SEPTEMBER IS HERE, and we hate to remind the football widows, but it's that time again.

The pros have already played a game, and the high schools and colleges kick off their schedules this weekend.

The Dallas Cowboys, America's Team, and the favorite pro team of 99 and 44/100 per cent of the residents in this area, are embroiled in a quarterback controversy as they begin their 1984 season.

At least it was a controversy prior to their game at Los Angeles Monday night. After the performance of Gary Hogeboom Monday, many of those who thought Tom Landry might have over-reacted by replacing Danny White as the team leader may now be saying "Danny Who?"

Hogeboom silenced the skeptics who may have wondered if he was up to the task. He didn't have just an "average" game, any way you look at it. His 33 pass completions set a Dallas single-game record, formerly held by White.

It's a typical Dallas dilemma, because now the Cowboys have the NFL's second most proficient passer in history (White), relegated to the bench, and back-up duty. And the way today's NFL stars are paid, White surely is one of the highest-paid bench-warmers in the

league. Up until the game's late stages on Monday, this writer kept thinking Landry was going to have to pull Hogeboom, and let White pull off a "miracle finish," due to all of the Dallas mistakes, which tarnished the new quarterback's opening game, and kept Dallas trailing most of the way.

But credit is due the 25-year-old, who kept his cool, and just kept plugging until everything jelled with the winning drive.

Hogeboom-White The controversy is just the latest in the series of quarterback dilemmas which Dallas has been through in its 25-year NFL history.

The broadcasters were talking Monday about when Don Meredith became the new Cowboy quarterback. Later on, there was the Roger Staubach-Craig Morton feud, with another young quarterback, Clint Longley thrown

Landry solved the "play me or trade me" demands of both Morton and Longley, by dealing them to other teams.

Fate is not really fair (it never is), because White has had fewer starting seasons than he spent in back-up years to Staubach. And, in three of the four years he's been the Cowboy quarterback, the team has been to the NFL title game.


But, as it has been pointed out, in Dallas, that isn't enough. Cowboy fans want Super Bowl rings, and nothing less will suffice. We wish Gary Hogeboom a lot of luck. He's going to need it. Next to the president of the United States, we don't know of a job that draws as much attention and criticism.

CONGRATULATIONS to the Friona EMS organization, the Friona firemen, hospital and city employees on their reaction to Thursday evening's mock traffic accident.

The "mock disaster," which has been done in larger cities as a test for emergency workers, was carried out to perfection, and apparently the drill more than achieved its goals: helping workers find ways of improving their techniques, or being more ready for the real thing.

The planners did a great job of keeping the thing quiet. We understand that even the firemen had not been told it was a drill. Out at the scene, we thought to ourselves "These guys are great actors." Come to find out, they weren't acting.

City's Tax Check Up By 54 Pct.

The City of Friona received its monthly sales tax check this week, and it represented a nice gain from the same month a year earlier.

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The September check, which represents taxes collected on sales made in July and reported to Comptroller Bob Bullock by August 20, was for \$7,025.93. This was up from the total of \$4,550.26 a year ago, a 54.4 per cent increase.

For the year, Friona has now received \$75,651.44 in sales taxes. This is up by \$7,049 from the same time frame in 1983, or 10.28 per cent.

Parmer County's three municipalities received checks totalling \$10,964.22 this month, up from the total of \$7,353.92 in

For the year, the cities (Friona-Bovina-Farwell) have received \$112,168.13, which is an increase of \$9,235, or 8.97 per cent, over the same time in 1983.

Bullock sent checks totaling \$52.4 million in local sales tax payments to the 990 cities that levy the one per cent city sales tax.

"I don't know of a city official in Texas who doesn't lick his lips this time of the month," Bullock said.

Other cities also experienced nice increases in their checks. Fort Worth's check for \$2 million is 66 per cent more than the September, 1983 payment. Austin's \$2.6 million check is 64 per cent more than the city received last September.

As usual, Houston received the largest check, \$8.6 million, upping the city's yearly total to \$107 million.





Immigration Reform—In the Wake of Simpson-Mazzoli

his week in Washington, ▲ Representatives will meet to decide the fate of the Simpson-Mazzoli Immigration Reform Bill. Their job is to find a way to draft a compromise version acceptable to both the House and the Senate. At this point it is doubtful they will succeed.

