## POLITICALLY UNWISE Tax Too Hot For Hopefuls

WASHINGTON (AP) — A number of Republican candidates in next month's elections have disassociated themselves from the anti-inflation surtax that President Ford contends would cost taxpayers only a few cents a day.

Criticism from GOP Senate and gubernatorial candidates came as the senior Republican on the House Ways and Means Committee, Rep. Herman T. Schneebeli, R-Pa., said he believes the fate of Ford's 5 per cent surtax proposal "rests on the American public and what they tell us when we go home."

12 CENTS A DAY Ford, who has conceded that many thought the tax proposal "politically unwise" just four weeks before the Nov. 5 elections, tried a new approach in defending it Wednesday at his outdoor news conference in the White House Rose Garden.

A family of four with \$30,000 gross income would pay \$42, or 12 cents a day, while a family with \$16,000 income would pay only \$3 — or less than one penny per day, Ford said.

SAME THING The American people "want to step up and do what's right. Politicians ought to do the same thing," Ford said.

But just before the President arrived, the Republican gubernatorial candidate in Pennsylvania, Drew Lewis, told reporters he opposed the surtax and suggested closing tax loopholes instead.

NOGALES NEXT Ford also said at his news conference: "He believes a one-year surtax will be sufficient, instead of a two-year tax suggested by Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., the acting head of the House Ways and Means Committee."

There has been "nothing to change" his inclination to run for the presidency in 1976.

He will meet Oct. 21 with Mexican President Luis Echeverria in Nogales, Mexico, his first trip outside the continental United States since becoming President.

He doesn't think there was anything improper in gifts by Vice President-designate Nelson A. Rockefeller to several individuals, including Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger before Kissinger joined the government.

He would meet with Soviet leader Leonid I. Brezhnev prior to a scheduled summit meeting, next year if there is need for an earlier conference.

YPSILANTI, Mich. (AP) — An Ypsilanti bank manager's wife and two children were freed unharmed today after the manager was forced to rob his own bank to ransom them, the FBI reported.

Mrs. Richard Green and her children, Erick 7, and Annette, 9, were released at a hotel about 15 miles west of Ypsilanti about 10:20 a.m. after being held hostage all night by four men.

## To Help Quell Racial Violence

BOSTON (AP) — State and Metropolitan policemen took up their posts in South Boston today to help local authorities quell racial violence that has increased since schools opened last month under a federal school busing order.

The contingent of 400 officers, outfitted with riot gear, were ordered into the area by Gov. Francis W. Sargent after a federal judge rejected Mayor Kevin H. White's request for 125 federal marshals to help keep the peace.

PROTECTION They were placed under the command of Boston Police Commissioner Robert J. diGrazia and Police Supt. Joseph Jordan.

"They will protect the buses, the children and the schools," diGrazia said.

U.S. District Judge W. Arthur Garrity Jr., in turning down the request for federal aid, told White to seek aid from local law enforcement agencies.

## \$41,000 CAPER 11 Stroll Away With Bank Cash

EL PASO, Tex. (AP) — Authorities lodged charges Wednesday against 11 boys and young men accused of taking \$41,000 from six banks in the past 30 months — apparently by simply strolling away unnoticed with the cash.

Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation said the case involved disappearances of money from banks in El Paso, Fabens and Van Horn, Tex., and Anthony, N.M.

FEW DETAILS An FBI spokesman refused to disclose any details of how the money was taken, saying that would jeopardize prosecution of the case.

A vice president of the Border City Bank in El Paso, Howard Hudgeons, said the manner in which his bank lost \$6,000 presumably was typical of the operations.

PUZZLING Other complaints were brought against John Kenneth Crank, 23, an inmate at the La Tuna, Tex., federal reformatory near here; his brother Wesley Crank, 21, in the state prison at Huntsville, Tex., and Dexter Clayton Hyder, 19, already being held in the El Paso County jail.

## Hostages Free, Gunmen Flee

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — American diplomat Barbara Hutchison was in good spirits and joking after seven leftist terrorists released her and six other hostages in return for safe conduct out of the country.

"Suddenly I became a tremendous bargain. I went from a million to nothing," the 47-year-old American quipped to newsmen Wednesday night after the 13-day episode ended.

## UW Surges Upward

The United Way surges upwards today to reach \$67,072, according to George Zacharian, executive director. This is 55.43 per cent toward the goal.

W. S. (Dub) Pearson, campaign chairman, urged all division leaders and campaign workers to press for conclusion of their efforts. Several employe groups were said to be on the verge of reporting.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House subcommittee chairman said today investigations indicate that improper political influence in federal hiring was widespread in former President Richard M. Nixon's administration.

Rep. David N. Henderson, D-N.C., chairman of the House Civil Service subcommittee, said evidence on some alleged hiring abuses has been turned over to Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski. He refused to elaborate.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford would like to recharge the drive toward improved U.S.-Soviet relations by meeting this year with Russian Communist Party leader Leonid I. Brezhnev, but only if there is prior progress in major negotiating areas. Ford said at his news conference, "If there is reason for us to meet before that (the U.S.-Soviet summit meeting scheduled for 1975), I will certainly consider it."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bankers and government regulators say two record-setting bank failures illustrate the soundness of the system for assuring savers they won't be left empty-handed if their banks collapse. The successive failures of the U.S. National Bank of San Diego and Franklin National Bank of New York have presented the deposit insurance system with its heaviest financial challenge yet, but the bankers and regulators say those are isolated instances of poor banking practice.

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger is spending the day sightseeing before he and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat sit down tonight to talk over peace negotiations for the Middle East. Sadat is precluded from daytime meetings because this is the lunar month of Ramadan, during which Moslems must observe a strict fast until sundown. On his sixth Mideast tour since the 1973 October war, Kissinger arrived in Cairo Wednesday night and immediately met with Sadat and Foreign Minister Ismail Fahmy. Kissinger revealed nothing about any progress toward resuming Arab-Israeli negotiations.

## Kennedy's Wife Faces DWI Rap

FAIRFAX, Va. (AP) — Joan Kennedy, the wife of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., has been charged with driving under the influence of alcohol after her convertible crashed into the back of an auto stopped for a street light.

Fairfax County police said the charge on conviction carries maximum penalties of a year in jail and a \$1,000 fine, and suspension of driver's license for six months. Police said, however, that such penalties are reserved for very grave cases that usually involve injuries or fleeing the scene of the accident, circumstances that don't exist in Mrs. Kennedy's case.

Police said Mrs. Kennedy was administered a breathalyzer test, but they would not disclose the results. The charge of driving under the influence is the only charge in the state of Virginia if alcohol or drugs are found above a certain level.

