## Use Of U.S. Troops In Viet Due Approval

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional leaders predict rejection of President Ford's more than doubled request for \$722 million in military aid for South Vietnam but indicate likely approval of limited authority for U.S. troops to evacuate endangered Americans and Vietnamese.

Even before Ford spoke to an unusually grim and silent joint session of Congress and to the nation Thursday night, key lawmakers were saying there was virtually no chance that additional arms would be voted for South Vietnam.

**NEVER**

"The Congress will never vote for military aid," declared House Democratic Leader Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. of Massachusetts.

"Further military assistance would only prolong or merely postpone an ultimate Communist victory," said Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., chairman of the Appropriations Committee and until recently a strong supporter of U.S. involvement in Vietnam.

Ford coupled his request for the additional military aid, more than double the \$300 million for arms and ammunition he has been unsuccessfully seeking for South Vietnam since January, with an appeal for a \$250 million initial installment for food, medical supplies and other humanitarian aid for the

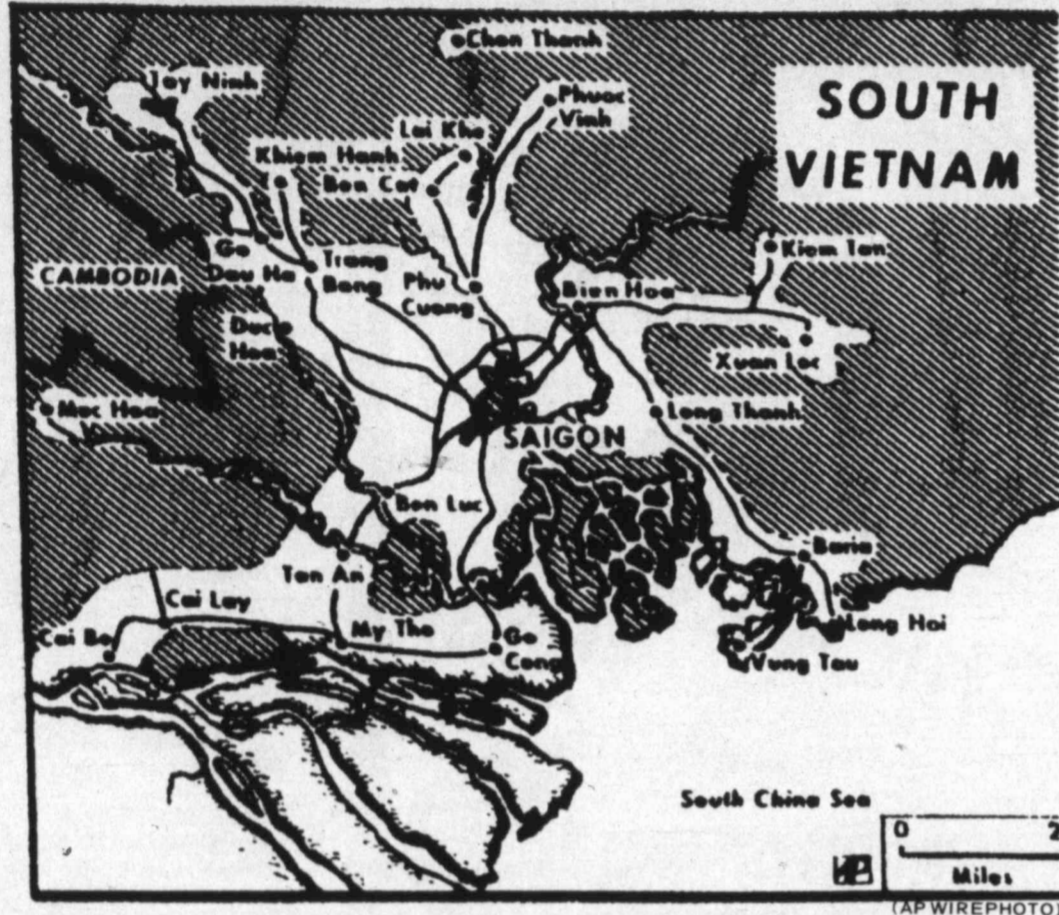
hundreds of thousands of Vietnamese refugees.

