Black, Mexican-American Feminists Disrupt Meeting

By PEGGY SIMPSON MEXICO CITY (AP) — A group of black and Mexican-American feminists disrupted a meeting of International Women's Year delegates at the U.S. Embassy, seizing the podium after shouting that the official American delegation to the conference was unrepresentative.

"Where are your Chicanas?" Wynta Boynes of the Congress of Racial Equality in New York called out repeatedly at the start of the meeting, sponsored by the 36-member U.S. delegation to exchange views with about 300 non-governmental participants to the conference.

She and Esther Urista, who identified herself as a Mexican-American from Tucson, Ariz., interrupted the opening speeches to say they had organized a coalition of unrepresented women. Ms. Urista, who prefers the Ms. designation, said there were about "50 or 60" other Mexican-Americans in the audience but only a handful were invited.

The two women said the U.S. delegation had only four minority members and they were not representative of poor and minority women. There are two Spanish surnamed delegates—Gilda Bojorquez Gjurich, a Los Angeles contractor-

businesswoman and Carmen Maymi, a Puerto Rican who directs the Women's Bureau in the Labor Department. Jewel Lafontant, assistant solicitor general, and Nira Long, a lawyer with the Agency for International Development (AID) are the two blacks on the delegation.

About 50 white feminists in the audience indicated their support but many of the 250 other women present booed and hissed, preferring to hear speeches by the co-heads of the U.S. delegation — Daniel Parker, the director of AID, and Patricia Hutar.

When Parker tried to explain AID programs, a young white feminist yelled: "I'm from the United States and I don't have to have a man speak for me... where are our women doctors and lawyers to speak for us?"

After a half hour of shouting and confusion, Mrs. Hutar gave up trying to resume the schedule and Parker left. Mrs. Hutar then introduced the members of the U.S. delegation.

Jewel Lafontant said racism was still a problem in

the United States but the State Department had named her as one of its top three delegates to Mexico "and I'm going to do my job and I hope you're with me. My door is open."

About an hour later the microphone was turned over to the protesters and dozens of other women participants who expressed their views for an additional hour and a half.

Ms. Boynes said later she felt the demonstration had "turned the delegation around. They hadn't been going to pay us any attention. Now they'll have to or we'll interrupt every meeting of the delegation."

Mrs. Hutar said of the demonstration: "It served a very good purpose — to let feelings and strong frustrations come forward. It has been valuable to us... I just hope we can get past the point where everybody has



Will Require Okie Cons To Make Restitution

MALESTER, Okla. (AP)— Some Oklahoma convicts will now be required to make restitution to their victims.

The state Pardon and Parole Board adopted the policy Sunday at its regular monthly meeting here. The board also decided to tighten the granting of paroles.

The Rev. Littleton Fowler of Hugo proposed that convicts make systematic repayments to victims as a condition of their parole.

The policy will apply in any cases where convicts took money for property which was not returned to victims. The board reserved the right to examine each case individually but the policy will mostly affect bogus check cases.

"I feel that anybody who makes parole should have a minimum wage to live on, but if they can make restitution they should. We've got to think about the victims too," said board chairman Charles Chesnut of Miami.

The board then applied the policy to inmate Thomas Walkabout, a carpenter serving seven years for passing \$1,500 worth of hot checks in Tulsa.

"I think it's fair," Walkabout told the board. "I want to pay those people back."

Board member John R. Green of Duncan raised the issue of pardons, noting that a convict serving a 15-year term was paroled last January and has already asked for a pardon.

"I don't want to pardon someone until they have completed their term of supervision, unless there are extraordinary circumstances," Green said.

The board also found out that Gov. David Boren has bounced back a pardon request by prison activist Jim Goodridge because Warden Richard Crips protested.

Goodridge, executive director of Help Our Prisoners Exist (HOPE), received a pardon recommendation last April from the board. He is on parole from a five-year term for an Oklahoma City forgery.

Goodridge has been a hard-hitting critic of the Oklahoma corrections system and Warden Crips.

Crips fired off an angry letter to the governor soon after the board recommended a pardon for Goodridge. Crips told the governor he believes Goodridge has violated the conditions of his parole by making statements of Crips which the warden contends weren't aimed at his competency as an administrator but rather were personal in nature.

