Alameda County officials burned down Mike Pompileo's cardboard-patched wood shack last week, declaring the place a rat-infested health hazard. They also evicted Pompileo's dogs, cats and duck, charged the hermit with trespassing on another person's land and delivered him to Napa State Hospital.

"We're trying to get Mike back here," said Pamela Galbraith, in charge of the emergency program to help Pompileo. "Mike is perfectly harmless. He's lived here almost his whole life and people kind of love him. So what if he're people kind of love him. So what if he's eccentric? He's a very proud man; it's sad to break a man's

In Oakland on Friday, the 6-foot, 250-pound Pompileo told Alameda County Superior Court Judge Harold Hove that all he wants in life is to return to Livermore to tend his pets, chat with folks and wander about as the spirit moves him.

The judge ordered 55-year-old Pompileo to submit to psychiatric examination next week and freed him to the custody of a son in San Jose.

Mrs. Galbraith said she's already collected \$200 and hired a lawyer to defend against the trespass charge. Local teenagers are holding a fund-raising dance for him Saturday night.

U.S. District Judge Charles Fulton said Friday the bond investors fell prey to a "diabolical scheme" by R. J. Allen and Associates to sell securities through 'misleading and false statements.' He ordered three officers and a salesman for the

firm to repay the money. Fulton also ordered the firm's assets held in trust and a receiver appointed to disburse to the bond buyers whatever money could be

The Securities and Exchange Commission had sought the action in a civil suit against the four defendants—company officers Robert J. Allen, Howard W. Alexander and Charls J. Diaz, and former salesman Thomas A. Preston.

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) — The Swiss began voting Saturday in a two-day referendum on whether to oust 540,000 foreigners on grounds they are changing the character of this sober, orderly nation.

Results are to be announced Sunday evening. All major political parties have urged that the proposal be voted down, and polls predicted it will lose by a comfortable margin. But there is a large undecided vote, and government of-ficials are privately less sure of rejection than the polls-

The movement against foreign workers has been boosted by unchecked inflation, growing fears of world economic recession and a tendency to blame foreigners for high prices and rents and even pollution

of the country.
At stake is the fate of people — two thirds of them Italians and Spaniards encouraged by business to come and work here and now suddenly facing an uncertain

In a bitter campaign many

Swiss have openly shown deep compassion, but just as many have expressed their hatred of foreigners.

Fear of what expulsion might do to the country's new wealth and its reputation abroad gained ground toward the end of the campaign.

"We've become supercareful about what we buy and when we buy it," says Robert Harrison, president John Wanamaker, a Philadelphia-based



## Stepin Fetchit **Loses His Case**


WASHINGTON (AP) — Lincoln Theodore Perry, the black actor known as Stepin Fetchit, has lost a bid for Supreme Court review of his claim that the Columbia Broadcasting System libeled him and invaded his privacy.

The court let stand Tuesday a decision of the U.S. Circuit Court in Chicago that Perry was a public figure and therefore could not collect damages unless CBS maliciously defamed

Perry, 72, sued because of a 1968 television special on black history in which he was described as having arized "the tradition of the lazy, stupid, crap-shooting, chickenstealing

Perry denied this saying he had "elevated the Negro" in the 33 films he made before leaving the movie business in 1938 during a contract dispute. He said the television

special destroyed his show business career and caused him to lose a role in the TV. series, "Sanford and Son,"

Tony is 37 years old. He considers himself very lucky to have reached that age, because ever since he was 13, except for about 11 years he has been strung out on morphine, heroine, and

During those years he saw all his boyhood friends die, had his first wife and four children leave him and watched his two year old daughter die of pneumonia, and has lied, cheated, and stolen to get a fix.

But now, he has been "clean" for around two years is married again and has a three month old daughter. "I only want to get my self respect back now, and to live to get old," he

"Tony" is not the real name of this man who wishes to remain anonymous.

"I never had any trouble finding heroine," he recalled," and everyone in my old neighborhood got on it." sorrowfully reflected, "I am the only one of them left

FRIENDS OVERDOSED Five of his friends overdosed and died and six more were killed in various incidents of crime, trying to finance their habit. A couple of his acquaintances are serving long prison terms for selling the drugs.

"I never got into selling heroine, because I could only afford enough for myself. Everything I bought, I used, and I didn't have any to sell," he remembered.

The seventh largest state, Michigan, has a Republican governor who has the incumbent's edge. But the race is rated close to a tossup. Democrats already control the No. 8 state, New Jersey, which does not elect a governor this year, and No. 9. Florida, where incumbent Reubin Askew is a heavy favorite for a new term.