Mrs. Kennedy was alone in her car driving southbound on Route 123 at about 1:45 p.m. EDT Wednesday when her auto struck another southbound vehicle at an intersection. The other vehicle, driven by Edward F. McGrath, 49, of nearby Vienna, Va., was pushed into the car ahead driven by Mrs. Carol A. Pinder, 25, also of Vienna.

## Scaffolding Plunge Kills 18 Workers

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Eighteen workers were killed today when their scaffolding broke and they plunged 18 floors to the ground at a bank under construction, officials said.

Authorities said three other workers survived the fall, but were badly injured when they landed on top of the other victims. One worker escaped the fall by grabbing a cable which had snapped.

Alejandro Galimang, chief of the private security force at the construction site, said the men were putting the finishing touches on the outside of the building when the scaffolding broke.

It was not certain what made the cable snap, but Galimang said a strong wind was blowing at the time of the accident. Police said they have not ruled out the possibility that the scaffold was overloaded.

## 'It's Almost A Nightmare'

**FLORESVILLE, Tex. (AP)** — Far away were grand juries and court appearances. At hand were his friends, his ranch on wide open Texas land and purebred animals for sale.

Those friends aren't occupied by Washington milk fund charges which Connally, a former Treasury secretary, denies. The friends believe Connally rather than the federal indictment which alleges he accepted a bribe.

**THINK ABOUT IT** "I don't think its changed my life any," said Connally of the charges, as he strolled along a pasture fence line Wednesday.

"I, of course, think about it, and at times I think it's almost a nightmare, almost as if it hasn't happened.

"It's one of those things like the time I was shot with President Kennedy. You know, you can't believe it ever happened," said Connally as he recalled the day in Dallas.

One of the tribulations of life? "Sure," said the tall, silver-haired Connally. "It's one of those things you encounter in life and it is not a pleasant experience.

**HE DID** "But if you can't overcome adversity, if you can't meet problems head-on without letting them completely overcome you, why then you are in trouble. I hadn't let it do that. I'm not going to."

Connally's aim on Wednesday was not to fight such charges but to buy a bull for his family ranching interests "with some stretch ... some length to him."

He did. Sitting in the shade of an amphitheater for the auction he was hosting, he and his family bid \$20,000 on a Santa Gertrudis which will go to his Children's Four-C Ranch. It was the top price paid for a bull at the auction where he and nine other breeders offered cattle.

**ALL MY LIFE** Connally, who a year ago was considered for the vice presidential nomination and then practiced law in Houston, said not too many people are aware he is a rancher.

In the past year, he has

spent more time than before at the Picoza Ranch—his own ranch—near the Four-C. He built an elaborate auction ring on the 3,600-acre Picoza that attracted buyers from as far away as South Africa for Wednesday's sale.

Why does he come out here? "I've done it all my life and my father did it before me. He was a tenant farmer and owned the first piece of land in the heart of the Depression in 1932," said Connally.

"It has all the elements of creativity to it that I like. It appeals to me," said Connally.

He said the ranch has been a help to him in the past nine months, as his name emerged in the milk fund controversy.

He talked about soap operas on television with a retired cattle truck driver. The cattle-buying crowd, some more affluent than he and some less, ate barbecue as they sat on hay bales under shade trees.

The grass is green. He introduced coastal bermuda grass to this region of Texas, a sandy scrub-brush type land, and "everybody thought I was crazy for buying it"—meaning the grass.

**MORE PEACE** Now, land that once supported a cow to every 20 acres can maintain an animal on every three, he said.

With his financial success, he can keep a ranch such as this, but he said it is not a hobby. A friend also said of Connally, "He's not a drug store cowboy.

Having the ranch "is one of the great blessings of my life ... it gives me more peace, it gives me more satisfaction, gives me more contentment," Connally said.

"It fills a part of my life because here you see—I don't want to get philosophical about it—but as a very practical matter, you see the seasons come and go. You buy cows. You buy bulls. You breed them. You can't wait to see the off-springs.

"You improve the breed."

## Wet Spell Takes Toll On Demand

Cooler weather, and particularly a prolonged, soaking wet spell, hammered demands for water down in September and the Colorado River Municipal Water District nearly half a million gallons less than in the previous month.

The total was 1,513,074,894, which was 10.63 per cent less than September a year ago and 22 per cent under August.

The big drop came in municipal deliveries which totaled 956,447,000 gallons, 19.76 under September 1973 and just about half the peak reached in July when cities took 1,910,032,000 gallons.

For the first three-quarters of 1974, deliveries amounted to 16,702,183, 712 gallons, compared to 1,513,074,894 during the same period in 1973. The gain was 16.93 per cent, but until September deliveries were running 20.64 per cent ahead.

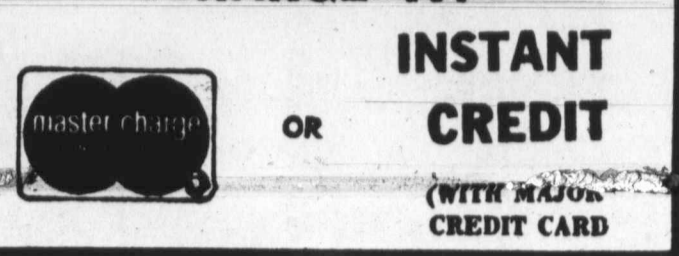
In September, Odessa took 333,466,000 gallons, down 16.62 per cent from a year ago; Big Spring took 234,368,000 gallons, down 6.90; Snyder took 64,581,000 up 7.97; Stanton 9,069,000, up 22.03; Midland 301,048,000, down 11.63; San Angelo 16,915,000, down 89.99.

If deliveries maintain a pace equal to last year in the remaining three months, the district could have its first 20 billion gallon year.

