MAIL FROM THE Texas Press Association this week included the results of "Texas Consumer Survey '84," the largest and most comprehensive study ever conducted on readership, listening, viewing and shopping habits.

Since we have a major investment in the local news and advertising business, we thought we'd share with our readers and advertisers some of the highlights of the report.

The survey showed that: *86.3 per cent of Texans read a newspaper every week, with 80 per cent reading their local community newspaper; *70 per cent of Texas newspaper readers usually read local merchant ads, and *87.6 per cent of the readers say that the ads in their local newspaper are important to them personally.

Other findings of the survey showed: *72 per cent of local newspaper readers responding were married; *over 50 per cent of the families subscribing to local papers comprise three or more people and *79.4 per cent of Texas newspaper readers own their own homes.

The survey indicated high readership and interest in local news: *82.8 per cent of Texans read all local news in their newspapers, *70.3 per cent read the special sections; *54.3 per cent read the state news.

Local merchant ads are by far the most thoroughly read advertising matter, as seen by these figures: *89 per cent of Texas newspaper readers usually or at least sometimes read all local merchant advertising; *85.4 per cent usually read all grocery ads; *85.8 per cent usually read all the inserts in the newspapers, and *85.59 usually read department store advertising.

The survey also outlined the strengths and weaknesses of direct mail along with radio and television.

Direct mail advertising in Texas, much of it conducted by out-of-state firms, is usually read by 43.7 per cent of the addresses, with only 31 per cent of that number reading all of a single mailing.

Radio and television, while being listened to by as much as 73 per cent of Texas consumers and seen by at least that many people, nevertheless, must divide those numbers by dozens of stations and channels. And the most watched cable television channels of all don't even accept advertising.

John Taylor, Director of the Texas Newspaper Advertising Bureau (TNAB), explained that an analysis of the massive survey easily reveals numerous additional newspaper assets that may be overlooked at first glance.

Taylor explained: "Every Texas newspaper is a dues payer to its community and state, as well as a major contributor to a better society. Texas newspapers, their publishers and staffs have spent lifetimes creating communities that justify the investment of dollars by major retailers.

"Our newspapers represent major local payrolls and substantial taxpayers to the local, county and state governments. And in all cases, one newspaper and not more than two thoroughly dominates the markets which they serve.

"Texas newspapers represent quite a choice from the major direct mailers who often don't even pay state taxes, and the electronic media which must share its hour-by-hour audience with about 50 competitors."

The massive survey was under the supervision of Dr. Ernest Larkin, director of the Journalism Research Center, University of Oklahoma.

Court OKs Payments

Agreement to pay the roofing job on the Law Enforcement Center, in the amount of \$8,174, to Leaway Roofing of Hereford, was approved at the regular meeting of the Commissioner's Court on September 10.

Another motion was approved to pay the August boarding care bills for the county's foster children, in the amount of \$2,139. The amount will be re-imbursed to the county by the state.

A bill was received from Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home of Friona for the use of its facilities for an autopsy. Payment of the bill, in the amount of \$100, was approved.

Motion was passed to pay an attorney ad item bill from Richard Collard, for representing a person in a mental hearing.

Commissioner Ernest Anthony was authorized to sign the Statement of Assurance certificate for Revenue Sharing. The certificate assures that Parmer County is in compliance with requirements in order to continue receiving Revenue Sharing payments.

Sheriff Bill Morgan met with the court to discuss using the County Courtroom the week of October 8 for a school to certify jailers. As October 8 is a regular commissioner's meeting, it was voted to change that meeting date to October 5, so the room would be available for the school.

The court met with accountant Bernie Gowens, who presented the audit of the court's year ending December, 1983.

After some discussion on the proposed budget, a motion was passed to set the county's tax rate at \$.312 per \$100 valuation, which is the same rate as that for 1983.

Damon George Is Contest Winner

Damon George, a freshman student at Farwell High School, was the winner of the third week's running of the Friona Star football contest.

George was one of nine contestants to correctly pick 19 of the 24 contest games, but beat out the other eight on the basis of his tie-breaker prediction on the Friona-Bovina score. He pegged the score at 42-7, missing the Friona side by 11 points.

Second place went to Bruce Patterson, who missed the score by 13 points. Patterson picked Friona to win, 47-0, missing Friona's score by six and Bovina's by seven.

Jack Clark, longtime entrant in the contest, and a former grand prize winner, took third place in the weekly contest. His tie-breaker score was 18 points off the actual score. He picked the Chiefs to win, 35-6.

The top three contestants were awarded cash prizes of \$10.00, \$7.50 and \$5.00.

Other contestants correctly picking 19 games, but missing out on the prize money, were David Gowens of Muleshoe, Ricky White, Leo Escalante, Todd Widler, Ruth Smith and Jim Beard.

Group Hears Highway Brass

A group of concerned Parmer County citizens met with Highway Department officials in Friona Thursday night, to find out what needed to be done to get the widening of Highway 60 off "dead center."

District Engineer Ben Alley of Lubbock told the group that a delegation of concerned citizens needs to appear before the Highway Commission in Austin to ask for funding of the project.

"The Highway Commission holds a monthly public hearing, to hear pleadings concerning any project the public wants. If they don't hear from your group, there is a good chance they aren't going to fund it," Alley said.

Alley pointed out that Highway 60, from Canyon to Las Cruces, N.M. was designated as a "Demonstration Project" by the federal highway officials some years ago, and that under the program the state of New Mexico built a considerable amount of roadway, but that Parmer County lost out. The project, which dealt

with "discretionary funds," has apparently been discontinued.

Highway 60 is the main gap in the four-lane road from Amarillo to Las Cruces, N.M., and although the traffic count here may not equal that in the more populated areas, the district highway chiefs feel that the type of traffic, and the specific problems along the road merit some consideration.

Brought up at the meeting was the unusually heavy number of trucks which use the road, due to the high number of feed lots and packing plants in the immediate area. The soon to be open Millard Warehouse will increase the truck traffic, also.

The feeling of those attending Thursday night's meeting was that a delegation needs to be formed to take the case before the state Highway Commission, and make its needs known.

Also attending the meeting were Rhea Bradley, resident engineer with the highway department, Littlefield.

"We will be glad to help you in any way with the project, but we employees of the Highway Department do not influence the funding of projects. That type of request must come from a local contingent," Alley said.

FHS Ranks In Statistics

Going into their game with Muleshoe Friday, the Friona Chieftains were ranked high in several categories of statistics published by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

The Chiefs were second in the area only to Littlefield in total offense, averaging 343 yards per game. Littlefield was averaging 426 yards. The team also ranked second in total defense, giving up an average of 172 yards per outing. The Wildcats also led this category.

Runningback Alfredo Mata ranked fifth in individual rushing, averaging 125.3 yards per game and 4.9 yards per carry through the team's first three games. John Aguirre was in ninth place, averaging 74.3 yards per game and 17.1 yards per carry.

Rick Barnett rates ninth among class AAA passers, with 65.3 yards per game and three passing touchdowns.

Aguirre is the six-ranking receiver, with nine catches for 123 yards, 13.6 yards per catch and three catches per game.

Mata is second in individual scoring with 42 points to Littlefield's Steve Green, who had scored 54 points.

FHS Hosts Indians

The Chieftains will host the Morton Indians next Friday in their last non-conference game of the season. The game has been designated as "Homecoming" game for the team, and begins at 7:30, with pre-game ceremonies for crowning of the Homecoming Queen.

Morton went into their game against Dimmitt Friday with a 3-0 season record, and is shaping up to be a power in their class AA district.

It will be the first meeting since 1979 between Friona and Morton. The two schools were district mates from 1956-63 and 1971-79. Friona holds an overall edge in the series, which dates back to 1945, 15 wins to eight for the Indians.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

55 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 27, 1929

The Santa Fe Grain Company has this week begun the removal of the old warehouse on its property on Main Street just north of the railroad siding. This is one of the oldest buildings in Friona and was at one time located near the center of the city from which place it was moved to the location above mentioned, and since the organization of the Santa Fe Grain Company, the building has been used as a storage room for feeds, salt and other commodities handled by the company.

