## 'Detente Hurting Cause'

NEW YORK (AP) — Exiled Russian author Alexander Solzhenitsyn says American eagerness for detente with the Soviet Union may hurt the cause of freedom in his native land.

Asserting that "the liberation of the human spirit from the rubbish of Communism has absolutely no connection with detente," the 1970 Nobel laureate for literature cautioned that, "You, perhaps accidentally, are not helping us toward liberation, but helping bury us in the ground."

Solzhenitsyn spoke Sunday on NBC-TV's "Meet the Press" in a studio near St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Cathedral where a special mass was being said to mark the opening of "Captive Nations Week." The week commemorates the fall of 29 nations to Soviet dominance.

# War Is Declared On Fat Marines

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gen. Louis H. Wilson, the new commandant of the Marine Corps, has declared war on fat Marines and on officers who let them get that way.

"If I see a fat Marine, he's got a problem, and so does his commanding officer," said Wilson, who keeps lean by running two miles every morning.

Wilson told a group of newsmen he plans to send the Marine inspector general around to check on how unit commanders enforce physical fitness standards. "If they are going to have to answer for that," he said, "I will be the first to succeed."

From the moment he became commandant June 30, the 56-year-old Medal of Honor winner has sounded as though he feels the corps needs a general bracing. "I call on all Marines to get in step and do so smartly," he said as he took over from Gen. Robert E. Cushman.

Now, two weeks later, Wilson said he intends to raise enlistment standards and weed out Marines "unwilling to accept discipline."

"I'm willing to sacrifice quantity for quality," Wilson said. He added, however, that he expects the Marines to attract enough quality recruits to fill requirements even after the economic recession ends.

Wilson said he will insist that the Marines recruit a higher percentage of high-school graduates. Indicating the goal is still under study, he said it will be well above the current 55 per cent level.

"I believe there is a majority of opinion that the more highschool graduates we have, the less problems we're going to have with discipline," he said.

For recruits lacking high-school diplomas, Wilson said the corps will demand higher entrance test scores, particularly in the verbal and arithmetic categories. The goal here is to increase the acceptable level from a score of 85 to 95.

Wilson acknowledged continuing problems with crime in the barracks and absence without leave. He attributed these problems, in part, to changing lifestyle patterns among young Marines and non-commissioned officers.

Prices for rice and soybeans are expected to rise if the Soviets buy large segments of America's bumper wheat and rice crops.

Dr. J. Norman Efferson, chancellor of LSU's agricultural sciences department, said Sunday he has learned Russia wants to buy 5 million tons of wheat and 5 million tons of corn from the United States.

"If it does go through, the prospect for rice this fall will be considerably better," said Efferson, renowned for his expertise in crop production and marketing.

"Rice and wheat are interchangeable on the international markets and when the price of wheat changes, rice prices do too. Soybeans are used for livestock feed in competition with wheat and corn, so their price tends to go up when wheat prices increase."

Efferson estimated rice would sell for \$15 to \$15.50 a barrel under normal conditions, but would jump to \$16 or \$16.50 if the Soviets snap up American grain to compensate for a drought in their grain belt.

Louisiana produces about 14.2 million barrels of rice annually, nearly 70 per cent of which is exported.

## No Comeback, Says Actress

MONTE URBASA, Spain (AP) — Audrey Hepburn says she has never quit acting and is not staging a comeback in her new film "Robin and Marian" about Robin Hood and Maid Marian.

Sitting on a stump overlooking a plain in Spain where the movie was being shot, she said her eight-year absence from movie-making was to find out what she wanted and who she was.

"After all, I had worked nearly all my life. I started teaching ballet when I was 13, and for years I was undergoing the discipline ballet demands. When you're in films, it means you're completely absorbed for three months or more. Your life isn't your own."

## Violent Death Count Rises To 13 In State

Traffic as usual was the most frequent cause of violent deaths in Texas over the weekend although tragedy in the form of gunfire resulted in the death of a Clay County rancher early Sunday.

