## Maize Days Celebration Kicks Off Saturday

Friona's 28th annual Maize Days celebration will be held beginning Saturday, September 15, with the Maize Queen pageant at Friona High School Auditorium. Theme for the 1984 celebration is "Celebrate Texas."

Talent preliminaries for the "Miss Friona" pageant will begin at 2 p.m. Theme of the pageant is "The Yellow Rose of Texas." Pageant finals will begin at 7:30 p.m.

As of Friday, there was some question as to whether there would be a carnival for the 1984 celebration. The owner of the Great Southwest Shows has a serious health problem. Family members pledged to make an effort to get their shows to Friona, but there was a chance they might not make it.

The Little Miss Pageant will be held Tuesday, September 18, beginning at 7:30 p.m. at the High School Auditorium. The pageant is sponsored by the Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce.

Tickets for the Little Miss pageant, as well as the Maize Queen pageant will be available at the door. Tickets for the talent portion of the Queen's pageant are \$2 each, and \$3.50 for the finals. Little Miss prices are

\$3 for ninth grade age and up, and \$1 for eighth grade and below.

A photography show will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday, September 20-22 at 618 Main Street, sponsored by Modern Study Club. The club will also sponsor its annual Country Store at the building Friday and Saturday, with craft items, baked goods and other things for sale.

A mixed softball tournament will be held beginning Friday and continuing through Sunday at the softball park north of the Sonic Drive-In. The tourney is sponsored by the Friona Young Homemakers.

Saturday, September 22 is the big day in the schedule. A hot cakes and sausage breakfast is scheduled for 5:30-8:30 a.m. at the high school cafeteria.

The Dixon Six-Mile race will begin at 8 a.m., from the Anthony Corner to Highway 60.

The annual Maize Days parade will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday. Parade entries need to be in position at 9:30. Cash prizes and trophies will be presented at 1:30 p.m. at the City Park. Mike Hanes, Danny Kendrick and Rick Jennings are in charge of the parade.

Savage's Hickory Pit Barbecue of Hereford will cater the barbecue. Advance tickets are \$5 for adults and \$3 for children under 10. Tickets are also available at the head of the line. Tables and chairs are to be provided for the diners this year.

A horseshoe pitching contest will be held on the north side of the City Park beginning at 2:30 p.m., sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

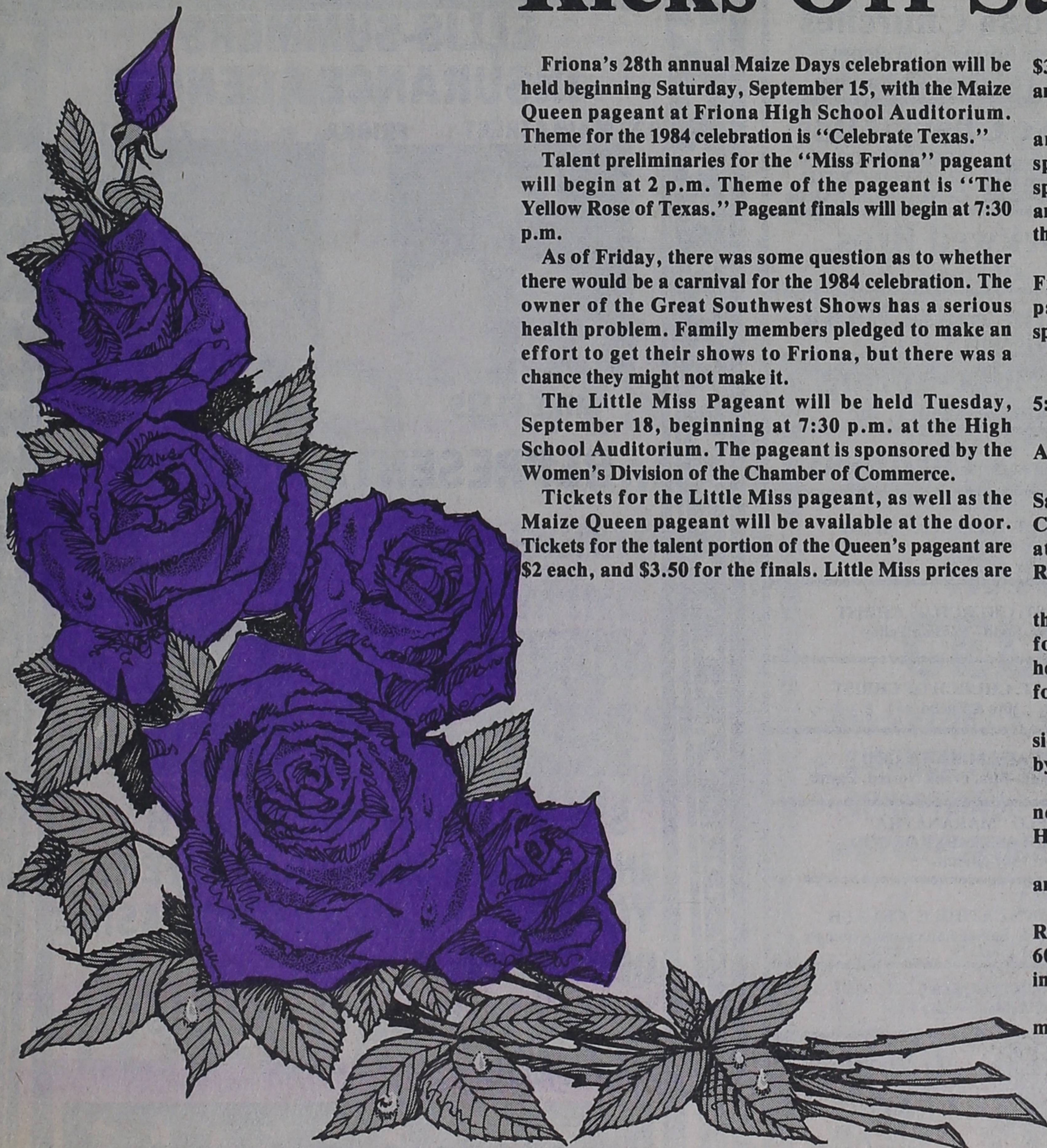
The children's pet show will get underway at 3 p.m. next to Gib's Cleaners, sponsored by the Friona Humane Society. All types of animals are eligible.

**50 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 14, 1934**  
The first bale of cotton for this section was brought to the Friona Gin Monday afternoon by Fred F. Bell, who lives east of Homeland, and the usual bonus for the first bale was subscribed to be given to Mr. Bell for his distinction as being the first of the season to bring in one bale of cotton.

**45 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 15, 1939**  
Marriage vows were exchanged by Miss Grace Miller and Bruce Parr Saturday afternoon, September 9 at 2 p.m. in the double ring ceremony in the home of the bride's brother, Mr. and Mrs. Claude Miller of the Lakeview Community.

According to a statement made by Miss Margaret St. Clair, the Parmer County Home Demonstration Clubs and girls' 4-H Clubs of the county will have exhibits at three regional fairs and also at the State Fair in Dallas.

**40 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 15, 1944**  
Luther Frank Loveless, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Loveless of Friona, has been graduated from the Fifty-Second Officer Candidate Class, Marine Corps

Schools here and commissioned a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps Reserve.  
The bountiful rains and occasional showers that have visited the Friona country during the past three weeks, have been of almost inestimable benefits to the farmers and their growing crops.

**30 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 17, 1954**  
Over 2,000 people attended the free barbecue and parade during the Parmer County Fair held this year for the first time at the beginning of the week rather than the weekend.

The first bale of cotton delivered locally this season arrived Saturday. The cotton was delivered to the Mills & Fleming Gin, and was grown by J.C. Redwine, who farms south of Hub. His yield has been guessed from 1 1/2 to 2 bales per acre.

Darla Bingham, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dean Bingham of Friona, was crowned the 1959 Maize Days Queen Thursday night following the annual Queen Contest to get the celebration underway last weekend.

# Grandchild Of Resident Is Killed

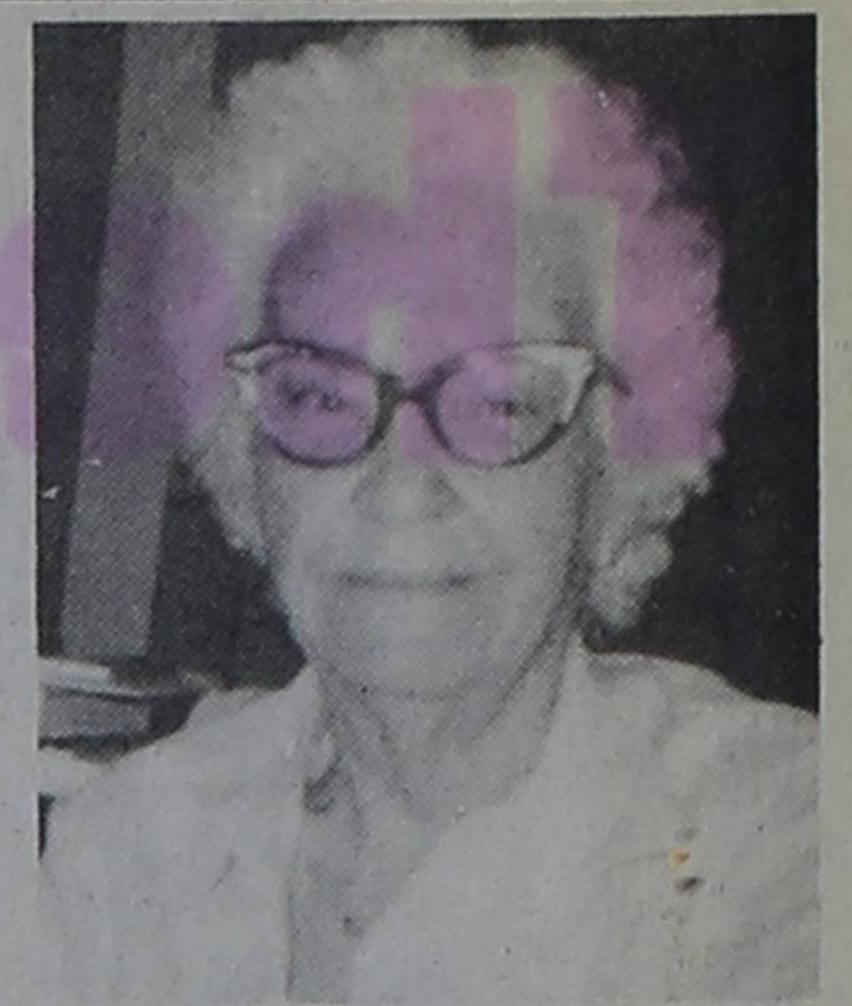

# ‘Have Faith & Work Hard’ Is Centenarian’s Advice

On a farm near Grapevine, Texas, September 23, 1884, James Hatcher, a native of Kentucky and his wife, Martha Evans Hatcher, who was born in Tennessee, became parents of a baby girl. She was named Ella Mae and was the middle child in the Hatcher family. They had three older children and three younger ones.

Even though she was named Ella Mae at birth, Mrs. Wilkerson says, ‘I’ve always been called ‘Dovie.’ This was a nickname one of my grandfathers gave me and I’ve gone by it all my life.’

The Hatchers, who were farm people, moved from Denton County to an Indian lease twelve miles from Davis Town, Indian

Territory, when Dovie was about three years old.

As a child Dovie learned to piece and quilt quilts, crochet, knit and embroider.

She says, ‘I must have learned to knit because it was necessary. I well remember assisting my mother and sisters in knitting stockings for the family after Mother had spun cotton into thread.’

‘Then, when the stockings were finished,’ she went on to say, ‘Mother dyed all of them black. She thought it was very disgraceful to wear stockings that were any color except black.’

The Hatcher family moved to a farm near Tipton, Oklahoma and in the early spring of 1914 Dovie

was married to W.C. Wilkerson, who was also a farmer. After farming in the Tipton Valley several years, the couple moved to the Hub Community.

Their first farm was located one mile west of the original location of The Syndicate Hotel, which was constructed in 1925 and opened for business the following year by the Capitol Freehold Land and Investment Company, Limited. It was built to accommodate prospective land buyers when the larger ranches were being divided into smaller tracts and sold to farmers.

Mrs. Wilkerson remembers, ‘Soon after we moved here we saw that we would have to do something besides farm to make ends meet. One day I was visiting with Judge J.D. Hamlin, who was the overseer of the Syndicate interests and he remarked that they would soon be looking for a manager for the hotel.’

‘Right then I told him I’d like to have the job. He said several had already applied, so I thought I probably wouldn’t get it. Later I came into town for supplies and ran into one of the salesmen, who told me he thought I would get the job.’

‘I still hadn’t heard anything from Judge Hamlin, so was surprised when Sam Lawrence came down to our house late one afternoon and asked me if I could come down and help cook supper for twenty land prospects.’

‘Mrs. Lawrence and I cooked supper by coal oil lamps as the Delco system, which had been installed, wouldn’t work. Soon after that my husband and two sons, Clarence and Billy, moved in.’

‘That was our home for the next several years.’

When prospective buyers were brought to Farmer County, they stayed two nights at the Syndicate Hotel and were given five free meals.

Mrs. Wilkerson says, ‘It wasn’t

unusual for us to feed 100 or more men at one time and wasn’t a real big job. Sometimes we would cook a whole quarter of beef at one time and we always had lots of canned vegetables and fruits. We raised our own back at that time. We served fresh vegetables when they were in season and canned the surplus.’

The Wilkersons lived in the Hub Community several years before selling their farm interests and moving to the Rio Grande Valley. Following her husband’s death, Mrs. Wilkerson lived several different places before returning to Friona to make her home in the 1960s.

About eighteen months ago she moved to Amarillo, where she makes her home with a nephew, Chester Hatcher, and his wife. One of her sons, Billy, is deceased. The other, Clarence, lives in Oklahoma City.

She also has two grandchildren, four great-grandchildren and three great-great-grandchildren.

She’s a long time member of the United Pentecostal Church and will be honored at the local church Sunday, September 23, with a reception marking her 100th birthday.

A special guest at the reception will be Ida Adams of 1301 North Main, Friona, who is Dovie’s sister. They are the only two members of the Hatcher family who are living.

