### Kennedy's Wife Faces **DWI Rap**

FAIRFAX, Va. (AP) — Joan Kennedy, the wife of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., has been charged with driving under the influence of alcohol after her convertible crashed into the back of an auto stopped for a street light.

Fairfax County police said the charge on conviction carries maximum penalties of a year in jail and a \$1,000 fine, and suspension of driver's license for six months. Police said, however, that such penalties are reserved for very grave cases that usually involve injuries or fleeing the scene of the accident, circumstances that don't exist in Mrs. Kennedy's

Police said Mrs. Kennedy was administered a breathalyzer test, but they would not disclose the results. The charge of driving under the influence is the only charge in the state of Virginia if alcohol or drugs are found above a certain level.

Mrs. Kennedy was alone in her car driving southbound on Route 123 at about 1:45 p.m. EDT Wednesday when her auto struck another southbound vehicle at an intersection. The other vehicle, driven by Edward F. McGrath, 49, of nearby Vienna, Va., was pushed into the car ahead driven by Mrs. Carol A. Pinder, 25, also of

#### Scaffolding Plunge Kills 18 Workers

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Eighteen workers were killed today when their scaffolding broke and they plunged 18 floors to the ground at a bank under construction, officials said.

Authorities said three other workers survived the fall, but were badly injured when they landed on top of the other victims. One worker escaped the fall by grabbing a cable which had snapped. -

Alejandro Galimgan, chief of the private security force at the construction site, said the men were putting the finishing touches on the outside of the building when the scaffolding broke.

It was not certain what made the cable snap, but Galimgan said a strong wind was blowing at the time of the accident. Police said they have not ruled out the possibility that the scaffold was overloaded

### The World At-A-Glance

Ford is described as well pleased with a new press conference format that allows follow-up questions. And he has further experiments in mind. Under active consideration is a proposal that reporters seek Ford's recognition by silently raising their hands rather than jumping up and shouting, "Mr. President."

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Ford would like to recharge the drive toward improved U.S.-Soviet relations by meeting this year with Russian Communist Party leader Leonid I. Brezhnev, but only if there is prior progress in major negotiating areas. Ford said at his news conference, "If there is reason for us to meet before that (the U.S.-Soviet summit meeting scheduled for 1975), I will certainly consider it."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bankers and government regulators say two record-setting bank failures illustrate the soundness of the system for assuring savers they won't be left empty-handed if their banks collapse. The successive failures of the U.S. National Bank of San Diego and Franklin National Bank of New York have presented the deposit insurance system with its heaviest financial challenge yet, but the bankers and regulators say those are isolated instances of poor banking practice.

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger is spending the day sightseeing before he and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat sit down tonight to talk over peace negotiations for the Middle East. Sadat is precluded from daytime meetings because this is the lunar month of Ramadan, during strict fast until sundown. On his sixth Mideast tour since the 1973 October war, Kissinger arrived in Cairo Wednesday night and immediately met with Sadat and Foreign Minister Ismail Fahmy. Kissnger revealed nothing about any progress toward resuming Arab-Israeli negotiations.

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Ford's pledge to improve automobile mileage 40 per cent in four years was a jarring surprise to his own Federal Energy Administration, still coaxing auto makers to agree to a 30 per cent improvement in six years. FEA officials say the agency had planned to reach a fuel use standard of 20 miles per gallon either in 1985 through a voluntary program or in 1982 through a standby plan for mandatory mileage standards.

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) -The largest demonstrations against President Nguyen Van Thieu in three years erupted in brief violence today. Two Western newsmen were beaten by plainclothes policemen during the fray, and one of them was seriously injured. Haney Howell, Saigon bureau chief for CBS, was kicked in the abdomen and rushed by U.S. Embassy ambulance to a hospital. Another CBS staffer said Howell was filming police beating a protestor in front of the National Assembly building when police turned on him. Barry Hillenbrand, a correspondent for Time magazine, reported that he was slugged in the back of the head and kicked in the stomach while trying to take pictures of plainclothes policeman trying to wrest banners and sticks away from Buddhist demonstrators in the central market.

### Take Compromise Package

The Big Thicket bill, to establish a national preserve in the biologically unique area, has been approved by this session of Congress after all. A hang-up between Senate and House-approved versions was removed with House passage of a revised bill meeting most Senate objections. Now the Senate has concurred and sent the bill to President Ford.