The Associated Press tabulated weekend violent deaths from 6 p.m. Friday and included fatalities that occurred before midnight Sunday.

Early today, the grim total reached 13, including eight traffic fatalities, three

homicides and two drownings. Authorities in Wichita Falls said Jim Keith, 61, was shot to death by two burglars who took antique guns and jewelry from his Clay County ranch after tying up his brother Kenneth, 70, and forcing him to help them open a safe.

Clifford Joe Walker, 22, of Houston, was killed Sunday night when his car collided with a wrecker on a South-west Houston street.

Pat Stearns, 74, of Abilene, drowned at Possum

Kingdom Lake in Palo Pinto County Sunday while taking his first scuba diving lesson.

A Hereford man, Juan Perez, 33, died at a Canyon hospital after his car ran off IH 27 north of Canyon and struck a tree Sunday.

Two motorists were killed Saturday night in a two-vehicle crash on a Dallas expressway. Joaquin G. Moreno, 64, and Rhudell Anderson, 55, both of Dallas, were identified as the victims of the wreck between a car and a pickup. Joe Moreno, 23, was critically injured in the collision.

Guyola Weimer, 54, of Dallas died Saturday of injuries he received in a two-vehicle collision at an intersection on the south side of Dallas.

A motorcycle accident on a farm road near Bowie Saturday killed Casey Russell Deen, 21, a ranch worker who was a member of a prominent Fort Worth family. Highway patrolmen said Deen, whose grandfather was a former Fort Worth mayor, lost control of his motorcycle about 2:30 a.m. while riding on the road leading to the family ranch where he worked.

Demetrio Ortega, 35, of Abilene drowned Saturday when he fell out of a boat while fishing in the Gulf of Mexico off Aransas Pass. Authorities said Ortega and his brother-in-law, Joe Perez, were thrown from the boat when its steering mechanism malfunctioned. Perez was rescued.

Johnnie Earl Cleveland, 39, a Houston carpenter, was killed Saturday night when he was shot in the left shoulder with a .32 caliber rifle. Officers said Cleveland was shot in a family quarrel.

Patricia Ann Shaffer, was found beaten to death Saturday after she was seen arguing with a man at a Houston cafe. John Burgess Webb, 29, was charged with murder in connection with the death.

Michael Lee Copeland, 8, and his brother, William Gregory, 6, of Southgate, Calif., were killed Saturday as they rode in the back of a pickup-camper that overturned near Ozona in West Texas during a thunderstorm.

A Big Spring woman was arrested here Saturday night in connection with an embezzlement in New Mexico.

The theft involved turquoise jewelry, police said.

## Red Cross Plans Class

"Better than average" swimmers are urged to attend a special American Red Cross Water Safety zone school, to be held from July 21-25 at Balmorhea State Park.

Certified Red Cross water safety instructor trainers will teach students various new swimming courses to qualify the students as basic swimming instructors and water safety instructors. Current water safety instructors will also receive essential retraining. There is no cost for the instruction; however, students will pay for their own textbooks and teaching guides (approximately \$5) and must pay for their own accommodations and meals.

# Strike Is Unlikely, Says Postal Chief

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal labor mediators are intensifying their efforts to resolve contract disputes involving railroad and postal workers in an effort to head off possible strikes next week.

W.J. Usery, director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, will shuttle between the separate negotiations involving the Brotherhood of Railway and Airline Clerks, led by C. L. Dennis, and the National Association of Letter Carriers, headed by James H. Rademacher.

Both negotiations face a July 21 deadline. Officials of the 117,000-member postal union and representatives of the Postal Service had a 14-hour negotiating session Sunday. Afterward, Usery told both sides it was important that they "engage in intensive bargaining" this week to avoid interruption of mail services.