Mrs. Wilkerson is still able to be up and around and take care of her personal needs. Her eyesight has failed to the point that she’s no longer able to do handwork, but she enjoys visiting friends and relatives and feels that she has been privileged to live in one of the most interesting periods of time in the history of man.

When asked about her philosophy of life, she replied, ‘If you want to live a long and useful life, have faith in God and work hard.’

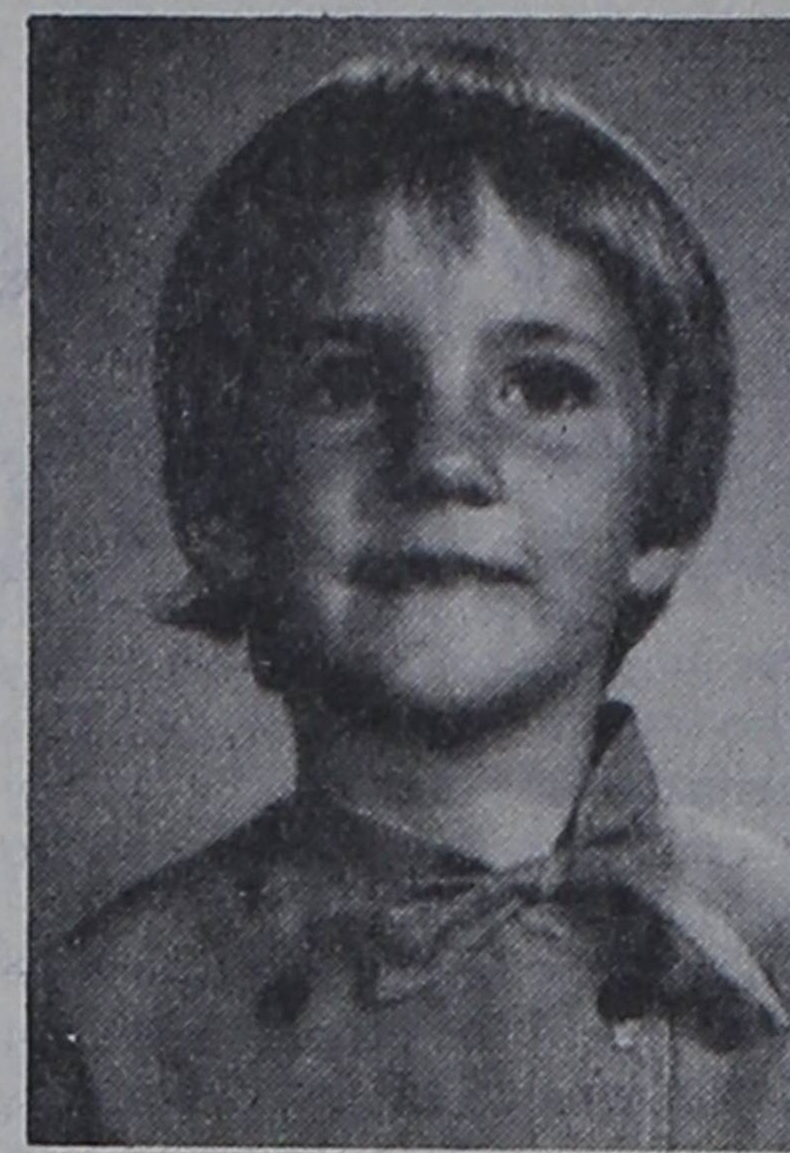

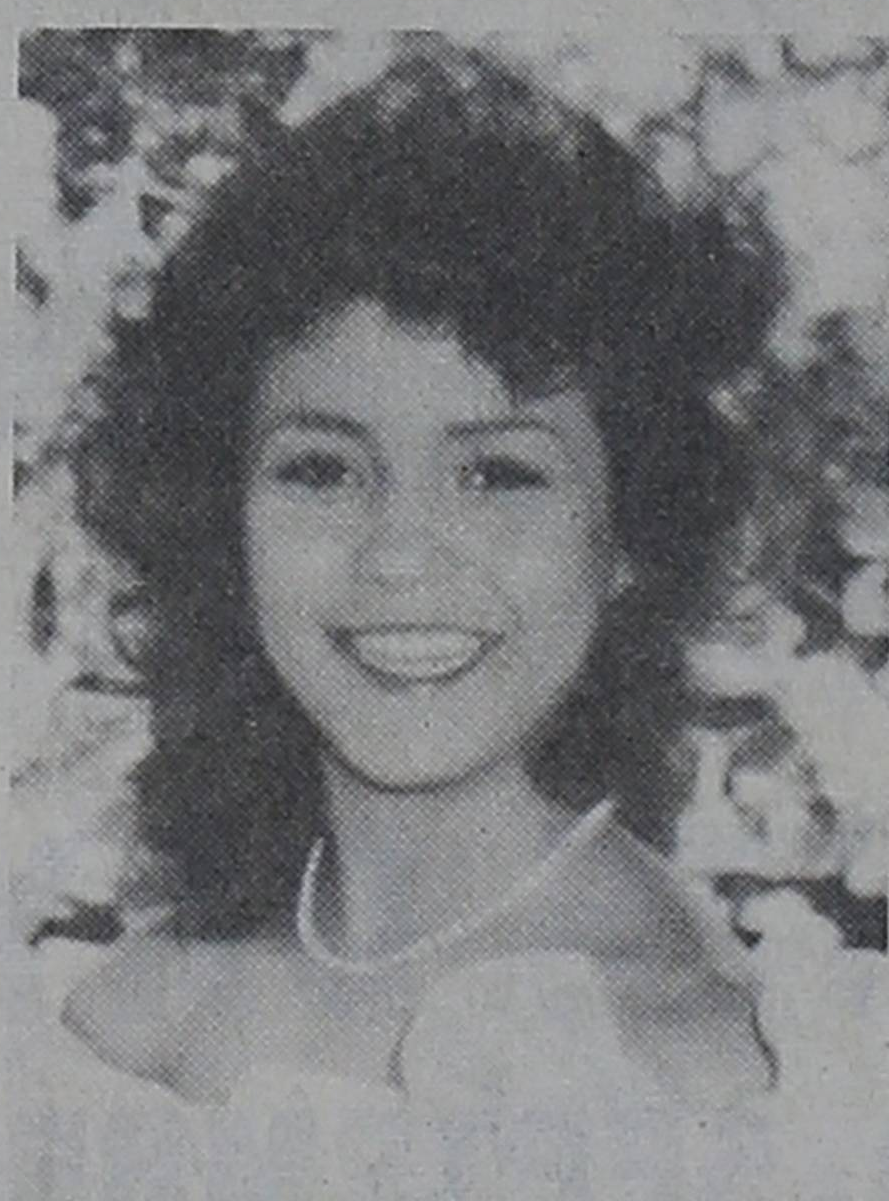

# Five Frionans Report On Memorable European Tour

The month of July, 1984 is one that will probably never be forgotten by five Friona residents. On the second day of the month Dianne Morgan began her fourth Grand Tour as a courier for the American Institute For Foreign Studies of Greenwich, Connecticut.

This year she was accompanied by her son, Charlie, and Wade Davenport, both 1984 graduates of Friona High School, and Shannel Woodard and Stephanie Miller, who had just completed their junior years and are presently FHS seniors.

The Frionans met groups from Lubbock and Monahans before departing from the Lubbock Airport for Athens, Greece via Dallas-Fort Worth and New York City. A frightening experience for Shannel was the result of overbooking. When she arrived at

the seat assigned to her, Stephanie was sitting in the next seat, which had been assigned to her and another passenger was sitting in the one Shannel expected to occupy and she was advised that she would have to get off the plane.

After Dianne was summoned to the scene and a great deal of explaining was done, Shannel was allowed to stay on the plane.

Their first day in Athens, which was on a Tuesday, was a free day for relaxation and individual activities.

The following morning they climbed to the rocky summit of the Acropolis for a spectacular view of Athens and saw the Parthenon and the historic remains of other temples of the Greek gods.

The group also visited the National Archaeological Museum in the center of the city and viewed unrivaled collections of prehistoric

and classical art, ceramics, sculpture, miniatures, coins and jewelry.

On Friday, they went to Piraeus where they boarded the fabulous cruise ship, the City of Rhodes, for a trip to the City of Rhodes by way of the island of Mykonos. They toured the Island of Rhodes, which is located off the coast of Turkey and the Acropolis of Lindos.

Enroute back to Piraeus they toured two islands, Crete and Santorinia, both in the Mediterranean Sea.

On Monday, July 9, they drove to Delphi to visit the beautiful sanctuary of Apollo and continued to Patras, where they boarded an overnight ferry to Italy. After arriving in Brindisi early Tuesday morning they drove to Sorrento in the beautiful bay of Naples for dinner and the night by way of Paestum.

Enroute to Rome the following day they visited Pompeii, the excavated Roman town buried by volcanic ash from nearby Mt. Vesuvius 2000 years ago. They toured ruins of the Colosseum and the Forum and had a guided tour through the extensive Vatican Museum culminating in a visit to the incredible Sistine Chapel with its paintings by Michelangelo.

A sightseeing bus took the group to Florence on Saturday. Sunday morning they drove up to Michelangelo Square and viewed the roof tops and domes of Florence below them. Later they saw the world famous Cathedral, the Baptistry doors and picturesque Santa Croce Square, the Accademia and Pitti Palace.

On their way from Florence to Pisa, where they visited the Leaning Tower, they drove over the Alps to Leysin, Switzerland. The following morning a bus took the group through scenic Vaudois Alps to les Diablerets, where they transferred to a cable car for a

spectacular ride to the Diablerets Glacier where year-round skiing is available.

Since the afternoon was free, the Frionans had a lot of fun skiing.

From Leysin, they drove to Geneva for a brief visit then continued to Paris for dinner and an overnight stay.

Some of the most interesting things they saw in Paris were Montmartre, Champs Elysees, the Arc de Triomphe and the Eiffel Tower. They also saw Napoleon's Tomb, the Louvre Museum and Notre Dame Cathedral.

After a free morning in Paris, the group drove to Versailles and visited the majestic Palace of Versailles, built for King Louis

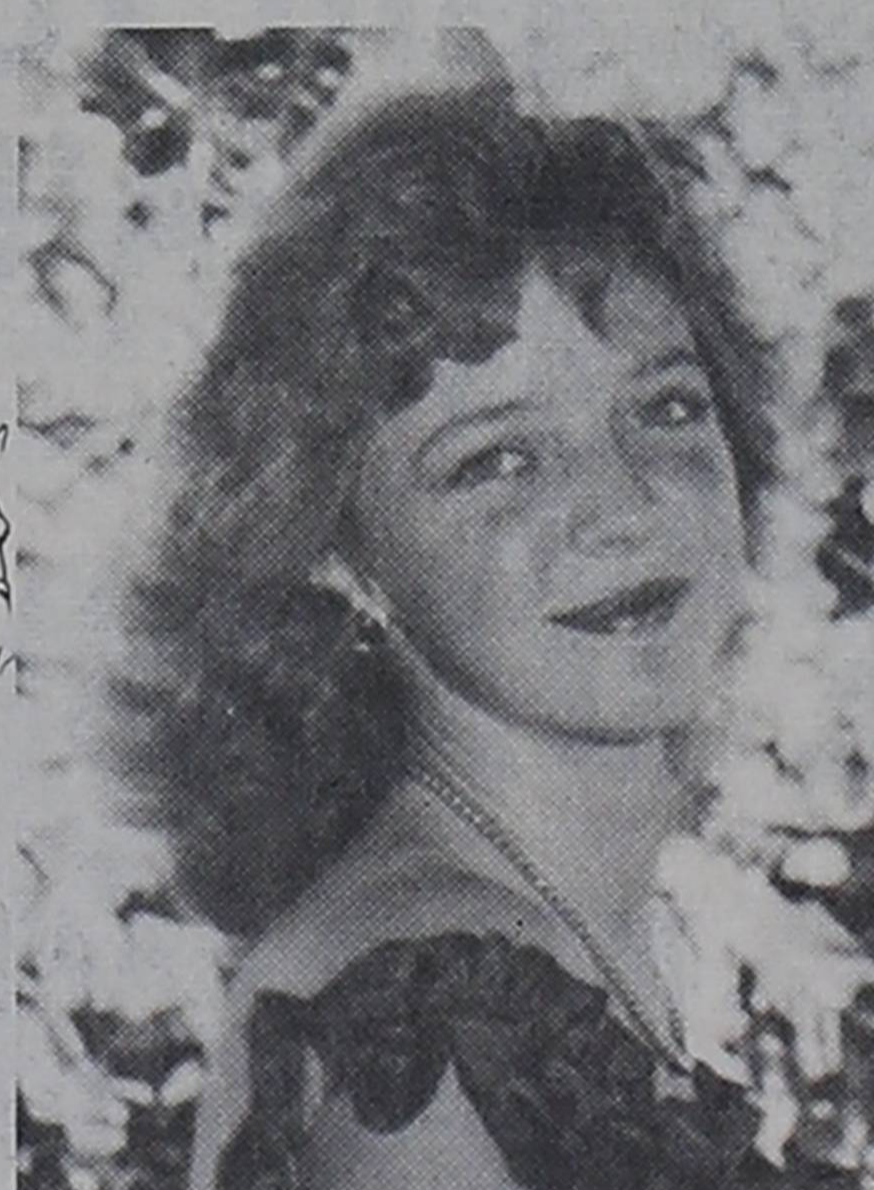
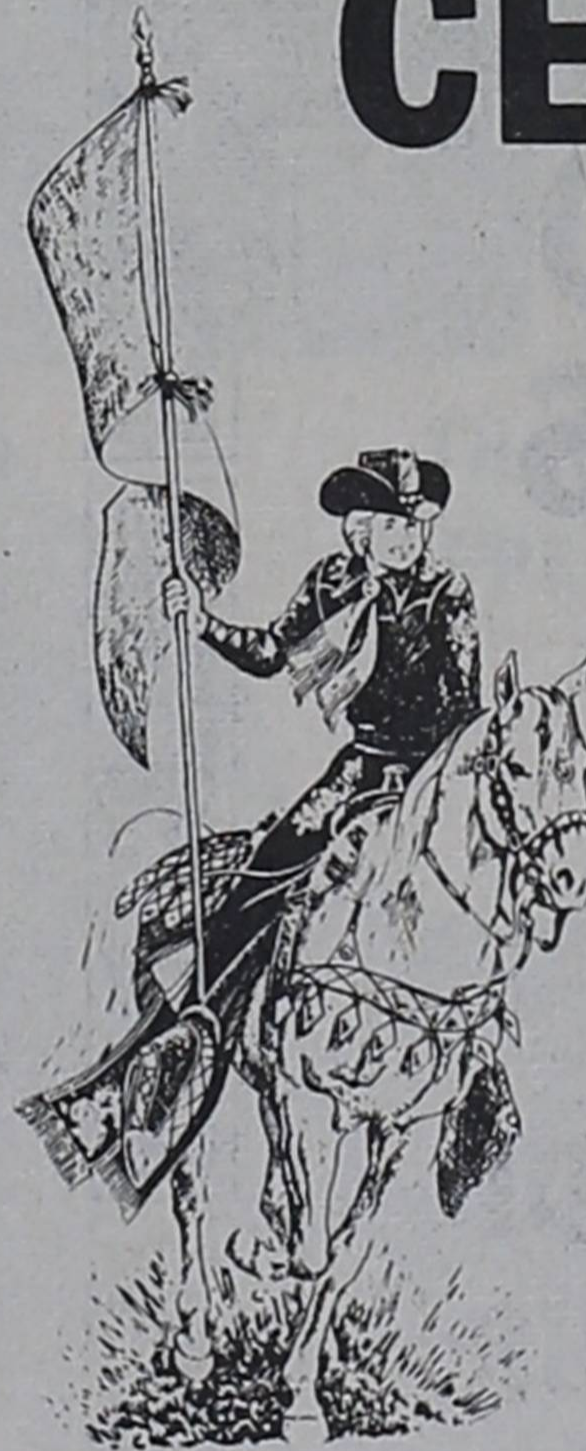