50 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 28, 1934

Costly fumbles prevented the Chiefs from dedicating the new Chieftain Stadium with a win last Friday when they played the Adrian Highs to a scoreless tie. The contract for carrying the mail over the newly established star route from Friona to Summerfield and return, which is advertised to begin on October 1, was let to Lloyd Pope, son of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Pope, he being the lowest bidder for the contract.

45 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 29, 1939

Another very disastrous farm fire occurred in the Friona territory about 2:30 a.m. Saturday morning, when the barn on the G.L. Mingus farm was destroyed as was the garage and the family car and a truck which were in it. A poultry house with a large number of chickens and a grainery with about 2,000 bushels of wheat, also burned.

Monday to allow discounts of one to three per cent on county and common school taxes for the current school year, in accordance with a bill passed by the last session of the Legislature.

40 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 29, 1944

Mrs. G.H. Brock, who lives in the Parmerton Community, was injured when a glass jar exploded as she removed it from her pressure cooker. A piece of glass cut a gash on her hand, and several stitches were required to close the wound. She escaped with only slight burns about her ankles.

30 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 30, 1954

Grain harvest is getting off to a rather slow start in Parmer County, with much of the feed being too wet for harvest, or storage under the Commodity Credit 13 per cent moisture ruling. Cotton prospects are looking exceptionally good in a similarly slow starting harvest season.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 1, 1959

15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 2, 1969

Ex-Olympian To Appear

Appearing at this year's Tenth Annual Allsup's Roadraces, October 12 and 13 is noted author and former U.S. Olympian, Jeff Galloway. One of the pioneers of the running "movement," Galloway was a 1972 Olympian in the 10K, has represented the U.S. in Europe, Africa and the USSR, and he broke the U.S. ten mile record in 1973 with a time of 47:49.

As an author, Galloway has helped thousands of runners to reach their performance goals with *Galloway's Book On Running*. With its 300 pages of in-depth information on innovative training methods, shoe selection, diet and nutrition, the book has been highly praised by experts such as Dr. George Sheehan. Along with his book, Galloway has written numerous articles for magazines such as *Runners World*, *Running Magazine* and other publications including a three-part series entitled *The History of U.S. Road Racing*. He is also the founder and chairman of Phidippides, a national chain of retail stores specializing in running and other aerobic sports, and charter board member of ARRA, the group which developed the professional road racing circuit.

Jeff Galloway will speak at the Tenth Annual Allsup's Roadraces pre-race banquet Friday, October 12 in Clovis, New Mexico and will participate in the running events

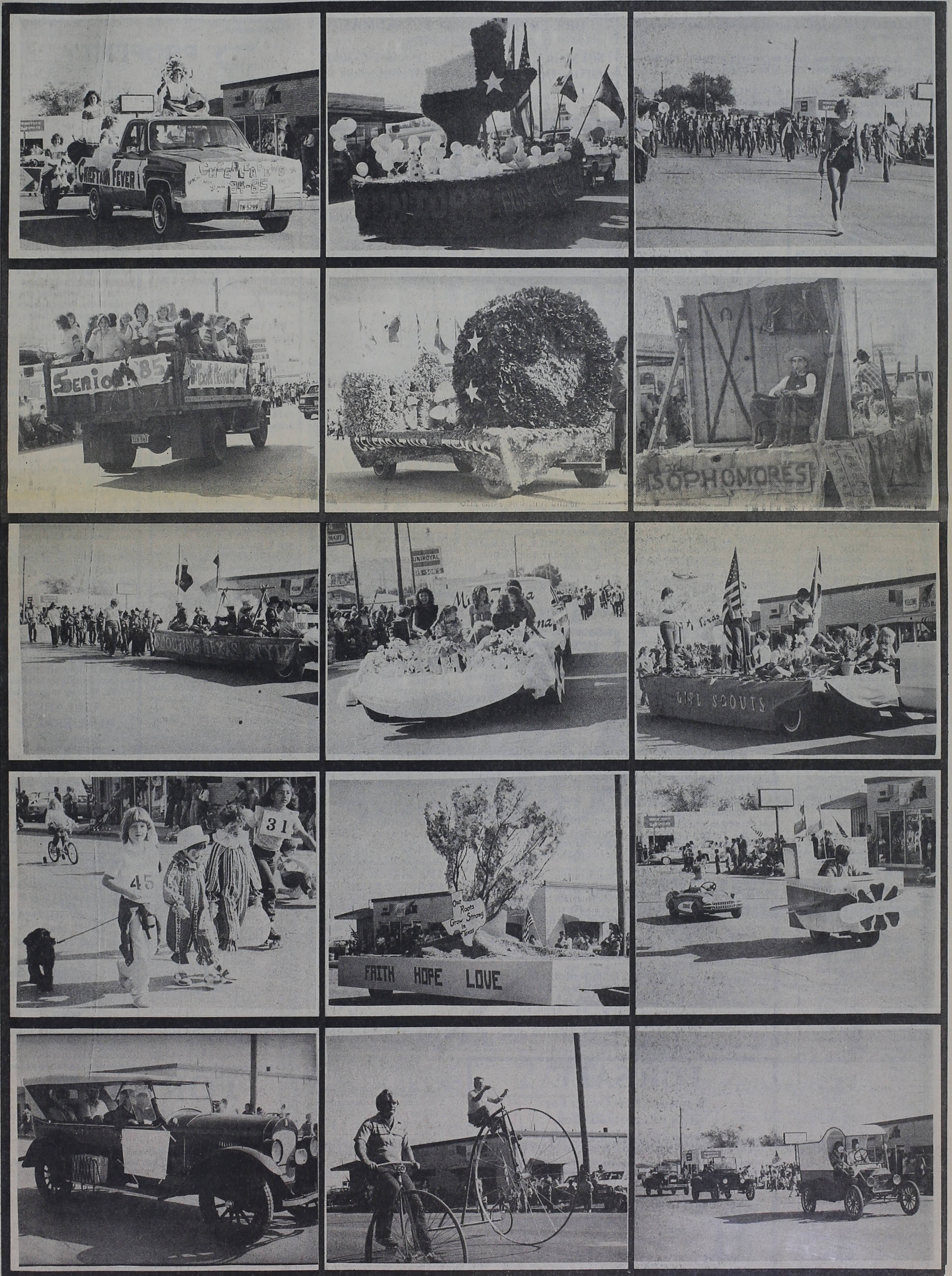

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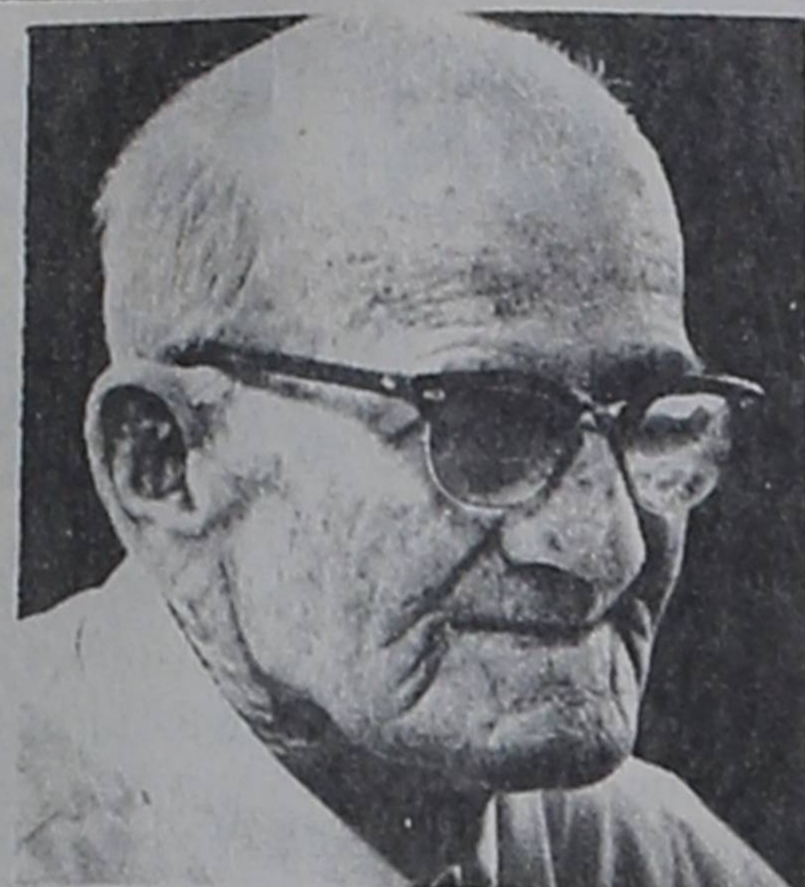
Ashcraft Rites Held