In the next largest state, Massachusetts Gov. Francis W. Sargent is trailing in the

While the Republicans have congrolled Congress only twice since the Great Depression, the governorships have changed hands in some reflection of the mood of the country. There has also been a

trend of a party moving to power in the states prior to successful bids for the White House.

In 1958 the Democrats won seven governorships to run their control to 35 and give the party strong roots for John F. Kennedy's presidential victory in 1960. Similarly, the Republicans

made gains in 1966 and took a 26-24 edge in 1967 as they moved toward Richard

The Democrats have been to it steadily since then. The glamour races this

year are in California and New York, because they are big states and because they have been Republican strongholds for so long.

Ronald Reagan, governor of California for eight years, is retiring next year.

Edmund G. Brown Jr., 36ear-old California secretary of state and son of the last Democratic governor, is the Democratic nominee and has a lead in the polls of about 15 per cent over Houston Flournoy, now the GOP state controller.

Rockefeller. Nelson governor of New York for so long it looked like a Republican preserve, resigned last year. Now his lieutenant governor of 15 years, Malcolm Wilson, is running for election in his own right. He's trailing far behind Rep. Hugh Carey, who won the Democratic nomination in a hot primary over the favorite of the party establishment.

Yet he apparently never discussed this with the President, his wife or advisers. There is some indication the President knew about the state of his health he gave away belongings to staff members for several months before his death. He never admitted, however, that he felt his illness was terminal.







"Unless present trends in population growth and food production are significantly altered, a food crisis that will have the potential to affect everyone from every walk of life will hit with more impact than, the energy crisis of Agriculture subcommittee on department operations said in a report released

"In all probability, the world can expect more, rather than less, disasters associated with mal-nutrition," it said. "The world food crisis will not disappear spontaneously or soon and maybe never.

The subcommittee said that shortages of land, water, fertilizer and energy could aggravate the food crisis, and warned that the United States could find itself in the midst of the prob-

"Americans cannot afford to sit idly by thinking

Observing that the United and population patterns are States, with 5 to 6 per cent of the world's population, consumes 40 per cent of the world's resources, the report said: "The demand for food, like the demand for oil, metals, minerals, and other resources, is obviously going to skyrocket, and that rocket is going to be fueled by fires of inflation and joblessness.

# Old Tradition: 'People Helping People'

The 'new' auxiliary to Big Spring State Hospital will be a blending of faithful volunteers, who have given their services through the years, and new volnteers who are finding satisfaction and pleasure in providing 'extras' that make life more enjoyable for residents of the hospital.

The auxiliary, which will work through the volunteers Council and the Volunteer Services office, will provide a multiplicity of services — from committee work to actual patient care. Each volunteer can choose his or her activity in assisting in any way with hospital needs.

The areas of volunteer service are almost limitless. The person who gives something of himself to brighten another's life shares that individual's burden but gains a personal — joyous — satisfaction.

In January, a stepped-up program of volunteer services will be available, in addition to the regular services schedule, and will include such activities as psycho-drama and remotivation therapy. Volunteer training sessions for such activities will be under the way of Phil Christensen, psychologist, who will serve as consultant to the auxiliary.

Mrs. Pete Rhymes will serve as temporary chairman for the auxiliary, with an advisory board composed of Mrs. H. W.Smith, Mrs. Wallace Hunter, Mrs. Claude Van Vleet, Mrs. David Elrod and Mrs. Rhymes.

The auxiliary will be continuing a long tradition of community involvement at the hospital. Last year alone, volunteers contributed 39,346 hours of service, 37,187 of them on a regular schedule basis. Over the years, one volunteer has acquired over 9,000 hours, another has 8,000 and scores of others have logged time in impressive figures. Last year, the volunteer program won first place in state scrapbook competition.

Big Spring State Hospital first opened its doors in 1939, and its superintendent for almost 20 years has been Dr. Preston E. Harrison. Perhaps the first organized group of volunteers at the hospital was that which formed in 1957 with the late Robert W. Whipkey as temporary chairman. Its first elected officers were Jack Y. Smith, chairman; J. D. Elliott, co-chairman; and Mrs. Neil Norred, secretary-treasurer. At that time, the working volunteers represented over 40 organizations. The first "capping" ceremony was introduced by Joe Pickle and, by 1959, the volunteers, in their blue and white pinafores, were a familiar part of the overall program.

In time, changing theories did away with the uniforms, but not the volunteers. Although modern medicine and new techniques are getting residents back into normal surroundings more quickly, an important ingredient of treatment is love. It's called "People Helping People."