# Jim Mears Recalls How Area Looked In 1919

 (Editor's note: For the better part of 20 years, Jim Mears has prided himself in being the first customer each press day for the Friona Star. Without fail, he is the first person to come to the Star office, being a regular "back door" customer, looking for the paper. If he misses us at the office, then he heads to the nearest newsstand.  
 It is our pleasure to print a story that we not only know the main character will appreciate, but with the confidence that he most likely will also be the FIRST person in the community to see the article.)

James Henderson Mears was born in the hills of Tennessee on June 18, 1899. His parents were James Henderson and Mary Ann Petty Mears.

He was born in Woodbury, which is in central Tennessee, southeast of Nashville, also near Murfreesboro. He says that not only was the country rugged where he was born, but so were its residents.

"They made a lot of moonshine whiskey over there, and someone was always getting drunk, and killing someone else. When I got back from World War I, I decided there must be something better someplace, so I headed out to Texas," Mears says.

Mears was drafted into the Army toward the last of World War I. He was in training at Clemson College, North Carolina. However, 82 days after joining up with the Army, the war ended, and the Armistice was signed.

He was discharged on December 10, 1918. Mears points out that congress later passed a law that you had to have served at least 90 days in the service to be eligible for a military pension, so he missed this opportunity by just eight days.

Mears was one of eight children in his immediate family, and also was the youngest. He had a sister that was the oldest in the family, and also had six brothers, all older than himself. All of his brothers and the sister are now deceased.

Jim says he learned to hunt at an early age, since there was a lot of game in the area where he grew up. His father grew corn and some feed for the cattle, and the family always had a big garden.

Mears was the only member of his immediate family to leave Tennessee.

"I had always heard of the west, and had a desire to see what was out there," the longtime Parmer County resident says.

So, in 1919 he took off for Texas, and ended up at Abernathy, where he found work for Elbert Overton on the EO Ranch.

Overton was just about to start to move his operations to Parmer County, where he had found an abundance of grass on which he could graze his cattle and sheep. Overton had a herd of cattle that were not quite ready to sell, so while the first moving operation was made, Mears was left in charge of the cattle.

"I stayed with Godfrey Acreson, an older bachelor, who lived northwest of Abernathy," Mears recalls.

After the cattle were sold, Mears was asked to complete the moving operation, bringing a wagon loaded with things Overton had not been able to take when he moved. The place Overton had purchased was near Black, and had a big two-story house with a shed for livestock nearby.

On the move from Abernathy to Black, Mears also had to move a flock of about 2,000 sheep, as well as some horses. He recalled that he rode his saddlehorse, and a companion, Dan Aragon, drove the loaded wagon. It was Jim's job to take care of the sheep.

Upon arriving in Parmer County, Mears recalls that it had rained, and they couldn't get their flock of sheep across Frio Draw. For a couple of days, Mears had to swim his horse across the draw and get food for himself and Aragon. Mrs. Overton would prepare food, and he would return with it across the draw.

The water finally went down to the point that the sheep were able to cross.

Mears lived with the Overtons while he was in their employ. Later on, Overton bought a large ranch over in New Mexico, and moved his belongings over there. Mears decided to stay here.

John Ira and Pearl Hand had moved their family to Parmer County from Oklahoma in 1925. Their oldest daughter was named

Opal Faye. She and Jim were married on May 6, 1927. They bought a half-section of land on the west side of the Lakeview Community in 1934.

Jim and Opal were parents of two sons: James C. and Sam Mears. Both attended grade school at the rural Lakeview School, and later graduated at Friona High School. Mrs. Mears died in 1951. Jim continues to live on the home place southeast of Friona.

J.C. Mears, the oldest son, served in the Navy, and after his discharge married Margaret Page. They were parents of a son and daughter: James Glenn and Janice Lynn. James Glenn married Sondra McCullum, and they have two children: James Nicholas, five and Heath, two.

Janice is also married to Roger Hasty, and has a daughter, named Christie Lynn, two years old. Sam served in the Air Force

after getting out of high school. He married Donna Miller, and they are parents of two children: a son, Clint and a daughter, Sarah. Both Clint and Sarah are graduates of West Texas State University.

Clint has his master's degree in business administration and is living in Canyon.

Sarah is married to Randy Gerles, a Farwell native, and the couple lives in Canyon. Randy is a city patrolman for the City of Canyon, and Sarah is employed by the Randall County unit, Department of Public Safety.

Mears tells about another time when the Frio Draw had flooded, probably around 1941. A fellow and his wife who lived close to him were expecting a baby. The man started to Friona to get the doctor, but could get only as far as the Elmer Euler residence, which is on

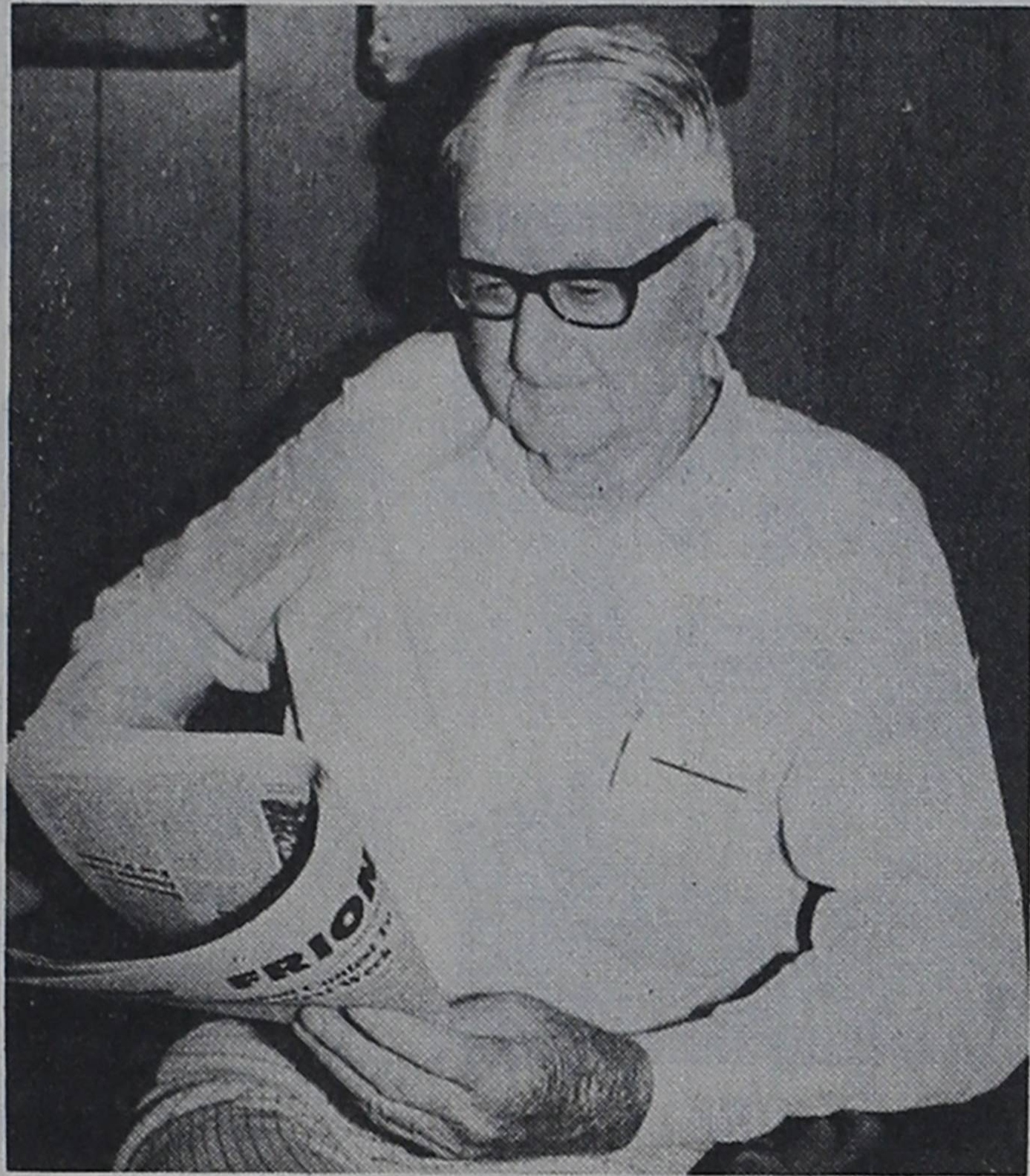

the south side of the draw. Euler saddled his paint horse, Mears recalls, swam it across the draw and roused the doctor. Then he had the doctor climb on behind him on the horse, and back across the draw they came. "The doctor was holding his black bag up out of the water and hanging onto Elmer, yelling, 'Don't let me fall off,'" Mears recalled with a chuckle.

Safely back at the Euler residence, the expectant father was able to take the doctor back to his home in his car, and the baby was delivered.

Mears says that of the early-day residents of Friona, he believes only Clyde Goodwine and Bob Spohn have lived here longer than he has, and these two men are about his same age.

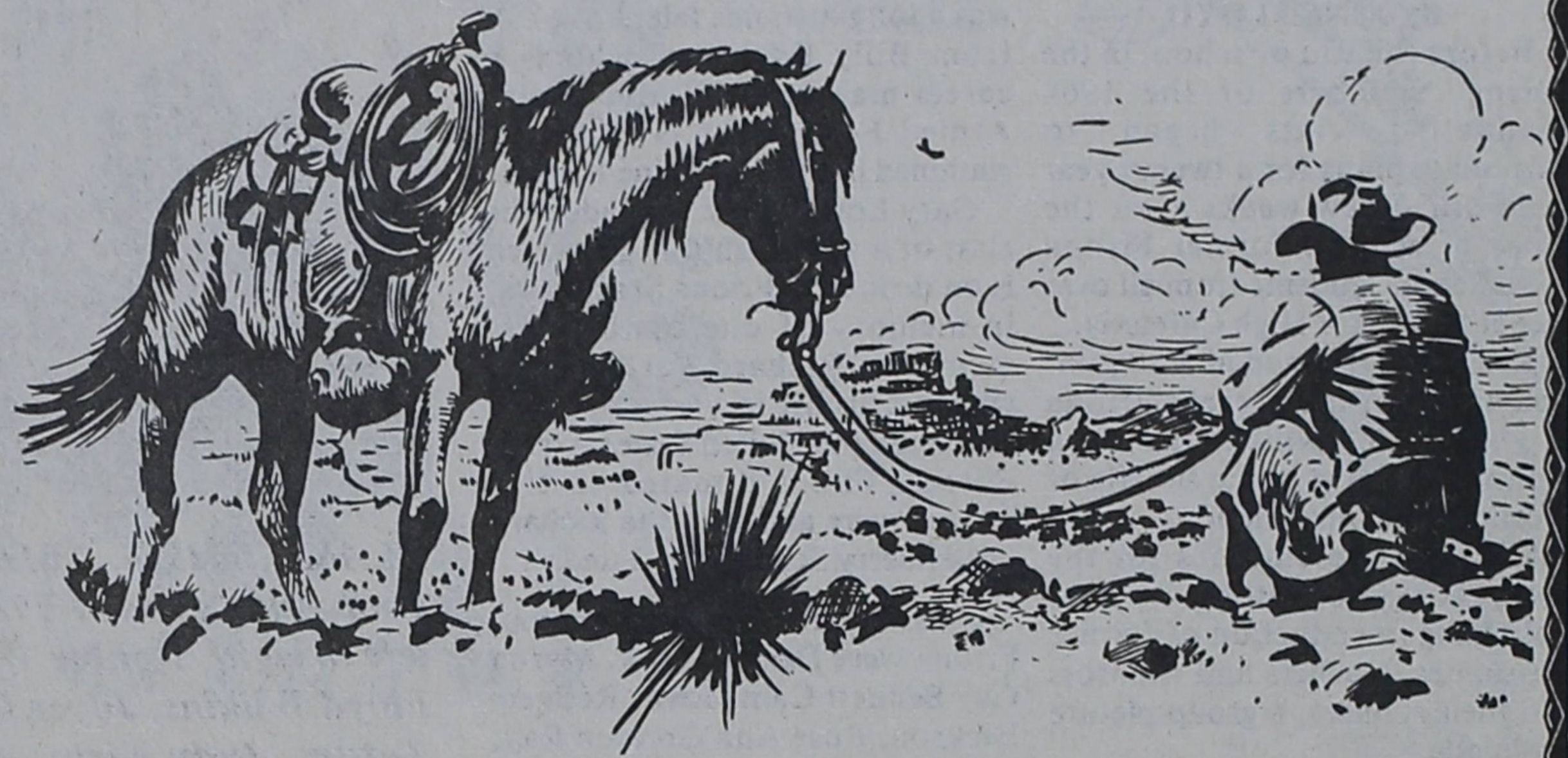
He also recalls George Maurer, an early-day Friona businessman. Maurer's son Carl was later a local businessman, also. "George was a real fine man. He had an elevator down where the Wheat Growers are located now. His competitor was John Gischler, and darned if their children (Carl and Luella) didn't get married," Mears recalls. When Jim and his wife Opal

were married, the Great Depression was raging. He recalls the struggle they had, during the drought and depression years, when they sold eggs for ten cents a dozen, and cream for a similar price. He recalls selling a 600-pound sow for six dollars, and what little wheat he could raise for 16 cents a bushel. Tragedy struck the family in 1951 when Mrs. Mears took ill and died. Jim continued to raise his two boys until they were grown and gone from home. Is he glad he decided to come to Texas 65 years ago? "You bet," Mears says.