Postmaster General Benjamin F. Bailar said Sunday he does not expect a strike, but he did not rule out some work stoppages if no settlement is found. There were indications that the postal talks have entered the critical stage, and both sides were asked to have their full negotiating committees here this week.

Usery would not say what issues remain unresolved in the postal talks but sources said one major stumbling block is the letter carriers' resistance to management's efforts to weaken the no-layoff clause in the current contract.

Usery said there is "still a long way to go to resolve the remaining issues but with a diligent effort by both sides, I am confident a mutually satisfactory agreement can be obtained."

Meanwhile, the negotiations between the 250,000-member railway union, which represents about a quarter of the industry's workers, and the National Railway Labor Conference, representing major railroads, resume with the clerks threatening selective strikes. Such a

## Cuban Trade Ban May Come To End Shortly

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Organization of American States is expected to take up the Cuba embargo this week with some indications the 11-year trade ban may be eased.

The 12-day meeting in Costa Rica beginning Wednesday marks the third time in as many years the Cuba embargo has come up, and American officials believe there is a better-than-even chance the OAS will either repeal or substantially weaken the embargo at this meeting. That view is disputed by some Latin American diplomats.

One reason American officials foresee affirmative action is that the United States itself is prepared for the first time to support a change in the 11-year-old OAS policy.

U.S. officials see the embargo as a contentious element in hemispheric relations but they say no effort will be made at the meeting to influence the position of other countries. The American delegation will be headed by OAS Ambassador William S. Mailliard.

Eight months ago in Ecuador, the last time the

OAS voted on a repeal proposal, 12 of the 21 nations were in favor but the embargo continued because the vote fell short of the required two-thirds majority of 14.

At Quito, the United States joined Brazil, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Bolivia and Haiti in abstaining, while Chile, Uruguay and Paraguay cast negative votes. The embargo ostensibly forbids OAS members from establishing trade and diplomatic relations with Cuba but a number of countries have ignored the ban.

One common belief is that the delegates at Costa Rica will shy away from a resolution calling for outright repeal of the embargo and push instead for a so-called "freedom of action" resolution.

## American Team Fails To Reach K2 Summit

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — An American mountaineering expedition has failed in its attempt to reach the summit of K2, the world's second highest mountain, according to a radio message received Monday.

The message said the 10 Americans, headed by Jim Whittaker of Seattle, Wash., had suffered serious delays because of strikes by the porters and bad weather. Whittaker had returned to his base camp, at 17,600 feet, and would leave there on Tuesday. The climbers expect to arrive at Skardu, in the foothills, by July 28, the

message said.

K2, also known as Mt. Godwin Austen, has been climbed only once.

One other recent expedition, the French team that climbed Gasherbrum 2, complained of demands by their porters. Because of the porters' ever-increasing demands, the French climbers ran out of money, and extra cash had to be sent from Islamabad.

It reported "all team members are healthy" but said one porter was seriously ill and had been carried down to 15,000 feet to be taken off the mountain by helicopter.

John Schiebel, physical director of the YMCA, has announced that Mrs. Michelle Hardy has been working as director of the YMCA Health Spa since July 1. Mrs. Hardy came here from Oklahoma City, Okla. when her husband became a pilot for Trans Regional Airline.

"We would like to remind local women of the many facilities and programs which are available to them at the spa," said Schiebel, adding that Mrs. Margie Faraday is serving as night director.

The spa is open daily from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. and on Tuesday's and Thursday's from 7 to 9 p.m. These hours may soon be increased.

The equipment includes a step-in whirlpool, a wet steam bath, Viking sauna, two sun lamps and one bi-

solar (heat-sun lamp combination). Mrs. Hardy and Mrs. Faraday are both trained to give massages and, for this service, there is a \$3 charge to spa members and \$5 to non-members.

A three-month spa club membership can be had for \$29.95, and this includes the use of all YMCA facilities plus the health spa. The YMCA facilities include two pools, hand ball and paddle ball courts, gymnasium, women's exercise room and multi-purpose room.

