# Lawmakers Return Full Of Energy, Enthusiasm

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) —  
Five months after they left  
the Capitol exhausted, 146  
legislators returned Tuesday  
with their energy and en-  
thusiasm tanks full.  
Their families, aides and  
friends packed the chambers  
and balconies of both houses.  
Bucks got slapped, hands  
vigorously shook other  
hands, and smiling mouths  
said, "Good to see ya."  
In the House, 119  
representatives who served  
in last year's Constitutional  
Convention returned to find  
new gold carpeting and blue  
drapes.

Roll call produced excited  
applause for some names,  
especially the new ones  
whose supporters saw their  
heroes in positions of power  
for the first time.  
The Senate sent a five-  
member committee to Gov.  
Dolph Briscoe's office to

announce ceremonially that  
that body was ready to do  
business. But Briscoe was  
not there, and his door was  
locked. His aide said he was  
attending the funeral of Ray  
Maner, a close friend from  
the governor's home town of  
Uvalde.

## Paralyzing Accident Costs \$1.7 Million

HOUSTON (AP) — A  
Houston man who claimed a  
defectively designed  
General Motors carburetor  
caused an accident which  
left him completely  
paralyzed has been awarded  
\$1,760,000 in a court  
judgment.  
State District Court Judge  
William N. Blanton said in  
the judgment signed  
Tuesday that General  
Motors and Bud Moore

Chevrolet of Houston must  
pay R.M. Hopkins Jr. the  
sum plus six per cent  
interest until the date of final  
appeal.  
Hopkins, 23, was injured in  
a pickup truck accident June  
11, 1971 in Galveston County.  
Will Watkins, Hopkins'  
lawyer, claimed that when  
the driver of the vehicle tried  
to accelerate on a straight of  
way the carburetor  
malfunctioned.  
"Some of the throttle  
blades in the carburetor  
became in a locked position  
that caused the carburetor to  
draw more gasoline than  
was desired, making it  
impossible in the short time  
remaining before entering  
the curve to adequately slow  
the pickup truck."

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# Two Texans Tried To Bribe Oklahoma Secretary Of State?

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — A federal grand jury investigation of former Gov. David Hall was resumed today, and state Capitol sources said the probe has taken a new turn that could lead to a partial conclusion soon.

Rogers reportedly was being protected by FBI agents after the arrests.

**FBI WATCHING**  
"There is some concern for his safety," a Capitol source said. "I don't know whether he has been threatened, but he is being accompanied by FBI agents."

The grand jury has been investigating alleged kickbacks on state construction contracts during the Hall administration for the past year. The alleged attempt to bribe Rogers apparently was something that developed in recent weeks.

The kickback probe has been linked with an Internal Revenue Service investigation of Hall. Since the IRS report has not been made final, no indictments are expected in connection with that investigation. A report on that probe apparently will be issued during the future grand jury session.

**SCHEME**  
The complaint alleged that "Mooney traveled from Texas to Oklahoma City on Jan. 10, 1975, and thereafter discussed said scheme with Rogers and took steps to carry out said scheme."

## Veterinarian Has Never-Ending Job

From training food handlers to vaccinating pets to inspecting cold drink machines, Capt. (Dr.) Larry Brown, the veterinarian at Webb Air Force Base, and his staff have a never-ending variety of jobs to perform.

All of these tasks are done with one mission in mind. That is to keep the people of Webb healthy and the food served to them in good condition.

A weekly tour with Capt. Brown or members of his staff might find them doing any of the following jobs in their repertoire of service provided for the personnel of Webb:

In insuring the quality condition of the food served and bought at Webb, the veterinary staff checks and inspects well over three million dollars worth of food coming onto the base each year. They check for quality in beef, ground meat and eggs along with all the candy, sandwich, milk and soda pop machines.

In the commissary, they double check the weights of foods to insure that the consumer gets what he pays for. The staff measures the fat content in hamburger to make sure the level falls within standards.

Also, eggs that come onto the base are candied to test for true egg quality. All the milk sold or to be served on base is thoroughly inspected.

The veterinary staff even goes off base to inspect various bread, milk and egg plants to make sure contractors produce the food in a wholesome manner.

**FOR CLEANLINESS**  
In the dining halls, the food handlers are trained and the facilities checked for cleanliness. Swab tests are made on dining equipment and utensils. Finger plate cultures from food handlers are taken to doubly insure the cleanliness of the food handlers' hands.

In the area more associated with the veterinary service, the staff vaccinates about 125 pets each month and treats sick pets. Blood tests are run on animals and microscopic examinations of pets' stools are checked for parasites such as worms.