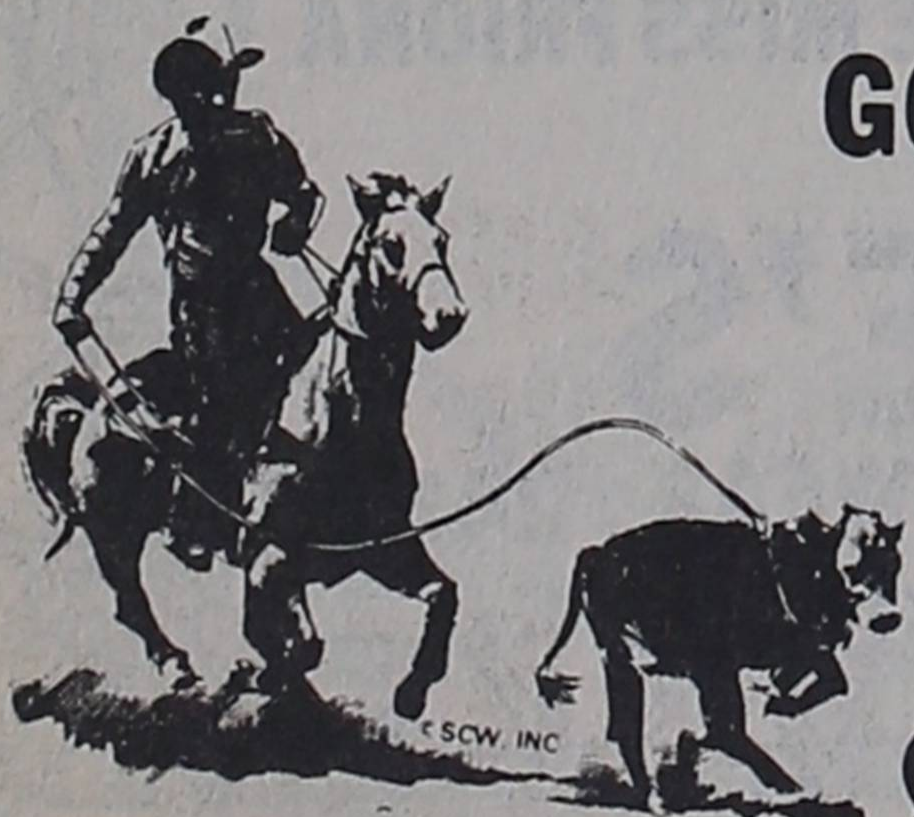

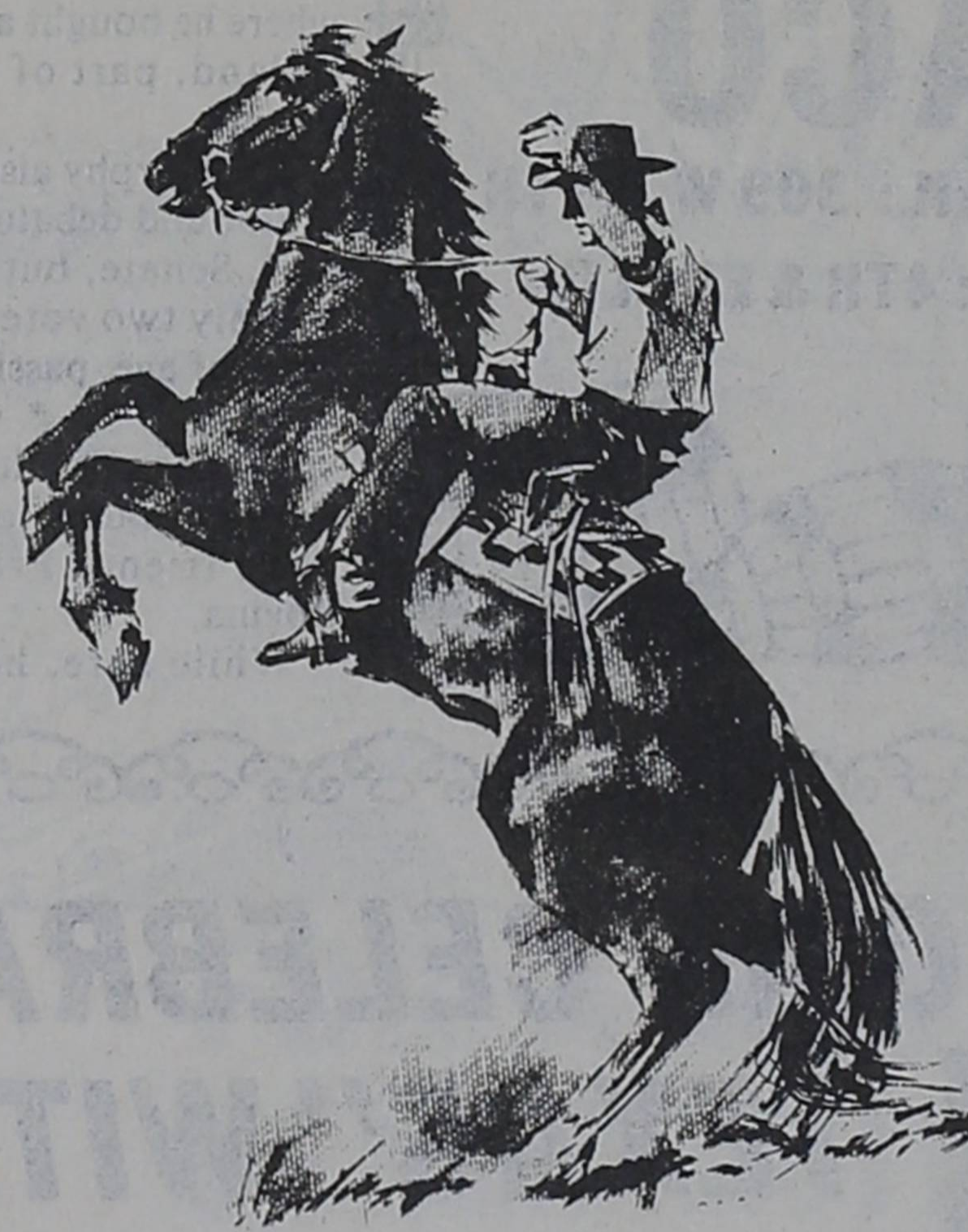

**Elders' Grandfather First Saw Parmer County In 1870s**



T.B. ELDER... Thomas Beecher Elder, the father of B.O. and Marshall Elder, first came to Parmer County in 1902, as a cowboy at the Star Ranch near Lazbuddie.

If your ancestors were in Parmer County during the first decade of this century, most people consider you are from pioneer stock.

What if your ancestors had been in Parmer County in the 1870s? That's the bragging rights which belong to the Elder boys of Friona-B.O. and Marshall, and to Otis' daughter and grandchildren (Laquita Dodson and daughters).

The Elders' grandfather, Joe Murphy, was in this area for seven years in the 1870s, hunting buffaloes for a living. Murphy spent his time here hunting the native bison. The animals were killed for their hides, which were shipped from here to Abilene, Texas.

"The hunters were paid \$2 per hide. I imagine that was good money in those days," says B.O. Elder, who has inherited a lot of his grandfather's hunting interests.

Joe Murphy was born in Parker County, Texas, on October 7, 1852. From the time he was 21, until he was 28, which would have been roughly 1873-1880, he spent a considerable amount of time in this part of the Plains, on the buffalo detail.

Murphy married Vina Campbell, who was born in Kentucky. They had five daughters and two sons. One of the daughters was May Murphy, who was to marry Thomas B. Elder.

Murphy was raised at Azle, near Weatherford, in Parker County. He told his children and grandchildren stories about how the Indians used to make raids and steal the white settlers' horses when he was a child growing up.

Parker County was an area where the Indians had regular trails. It is named for the great Comanche Chief, Quanah Parker.

B.O. Elder says he has one of his grandfather's old guns, a Colt .45 pistol, which was made in the 1860s, and was used by his ancestor in hunting buffalo.

After he married, Joe Murphy moved to Wise County, Texas, where he bought around 1100 acres of land, part of a Spanish Land Grant.

Joe Murphy also became a noted orator and debator. He ran for the U.S. Senate, but lost the election by only two votes. He lived to 90 years of age, passing away in 1942.

Thomas Beecher Elder came to Parmer County in 1902, to visit his good friend, Frank Hastings at Bovina.

While here, he got a job as a

cowboy on the Star Ranch near Lazbuddie. His boss was a Mr. Laird. He was about 19 or 20 years old at the time, and he told his children he was initiated by having to ride "Old Roan," a horse that had never been ridden.

There were wild mustang ponies, antelopes, coyotes and a few lobo wolves in the country at this time.

As a cowboy on the Star Ranch, T.B. Elder was paid \$30 per month, plus room and board, and had to furnish his own horse. Before you go to feeling too sorry about the wages, it is pointed out that early in this century, wages of a dollar a day were considered an excellent job--plus he received room and board, even if the room was a dugout.

T.B. Elder lived in a dugout north of Lazbuddie. He had a sweetheart, May Murphy, who was living near Decatur in Wise County. He returned to Wise

