

Welding Course Slated For Farmers In Area

A farm welding short course for adult farmer will be held Feb. 17-20 under the sponsorship of the Coahoma High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Supt. W. A. Wilson. Jon Scott, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Joel R. Barton, welding specialist with the Vocational Agricultural Division of the Texas Education Agency, and the department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course.

Barton is a native of Glasscock County, and was reared on a West Texas ranch. He attended grade school in San Angelo and graduated from high school at Big Lake. He holds a B.S. degree in Animal Science from Texas A&M. After five years as a pilot in the U.S. Air Force Mr. Barton served as an agricultural specialist in Texas state hospitals and special schools. In addition to regular classes, he set up farm shops and gave instruction in farm welding

and general farm repair. Barton joined the Agricultural Education Adult Specialist Program as Arc Welding Specialist in October, 1959. He has attended Hobart's Welding School for instructors in Troy, Ohio, and a special school on hard-facing conducted by industry personnel from Whittier, Cal.

"Many welding short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Barton and all have met with outstanding success," said Hulan Harris, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Big Spring, Texas. Arrangements for the adult education short course in welding and in other fields are made through Harris's office.

The short course at Coahoma is scheduled to begin Feb. 17 at 7:00 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held. During the dates the short course is in progress, Barton will be available to assist farmers with individual

LUBBOCK — Cong. Robert W. Kastenmeier, (D-Wis.) has been named the 1975 recipient of the national Thomas Jefferson Award to be presented Friday 7:30 p.m. at Texas Tech University.

The award is presented annually by Texas Tech, the Texas Daily Newspaper Association, Texas Association of Broadcasters and the Texas Press Association.

The award goes to the public official who has contributed most during the preceding year to protect the rights of news media to inform the public.

Previous recipients were Senator Sam J. Ervin, Jr., North Carolina Democrat and chairman of the Senate committee which investigated the Watergate affair, and Governor Edwin W. Edwards of Louisiana.

Kastenmeier, a member of Congress since 1958, was selected for the award in recognition of his legislative work in the area of "news source and information protection."

CEREAL KING'S RAIN 'BATTLE' Legend Of C. W. Post

POST, Tex. (AP) — By the time children reach the first grade in Post, they know at least part of the story of the founder of this West Texas town, C.W. Post—more famous to the rest of the nation for corn flakes than for colonizing a part of the Southwest.

Those same children probably know more about George Samson, the friendly Scotsman who helped build what was then called Post City.

"Scotty," a stone mason, celebrated his 91st birthday Feb. 3. He's something of a living legend, and to prove it, a part of the West Texas Museum in Lubbock is devoted to his activities.

PLENTY OF WORK
Samson, born in Fortar, Scotland, arrived in New York in 1905 with \$5. A couple of years later he was in Texas, working in Georgetown—with a friend when they heard of a man building a town on the "wild and woolly" plains.

"Come on at once. Plenty of work," Post replied to a telegram sent by the pair.

"One morning Mr. Post says to me, 'George, I'd like you to be foreman of the stone work. Will you do it?'"

"I said, 'Mr. Post, I'm too young to do anything like that, but I'll do the best I can.'"

Samson's words still roll with a rich brogue, a contrast with the native accent that is as flat as the area's horizon.

Post had big plans. By 1907, the multimillionaire owned 333 square miles of the Llano Estacado—the "Staked Plains." He paid an average of \$3.50 for each of the 213,324 acres. The best of the irrigated farmland now sells for more than \$600 an acre.

TEACHER REACHING FOR BOTTLE, GRABS SNAKE

BEAUMONT, Tex. (AP) — Biology teacher Sally Lanasa was reaching for a bottle of glycerine when she grabbed a handful of Louis.

Louis had been missing more than two years. Louis is a boa constrictor.

Mrs. Lanasa said Louis was "awful shrunk-looking." Louis vanished in the French High School science building in autumn 1972.

Pupils searched for the snake for about a week, then gave up.

Mrs. Lanasa speculated Louis lived off laboratory rats and mice until last summer when the school stopped keeping such vermin.

After that, she said, his diet probably consisted of cockroaches and "whatever else was unlucky enough to wander into his path."

Louis was given a fat mouse and some hamburger meat Thursday. Mrs. Lanasa said he seemed to be showing signs of improvement.

