DETROIT (AP) - Thousands of laid off auto workers begin an uncertain financial struggle next week when the exhaustion of special jobless benefits cuts their unemployment pay by up to two thirds. Chrysler will turn off the tap on its Supplemental Unemployment Benefits (SUB) fund Friday. Massive and prolonged layoffs have depleted the fund's cash reserves. When that happens, 33,400 laid off production workers will lose between \$30 and \$110 a week.

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) - The Khmer Rouge insurgents have cut the supply road and railway between the Thai border and Battambang, Cambodia's second largest city, while continuing to threaten Phnom Penh from three directions, military sources reported. Almost round-the-clock fighting raged on the east bank of the Mekong River across from Phnom Penh, and fresh insurgent troops were reported moving into the area.

TAIPEI (AP) - Crowds ten deep lined the 15-mile route as the body of President Chiang Kai-Shek was carried to the Sun Yat-sen Memorial at noon today and placed in state there. Thousands burned incense sticks and candles on improvised Buddhist altars for the 87-year-old Generalissimo, a Christian convert. WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate appears ready to approve a bill aimed at forcing Americans to conserve energy without paying the sharply higher prices advocated by President Ford. The bill would give the president standby authority to ration gasoline in the event of another boycott by petroleum-producing countries, and includes long-range power for the states to determine how best to meet federal conservation goals.

WASHINGTON (AP) - In one of Washington's noisiest, most colorful demonstrations ever, more than 500 huge coal trucks rumbled outside the White House and the Capitol to protest the strip-mining legislation before Congress. The trucks were accompanied by some 2,000 miners, coal truck drivers and mine operators who claimed the legislation would cripple the coal mining industry and throw them out of work.



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

Overcash was elected mayor of Fort Worth Tuesday, defeating three other candidates.

Complete unofficial returns showed Overcash with 15,562 votes and J. C. Pace Jr., his leading rival, with 13,040.

Two others in the race, Gordon J. McKenna and Robert Haas, polled 1,258 and 489 votes, respectively. Overcash, who has served

one term as city councilman, will succeed Mayor R. M. Stovall, who decided not to seek reelection. Near perfect weather

apparently spured Fort Worth residents to the polls. More than 30,000 cast ballots-about 2,000 more than predicted.

Overcash was contacted by telephone in Neustadt, West Germany, and told of his victory. He is in that country for the funeral of his wife's mother.

Leonard Briscoe, Fort Worth's second black city council member, was upset at the polls, leaving the city with an all-white council and one made up of a majority of new faces.

Five of the nine council seats will be occupied by newcombers, but an April 29

Tying arrangements are another knot. If you buy one product you must buy another; that is, if you buy the copying machine you have to buy the paper too.

but did not find a formula that would lead to Congress repealing its ban on military aid to Turkey, which if continued threatens new reverses abroad for the U.S. rivalling Vietnam. The ban on aid to Turkey is the product of ethnic politics. Mr. Ford's failure to get aid resumed is the product of ethnic politics.

This explains genuine alarm inside the administration that numerically small but politically powerful ethnic groups are now influencing foreign policy as they long have been a force in domestic decision-making

NOWHERE HAS THE DANGER been clearer than in the ban on Turkish aid, pushed through Congress by an alliance of the small, potent Greek lobby and the large, potent Israeli lobby. "It is an unholy alliance," one senior White House aide told us, "but we have to deal with it."

To deal with it, Mr. Ford on March 21 found himself personally negotiating with the three liberal Democratic Congressmen who lead the Greek-Israeli alliance: Reps. Benjamin Rosenthal of New York John Brademas of Indiana and Paul Sarbanes of Maryland. The subject: what they demand from Turkey as the price for permitting resumption of aid

IN THE BACKGROUND of the President's secret negotiations with them is the disaster awaiting the U.S. within one month when Turkey begins closing down highly sensitive

American bases along the Turkish-Soviet border. The first bases earmarked for

closing are three or four "listening posts" (among a total of at least 30 U.S. installations in Turkey). These conduct intelligence posts operations, mostly electronic, against the Soviet Union — so secret that even the host country, Turkey,

has no access to the information obtained.

WITH THE FORMATION of a new Turkish government after months of a caretaker regime, the U.S. has



now been handed a list of the bases

Ford's personal effort with Rosenthal, Brademas and Sarbanes. His message: the moment Americans are evicted from a Turkish base in retaliation for cutting off aid, escalation of political tensions and recriminations on both sides may fatally undermine 30 years of U.S.-Turkish cooperation and affect Turkey's role in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO)

BUT THE BEST OFFER Mr. Ford could extract from the three Congressmen was this: let the Turks agree to resettle 30,000 Greek Cypriot refugees in Famagusta on the south coast of Cyprus, now Turkish-occupied, and "straighten out" the line between Famagusta and Nicosia; then, and only then, they might agree to lift the ban on Turkish aid.

Moreover, pro-Greek forces in Congress, enormously strengthened by their alliance with the pro-Israeli bloc, will not lift a finger to help the President unless the Turkish government moves first. Yet Turkey dwarfs Greece in terms of American interest.



SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -The solemn children of war touch and grasp and cling. They love to be held. They are suffering the "Orphans" Syndrome.'