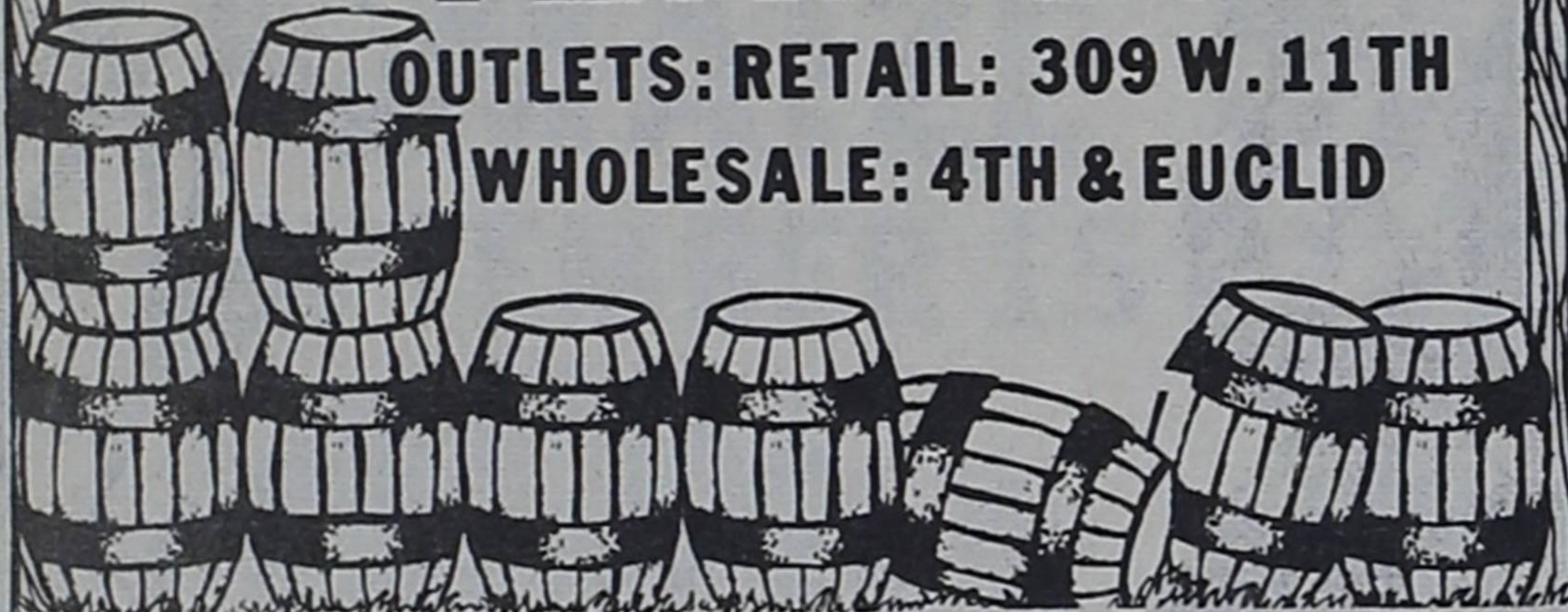

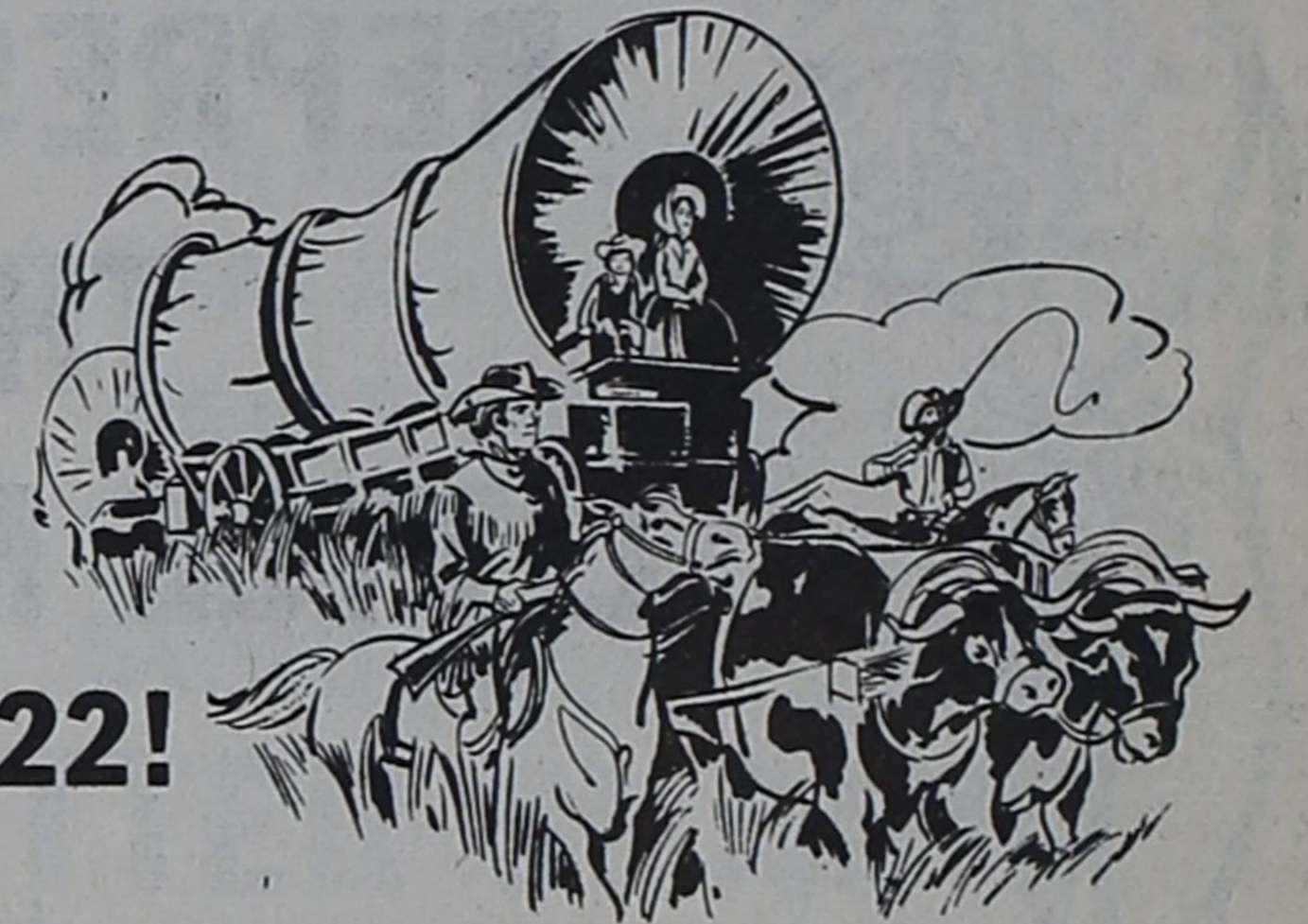

County in 1904 and the couple was married on July 10.

T. B. Elder told of a time when he was working for the Star Ranch when he had to ride his cow pony, Old Snip, up the Running Water Draw to Bovina to get the mail. He was probably looking for a letter from May, with whom he corresponded.

On his trip back, a sudden snowstorm hit, and he became lost. He hung his bridle reins over the saddle horn and "Snip" took him to the ranch. He was almost frozen. He said he was offered 80 acres of land at one time for his horse and saddle, but didn't trade.

The Elders moved to Lamb County, at Spade, in 1925. They often visited the old ranch near Lazbuddie.

T. B. and May Elder had two sons, Marshall and B.O., and two daughters, Gladys Hartsell and

Marie Mann.

In 1929, B.O. Elder married Maudie McFarlen at Spade.

Times were tough in the 1930s. B.O. Elder had a job teaching school at Spade from 1930 to 1937. "Some years, I made only \$60 a month, but was glad to get it," Elder said.

B.O. and Marshall Elder bought land in Parmer County in 1956 and 1957, just east of Hub.

In addition to farming, B.O. Elder has raised and trained registered hunting dogs. He has a room-full of trophies he has won with his dogs.

B.O. Elder and his wife Maudie were parents of a daughter, Laquita, who is married to Connie Dodson. They have four daughters, Shae, Sheri, Stacie and Sunny.

Elder's first wife Maudie died in 1965. In 1968 he married Annie

Cargile, a widow who was living in the Lazbuddie community. Her first husband, Dan Cargile, died in 1966.

Annie has two daughters: Danny Rue Menefee of Fort Towson, Oklahoma, and Marlene McDonald of Lazbuddie, and a son Preston Cargile.

Marshall Elder married Mary Kennedy. They live in Friona and have no children. In addition to farming, Marshall has served as a salesman for Reeve Chevrolet, and spent a time as salesman for Parmer County Implement Company.

For the last several years, he has been in the real estate business.

Marshall and his wife spend a lot of time in Ruidoso, New Mexico in their trailer. They have just recently purchased the former home of Kenneth and Lawanda Moore, at 1601 West Tenth Street

in Friona, and have moved there.

In 1948, B.O. Elder went into the coon hound business and it soon became big business. While he was selling dogs, he shipped hounds to every state in the union except Utah, as well as to Mexico, England and Belize, Central America.

In one calendar year, he sold over 5,000 dogs. He was offered a new Chevrolet pickup for a particular female dog, but turned down the offer.

Otis says the most dogs he ever owned at a given time was 167, and most 'coons he ever caught alive at one time was 20 near Marietta, Texas in 1951. He said he had sold 406 live raccoons to the Coon

Hunters Assn. for purposes of restocking.

One of his coon dogs holds the U.S. Coon Hunters' Assn. record for getting a 'coon out of a swinging keg, in 1.3 seconds. The record was set in 1964, and still stands.

He has won 317 trophies with his hounds in competition. Recently, a pup that he raised won the top prizes in a field of 517 dogs in a competition at Gillette, Texas.

Elder still has 14 wolf-hounds, all registered. "I'm 76 years old, and I still hunt a couple of nights a week," the outdoorsman says.

The Elders have a brick home at Lake Texhoma. They had 306 lots in that area to begin with, but since have sold 250 of them. He hauls

his hounds back and forth, from Lake Texhoma to Friona.

"I like to turn the dogs loose, and sit out on my porch. I can turn my hearing aid up, and listen to them go for miles," Elder says.

Elder's wife, Annie, enjoys hunting and fishing, also. He says that a few summers ago he and Annie were south of Hub on Running Water Draw, listening to their dogs chase a coyote. "Tears came to my eyes, as I could imagine my Dad coming up the draw on Old Snip, so many years ago," Elder says.

A hundred and ten years after his ancestor stalked the buffaloes in this area, Joe Murphy's grandson still enjoys the thrill of a hunt.

# Harry Hamilton Recalls Early Days In Friona

Harry Hamilton came to Friona and Parmer County in January, 1926. His father, H.P. Hamilton, Sr., and mother, along with five children, moved here from Rockwall County and lived on the farm one and one-half miles east of Hub on the north side of the highway.

This farm at that time belonged to the Syndicate, or the Capitol Reservation Land Company. The elder Hamilton had bought 320 acres of land from the Syndicate and they rented him part of this farm so they would have a place to live.

The 320 acres Hamilton bought is now the south half of the Eugene Boggess home place. Hamilton, along with some others, due to circumstances beyond their control, lost their farms in 1928. Mrs. Hamilton inherited a small farm in Rockwall County about this time, so the family moved back to Rockwall County in

February, 1929.

While living here, Harry drove a school bus for Mr. F.W. Reeve, who owned the buses, and attended Friona High School in 1927-28, and 1928-29. He lettered in football in 1928 and made the basketball team, but had a severe attack of appendicitis and the doctor said, "no more basketball."

"There was one football game in particular that we played in 1928 and won 13-8, and as far as I know, no other high school was able to do that. That was the game with the West Texas State Teachers College Calves, as they were known then. Some of those who were on the team were Granville McFarland, Glenn Reeve, Sr., Frank Truitt and myself," Hamilton said.

Hamilton said he did not like living in Central Texas and longed to return to the High Plains.

He married Inez Roberson of

Forney, Texas, in January, 1933. They have three children, Tommie of Friona, John of Garden City, Kansas, and Helen Bagwell of Portales, New Mexico.

"Inez and I had been married eleven years when we decided to try our fortunes on the plains of West Texas. A friend of ours, P.E. Roddy, rented us a farm at Spade, east of Littlefield in Lamb County, that we moved to in December 1943. We stayed in Lamb County through the remainder of the war years and until January 1953 when we moved to the Menefee farm south of Friona. We have farmed in the vicinity of Friona since that time," Hamilton said.

Certainly there have been many changes in and around Friona since 1926, and the next fifty hold a lot more.

In 1926, there were many thousands of acres of land broken out for farming that had been in ranch land previously and 1926

was a fairly good crop year.

"We had 200 acres of corn that year and were hand pulling corn on Thanksgiving Day when a sand storm came out of the west that is still remembered by many. By 10:00 a.m., tumble weeds were going by over the corn and several windmills were blown down. Needless to say, but the corn was down too. The storm lasted about all day and the sand obscured the sun," Hamilton recalls.

The first part of 1927, or until about June 15, was bone dry with several windy days that the sun was completely obscured until late in the afternoon.

"I also knew people with new homes that carried the dirt out of the house by the bucketfull after some of the worst storms. Those days at meal time the table was set with the plates upside down until you were ready to eat, otherwise, they would be sandy," the longtime resident said.

The Hamiltons have seven grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

# Local Women Visit Jamaica

Early in August of this year Jere Smith and Erma Brown took time off from their jobs at Hi-Pro Feeds and Sis-Son's for a five day trip to the Island of Jamaica, which is one of the West Indies group.

It is located in the Caribbean Sea

about 90 miles south of Cuba and its tall green mountains, soft ocean breezes and brightly colored flowers make it a tropical paradise. Its area is 4,232 square miles--an area slightly smaller than the State of Connecticut and has 325 miles of coastline. Its length is 148 miles

and the width--at the widest point--is 52 miles.

Average rainfall for the island is between 75 and 100 inches annually with May and October generally being the wettest months.

The name Jamaica is a derivative of an Indian word, Xaymaca, which means "island of springs." The island's east-west mountain range rises to the cloud-capped Blue Mountains in the east, where its highest point, Blue Mountain Peak, towers 7,402 feet above sea level. Lowlands stretch across the western end of the island, and a narrow strip of flat land covers the southern coast.

Jamaica, which attracts thousands of tourists from all over the world every year, has many beautiful streams, springs and waterfalls.

The two Friona ladies and Martha Garner of Bovina, joined five other ladies from Lubbock, Abernathy and other South Plains cities, in Lubbock, where they enplaned at Lubbock Airport for the Dallas-Fort Worth Airport.

At DFW they were joined by 123 other ladies from surrounding states for a direct flight to Montego Bay, Jamaica. The group arrived in Montego Bay, which is a 3 1/2 hour flight from Dallas, Monday afternoon and completed their trip to the Americano Hotel in Ocho Rios by bus.

The evening the ladies arrived in Jamaica they ate at "The Ruins," which is an outdoor restaurant and the main attraction was a waterfall at one end.

On Tuesday they visited the Straw Markets, similar to our flea markets, only it contained items made from straw. A large selection of items were available.

In the evening the tour group took row-boats down the White River and had dinner of roasted chicken and pork. This was out in the open and featured a floor show consisting of dancing and music in their native language. Also included with the entertainment were limbo dancers and 'fire eaters.'

On Wednesday the tourists rode a yacht down the Dune River and actually climbed the waterfalls along the way. Later that evening they took time to enjoy a peaceful evening sitting on the Atlantic beach.

On Thursday they took a bus to Ft. Antonio and rode a raft down the Rio Grande River.

Thursday evening they visited a coconut grove and attended the Reggae Festival. During this time they watched as artists displayed their talents performing the national dance. They enjoyed a meal of lobster that evening.

Friday they returned to Lubbock and Martha, Erma and Jere were guests of a welcome home party, hosted by the Theos Group of Lubbock. They ate a midnight breakfast at the International Pancake House on Avenue Q in Lubbock. Following the meal, the ladies returned to their homes in Friona and Bovina with lots of memories of the beautiful island of Jamaica.

# Meeting Set Sept. 20 To Explore Tax Law

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said today Parmer County residents with questions about changes in state tax laws can get answers during a special seminar to be held from 10 a.m.-12 noon on September 20, at the County Court Room in Farwell.

"The state sales tax rate is going up and a number of new items and services will be taxable for the first time beginning October 2," Bullock said. "We are holding seminars across Texas so that these

changes won't come as a surprise to anybody."

### PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1984

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (¾ for The University of Texas System and ¼ for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin.

House Joint Resolution 19 also annually appropriates \$100 million in each fiscal year, beginning September 1, 1985 (from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution) for the use of those

agencies and institutions of higher education which are not included in The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a ½ vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher education that is eligible to participate (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the purposes of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improvements, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. Additionally, each institution would be authorized to issue bonds backed by a pledge of up to 50% of its share of the \$100 million annual appropriation for the purpose of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extraordinary cases, verified by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature, all institutions of higher education would be precluded from receiving appropriations of general revenue funds for the purposes of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the legislature to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of officers, employees and agents of the state or its political subdivisions, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units authorized to make arrests, who die in the course of performing hazardous official duties. Payments to surviving spouses and dependent children of

such officers, employees, and agents are already authorized by the Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of those counties would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties of the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. The amendment would permit mutual insurance companies to bid for those policies.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."

THE CAMPAIGN for the U.S. Senate seat in Texas has taken an unusual twist, due to the focus by the candidates on the so-called "homosexual rights bill."

Lloyd Doggett, the liberal Democrat from Austin, supports federal legislation to ban discrimination against homosexuals in hiring and firing. Phil Gramm, the former conservative Democrat, now a Republican, opposes it.

Gramm argues that those with an unaccepted lifestyle should not be granted "special status" in the job market. Doggett says that Gramm has misinterpreted the proposed legislation, and says that homosexuals need protection.

The interpretation question came up last month, when Gramm charged that the bill would require "reverse discrimination," or "hiring quotas" for homosexuals.