Edwin Kantar, who represented North America in this year's World Team Championship, is perhaps best known as a composer of single dummy problems—hands where you see only declarer's cards and dummy's. He has now collected 100 of his best problems of varying degrees of difficulty into a paperback: "Test Your Bridge" (Wilshire Book, 200 pages, \$3). Written with accuracy and humor, it is a worthy addition to your bookshelf. Cover the East and West hands with your thumbs and test your play on this hand from the book.

"Skillfully avoiding the laydown contract of four hearts, you have once again stolen the hand from your partner and are declaring three no trump. West leads the six of spades and East produces the ten. Plan the play.

"Your best bet is to work with clubs, not hearts. Three clubs will give you nine tricks, and taking two finesses through East should give you three club tricks approximately 75% of the time, at the same time keeping East out of the lead for a fatal spade lead through your king. The heart finesse is strictly for dreamers.

"Win the jack of spades, cross to the ace of diamonds

LONELINESS
Post, a sociologist of sorts, was aware of the toll loneliness had taken on frontier women.

The answer, he thought, was togetherness. So the first farms were laid out with the homes located in the middle of the 640-acre sections.

There, the quarter-section farms provided a crossroads—four families just across the dusty paths from one another. Plenty of chances for the women to visit, the children to play—and as it turned out, to bicker and fight. So much for togetherness. The homes were moved to the middle of each farm.

"He was a wonderful person," Samson said. "You wouldn't know he was rich by the way he acted."

The cereal king once had to remind the town's board of directors to keep things simple—write the Algerita Hotel menu in terms everyone could understand:

"If you have fricassee of chicken with peas, call it that; don't call it 'Fricassee aux pois'...don't try to make the compunchers think we are a lot of frog-eating French."

Waiters were to tell guests that Postum was available instead of coffee, and Grape Nuts was kept in a covered dish on the dining table. Both were his products.

RAIN IDEA
He turned to a greater problem—the need for rain.

"There wasn't much rain here for three years," said Samson. "We were willing to try anything."

Post's theory was based on accounts of Civil War battles. Often, it seemed, the fighting would come to a halt

in a soaking downpour after hours of cannonading. Instead of cannons, dynamite was used on the Texas plains.

Samson helped. "Sometimes it rained, sometimes it didn't do anything," he said.

In early tests, the dynamite was held aloft by kites and detonated. Later the explosives were simply placed on the Caprock escarpment.

The first rain "battle" in June 1911 used 168 sticks of dynamite and lasted an hour. It was the only kind of thunder residents were to hear that day.

On June 30, the effort was repeated.

"Rain followed within 10 to 12 hours after firing had ceased, whereupon a rainy period set in, extending from July 1 to July 10," Post wrote in a 1912 Harper's Weekly article.

'YES, I BEAT HIM'
On the whole, however, results of the some 23 battles were hit and miss. The three-year experiment cost about \$50,000.

Post City was a showplace for West Texas. A waterworks, electric service, a sewage system—and a golf course.

"We started playing west of town on what we called a three-hole golf course," Samson said. "We didn't know what greens were, grass greens anyway. We mixed sand and oil for the putting surface."

Samson played the game well, later racking up

amateur championships. And he played the game honestly—with all four of his clubs—even in competition against Post.

"Yes, I beat him," said Samson. "He was good, though."

In the years that followed, Samson not only laid stone, he designed 17 municipal golf courses in the Panhandle-South Plains.

When Post heard of a Canadian Scot band on tour, he arranged for it to stop in Post City.

INDECENT
Samson and his wife took the bandleader home for tea. The social was interrupted by a man running up the steps and yelling, "Scottsman, they're arresting your Scottish friends for being indecent."

Sure enough, policeman Ed Harper was hauling the band in, bagpipes, drums, kilts and all.

"He didn't know what kilts were," said Samson. "He apologized and let them go."

Post was planning to spend more time in the Texas town when his new home was completed, a 20-room house with a large living room set off by a Samson-built fireplace, a Persian rug and hand-painted leather wallpaper.

Post never enjoyed the dwelling. He died at age 59 in California several weeks after an appendectomy.

Samson retired six years ago as general maintenance superintendent at the Postex (cotton) Mills, a plant he helped build in 1912.

GRE Center To Be Established

Howard College may establish a test center for the Graduate Records Examination to be given April 26.