Regular annual memberships at the YMCA are as follows:

Recently we went on a trip, and my husband gave Tom and Ann a key to our house so they could keep an eye on it.

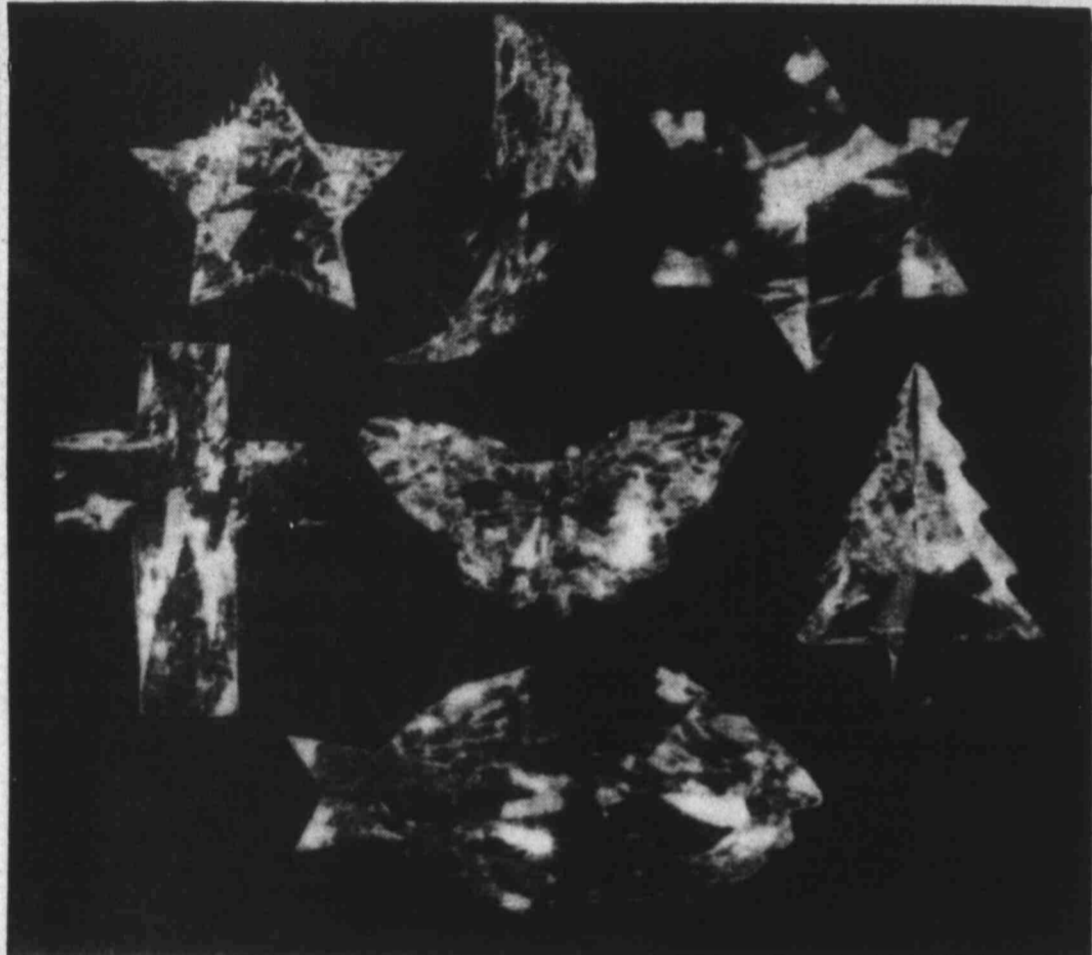

# Gardeners: Practice Home Canning Safety

To offset spiraling food costs, many people are turning to home grown fruits and vegetables. As more and more food begins to ripen, produce which can't be eaten or given away is usually canned.

