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Job Picture To Brighten?

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's unemployment rate jumped to a post-World War II high of 9.2 per cent in May, but total employment also gained for the second straight month, the government reported today. The report gave some evidence that the job picture is beginning to brighten.

The jobless rate — 8.9 per cent in April — has climbed steadily since last August. This was the first time in 34 years that it exceeded 9 per cent of the work force. In 1941, the jobless rate averaged 9.9 per cent over the year out of a work force of 55.9 million. The Labor Department said another 360,000 Americans joined the jobless rolls last month, bringing the total number out of work to 8.5 million.

But the number of Americans working also increased in May, rising by 320,000 to a total of 84.4 million. The size of the labor force was reported up by 680,000 to 92.9 million in May. But because more people went looking for work than there were jobs available, unemployment also increased.

Analysts with the Bureau of Labor Statistics cited the gains in employment over the past two months as a "positive sign" of an improving job picture. Another indicator was the Labor Department's Diffusion Index which showed that 54 per cent of the 172 industries in the index posted employment gains in May. It was the first time since August that more than half of the industries registered employment increases. Over the past two months total employment has increased by 550,000, after registering six consecutive monthly declines that totaled 2.6 million. Nearly all the increase last month was in agricultural employment and involved adult males and teen-agers, the government said. Despite the gains in employment, joblessness also has continued to increase. Since August it has risen by 3.6 million.

The World At-A-Glance

WASHINGTON (AP) — Disclosures of government-sponsored surveillance programs and plans to centralize computer files on millions of Americans follow President Ford's pledge to preserve each citizen's right to privacy. Shortly after taking his oath as President, and in reference to Watergate scandals, Ford told a joint session of Congress that in his administration: "There will be hot pursuit of tough laws to prevent illegal invasion of privacy in both government and private activities." But it was disclosed this week by Pentagon officials that the Defense Department had maintained files on civilians despite orders to destroy the records in 1971.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Agriculture Secretary Earl L. Butz says the grain inspection scandal could lead to the federal government's taking over responsibility for grain inspections. Butz said in an interview that no decision had been reached within the administration on how to overhaul the inspection system. But he said one option under consideration would give the federal government the same inspection responsibility for grain that it now has for meat. State and federal inspectors check meat for quality and sanitation.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Top Justice Department officials intend to strengthen their control over the Drug Enforcement Administration in an effort to salvage an agency ravaged by allegations of mismanagement and corruption, says Deputy Atty. Gen. Harold R. Tyler Jr. A major move in that direction was Atty. Gen. Edward H. Levi's choice of Henry Dogin, a veteran department prosecutor, as acting DEA administrator. Dogin replaced John R. Bartels who resigned at Levi's request last Friday.

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — Taverns in Wisconsin now can call themselves saloons under a court ruling being hailed as a victory for both free speech and unpretentious drinkers. Circuit Judge Richard Bardwell struck down on Thursday a state law prohibiting drinking establishments from billing themselves as "saloons." His ruling also declared unconstitutional a Madison ordinance against the use of the word. "It is time we realized that this is 1975, not 1919," Bardwell said. "There is no longer anything opprobrious or disdainful about the word saloon."

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Months of searing drought in eastern Ethiopia and Somalia have killed tens of thousands of nomads and millions of their cattle and goats. Rain broke the drought in many areas recently, producing "reasonably promising" prospects for crops and grazing, according to officials. But aid experts say it will take years and millions of dollars for the Ogaden Desert, shared by the two East African nations, to recover from overgrazing and lack of rain.