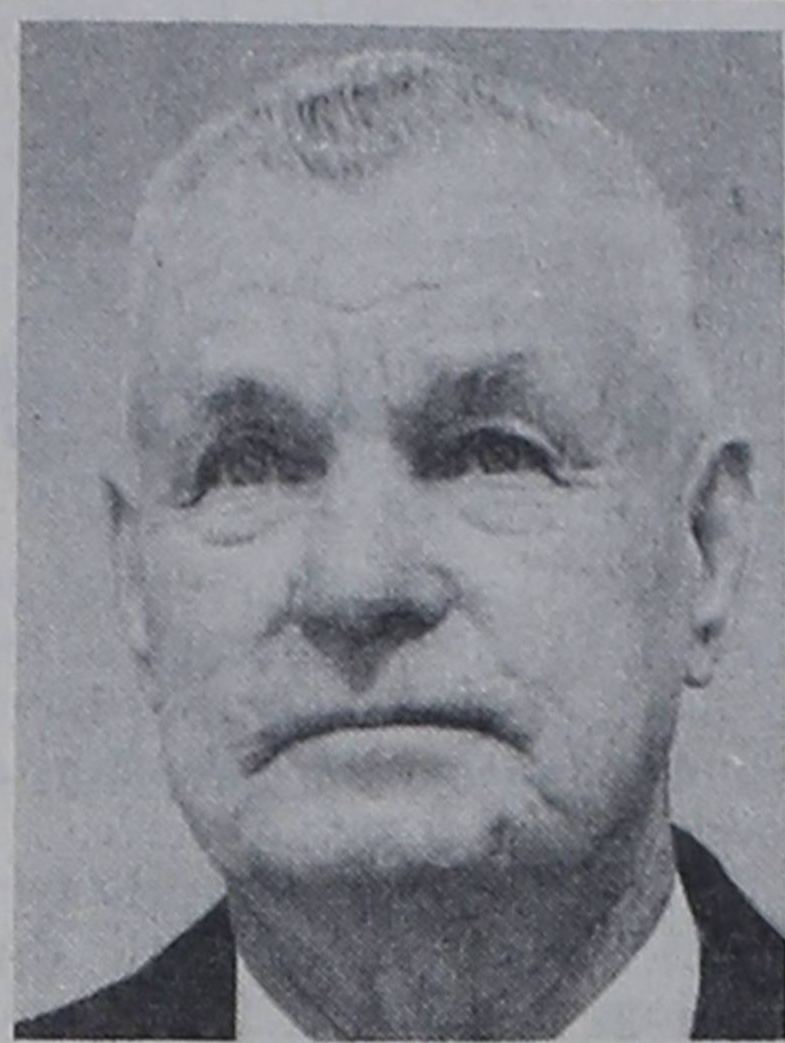

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Chiefs Set Records In 53-7 Win Over Bovina Mustangs

Fans attending the renewal of the Friona-Bovina football series at Bovina last Friday may have wondered if they were watching a football game or a track meet.

When all was tallied up, the two teams advanced the ball (by rushing, passing, kick and interception returns) a combined total of 1,116 yards. Friona won the total yardage battle, 744-372, and they won the game, 53-7.

It was the final tune-up prior to their district opener, and the Chieftains really put the frosting on their offense. They had an opportunity to work on their passing game for the first time this

season, and found that it worked very well, thank you.

Quarterback Ricky Barnett completed ten of 13 passing tries, including two touchdown passes to Rodney Allen, as the team racked up their highest point total and yardage figures in several years.

The game was less than a minute old when tailback Alfredo Mata turned the corner and raced 57 yards for a touchdown. Typical of the way the game went for Friona, they turned a fumbled snap on the PAT try into two points instead of one, and led, 8-0.

The Chiefs drove to Bovina's eight yard line on their next possession, but a mixup on a fourth and one play turned the ball over to Bovina.

Bovina made two first downs and was forced to punt. Mata fielded the ball at his own 35, found a wall of blockers on the west sideline, and sped 65 yards for his second TD. Sam Montoya's kick made the score 15-0 with 2:17 left in the opening quarter.

Bovina put together an impressive drive to the Friona 13, before losing the ball on downs. Then, early in the second quarter John Aguirre raced 60 yards for a touchdown. Montoya's kick made the score 22-0.

Ben Neelley intercepted a Bovina pass to start another scoring drive. Barnett moved the team downfield, passing once to Allen and once to Aguirre, and adding a 16-yard run of his own. Aguirre got the touchdown from the three, and the kick made the halftime score 29-0.

Aguirre picked up his first pass interception in the third quarter, and set up Friona's fifth score. Mata ran 15 yards, and Barnett lofted a TD pass to Allen, wide open in the end zone. Montoya's kick went wide, but the lead became 35-0.

Early in the final period, Bovina was again forced to punt. Mata took the ball, circled to his right, and ran the ball to the Bovina 13. Three plays later, Barnett hit Allen for his second TD, and a 41-0

Friona lead.

Four plays later, Bovina was again punting. Mata was again running. This time he returned the kick 66 yards for the score, and although the kick went wide, Friona had a 47-0 lead.

Reserves were taking over by this time. The junior varsity saw most of the action in the final quarter. Tailback Jimmy Williams picked right up where Mata had left off, gaining 47 yards in five carries. He sparked the second unit to the last Friona score of the night with runs of 16, 9 and four yards. Barnett tried to run for two points but was stopped just short, and Friona led, 53-0 with 3:26 left to play.

Bovina avoided the shutout by driving 71 yards in just three plays. Doug Johnson got the touchdown from 35 yards out, and Todd Ware's kick made it 53-7.

So well did the Chiefs dominate that they never had to punt in the game.

Mata was the leading rusher with 167 yards in 21 carries (a nifty 8.0 yards-per-try). Aguirre added 85 yards, only touching the ball four times--a gaudy 21.3 yards-per-try average.

Mata returned three punts for 178 yards (59.3 per return). Allen caught five passes for 40 yards, and Aguirre caught three for 43 yards.

Defensively, the team played a heads-up game, intercepting three passes and recovering one fumble.

Split end Ben Neelley suffered a twisted knee while being tackled early in the game, and sat out the rest of the contest.