In contrast, he made no renewal of his \$222 million aid request for neighboring Cambodia, declaring "it may be too late" already to prevent the fall of that embattled country to Communist insurgents.

He called on Congress to act by the end of next week to clarify restrictions on the use of U.S. troops in Indochina so the troops can be used to protect American lives "by ensuring their evacuation, should this be-

come necessary," and to help pull out up to 200,000 friendly Vietnamese.

"I hope that this authority will never be used, but if it is needed there will be no time for congressional debate," Ford said.

### Nab Two Girls As Suspects In Pecos Murder

LAKE CHARLES, La. (AP) — Calcasieu Parish officers held two Lake Charles teen-agers today for extradition proceedings after arresting them on a murder warrant from Texas.

They are accused of killing Dwane Grable, 31, of Salt Flat, Tex. His body was found Monday near Pecos, Tex. He had been shot in the back of the head.

Arrested here were Jeannette Franklin, 17, and Shirley Bergeron, 19.

Deputies in Pecos said the girls may have been hitchhikers picked up by Grable. However, they declined to say what clues led to the arrest warrant for the girls.

## Shot Gun Blast Fatal To Man

Michael Ralph Green was shot to death Thursday night at his 26th birthday party, just a few weeks following his release from the Penitentiary at Huntsville.

The lone candle on the cake had been blown out and one slice cut from the cake, but nobody had yet eaten the birthday cake at 8:45 p.m. when the shooting occurred at 1217 Mobile at the Lloyd Nichol's home.

Police said Green and Jay Doug Ingram, 24, had ridden around in a car together, then apparently argued. The disagreement developed into a fight, authorities stated, after which Green came back inside the house. He paced the floor for a while, according to other guests at the party.

Witnesses said that Green,

with a beer can in his hand, again stepped to the door and was struck in the chest with a blast from a 16-gauge pump shotgun. Arven Henry, investigating officer, said the shot apparently was fired from a distance of about ten feet. The can Green was holding was riddled. Green

crawled back into the house. When officers arrived, he was sprawled on the floor by the bed.

Green said: "Somebody help me. I'm dying."

A female guest at the party knelt beside him and tried to keep him quiet until an ambulance arrived.

Green was dead on arrival at Malone-Hogan Hospital where Justice of the Peace Walter Grice ruled "death by a shotgun." Pellets were reported to be lodged in his heart according to police officers.

Ingram, who was free on a \$25,000 bond in connection with an armed robbery in Lubbock in February, was standing inside the house, still holding the shotgun when officers arrived, according to Howard Kloss, first officer on the scene.

Ingram was arrested for disorderly conduct and investigation of murder. The charge was later changed to murder and bond was denied.

Green, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Green, had been serving three concurrent 12-year terms at Huntsville involving sale of marijuana. He had been released on parole. He was sentenced January 31, 1973.

Ingram, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. J. Ingram of Vincent, was a high school football and basketball player at Coahoma High School, graduating in 1968.

Officers at the scene included Henry, Kloss, Sgt. Claude Morris, Sgt. John Wolf, Patrolmen Mike Pearson and George Quintero, and Capt. Jack Jones.

Services for Green will be at 11 a.m., Saturday in the Nalley-Pickle Rosewood Chapel, with the Rev. Eldon Cook, pastor of Westside Baptist Church, and Dr. Claude Craven, pastor of Trinity Baptist Church, officiating. Burial will be at 4 p.m., Saturday at the Mereta Cemetery near San Angelo.

Mr. Green's residence was listed at 1410 Wood Street. He was born April 10, 1949, in San Angelo. He was a welder by trade, employed by Cathey Welding Company. He had been a resident of Big Spring since 1954. He was a member of the College Baptist Church.

He was raised and attended schools in Big Spring. He had served two years in military service.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Green, Big Spring; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Stella Keith, San Angelo; several uncles and aunts.

### 12th Wife Finds Real Happiness

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Judy Joseph says she has found real happiness sharing her husband with 11 other women.

"My parents don't believe me. I've been home to Montana to visit them, and it's harder every time," she said Thursday.

She is one of a dozen women claimed as wives by Alexander Joseph, 39, leader of a group that has attempted to homestead on federal land in southern Utah.