Boren returned the pardon recommendation to the parole board for reconsideration after talking last week to Robert Mitchell, a gubernatorial aide who

handles corrections problems. Mitchell said Boren decided to return the recommendation with Crips' letter attached after Mitchell told the governor that was what had been done in similar cases.

"The warden is greatly upset by the statements

Goodridge has been making about him as an individual," Mitchell said. "His protest is as valid as any other because Mr. Crips is a common citizen as well as a warden."

The board recommended 29 inmates for parole and denied recommendations for 13.

Solon Released From Hospital

LAGRANGE, Ga. (AP)— Rep. John J. Flynt Jr. and his wife have been released from the hospital where they were taken June 6 after a bus-truck collision which killed two persons and injured 20 others, including Army Secretary Howard "Bo" Callaway.

Flynt, a Georgia Democrat, was admitted to LaGrange City-County Hospital for treatment of chest injuries,

Connally Gigs Congress About Energy Problem

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)— Former Texas Gov. John B. Connally says the American people are defenseless in the face of another foreign oil embargo if it came during a world conflict.

The nation "might last 60 days" under such circumstances, Connally told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram in an interview published over the weekend.

Connally said Congress "has done exactly the wrong thing" about the energy problem despite the seriousness of the situation. The Congress, he said, "is basically 180 degrees out of phase with what it should have done."

The former U.S. Treasury

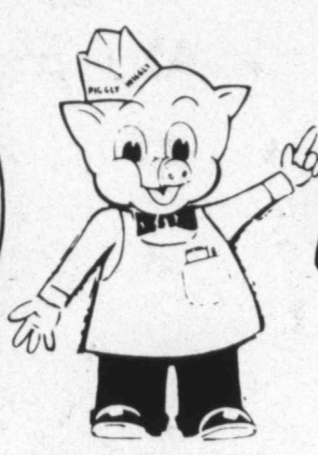
secretary said this Congress is the most irresponsible and least productive in his lifetime. He blasted it for destroying the incentive to search for gas and oil and develop other sources of energy.

On another subject, the former Democrat who turned Republican during the Nixon administration said he does not know who was behind the bribery charges that were brought against him. Connally was acquitted of the charges that he accepted a bribe to help bring higher milk support

prices. "I can't prove a thing," he said. "I think it could have been a number of things but I don't want to speculate on it."

Concerning his political future, Connally, now practicing law in Houston, said, "I am going to say a lot of things around the country that need to be said and I'm going to do it in as fair and objective a way as I know how to do it."

He said he has not ruled out the possibility of seeking public office again.

Hail-Loaded Storms Zip Across Sections Of Texas

Tornadoes dipped and darted ominously as hail-loaded thunderstorms coursed across broad reaches of Texas during the night and into this morning. There was no word of serious damage, however, as the weather calmed by dawn except for a few light storms across the north part of the Texas Panhandle. Skies turned clear to only partly cloudy elsewhere. Turbulence which generated the rash of funnel clouds caused most of North-west Texas and neighboring

parts of Southwest, West Central and North Central Texas to stay under a tornado watch much of the night.

There were reports of two twisters touching ground north of Turkey and at least two more in that neighborhood west and northwest of Childress. The National Weather Service relayed

word of still others being sighted just northwest of Floydada, near San Angelo and west of the Pecos River near Marfa and between Alpine and Marathon in far West Texas.

Often heavy rain and hail accompanied the storms in many localities, including some in East Texas. Hailstones as big as

baseballs pounded down around Marathon. Enough small hail to put a two-inch cover on the ground accumulated at Plainview, and hail the size of golf balls fell at Lockney.

Sunday afternoon heat sent thermometers climbing as high as 97 degrees at Alice in deep South Texas. Amarillo in the Panhandle was the coolest point with a maximum of 85. Readings early today ranged from 60 at Amarillo up to 76 at Corpus Christi on the coast and Del Rio on the Mexican border.

Forecasts promised little change—clear to partly

cloudy across the state with another round of widely scattered thunderstorms by evening, most numerous in the Texas Panhandle and far West Texas.

Blasts, Fire Force Evacuation Of 500

ANGLETON, Tex. (AP)—Fire officials sought today the cause of a series of explosions and fire that destroyed a gas storage facility here.

No injuries were reported in the explosions and fire Sunday at the Angleton Butane Co. but some 500 persons were forced to evacuate their homes in the area.

Fire Chief A.L. Kelley said a gas leak reported at mid morning turned into a chain of small explosions a minute later.