The original Senate-passed bill provided for more acreage - about 100,000 acres instead of 84,500 in the House bill — but that was the only major difference remaining. Senate sponsors went along with the House

version in order to obtain final passage.

The Big Thicket bill now passed by Congress isn't ideal, of course. It would have been better if the larger acreage included in the Senate bill had been accepted. But the important thing is to get a Big Thicket bill through Congress, whatever the acreage, as long as the most important areas are thus spared from destruc-

A bigger flaw, is the dropping of "legislative taking" by the House in order to satisfy Senate opponents. That means all the acreage will not be brought under

promised last fall that General Chrysford would devote its efforts to the production of small cars that would not consume so much gasoline, Ringold replied, "No one is going to tell us what kind of automobiles to make. The profits are more than enough gasoline for

ALAN K. LIMITIL, who was one of the first organizers of car pooling in Fairfax County, Va., is now driving to work alone. "Car pooling is a drag," Alan told me. "Who wants to talk to four other guys every morning? I think a man's automobile is his castle."

Mrs. Helen Klinger, the principal of PS 145, said that she no longer

believed in keeping the thermostat in her school down at 68. "We froze our tushies off last year," she told me, "and we don't intend to do it again. Congress ought to investigate the oil and gas companies and find out where the heat is really going.'



LOS ANGELES (AP) The bottom has dropped out of the market for old

newspapers 'The market is very soft,' said Harold Cowan, owner of Industrial Paper AAASupply of Los Angeles, a that buys old newspapers for recycling into newsprint and industrial

products. The price has slumped from \$32 a ton six months ago to \$10 for domestic use

and \$5 for export. Early this year there was a newspapers, with Japanese Korean interests grabbing a big percentage of the market and driving the price up. Now there is a

Japanese sources, commenting on the slowdown in paper imports, noted that country's economy, which has been growing at a rate of 10 per cent a year for the last two decades, has

slowed down and this has affected imports of all types. In 1972, Japan and Korea shipped about 2,200 tons of newspapers a month Southern California

As the demand rose, a monthly shipment of 12,000 tons was projected for 1974, but it should fall far short.

Cowan said he has a surplus of newspapers on hand, hasn't bought any in eight weeks and probably won't for another two weeks. This has put a crimp in collection drives by schools and churches, but their efforts are still going on to a

limited extent. Probably the biggest user of old newspaper for recycling into newsprint is Garden State Paper Co. with plants in Pomona, Calif., Garfield, N.J., and Alsip, Ill.

Sixty-five newspapers in California and about 200 throughout the country are using recycled newsprint.

recent weeks, the general paper industry, particularly on the West Coast, is stronger today than at any time since World War II, said Richard B. Scudder,

chairman of Garden State. "Today's newspaper prices are higher than any paid since January 1973, when an unexpected export demand resulted in unprecedented high prices.

'The so-called current drop in prices occurred as the export market closed off its purchases and the domestic market adjusted to the situation. Scudder said Garden State

has played an important role in attempting to bring some degree of stability into the traditionally cyclical waste paper market. "For example," he said,

### Local Schools Plan Records 'Cleanup'

Big Spring school officials join school officials across the nation in "cleaning up" their pupil records to prepare for compliance with

a new federal law. The law, which authorizes parental inspection of pupil records after Nov. 20, is a portion of the omnibus education bill signed by President Ford shortly after

he took office. Dr. Emmett McKenzie, superintendent, has requested his administrators to check all student records and personnel records, ridding them of certain information.

TO BE FACTUAL "We want our files to be factual. All opinions of teachers and administrators are to be removed. The file will include grades, test results and information of fact," Dr. McKenzie added.

"For instance, if a file shows that Johnny threw a book through a window and broke the glass. That is fact. But, if the teacher added, 'Johnny is a bad boy,' that is an opinion and will be

removed. The new law comes under the rights and privacy act and allows any parent, guardian or pupil over age 18 to view the pupil's entire record within 45 days after