Joseph freely admits having 12 wives and says he has been excommunicated from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) for practicing polygamy.

Judy, a pretty 21-year-old blonde, adds, "You have to give up possessiveness, selfishness, jealousy and learn to love more when you become a polygamous wife."

She said she comes from a big family, and lived with five other girls at the University of Montana, where she had a perfect grade average. Three of her roommates now say they are Joseph's wives.

"I learned to have a real loving relationship with other girls in college, so it was easier to adjust," Judy said.

She said the other wives range in age from 18 to 30, and two are daughters of Utah polygamists.

"My parents don't understand how I've become so happy," Judy said, adding that they told the FBI that Joseph had kidnapped her when she married him 18 months ago.

She described her life in remote southern Utah, living in a house trailer with several other women, as "an adventure around every corner."

Carmen Joseph, another of Joseph's wives, says some of the marriages have been formalized and are registered with appropriate agencies, but others have not.

Utah law prohibits both polygamy and cohabitation. Authorities haven't charged them with violating either law, the family said.

### Wife Blamed

KLEBERG, Tex. (AP) — Ex-Police Chief Bill Brown quit his job Wednesday because he thought arsonists were trying to run him out of town.

Brown said Thursday he has learned his wife set fire to their home and made up stories about receiving threatening telephone calls.

"Everything I thought turns out to be nothing at all," Brown said.

Brown said earlier in the week that crime was rampant in this south Dallas County town and that criminals and others were trying to force him to leave because he was making too many arrests.

Brown cited the burning of his home and alleged threatening telephone calls made to his wife, Bobbie.

But Brown said Thursday his wife admitted setting the blaze, and that there had been no calls, nor had two men grabbed her outside her mother's home in Fort Worth where she had sought refuge.

### BS Trucker Is Injured

OLD GLORY — A truck loaded with anhydrous nitrate en route from Big Spring to Munday overturned here Thursday morning, forcing about 70 residents of this Stonewall County community to evacuate their homes because of the escaping noxious ammonia gas.

Richard Houck, 34, Big Spring, the truck driver, suffered minor injuries to his neck and back and was listed in satisfactory condition in Haskell Memorial Hospital.

The Old Glory residents were rushed from their homes and schools and businesses closed about 10 a.m. Thursday, and were able to return late Thursday night.

Houck, driver of the W. R. Grace Co. truck, apparently lost control of the truck as it went around the corner on slick Highway 380, causing the truck to plummet into a telephone pole and ditch. The damage to the pole cut off electric service to the town. Power was not restored until 5 p.m.

Two Grace Company trucks from Plainview were brought in to take the ammonia from the damaged trailer.

### Judge Carrillo Faces Tax Raps

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. (AP) — The Carrillo faction in Duval County politics received another setback Thursday when two family members were among three persons indicted here by a federal grand jury on charges of filing false income tax returns.

Named in the indictments were 229th District Court Judge O.P. Carrillo; his brother, Duval County Commissioner Ramiro Carrillo, and Arturo Zertuche, a Benavides business-man.

Members of the Carrillo family have been engaged in a struggle with the Parr family for control of politics in Duval County, longtime power center in South Texas.

The struggle reached a head last week when Judge Carrillo signed an order temporarily ousting Archer Parr, nephew of the late "Duke of Duval," George Parr, as Duval county judge. The order cited Archer Parr's federal perjury conviction as a reason for removal.

The struggle for power reached another turning point last Saturday when Parr-backed candidates beat Carrillo-backed candidates in the Benavides-Freer school board election.

"I'm still very much the judge of the 229th (district)," said O.P. Carrillo after the indictments were returned Thursday. He added that he would continue serving on the bench but would not comment further.

The Carrillos and Zertuche were released under \$10,000 bond each after their appearance in federal court.

The indictment did not specify the amount of the alleged underpayment and did not say how much is owed by the defendants.

One of the 12 counts accuses the three men of conspiring to file false income tax returns and the other 11 accuse them of filing false returns.

Judge Carrillo is accused of filing false returns in 1968 and 1970 and filing a false partnership return in 1970.

