It was the second gangland-style mass killing in a month in Montreal, the crime capital of Canada. Police said they believe a settling of underworld accounts was the motive.

#### Watergate Four Denied **New Trials**

WASHINGTON (AP) -U.S. District Judge John J. Sirica today denied requests for new trials or acquittals from the four men convicted in the Watergate cover-up

Sentencing for the former high-ranking aides to former President Richard M. Nixon

was set for next Friday.
Former Atty. Gen. John N.
Mitchell, White House aides H. R. Haldeman and John D. Ehrlichman and Nixon reelection campaign official Robert C. Mardian were convicted New Year's Day of plotting to cover up the 1972 break-in at Democratic National Committee headquarters.

"None of the defendants have shown that a new trial would be in the interest of justice," Sirica said in a nine-page opinion.

Sirica, in turning down motions for acquittal, said: of these motions is the allegation that the evidence of their guilt is insufficient to sustain the verdicts of guilty which were returned." The judge said he was unable to 'agree with the defendants'

WASHINGTON (AP) - The number of Jews allowed out of the Soviet Union fell by more than 40 per cent in 1974 and signs indicate Moscow will cut the flow even more this year. Only 1,250 Jews managed to leave Russia in January, the same month in which Moscow repudiated the trade agreement with the United citing congressional demands for easier emigration standards.

Brezhnev is back in the limelight, apparently as vigorous and ebullient as ever despite rumors of illness during his seven weeks out of the public view. TEXAS NO PLACE FOR DEADBEATS

### No Workee — No Eatee

HOUSTON (AP) - If you're ablebodied and looking for a work-free life on welfare, pardner, you better move out of Texas. Things just ain't handled that way in the Lone Star

Texas welfare and unemployment payments are so low, said officials interviewed on the question, that this is just not the place for "Our payments are so low that

people have to work," said Barry Fredrickson, the regional director for financial services of the Texas State Welfare Department. JOBS AVAILABLE

And there's plenty work available, according to Robert Taylor, a labor market analyst for the Texas Employment Commission.

"If a guy wants to work, somewhere, he'll have no trouble finding a job, particularly in Houston," said Taylor. "In a recent Sunday paper, for example, there 25 pages of help wanted ads.

There are positions open for everything from engineers to skilled crafts to common labor," he said. The least available jobs are for common laborers, but there are scores of those.

Fredrickson said Texas ranks about 44th among the 50 states in the welfare payments it provides.

**\$63 IS TOPS** For unemployment compensation, according to Texas Employment District Director A.L. Gruhlkey, it also ranks near the bottom.

"The maximum unemployment compensation we pay is \$63 a week for 26 weeks, said Gruhlkey. "And if we find an eligible job for the worker and he refuses to take it, we'll cut him off.

Food stamps, another source of welfare benefits, are available, but they're hardly enough to feed a

Fredrickson said, for example, an unemployed worker with a wife and four children would get about \$210 worth of food stamps a month costfree. If he's also getting the \$63 a week in unemployment compensation, however, he'll have to pay \$79 for the stamps.

**FEW CAN PLAY** If the worker is able-bodied, added Fredrickson, "he would get no benefits at all from the state welfare

Few workers in Texas can play the "unemployment check" game. This game calls for a worker to labor for a year and then quit for six months to get the unemployment compensation.

In Texas, said Gruhlkey, the worker has to show a willingness to accept jobs. If he refuses work comparable to his previous job, the law requires his payments to stop. "This law is very vigorously en-forced," said Gruhlkey. "We make every effort to follow through on

\$143 A WEEK "Several times a week", he said,

some unemployment checks must be cancelled for this reason. As a result of these policies, Texas has not become a haven for welfare recipients, said Fredrickson.

Other states have much more profitable no-work programs, he noted. In Illinois, for example, an out-of-work laborer can get \$105 a week. In Massachusetts, the compensation can be as high as \$143 a

According to federal figures, monthly welfare payments in Texas averaged only \$30 a month for individuals and \$113 for families in 1973. In Massachusetts, for example, the same figures were \$93.83 for individuals and \$329.64 for families. The result, in Texas, says

Fredrickson, is that the number of welfare recipients is declining. And one of the major reasons for the decline, he said, is inflation.

Where once welfare recipients could live on the dole, the rising prices now make it impossible, he

"We haven't changed payments since 1960," said Frederickson. "Before inflation really set in, people could get by. It wasn't a great life, but they could get by without working.