Doggett argues that the legislation would not provide for a quota system, but even if it were not interpreted that way, it definitely gives homosexuals the right to go to court if they think they were not hired because of their sexual preference.

The effect of this point could be to make employers reluctant to turn down avowed homosexual job applicants for fear of being dragged into court and facing costly litigation. In this manner, the bill embraced by Doggett would give homosexuals an advantage in the job market over those who pursue what society considers "normal sexual interests."

Doggett further argues that sexual preference should not be a consideration when hiring.

We feel sure that most parents would not want avowed homosexuals teaching their children. This is one vital area of the job market—and it's ironic that the Texas State Teacher's Assn. was one of Doggett's more staunch supporters in the primary. Society has, for the most part, protected young, impressionable children from exposure to certain lifestyles.

Opponents of the "gay rights" bill also question whether the public interest would be served by forcing an employer, as a requirement for doing business, to indirectly finance a lifestyle that he finds morally offensive.

Doggett has gained national attention for the Senate race in Texas by embracing the homosexual rights group. In fact, it made national news that the proceeds of an all-male strip show, which featured a "Mr. Gay Apollo" at a homosexual bar in San Antonio were donated to Doggett last spring, during his primary campaign against Kent Hance.

Doggett later returned the money, but only after Gramm brought the event to the public's attention. Doggett's financial report notes another donation, from the Human Rights Fund of Washington, a known gay-lesbian group.

"We're not an ignored faction any longer," was the boast of a gay-lesbian leader from Texas, which aired on a national newscast this week, referring to the backing of gay rights by Doggett.

It's going to be interesting to see how this issue affects the outcome of the Doggett-Gramm race in November.

Back during the Democratic primary and runoff, we thought the public had been made fully aware of the fact that Doggett was the epitome of the liberal candidate, and that voters had a clear choice between his candidacy and the more conservative Hance. Even at that, they went with Doggett.

We would think that Phil Gramm speaks for the majority of mainstream Texas voters with his stance on the homosexual rights issue. At least, he openly stands for the traditional family values.

However, the picture of the overall Texas voter appears to be changing. Many voters have the attitude "We want the government dole, and if we have to take all that other trash that the liberals embrace, then so be it."

We wonder if they will say that once again in November.

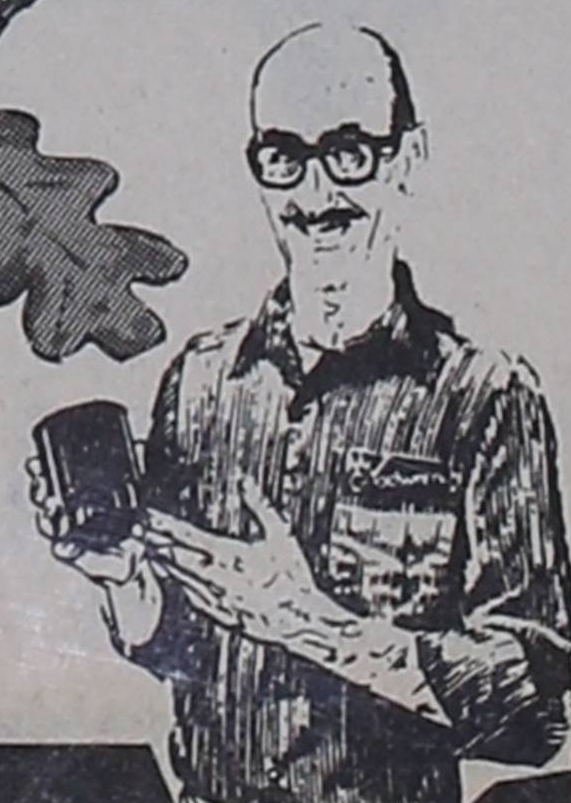

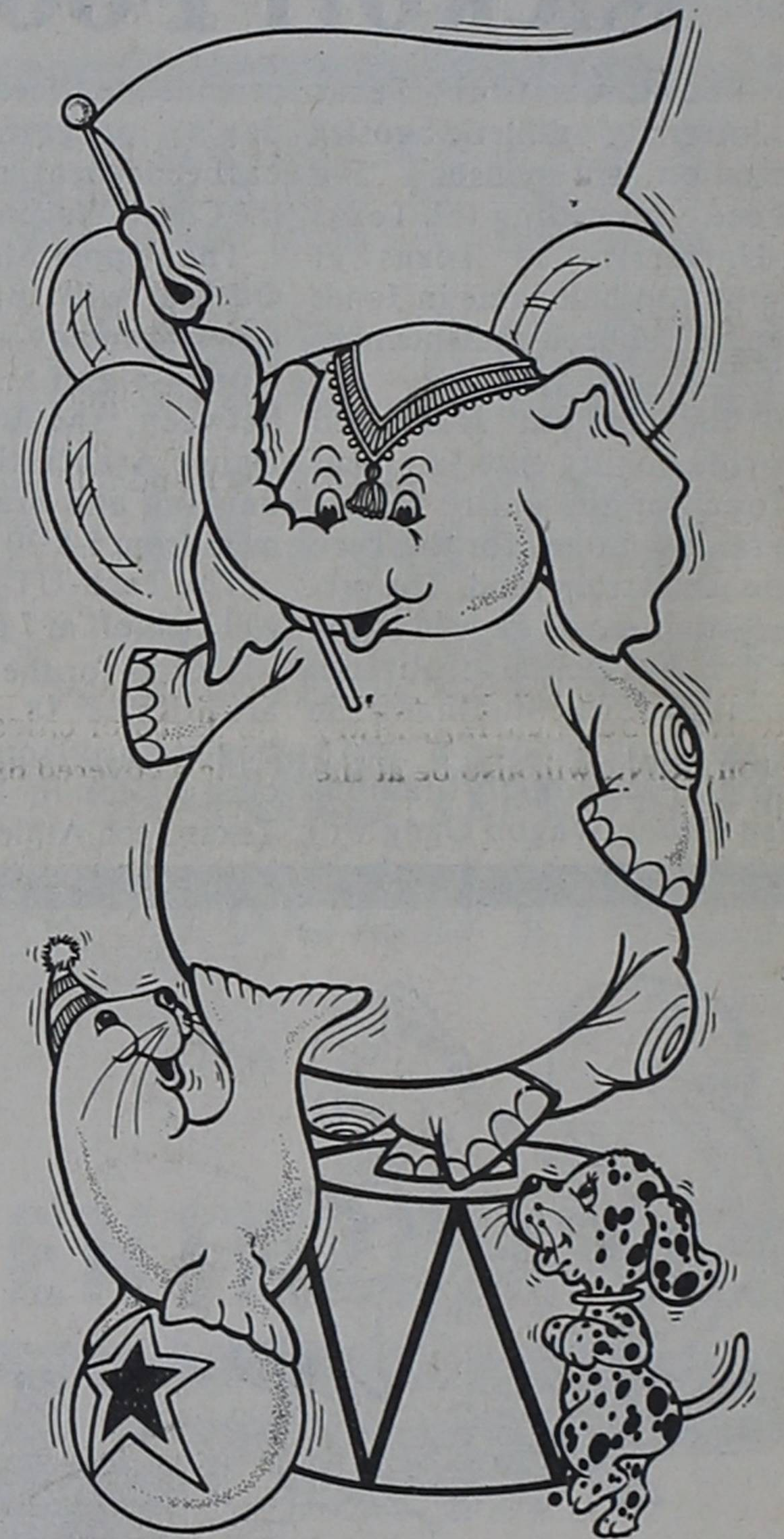

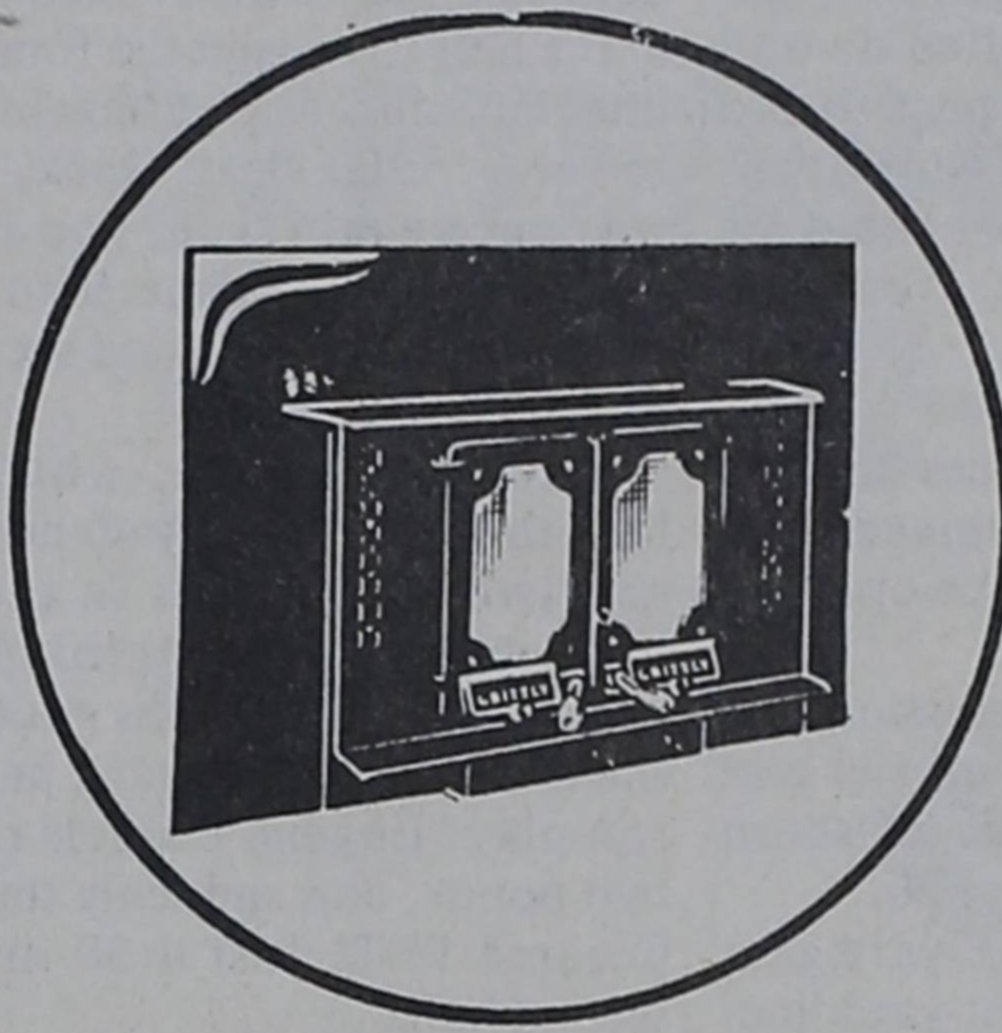

# Chieftains Impressive In 21-14 Opening Game Win

Four turnovers, a good steady defensive performance and the running of Alfredo Mata, and the outstanding kicking of sophomore placekicker Sam Montoya added up to a 21-14 win for the Chieftains in their season opener against River Road's Wildcats last Friday in north Amarillo.

Montoya was successful on his first three varsity field goal attempts. He set a school record with three field goals in one quarter, to spark the Chiefs to a 15-0 halftime lead.

Although the defense did allow a couple of second half touchdowns, Friona was in control throughout, in taking the win.

Ironically, although Montoya was successful on all three field goal attempts, the Chieftains failed in their two conversion attempts, as they added up their 21 points in an unusual fashion.

The running of Mata and fullback Brent Gatlin gave Friona a pair of first downs early in the game as Friona moved the ball from their own 13-yard-line to midfield. But a motion penalty against the Chieftains erased another first down, and forced a punt.

A stiff southwest breeze affected play somewhat during the game, particularly the punting.

Managing only a 12-yard kick effort on his first try into the wind, quarterback Ricky Barnett came back early in the second quarter with the wind to his back and set another school record with an 80-yard punt, from the Friona five to the River Road 15.

Barnett's mammoth kick not only got the Chieftains out of a big hole, but helped set up Friona's first touchdown.

Friona's defense held the Wildcats, and Friona took over on the River Road 44 after a good return by John Aguirre.

On the first down play, Mata

took the ball on an apparent right end sweep. But he pulled up and threw a perfect strike pass to end Ben Neelley, who was wide open. Neelley caught the ball at about the ten, and went in for the touchdown.

High snaps foiled the PAT try, as Friona had two chances due to a penalty, but Friona assumed a 6-0 lead with 8:58 left in the opening half.

On River Road's possession, the Chiefs racked the ball-carrier and forced a fumble, with Matt Osborn recovering at the Wildcat 26.

Mata ripped off an 18-yard gain to the home team's eight-yard line. A pass try fizzled when Barnett, having some trouble with his passing arm due to an injury, dropped the ball and recovered for a ten-yard loss.

Montoya came in to kick his first field goal, a 23-yard effort, to hike Friona's lead to 9-0 with 5:33 left in the half.

A short punt into the wind gave Friona good field position a short time later, at the RR 42 yard line. Barnett passed to Aguirre for 20 yards, and then Mata squirted 15 yards to the Wildcat 15.

However, a holding penalty put a crimp into the drive, and on fourth down, Montoya came back in, this time booting it with plenty to spare, from 41 yards out. This made the score 12-0, with 1:48 left on the clock.

And the Chieftains weren't through with their big quarter. Rodney Allen recovered a fumble at the opponents' 21-yard line on the first play after the touchdown, and Friona was threatening again.

Mata ran seven yards to the 14, and five yards to the nine. A penalty moved the ball inside the RR five, but then Friona was called for holding, and the ball was moved back to the 17.

Neelley made a fine catch on a

deflected pass with 37 seconds left in the half to re-gain the four-yard-line, but Montoya was again called in for a "chip shot" kick, which was once again true, and Friona had a 15-0 halftime lead--nine points on field goals and six on the touchdown.

Friona's defense, which had held the 'Cats to only 40 net yards and two first downs in the first half, relaxed as the third quarter began, and Cliff Hobbs got behind the defense on a 61-yard pass and run play. Eugene Daniels ran for two points, and suddenly the score became 15-8, just 4:38 into the second half.

But Friona answered the challenge on its second possession, after Osborn's second fumble recovery at the River Road 15.