### Texas Tech Student Executed, Fem Shot

DALLAS (AP) — A Texas Tech University student was shot to death and a woman companion was wounded today by a pair of gunmen who abducted them from a Dallas nightclub, police said.

Police said the couple was marched to the muddy Trinity River bottoms around 1 a.m. where they were shot from behind by a pair of gunmen who stole their wallets.

The dead man was identified as Michael McMahan, 22, one of a 29-member student group attending a conference at the University of Texas-Arlington. He was a native of Washington.

Police said his companion, Deia Karlene Sutton, 20, suffered a gunshot wound in the back of the neck. Police said she was released from Parkland Hospital after treatment, the bullet still lodged at the base of her skull.

Police said the young woman told them she and McMahan left a popular Dallas nightclub around 12:45 a.m. and were accosted by the two gunmen in the club parking lot. Officers said the woman told them the muggers, armed with a pistol

and a shotgun, forced them into McMahan's car and ordered him to drive to the river bottoms.

Miss Sutton said the gunmen forced them to walk to the river's edge and not turn around, police said, adding that at that moment two rapid shots were fired.

Police said Miss Sutton related that after being shot, she slumped to the ground and "played dead."

McMahan suffered a fatal wound in the lower back, police said.

Miss Sutton said McMahan inquired about her condition before he died but she advised him to be quiet.

Miss Sutton said the killers overheard the conversation, returned and began beating both of them, shoving her face into the mud and choking her.

She said she tried to feign unconsciousness but fought back when she was unable to breathe. Police said she told them the killers left after taking the couple's wallets.

Miss Sutton lay quietly five to 10 minutes then stumbled to a nearby hotel for help, police said.

## The World At-A-Glance

LANTANA, Fla. (AP) — "He is my admiral, I am his little soldier," Victoria Fyodorova says of the father she is visiting for the first time. The Russian-born actress and her father, retired Adm. Jackson R. Tate of Orange Park, Fla., emerged for a news conference Thursday after more than two weeks of hiding. Miss Fyodorova, 29, is the "love child" of a World War II romance between Tate, now 77 and a heart patient, and Russian actress Zoya Fyodorova, who is 62 and living in Moscow. Tate, who later married an American woman, did not learn of his daughter's existence until 1963, then lost track of her again until last year.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional investigators say that opposition from utility companies could pressure the government into omitting a key safety device for the nuclear breeder reactor. The device, called a "core catcher," would spread nuclear fuel from a shattered reactor core to prevent an uncontrolled chain reaction and thus keep a serious internal accident from becoming a public disaster.

PARIS (AP) — The international meeting making preparations for a world oil and energy conference this summer may continue beyond its scheduled closing today because of a deadlock over the demand that the conference deal with all raw materials the underdeveloped countries sell to the industrial nations.

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — South Vietnamese troops withstood a third day of assaults against Xuan Loc, a provincial capital 40 miles east of Saigon, today and battled attacks on two district capitals 20 to 30 miles southwest of Saigon, the government reported. The Viet Cong claimed the Communists had gained control of the market, the provincial headquarters, an engineering base and the eastern part of the airfield at Xuan Loc, but the Saigon command claimed the invaders had been driven out. It said the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong were attacking today on the eastern and southeastern edges of the city.

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — Government ground forces and planes using advanced American fire bombs halted a 200-man Khmer Rouge force that battled to within two miles of Phnom Penh's airport, reports from the area said. The Cambodian command was reported trying to organize a counterattack. The command claimed artillery bombardment and the air force's rain of CBU55 fire bombs killed 700 insurgents 7 to 12 miles northwest of the city.

MIAMI (AP) — The capitalism under which the United States has prospered is turning the Bicentennial into a Buy-centennial, local officials say. "We are terribly disturbed by what's going on," said Steve Nostrand, executive director of Third Century, the local group sponsoring Bicentennial celebrations.

# Burleson Says Watch Out For The Watch Dog

WASHINGTON, D.C. — During a recent police action in Washington a police dog bit a policeman. Dogs make mistakes too during confusion and excitement. So, the subject here is watch out for the watchdog. Legislation to create a consumer protection agency — a super-bureau which is supposed to save all of us from flim-flams and shoddy but expensive merchandise, is again before Congress. Last year this legislation passed the House of Representatives but fell before a filibuster in the Senate.