'Paul Bunyan' Creator Dies

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — Esther Shephard, 83, who wrote the extravagant folk tales of "Paul Bunyan" and his faithful blue ox Babe, died late Monday. She retired in 1959 as an English professor at San Jose State University.

Scenic Rivers Bill Introduced

AUSTIN (AP) — Rep. Joe Allen, D-Baytown, introduced a bill Thursday to protect Texas rivers and streams through a joint effort of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission and local governments.

Allen said his bill, if approved by the legislature, would preserve "the river areas in the state that have remained untouched and unharmed by man or industry."

Under the bill the Parks and Wildlife Commission would appoint an advisory council of representatives of local governments in the vicinity of the scenic river area who would advise in the setting of boundaries and administration of the lands.

Public hearings would be held before the commission

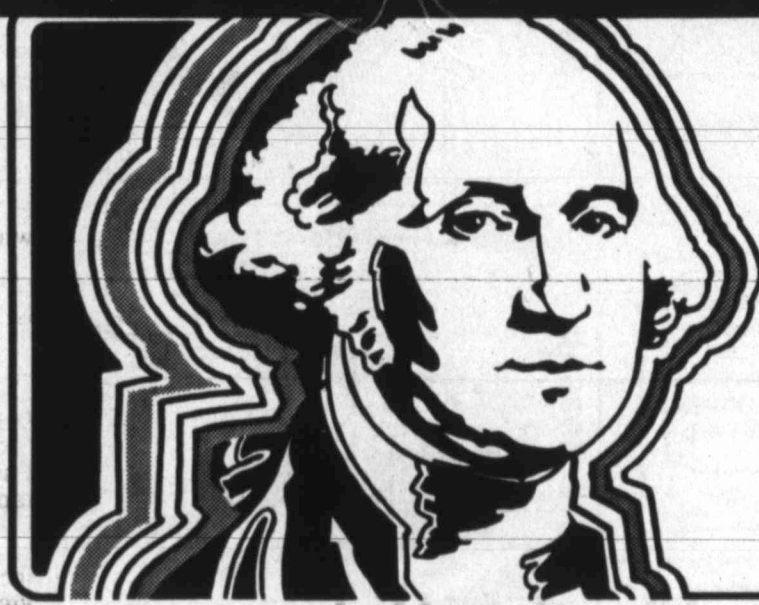

and run the eight of clubs. Assuming this loses to the jack, win any red suit return in dummy and run the ten of clubs.

If West holds both missing club honors, you are out of luck, but you then ask partner why he didn't correct your three no trump to a cold four hearts. In other words, keep the table off balance before your partner starts in on you.

Note that a losing heart finesse would defeat the contract before the play had really gotten started. The odds on a successful finesse are only even money, so the chance of one of two club finesses is considerably better.

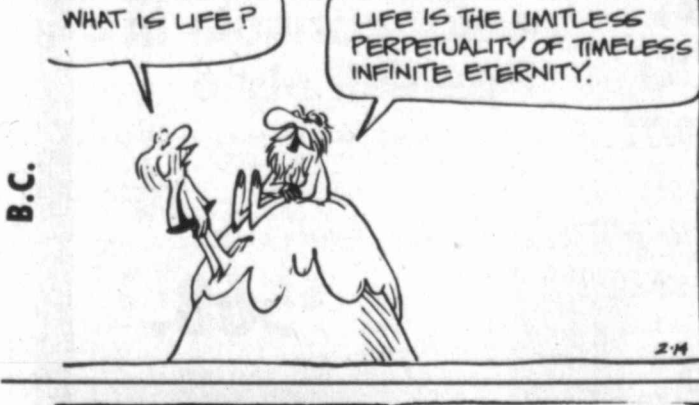
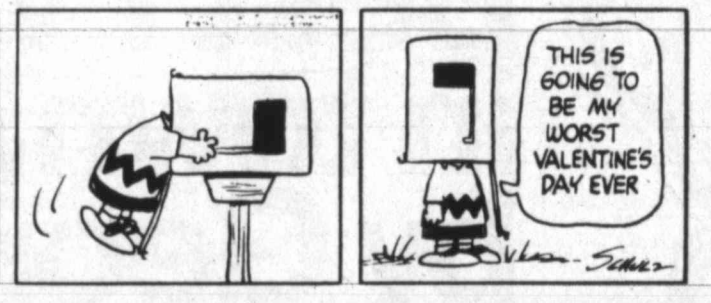

Precincts Get Crews For 15-Day Periods

In hopes of establishing more efficient work schedules, County Commissioners Court Thursday afternoon decided to assign road construction crews to commissioners' precincts for 15-working-day periods.