The team had a first and goal at the RR four, and almost stalled, before Mata cracked the line on fourth down for the touchdown. The team tried for a two-point conversion, but a pass try was incomplete. The score became 21-8 with 3:09 left in the third quarter.

Late in the game, River Road put together its most impressive drive of the night, going 90 yards in 12 plays. Daniels got the TD from two yards out. A two-point try failed, and Friona's lead was 21-14 with 2:31 left to play.

Mata and junior fullback Wendell Woodruff iced the game by picking up two straight first downs as the Chieftains ran out the clock.

The win evened up the Friona-River Road series, four wins each, and gave Coach Tommy Moss a 3-2 edge over the Wildcats.

It also kept the tradition of close, hard-fought games alive.

The Chiefs had to overcome a slew of penalties, being flagged ten times for 120 yards. Mata had over 30 yards in gains erased by flags, including a nifty touchdown run in the second quarter.

"We should have beaten them worse than we did, but all in all, I felt like the entire team played a fine game," said Coach Tommy Moss.

Defensive starter Ross Roden sustained a ligament injury to his knee in the game, and underwent surgery on Monday. He will be lost for the balance of the season.

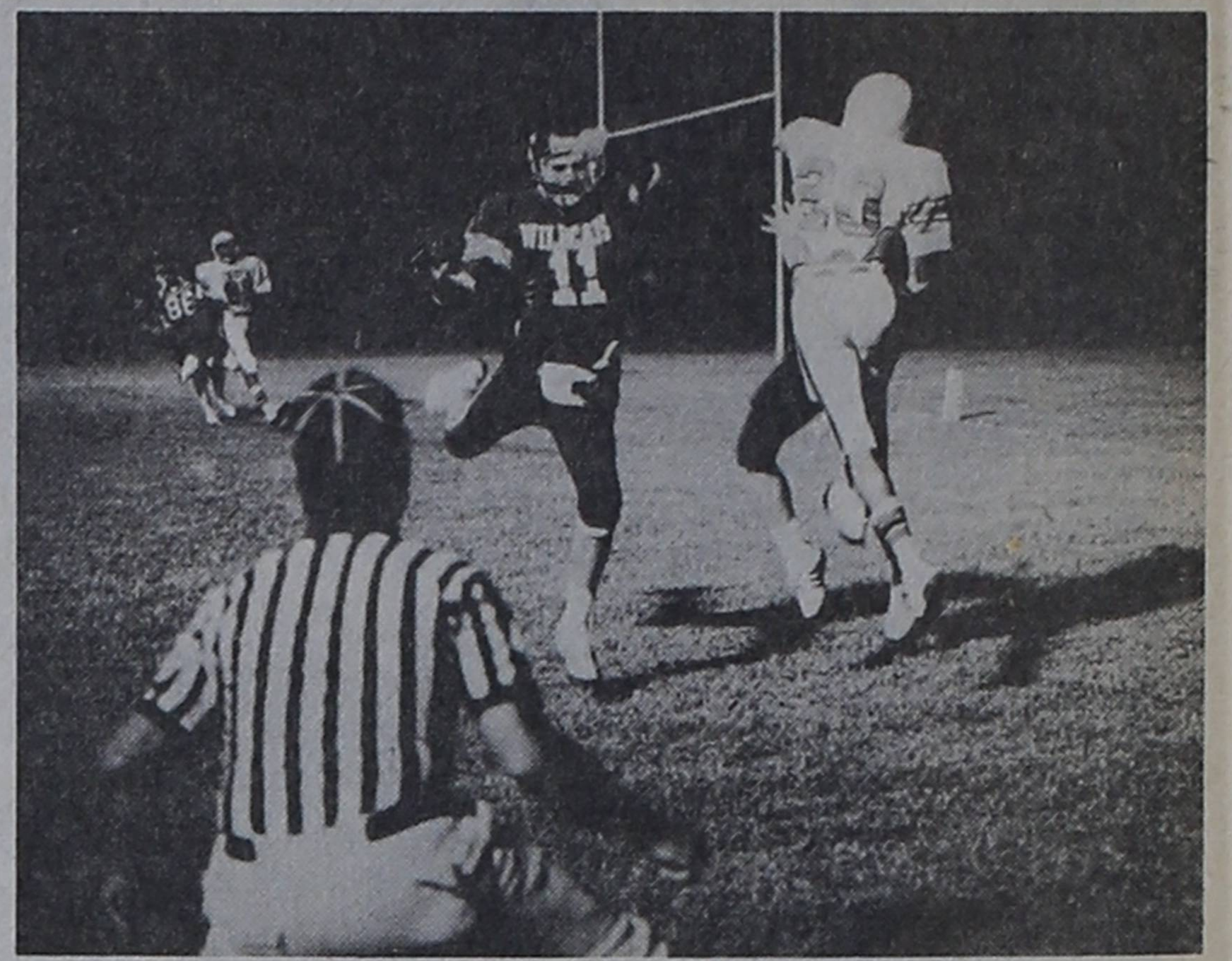

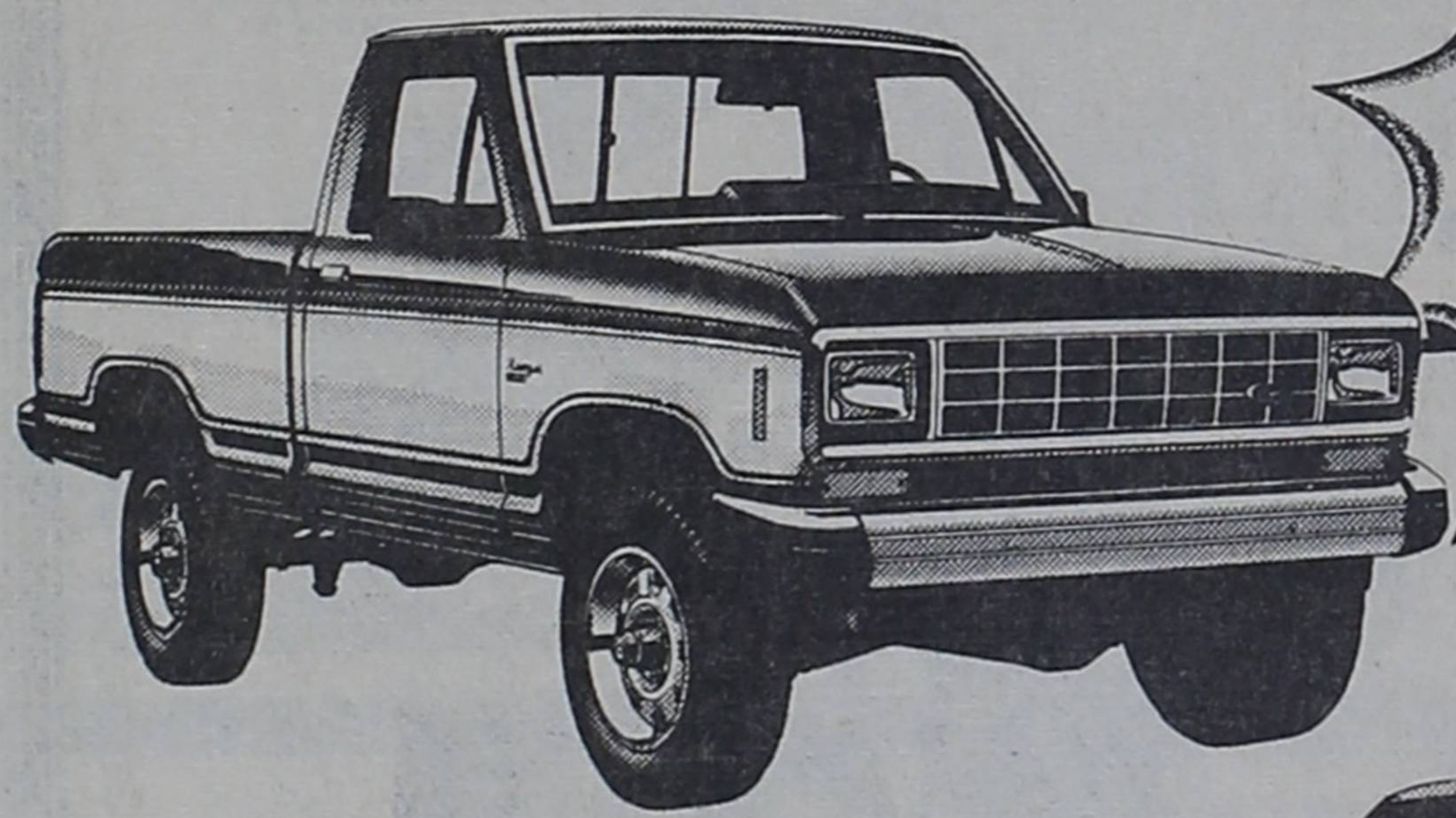
**CATARACTS--Causes and Types**

When the crystalline lens becomes opaque for any reason, then we call that lens a "cataract." The crystalline lens has a water content of approximately 65 per cent. The other 35 per cent is mostly protein and calcium. Normally, the concentration of protein is high and the concentration of calcium is low. As the lens ages there is a decrease in the water content of the lens. This causes the lens to become progressively harder and to lose its elasticity. Focusing at near becomes more difficult. This process, called presbyopia, usually occurs around age 40. It is when reading glasses or bifocals begin to be needed.

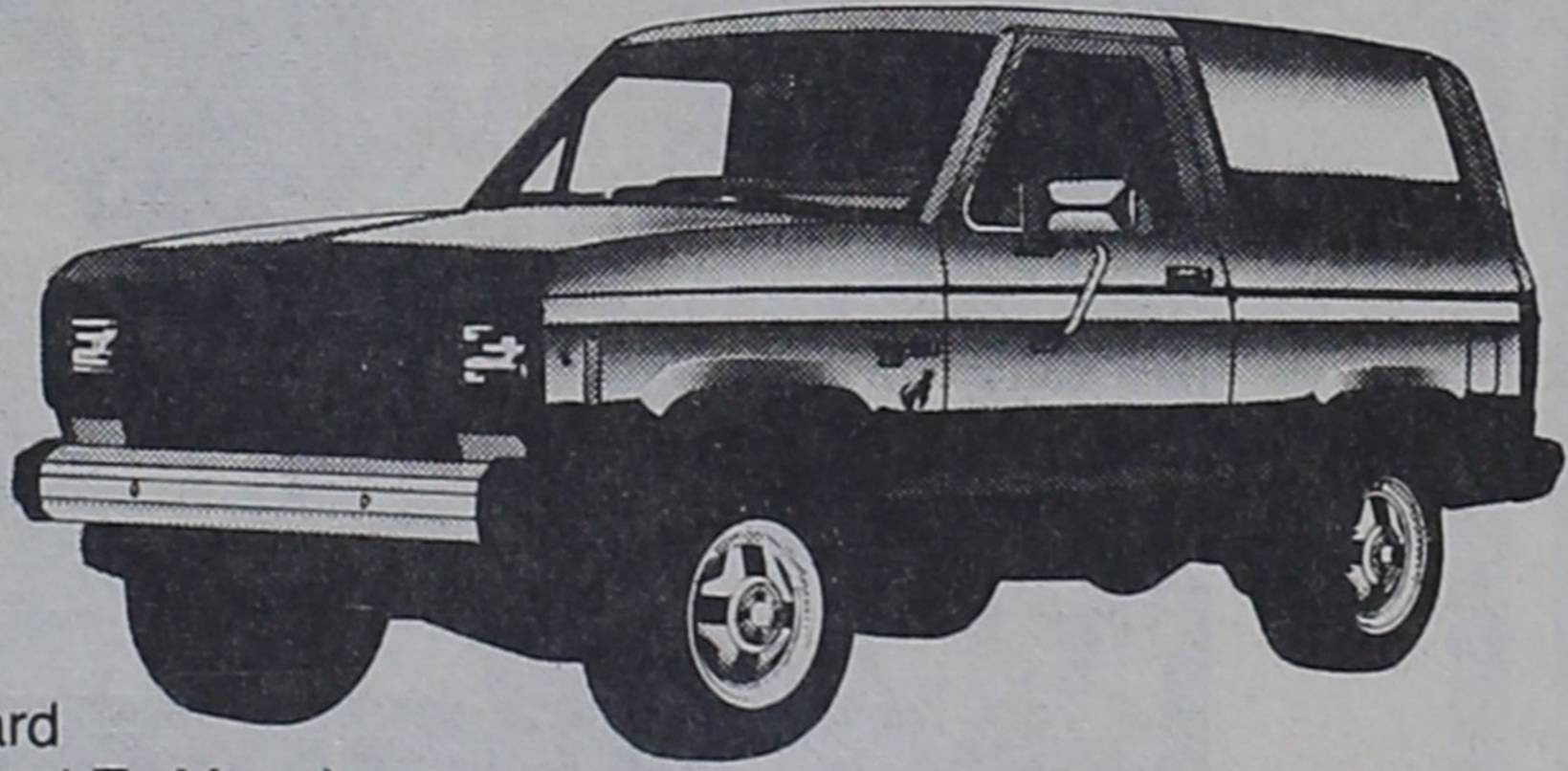
Cataracts are classified according to their age of onset, their degree of cloudiness and location, and whether they are congenital or acquired. Congenital cataracts are present at birth and are caused by hereditary factors or by illnesses suffered by the mother during pregnancy. Illnesses such as measles or syphilis during pregnancy can cause the infant to be born with congenital cataracts. Cataracts in young people are usually of a genetic origin. Systemic disease such as diabetes can also cause cataracts. Senile cataracts are associated with the aging process and begin later in life. Traumatic cataracts can result from an injury to the head or the eyes. Some drugs, if taken in high dosages, can cause cataracts (i.e., steroids). As you can see, cataracts can be caused by many different things. For this reason, it is important that your eyes be examined regularly by your optometrist.

