Stans Says Violations Of Laws Unintentional

WASHINGTON (AP) -Former Commerce Secretary Maurice H. Stans pleaded guilty today to five misdemeanor counts of violating campaign laws while he was chairman of Richard M. Nixon's 1972 reelection finance committee.

He was the third member of Nixon's Cabinet to plead guilty or be convicted of criminal offenses in the post-Watergate era.

Although he pleaded guilty, Stans said his violations of the campaign laws were unintentional. "In each of these transactions I made a good faith

SAIGON (AP)- An Air airliner en route from Vientiane, Laos, to Saigon with at least six crewmen and 21 passengers aboard was shot down Wednesday by Viet Cong forces in South Vietnam's central highlands near Pleiku, government officials said. There was no immediate word on whether there were any

One of these transactions involved \$81,000 in cash turned over to campaign aide Frederick C. LaRue, who became the paymaster for the Watergate cover-up. LaRue is scheduled to be sentenced Friday on his plea of guilty to taking part in the cover-up.

Stans said in the statement that he pleaded guilty "after long deliberation and full advice of counsel."

NEW MEDICAL SCHOOL IN FORT WORTH?

Need For Doctors Underscored

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) -Texas needs more doctors, especially in rural areas, and it wouldn't hurt if a lot of them were women, the House Higher Education Committee was told Tuesday

Dozens of students, administrators and alumnae of Texas Woman's University filled the House chamber to support creation of a TWU medical school in

Fort Worth. WAITING GAME Three other medical

school bills had to wait for nearly four hours while the TWU bill was debated. Two are enabling legislation for the later creation of medical schools in Corpus Christi and in the Rio Grande Valley. The third calls for a merger of the Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine at Fort Worth with North Texas

State University. All bills will be studied by a subcommittee.

'We're in a state of readiness to proceed," said Dr. John A. Guinn, president of TWU. The planning already has been completed and paid for, he said, and the land will be donated.

Rep. Fred Head, D-Troup, committee chairman, pressed Guinn on whether he would support a requirement that 20 per cent of the students at the proposed school contract to serve four or more years in rural areas, which he said are desperate for medical service.

'YES, SIR' Guinn hedged by saying this could be accomplished voluntarily by TWU's selection of students sensitive to the needs of rural

"Yes or no," Head de-

"I would be in favor of trying it, and I would support

'Guinn said. And could he guarantee that a teaching hospital - a principal expense of any medical school - would be provided at no expense to the state, Head asked.

"Yes, sir," Guinn replied. Guinn was asked why the College Coordinating Board last year rejected the TWU proposal by an 8-7 vote. According to Sen. Betty Andujar, R-Fort Worth, who opposes the school, the closeness of that vote was a tribute to the diligent lobbying by Guinn, since the board originally was unanimous in opposition to

Guinn modestly said the only reason he could give for the board's final, narrow rejection of the proposal was

pushed hard enough to get the information on our

capabilities to the board." Guinn said TWU was going over the head of the board to the legislature because it considered the issue "so urgent and necessary we will take any honorable steps to secure this school.

Several witnesses testified that TWU can make a unique contribution in the field of health care. The sponsor of the bill, Rep. Doyle Willis, D-Fort Worth, stressed that TWU has a good record of accomplishment in areas that other schools find troublesome. For example, he said, 13 per cent of the TWU enrollment is Mexican-American and 14 per cent is

Rep. R. B. McAlister, D-Lubbock, liked the emphasis to become doctors. "I wouldn't be hornswaggled if a woman turned out to be a better doctor than a man, with her TLC (tender loving care)," he said.

Sam Stone Jr., an Austin lawyer representing the Texas Medical Association, told the committee the TMA "does not oppose any medical school being built or authorized." But he said TMA urges a comprehen sive study before any new medical school is created. and he said TMA believes existing medical schools should be fully funded.

That wasn't good enough for Rep. Frank Gaston, R-Dallas. He said he expected TMA, as the leading professional organization in the field, to take a stand and give the committee its ad-

The World At-A-Glance

University of Pennsylvania professor estimates that 65 per cent of America's black teenagers are unemployed. He says if the economy doesn't improve quickly an entire generation of young blacks will enter adulthood in the 1980s without ever having held a job. Dr. Bernard Anderson, assistant professor of industry at Penn's Wharton School of Finance and Commerce, said about 570,000 of the approximately 880,000 black youths between 16 and 19 can't find jobs. He said this compares with a jobless rate of about 25 per cent among the nation's 7.5 million white teenagers. "The implications and ramifications are absolutely disastrous," he said. "What this means is that a very large number of black teen-agers, especially in the inner cities, cannot look with any optimism on holding a fulltime job for any length of time

between now and adulthood."

NEWTOWN, Conn. (AP) - The attic walls of an old house have vielded dozens of cartoons sketched more than 40 years ago by humorist James Thurber. Frumpy, stooped men march along one wall on their way to fish. Nearby, a dog takes a typical Thurber-dog nap in a chair.

Some of the characters have names presumably people and animals the humorist knew when he lived in the house from 1931 to 1934. The Thurber cartoons were discovered when the current occupant of the house, Allen Coster, was in the attic of his home trying to figure out where an old staircase went. "There is a presumption of fraud, that the marriage was one of convenience for the purpose of getting a resident visa, if divorce or annulment follows within two years or if the parties do not live together," said immigration Judge B.Q. Maldanado.

