Cheaper Utility Rates Not Seen

If proponents of a state utilities commission hold out hopes of cheaper rates because of a commission, they are doomed to disappointment.

Tom Locke, division manager for Texas Electric Service Company, declared in an address to Downtown Lions Wednesday that while Texas rates (Texas is the only state without a utilities commission) are generally lower, all rates are destined to rise.

The reason is simple: Easy, cheap sources of energy are being depleted and more expensive sources will have to replace them; also, the cost of materials for plants and lines as well as interest on borrowed money are far more expensive than when present plants were built.

Were it not for the much lower cost of money and materials in present

systems, which modify effect of inflation and shortages, rates would be tremendously higher, he said.

Locke cited figures which show that costs for 750 KWH of power (including fuel adjustments) amounted to \$18.68 in Fort Worth and \$16.21 in Houston, whereas other states ranged up to \$53.60 in New York. In some instances, he said, the Texas rates reflected foresight in tying down gas reserves before prices jumped as much as five times.

He advocated leaving regulation at the closest level — cities. As for the charge that rural customers "are being ripped off, here there is a far greater density of service — and I don't think this is a rip-off." He also said local regulation was more expeditious and permitted utilities to plan more effectively.

TEESCO is shifting to lignite-fired and atomic plants, he said. The former costs 2½ times as much as gas-fired plants, and the latter four times as much. However, atomic fuel (and he did not regard 'wastes' or by-products of fission as a bugaboo, but perhaps even a boon) may offer the cheapest fuel for BTU. At any rate, the shift to fuels other than oil or gas is inevitable, he said, for "we're now supplying three-fourths of the power from one-sixth of the potential fuel sources."

Review Board Okays Funds

COLORADO CITY — The Kiwanis Clubs of Snyder and Colorado City received notification this week that their application for funds under the Urban Mass Transit Act has been approved by the review board in Austin and will be forwarded to the Urban Mass Transportation in Washington, D. C. for final approval.

The amount approved by the board of the Texas Highway Department was \$10,570.95. The application was submitted through the West Central Council of Governments for two 12-passenger vans to be used by the two cities for elderly persons in getting around the city and taking care of their errands.

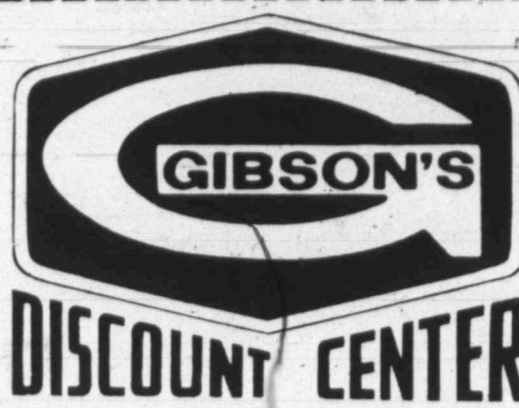

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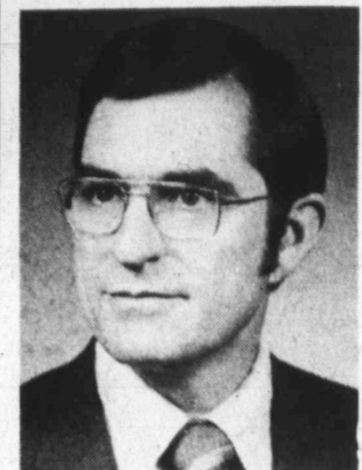

O. A. McBrayer To Be Awarded Doctorate

Two McMurry College alumni and a distinguished New Mexico minister will be awarded honorary doctorates at the college's spring commencement exercises at 3 p.m. on Sunday, May 4, in the J.W. Hunt P.E. Center.



O. A. McBrayer and Raymon L. Bynum will receive a doctor of laws degree and a doctor of divinity degree, respectively. Don L. Forsman is the third candidate for an honorary doctorate.

