The hospital has recently purchased "atomic clocks" which are placed in its **Emergency Department and** patient rooms. The clocks are accurate within one second each 1.6 million years. The clocks display the exact time in hours, minutes and seconds and are automatically set by radio signals from the U.S. Atomic Clock.

The clocks operate for up to 3 years using replaceable lithium batteries and are unaffected by power interruptions or system-wide malfunctions. The clocks automatically switch between daylight savings and central standard time.

EVERY CENSUS year, Carol and I always try to be prompt with our reply with the census form, and take particular care to answer every question on the form as accurately as possible.

This isn't because we are such "true blue" Americans. It is mainly because for the past 25 years or so, we have studied the



census returns on microfilm, tracking our Ellis forebears and our related lines. We have searched the census records at Amarillo, at Lubbock, at the LDS Library in Salt Lake City, at Nashville, Tennessee, Dallas, Fort Worth, and other places in between. We have poured through the state archives in Austin and in Nashville. No one from the Bureau of the Census needs to win us over on the importance of filling out our form and getting it mailed in.

Census records provide us with a rare opportunity to look into our ancestors' living room on those particular census years. Being in the news business, we have many times visited people in the local areas to write feature articles. We come armed with pen and notepads, and a list of questions. This is basically what the census-takers have done in our country every 10 years since the year 1790.

When you locate your relatives in the old census records, you get a positive picture of who was living in their home at the time. Don't forget that in times past, there were often parents, grandparents and grandchildren, as well as the heads of households and their spouses and children.

Much has been made about the "long form," which many residents were asked to fill out this year. Ever since the first census, there have been new questions added at various times.

Beginning with the 1850 census, names and ages of all the family's children were listed. The head of the household was asked his/her occupation and place of birth. In 1880, the census added another item which helped genealogists many years later, when they asked the husband and wife individually where their fathers and mothers were born. Beginning in 1860 (that's 140 years ago!), farmers and merchants were asked to list their property value. We don't know how close they came to the actual value, but most times that blank had a figure in it. What bothers me is the fact that we are now living in the "jet age," with computers, the internet, and all of the latest technology, yet it appears that the 2000 census may well turn out to be the "worst ever" in terms of percentage of returns. The biggest reason for this may be that the government has not gone to the trouble of hiring census workers to go door-todoor as they did for the first 200 years. We heard on April 1 that only about 60 per cent of the people had sent their forms back in Amarillo, and a similar percentage in Lubbock. In our work in the old census records, if we know for sure the county in which our ancestors were living in a census year, we can generally find them. We're thinking that the censustakers must have gotten about 98 per cent of the people in the mid-1800s to 1920, which is the latest census available for research. In the 1800s, census takers had to use horses, buggies, etc., to make their rounds in the country. Telephones hadn't been invented. There was no rural mail. But the people got counted. Just like everything else that the U.S. government controls, in spite of all of our modern capabilities, officials have found a way to assure that the final results will be far, far below what they should be, for our "electronic age." I don't have any solutions, but it's very evident that there are some major problems. Biggest problem may be that the government provides so much money for the census, that by the time the bureaucrats have taken their cuts, there isn't much left to accomplish the work. Any suggestions?





On March 8, 2000 Energas Company filed a statement of intent with the Railroad Commission of Texas to increase its gas rates in the unincorporated areas ("Environs") surrounding the sixty-seven West Texas Cities listed below. The proposed increase would affect all classes of environs tariff customers including Residential, Commercial, Public Authority. Small Industrial and Air Conditioning customers and would be identical in relative magnitude to those proposed by the Company for the sixty-seven West Texas cities in the Company's pending Appeal at the Railroad Commission. The proposed effective date for the increase is April 27. 2000. The Railroad Commission may delay the proposed effective date for up to 150 days. However, the environs rates will not be changed until the rates inside the sixty-seven West Texas Cities are changed. There are approximately 22,275 Environs customers in the unincorporated areas surrounding the sixty-seven West Texas Cities from which the Company has appealed to the Railroad Commission. The proposed changes in environs rates are expected to increase the Company's annual revenues by approximately \$1.0 million or 8.5%, adjusted for normal weather. The change is a "major change" under state law only in the environs of Lubbock and Odessa.

Energas proposes to restructure its gas rates to moderate bill variability during the heating season, to increase its revenues from gas service by increasing the customer charges and lower pricing blocks, and to increase its charges for miscellaneous services such as reconnecting gas services following nonpayment. The Company also proposes changes to its Gas Cost Adjustment ("GCA") Clause to collect all of the gas cost and related taxes instead of just the difference between actual gas cost and a base cost of gas in the base rates. Copies of the proposal may be obtained at the Energas Office at 5110 80th, Lubbock, Texas, 79424.

Customers who are affected by the proposed environs rate changes may, within 30 days following the proposed effective date, file written comments or a protest with:

Nearsightedness Has Genetic Link

Individuals with two myopic, or nearsighted parents are nearly six-and-a-half times more likely to become nearsighted in youth than individuals with one or no near-sighted parent, according to a study reported in Opto-

metry and Vision Science. Myopia is a common vision condition where nearby objects are generally seen clearly, but distant objects are blurred and do not come into proper focus. It appears that both genetic and environmental factors influence who will become myopic.

Myopia is usually detected in children after the age of eight. Prescription glasses or contacts are the best treatment for this condition. As children become teenagers, the condition usually worsens and then levels off in adulthood. During this growing period, new eyeglasses may be needed as often as every six months to correct the problem.
