
Shot to death were Mrs. Carmen Wright, 25, who was riding by the school in a car; Neal Pilon, 58, a gas company meter reader who was gunned down on the street; and school custodian Earl Metcalf, 62, who was shot inside the school.

Most of the wounded were firemen responding to a report of fire at the school. Hospital spokesmen indicated that eight were struck by bullets or frag-ments of bullets while three others were hit by flying bits of glass. One of them, Herbert Elmore, was reported in serious condition with a head wound.

School Principal Louis Nicol said the youth ranked eighth in his class scholastically and had "no discipline problem whatever." Nicol described Barbaro as "quiet, more of a loner than not," and "a real good shot" on the rifle team. Richard Krott, the school's

head custodian, said the shootings began about 3 p.m. in the school doing routine maintenance when a school secretary told him there was a fire on the third floor.

He said he and his men rushed to the floor and found the hallway was filled with smoke. He said that shots were fired and he and his

Volcano **Erupting**

WASHINGTON (AP) Kilauea volcano on the Island of Hawaii began erupting in spectacular fashion early today, the U.S. Geological Survey reported. Dr. Donald Peterson,

scientist in charge of the survey's Hawaiian volcano observatory, telephoned the survey's headquarters with Peterson said he and his

colleagues were awakened by a seismic alarm that was triggered by a rash of small earthquake tremors. At the same time, he said, the volcano, which had been swelling and inflating in recent weeks, deflated sharply and suddenly - a sign that lava was about to erupt.
The eruption began at

12:20 a.m. Hawaii time, 6:20 a.m. EST.

Peterson said the eruption began from a three-mile long fissure which partly rings the southern end of the crater of the volcano, at

about 3,500-feet elevation. There is no immediate danger to any people or cultivated land, the survey

reported. Peterson said the lava is moving southward into an uninhabited desert area on the south flank of Kilauea. The area is the Kau Desert of Hawaii National Park.

The eruption is located about 30 miles southwest of Hilo, the main city on the island.

Boost GI Insurance Dividends

WASHINGTON (AP) Veterans of World Wars I and II will get higher GI insurance dividends in 1975 and Korean conflict era veterans will receive dividends for the first time, the Veterans Administration

announced Monday.

Almost 4½ million veterans are affected. The payments will total \$335.6 million, which is \$31.8 million higher than last year and the eighth year in a row that the amount of the

dividend has climbed. The 130,000 World War veterans whose USGLI policies bear the letter "K" in front of their policy numbers will receive an average payment of \$169, compared with \$156 in 1974 and \$142 in 1973. The payments for these will total \$22 million, VA Administrator Richard E. Roudebush said.

The 3.72 million World War II veterans whose NSLI policies bear the letter "V" in front of their policy numbers will receive an average payment of \$83. compared with \$75 in 1974 and \$72 in 1973. Payments for these will total \$307.5 million, Roudebush said.

Dividends will be paid for the first time to 566,000 Korean conflict VSLI policyholders. The VA said they will get an average dividend of \$11. These payments will total \$6.1 They were million. authorized by Congress last,

There are no dividends for Vietnam era veterans, since the only governmentsponsored policies for them expired shortly after they got out of service unless they converted the policies to regular civilian ones.

Roudebush said the increased dividends for World War I and World War II veterans result chiefly from higher interest earnings on the funds.

The dividends are paid automatically on the anniversary date of the individual policies. Roudebush mailed Jan. 1.

\$850 Million Suit Filed

NEW YORK (AP) -Attorney F. Lee Bailey has filed an \$850 million lawsuit in behalf of the 85 passengers killed in the crash of a Trans World Airlines 727 Dec. 1 at

Upperville, Va. In the suit against TWA and the Boeing Co., makers of the plane, Bailey, himself a jet pilot, charged that the aircraft was equipped and operated dangerously.

The complaint said the plane lacked "an adequate ground proximity warning system" and the defendants failed to obey ground control instructions, failed to watch the altimeter and other in-9 struments and failed to train the crew properly.

