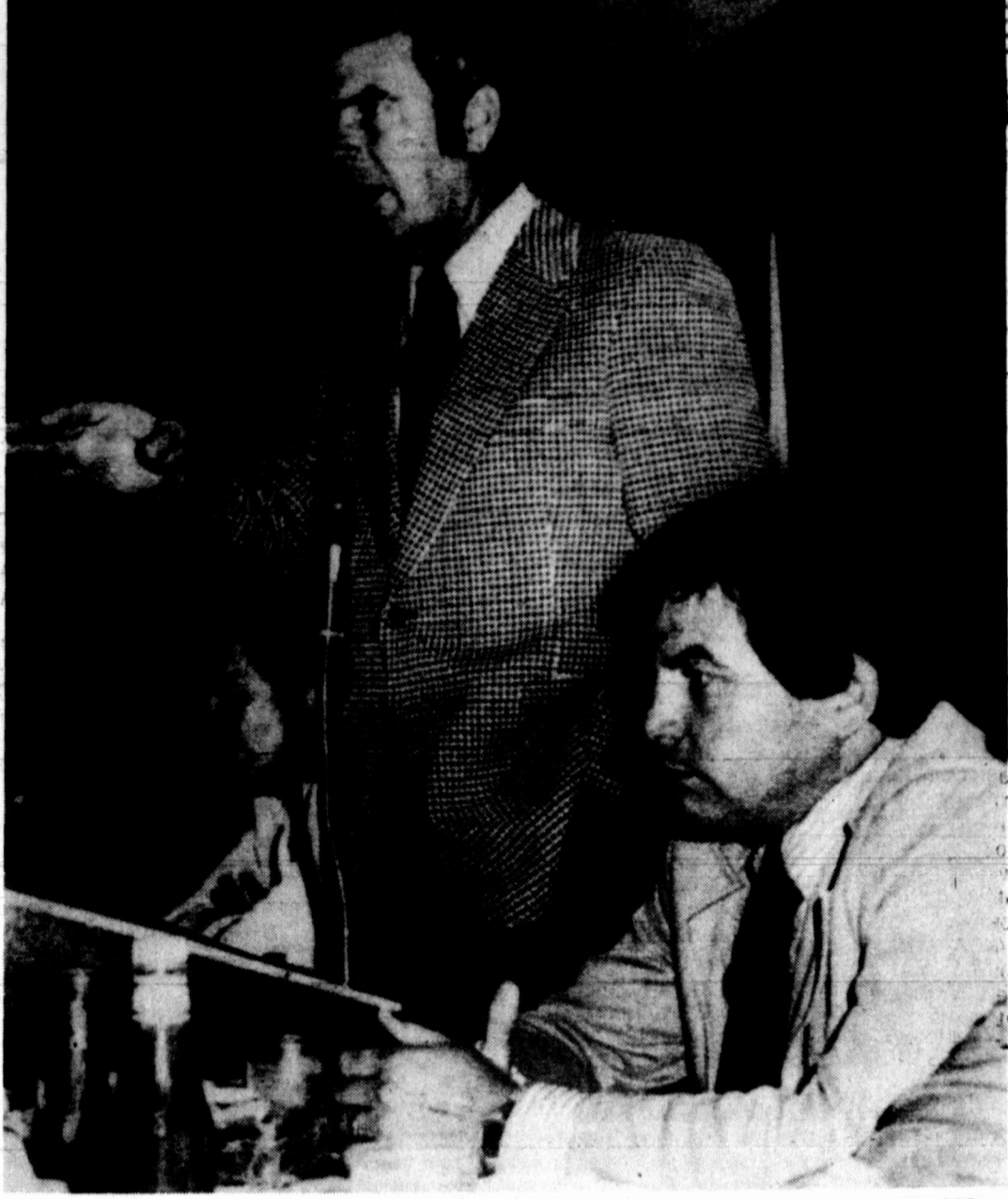

Establishing a winner is a pleasant way to gain a trick—if you can use it. To make his two spade contract on this hand, declarer found that he couldn't afford to discard on dummy's high diamond.  
West's distribution weighed against a takeout double at his first turn, so he contented himself with a two heart overcall. North barely had enough to freely raise his partner's opening bid, especially since he held just three-card support and there was a possibility that South had only four spades. In the long run, however, it is wiser to bid on the North cards to prevent your side from getting preempted out of the auction.  
West led the king of hearts against two spades and, after taking a look at dummy, shifted to a trump to cut down ruffs—an initial trump lead might have been more successful. Declarer won with the queen and, since an immediate heart ruff would have left him in dummy with no convenient way to get back to his hand, finessed the diamond queen. The ace of diamonds was cashed and a diamond ruff with the spade three put declarer back in his hand. West followed to these three tricks with K-J-10, so dummy's nine was now high.  