Even if the Senate accepts most of the provisions of the House bill, there are many, including Kent Hance, who believe the House would not pass its own version again if it came up for another vote. It passed by only five votes last June.

The problem is that the House version of Simpson-Mazzoli would be unfair and too expensive to implement. At the root of the problem is a House leader lacking in political courage and leadership. At one point House Speaker Tip O'Neill said illegal immigration was a "regional problem" and he wished

the bill would just disappear. There are those who feel the same way about Tip.

The House version would grant amnesty to illegal aliens who came into this country before 1982. This is not only unfair to those who have waited for years to enter legally, it would also cost over a billion dollars a year in services for the next four years.

The House version also fails to provide a good solution for proper identification which is necessary for a workable program. Senator Alan Simpson of Wyoming has a collection of forged identification cards that proves this point. One illegal alien obtained a forged driver's license and social security card, enrolled in college and got tuition aid, food stamps, Medicare, Medicaid and unemployment benefits.

Many people oppose a na-

tional identification card for workers, but we already have one. All that is really needed is a counterfeit-proof social security card.

The House version has many sections that I object to, but there is one provision I support. I agree with the need to provide a program for guest workers for agriculture. This is necessary to keep from causing hardship on our struggling agricultural economy.

Our immigration problem continues while Congress debates the solution. Professor Donald Huddle of Rice University estimates that for every 100 illegal aliens employed, 65 Americans are left unemployed. And, in 1982 alone Texas' taxpayers paid \$85 million to educate the children of illegal aliens.

Loss of jobs and the costs of social services are the most obvious burdens of illegal immigration, but there is a more fundamental issue. A sovereign nation must have firm, controlled borders. We cannot continue to live at the mercy of social and economic conditions outside the control of the United States.


Pearce-Moses, the foundation's photo historian, said that photos are important historical documents and many are lost every day through neglect and deterioration.

Advertisements by margarine, cooking oil and shortening manufacturers often claim their product is better than a competitor's because of the type of fat-saturated versus polyunsaturated-it contains.

Since all of these food makers present rather convincing arguments why their product is better for you than the other, it's easy for consumers to become confused. But you can sort out the advertising claims with a few facts about fat.

Fats are complex structures with many different parts of elements linked together. These links are actually chemical bonds.

A saturated fat is one in which all of the links are filled.

In the meantime, consumers should recognize that certain amounts of fat--saturated, or unsaturated or both--are necessary for good health and part of a balanced diet. Representatives or the Senate. I was assigned to City L, the Lincoln Logs; Federalist Party and the House of Representatives. I was told to have fun and learn

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
more to get involved. Our first steps was to organize the political parties and elect their leaders. After this was done, Precinct, City, County, District, and State elections were held.

CATARACTS--Visual Symptoms of Cataracts

Most cataract patients experience a slowly progressive, painless decrease in visual acuity. Others report a rapid loss of vision over a period of months, weeks, or even days. A rapidly maturing cataract will cause a patient to seek out their optometrist because they have noticed a sudden loss of vision. Patients with a slowly maturing cataract have such a slow change in their vision until they come in for a regular checkup examination. There is never any pain associated with a cataract and its development.

A hyperopic (farsighted) patient will often notice their uncorrected distance vision getting better as their cataract matures. A myopic (nearsighted) patient will notice their uncorrected distance vision getting worse and their uncorrected near vision getting better as their cataract matures. This temporary improvement in their uncorrected distance or near vision is referred to as "second sight" and is the result of the crystalline lens swelling as the cataract matures.

Some patients complain of seeing "spots," especially when gazing at bright backgrounds. Other cataract patients complain of difficulty identifying colors or a "yellowing" of their vision. This is due to the shorter wavelengths of the visual light spectrum (violet and blue) being absorbed by the cataract and to the longer wavelengths (red and yellow) being transmitted through the retina. The paintings by famous artists who developed cataracts during their careers are excellent examples of the progressive loss of the color sense that accompanies maturing cataracts.

OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION**

NOVEMBER 6, 1984

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and mate- from receiving appropriations of tor must be elected according to the rials; (3) for an increase in the general revenue funds for the pur- above procedure to perform the Lieubonding capacity from 20% (% for The University of Texas System and 1/3 for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and

The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a 23 vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect. outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher education that is eligible to participate (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the purposes of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improvements, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of these counties would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to The proposed amendment will the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

> The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."

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
