PARIS (AP) - Aristotle Onassis left his widow Jacqueline about \$120 million, most of his valuable paintings, and trust funds of \$15 million each to her two children by President John F. Kennedy, family sources

They said the bulk of the Greek shipping magnate's estimated \$600 million fortune will go to his only surviving child, 24-year-old

Art dealers in Athens conservatively estimate the value of Onassis'collection of paintings by Gauguin, El Greco, Van Gogh and Picasso at \$20 million. One dealer said that several paintings already were hanging in Mrs. Onassis' Fifth Avenue apartment in

Sources close to the family said Jacqueline had received a settlement at the time of her marriage to Onassis to provide for the two Kennedy children through a trust fund, with cash for herself and unlimited expenses

Onassis died in Paris Saturday at the age of 69. Doctors gave bronchopulmonary infection as the cause of death.

Also expected to get Senate and House committee action today and Tuesday are proposals for emergency military aid for Cambodia. Democrats in both chambers have criticized any increase in aid, and the House committee already has rejected one compromise.

Ullman said the \$3-billion tax credit proposal for home buyers, approved by the Senate Finance Committee, must be taken off the antirecession tax cut bill.

Herman Schneebeli, R-Pa., senior GOP member of the Ways and Means Committee, agreed that the tax cut bill is the wrong place for the home buyers provision. He, too, said he is still opposed to attaching the ailing companies provision.

Despite signs that the nation's current economic difficulties are easing, Simon said it is realistic to estimate budget deficits of at least \$45 billion in fiscal 1975 and \$80 billion in fiscal 1976.

"As enormous as these deficit figures are, they do not represent an outer limit of what might actually develop," Simon said.

"Frankly, I am fearful that the capital cannot meet such heavy demands for funds from the federal government without producing serious adverse economic consequences."

All signs show that the nation's current, short-term economic difficulties are becoming less serious, Simon said

But he added that the end of the recession is not yet within grasp.

"The unemployment rate, most recently at 8.2 per cent, is likely to go up again before it comes down and there will no doubt be many other pieces of bad economic news reported in the coming

months," he said. "I do suggest, however, that the downward slide of the economy is losing momentum, that the market system still works and that natural cyclical forces will bring a bottoming out of the recession this year.

THOUGH POPULAR **Cultural Lures** 

Heavily In Red PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Museums, orchestras, the theater and ballet are more popular than ever, but they're drowning in red ink, according to a study of 49 cultural attractions in Philadelphia.

The Greater Philadelphia Cultural Alliance conducted the study to show the economic importance of culture in hopes of obtaining more financial support from the business community. Henry E. Putsch, executive director of the alliance,

says that while attendance at cultural events is steadily increasing, organizations such as the worldrenowned Philadelphia Orchestra are losing money.
"The Orchestra is always sold out, and there's only so much you can charge for tickets," he said. "The

money raised from tickets in no way covers expenses." The same holds true for other attractions, such as theater and ballet, he said. Orchestra tickets now cost \$2 to \$25, compared with \$1 to \$10 five years ago. Ballet or theater tickets are

priced at \$3.50 to \$10 today, compared with \$2.50 to \$10 The 49 organizations considered in the study employed a total of 5,100 persons and had a combined budget of \$64.1 million last year.

They reported operating deficits of \$35 million, and although most of the deficits were made up by government subsidies and individual and foundation contributions, year-end deficits still totaled \$2.5

Putsch says the major economic importance of cultural attractions is their "multiplier effect" money spent in the city by people who come to attend cultural events. He says the actual dollar impact from culture's multiplier effect is \$160 million a year in

And although local cultural events are sometimes costly, they are still less expensive than vacations away from home, says Putsch.

"We're finding that a lot of persons in the area are staying here now and going to things here instead of going away for vacations," he said. "And we think that businesses in this area need to know how important the culture business is here."

UNION BEACH, N.J. (AP) - "Daddy locks me up and I don't use anything to get out," says Dennis Burke Jr., a 4-year-old who specializes in Houdini-like

escapes from ropes, chains and handcuffs. The youngster learned his bag of tricks by watching his father, Dennis Burke, an amateur magician who performs with the boy at charity functions under the billing of Dionysius Burke & Co.

D.B. Jr., as his father calls him, recently amazed the audience at a March of Dimes telethon when he escaped from chains and two pairs of handcuffs in 40

His father, a production worker at Tenco Co. in Linden, says the boy escaped from padlocked chains at a Cub Scout dinner in 14 seconds. Burke says Dennis first tried to imitate him by escaping from ropes and chains. Burke wraps his tiny son in one 11-foot chain and another 3-foot chain,

The father says, "As though mechanized, Dennis begins to jump and wriggle, sometimes using his teeth until the chains begin to loosen. His format varies from standing to sitting, but whichever is more comfortable, it seldom takes him more than seconds to release

himself "Just to show that he was tightly secured, he shows you the impresssions left on his skin from the links." Dennis, who often makes his escapes behind closed doors, insists he doesn't use a spare key. But he won't say how he does it. He'll only say, "It's all tricks."

struggle. EVEN SECRETARY OF STATE Henry Kissinger has quietly admitted to Hussein that a golden chance was ignored after the Israeli-Syrian disengagement agreement

"Dr. Kissinger had access to our plan for Israeli withdrawal from the Jordan River," a key minister told us privately. "But when he showed it to the Israelis, all they talked about was continuing military control of the entire West Bank." So Jordan's plan got nowhere.

Would you tell me a little about clubfoot? Is it hereditary? Can it be inherited from a member of the family who has bunions? Will an infant who is corrected with a cast always have to wear corrective shoes? And after the feet are

corrected will there be

normal growth? - L.M. Clubfoot is a deformity in which the foot is turned inward and downward. In other forms, the foot may be turned upward and inward or in other combinations of deformity. Common to all forms is an inability to place the sole of the foot squarely

Clubfoot is always congenital (present at birth) and it may also be hereditary, although not necessarily. But it has no connection whatever with bunions. It occurs in about one in a thousand births, and in about half of the cases both feet are involved. In some instances the fetal foot becomes trapped in an abnormal position in the womb. Sometimes a defect in cartilage development is the primary cause. And, as I indicated above, in some cases heredity is the sole factor

Earliest possible detection, and by this I mean at needles? By all means, ask birth, is essential in order to get the maximum results

from treatment, wnich should begin in the first month of life. Usually a cast is applied and used until the child begins to walk. The cast is changed periodically to adjust for any correction made. If the cast is discontinued prematurely, the foot may revert to the deformed state.

After the cast period, corrective shoes are usually required, often until bone growth has ceased. If treatment has been successful up to this point, normal development can be expected. However, at any time during treatment the bone specialist may decide that surgery is necessary. This is done often to correct

a defective heel cord. Clubfoot will not affect a child's general physical development.

Incidentally, during the corrective period, it is best for the child to sleep squarely on its back to counter the natural tendency of the foot to turn in an abnormal direction.