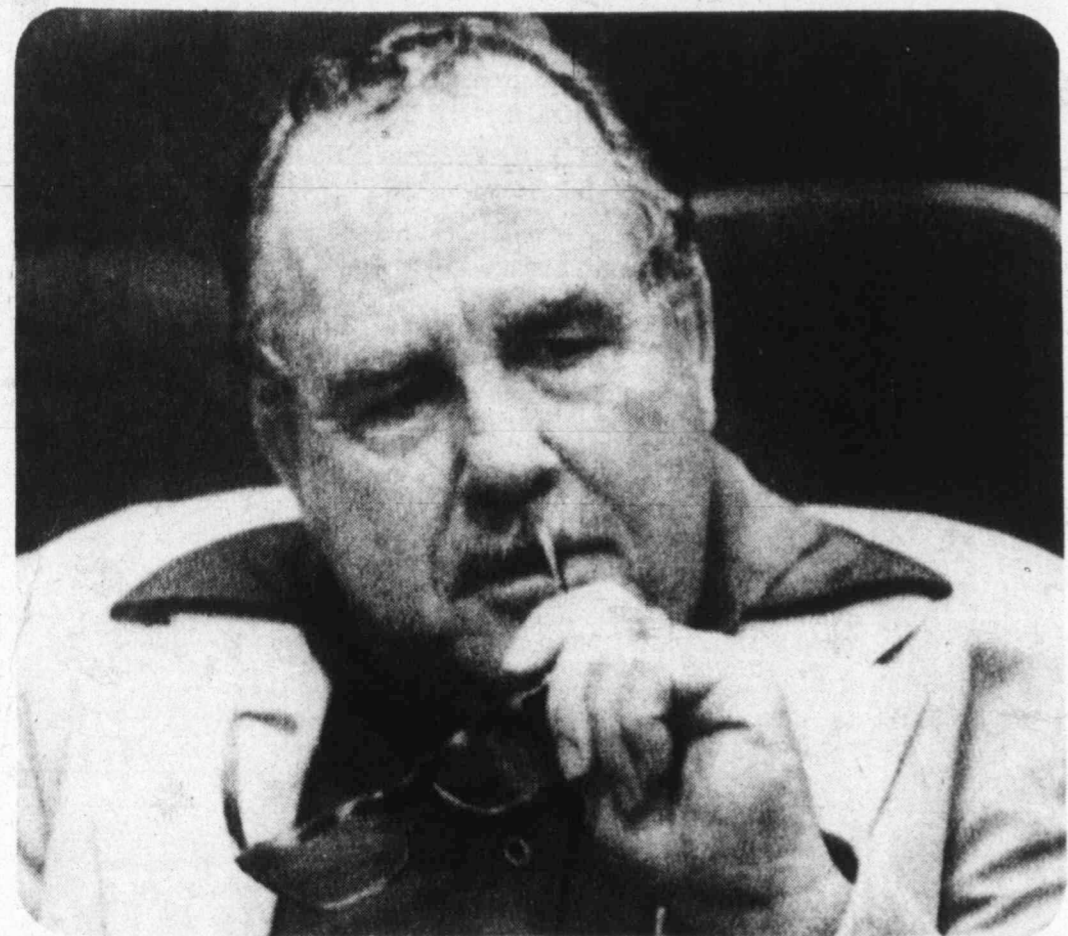
Hijacked Copter Plays Part In Prison Escape

JACKSON, Mich. (AP) — A hijacked helicopter swooped into the yard at Southern Michigan Prison in Jackson and plucked one or two inmates to freedom today, authorities said. State police said the hijacker and the escapee or escapees flew to the Munith area, about 15 miles northeast of the prison, where they switched from the copter to a getaway car. Jackson County Sheriff's deputies said an unidentified pilot was apparently hijacked somewhere in the Jackson area. Deputies said the hijacker held a knife to the pilot's throat during the escape flight, but the pilot was not injured. Sheriff's deputies said the helicopter pilot attempted to follow the auto in his chopper after the men escaped in the car. He alerted authorities who set up a roadblock, stopping a car matching the description of the getaway car. But when stopped, the auto was driven by a woman and no one else was inside. The woman was being questioned by state troopers. State Police Deputy Director Forrest Jacob said the men were believed to be on foot. Jacob said tracking dogs and a state police helicopter were being sent to

the Munith area to press the manhunt. Robert Brown, deputy director of the State Corrections Department, said the helicopter swooped in toward the walled prison barely off the ground and "hopped" over the wall landing at the rear of the facility. He said the prison wall is only monitored by television cameras at that point and the chopper was out of range of gun towers. He said the chopper's identification numbers had been painted over. Authorities were making a head count at the prison to determine who was missing. The current movie "Breakout," starring Charles Bronson, centers on the use of a helicopter for a prison escape. It is based on an actual prison escape in Mexico several years ago.

Committee Hears Six Little Words

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Rancher-banker Clinton Manges declined to testify today before a special House investigating committee because he has hired former state Sen. Jim Bates as his lawyer, and Bates is in a murder trial. The committee is investigating District Court Judge O. P. Carrillo of Duval County to see if impeachment charges should be brought against him. Manges was subpoenaed Wednesday night by officers who had tried to find him for several days. Arthur Mitchell, representing Carrillo, told the committee he could not represent Manges because of a possible conflict of interest between Carrillo and

Manges. Manges, an unimposing, plump man with leathery skin and a small black and gray mustache, spoke only six words to the committee in the glare of camera lights. Rep. DeWitt Hale, D-Corpus Christi, committee chairman, asked Manges if he had hired Bates, as Mitchell had said. "I have," Manges said. Hale asked if it was his wish not to testify until Bates could be in Austin at 2 p.m. Tuesday. "It is," Hale asked if the Tuesday schedule would be satisfactory. "It will." Rep. Jim Kaster, D-El Paso, said he thought the delay was a good idea

because "Gov. (Dolph) Briscoe is out of town and he will be back then and can give him back that money." The committee room rocked with laughter. Manges did not change expression. The money Kaster referred to was a \$15,000 contribution Manges made to Briscoe's 1972 campaign. Briscoe has said he could not accept a contribution of that size from someone he barely knew. He said he has been trying to give it back to Manges for more than two years but cannot make connections with him. The money reportedly now rests in a Houston bank vault in the custody of Briscoe's lawyers.