With the Congress more tilted towards the liberal side as a result of the last election and with a recent change in the Senate rules to

make filibustering more difficult, the chances are increased that this bureaucratic monstrosity may be unloaded on the people of this country, under the guise of protecting the consumer. As proposed in this legislation, a new agency would be authorized to dip its oar into any governmental operation that "may substantially affect the interest of consumers" — which means just about everything. The bureaucrats of such an agency would be as much, if not more powerful, than those which power granted them by the Congress. The probability is high that such an agency would soon dwarf most other governmental departments in controls, size and costs. This kind of thing would add another "watchdog" to a penful already a part of the Federal government.

There are already in the law provisions on "truth in lending", "Truth in Packaging and Labeling" and a number of other regulations governing advertising and the like to give protection to the public. The long-time established regulatory agencies such as the Interstate Commerce Commission, the Federal Power Commission, the

Securities and Exchange Commission, the Federal Trade Commission and others, have their special functions and although some of these are not for the purpose of helping or protecting a particular individual, all have powers over some aspects of national life which affects us all.

The proponents of these newer units of the federal government and those proposed such as the Consumer Protection Agency, seem to assume that people just don't know much and must have someone to look out for them on everything. Self discipline through such organizations as the Better Business Bureau to which many businesses belong, is one way for commercial enterprises to help themselves and serve their customers and keep the Government out of it.

A watchdog can serve a useful and necessary function. But to unleash another dog with the power this proposal authorizes is to say "sic 'em", and those who are supposed to be benefited and protected are likely to be bitten.