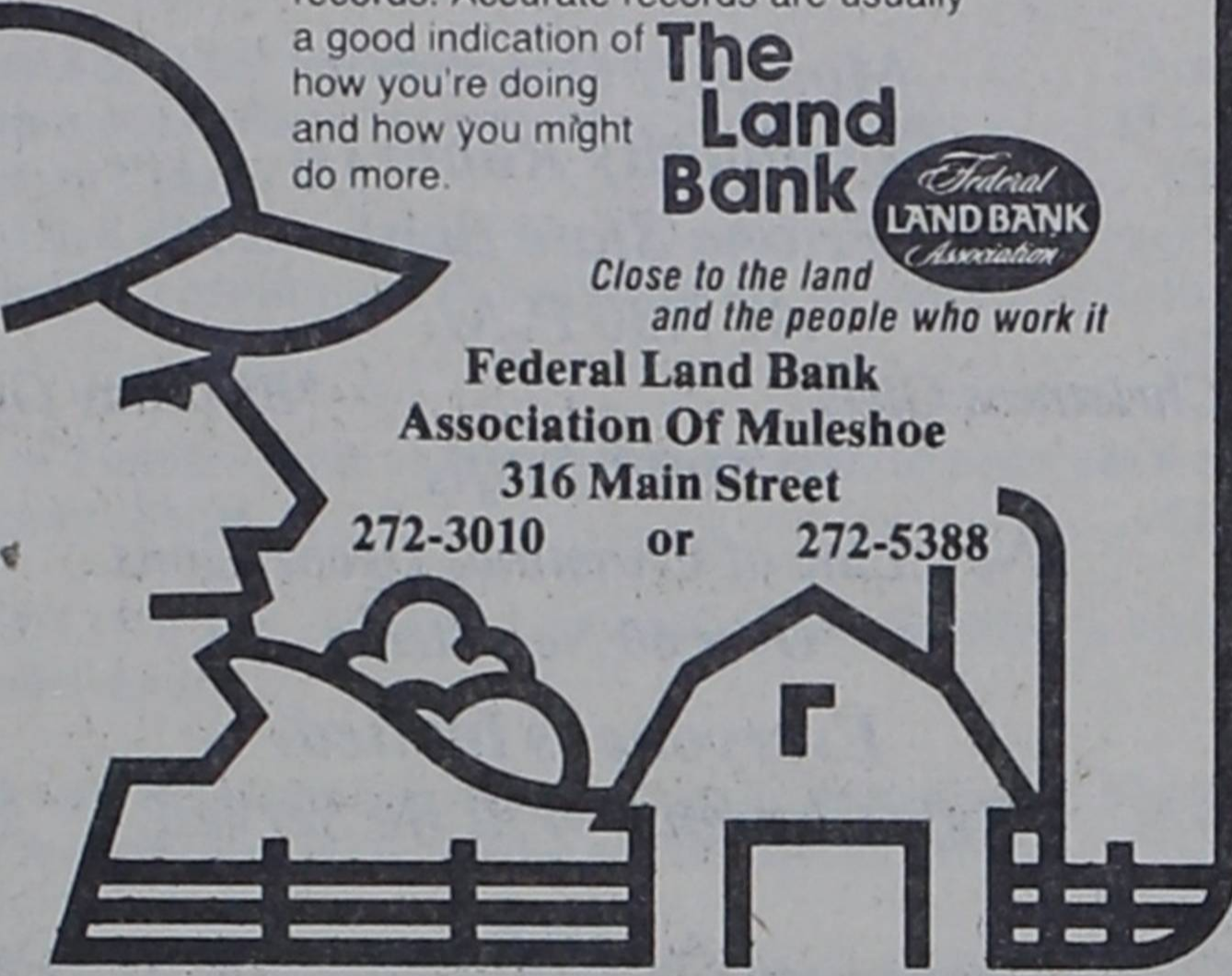
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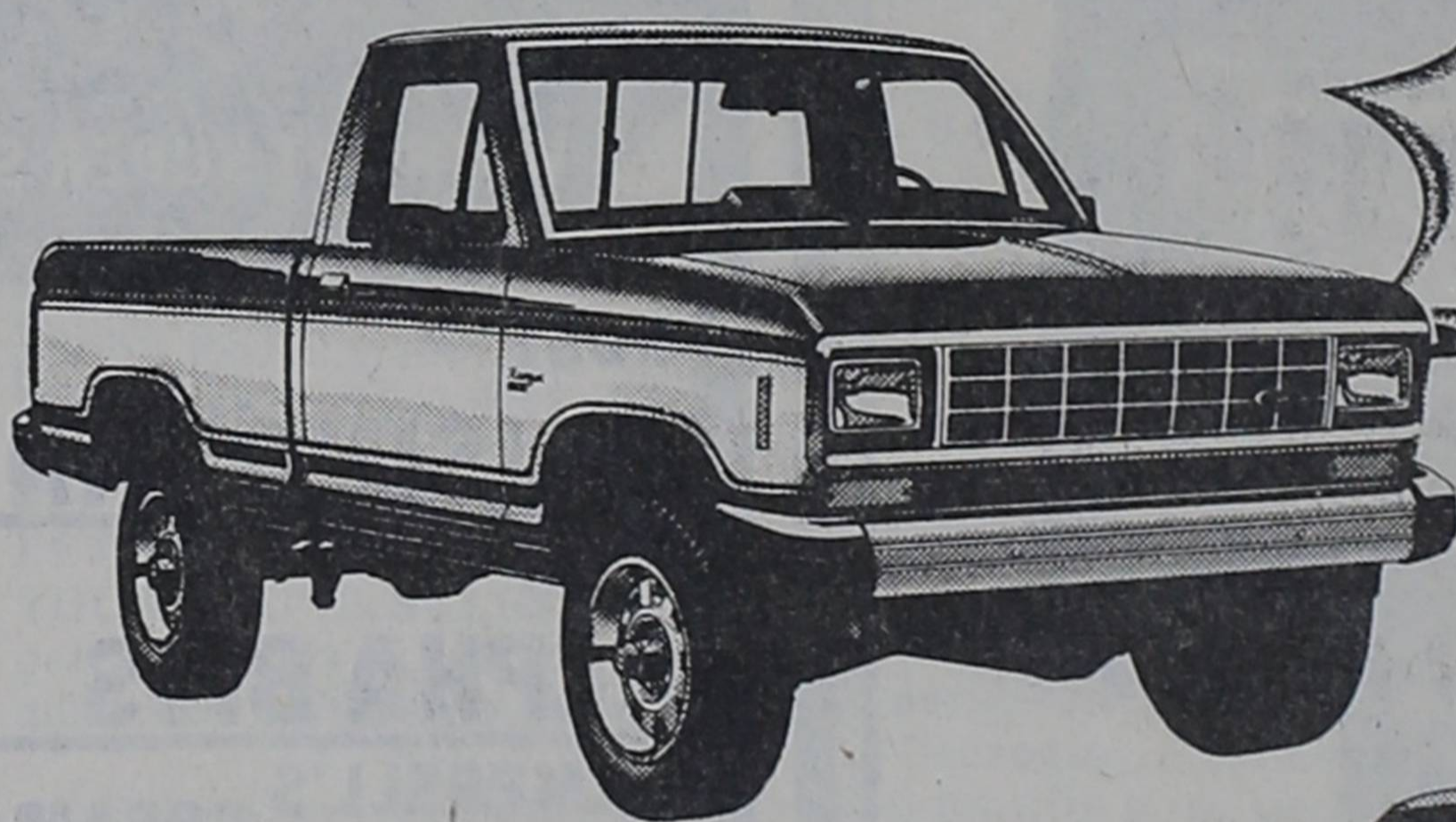
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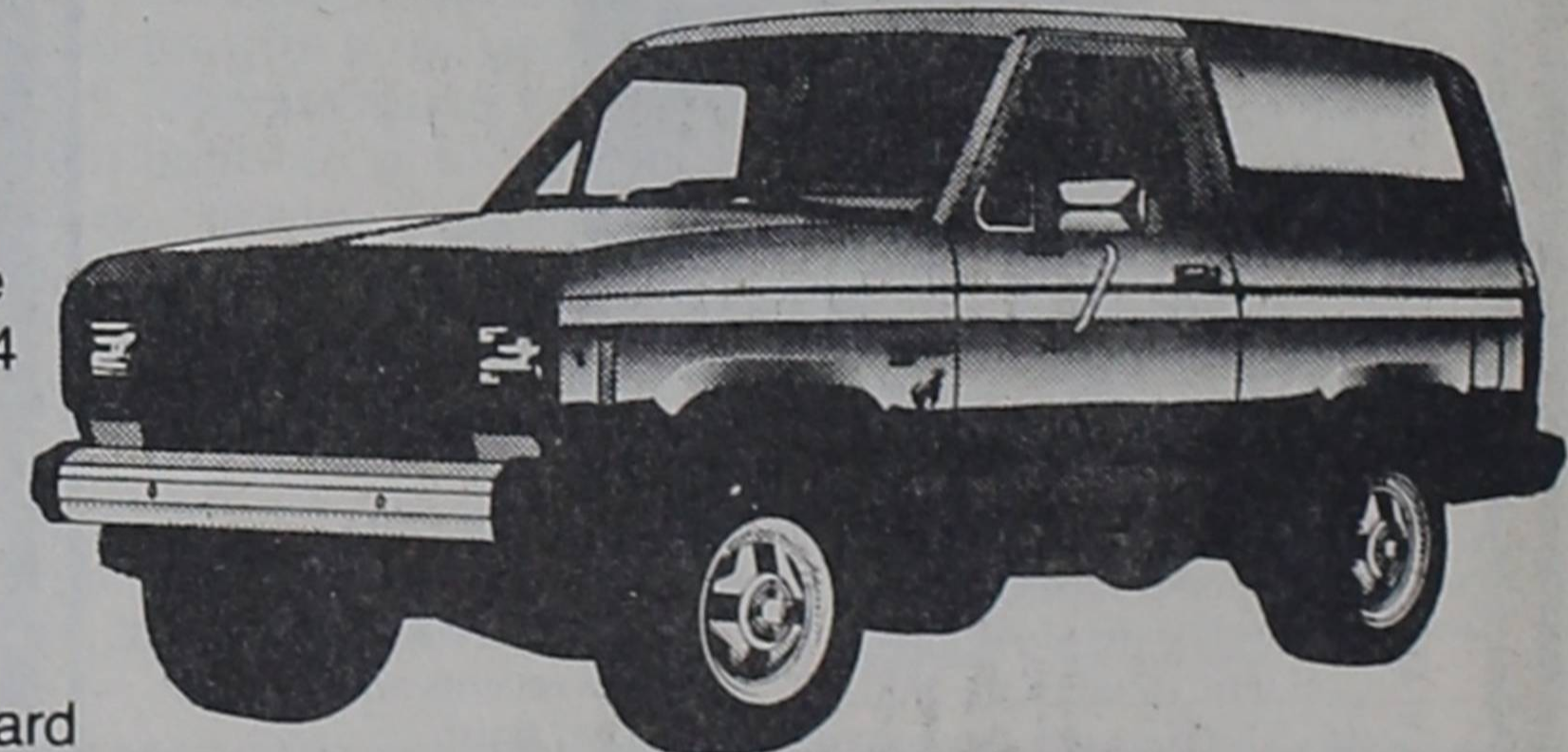
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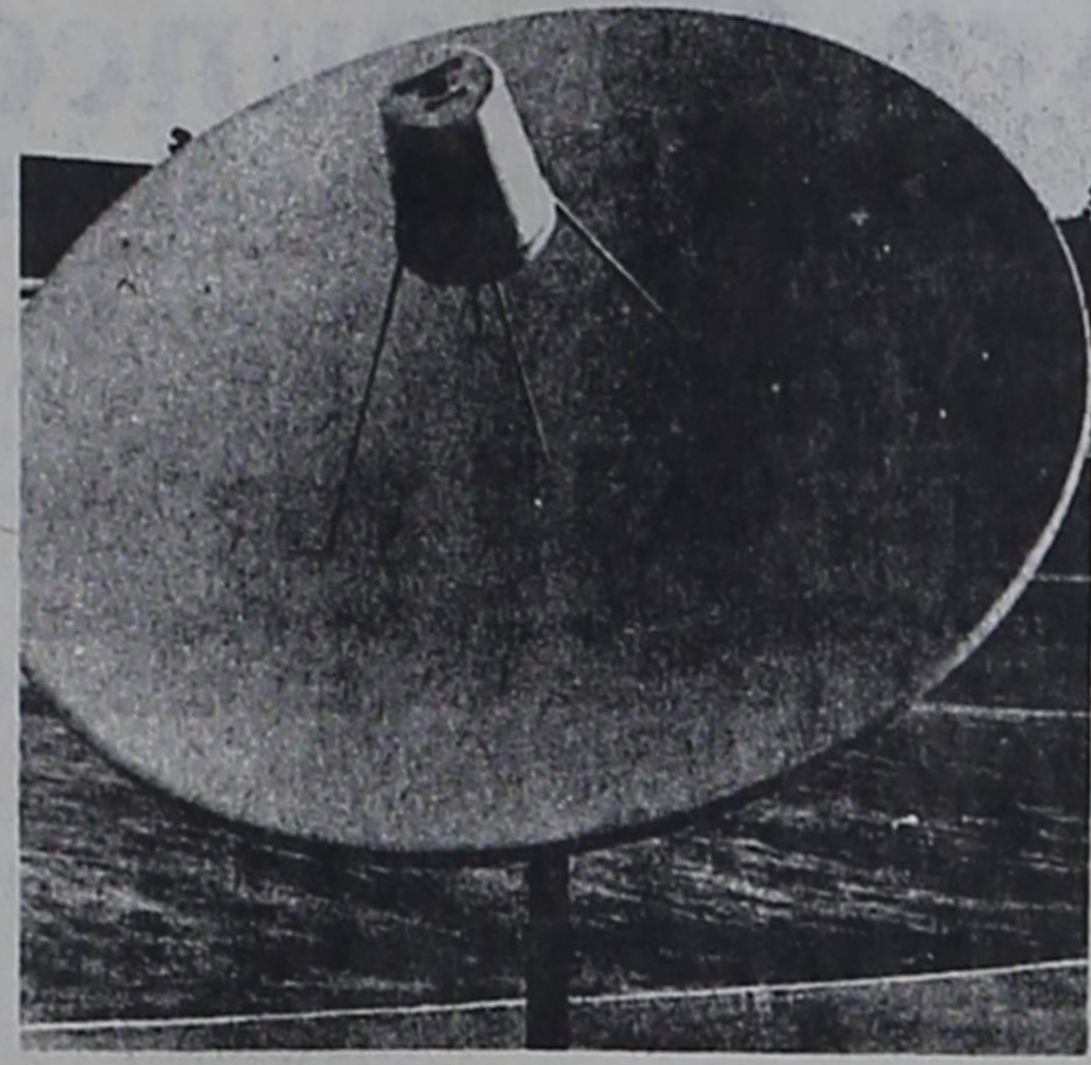
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Freshmen Top 'Cats By 37-0