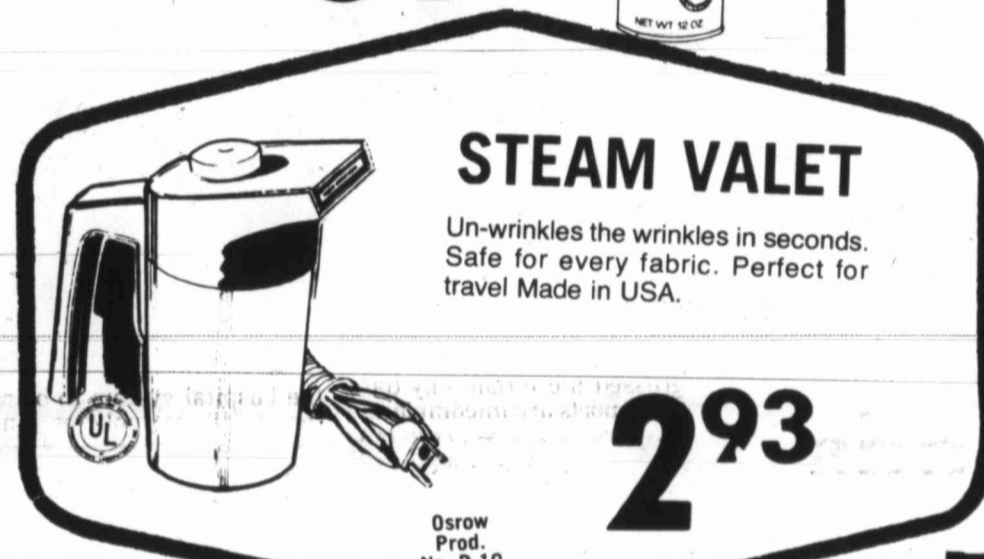

# 'Man Must Change His Attitudes, Values'

An introduction to the study, "Only One Earth," was presented by Mrs. Preston E. Harrison, program leader, when the Day Study Group, American Association of University Women, met Monday morning in the home of Mrs. Neil Willoughby, 1708 Alabama.

"Our daily well-being is dependent on the resources and cooperation of other nations," said Mrs. Harrison. "As integration into the world economy progresses, the nation-state assumes a greater responsibility toward its citizens. Through this integration we are witnessing an expanded social consciousness. Obviously, the quality of life within a state is dependent

upon drawing widely upon the world's resources. Therefore, cooperation of government is necessary to cope with many of its economic, environmental, and social problems.

"Economic interdependence among nations includes international trade, and increasingly complex international monetary system, massive internationalization of production, and the emergence of multinational corporations. To be considered also is ecological, technological, and social and natural resource interdependence within the world.

"We will hope that in time the rising aspirations

throughout much of the world will eventually improve the organization of global society itself. The United States has been one of the most independent of countries; but we are becoming increasingly dependent for fuel and industrial materials.

"In 1970 the United States imported \$8 billion worth of energy fuels and minerals. In 1985 this \$8 billion is projected to increase to \$31 billion. Basic raw material imports by the year 2000 are projected at \$64 billion, eight times what it was in 1970, and these imports would depend on United States' access to foreign markets.

"To adapt to this interlinked world, man must change his attitudes and values — both national and global priorities will affect the organization of the international system.

# First Court Challenge Of Death Penalty Law

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Attorneys for a man who was sentenced to die for the abduction-slaying of a Dallas lawyer, have filed the first court challenge to the new Texas death penalty law.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals will hear arguments on the constitutionality of the measure Nov. 13.

Directly at stake in the first case is the life of William David Hovila, convicted of capital murder in the 1973 shooting death of Dallas lawyer Henry J. McCluskey.

**UNPROVOKED**  
A second death penalty appeal also will be heard that day on behalf of Jerry Lane Jurek, convicted of killing 10-year-old Wendy Adams of Cuero.

The legislature wrote the new death penalty statute in

1973 after the U.S. Supreme Court struck down the old one.

It makes death mandatory for certain kinds of murder if the jury finds the killing was unprovoked and deliberate and believes there is a probability the defendant would commit criminal acts of violence that would constitute a continuing threat to society.

The NAACP Legal Defense Fund and the National Office for the Rights of the Indigent filed a "friend of the court" brief in the Jurek case that also was used by Hovila's lawyer, Howard Wilson of Dallas.

**NEW LAW**  
The briefs said the new law preserves the constitutional defect of the old one by giving juries too much discretion over who lives and who dies.

They said the additional requirements are determining guilt are "nothing more than a guise under which capital jurors will inevitably respond to sentiment at best and prejudice at worst to deter-

mine—not the dangerousness of the defendant or the deliberateness or reasonableness of his crime—but whether they wish to see him die."

**NO EVIDENCE**  
A jury's prediction of future criminal behavior should not be the thread on which a man's life hangs, the briefs said.

"There is no evidence that this kind of prediction can be accurately made by specialists trained in the field of psychiatry... Surely it cannot be accurately or intelligently made by a lay jury," they declared.

Both briefs—trying to make the point that the death penalty is unevenly applied—said that only about 10 of the 1,400 Texas murder cases a year result in death verdicts.

**PUNISHMENT**  
Dallas Dist. Atty. Henry Wade and State's Attorney Jim Vollers responded that the law is designed to impose the death penalty equitably.  
"The Texas Capital Murder Act has removed completely all discretion

with regard to punishment from the jury and the judge. The jury determines only questions of fact and is sworn to do so... The judge's imposition of sentence is then purely ministerial, based on the jury's finding of fact," their brief said.

They said all eight capital murder trials in Dallas—one for killing a policeman and seven for murder during a robbery—have resulted in death verdicts.

**TWO THUGS**  
"This shows two things: first, that this act is not being administered in an arbitrary or capricious manner and, second, that the penalty has not been rejected by the citizens of Dallas County as excessive or unnecessary," the prosecution brief said.

One thing is clear, Wade and Vollers asserted: "The carrying into execution of the death sentence in the case of William David Hovila will permanently deter him from any further atrocious crimes of violence against society. Society has a right to no less."

## Water, Inc. Sets Session Nov. 3

"Action today for water tomorrow" will be the theme of the 1974 Water, Inc., membership drive and the month long campaign will be launched at a membership drive leadership rally in Lubbock Nov. 9, according to Lloyd Calhoun, Hobbs, N.M., chairman of the steering committee.

"We have set a goal for ourselves of 1,200 new members," Calhoun said, "and we will be conducting a simultaneous effort to inform the general public about developments and expectations in water importation."

## Webb Record Is Best In ATC

Webb AFB has the most outstanding record of fire prevention of any facility in the Air Training Command during the past two years.

In that period, Webb has had only two reportable fires, both during the drought conditions last summer. One fire caused \$386 worth of damage to Bldg. 200, as a discarded cigarette ignited the shrubs alongside the building.

The other reportable fire was caused by a loose connection in a 220-volt outlet in one of the family housing units. There was approximately \$300 damage.

The base fire department also answered four small grass fires in the neighborhood during the summer. There was no reportable damage in any of those blazes.

In the ATC there were 61 reportable fires in FY-74, or 15 less than the year before. ATC suffered a \$31,884 fire loss last year, \$17,691 of that in 28 family housing fires. In addition, ATC personnel lost \$25,941 in personal property.