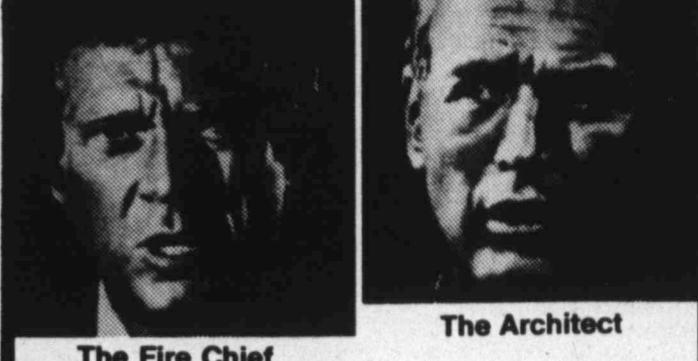

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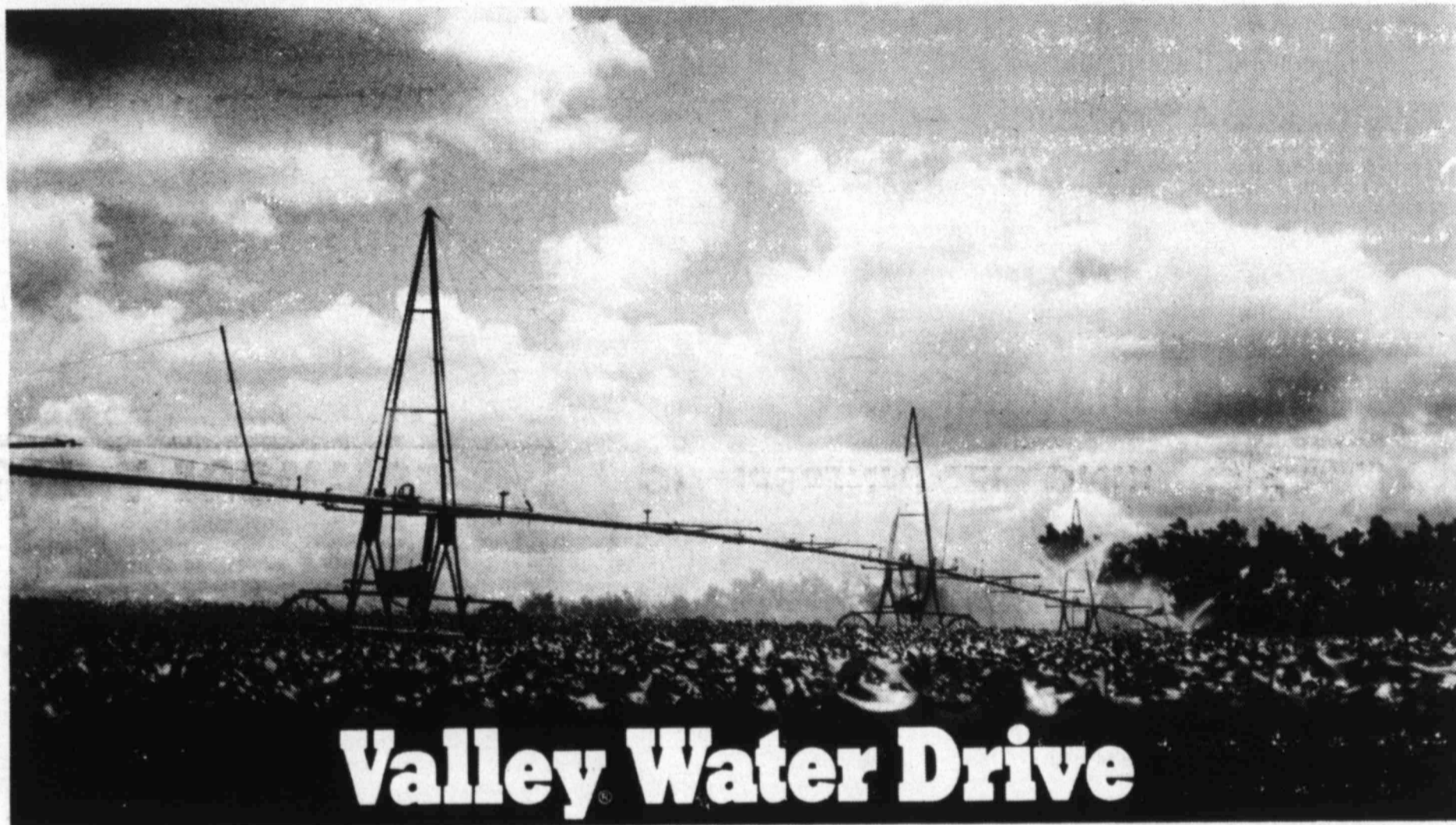

**Mill Will Shut Down Ex-Resident Assumes Post**

**HOUSTON (AP)** — Champion Papers says it will shut down its Houston Ship Channel mill April 14 for one week because of what it calls generally poor economic conditions. The mill, a division of Champion International, has about 1,500 employees. Cecil Parker, general manager of operations, said most of the employees will have the option of taking paid vacations during the shutdown week. He said a few workers will remain on duty for normal maintenance. Parker said the plant has customers worldwide and the shutdown has nothing to do with economic conditions in Houston, which have been described as considerably stronger than for the nation as a whole. Parker said the shutdown is to reduce inventories that have increased because of declining sales.

**Expenses Of Appraiser Training Are Argued**

Whether local governments should pay the costs of training tax appraisers was argued in the tax appraisal board meeting Thursday afternoon. "The only way this office can progress is through education," Richard Fleener, senior appraiser, told the board. He has completed a three-day course on the fundamentals of tax assessing at San Antonio and plans for another employe to take this course at Tyler while he studies a second three-day course. Cost for the San Antonio school, including expenses, ran \$116.50. Fleener suggested more than the \$1,000 in the contingency fund this year be appropriated for training in 1976. Jack Watkins, president of the Big Spring Property Owners Association, said: "It does not seem right to me to spend taxpayers money to educate somebody to do a job he should already be educated to do." Seminars and schools are necessary to keep abreast of changes in tax assessing, Fleener said. "Employing tax appraisers is 'far less expensive' than contracting with a professional appraisal firm, which was less than satisfactory, Don Crockett, an assistant superintendent for Big Spring schools, said. "It'd definitely be a backwards step if we didn't support this type training," Crockett said. Crockett predicted state legislation will make the training mandatory. Watkins said teachers are not paid for schooling they