McBrayer, an ordained elder in The United Methodist Church for 26 years, is presently district superintendent of the Big Spring district of the UMC. The son of a Methodist minister, McBrayer grew up in Central and Northwest Texas and graduated from McMurry in 1945. Trinity Lutheran Group Votes To Disband Church Locally

Trinity Lutheran Church congregation voted unanimously to disband by June 30 of this year when they held a congregational meeting, Sunday, April 27. They adopted a resolution that they would cease to have public worship on May 25, 1975 and that the officers and councilmen be authorized to execute any and all documents of every kind and nature, conveying the assets of the Corporate Church by selling the same or conveying to the authorized representative of the Lutheran Church in America.

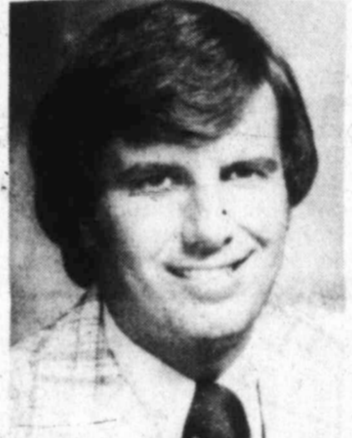
The special leave-taking service was written by the late Dr. H.D. Hoover, who was the Rev. Utz' professor at Gettysburg, Pa. The church at Virginia Ave. and Marcy Drive as well as the manse at 2405 Allendale Road will be for sale. Rev. and Mrs. Utz, who have completed 19 months of service after his retirement under the appointment by the President of the Synod, will move to San Antonio July 1 in a recently purchased residence there.

The church, during its years in Big Spring received a total of 286 members, had three deaths, baptized 33 children and had 11 weddings. Trinity Lutheran was organized Sunday, April 28, 1963. The roots of Trinity can be traced back to June 7, 1961 when a missionary developer, the Rev. Donald Kenning arrived in Big Spring. It was his job to survey the community towards the possibility of establishing a Lutheran

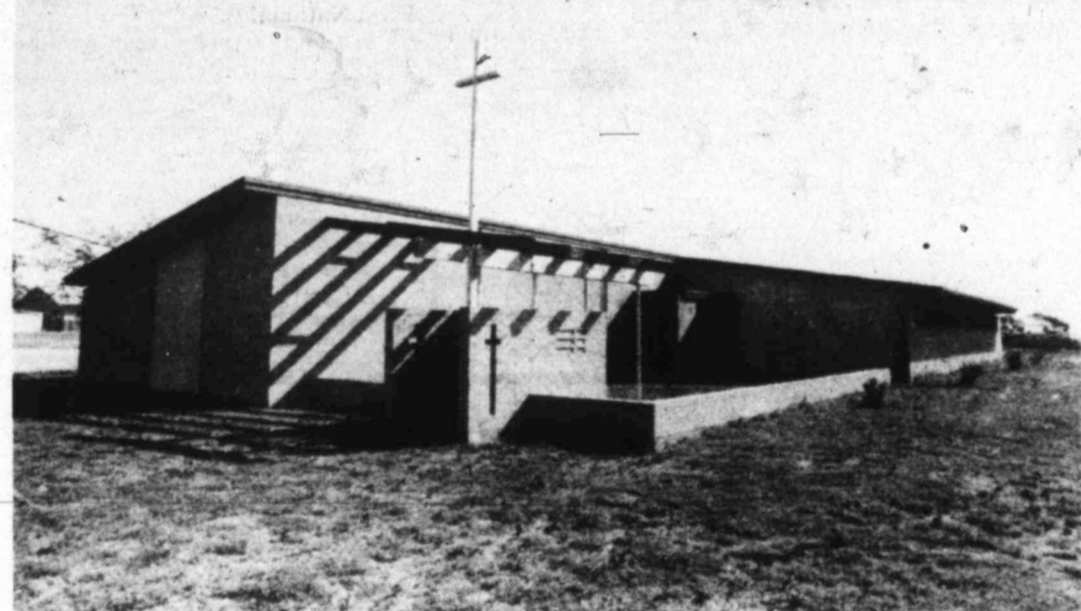
Church in America building to prepare it for worship services. All of the people willingly gave of their time, money and talents to ready the building for services. In February of 1962, it was decided by action of the steering committee to purchase chairs and an organ for the mission. On March 25, 1962, the congregation opened its charter. Now the specified number of members had signed and a full-fledged church was started. October of 1962 was the time of choosing a name for the new church. A potluck supper was held at St. Paul's Presbyterian Church at which time the name Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church was chosen. The official organization of the Church took place on Sunday, April 28, 1963.