# Local Schools Plan Records 'Cleanup'

Big Spring school officials join school officials across the nation in "cleaning up" their pupil records to prepare for compliance with a new federal law. The law, which authorizes parental inspection of pupil records after Nov. 20, is a portion of the omnibus education bill signed by President Ford shortly after he took office. Dr. Emmett McKenzie, superintendent, has requested his administrators to check all student records and personnel records, ridding them of certain information. "TO BE FACTUAL" "We want our files to be factual. All opinions of teachers and administrators to be removed. The file will include grades, test results and information of fact," Dr. McKenzie added. "For instance, if a file shows that Johnny threw a book through a window and broke the glass, that is fact. But, if the teacher added, 'Johnny is a bad boy,' that is an opinion and will be removed."

The new law comes under the rights and privacy act and allows any parent, guardian or pupil over age 18 to view the pupil's entire record within 45 days after making the request.

Authorities were puzzled here this week as to whether a burglar went to a local residence to eat and then decided to take a valuable ring, or went to take the ring and decided to eat.

Mrs. Anita Rees, 709 W. 18th, reported a theft at her home of a loaf of bread, one package of cheese, and one 24K white gold pear shaped diamond and ruby ring. Total value of the thefts was listed as \$1,201.23.

Accuracy of the records may then be challenged. VIEW ON REQUEST "We will set up a policy for viewing records here and honoring requests. All procedures will be the same at each school," according to Dr. McKenzie. Federal funds will be withheld from schools that refuse to allow viewing of records upon request. There is also a study underway on the HEW regulations and guidelines on sex discrimination. These guidelines are designed to provide equal treatment of women in admissions, athletics, housing, financial aid, extra-curricular activities and employment. Biggest disagreements in this area are in the fields of physical education and athletics, national surveys indicate. Dallas schools are threatening to do without the federal funds if necessary in connection with this regulation.

The News said 29 per cent replied that they disapproved, and 30 per cent answered "don't know."

Voters also were asked whether they agreed that the amnesty program the President proposed was basically fair for all concerned. Thirty-eight per cent said they agreed, 43 per cent disagreed and 19 per cent were classified as "neutral."

## Nobel Prize For Medicine

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) - Three scientists who did their major research in the United States were awarded the 1974 Nobel Prize for medicine or physiology today for being "largely responsible for the creation of modern cell biology."

The \$124,000 prize was shared equally by British-born Christian de Duve, 57, who works at Rockefeller University in New York City; George E. Palade, 62, a naturalized American born in Romania who heads the cell biology section at Yale University's School of Medicine; and Albert Claude, 75, director of the Institute Jules Bordet at the University Libre in Brussels. Claude was born in Luxembourg. All three conducted their research at the Rockefeller Institute in New York, now known as Rockefeller University. Claude began the work by using the electron microscope and developing a procedure by which cell parts could be seen under it. Palade combined the two techniques to obtain more information, and De Duve carried this one step further by making predictions about structural components in the cell, the citation said.

In Brussels, Claude said it was "thanks to the United States and the Rockefeller Institute" that he was able to do the work that brought him distinction.

## Delicious Chutney

Because Worcestershire sauce contains tamarind, used in the best India chutneys, it's worth adding to this relish.

- 2 lbs. tart apples
- 2 cups chopped onion
- 15-oz. package seedless raisins
- 1 1/2 cups firmly packed dark brown sugar
- 3 cups cider vinegar
- 3 tbsps. Worcestershire sauce
- 2 tbsps. lemon juice
- 2 tbsps. salt
- 2 tpsps. ground ginger
- Pare, quarter, core and dice apples — there should be about 2 quarts. Turn into a large saucepot with remaining ingredients and mix well. Bring to boiling point; simmer, uncovered, stirring often until thick — about 45 minutes. Ladle into hot sterilized canning jars, leaving 1/2-inch head space, add caps and screwbands according to jar manufacturer's directions. Process in boiling water bath for 10 minutes. Makes three pint jars.

## Pears Add New Flavor To Two Old Favorites

Few things are more enjoyable than an old-fashioned baked dessert to top off a delicious meal. Here are two old-time favorites — mincemeat pie and oatmeal cake — which have had pears added to their recipes to give them a delightful flavor.

### PEAR-MINCMEAT PIE

- 1 (29 oz.) can pears
- 1 (9 oz.) pkg. condensed mincemeat
- 1/2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon rum or brandy (optional)
- 1/4 cup chopped pecans
- Pastry for 2-crust (9-inch) pie
- Milk
- Granulated sugar
- Drain pears and dice, reserving 1/4 cups pear syrup. Break mincemeat into small pieces. Add reserved pear syrup and brown sugar. Place over high heat and cool. Add pears, brandy or rum and pecans. Line a 9-inch pie plate with pastry. Fill with pear-mincemeat mixture. Top with lattice crust and flute edges. Bake at 400 degrees 30 to 40 minutes, or until golden brown. Serve warm or chilled, as desired. Makes 1 (9-inch) pie.

### PEAR BRITTLE

- 1 (29 oz.) can pear halves
- 1 cup quick-cooking oatmeal

### CHEESE-AVOCADO RING

- 1 (8 oz.) package Neufchatel cheese
- 1 (3-oz.) package lime-flavored gelatin
- 1 1/2 cups boiling water
- 1 tablespoon reconstituted lemon juice
- 1 tsp. grated onion
- 1 tsp. salt
- Few drops Worcestershire sauce
- Few drops Tabasco sauce
- 1/4 cup finely-chopped pimento
- 1/4 cup finely-diced green pepper
- 1 avocado, diced (about 1 1/2 cups)

## Simple Soup Satisfying

A simple but satisfying soup is this one made with beef broth or bouillon cubes and perk'd up with sour cream.

### PEASANT SOUP

- Substitute 5 cups homemade beef broth, if you like, for the canned bouillon.
- 2 tbsps. peanut oil
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 2 tbsps. minced parsley
- 6 cups shredded cabbage, about 1 lb.
- 2 medium potatoes, pared and cubed
- 2 10 1/2-ounce cans beef broth (bouillon) diluted with 2 soup cans water
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 cup commercial sour cream mixed with 1/2 tsp. caraway seed
- In a large saucepot heat oil; add onion and parsley and cook over moderate heat about 5 minutes. Stir in cabbage, potatoes, broth, salt and pepper. Bring to a boil; simmer until vegetables are tender — about 30 minutes. Top bowls of soup with dollops of sour cream. Makes 6 servings.

## Save With Cabbage

Cabbage heads are rolling into the market! Let them add their thrifty punch to a resolution to use seasonal foods and help save money on the food budget.

An old-fashioned favorite gone modern, cabbage rolls now take both tomato sauce and cheese soup.

If you want to come out just right on the cabbage leaves, select a large head, cook 7 to 10 minutes in boiling water and drain them. It's important to measure the filling and thereby assure equal size servings, points out Reba Stagg, meat authority.