receive in the summer. Fleener presented the board with a proposed statement to accompany notices telling property owners of tax changes and equalization board dates. Officials of participating governments will decide whether to use the recommended note. **PROOF SUGGESTED** The note tells those wishing to complain about personal property taxes to bring two or more types of evidence when appearing before the equalization board: "1. An inventory accompanied by a balance sheet or general ledger reflecting January 1, current year balances and signed by the taxpayer or a recognized public accountant. "2. An insurance reporting form reflecting all inventories as of January 1, current year and signed by an officer of the insurance company. "3. A bona fide copy of the taxpayer's federal income tax return as of January 1, current year (or adjusted to January 1) signed by the taxpayer. "4. A statement of furniture, fixtures, and equipment with a schedule of depreciation reflecting the difference between cost and book value." Tax offices in Lubbock, Amarillo and Houston send similar statements with notices of equalization board meetings, Fleener said. In other business, the board: Discussed pending state legislation which would require uniform ap- praisal statewide. "This year, for the first time, I feel like they're going to do something," Crockett observed.

**CONNALLY TRIAL One Man's Word Against Another's**

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Lawyers for former Treasury Secretary John B. Connally asked the judge in his bribery trial today to acquit Connally on the grounds the government's main witness is a paid informer and a perjurer. In a motion for a judgment of acquittal, chief defense lawyer Edward Bennett Williams was sharply critical of Jake Jacobsen, who testified that he paid Connally \$10,000 for help in getting a 1971 milk price support increase. "He has served as an informer paid by the government for information — not in money, in the more valuable coin of whitewashes of his other crimes," Williams said. The motion for acquittal will be argued Monday before the defense puts on its first witness. Before resting their case Thursday, the prosecutors had presented 36 witnesses and a mass of documentary evidence. But only one witness swears Connally took the money. Former dairy industry lawyer Jake Jacobsen testified he gave Connally two illegal \$5,000 payoffs in 1971 for Connally's efforts in persuading the Nixon administration to raise milk prices. He swears he and Connally later tried to cover up the crime in 1973. But Jacobsen has admitted that in the past he committed perjury, and that in pleading guilty to bribing Connally he got the government to reduce charges against him. During a day and a half of

## County Revenue More Than Expenditures

During 1974, Howard County spent \$1,875,895 and received \$1,947,792, the county auditor's annual report indicates.

The county spent \$71,896 or 4 per cent less than current revenue, including revenue sharing receipts.

At year end, the county had a \$1,566,062 balance. Included in this amount was \$1,228,750 invested in interest-earning certificates of deposit and \$337,312 in checking accounts.

"Outstanding general obligation bonds at Dec. 31, 1974, totaled \$530,000, which is considered to be net direct tax-supported debt," County Auditor Virginia Black wrote in the report.

"During the past year, \$131,000 of the tax bonds were retired," Mrs. Black noted. "No general obligation bonds have been issued in the last five fiscal years."

Revenue sharing brought the county \$270,488, which

added with interest and remaining earlier revenue sharing receipts, gave the county \$396,329 more funds. County Commissioners Court used \$101,829 for purchase of road equipment and vehicles.

With \$61,373 in revenue sharing funds, the county built 10 new hangars at Howard County Airport.

Patching materials were purchased with \$41,009 of the fund.

Howard County allocated \$1,500 in revenue sharing for fire protection in Coahoma, a city whose board of aldermen rejected revenue sharing checks sent directly to that city.

Commissioners Court, the body which manages county government, in 1974 consisted of then County Judge A.G. Mitchell and Commissioners Bill Bennett (who lost his bid for re-election), William B. Crooker Jr., Jack Buchanan and Simon (Cy) Terrazas.

## Forsan Easily Wraps Up Literary Event

FORSAN — Forsan entries dominated the District 10-B Region I Literary contest conducted here Thursday, scoring a total of 237 points in the 18 events.

A distant second in the meet was Water Valley, which wound up with 96 points, followed by Greenwood, with 57; Sterling City, with 51; Garden City, 20; and Grady, with five.

## Texas Minimum Living Figures

WASHINGTON (AP) — A person can live in "some luxury" on less money in Austin than in any of three cities checked by the Labor Department, the agency reported today.

Checked were Houston, Dallas and Austin.

The "some luxury" cost in Austin is \$17,914 annually. It is \$18,784 in Dallas and \$18,467 in Houston.