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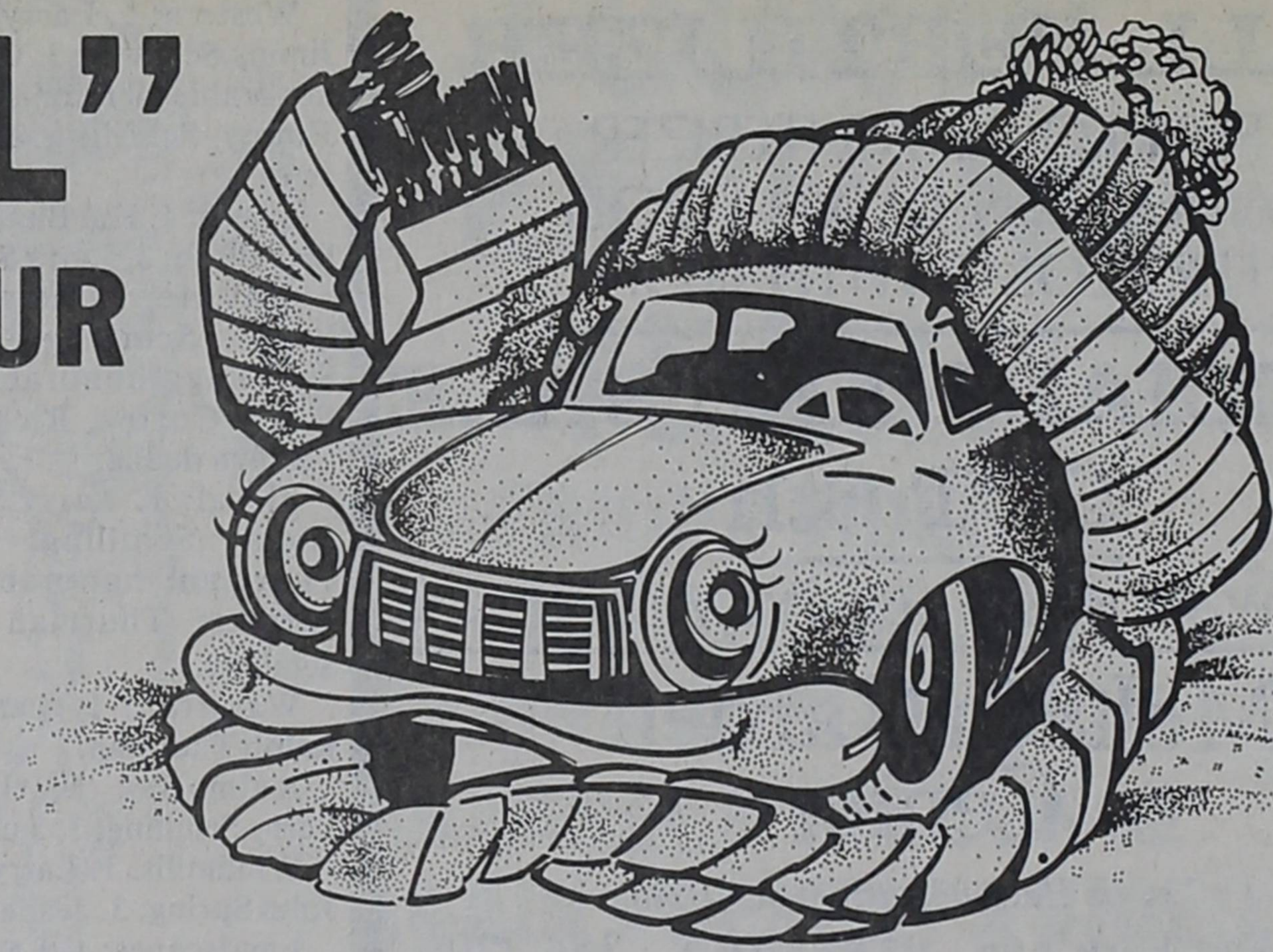
Game Time Adjusted

