The taps were discovered by a private electronics expert hired by Lynn during an internal departmental investigation he initiated just after taking office last January.

One source, a former Bell System employe, said telephone workmen almost routinely would tap into phone lines at random duirng nighttime shifts when there was little to do at a switching station.

The source said the workmen would occasionally discover favorite lines, where conversations of an intimate nature took place with regularity, and would listen almost nightly, sometimes even recording it to share with others.

Pat Maloney, a San Antonio attorney representing plaintiffs in a \$26 million suit against Bell, said his investigation shows telephone tapping by Bell is common.

"They do with impunity listen in on conversations," said Maloney. "The assured me that is against the law, but I have on good authority that they don't always obey

Bell Officials admit that telephone tapping can easily be accomplished through company facilities, but said it is a violation of company

Another source familiar with the Bell System's operation said Bell's security forces were "beefed up" following the 1968 passage of the Omnibus Crime Law which put strict limits on wiretanning by law limits on wiretapping by law enforcement agencies. Wiretapping provisions of the law, he said, were usually ignored.

No Paradise Elsewhere

Inflation and high interest rates have been blamed primarily for the lag in the building industry in the United States. Some enterprising persons have even considered going overseas to escape some of the high

cost of living.

That could be a mistake. Some foreign nations are suffering much higher inflation rates than the United States and one could find himself in worse shape than

The U.S. military has found this to be especially true in its installations in Okinawa. Richard Halloran, writing in the New York Times, reports that construction and maintenance costs are so high on that island that marine barracks are decrepit and leaky, their plumbing is cracked and clogged and the water is both coid and rauoned. He writes that beds are infested with insects and rodents. The Air Force, he says is doing better, but not much. In fact, inflation has hit the military so hard, Halloran says, that the Marine Corps, not being able to pay for civilian workers, has started putting men back on kitchen police for 30 days at a time. The Air Force has radarmen and other technicians cutting grass.

According to the Air Force, the cost of cement has gone up 73 per cent in the last year in the island, lumber 98 per cent, gravel 83 per cent and steel 127 per cent. Wages have risen 154 to 259 per cent on an

average.

Halloran says that inflation in Okinawa also has been aggravated by large amounts of money pumped into the island by the Japanese government and

private investors after Okinawa was transferred from American to Japanese control in 1972. Formerly under U.S. military administration, many things such as electric power, road maintenance and water supply are being run by the local government. And military officers say that the administration is rather incompetent. All-in-all it doesn't look like a bed of roses for the U.S. military man in Okinawa. for the U.S. military man in Okinawa.



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Don't Believe It

YORK (AP) on its monthly statistical report, you might think the mutual fund industry had been saved from bleeding away and restored not just to good health but to almost unprecedented vigor.

Month after month the industry's experience had been the same: owners of funds redeeming more shares than the depleted sales staff of the more than 400 funds could sell to new owners.

After January of this year, in fact, redemptions exceeded sales right through September. Owners of funds bonds and even for savings accounts and time deposits.

Adding to this almost disastrous experience was an equally poor performance by the stock market. When the market doesn't perform well neither do the funds; their assets sank to only \$32 billion in September, compared with \$52 billion in October

Then came the turn, as related by the Investment Company Institute: "Mutual fund sales totaled \$816.5 million in October, the second highest monthly level in the industry's history.

Even more exciting, seemed, was the fact that net sales, or the excess of sales over redemptions, reached \$505.7 million, a figure never before attained, even in the bullish days of the late 1960s. What explains it? The

price of money-the interest rates being paid for money that is loaned out. High interest rates ordinarily are the enemy of mutual funds, were unloading them for as they are of the entire market. But now the funds have joined the money market.

The record sales, it appears, were the result largely of an increase by newly formed money market mutual funds - funds that invest mainly in commercial paper, bankers' acceptances, certificates of deposit and short-term government

secrities. There is no reason, when you think of it, why mutual funds should stick with the stock market when there's money to be made elsewhere. Rather than continue a futile fight with high interest rates many funds decided to cash in on

The business of most mutual funds continues to be the stock market, depressed as it is. Take away the sales the money market funds and the industry's net sales for October were only \$119.8 million.

Nevertheless, that figure in itself lends courage to the funds because it is the first month since last January that sales exceeded cash-ins.

The problem for the funds now is to get the proceeds from sales of their own shares invested in the stocks of American industry, and that isn't too easily ac-complished during a bear

Tapes Of Wrath

WASHINGTON - I went over to the Watergate conspiracy trial the other day, and it was good to see all my old friends again — Bob Haldeman, John Ehrlichman, John Robert Mardian and Kenneth Parkinson. It was tape day, and the prosecution was playing White House tapes for the jury. Everyone in the courtroom was provided with a set of earphones and all we had to do was sit back and relax and listen to how everyone was shafting each other.
IT'S A PITY that all Americans

can't hear the Nixon tapes. No matter what you read in the transcripts, nothing compares to listening to the voices themselves as they discuss ways and means of shutting off Watergate at the pass.

Having just seen "The Godfather" on television, I couldn't help comparing the Don Corleone family with the Don Watergate family. The first thing that occurred to me was that Marlon Brando as the Godfather spoke so much better English than Richard Nixon - and this despite the fact that Brando had cotton in his cheeks and was supposed to have been born in Sicily.

THE DON CORLEONES lived by a code of sorts. While they did not hesitate to take care of people outside the family, they always portected each other. When you listen to the tapes, you have to conclude that in the Don Watergate family it was every man for himself. So what you hear through your

earphones is the making of a conspiracy not only against the government but against each other. Haldeman and Ehrlichman are out to get John Mitchell; Nixon's out to get Colson; Colson's out to get John Dean, and Haldeman's out to get

Ehrlichman. THE CLEAREST TAPES are the telephone conversations between Nixon and his aides. The thing that struck me the most about these is that, when Nixon was speaking the phone, he always breathed heavily as if he was making an obscene call - which it now turns out he was

Another observation you can make from the tapes is that nobody ever let the President of the United States say anything. Every time he started to talk he was interrupted by one of his aides. All they permitted him to do was occasionally repeat something that they had just told him. Marlon Brando would have never stood for this.

I DON'T WANT to carry this comparison between the Don Corleone and Don Watergate families too far. For one thing, the Don Corleones were much smarter than the Don Watergates. You can't conceive of Marlon Brando's people setting up a tape system in his house. And you know even if they did, the Godfather of the film would have thrown out the machines after the feds were on to him.

But we can't cry over Scotch tape. the tapes are there for the jury and a few privileged members of the press to hear. If they could be played generally, they would have a much bigger rating than the "Godfather" They make great listening, and my only regret is that so far the American public can't tune in on them. If they could, I assure you they would have a higher rating than "The Godfather." Hollywood writers just can't duplicate the duplicity of the Watergate gang. If they tried, nobody would believe it.

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