Americans May Spend Way Out Of Recession

Americans are starting to spend again, loosening the purse strings after more than a year of caution caused by soaring prices and uncertainty over the future of the economy. The signs are small ones and the indicators are far from unanimous. But recent reports show that consumers apparently are heeding the advice of those economists and politicians who have been urging people to spend their way out of recession. Retail business picked up last month; so did car sales, although they were still at a 14-year low. Businesses are spending more for equipment. Government indexes on the economy provided encouragement for the

experts. Tax rebates were credited with providing some of the stimulus. The rate of inflation has been lower; consumer confidence is rising. No one knows how many Americans will spend the rebate checks they are getting from the federal government and how many will simply put the money into savings accounts. The total of the rebates is estimated at \$8.1 billion. Dr. Elsie Watters, research director for the nonprofit Tax Foundation Inc., predicted more than half of the money refunded to taxpayers will be spent on consumer goods. Dr. Watters said the economy already had shown

signs of improvement. She said the rebate "is the icing on the cake." Irwin Kellner, an economist at Manufacturers Hanover Trust Co., said the tax rebate checks — being mailed at the rate of 13 million a week — were a factor in May increases in retail sales. Sears Roebuck & Co., the nation's biggest retailer, reported Thursday that sales in May were 2.2 per cent higher than they were in the same month a year ago. The figures were unadjusted for inflation. J.C. Penney Co. said May sales were 7 per cent higher than last year's and Montgomery Ward Co. reported a 4 per cent boost.

Paid \$450,000 Bribes To Two Arab Generals

WASHINGTON (AP) — Northrop Corp. says an Arab general took a \$250,000 bribe in 1972 to refrain from blocking sale of the company's F5E jet fighters to Saudi Arabia. In a special report made public late Thursday, the California aircraft manufacturer said it paid another \$200,000 in 1973 to an intermediary as bribe money for a second Saudi Arabian general after the officer became hostile to Northrop employees. The report said both payments were requested by its Middle East sales representative, Adnam M. Khashoggi. According to the report, Khashoggi told Northrop officials the first \$250,000 payment indeed reached the intended recipient. Neither general was named in the report, but Northrop said it had given the information to Saudi authorities. Khashoggi disputes Northrop's account of the affair. He says he got the money for legitimate expenses and denies paying any bribes. Northrop officials are to appear Monday before the Senate subcommittee on multinational corporations. The panel is probing over-

seas payments by U.S. corporations, including Gulf Oil Corp.'s \$4 million in political donations in South Korea and United Brands' \$1.25-million banana bribe in Honduras. Earlier this year, the Securities and Exchange Commission accused Northrop of keeping inadequate records for some \$30 million paid to sales agents and consultants. This led to speculation that some of the money went for bribes or political gifts.

Bronson Will 'Stay Home'

The Frankovich movie starring Charles Bronson, which was to have been filmed in the Big Spring area, will instead be filmed on a western set in Hollywood, the Texas Film Commission told the Chamber of Commerce this week. The Texas Film Commission thanked the local Chamber for their efforts to attract the film and said that there are still possibilities of getting other movies for the area.

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CHRISTINA, JACKIE FEUDING? Plans For Onassis Fortune Disclosed

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Christina Onassis, principal heir to her father's estimated \$1-billion fortune, said Thursday that half of it would be given away through a charitable organization.

The 24-year-old Christina said through a spokesman that such a donation was "in accordance with the instructions and wishes of my deceased father, Aristotle Onassis."

The brief announcement, however, failed to clarify the amount she and her stepmother, Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, had inherited. There have been reports that the two women have been feuding over the inheritance.

The statement announcing the plans for half the fortune was read to newsmen by Christina's lawyer in Athens, Stelios Papadimitriou. Christina was not present.

She had arrived in Athens three days ago to attend to business affairs and visit close relatives.

It was the first time the Onassis family had publicly disclosed that it would donate money for philanthropic purposes.

Onassis, who died at 69 in Paris last March, often had given money to the poor here privately and had sent many Greek children to the United States and paid for their medical expenses when he operated Olympic Airways, Greece's national airline.

major part of his fortune through shipping, had often been accused by Greeks at home of being "selfish" and "callous" for failing to contribute a sizable part of his empire to the poor while he lived.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Russian film star Victoria Fyodorova will marry an American airline pilot, a member of retired Adm. Jackson R. Tate's family said Thursday.

The 29-year-old actress, who came to this country in March to meet Tate, the father she had never seen, will wed Fred Poy of Stamford, Conn., a pilot for Pan American World Airways, Tate's son Hugh said.

Efforts to reach Poy for confirmation were unsuccessful.

"Well, I don't have a wedding invitation, but I understand that's true," the younger Tate said when asked about the marriage rumors.

"He's a fine gentleman, an ex-naval officer. I heartily approve," said Tate, adding the wedding may be as early as Saturday either in Connecticut or New York.

Tate said the two had met through mutual friends.

The elder Tate, whose love affair with Russian actress Zoya Fyodorova in Moscow in 1945 resulted in Victoria's birth, earlier told reporters he knew of no marriage

Victoria waged a long battle with Russian authorities to gain the 90-day visa which enabled her to visit her ailing father, who as a young naval attaché had been banished from Russia when Joseph Stalin learned of his romance.

Victoria's mother Zoya, now 62 and living in Moscow, was imprisoned for eight years by Stalin. Tate, 77, did not learn of his daughter's existence until 1963.

Temporary Repairs Are Authorized For Bridge

Authorizing temporary repairs costing \$2,500 to \$3,000 for materials alone, County Commissioners Court Thursday afternoon discussed replacing the Moss Creek Road bridge over Beal's Creek.