### BEEF CABBAGE ROLLS

- 1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
- 1 1/2 tpsps. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 cup cooked rice
- 1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce
- 2 tbsps. instant minced onion
- 1 tbsp. parsley flakes
- 1 large head cabbage (14 large leaves)
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 can (11 oz.) condensed cheese soup
- 1/4 cup milk

Cooked ground beef until lightly browned. Pour off drippings. Add salt, pepper, rice, tomato sauce, onion and parsley flakes. Mix well. Cover and cook slowly 30 minutes. Separate 14 cabbage leaves, cover with boiling water and boil 7 to 10 minutes. Drain. Place 1/4 to 1/3rd cup of meat mixture in center of each cabbage leaf.

Roll and fasten with a wooden pick. Place rolls in a 3-quart oblong baking dish or a 13x9-inch baking pan. Add water. Cover tightly and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 30 minutes. Remove cover. Combine cheese soup and milk and pour over cabbage rolls. Bake, uncovered, an additional 15 minutes. 6 to 8 servings.

## Whole Spuds Good Fried

French fried whole potatoes are easy to fix. Boil pared whole potatoes (small ones, only 1 or 2 inches in diameter) until tender. Drain well so excess water will not make fat sputter. Or, if you are preparing for frying later, drain and place in a covered container and refrigerate until ready to use.

Heat fat in French fryer or in heavy cooking vessel to depth of 3 inches. Fry 3 to 4 of the potatoes at a time until thoroughly heated and a golden brown. Drain on absorbent paper, sprinkle salt and serve piping hot.

## Difference In Herbs, Spices

What is the difference between herbs and spices? Herbs are plant leaves such as basil, bay leaf, dill weed, marjoram and parsley. In temperate climates they can be used fresh from the garden during summer months to add a subtle new flavor to many favorite meat dishes.

Spices are roots, bark, seed or fruit of aromatic perennial plants. These are normally grown in the tropics. Many of the spices on your shelf came from the West Indies. Typical spices include black pepper, all-spice, cinnamon, clove and saffron.

A third classification is "aromatic seeds." These are seeds of annual plants such as anise, caraway, cardamom and coriander.

## Ratatouille Is Easy To Make

Everyone should try making ratatouille sometime in their cooking career and this is an exceptionally good recipe for the famous French dish.

## Tiny Dumplings In Stew, Soup

Here's a simple recipe for making those delicious little dumplings that are so good dropped by the teaspoonful in stews and soups.

- 1/4 cup water
- 2 tbsps. butter or margarine
- 7 tbsps. flour
- Pinch of salt
- Large egg

In a small saucepan bring water to boiling point; add butter and melt. Over low heat add flour and stir until mixture leaves sides of pan. Remove from heat. Add egg and with a spoon beat until smooth and velvety. Have 1 quart water and 1 teaspoon salt simmering; drop mixture, by level teaspoonfuls into water; cook and simmer until cooked through — 10 to 15 minutes. Drain and add to hot soup. Makes 24 miniature dumplings — 4 to 6 servings.

## Corned Beef Good To Add

Practically any main dish will boast a new look if you begin with canned corned beef.

For example, add cubes of canned corn beef to creamed potato, creamed celery, creamed vegetable or green pea soup and serve this hearty dish for lunch or a late-at-night supper. Crisp slices of celery and chopped parsley add extra color and texture. Make the meal complete with chunks of French bread and a tray of chilled olives, cucumber slices and relishes.

## Clove Is Versatile

The whole clove is one of the most versatile spices on the kitchen shelf. Everyone knows how much whole clove adds to baked ham. It also makes good garnishing in fruit-compotes, salads and pressed ham type dishes.

Whole cloves give a dish an intriguing look and an aroma that stimulates the appetite. Especially handy in garnishing is their nail-like shape. When pushed into food they stay put. This keeps the dish looking as good on the table as it did in the kitchen.

Whole cloves also are wonderful for stews and soups. The flavor of the whole clove is released gradually in the cooking process, and still is strong and fresh when the dish is served.

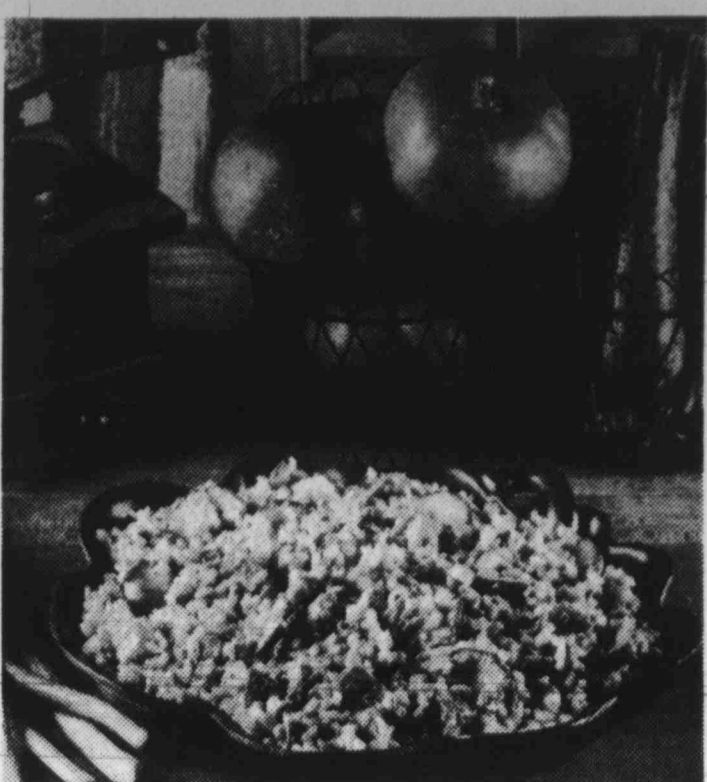
## Fruited Rolls Special Treat

Maraschino cherries, nuts and raisins turn refrigerated crescent rolls into a special treat.

Drain and chop 1 (4-oz.) jar of red maraschino cherries. Mix together cherries, 1/4 cup each of chopped walnuts and "chopped seedless raisins. Sprinkle over each triangle of dough from 1 (8-oz.) package of refrigerated crescent rolls. Roll and bake as directed on package. Serve warm. Makes 8 rolls.

## Cookie Jar

Cookies can be kept nice and fresh in the cookie jar by adding a slice of fresh bread. Change the bread every other day.

## Brown Rice Salad With Vegetables

Brown rice — regular or the new variety — is never as tender as white rice because although the outer hulls are removed, the bran layer underneath is not. This chewiness stands brown rice in good stead when it's used in a salad to serve as the main course for lunch or with meat, poultry or fish for supper.