A major construction project is under way now in Commissioner Jack Buchanan's precinct.

So lots were drawn to determine the order in which other precincts will be worked, with Buchanan's precinct four coming last.

Starting the first Monday in March, road construction crews will be handling projects in precinct three, where William B. Crooker Jr. is commissioner. Next comes Simon (Cy) Terrazas' precinct one and then Ikie Rupard's precinct two.

This plan, which applies only to construction and not to maintenance, will be flexible and will be suspended temporarily following events like natural disasters in one area.

Crooker proposed the court adopt a method of work scheduling in response to a request from County Engineer Neel Barnaby. Because Howard County has a unit system involving one road department for the whole county instead of one for each commissioner's precinct, coordination is necessary.

"Fellows, we have accomplished more in two hours time than we have in a long time," Crooker, a commissioner for six years, commented.

Buchanan noted that before "it was all helter

skelter." Members of the court emphasized they were satisfied with work being done by road crews but wanted to provide a more efficient framework for scheduling.

In unrelated discussions, Buchanan told the court about a request the county grant an easement so a landowner could divert water down a county road ditch.

Before the Soil Conservation Service will engineer the water diversion, county permission is required. Commissioners feared a suit from other property owners near Fairview Road east, Howard County Road 34.

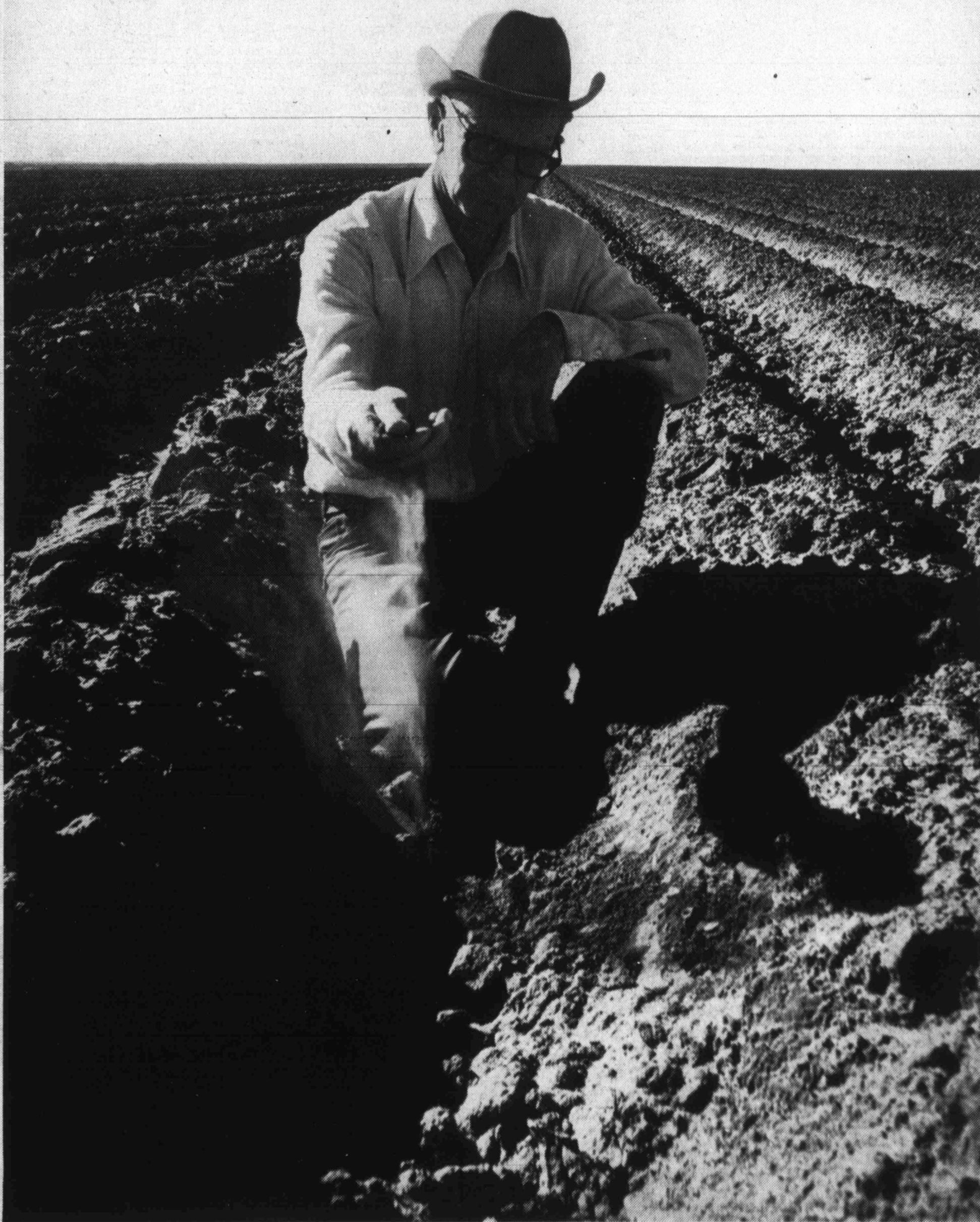
U.S. Action Is Lent Support

WACO — Texas Farm Bureau President Carrol Chaloupka has expressed strong support for government action to prevent imports of subsidized cheese.

ATLANTA, Ga., — Delta Air Lines said here today it believes the Civil Aeronautics Board should not limit any investigation of airline coach class in-flight amenities to the complimentary service of alcoholic beverages. Rather, it urged the CAB should require the airlines to report on all complimentary services including alcoholic beverages in first class sections, food service in both classes, etc.

Welfare Sleuths Working For Texans Who Need Help

AUSTIN (AP) — If you think defrauding the Texas Welfare Department is an easy way to get money, then you must not have heard of Howard Smith and his staff. Smith is the director of the Department of Public Welfare's (DPW) Investigation Division which already has filed fraud cases on more than 300 welfare recipients since it was organized in November. "We feel like we're helping the people who really need the help," said Smith who heads 104 investigators. "When you take the fraudulent cases out of the money barrel, then there is a little more money in there for those who need it," he said in an interview. Smith, a former state highway