He said the fire spread across a city-block area. An 18,000 gallon tank exploded,

he said, sending a fireball hundreds of feet in the air, shattered windows and damaging walls of a nearby townhouse.

Explosions also occurred in a 4,000-gallon tank and in 40 to 50 small butane cylinders, Kelley said.

Persons evacuated lived in the townhouses, two mobile homes and a housing subdivision.

A 6,000-gallon tank did not explode but burned throughout the day. Firefighters extinguished the blaze in late afternoon and permitted residents to return to their homes.

Kelley said the company

property destroyed in the blast and fire also included company offices and shop and two tank trucks.

A tent skating rink in the back of the facility was destroyed by the fire and the roofs of two small nearby houses were ignited. The roof fires were quickly extinguished.

Kelley said no one was at the company when the explosions began.

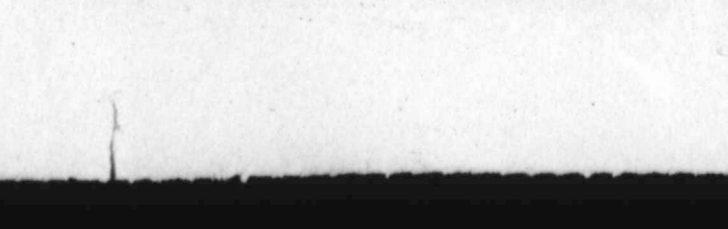

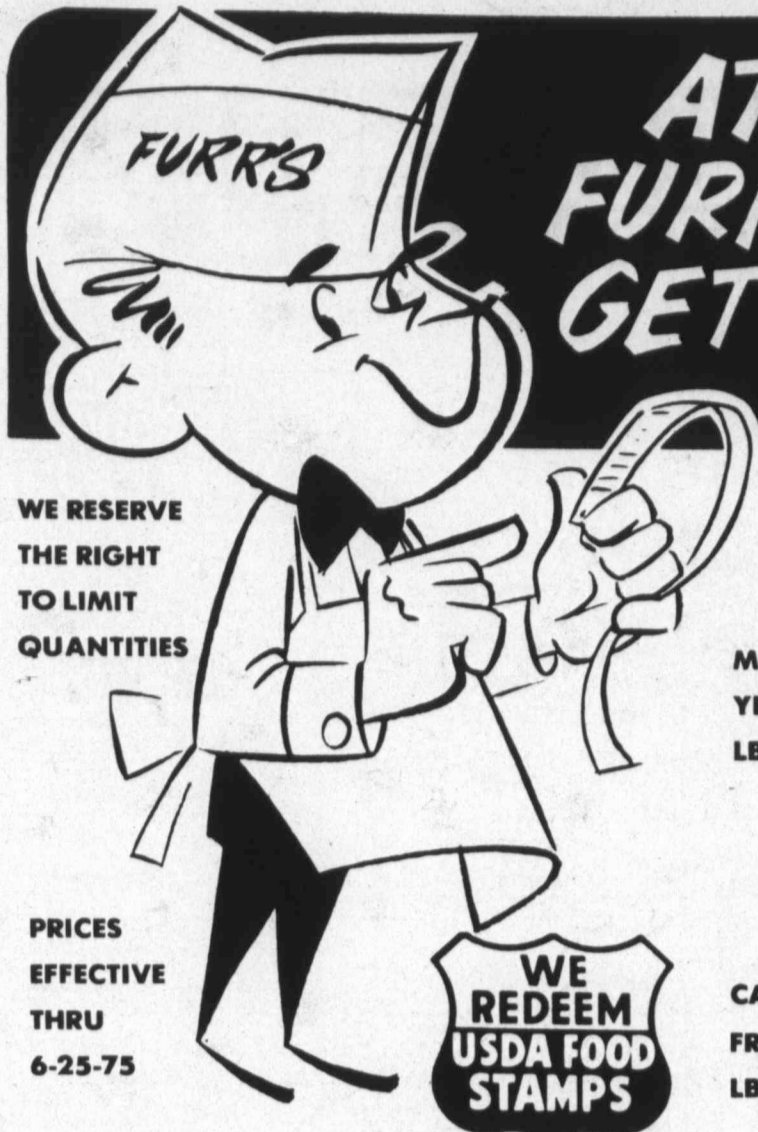