Mongiello said he has heard of "arrangers"—those who put an alien and a U.S. citizen in contact for such

marriages although "we haven't prosecuted any

Mongiello said the biggest problem is with Mexicans by sheer volume alone, but we run into these cases in-volving all nationalities. In New York they mostly have problems with marriages involving Europeans and people from the Caribbean. Here, because of the proximity of the Mexican border, out biggest problem is with Mexicans."

Mongiello regards rising affluence abroad and improved international travel as the biggest contributors to the problem. "More aliens have the money and the availability of international travel than, say, 10 years ago," he explained.

To combat the problem,

the government is adding \$34 million to its budget just to chase illegal aliens out of this country. "We really need \$50 million more to do the job right," he said.

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Bound To Happen

It was bound to happen sooner or later. The federal agency charged with keeping illegal aliens out of the United States has turned up a couple of illegals working in its national headquarters.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service admitted that two members of a cleanup crew, hired through a contracting firm, were arrested recently as illegal aliens. One had been working in the Washington building since December.

It isn't surprising since the entry of illegals has reached epidemic proportions over the past few years. If every government agency was subjected to a good shaking, numbers of aliens probably would tumble out of bureaucratic trees.

While the episode in Washinigton has a humorous aspect, there is nothing funny about the illegal alien problem itself. Authorities estimate that not less than 4 in this country illegally, with more than 1 million holding jobs which could be filled by citizens and legal

Agency officials have stressed recently that the jobs taken by the illegal aliens reach into all sectors of the economy and go far beyond the farm laborer tasks they

I would like to know the meaning of Christ's words on marriage in Matthew 19:11, 12. Sounds like a put-down for the great institution



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

investments, seeming to prefer instead a safer depository for their funds — in banks and bonds, for in-This coincided with a

decline of the stock market as an outlet for discretionary funds. Since the mutual fund industry was invested almost entirely in stocks, it was believed they couldn't do better than stocks

Last year the flight from mutual funds slowed. In fact, net sales totaled \$1.4 billion, the best sales year since It wasn't that redemptions didn't continue; they did. The change resulted from a brand-new

The new item was the money market fund, which invests in bank certificates deposits, commercial paper-money lent by one to anothercompany Treasury bills and the like,

all of which pay interest. Since interest rates hit historic highs, the money market funds, so called because they can be turned into cash quickly, did extremely well. Their sales

soared. Meanwhile, the rest of the industry has been doing In 1974, sales of poorly. growth funds, which are heavily invested in common stocks, fell 40 per cent. Sales of the "growth and income" category, less volatile, fell 26

per cent. In fact, redemptions in the growth category totaled almost as much as sales. And in the growth and income category, redemptions actually exceeded sales by more than \$300 million.

But the money market funds sold more than \$2.3 billion of shares, an enormous leap in one year from sales of just \$3 million. 'Money market funds were clearly the star on the financial stage in 1974," said one fund president.

But now comes the test. Interest rates are falling, and it was high interest rates that almost solely gave the money market funds that big boost. Meanwhile, the stock market seems to have regained some vitality.

So far, redemptions of money market funds have been relatively modest, although rising. But can these funds continue to attract customers?

The test isn't long especially if a new investment climate, based on a belief in economic expansion, takes hold. money market funds depended to a great extent on uncertainty and insecurity in the stock market.

Dear Doctor: I read with interest your discussion of "cryoglobulin" as a factor in

As a longtime suffering female with cold allergy hope that I might have found the right diagnosis for my condition. I shall look for a doctor to help me. In the meantime, I am curious to know what type of treatment would overcome the lack of cryoglobulin in my blood. What type of food would be helpful, if any? — M.G.

Cryoglobulin is a form of protein that appears in the bloodstream and which, when exposed to cold, tends to gel or crystallize there. It can be a factor in some cold but necessarily

It is its presence, not absence, that is the factor in a person who has a cold allergy. Exposure to the cold makes the substance change its form, as I described above.

Foci has no bearing on cryogobulin production, and it is not clear just how or why the substance appears, or why it behaves differently in some people than in others. If you have an allergy to cold, then the cryoglobulin

If a nose is made smaller, logically there should be an excess of flesh that once covered a larger structure. Could I expect sagging skin? Mrs. N.O. You are correct in that the

incisions are made from within the nostrils. The surgeon then proceeds to remove some of the cartilage, cutting it down to the desired shape. He will also adjust the excess nasal tissue to the new shape. You won't have to worry about sagging skin.

A recent column plugging for the identification or marking of historic roads and places prompted a call from E. H. Forester. His father, P. E. Secret negotiations are under way to bring conservative independent Sen. Harry F. Byrd, Jr., of Virginia back the Democratic party, a return likely to suffocate lingering Republican hopes for Southern Democratic conversions.

Although the joint committee report recommends that the Congress consider "inviting" the -Allow commercial and public Public Broadcasting Service to submit proposals for operating the congressional TV system, committee officials say the Metcalf-Brooks resolutions don't urge such

an invitation. The measures instead leave operation of the system, as well as coverage ground rules, to be decided the House and Senate organizations concerned with the floor proceedings be allowed on a matter, the officials say.


Limbs, Leaves Are Sought