Rabies suspects are submitted to the lab for testing. Animals which have

bitten personnel are quarantined.

The captain also performs a limited amount of neuter surgery on pets as an aid in controlling the pet overpopulation problem.

Such operations are valuable for training the airmen veterinary specialists as well as allowing the base vet to maintain his surgical skill.

A nominal fee is charged for pet services on privately owned pets. These fees go into the central base fund.

**DIVERSITY**

Brown adds that the diversity of his job and the different people he meets are what makes his job so interesting.

He would like personnel to call his office any time they

have comments or gripes to make about any of the veterinary services. If moldy bacon, cracked eggs, sour milk, spoiled meat, underweight items or bugs in flour or candy are found, his staff would appreciate hearing about the cases, provided they are legitimate.

If one disapproves of the methods of food handling or sanitation in any facility on or off base, the veterinary staff would like to hear about them, also.

The captain adds that assistance from base personnel in "bird-dogging" problem areas will help his staff in making a better, more enjoyable life for Webb personnel and their dependents.

## House Speaker Clayton Promises 'Fair Play'

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Newly elected House Speaker Bill Clayton promises he will not seek a return to the days when the man with the gavel ruled the House with an iron hand.

Clayton, a 46-year-old conservative from Springlake, defeated liberal Rep. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, for the speakership by a 112-33 vote shortly after the new legislature opened Tuesday.

A coalition of liberals and conservatives that joined forces when Rep. Fred Head, D-Troup, dropped out of the speaker's race and brought his supporters into Clayton's camp, assured Clayton's election.

In nominating and seconding speeches, Parker's chief supporters praised his record of "people-oriented" legislation and fed fears that Clayton might try to rebuild the power of the speaker.

The 1973 House, under Speaker Price Daniel Jr., weakened the speakership, which had come to dominate virtually every action taken in that chamber during the tenure of Speaker Gus Mutscher.

Mutscher was convicted in 1972 of conspiracy to accept a lucrative stock deal from Houston promoter Frank Sharp in exchange for his influence in passing a pair of

bank deposit insurance bills that might have freed the Sharpstown-State Bank from federal surveillance.

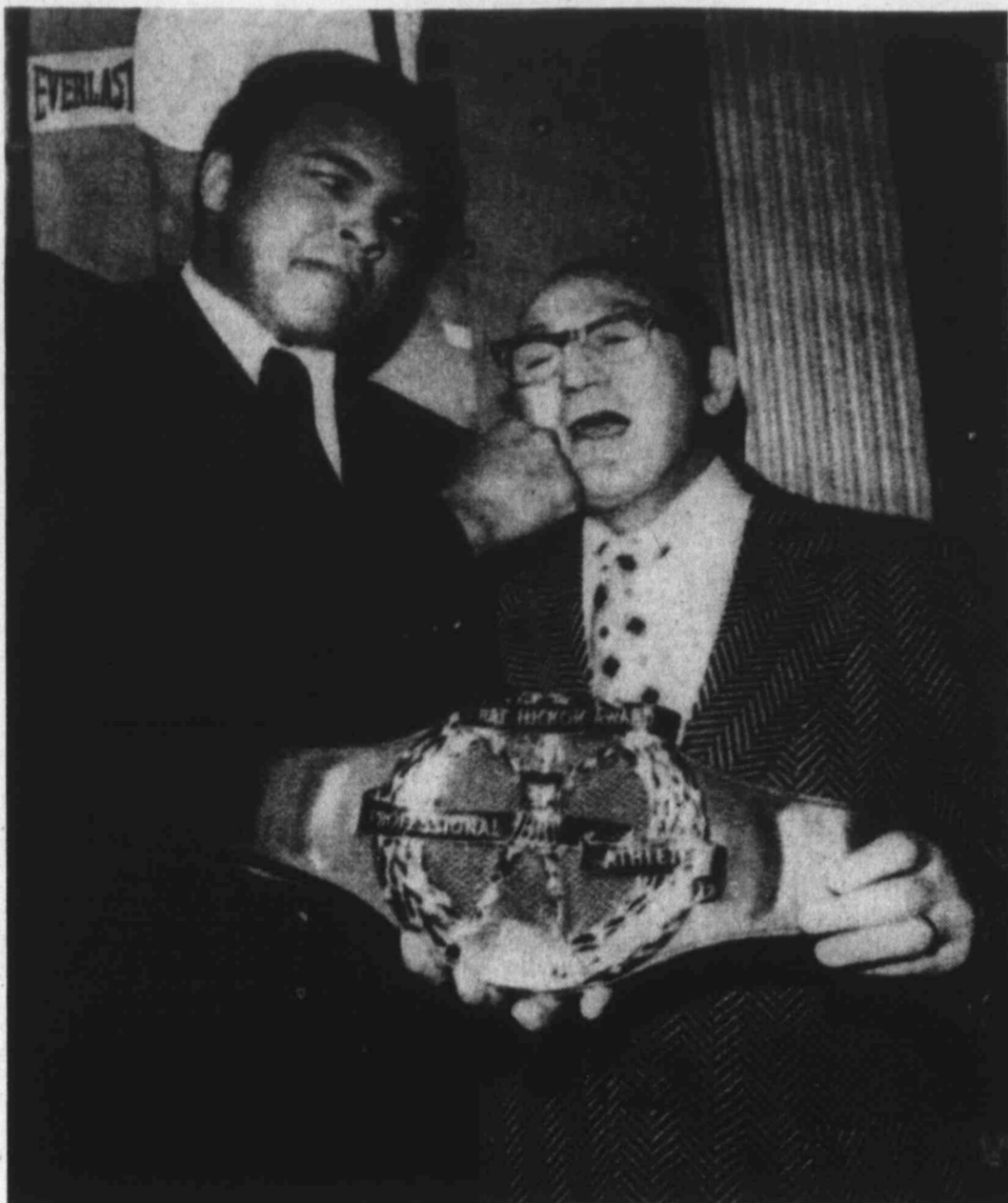
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Dogs Win Out