Declarer ruffed a heart in dummy and was tempted to discard a club from his hand on the high diamond. However, he realized that West would ruff and, if he still had a trump to return, could remove dummy's last trump, leaving declarer dependent on the location of the ace of clubs for his contract.  
There was a sure way to make eight tricks, and declarer took it. He ruffed his diamond winner and ruffed another heart with the jack of trumps. This gave him six trump tricks, four on cross-ruffs, along with two diamonds—just enough to get home.

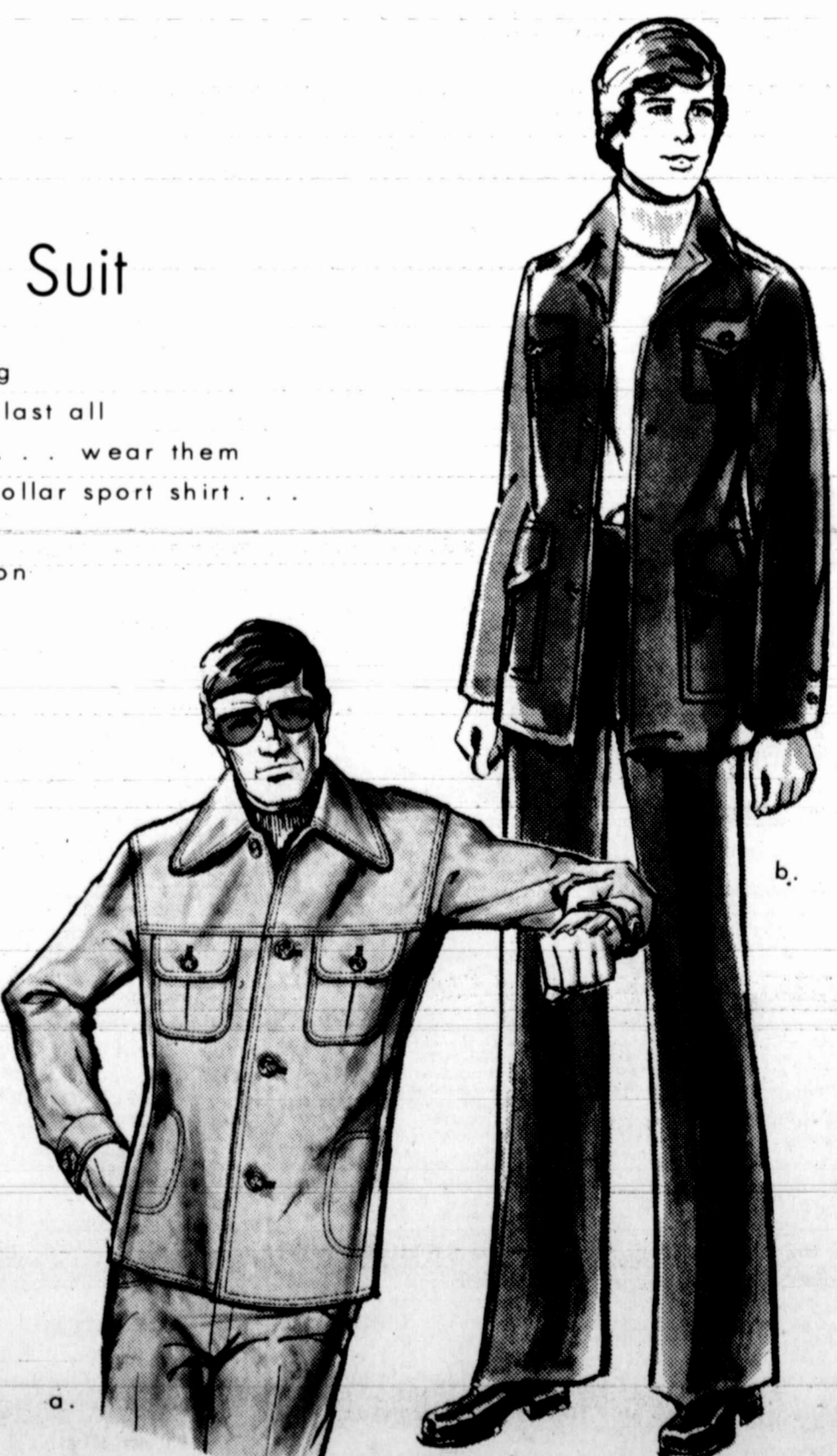