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CATARACTS--When Is Surgery Recommended?

We do not recommend surgery for the cataract patient until we have made a thorough examination of the eye and have carefully considered the past and present health of the eye. We do recommend surgical intervention to a patient who meets the following criteria:

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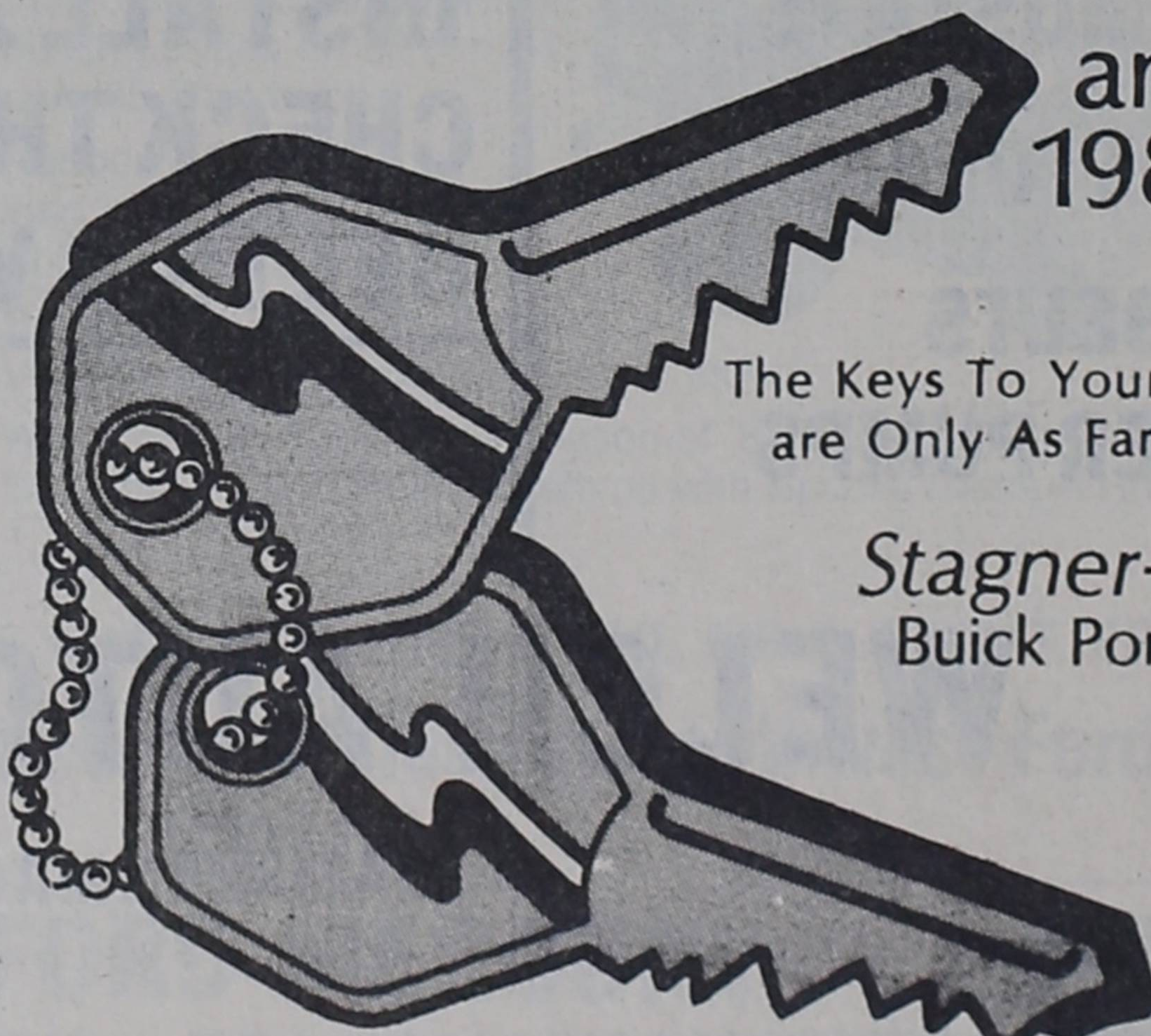
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Brent Hinkle Featured In "Power Play" Magazine

(Editor's note: The following article, on Friona High School student Brent Hinkle was included in the October/November, 1984 issue of Commodore Home Computing's Power Play magazine.)

A PENDULUM'S SWING
Jeffery Brent Hinkle, 17, of Friona, Texas, is an explorer in the high-tech world of computers. As a junior in high school, Brent discovered ways to use his

Commodore 64 and 1541 disk drive that are complex and exciting, practical and fun. His creations range from sophisticated simulations of pendulum motions involving high math and graphics to football programs that analyze opponents' offenses and determine the probability of successful defense!
His project at ISEF '84 explored the computer simulation of simple and compound pendulum motions. It began as a science

experiment earlier in the year. Brent explains, "I thought about how to do the mathematics and started to work it out on paper. It took over an hour and six pages of paper just to work out four points of pendulum movement!"
The BASIC program Brent created for the project and plugged into the 64's memory, however, can plot and graphically display 200 points in a little over four minutes!