RECEIVES HICKOK Ali Says Wepner Deserves 'Shot'

NEW YORK (AP) — Muhammad Ali says Chuck Wepner, a journeyman heavyweight who makes more money selling liquor than in the ring, deserves the shot at the heavyweight championship. Ali is scheduled to give him in March.

Ali also said Tuesday as he received the Hickok Professional Athlete of the Year Award for 1974, a year in which he beat Joe Frazier and regained the title from George Foreman: "If I'm like I should be, he (Wepner) has no possibility to win."

This immediately brought up the question of whether the public will buy a fight, even an Ali fight, against an unranked opponent who has been called the "Bayonne Bleeder" because of his reputation as a bleeder.

Mike Stoen led the Forsan boys' B team with 10 points. Tommy Cruz had 13 points for Grady in that one.

The promoter is Don King, the site is the Cleveland Coliseum, the date is March 24 and Herbert Muhammad, Ali's manager, said Tuesday, "the fight is definitely on."

King apparently came up with the \$1.5 million guarantee before the Tuesday deadline set by Muhammad, who said if King didn't get the money, Ali would fight third-ranked Ron Lyle March 24 at the Garden.

Sholer decided to take matters into his own hands. First, he gathered all the remaining canned goods and stored them safely upstairs along with everything else of value from the basement.

Next, he bought some new canning jars and labeled them carefully as "tomatoes" and "peaches." To these fruits and vegetables, Sholer added a recipe of his own.

Sholer said he couldn't reveal all the contents, but the ingredients included soap and powerful laxatives. Four nights later, a thief broke in again and took all the canned goods on the shelf. That was four weeks ago, and the basement bandit hasn't been back.

One of the points raised in the book is that point count should serve as a guide to accurate bidding, and that players should beware of letting point count become master instead of servant. This principle was overlooked by both the Norwegian and Swedish South players on this hand from their match at the recent European Championships, played in Herzliya, Israel.

Not that his decision made much of a difference in this particular match. When the hand was replayed, the Swedish South also reached four hearts, though on a different auction. At this table West elected to make the gambling lead of the king of spades, with disastrous consequences. Declarer took the ace, drew trumps and finessed the ten of spades, thus limiting his losers to two diamonds and a club.

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## OVERDOSE OF DRUGS? Assistant To Playboy Publisher Found Dead

CHICAGO (AP) — The executive assistant to Playboy magazine publisher Hugh Hefner has been found dead of what authorities have termed an apparent overdose of drugs.

Bobbie Arnstein, 34, whose body was found in a hotel room Monday, was convicted recently on federal charges of conspiring with two men to distribute cocaine.

She had received a 15-year prison sentence, pending a 90-day psychiatric examination. While appealing the conviction, Miss Arnstein had returned to work for Hefner.

A federal grand jury has been investigating charges that narcotics have been used at Hefner's mansions in Chicago and Beverly Hills, Calif. Several employees of Hefner's \$200 million corporate empire of magazines, hotels, clubs and films appeared before the grand jury in Chicago in December.