County Engineer Neel Barnaby suggested building a new bridge with 60-foot precast concrete slabs. Such a \$100,000 bridge would look like an overpass on an interstate, Barnaby explained. Also, Barnaby proposed

straightening the dead-end road (Howard County 29) used both by lake visitors and trucks carrying sand and gravel.

But, for now, the court has decided to authorize purchasing \$2,500 to \$3,000 worth of high quality cement and reinforcing steel.

Should the bridge become impassable, some rural residents and possibly park visitors would be stranded. Vehicles, which will temporarily be routed over part

of the existing structure, could travel over the concrete eight or nine days after it's laid, Barnaby said.

The concrete will reach maximum hardness after 28 days, Barnaby said.

County Judge Bill Tune has had the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission and Texas Highway Department contacted about a grant for a better bridge.

A city specialist for federal grants is assisting the county.

Rain Making Tries Bared

Some of the "mysteries" of weather modification attempts were bared for the Downtown Lions Club here Wednesday at the Settles.

R. A. Schooling, administrative assistant in charge of the Colorado River Municipal Water District's modification efforts, reviewed the district's efforts which go back more than three years. This year, instead of having a contractor, the district is operating its own project.

Schooling detailed how the district also is cooperating with the Texas Water Development Board in a scientific study of the program. By randomization and independently based observation, the TWDB (using an experienced contractor) seeks to evaluate the modification efforts.

John Girdzus, meteorologist for the district, explained how modification efforts are designed to speed up the time cycle in microscopic ice crystals which may form around silver iodide particles and thus bring the coagulation of moisture to the point of rain. He also fielded the numerous questions from the floor about theory and practice in weather modification.

Admission Of Women To Academies Okayed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Admission of women to the U.S. military service academies was approved today by the Senate.

The action was by voice vote and with little debate.

Since the House added a similar provision to its version of this year's military weapons procurement bill, the requirement that women be admitted to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y.; the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md.,

and the U.S. Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs, Colo., appears likely to become law this year.

The women's admission vote came on an amendment to a \$30.3-billion authorization bill.

House adoption of the similar amendment came after a spirited debate on the potential for putting women into combat roles.

Sen. William D. Hathaway, D-Maine, principal sponsor of the Senate's admission amendment, said he did not view it as a prelude to use of women in combat. He noted that Army nurses and other women personnel already are prepared to serve in combat zones.

"My feeling is that if we are going to have women in the services they should get the best training possible," Hathaway said in an interview.

The Senate version includes language allowing the

secretary of Defense discretion to "accomplish expeditiously additional changes that may be required from time to time to accommodate women."

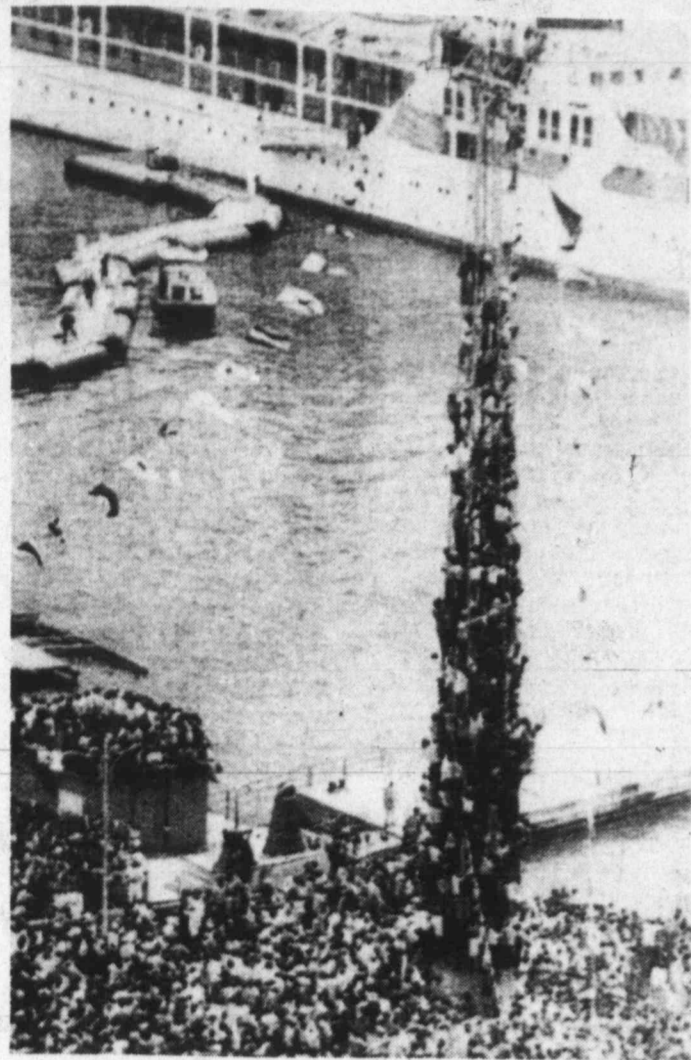

Hill's Opinion On FOI Request

AUSTIN (AP) — Speaker Bill Clayton has the responsibility to make House records available for public inspection but he can still direct inquiries about House members to the individual affected, Atty. Gen. John Hill said Thursday.