Each Additional Square Yard, Price of Material and Labor Charges for cutting or altering any street or alley in the city shall be paid at the time the permit required by Section 24.18 is issued, and will be based on the estimated size of the cu to be made. Adjustments for overruns and underruns will be calculated upon completion of the cut and additional charges or reimbursements will be nade accordingly.
Section 24-20. Back-Filling, Filling,

and Resurfacing
Any person making a street or alley
cut under a permit required by this
article shall back-fill the ditch as
directed by the City of Big Spring
Public Works Department. The Department of Public Works will be notified when the back-filling required by this section is completed. This notification will be accomplished by the submission of Section C of the application form to the Department Public Works or his authorized agent. Upon acceptance of the back-fill by the Department of Public Works the permit holder will be notified that the city will take over the cut and assume liability for the safety of the traveling

At the time that the Department of Public Works begins the resurfacing of the dirch, the In certain areas designated by the Department of Public Works paving cuts across streets will not be permitted. ### Checkpoint For Aliens Is Illegal

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) - The halting of motorists between Los Angeles and the Mexican border in hope of catching illegal aliens has been ruled unconstitutional by a federal judge.

The effect of a blanket search warrant, U.S. District Court Judge Edward Schwartz said Monday in his ruling, that "everyone may be stopped without even a founded suspicion, simply to constitute what is obviously a kind of dragnet for the purpose of catching up with numerous illegal aliens that enter the United States and travel."

"This is obviously a total and blanket intrusion upon the rights of the traveling public," Schwartz said.

Last July a federal magistrate in San Diego ordered the blanket search warrant at the San Clemente check point at the request of the Border Patrol.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals sharply curtailed the authority to spot and search vehicles but since then the warrant has been renewed 10 times for 10-day

Schwartz said the government has other means of enforcing immigration laws. He mentioned increasing patrols and watching the border itself more closely.

In addition, he said, "I think one means is in Congress now that would make it illegal for an employer to knowingly hire illegal aliens."

The ruling came in the case of Salvador Casillas, 30, of Los Angeles, who had been charged with transporting illegal aliens in the United States. His lawyer said the government has 30 days in which to appeal the ruling.

### **Draftees Get Break**

WASHINGTON (AP) -About 2,500 men who were the last draftees before the Army switched to an allvolunteer force will be home by Thanksgiving.

The Army said Wednesday it was releasing many of the men before the end of their two-year hitch because of success in meeting enlistment goals for a volunteer force in recent months. Some remained in uniform until as late as next June 30 without the early separation.

Any draftee who volunteers to remain on duty beyond Thanksgiving will be permitted to do so, the Army

### Flying Weather Lab Contracted

Interior Secretary Rogers C. B. Morton said today the Bureau of Reclamation has awarded a \$2,198,895 contems, Inc., of Fort Collins, Colo., for development and operation of a highly instrumental research aircraft and mobile computer van for use by Project Skywater, the Bureau's modification research

program.
"This aircraft, its

sophisticated instruments and the mobile computer tract to Convergence Sys- system," Morton said, "will provide the Bureau's atmospheric scientists with priceless information in cloud dynamics and the effects of cloud seeding on weather systems.

TRANSFER INFO Gilbert G. Stamm, commissioner of reclamation, said the plane, a twin-engine Aero Commander 680 FL, also will carry a computer system which will rapidly translate information from instrument to a magnetic tape for immediate analysis.

'After each research flight," he said, "the mobile computer van will plug into the aircraft's computer and extract the data which then will be further analyzed in the van's computer and available for study. 'The aircraft's instrument

package and the mobile computer will be uniquely suited for the cumulus cloud research underway in the High Plains Cooperative Program," Stamm said.

"The High Plains project is a second generation of research into the seeding of summer cumulus clouds for enhanced showers over the High Plains region," he explained. Under the contract, Convergence Systems will provide the flight crew and operate the aircraft during 5-month periods during each of the next 5 summer seasons.

The aircraft is capable of reaching 28,500 elevation, maintaining the relatively low speeds required for research, and can use short runways for both takeoff and landing.


MAY BE HERE The aircraft primarily will be used near Miles City, Mont., location of a High Plains research site operated in cooperation with the Montana Depatment of Natural Resources.

The aircraft may also be used near Colby, Kans., and Big Spring, Tex., two other High Plains research sites. The instrument package

will include a weather radar which will permit the aircraft to fly into known icing conditions; devices to monitor free air temperature; air temperature, including dynamic heating; static pressure; humidity and dewpoint; the size of water content; the presence and size of ice crystals and other particles; and an ice nuclei counter.

It also will carry a 16-mm time-lapse camera system for airborne cloud photographs and a digital data acquisition and recorder system handling the com-puter compatible magnetic


