ROCKMART, Ga. (AP) A work train backed into a loaded school bus at a crossing today, killing at least seven children, authorities reported.

Heath told newsmen he was probably not the target of the blast since he had made his dinner arrangements at the last minute. There was speculation that the bombings were the work of the Irish Republican Army.

DETROIT (AP) - Chrysler Corp. has reported a third quarter profit of \$11.2 million in U.S. and Canadian operations and increased sales revenue worldwide. But the firm wound up losing \$8 million for the quarter because of overseas losses. The North American profits were offset by losses totaling \$19.2 million overseas, Chrysler said. The figures announced Tuesday show Chrysler still in the black for the year so far.

Campaign 'Reform' Bill

The campaign financing plan that has emerged from Congress is billed as sweeping political reform.

But the only features of the legislation worked out in a House-Senate compromise that are really new are provisions for subsidizing presidential campaigns with tax dollars and for an independent commission to enforce the new law.

And it is the public financing issue that has heated House and Senate debate and stirred speculation that President Ford might veto the bill.

In its final form, however, the measure probably will be blessed with a presidential signature. Funds diverted to the political campaigns will be limited to the amounts accumulated through the voluntary checkott on tederal income tax forms and will be limited to presidential candidates in general and prinoury elections

The Senate version of campaign reform envisioned extended public financing to congressional candidates and sould have dipped far deeper into the public till.

It is concervable that the \$1 income tax checkoff will over a tour year period provide the \$20 million authorized for each major party candidate in the pre-adertial election, the \$5 million proposed for process hopefuls and the \$2 million for each of the re corports conventions.

Jack rabbits were so numerous that shooting or trapping them could hardly make inroads on them. Consequently, rabbit drives were organized, and there was never more fertile area than northwestern Glasscock County. Rabbits were big rascals, and it was no exaggeration that a jack's hind legs could be held at a grown man's hips and the front feet would touch the ground. Between them and the prairie dogs, it was mighty tough on a pasture. So multiplied thousands of them were cleaned off by the drives, only they scarecly seemed missed

TAKING THE cagey coyote was not so simple. About the only effective ways was to get experts like Christie (and later our own Earl Brownrigg) who were learned in the ways of the wily coyote, enough so that they could overcome his suspicions and get him in a trap. They didn't often bother with a scalp or a hide; more than likely they strung the carcass up on a barbed wire fence as a warning to their mates that this wasn't still the promised land. And yet today we have an ample supply of jack rabbits and covotes.

Earthquake Registered

HONOLULU (AP)- A major earthquake struck remote area of the South Pacific, authorites reported today. There were no early reports of casualties or damages.

A spokesman for the International Tsunami Information Center said the tremor, which registered 7.2 on the Richter scale, was recorded at 8:15 p.m. HST Tuesday in the vicinity of the Solomon Islands.

A quake of 7.2 is classified as major and would be capable of heavy damage.

The center said the location of the quake was such that a Pacific-wide tsunami, or seismic sea wave, will not be generated. The epicenter of the earthquake was not immediately known.

The Richter scale is a measure of ground motion as recorded on seismographs. Every increase of one number means a tenfold increase in magnitute. Thus, a reading of 7.2 would be 10 times greater than a reading of 6.2.

The San Francisco earthquake of 1906 registered 8.3.