Even if Congress reluctantly settle on the latter, American taxpayers are entitled to an efficient postal operation both for the sake of their hard-earned dollars and for respectable service.

# Who Fell Off?

What used to be called shenanigans are nowadays called foul play. And Rockefeller being in the spotlight, he is feeling the heat generated by what Spiro Agnew dubbed the post-Watergate morality. What is it, in politics, that is simply tough and ingenious and even cute? What is it that is foul

SUDDENLY I SAW, coming in from the mists of yesteryear, one of Rockefeller's old fleet of campaign destroyers. Only this one was slightly older than the Goldberg Book. It dated back to 1968, and here

are the circumstances. During the Miami Beach convention of the Republican Party, the Miami Herald carried a monstrous big ad entitled: "Memoradum to: Delegates to the Republican National Convention-From: Black American-Subject: The Presidential Nomination." The advertisement instructed the delegates to vote for Rockefeller — or else. "We take this opportunity to advise you that candidates with records such as Richard Nixon and Ronald Reagan are not acceptable to black

Americans. THE CHAIRMAN of the list of 76 Negro signers was the late Mr. Louis Lomax, the Los Angeles writer, and among the 76 were the names of very prominent black citizens, for instance Charles Evers, Marian Anderson Louis Armstrong, Cab Calloway, and Lionel Hampton some of whom would in due course

become Nixon enthusiasts; none of whom was given lightly to implying that other Americans are racists, that being the clear implication of the advertisement concerning Nixon and Reagan.

Now someone asked me, at a public situation in Miami, to comment on the ad. I said it was reprehensible, and that it was, on the face of it, a Rockefeller operation, undoubtedly paid for by WHAT OTHERS SAY Rockefeller headquartesr. That afternoon, a journalist reported my observation to Gov. Rockefeller at a press conference. "Is that true," the Rockefeller operation?

died down I beamed at the set, American seamen.

# More About Warts

Dr. G. C. Thosteson

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have no quarrel with your article on warts and I personally have had some ugly ones shrivel and disappear

spontaneously However our daughter, 8, had her hands covered with warts, and was selfconscience. Our pediatrician referred us to a specialist in dermatology who marked each with an ordinary pen, then touched each marked area with a Q-tip dipped in liquid nitrogen.

We were told her hands would look terrible for about 10 days — and they did. But as the quick-frozen tissue dried up and fell off, no more warts. We've been assured that in a year there would be no scar tissue or aftereffects. (At the moment merely white spots on her otherwise lightly tanned skin.)

We learned that not all are capable of this type of treatment - R.H.Thank you sir. Warts are a

peculiar type of growth, sometimes an annoyance, but not dangerous or harmful except in appearance. If folks are willing to let them come and go naturally.

they always disappear in time. If you are in a hurry to get rid of them, let a dermatologist do it, by whatever method he finds effective. The liquid nitrogen is one such method, as you know. I'll let you in on a secret:

not even a specialist can guarantee that warts won't return, but the instantfreezing method you describe is effective when used by doctors who know how to do it. Since warts do (in their

own sweet time) disappear spontaneously, all sorts of hocus-pocus seems to work when applied around the time the warts are getting ready to depart amyway. When this happens, the beholder is (not surprisingly) certain he has discovered "the sure cure for warts."

It didn't exactly astonish me to receive a fresh supply of such testimonials this time. Among them the following:

"A neighbor asked me if I wanted the warts off and I said yes. He held my hand and rubbed his hand over the warts. In about two weeks my warts were all gone -

From a traveler in Europe: "I found some yellow peas and rubbed on the warts and they went away.' From Minnesota: "I cured

Lockley definitely succeeds in what he sets out to do and his observations are, for the most part, interesting. There are times, however, when the going gets pretty dull, even for the most rabid rabbit fan, as witness the chapter on "myxomatosis,"

a rabbit disease. But, for the most part, Lockley writes engagingly and his observations on the wonders of nature - flowers, trees, rabbits and other creatures — are charming and uplift the text. His ob-servations of rabbit behavior also are most interesting, especially in the way they reflect human behavior. Or as Lockley puts it, "Rabbits are so human. Or is it the other way round - humans are so rabbit?'



for that matter, Christian no legal sanction would be needed to prevent one man being treated by his fellow men less favorably than another simply upon the ground of his color or ethnic or national origins.

"But in the field of domestic or social intercourse, differentiation in treatment of individuals is unavoidable. No one has room to invite everyone to dinner. The law cannot dictate one's choice of friends.

The ruling applies to private clubs that do not provide goods or services "to the public or a section of the public.