The opinion was in answer to a request from Clayton made after The Associated Press asked that the attorney general decide if each member of the House had the authority to say if his records shall be open to the public.

Clayton issued a memo April 8 saying requests for

information concerning House members should be directed to the members themselves.

Previous speakers have given free access to members' records without the requirement of contacting the members first.

Hill's opinion Thursday said the law clearly says the speaker is "custodian of public records" of the House and the speaker can establish "reasonable procedure for public records to be inspected efficiently, safely and without delay." Hill said this duty could be performed through a speaker's agents but "the speaker's responsibility to see that public records of the House are made available for inspection may not be delegated."

Newsmen Booted Out

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — Three American newsmen and a West German were expelled from South Vietnam today and arrived in Vientiane.

They were George Esper of The Associated Press, Paul Vogle and Chad Huntley of United Press International, and Dieter Ludwig, a German who had been working for CBS and Time magazine.


The Provisional Revolutionary Government told the four newsmen it was ordering them out of the country because it wanted to reduce the number of journalists in Saigon and wanted to get rid of those with years of experience under the previous South Vietnamese government.

The new government did not object to any of the dispatches the four men filed from Saigon, all of which had to go through censorship.

Vogle has been in Vietnam 19 years, Esper 10, Huntley 8. Ludwig is also a veteran.

"A reasonable and expeditious procedure, whereby requests are directed to individual members to whom the information relates cannot be said as a matter of law to violate the Open Records Law," Hill said.

The Catfish is no longer floundering — and as a result, the New York Yankees are surfacing. "I'm in the groove now and know what I'm doing," said Catfish Hunter after beating the Minnesota Twins 7-4 Thursday.

Hunter, the Yankees' expensive right-hander, finally appears to be worth his weight in the gold they're paying him. The Yankees' \$3.75-million man, who couldn't win a game in April, now has won eight of his last 10 decisions.

And the Yankees have sailed over the 500 level for the first time this season and moved into second place, three games behind the first-place Boston Red Sox in the American League East.

RYAN TO PITCH History Could Be Made Today

ANAHEIM (AP) — Hang in there, Sandy Koufax. Keep cool, Johnny Vander Meer. You and your record-book achievements probably won't get shunted aside tonight. But then again...

Two years ago, Nolan Ryan pitched a no-hitter and then, in his next start, went seven innings before he surrendered a hit, a bloop single.

Tonight, against Hank Aaron and the Milwaukee Brewers, Ryan gets another chance to throw a second consecutive no-hitter — matching Vander Meer's 1938 feat, as well as an unprecedented fifth career no-hitter, which would eclipse Koufax's achievement.

Despite the historic possibilities in front of him, Ryan is facing the game in his usual unflappable manner. "As far as a fifth no-hitter is concerned, I don't think it will put any more pressure on me. I've been there before," he said earlier this week.

"If there's an opportunity, I'll go for it. But I'm not going to change my style just to throw a no-hitter. I'm going out to win a ball game."

Vander Meer of the Cincinnati Reds pitched his consecutive no-hitters against the Boston Braves and Brooklyn Dodgers on June 11 and 15 in 1938.

Koufax was the sole owner of the major league record of four no-hitters until Ryan tied him last Sunday with a 1-0 victory over the Baltimore Orioles. Ryan's achievement stands as an American League record, breaking the mark of three no-hitters held by the great Bob Feller of the Cleveland Indians.

Ryan came closest to matching Vander Meer in 1973. He pitched his first no-hitter on May 15 and came back at Detroit on July 15 with his second.

His next start was at Anaheim Stadium on July 19 against Baltimore. "I hadn't pitched a no-hitter at home and I wanted to do it," Ryan said.

He came close. Through seven innings he gave up no hits, although the score was 1-1. In the eighth, Brooks Robinson reached first base when the umpire ruled he had been hit by a pitch. Robinson later said he didn't think the pitch had touched him.

Mark Belanger, in a bunting situation, hit away and blooped a high fast ball into short center field. The Orioles won 3-2 in the 11th inning.

San Antonio, the TL West cellar-dweller, is 13 games behind Shreveport despite the victory.