patrol captain for 26 years, said his unit investigates all 27 programs of the DPW ranging from child adoption to food stamps. "The 300 cases where we have found evidence of fraud represent an extremely small percentage of the DPW's total cases," Smith said. "For example, last year the DPW handled almost 400,000 cases involving aid to families with dependent children and over one million people who qualified for food stamps," he added. "We have had a tremendous impact in areas of the state where we have worked," Smith said. "Some people have voluntarily withdrawn from DPW programs when they heard about our investigations." Ed Richards, Smith's chief assistant, said most welfare recipients are pleased to hear the DPW has an organization to check on fraud cases.

DRUG CASES Richards said, "A great many of the complaints we check into come from the people on welfare programs." Smith's division also investigates the vendor-drug program where welfare patients can receive up to three prescriptions a month through state funds. "Out of almost 3,000 pharmacists in the state involved in the program, we have had only four cases so far that showed fraud," Smith said. "Some of the pharmacist cases referred to us by DPW auditors have involved major amounts of money where a druggist had fraudulently claimed he had filled a large number of prescriptions," Smith said. "But the vendor-drug cases, like many of our cases, are difficult to prove because of the complexity of the evidence necessary to show fraud." Evidence prepared by Smith's division is turned over to local authorities for prosecution in state courts. Smith said, "By far, the local prosecutors have been very cooperative in presenting our cases to the grand jury and trying the facts in court."

Arrowmen will be selected to compete in Ceremonial performance, costuming, Indian dancing, Archery, physical endurance, Tug-O-War, Burro racing, alligator walk, Egg toss, Totem Pole construction and Teepee display. Mick Willett, Chapter Advisor, is urging all OA members to attend this important meeting even though they may not attend the Pow-Wow. Registrations for 1975 will be accepted and forwarded to Tatanka Lodge. Members who are not registered by 15 March will be dropped from the roster at Tatanka Lodge and the Lone Star Chapter. New competition rules and proposed Lodge policy changes will also be presented. It is imperative that all Scouts accept their responsibility as Order of the Arrow members and assist in bringing the championship to Big Spring.

REWARDING Smith said Texas is the only state with a unit designed to investigate all aspects of the welfare department including allegations of internal wrongdoing. "Our investigations are not as exciting in a sense as catching a robber in the act," Smith said. "But they sure are challenging in a complicated way and also very rewarding because we know we are helping people who need it."