Since Trinity's founding the following ministers have served: Rev. Donald T. Kenning 7-1-63 to 7-1-67, Rev. Robert S. Knutson 7-1-67 to 7-3-70, Rev. Neale O. Jensen 7-26-70 to 12-1-73, Rev. Lester M. Utz 12-1-73 to present.

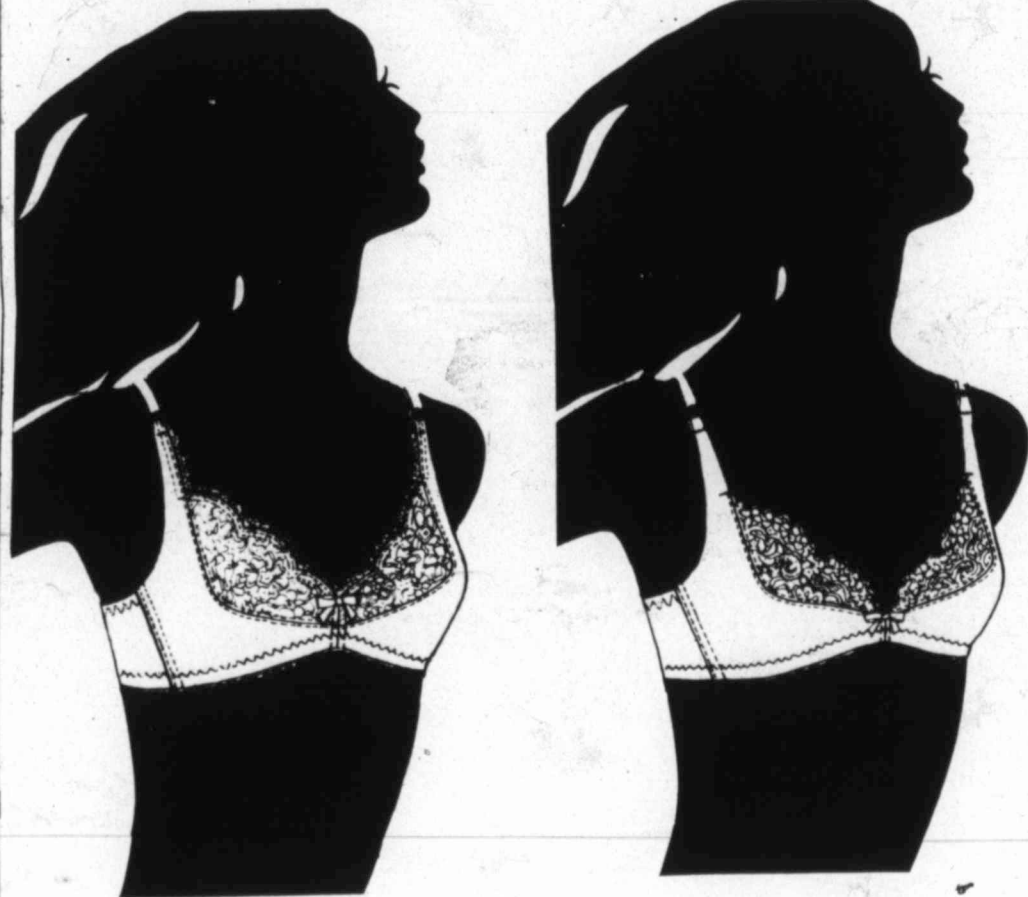