The plane crashed into a mountain during a storm as it was approaching Washington's Dulles Airport. Bailey's suit in Manhattan Federal Court specifically represents Essie English of Denmark, S.C., mother of one of the victims, Annie Mozelle Killingsworth, 25, of

Columbus, Ohio. Bailey also asked that it be considered a class action, and seeks \$10 million for each of the victims.





In this day of changing lifestyles, adults, of necessity, must learn to cope with their financial, emotional and spiritual problems. The general feeling seems to be that they have made their bed — now lie in it — or find one that is more comfortable.

WHILE ADULTS are expected to cope, it is not fair to think that a child can make the changes as readily. We may yearn for simpler days, but they are gone forever, and it is difficult to have effective adult-child communication if big people ignore the fact that little ones have rights, too.

The late Dr. Haim Ginott, author of "Between Parent and Child," believed that parents and teachers should treat children as guests.

"WE WERE ALL brought up by parents and teachers to be sensitive and protective of guests' feeling," he said. "Not so with children's feelings; children are also guests in our homes and schools. There are only a few years in which we can really make an impact on their character and on their values.'

Dr. Ginott urged that adults, when communicating with children, convey caring, not rejection. Do not humiliate the child. Do not attack his character or offend his dignity. Protect him from your own anger or frustrations. Guard his self-esteem, self-worth and self-image.

IN OTHER WORDS, show the child you love at least as much courtesy as you do the stranger who comes to your door.

I'd like to share with young parents, those for whom it is not too late, "A Memorandum from your too.

DONT SPOIL me. I know quite well that I ought not to have all I ask for. I'm only testing you.

Don't be afraid to be firm with me. I prefer it; it lets me know where I

Don't use force with me. It teaches me that power is all that counts.

Don't be inconsistant. That confuses me and makes metry harder to get away with everything that I can. Don't make promises; you may not be able to keep them. That will

discourage my trust in you.

Don't fall for my provocations when I say and do things just to upset you. Then I'll try for more such "victories."

DON'T BE TOO upset when I say, "I hate you." I don't mean it, but I want you to feel sorry for what you have done to me.

Don't make me feel smaller than I am. I will make up for it by behaving like a "big shot.

Don't do things for me that I can do myself. It makes me feel like a baby, and I may continue to put you in my service.

Don't let my "bad habits" get me a lot of your attention. It only encourages me to continue.

DON'T CORRECT me in front of people. I'll take much more notice if you talk quietly with me in private. Don't make me feel that my

mistakes are sins. I have to learn to make mistakes without feeling that I am no good. Don't tax my honesty too much. I

am easily frightened into telling lies. Treat me the way you treat your friends, then I will be your friend,

In the Bible, and particularly the last book, the reference to the number seven is very numerous. But why seven? Why

not six or eight? Ther is no denying that the Scripture makes ample use of numeric symbolism. As you suggest, the most prominent is the number seven. Actually, in one way or another, it's referred to in nearly 600 passages in the Bible.

The meaning is that of totality, completeness or perfection. When a man was said to have had seven sons or daughters, or an action was reported as done seven times, the symbolism was obvious. I don't suppose in all cases it could be regarded as a sacred number, but among the Jews, its associations with sacred matters was kept alive by the institution of the Sabbath on the seventh day.

The significance of seven extends to its multiples. Fourteen is symbolic in some cases. Forty-nine or seven times seven occurs in two

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) What does a Nobel Prizewinning scientist do when he Rt. 2, Bx. 153, and a pole, wakes up the morning after with a hangover?

Olive oil and Vitamin C were among the folk remedies proposed for New Year's drinkers by several of the famed scientists in a poll Monday

"I never did find a cure," said Glenn Seaborg, former chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, Berkeley chemistry professor and winner of a Nobel Prize in 1951 for helping create heavy elements beyond uranium. But I hear taking a little olive oil before hand helps. And afterward, just lie down

until it goes away. Linus Pauling of Stanford University — winner of a Nobel Prize in 1954 for his TWO ANTIQUE Brunswick pool work with chemical bonds and the Nobel Peace Prize in 962 — suggested Vitamin C.

"Take about six grams as preventative before drinking," said Pauling, adding that more Vitamin C should be taken if a hangover

arrives anyway. And Pauling added this inal suggestion: "Put your drinking arm in sling the night before and