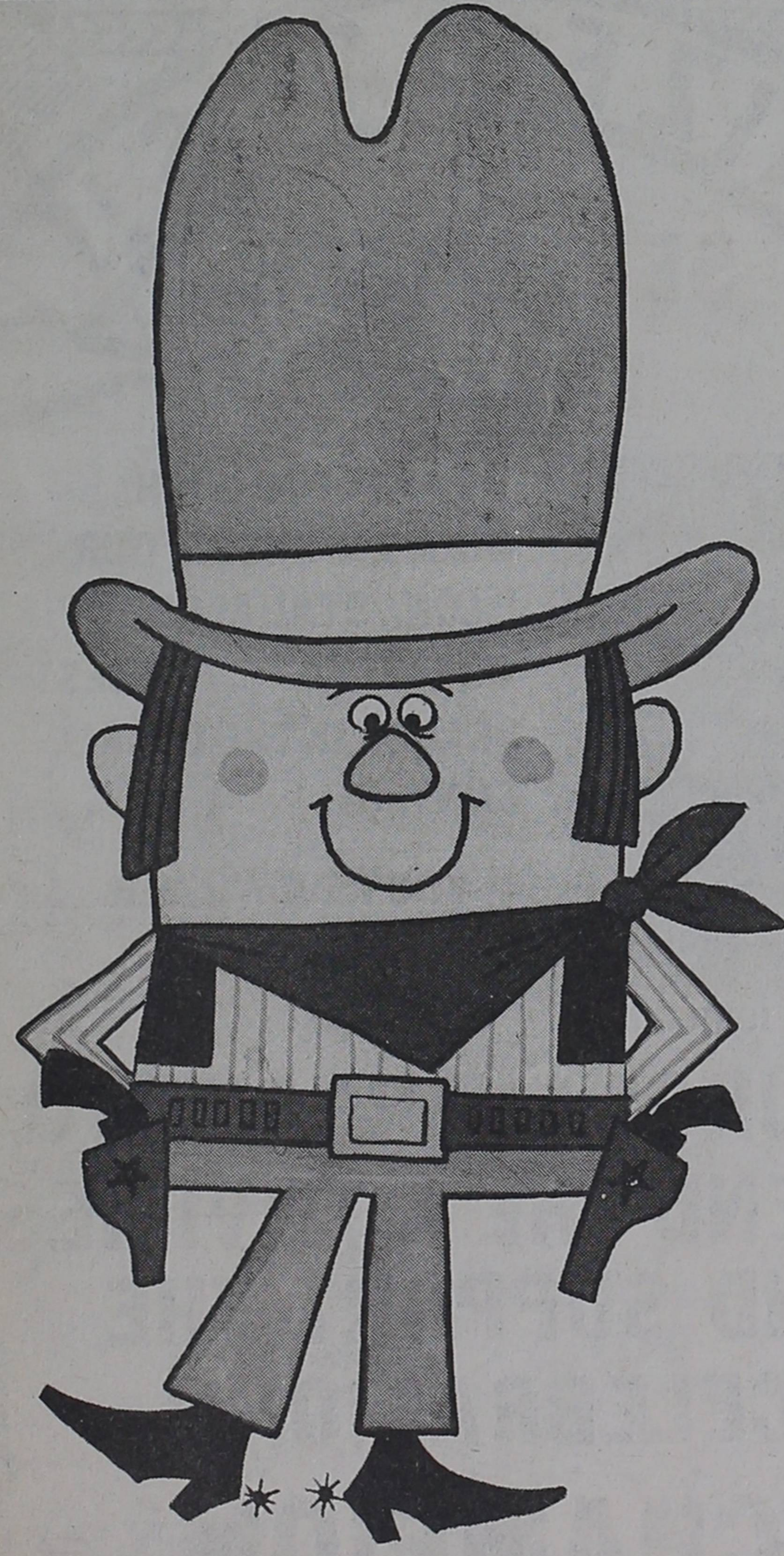

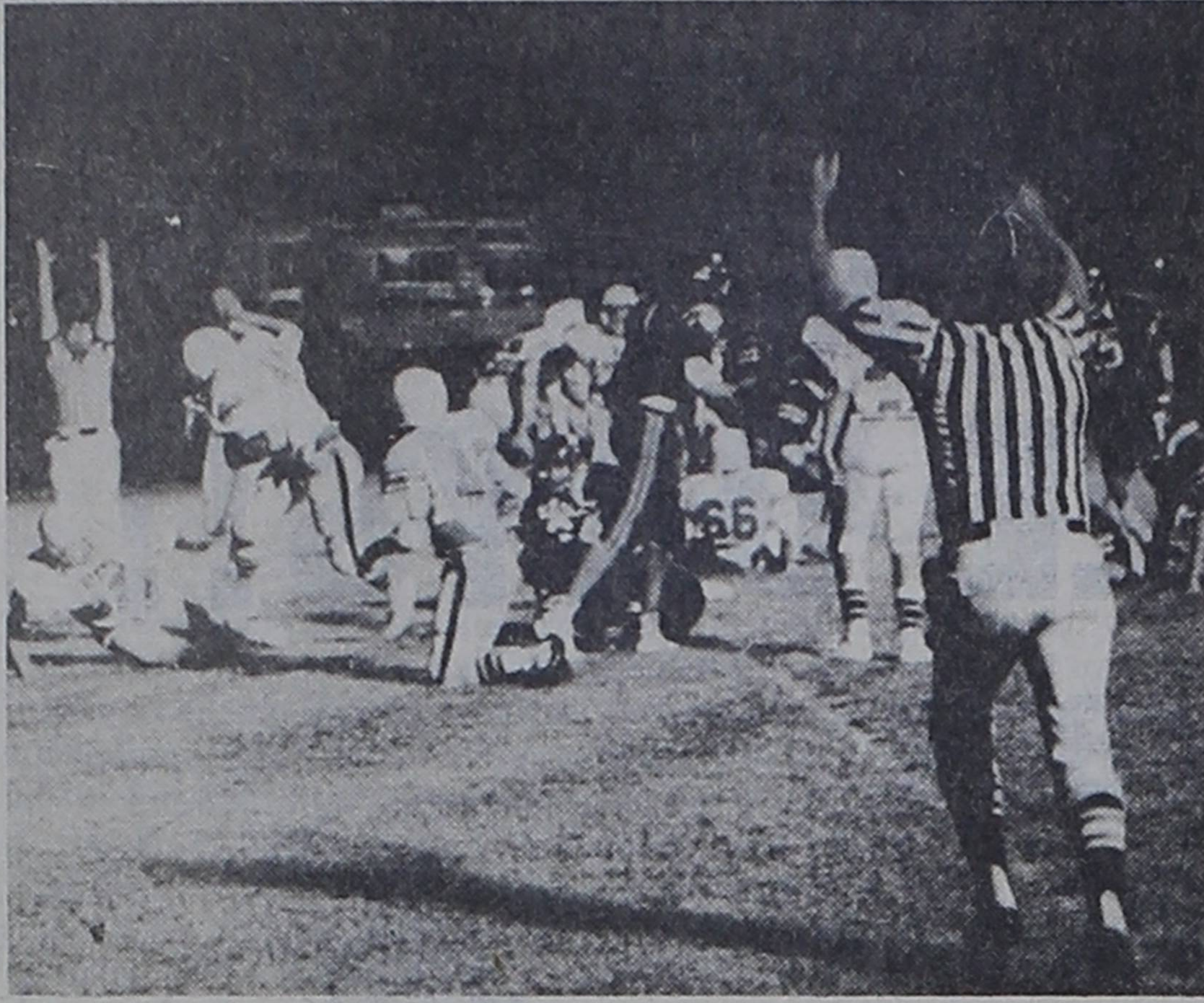

**FOOTBALL CONTEST**

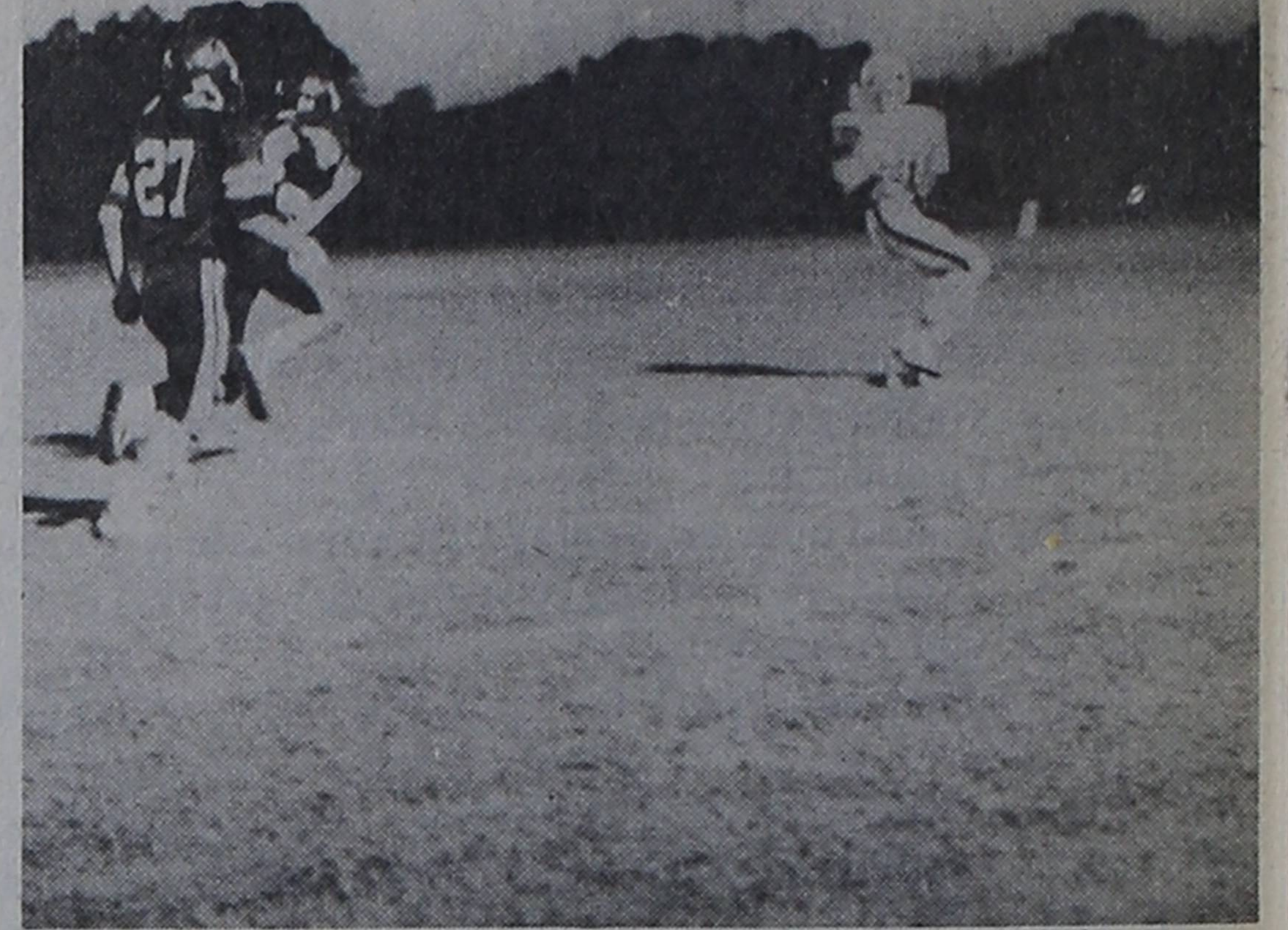
Eleven contestants correctly picked 16 of the 24 contest games, missing by just one or two games

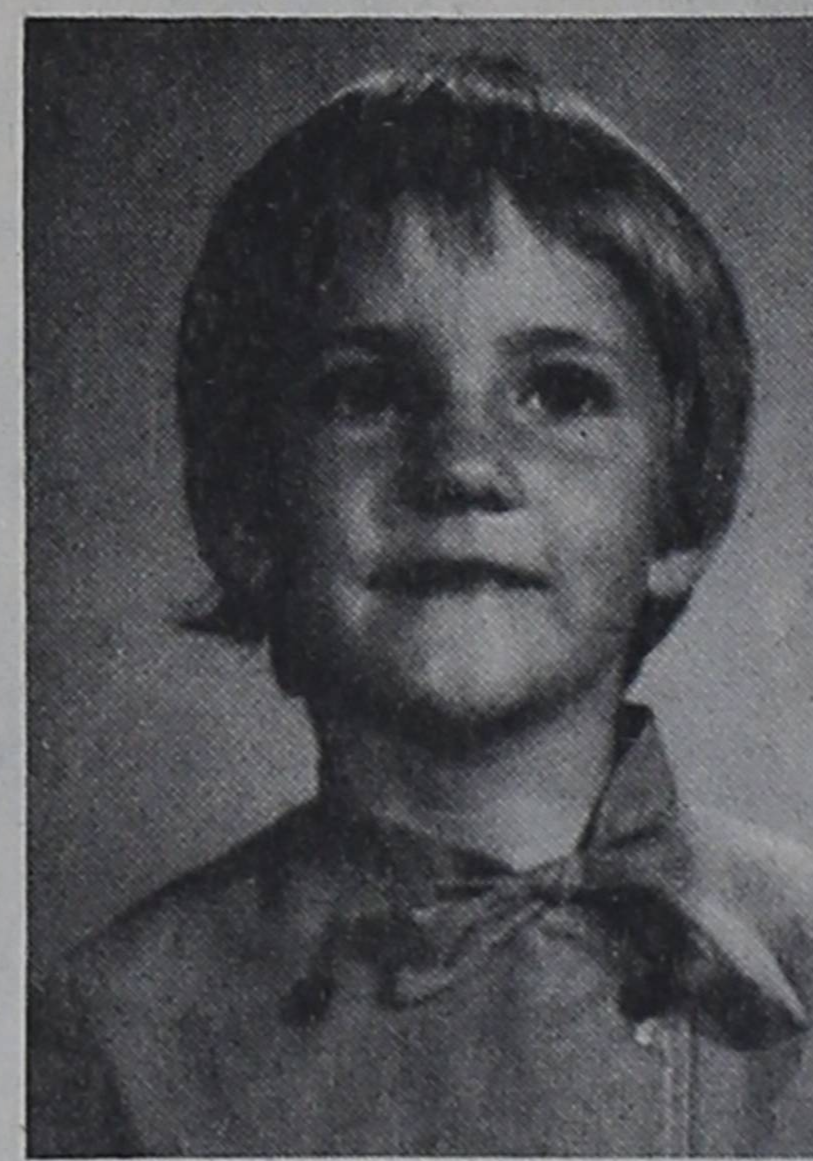