Home canning provides safe, inexpensive, quality products — but only if the fruits and vegetables and especially tomato products, have been carefully selected and properly processed.

Improper canning may result in botulism, a food poisoning which may cause death. Botulism is caused by the toxin formed during the growth of the bacteria, clostridium botulinum. This may result from improper processing which may be avoided by following these guidelines.

Don't take shortcuts or experiment in home canning. Use only tested, currently approved methods, such as those described in USDA's Home Canning of Fruits and Vegetables, Home and Garden Bulletin No. 8. (The procedures in this bulletin are under continuous review.)

Use only jars, cans and lids made especially for home canning. Never use ordinary jars such as a mayonnaise or coffee jars.

Do not reuse sealing lids. The rubber ring deteriorates easily and prevents a tight seal. Get new rings for 1-piece lids and new metal lids with sealing compound for 2-piece lids.

Do not use overripe food. Products change in chemical composition with age and lose acidity. Make sure the food is of good quality, with no bruises or soft spots.

Do not overpack foods. Trying to get too much food into one jar may result in under-processing and spoilage.

Follow exactly the time and temperature specifications for foods and container sizes listed in instructions. Adjust processing times according to altitude.

Test the seal according to instructions.

Do not use canned foods showing signs of spoilage. Watch for bulging lids, leaks, off-odors, or mold. If in doubt, don't taste. Destroy out of reach of children and

pets. Boil home canned vegetables covered for at least ten minutes before serving.

Tomatoes — follow established recommended canning procedures closely.

A recent problem in home canning tomatoes is the acidity variation which affects the quality and safety of the canned product. The problem is associated with a few tomato varieties and to some extent the climate and soil in which they are grown. Weak acidity may permit the growth of highly toxic organisms such as Clostridium botulinum — the cause of botulism. Strong acidity inhibits the growth of such organisms.

As new information becomes known the USDA will make it available to home canners. You may wish to consult with

specialists in your local community who are knowledgeable on the subject of home canning relative to the best canning recommendations and types of tomatoes best suited for your area.

Some states have recommended adding the following to tomatoes and tomato juice to reduce spoilage and protect against botulism.

Citric Acid U.S.P.: 1/4 teaspoon per pint; 1/2 teaspoon per quart. Add citric acid when cooking the tomatoes; mix well. Citric Acid is a uniform and reliable product for strengthening acidity. You may need to order citric acid from your druggist a few days before you need it.

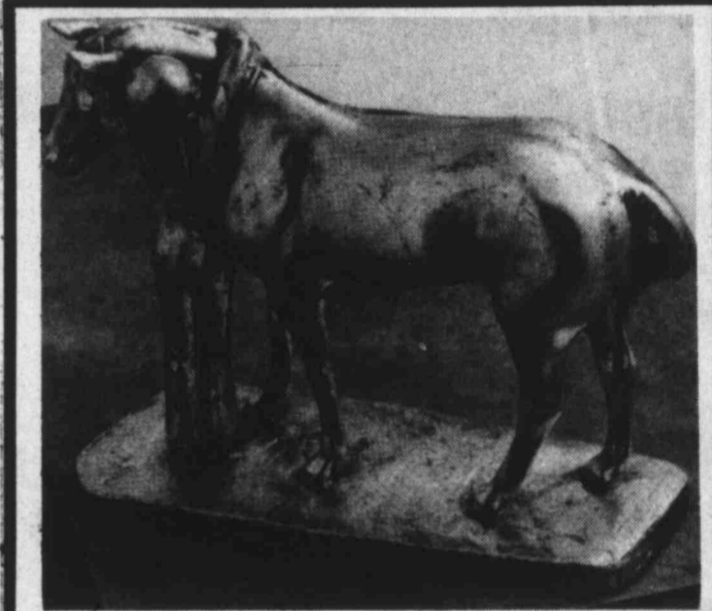