Police said they did not know whether the apparent overdose which took Miss Arnstein's life was accidental. They said she checked into the Maryland Hotel Saturday under the name of Roberta Hillman. She gave the home address of Shirley Hillman, a friend who once worked with her at the Playboy mansion.

A driver's license in the name of Roberta Arnstein, listing the Playboy mansion's address, was found in the room. Her body was discovered by a hotel employee sent to ask her to pay rent for a second day's occupancy.

# O'Bryan Linked To Cyanide Buy

HOUSTON (AP) — Ronald Clark O'Bryan was identified in district court testimony Tuesday as the man who asked about buying cyanide at a chemical firm only a few days before O'Bryan's son died from eating poisoned trick-or-treat candy.

A sales clerk at the Curtin Matheson Scientific Co., David Lee Jackson, said he could "positively identify" O'Bryan as a man who came to the company's sales counter one or two days before Halloween to inquire about buying potassium cyanide, a deadly poison.

Jackson's testimony came during a pretrial hearing. Judge Frank Price was hearing testimony on defense motions to suppress evidence.

O'Bryan is charged with capital murder in the Halloween death of his son, Timothy, 8. The boy died after eating a powdered candy called Pixie Stix which he received while trick-or-treating. Lab analysis showed the candy was laced with cyanide.

Judge Price said he will rule on three of 19 defense

motions on Feb. 3. More testimony may also be taken then, he said.

The defense is asking that evidence found in the O'Bryan house and cars be suppressed because officers conducted searches without proper warrants. They also ask that Jackson not be permitted to testify in O'Bryan's trial, claiming that his identification of O'Bryan came at police prompting.

During testimony Tuesday, however, Jackson said he could positively identify O'Bryan as a customer who inquired about cyanide. He said he remembered O'Bryan because the Deer Park optician talked in a high "squeaky voice", wore a green smock that tied in front and seemed to be missing one eyebrow.

Jackson said during a 10-minute stay at the chemical company O'Bryan was told about the amounts and grades of cyanide available. He made no purchase because the chemical came in too large an amount.

O'Bryan is a former resident of Big Spring.

# Oil Workers At Amoco Will Strike Unless . . .

DENVER (AP) — Oil workers at Amoco, the nation's third largest refiner, will walk off their jobs Thursday unless a new contract agreement is reached, the union president says.

A. F. Grospron of the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers International Union, announced the strike plan late Tuesday. He said no progress had been made in bargaining for Amoco's 4,700 oil worker union employees. Amoco is a subsidiary of Standard of Indiana.

"Unless an agreement is reached with other major oil companies additional strike action will be taken by the union shortly," Grospron said.

Grospron said local Amoco units served 24-hour strike notices on the company Tuesday. If no settlement is reached, the strike would begin at 12:01 a.m. Thursday.

**PAY BENEFITS**  
The strike would affect refineries and terminals in Wyoming, Utah, Texas, Missouri, North Dakota, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota and Illinois.

At the same time, Grospron announced settlement of the wage and benefit issues with the Atlantic Richfield Co. Grospron said the settlement was equal to the contract negotiated with Gulf Oil Corp., which included a 26.8 per cent wage hike over two years.

Gulf reached a settlement with the union Friday, averting a strike threatened for that day. Traditionally, other oil companies agree to the terms similar to those reached in the first agreement.

Grospron did not disclose the exact terms of the Atlantic Richfield agreement, which covers 4,700 workers in 14 local bargaining groups. On Monday, he rejected a proposal by the firm, apparently because it did not match the Gulf money offer.

**LOCAL ITEMS**  
An industrywide strike was called in 1969 and there were strikes against selected companies in 1971 and 1973. The union has 60,000 members in refineries and related petrochemical plants. The settlements with Gulf and Atlantic Richfield

would cover a total of 8,200 workers.

Although the national union has approved the settlements, they must still go to the locals for ratification and addition of local items.

Grospron alone can authorize strikes. But about 9,000 workers have walked out over local issues at refineries in California, Texas, Ohio and Illinois.

The union's contracts with the oil companies expired at midnight Jan. 7.

Other companies with whom the company is negotiating include Texaco, Mobil, Shell, Phillips, Continental, several of the Standards and many smaller companies. Exxon, the nation's largest refiner, has only one plant covered by the union.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A spokesman for the Internal Revenue Service says former President Richard M. Nixon has paid back taxes for 1970 through 1972 but has not produced a sum he agreed to pay for 1969.  
The IRS ruled in April that Nixon owed a total \$432,787 — back taxes for the four years, interest for the 1970-72 years and a 5 per cent negligence penalty.  
The figure included \$148,081 for 1969, on which the statute of limitations had expired.