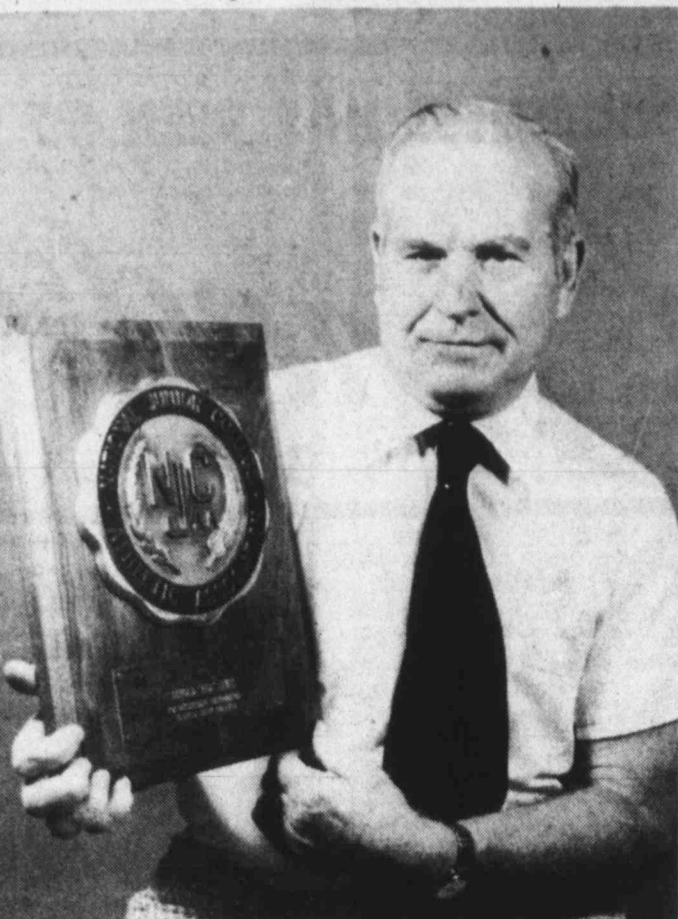

DALLAS (AP) — Three University of Texas baseball players, including star pitcher Jim Gideon, have been chosen in the first five rounds of major league baseball's free agent draft.

The Texas Rangers picked the 6-foot-4, 190-pound junior right-hander in the first round Wednesday and grabbed Blair Stouffer, a UT shortstop, in the fifth. The San Francisco Giants picked UT catcher Rick Bradley in the second round.

Terry Wright, a Paris, Tex., high school pitcher, was grabbed by the Rangers in the third round.

Gideon compiled a 38-6 college record with a 2.11 earned run average. He posted a 15-0 record this year as he guided his team to the College World Series in Omaha.

The Houston Astros chose Michael McLaughlin, a David Lipscomb College hurler from Nashville, Tenn., in the first round.

The first player from the Lone Star state picked was Arthur Miles, an Austin Crockett High School shortstop. He was chosen by the Montreal Expos.

Miles, 18, hit .321 this past season and made the all-Dist. 26-4A squad. He is considered an excellent fielder with a strong arm.

The Philadelphia Phillies took the second Texas player when they snared Sammy Welborn, a Wichita Falls high school pitcher.

Welborn, a 6-4, 195-pound right-hander, said in Wichita Falls that he still plans to sign a letter of intent with UT although he plans to talk with Philadelphia.

"If Philadelphia offers me a good deal, I will start my professional career this summer," Welborn said.

Welborn, who hurled three no-hitters in high school, had 136 strikeouts in 75 innings this year. He had a four-year ERA of 1.11.

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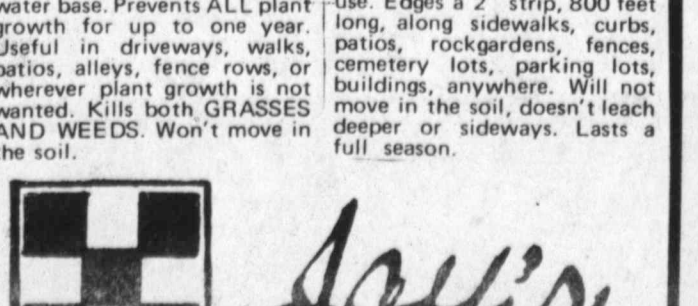
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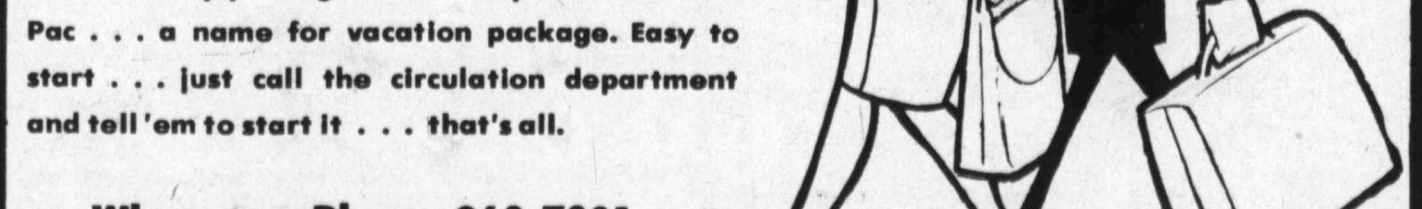
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No Joy

PROVO, Utah (AP) — A small misstep by Texas-El Paso high jumper Greg Joy may mean a giant leap for Southern California toward its first NCAA Track Championship since 1968.

In Wednesday's qualifying events, Joy, the NCAA indoor champion and a potential winner for meet contender UTPEP, tripped into the pit on his final try at 6-11, and was eliminated.

The top 12 jumpers qualified for Saturday's finals and Joy's unexpected miss left him far out. The 54th annual NCAA outdoor championships are being held at Brigham Young University.

Until Joy stumbled, Texas-El Paso figured to challenge USC for the team title. But, with Joy's possible 10 points irretrievably lost and with USC advancing nine men to further competition, the Texans' chances dimmed considerably.