### BROWN RICE GARDEN SALAD

- 1 cup long grain parboiled brown rice
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise-type salad dressing
- 2 small or 1 medium zucchini, about 1/4 pound
- 1 large tomato
- 1-3rd cup thinly sliced scallion, green top included
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon white pepper

Cook the rice according to the package directions; cool and then fold in the dressing.

Scrub zucchini with a vegetable brush under cold running water; cut a thin slice from each end and discard; do not pare. Slice thin — there should be about 1 1/2 cups. Slices may be halved or quartered. The

zucchini is used raw. Add zucchini in half horizontally; gently squeeze out seeds and discard; slice and dice — there should be about 1 cup.

Add zucchini, tomato, scallion, salt and pepper to rice mixture; mix gently but well.

Serve at room temperature or chilled. Makes 6 servings.

## Prepare Meat For Easy Use

When stocking up on ground beef in the freezer, have it packaged in two ways. Some should be in patty form so it can be cooked, without lengthy thawing, as hamburgers in quick time. The remainder should be packaged in amounts to suit other needs of the family, like 1 1/2 to 2 pounds for meat loaves, spaghetti or pizza sauces.

For meat loaves the ground beef will need to be thawed, preferably in the refrigerator. For sauces and mixtures that call for browning the meat, it may be started in its frozen state.

### Evangelist Workers Face Deportation

# Peddling Preachers Pinched

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Rev. Sun Myung Moon and his fervent disciples are swooping across the country with a brand of Christianity embracing politics and peddling.

To their dismay, they've swooped straight into the hands of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, which thinks the Rev. Moon's Unification Church may be teaching its young foreign trainees more about peddling than preaching.

The Immigration Service has threatened to deport 61 of the foreign trainees who failed to leave the country after their visitor's visas expired. About 500 more face similar treatment.

"I am again and again embarrassed in front of them that our country in effect is sending them back to you," said Neil A. Salonen, president of the church's American branch.

While the government moves toward judgment, the church is proceeding with heavily advertised "day of hope" rallies scheduled in six cities before Christmas.

In Washington, site of the Oct. 16 appearance, thousands of handbills bearing the Korean preacher's sedate visage are blooming from sidewalk trash cans, vacant store windows and the fences

along construction projects. The blitz then moves to Atlanta, Chicago, Seattle, San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Published and broadcast advertising for such rallies consumes much of the U.S. church's multimillion-dollar annual budget.

Salonen said 90 per cent of the \$7 million raised last year came from the fund-raising activities such as those questioned by the Immigration Service.

The converts, most of them youthful, are dispat-

ched to peddle peanuts, flowers, candles and other small items—door-to-door or from small sidewalk stands.

Trainees peddle "only as part of a much larger program of evangelism, lecturing, Bible and other religious study, prayer, workshops and many other activities," Salonen said.

But the immigration service saw it differently. "We had received complaints, some from local authorities who in turn had received complaints especially on the door-to-door peddling," said INS spokesman Verne Jervis.

The 61 trainees whose visas had expired were told to leave voluntarily by Sept. 20 or face deportation proceedings. But they probably will be allowed to stay.

Salonen said the church challenges the order through administrative hearings and lawsuits.

Meantime, the church is pressing ahead with a wide-spread campaign for

believers in a dogma flavored as much with politics and Oriental philosophy as with traditional Christian tenets.

Moon, 54, claims to have seen a vision of Jesus while praying on a Korean mountainside at the age of 16. Nine years later, he began the evangelistic mission but soon fell into the hands of Communist forces who held him in a prison camp nearly three years.

He founded the Unification Church in the mid-1950s and missionaries brought it to the United States a decade later. Salonen said U.S.

membership has grown to about 25,000 but only about 5,000 are active workers. The church lists headquarters in every state, with the largest followings in New York, Washington and San Francisco.

Also named in the one-count indictment were Barrie Sommerfield, vice president and merchandise manager of Saks, and Leonard Hankin, executive vice president of Bergdorf Goodman.

The stores are among the largest retailers specializing in the sale of women's clothing in the New York metropolitan area and did about \$70 million in business in 1972, the indictment says.

The stores were accused of fixing retail prices of women's clothes by adopting uniform markup lists, starting in the late 1960's and continuing to the present.

### Import Of Water Is Vital Point

The Economic Advisory Committee of the Governor's Water Tank Force has taken the stand that the question of water import must be tied to any state water plan.

### U.S. Narc Agent Shot

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — A U.S. narcotics agent was wounded seriously during a shootout in a Los Mochis, Mexico, hotel that left an alleged drug trafficker dead and two other men wounded. The Arizona Daily Star reported the agent, Antonio Adan Celaya, 40, was shot in the chest, arm and leg Tuesday at the Hotel Chapman. Officials of the Arizona Medical Center here said a seven-man surgical team was flown to Los Mochis to aid the wounded agent. John Strand, head of the

Drug Enforcement Administration office in Nogales, Ariz., said Celaya was in charge of the DEA district office in Hermosillo, Mexico.

"His condition is listed as stable and the Mexican doctors recommended that he not be moved for 24 hours," Strand said.

Celaya is the second U.S. narcotics agent to be shot in Mexico this year, Strand said. In March, another agent was shot in the head and he remains in a California hospital.

Arizona Medical Center officials said bad weather hampered the team's return to Tucson with Celaya but they were expected to arrive here sometime today.

## 'GOOD NIGHT, IRENE' Texans Seek To Move Grave Of 'Leadbelly'

SHREVEPORT, La. (AP) — Some Texans are conspiring to spirit away one of Louisiana's most famous folk singers, Huddie "Leadbelly" Ledbetter.

Ledbetter, who wrote "Good Night, Irene," died in 1949 after a turbulent life, much of it spent in Louisiana and Texas prisons. He was buried in the Shiloh Baptist Church cemetery north of Shreveport. Now the Harrison County Historical Society Committee of Marshall, Tex., says it wants to have Ledbetter's remains moved to Texas.

Max S. Lale of Marshall, chairman of the committee, reluctantly disclosed the organization's plans Wednesday.

"I'm really sorry you got wind of this before we got this all put together," he told newsmen. "I don't know if anyone might object."

contend Ledbetter was a native of their state.

Ledbetter's niece, Irene Campbell of Marshall, says, however, that her uncle told her he was born on the Jeter Plantation not far from the Shiloh cemetery. Born in 1888, Ledbetter was raised and worked around Louisiana and Texas until 1918, when he was jailed for murder in Texas. He was pardoned in 1925, but was imprisoned at the Louisiana Penitentiary in Angola from 1930 to 1934 for attempted homicide.