Speed, of course, is one of the best reasons for using a 64 in high-level mathematical applications, but with a pendulum simulation, there was another important consideration.

"Speed was the big reason for using the computer," Brent says, "but the 64 also helped me eliminate several physical restraints. The size of the actual pendulum is one and overcoming friction is another. With the 64 we can eliminate friction and size restraints to some extent, until the numbers get too large."

He's used the computer for about 18 months and was not exposed to computers before that "except in books and magazines." Self-taught with the aid of the manual, Brent just jumped in and made the 64 do what he wanted done!

"With the kinds of programs I'm writing now, however, I think I'm getting close to the memory limits of the 64 in BASIC programming," Brent notes.

"BASIC requires quite a bit of manipulation in terms of memory and I'm having to chain several programs together just to get my ideas to work."

There is a lot that Brent is just beginning to understand about the 64, he says. "The pendulum simulation is not in real time," he explains, "but it easily could be." For that, Brent says he needs an understanding of machine language and has yet to tap that vast resource within the 64.

"I suspect it would have been very close to real time if I had been able to use machine language, instead of BASIC," he adds.

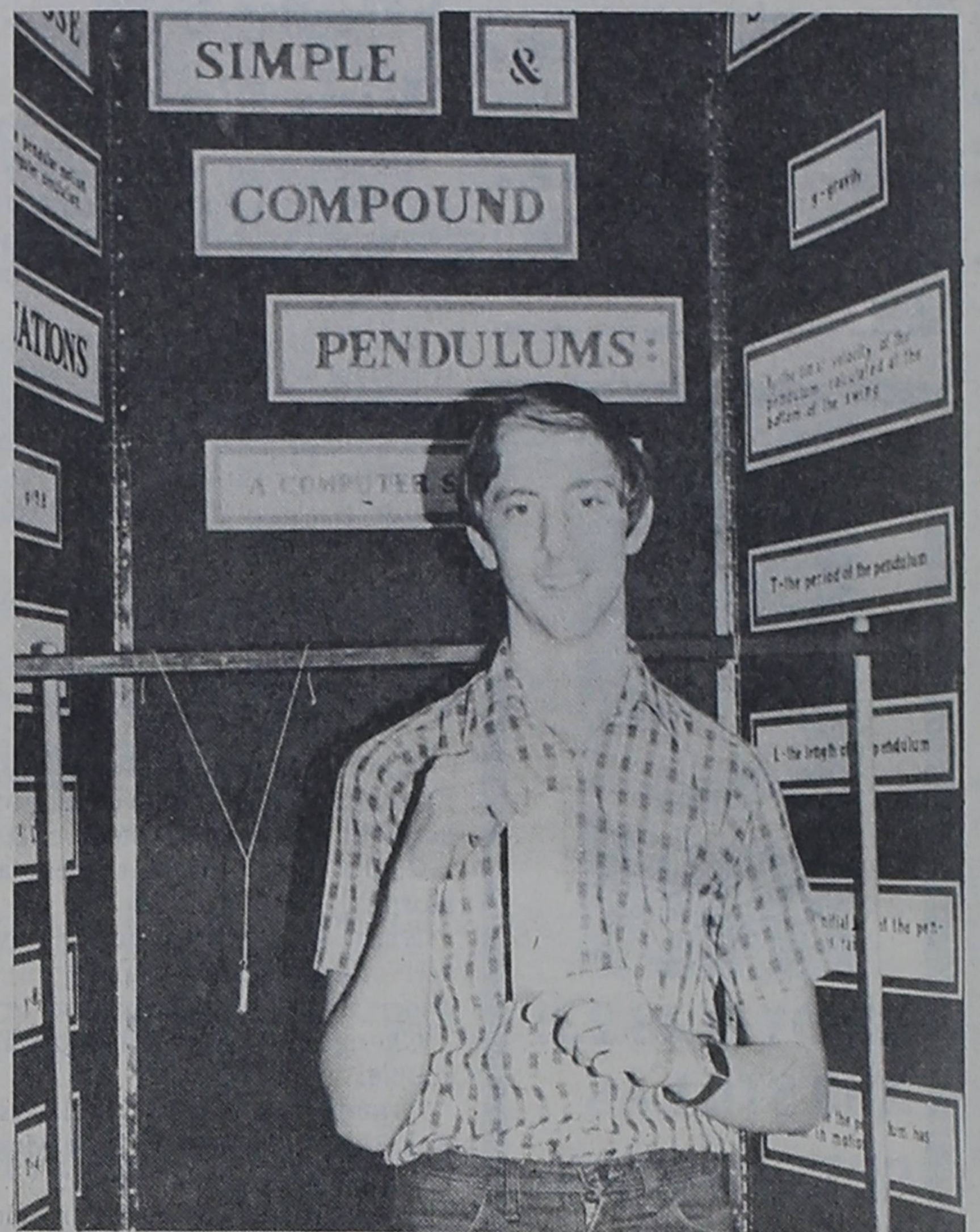
Brent is not limiting his computer skills to the theoretical, however. Earlier this year, he worked through a commercial football program, making major modifications to it that allowed the school's coaches to break down plays that opponents run against the team.

"It will scout about 200 plays that an opponent may run against us and tell us what holes in the line they are most likely to come through," he comments. The "football scout" also will predict the probability of pass plays or running plays--what's likely to happen anywhere on the field under game conditions!

But does it work? "The program has been very helpful to the football team," Brent says with a smile. "They have enjoyed using it to predict some of their defenses."

Although he humbly admits that it doesn't work every time, Brent adds "...in general, it's very successful, I believe."

Like many Commodore users, Brent is at the cutting edge of a new technology that he intends to explore to its limits. He is looking at producing a comprehensive general ledger program with an eye towards the commercial software market. In the meantime, helping his Friona High School team win a few games is satisfying enough!

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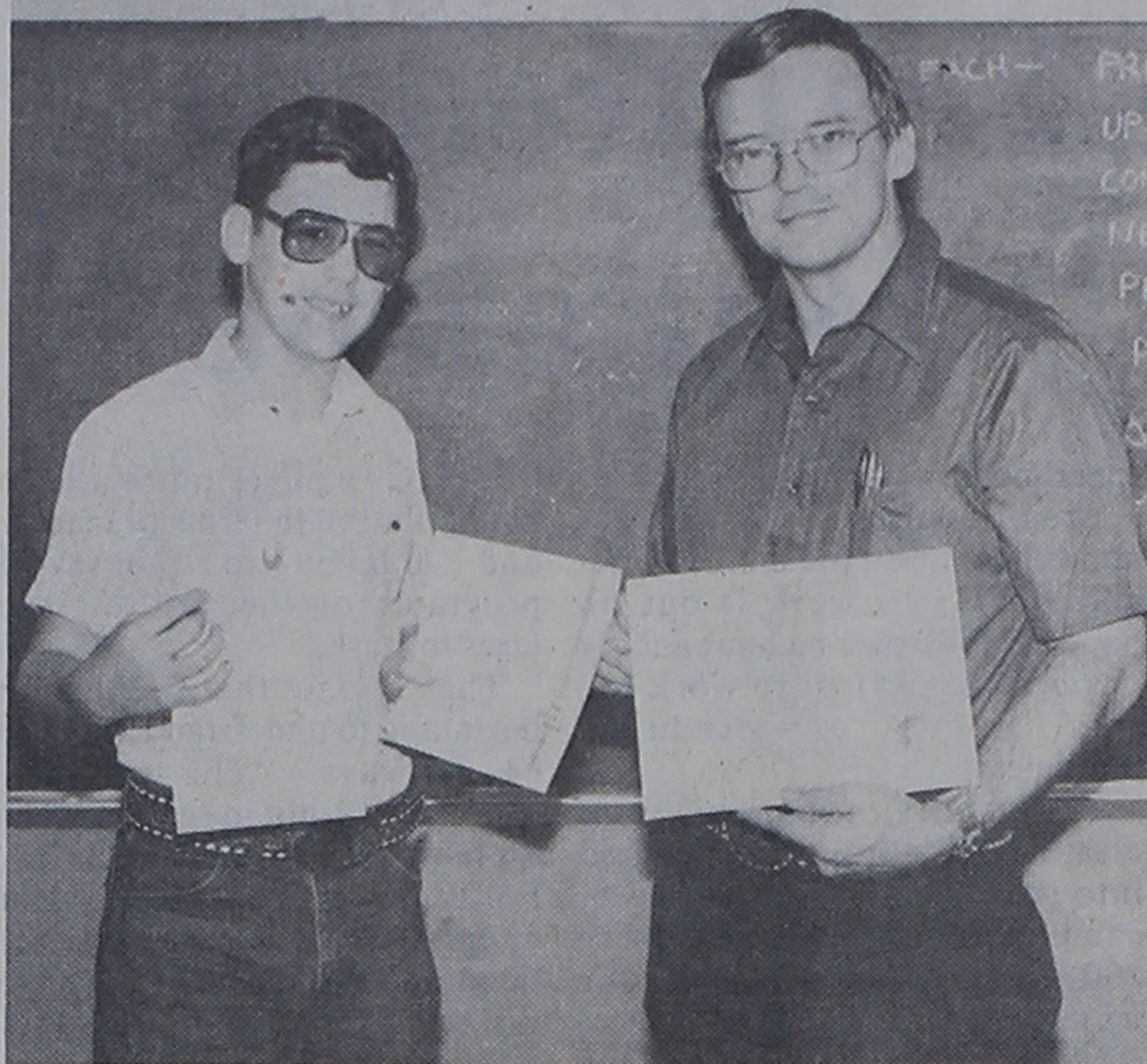
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Friona Boy Wins Contest

