There should not be any controversy on those things which constitute the very heart and life of Christianity. I speak of those things which, when present Christianity is present, and when absent, Christianity is absent.

But, what are some of these things? What are we believe about them? How are we to correct the uses? And, how are we to agree on them? To be continued