FAMOUS IN 40's Legend has it that the governor of Louisiana heard his singing during a routine tour of the prison and pardoned him.

"Leadbelly" also served a year in a New York prison for assault. His distinctive prison-style singing and his gravelly voice made him a famous performer in the 1940s.

Mrs. Campbell, 66, said she wasn't the subject of Ledbetter's "Good Night, Irene," but said Ledbetter himself gave her the name over the objections of her mother.

GOOD REASON Lale said his committee hasn't decided where Ledbetter's body would be reburied in Texas but the site probably would be in the Karnack Community just west of the Louisiana-Texas line where "Leadbelly" spent many of his younger years.

He said some legal steps will have to be taken before disintering the body but preparations have been made to acquire necessary permits.

The Caddo Parish coronor, Dr. Willis P. Butler, said the move would require three permits, one of which could be issued only by himself or the parish health unit.

### Checkpoint For Aliens Is Illegal

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — The halting of motorists between Los Angeles and the Mexican border in hope of catching illegal aliens has been ruled unconstitutional by a federal judge.

The effect of a blanket search warrant, U.S. District Court Judge Edward Schwartz said Monday in his ruling, that "everyone may be stopped without even a founded suspicion, simply to constitute what is obviously a kind of dragnet for the purpose of catching up with numerous illegal aliens that enter the United States and travel."

"This is obviously a total and blanket intrusion upon the rights of the traveling public," Schwartz said. Last July a federal magistrate in San Diego ordered the blanket search warrant at the San Clemente checkpoint at the request of the Border Patrol.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals sharply curtailed the authority to spot and search vehicles but since then the warrant has been renewed 10 times for 10-day periods.

Schwartz said the government has other means of enforcing immigration laws. He mentioned increasing patrols and watching the border itself more closely. "I think one means is in Congress now that would make it illegal for an employer to knowingly hire illegal aliens."

The ruling came in the case of Salvador Casillas, 30, of Los Angeles, who had been charged with transporting illegal aliens in the United States. His lawyer said the government has 30 days in which to appeal the ruling.

### Draftees Get Break

WASHINGTON (AP) — About 2,500 men who were the last draftees before the Army switched to an all-volunteer force will be home by Thanksgiving.

The Army said Wednesday it was releasing many of the men before the end of their two-year hitch because of success in meeting enlistment goals for a volunteer force in recent months. Some draftees could have remained in uniform until as late as next June 30 without the early separation.

Any draftee who volunteers to remain on duty beyond Thanksgiving will be permitted to do so, the Army said.

### Farmers Union Raps Embargo

Texas Farmers Union President, Jay Naman of Waco, today termed President Ford's action of a "voluntary embargo" on sales of grain to foreign buyers as "disasterous to Texas farmers," echoing a NFU statement.

"The embargo on these grain exports will take the top off the 'boom' that farmers have been promised they could collect if the farming gamble comes up with strong demand."

"We call on President Ford to direct that price support loans be offered to farmers immediately at 90 per cent of parity for the 1974 crops. We call on Congress to vote at once to authorize price support loans be raised to 100 per cent of parity for the 1975 and later crops."

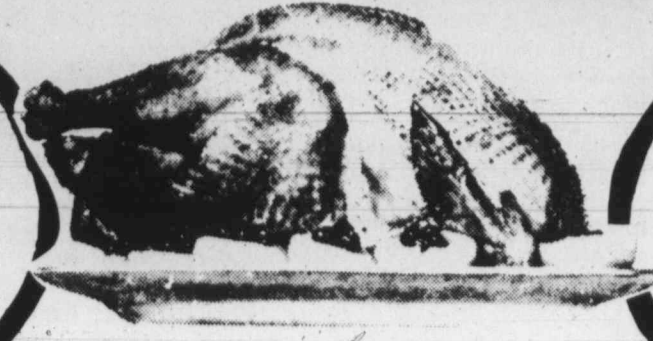

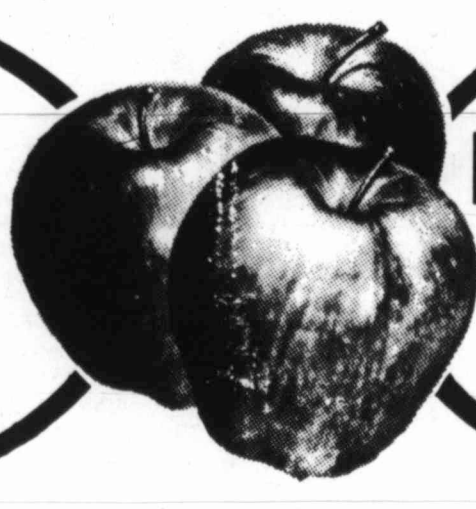

### Pierson Suit Settlement

**ABILENE, Tex. (AP)** — Don Pierson will turn over nine million shares of his Dupont Caribbean, Inc., stock and \$18,000 cash to three plaintiffs who sued him for several hundred thousand dollars. Terms of the settlement were announced here in U.S. District Court here. Pierson and his wife Ann were sued as directors of Dupont Caribbean, Inc. (DPI), an Eastland, Tex., company formed to develop the Haitian island of Tortuga into a Caribbean tourist paradise. The plaintiff accused Pierson of failing to abide by contracts and agreements made in the past five years. Pierson said the settlement still left his family in control of DPI with three quarters of the voting stock, 7.5 million shares, in their possession. Under the settlement, 2.5 million shares of DPI voting stock will be issued to the plaintiffs along with 6.5 million shares of no-voting DCI stock. The agreement also provides for payment by DPI to the plaintiffs of \$18,000 cash. All stock and money will be distributed among the plaintiffs according to a ratio they will determine later. The agreement provides another one million shares of DCI nonvoting stock held by plaintiff Alvin Celcer would be recognized by DCI as Celcer's. Plaintiffs in the action included Celcer, Phillip F. King and Exchange Street Corp.