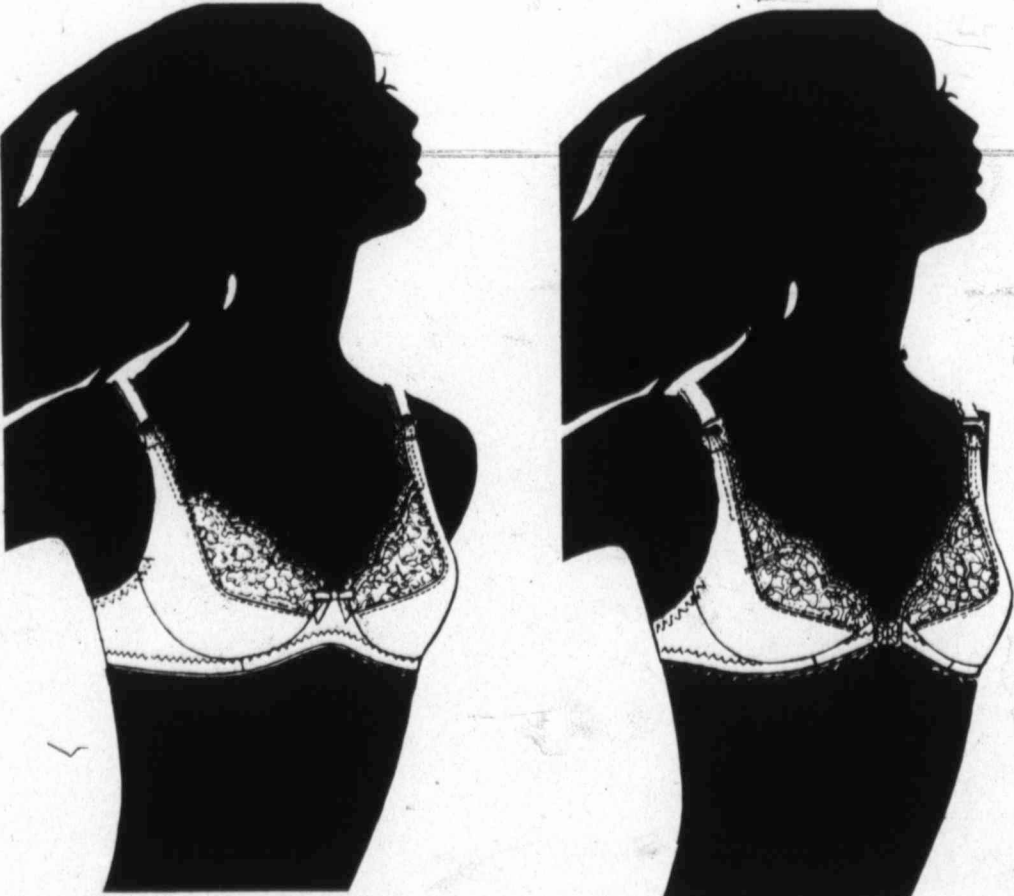

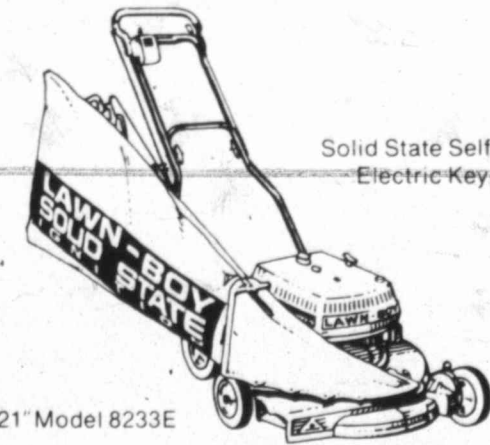

Denver City Gas Blast Sparks \$1 Million Suit

DALLAS (AP) — The children of a West Texas woman who was killed by escaping lethal gas have filed a \$1 million suit against Atlantic Richfield Oil Co.