Western Athletic Conference champ UTPEP now needs heavy scoring from shot putter Hans Hognlund, triple-jumper Arnold Grimes, pole vaulter Larry Jesse and distance men Wilson Waigwa and James Munyala to stay with the Trojans.

Texas-El Paso's complaint on the call was overruled by an NCAA appeal jury.

But Southern Cal did its own part in its march toward a possible title, qualifying 45.1 quarter-mile Ken Randle to lead a qualifying list that included Olympic long jump champion Randy Williams and intermediate hurdler Tom Andrews.

Williams and Theo Hamilton of Kansas both broke the old BYU stadium record of 25-11 3/4 in the long jump. Hamilton leaped 26-5 1/4 and Williams, 26 1/2.

Southern Cal also will have shots at points with James Gilkes in the 220, Darrell Elder and Vic Fruguglietti in the discus and strong 440 and mile relays teams.

BOB MURPHY Notoriously Bad Starter

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — If Bob Murphy's self-assessment is correct, he may be cashing a \$50,000 check Sunday.

"I'm a notoriously bad starter," said Murphy, winner of this year's Jackie Gleason Classic. "But I'm probably the best finisher on the tour."

Murphy, a rotund 210-pounder, had a four-under-par 68 Thursday in the opening round of the \$250,000 Kemper Open Golf Tournament, leaving him in a tie for fourth place, three shots behind the leader, former PGA champion Ray Floyd, who carded a brilliant 65 in the hot, muggy weather.

"I don't know why I usually start badly," said Murphy. "I think it's a matter of concentration. This was a fast start for me. My good start usually is 72."

"I'd sure like to pick up 50 bills here and be on my way to the U.S. Open," he added, referring to the year's second major test of golfing greatness, scheduled in two weeks at Medina, Ill., just outside Chicago.

While Murphy was hoping for a strong second round today over the 7,160-yard, par-72 Quail Hollow Country Club course, Floyd was enjoying the spotlight as a leader.

"I haven't been in the lead in so long I might not get any sleep tonight," said Floyd, winless since making the PGA title his third championship of the 1969 season.

Trailing by two shots at 67 were tour rookie Roger Maltbie, who rolled in two 35-foot putts and a 20-footer, and Bobby Mitchell, winless since the 1972 Tournament of Champions. He also putted well, winging a 20-footer and a 30-footer, and holed a trap shot from 35 feet on No. 6.

Tied with Murphy at 68 were long-hitting Jim Dent

and Dick Ryan. Grouped at 69 were Joe Porter, Miller Barber, Danny Edwards, Ed Furgol, Jim Wiechers and Gary Player.

Australian Bruce Crampton had a 71 and Lee Trevino struggled to a 75 that included a triple-bogey seven on the seventh hole.

McGinnis' Contract Ruled Void By NBA

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Larry O'Brien, five days the commissioner of the National Basketball Association, laid down the law against the New York Knicks and gave his blessing to a record \$400,000 fine against the Atlanta Hawks.

"The league can exist only if it adopts and adheres to an appropriate set of rules," O'Brien said Thursday after the cases involving superstars George McGinnis and Julius Erving were decided — for now, anyway.

"If violations of such rules by one team were permitted, then it would be the same as if there were no rules at all. This would, of course, threaten the structure and very existence of the league," he said.

Playing outside the rules, the Knicks last Friday signed American Basketball Association scoring champion McGinnis although NBA forwards to the Indiana Pacers' forward belonged to the Philadelphia 76ers. The Hawks signed Erving, another ABA star, in 1972 before he was eligible for the NBA draft.

O'Brien said the Knicks were guilty of a "flagrant violation" of the NBA constitution and bylaws and ruled that McGinnis' contract with New York is void. He also ordered the Knicks to forfeit their 1975 first-round draft.

"We have no plans of future defense. The deed is done. We'll respect the commissioner's decision," said Knicks President Mike Burke.

The Knicks, in signing McGinnis for a \$500,000 bonus and \$400,000 a

year for six seasons, said he would get his money regardless of whether he was allowed to join the team. The only way they can get him now is by making Philadelphia an offer it can't refuse — mainly players, cash or both.

General Manager Pat Williams of the 76ers has said he wants McGinnis. The player, free in O'Brien's eyes to return to the ABA, says he wants to play with New York or no one in the NBA.

The fine levied by the NBA Board of Governors against the Hawks in the three-year-old Erving case is believed to be the largest in pro sports history. O'Brien, it was learned, spoke in favor of the action.

"I was surprised by the size of the fine," said Hawks President John Wilcox, who added that no decision had been made whether to take legal action to fight the ruling. That decision may be up to new owners who will take over leadership of the Hawks' franchise when they get NBA approval.

The Hawks were ordered to pay the league \$250,000 and the Milwaukee Bucks \$150,000. The Bucks drafted Erving in 1972, one day after the Hawks had secretly signed him.

Erving returned to the ABA, joining the New York Nets who reportedly paid the Hawks \$400,000, and is playing now under a long-term contract.

If he ever becomes available to the NBA, the Bucks will have rights to him. The Bucks also received two second-round draft picks Atlanta holds for 1976.

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Independent South Carolina, 47-4, opens its bid against Seton Hall, 31-8, and Eastern Michigan, 35-17, tangled with Florida State, 49-8, in the remaining first-round games Saturday night.