### Nab Drivers For Speeding Marijuana Highway

**ALICE, Tex. (AP)** — Road signs designate it U.S. 281, but around this South Texas town they call it 281-M, or "The Marijuana Highway." The road knifes its way north from the Rio Grande Valley across the cactus and mesquite-studded landscape of South Texas to San Antonio and beyond. Alice is halfway to San Antonio, and tons of marijuana roll by here week in and week out. **NO WAY** "There's no way of telling just how much marijuana is hauled through Alice," said B. F. "Bev" Lloyd, district attorney of Jim Wells County. "We get more by accident than any other way." Indications are that hauling marijuana up U.S. 281 is so commonplace that some drivers are getting casual about their job. In one case cited by Lloyd, a driver was stopped for traveling 64 miles per hour in a 55 m.p.h. zone. It turned out he was carrying 500 pounds of marijuana. **TIPS** "Now why in the world would a man carrying 500 pounds of marijuana exceed the speed limit?" Lloyd asked. "Ninety per cent of the seizures have been by sheer accident—because the person is doing something wrong," Lloyd said. Some arrests result from tips from federal agents or Valley law enforcement officers. But he said such cases are rare. The tall prosecutor said he believes 75 per cent of the criminal cases his office handles are in some way

related to narcotics, but not all the cases come off the marijuana highway. **PAY FOR HABIT** Lloyd said many burglary and shoplifting cases are the result of a person needing money to pay for his habit. Asked why there are more confiscations of marijuana now, Lloyd said, "The police are more alert and there's just more coming through." Lloyd said that in a recent case a state trooper noted an automobile weaving "all over the road." He stopped the driver and arrested him for driving while intoxicated. A search revealed that the tipsy driver was hauling 500 pounds of brick form marijuana. In another case Lloyd cited, a Jim Wells County deputy stopped to aid a disabled automobile. The man was hauling about 500 pounds of marijuana. **NEW GIMMICK** Lloyd said marijuana smugglers frequently buy older automobiles so they will not lose so much money if the car is confiscated. He said some haulers use rental automobiles "and then we don't even get the car." Lloyd said most persons arrested in the Alice area are from the Lower Rio Grande Valley and were hired to haul a load of something for a small amount of money, frequently \$25. Lloyd describes the persons arrested as "message boys," saying they usually will not tell officers who hired them. "They have to get their

**BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (AP)** — District Court Judge William Scanlan ordered the city of Harlingen not to move or tamper with the wreckage of a helicopter that crashed last week, killing two policemen. Genoviva R. Avila of Mission, widow of helicopter pilot Huber R. Avila, filed

suit, claiming she and her lawyers have been prevented from examining the wreckage. Avila and Douglas Dodson, a police dispatcher from Harlingen, were killed when the helicopter crashed and burned at Harlingen. In the suit filed against the city of Harlingen and an insurance company, Mrs. Avila said she believed her husband was killed because of either negligent conduct, defects in the helicopter or faulty maintenance. Judge Scanlan set a hearing for Friday.

### Flying Weather Lab Contracted

Interior Secretary Rogers C. B. Morton said today the Bureau of Reclamation has awarded a \$2,198,895 contract to Convergence Systems, Inc., of Fort Collins, Colo., for development and operation of a highly instrumental research aircraft and mobile computer van for use by Project Skywater, the Bureau's weather modification research program. "This aircraft, its sophisticated instruments and the mobile computer system," Morton said, "will provide the Bureau's atmospheric scientists with priceless information in cloud dynamics and the effects of cloud seeding on weather systems." **TRANSFER INFO** Gilbert G. Stamm, commissioner of reclamation, said the plane, a twin-engine Aero Commander 680 FL, also will carry a computer system which will rapidly translate information from instrument to a magnetic tape for immediate analysis. "After each research flight," he said, "the mobile computer van will plug into the aircraft's computer and extract the data which then will be further analyzed in the van's computer and available for study." "The aircraft's instrument package and the mobile computer will be uniquely suited for the cumulus cloud research underway in the High Plains Cooperative Program," Stamm said. "The High Plains project is a second generation of research into the seeding of summer cumulus clouds for enhanced showers over the High Plains region," he explained. Under the contract, Convergence Systems will provide the flight crew and operate the aircraft during 5-month periods during each of the next 5 summer seasons. The aircraft is capable of reaching 28,500 feet elevation, maintaining the relatively low speeds required for research, and can use short runways for both takeoff and landing. **MAY BE HERE** The aircraft primarily will be used near Miles City, Mont., location of a High Plains research site operated in cooperation with the Montana Department of Natural Resources. The aircraft may also be used near Colby, Kans., and Big Spring, Tex., two other High Plains research sites. The instrument package will include a weather radar which will permit the aircraft to fly into known icing conditions; devices to monitor free air temperature; air temperature, including dynamic heating; static pressure; humidity and dewpoint; the size of water content; the presence and size of ice crystals and other particles; and an ice nuclei counter. It also will carry a 16-mm time-lapse camera system for airborne cloud photographs and a digital data acquisition and recorder system handling the computer compatible magnetic tape.

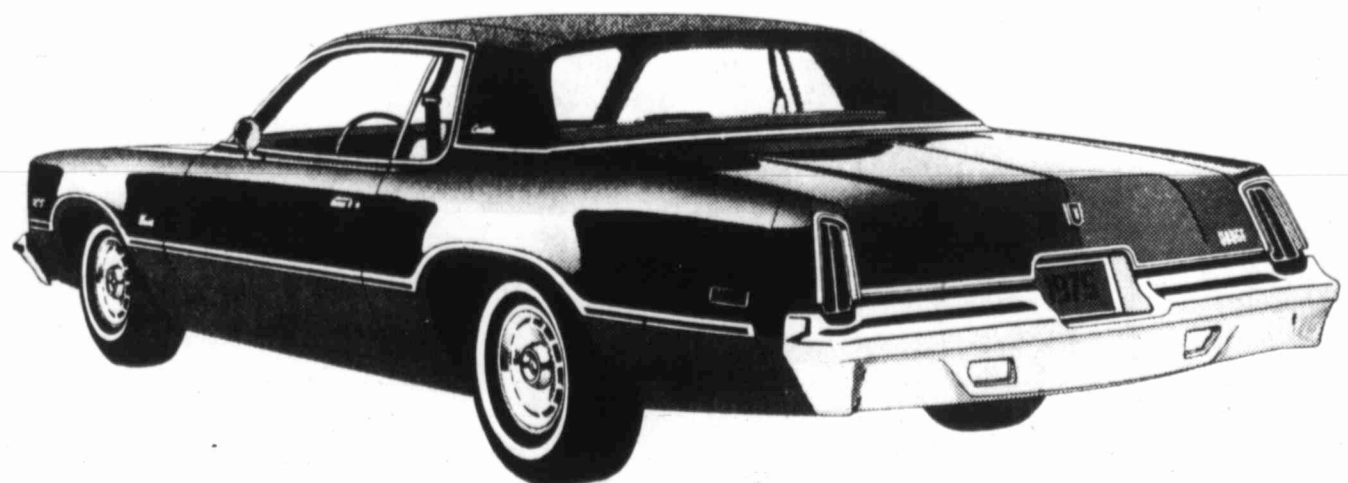