"But now they're having to work. Even the low-paying jobs will increase their standard of living," he

22,400 ON WELFARE

In the past nine months alone, for example, the welfare rolls in the Houston metropolitan district have declined by 3,000. Out of a population of 1.5 million, there are only 22,400 on welfare.




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

Some of both, no doubt. But then the rhetorical exercise does bring up an interesting point. How many of the dire forecasts are issuing from sources which got burnt with their overly-optimistic forecasts a year

It would be folly to be a polyanna, to say simply, as Prof. Coue' did half a century ago, that "things are getting better and better," and presto things will be better and better.

But the converse is true. It is not realistic to say simply because things have receded that they will get worse and worse, and presto they will be.

J. H. Taylor, senior vice president and economist for the Southern California area of the Bank of America, ventures that many economists may be looking inward rather than outward in their pessimism, noting "Not all dogs have fleas."

There are others who, while taking a reasoned view

of the downturn in trade, remind us that we may be failing to feed in sufficient variables which allow for an upturn. It's the same story of being locked into a rigid, spassionate computer program — feed in gloomy factors and you get gloomy answers. This is difficult not to do when there has been a decline, but in the final analysis, it is people who make or decide whether times are good or fair or bad, and when we fail to keep

in mind the people factor of the equation, we deny ourselves the flexibility of input which may help supply somewhat different answers.

What we are trying to say is that while bona fide economists have more expertise than most of us, they are not infallible. It's just possible, and maybe even probable, that things will be better sooner than we think if we don't panic to extremes in either direction.



Bryant said he met with no hostility from the governor's staff while trying to set up the interview,

despite the delay. 'Quite the contrary," he said. "In fact, his press secretary confided after the taping that they held us off a little bit just to see how much we really wanted to do the interview, and also to take a look at the pro-

"Scotty," a stone mason, celebrated his 91st birthday Feb. 3. He's something of a living legend, and to prove it, a part of the West Texas Museum in Lubbock is devoted to his activities.

PLENTY OF WORK Samson, born in Forfar. Scotland, arrived in New York in 1905 with \$5. A couple of years later he was in Texas, working in Georgetown with a friend when they heard of a man building a town on the "wild

can." Samson's words still roll with a rich brogue, a contrast with the native accent that is as flat as the area's

He has now collected 100 of his best problems of varying degrees of difficulty into a paperback: "Test Your Bridge" (Wilshire Book, 200 pages, \$3). Written with accuracy and humor, it is a worthy addition to your bookshelf. Cover the East and West hands with your

thumbs and test your play on this hand from the book. "Skillfully avoiding the laydown contract of four hearts, you have once again stolen the hand from your partner and are declaring three no trump. West leads the six of spades and East produces the ten. Plan the

"Your best bet is to work with clubs, not hearts. Three clubs will give you nine tricks, and taking two finesses through East should give you three club tricks approximately 75% of the time, at the same time keeping East out of the lead for a fatal spade lead through your king. The heart finesse

is strictly for dreamers. "Win the jack of spades, cross to the ace of diamonds

and run the eight of clubs. Assuming this loses to the jack, win any red suit return in dummy and run the ten of clubs.'

If West holds both missing club honors, you are out of luck, but you "then ask partner why he didn't correct your three no trump to a cold four hearts. In other words, keep the table off balance before your partner starts in on you.'

Note that a losing heart finesse would defeat the contract before the play had really gotten started. The odds on a successful finesse are only even money, so the chance of one of two club finesses is considerably







innovations came with adoption of the overstrung scale (strings laid radially in two layers with the treble below the bass for best tone and power). About this time he adpted the iron frame which enabled increased string tension and better tone, and in 1880 a single cast steel frame that again

Later he added a pinblock assembly with flanged plate, again improving string tension and quality, new treatments for hammers and dampers. In 1872 he inpiano in the kitchen of his corporated the theory of home at Seesen in the Harz overtones ennunciated

Germany by adding an appropriate length of string which vibrated in harmony with the main section, enhancing richness. He also developed the accelerated action by which the hammer responds instantly to the touch because of a rounded fulcrum and delicately counterbalanced weights.

migrant piano-maker found fame not only in his new homeland but also back in Europe prior to 1870. He scored a master stroke in engaging Anton Rubenstein for an American concert in 1872, and quickly his grand pianos became standard instruments for such greats as Richard Wagner, Franz Liszt, Charles Gounod, and later Josef Hoffman (Anton Rubenstein's pupil), Arthur Rubenstin, Ignace Jan Paderewski.