The six children claimed their mother, Mrs. J.R. Patton, 57, died "in a tremendous amount of pain" while watching her husband, daughters, sons-in-law and granddaughter also die.

The seven died at a home near Denver City last Feb. 2 when poisonous hydrogen sulfide gas escaped from a nearby oil well.

The six children claim Atlantic Richfield failed to take measures to warn area residents of potential dangers from the well.

The suit filed in the court of U.S. District Court Judge Sarah T. Hughes Wednesday seeks \$60,000 in damages for each plaintiff and \$750,000 in exemplary damages.

CLINICALLY DEAD

Continued To Breathe After Obit Published

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — A man considered clinically dead continued to breathe for three weeks after his wife made the decision to withdraw his life support system and his obituary was published, hospital officials revealed today.

Joseph Klimek, 24, of Manchester entered Manchester Hospital Jan. 31 suffering from a rare blood disease which causes slow internal bleeding.

Two weeks later he was transferred to Hartford Hospital where his spleen was removed. But he suffered a heart attack, cutting off oxygen to his brain and killing it.

Doctors placed Klimek, an accountant and father of a 2-year-old son, on a respirator. But for eight weeks he showed no improvement. Tests of brain activity showed no response.

On the morning of April 8, Dr. G. W. Anderson, chief of neurology at Hartford Hospital, shut off the respirator after consulting with Mrs. Klimek. Breathing stopped immediately but the heart continued to beat, a common occurrence.

No breathing was noted for several minutes and Klimek was pronounced dead and preparations began for autopsy. The family was notified of his death, and the obituary was released to a local paper.

Later that morning, nurses noted Klimek had resumed breathing. He subsequently was given intravenous feedings, but the respirator was not used. Anderson said how Klimek continued to breathe without the respirator is a mystery.

Klimek's breathing stopped again and he was declared officially dead at 11:15 a.m. Tuesday.

Family Service Center Drilling Edge Names Mary Joy Cowper

Mrs. Mary Joy Cowper was elected president of the board of directors of the Howard County Family Service Center during the inaugural meeting of the board Thursday.

Other officers named included A. J. Prager, vice-president; Mrs. Venora Williams, secretary; and Rick Hamby, treasurer. The directorate also includes Dr. Ron L. Cohorn, Julian Patterson, Jesse Hernandez, G. G. Morehead and Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Jim Baggett.

The family service center is sponsored by the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, the United Way and citizens in general.

Professional advisors to the agency will be Jake Glickman, director Social Services, Big Spring State Hospital, and Jack Davis, director, Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center.

The Family Service Center is Howard County's newest social agency, having begun operations Feb. 18. The Texas Secretary of State approved Articles of Incorporation as a non-profit corporation April 9.

As a non-profit corporation which will soon secure tax-exempt status from the Internal Revenue Service, the Family Service Center will be eligible to receive donated funds, including United Way Support. Mrs. Cowper appointed a budget committee to prepare an application to the United Way for support during 1976.

In other action, the Board considered a statement of long-range goals for the agency which will be up for approval in July. The Board also heard a report from the Center's Director, Wilfrid M. Calnan, whom it appointed Executive Officer of the Board. During the first ten weeks of operation, the Center has received 31 referrals for its counseling services, and conducted 136 counseling interviews. Problems referred included marital conflict, parent-child conflict, child rearing, personal adjustment problems, money management, unwed pregnancy, and problems relating to physical illness.

During April, 73 appointments were given. Of people making appointments, only two cancelled and two failed to keep appointments.

The Family Service Agency is located in the Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center at 306 West Third St. Telephone number is 263-1362.