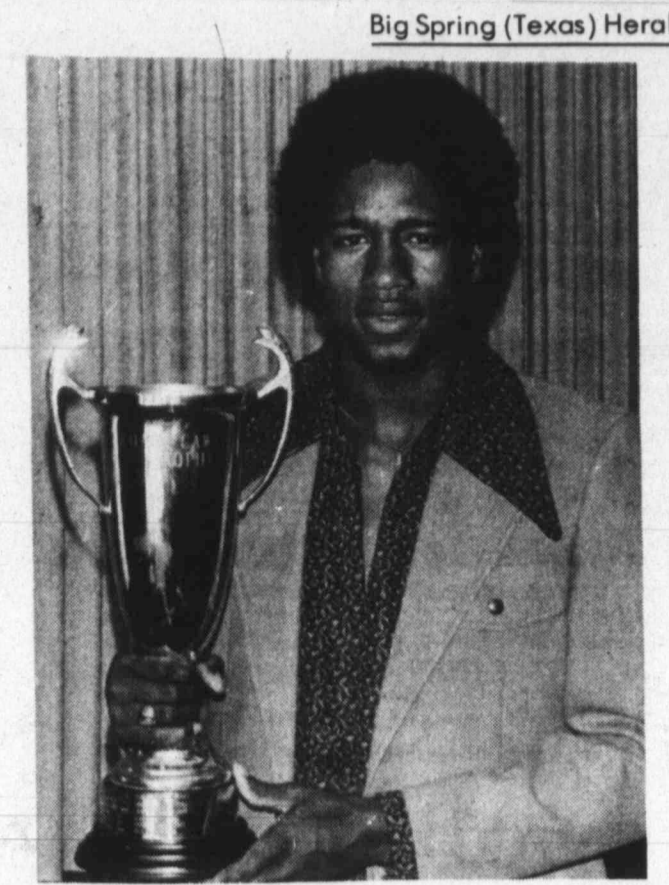
Lewis, the first team to win the NAIA baseball title two years in a row, also beat Sam Houston in the 1974 double-elimination tournament by one run.

There Is Nothing Hidden In Today's Modern Church

NEW YORK (ap) — Secrecy is a declining practice in the churches. They've become increasingly open about their official discussions, decisions and operation. But just as in government, concealment — and at times deceptions — still occur.

In some cases, there are closed meetings, confidential reports, hidden agendas, unrevealed actions.

Yet the churches, like other public and governmental institutions, represent people, are supported by the people's money and the people consequently are entitled to know what goes on, says Richard N. Ostling, president of the Religion Newswriters Association.

While the churches generally affirm that principle, he writes in a book issued by Harper and Row, "Secrecy in the Church," they sometimes don't live up to it. Take some recent examples:

— Roman Catholic bishops, at their annual

meeting last fall, acted in closed session on a matter of obvious concern both to church members and the public, but afterward wouldn't reveal it. Reporters queried usually candid friends among them, but they wouldn't tell. Their then president, John Cardinal Krol, of Philadelphia, had admonished them to silence.

Finally, however, through one bishop who believed in leveling with the people on an action involving them, the facts were brought out: A committee had been authorized to raise questions with congressional committees to confirmation of Nelson Rockefeller as vice president because of his pro-abortion stand. Only after newsmen dug it out, through a lone bishop against hiding it, was an action on a clearly public issue officially acknowledged.

— In another case, the interdenominational relief agency supported by most major Protestant and Orthodox churches, Church World Service, recently was involved in a policy con-

troversy over whether it should oppose oppressive governing systems overseas as well as doing direct relief work.

An emergency meeting of its 30-member executive board met to consider the dispute, but reporters were barred and official statements afterward were ambiguous. Only later through individual sources was it determined — on a matter of keen church-member concern — that the agency would stick solely to relief-rehabilitation work and avoid partisan conduct about foreign social systems.

"There is nothing hidden but it must be disclosed," Jesus said. Ostling, the brainy, gentlemanly religion editor of Time magazine, cites this principle in his coolly documented study and adds: "The Christian church has a special claim to be champion of the truth, and the truth is without value if no one knows it."

Emphasizing that church leaders are "accountable to their members," he observes: "Secrecy is based upon a low opinion of the public and ultimately of the individual man."

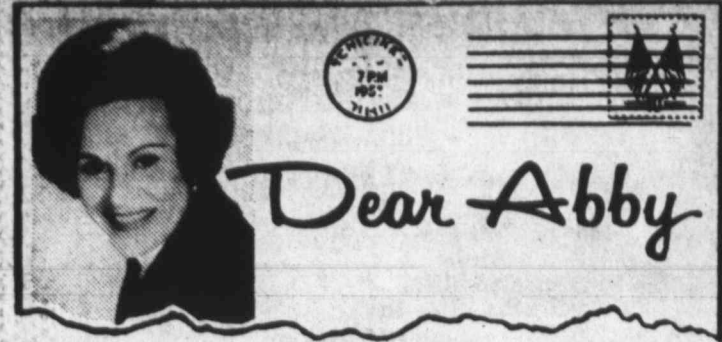