'So many of these children have the orphans' syndrome and suffer severe emotional deprivation. They have unusual needs for love," says Dr. Alex Stalcup, supervising physician of "Operation Babylift" here. Stalcup has watched nearly 900 Vietnamese children being processed at the Army's Presidio. They suffer from pneumonia and

chicken pox, malnutrition, stomach worms and broken limbs. About 100 have been hospitalized. But of all the privations of

war, these children - called Thuy or T-21 or even "No Name" — suffer most from the privations of heart.





UCLA PROFESSOR OF PSYCHIATRY CONTENDS:

No One Should Be Sent To Jail For Smoking Pot

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) -Marijuana smoking is "a very intense, symbolic moral issue" and is not something people should be sent to jail for doing, says a UCLA professor of psychiatry.

The United States has a much bigger problem with the abuse of alcohol than with drugs, including heroin, Dr. J. Thomas Ungerlieder

JUST AS HARMFUL Ungerlieder served on the President's National Commission on Marijuana and Drug Abuse. He testified in support of a bill that would make possession of up to two ounces of marijuana a maximum fine of \$200, and no jail time.

night. "Jail is harmful to your health," the doctor said. Sen. Walter Mengden, R-Houston suggested the best way to avoid jail for possession of marijuana was not to possess it. Robbers and murderers could stay out of jail too, he said, if they

dering. Those crimes harm other people, the doctor said, while the use of marijuana in one's home does not. MORAL ISSUE

Mengden said a Houston man, whom he did not identify, smoked marijuana, then left his house with a rifle and began shooting "kids and elderly people."



Perhaps the heaviest tension of all strummed the nerves of Lee Elder, the first black man to compete here and for months the center of world-wide attention as a breaker of racial barriers.

"I do not feel like a great man in history," Elder told a presidential-style press conference Tuesday. "And that's the way I would like to

Elder pleaded to be left alone while facing the greatest challenge of his career, and added: "I am playing well enough to win if breaks go my way.

Nicklaus wore a mantle of supreme confidence - the kind you'd expect of a fourtime winner — as he returned from a week-end break with his massive hitting power and putting artistry more evident than ever.

In his practice round, he almost holed out from the fairway on the ninth hole, thrilling a clubhouse gallery. Then he spotted a couple of putts about 20 feet from the hole and knocked them into the cup.

"I am putting better," he told admirers who pursued him from the ninth green to the 10th tee.

Nicklaus, winner of his last two tournaments - the Doral and Heritage - and his former Ohio State schoolmate, Weiskopf, a pole-to-pole victor in last week's Greater Greensboro Open, have been established as the players to beat for the

Then came career home run No. 575 in his first time at bat as a big league manager. That started the Cleveland Indians to a 5-3 victory over the New York Yankees, which was great moment No. 3, especially since it was viewed by an excited home town crowd of 56,204. the Elsewhere in American League, the world champion Oakland A's nipped the Chicago White Sox 3-2, the Minnesota Twins crushed the Texas Rangers 11-4 and the Boston Red Sox downed the Milwaukee Brewers 5-2. The Kansas City-California game was rained out while the Baltimore-Detroit opener was postponed earlier by a snowstorm. Robinson brought the large Cleveland crowd to its feet with his first-inning home run off New York's Doc Medich. "It's just tremendous," Robinson said later as he contemplated the historic occasion. "I really can't explain how I feel. I've been a manager before, but this is where it's at. I couldn't think of any better way to start my new career. I was extremely pleased by the way we won. It was a team effort. The guys came from behind and played together and that's what you have to do to be successful. Despite Robinson's dramatic homer, the Indians fell behind 3-1 in the second inning. But Boog Powell, Robinson's old Baltimore teammate, drove in two runs with a homer and double and Jack Brohamer drove in the other two with a sacrifice fly and a single. 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"I can't believe they're that dumb up there," Mrs. Floyd Earls said. "That's my home.'

She was commenting on a report from Ardmore, Okla., which blamed some cattle mutilations on packs of stray

dogs. The Floyd Earles, 4016 Parkway Road, and the Howard County Sheriff's Office several months ago were seeking a pack of "killer dogs" accused of slaughtering three lambs and 20 chickens.

The Associated Press has quoted a U.S. Department of Agriculture veterinarian saying the remains of a calf were found near Ardmore and bore all of the same evidence previously associated with cattle mutilation incidents. The cattle mutilations have been a mystery some explained as the work of satanists and some credited to UFOs.

But Ardmore area authorities attributed this and other area calf killings to packs of dogs. 'That could happen,"

County Commissioner Jack uchanan said. He recently

discovered a mutilated cow and calf belonging to him near the Luther community. TEETH MARKS

Buchanan, however, doubted dogs killed two of his cattle.

'They don't have teeth like that," Buchanan said. The rancher mentioned thin layers of skin and hair peeled from the flesh and bone cutting.

Texas Ranger George Frasier, Big Spring, said: "By far and in large, the majority of them are being attacked by predators or varmints.

In a meeting of Texas Rangers last week, the large amount of autumn rainfall and new types of weeds were discussed, Frasier said. It was thought cattle could be dying from eating exotic weeds

"I still feel like in a few, in a very few cases, there have been some mutilations by some humans," Frasier said

HOPES SO Bill Whitton, chief deputy sheriff, also was asked about the stray dog theory. "I'd be hoping that was right," Whitton commented.

The deputy said he couldn't compare the Oklahoma incidents with Howard County cattle mutilations, though, because he had not seen the law enforcement agency reports from Ardmore.

Registration begins at 12 noon and riding events at 1 p.m. Barrels, poles and other regular play day events will be run with the entry as 50 cents for each event.