An "austere" standard of living is \$8,108 for Austin, \$8,405 for Dallas and \$8,483 for Houston.

Moderate living costs, the department said, were \$12,388 in Austin, \$12,917 in Dallas and \$12,872 in Houston.

By comparison, the costs in all U.S. urban areas were \$9,198, \$14,333 and \$20,777.

For all metropolitan areas, the figures were \$9,323, \$14,644 and \$21,381.

We have often stressed the importance of the opening lead. Observe what a difference it made on this hand from the finals of the 1975 World Team Championship, at a time when Italy was staging a remarkable comeback after trailing the U.S. by 77 International Match Points.

East, Pittala, ducked smoothly. Faced with a guess, Wolf chose to finesse the nine. West won the ten and shifted to a diamond, and declarer could make no more than eight tricks, for he now lacked the entries to establish and run dummy's hearts.

Unlucky, but give East a full measure of credit. Had he played the queen of hearts when declarer led low from dummy, South would have had little trouble in making nine tricks.

At the other table, West led his fourth-best diamond. Though this did not cost a trick, it gave declarer, Benito Garozzo, all sorts of time. His grip on the diamond suit was so secure that he reasoned he could, in some circumstances, afford to lose three heart tricks and still assure his contract. So he won the first diamond and attacked hearts by leading the jack from his hand, taken by East's queen. The diamond return was won by declarer, and the nine of hearts was led and passed. When this forced the ace, the king became declarer's ninth trick. As luck would have it, the suit divided evenly and Garozzo ended up taking eleven tricks.

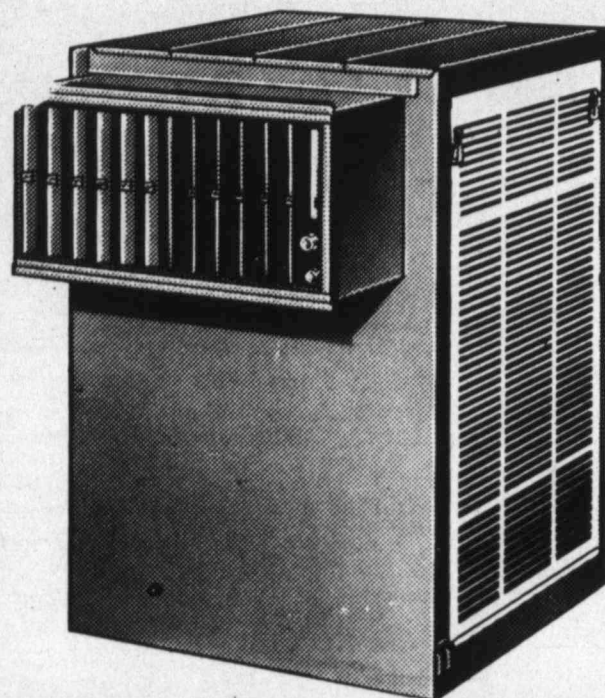

**Tarahumara Indians Are Vanishing Tribe**

"The Tarahumara Indians", a book by Jonathon Cassell, was reviewed by Mrs. R.B.G. Cowper Tuesday evening for the Howard County Historical Survey Committee. The meeting, open to the public, was held in the Chamber of Commerce conference room.

The book concerns the experiences of Mr. and Mrs. Cassell and their 15-year-old son who traveled to the interior of Mexico to research the lives and habits of the Tarahumaras, an "almost lost" tribe of Indians who live in caves and cliffs during the winter and move to the low valleys to raise their crops during the summer.

During the business session, Mrs. Floyd Mays, chairman, reported that she and others had gone to what was marked in 1909 as the highest point in Howard County. It is in Silver Heels and can be found by following Chaparral Road south to the Fern Cox ranch. She said the site, which can be seen from the road, is a few feet higher than Signal Mountain.

Also, Mrs. Mays said a group from Austin is scheduled to be in Big Spring soon to check the possibilities of turning an old cave on Scenic Mountain into a tourist attraction. She noted that a historical map, which was made of Signal Mountain Loop, has drawn so much attention that maps may be made showing historical areas north, east and west of the city. Sites suggested included

Geronimo's campground, old Soash, the Slaughter Ranch, Borden County Museum and the natural dam lake.