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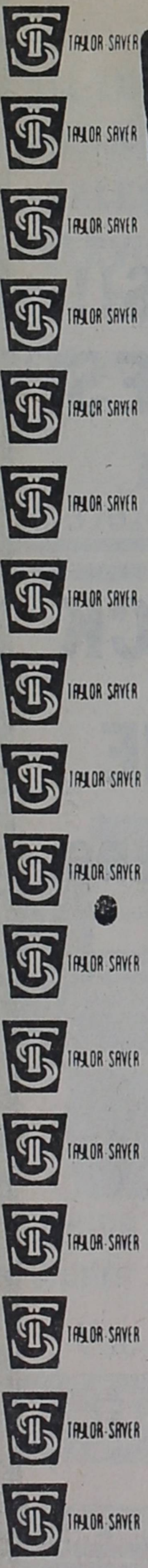
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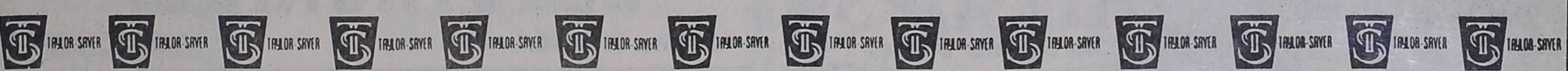
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Four Earn \$200 WT Scholarships

More than 300 students attending West Texas State University as freshmen have been awarded \$200 Don and Sybil Harrington Scholarships for the 1984-85 academic year.

Scholarships are awarded each year to students who were members of high school National Honor Society chapters or similar organizations.

Don and Sybil Harrington honor scholars may receive an additional President's Honor Scholarship if they score 28 or more of a possible 36 on the American College Test (ACT) or 1,220 points of a possible 1,600 on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) college entrance examinations. They receive an additional \$100.

Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholarships were begun in 1979 with an endowment from the

Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation of Amarillo. Additional grants have grown to a total endowment of \$1.2 million and students are eligible to retain the scholarship for four years at WTSU if they maintain a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale.

A competitive scholarship of \$200 or more at WTSU waives out-of-state tuition.

Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars from Friona are Beatrice Ramirez, daughter of Tomas Ramirez; Jo Schueler, daughter of Herbert and Cecelia Schueler; and Kristi Britting, daughter of Lee and Karen Britting. All are graduates of Friona High School.

Richards Gets Top Backing

In a press conference over the weekend, U.S. Rep. Kent Hance and U.S. Rep. Kika de la Garza, chairman of the powerful U.S. House Agriculture Committee, endorsed the candidacy of Don Richards, Democratic nominee for the 19th Congressional District.

The two Texas congressmen headed up a breakfast early Saturday at which a number of West Texas agriculture leaders again announced their support for Richards in his race to replace Hance.

Richards, a former aide to Hance, hosted the breakfast for the West Texas agriculture leaders to announce their unified endorsement for his campaign.

"I endorse Don Richards and support him," said Hance, who had been the featured speaker at a fund-raising dinner for Richards in Plainview last week. "His philosophy is my philosophy and my philosophy is his philosophy. Don is a conservative. He did an excellent job while on my staff in Washington and Lubbock."

De la Garza, congressman from Mission, Texas, who has been chairman of the House Agriculture Committee for four years, also echoed his desire for Richards' election: "I want this young man in Congress and on the Agriculture Committee. I know him and can work with him."

"West Texas needs someone who understands agriculture and can be effective in protecting the agriculture interests of this area. Don has worked in Washington as a member of Hance's staff. He knows and understands the legislative process. Don's opponent can speak to the Republican leadership all he wants to--but I'm going to be chairman of the agriculture committee and I

want someone like Don Richards who knows agriculture and how to protect farmers. Like George Mahon and Kent Hance, Don Richards has compassion for people, but is frugal and a conservative who will hold the line on spending."

Hance also spoke to the effectiveness of Richards in the U.S. House: "A Republican on the Ag Committee, or any committee, is a minority within a minority. However, Don Richards as a conservative Democrat will be the critical swing vote with much more influence than a Republican. There is no way that I could have been as effective for West Texas as I was had I been a Republican. Don Richards will make a great congressman. I cannot recommend him any higher, and I fully support him."

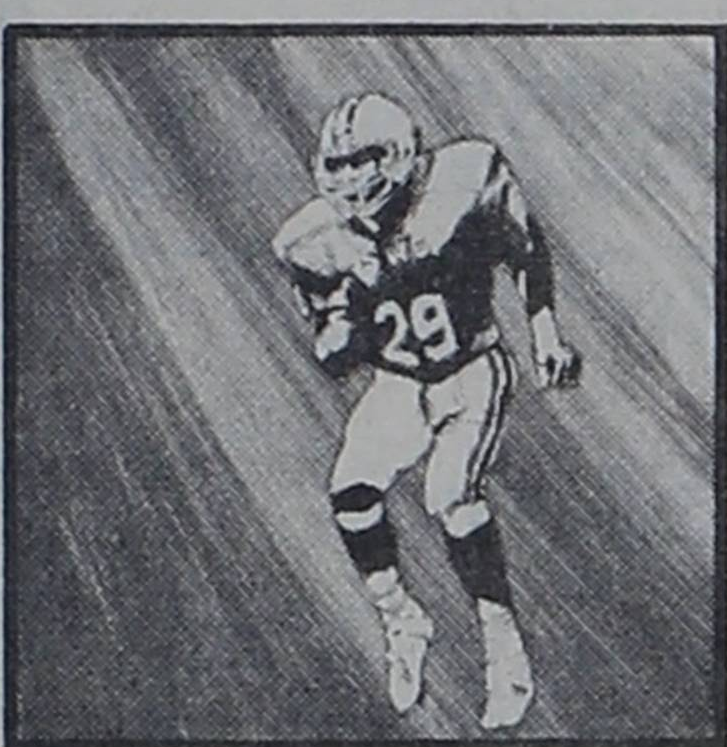
