WASHINGTON (AP) The Supreme Court today agreed to review a decision upholding a provision in a federal law requiring coal mining companies to finance payment of benefits to blackung sufferers

The court will hear arguments on the decision of a three-judge federal court in Lexington, Ky., which simultaneously struck down other features of the law.

The Black Lung Benefits Act of 1972 provided for the federal government to pay monthly benefits for life to coal miners disabled by black-lung disease who submitted their claims before the end of 1973. It made employers liable for claims submitted after 1973.

The law also provided that a miner or the survivors of a miner who could submit xray, biopsy or autopsy evidence of complicated black-lung disease could submitting any further evidence. The three-judge court said this portion of the act, creating an "irrebuttable presumption" of liability, was unconstitutional.

Faint Rays Of Sunshine

It's keep-your-fingers-crossed time.

For the second straight month, the Commerce Department's composite index of leading economic indicators has taken a jump upward. It increased 4.2 per cent in April, after a 1 per cent rise in March.

That's the first time since February and March of last year the economy has strung two plus months together. And the April increase is the highest ever for a single month, breaking the previous high set in June,

Historically, three months of changes in direction of the index has been taken as conformation of a change in the economy. In other words, another increase in the figures for May would mean we are climbing out of the recession - if historical precedents still apply

The index itself is most useful as a forecast. If we are rising, as indicated, in economic well-being, the full effects should begin to be felt this summer. By the end

THE GOAL is to convince Montgomery, Ala. Although Wallace's uninhibited criticism of Sweden in that interview accurately stated the historical facts, he has been accused of thinking neutral Sweden was a belligerent — of being a snopesian ignoramus.

Nor is that the only distortion. A reading of the transcript shows no Wallace departure on foreign policy from his rambling conversations with reporters over the years: blunt to the point of offensiveness, nationalistic to the point of jingoism, anti-Communist to the point of hysteria. But the analyses have painted a more sinister picture.

THE REASON for this is the Democratic party's escalating Wallace dilemma. Party leaders have no airtight arguments to blunt Wallace's obvious appeal to the discontented. That led to the first contrivance: the aborted drive to repeal presidential primaries Wallace would likely win.

Wallace's interview with the foreign journalists, reported by the Washington Post of May 8, was therefore desperately needed ammunition. It fit the purposes of mainstream Democrats to foster the impression that Wallace had confused Sweden's World War II status. Both liberal and conservative columnists chortled over his alleged redneck ignorance.

THE SHAH HAS the advantage of knowing just what he wants and having as well the authority to go after it. During his recent visit to Washington he said that prices charged by the oil producing and exporting countries OPEC would undoubtedly go up in September. This reflects his intention to get all that he can from an asset that, as he has said in the past, has a life of perhaps 20 years.

His statement angered some officials in Washington who feel that still another price increase would mean another round of inflation and deepen the problems of the developing nations.

THE SHAH'S RESPONSE was to point the inflation in the cost of raw materials, notably agricultural products, of 34 per cent. Greater by far, he insisted, than the rise in the cost of oil over the past two years.

Whatever the merits in the tit-fortat argument about inflationary price rises, and Secretary of the Treasury William Simon sharply challenges the Shah's figures, the Ford Administration has yet to face up to the demand of the developing nations for price indexing. This means fixing levels, a floor and a

ceiling, on exported raw materials.

IT RELECTS the deep resentment in the third world of the rapid fluctuations in the prices of the agricultural products from the

When the commonwealth countries met in Jamaica recently, price a primitive economy.

The indexing would apply, of course, coffee which the third world sends into world markets with prices often falling ever deeper into the oil trap As of the end of March, U. S. oil consumption was close to 17 million barrels a day, nearly a million barrels more than a year earlier.

IN FEBRUARY, 1974, the U.S. was getting only 8.6 per cent of imported oil from the Middle East while a year later this had risen to 25.5 per cent, with about 14 per cent coming from Iran.

The Shah's position has been greatly strengthened politically during the past year. Having settled a long quarrel with neighboring Iraq, he is now better able to assume the role of leader and protector of the Persian Gulf states. These states are themselves large oil producers. Saudi Arabia 'ranks first in production and reserves, Iran

THE ASSASSINATION of Saudi Arabia's King Faisal meant the end of a rival for power in the Gulf. The present rulers in Riyadh apparently do not share the late king's resentment of the Shah's ambitions and his concern for keeping the smaller

states free of big power intervention. Iran's vast oil revenues are going for two principal purposes. One is for modern industry, five nuclear power plants from the United States being only part of the expansion designed to bring the country into the late 20th century. New water resources, including desalination, are to convert deserts into farms.



(AP) — The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries is expected to agree to abandon the U.S. dollar as the basis for the international oil price




