

of that," retired Air Force Col. L. Fletcher Prouty said Sunday night after Butterfield had denied the allegations on the CBS program "60 Minutes." In a statement today to

reporters, Butterfield said: 'Mr. Prouty's initial public statements about me were sufficient to lead reporters to allege that, in my case, there was a spy motive, that I had infiltrated the White House, or in other words, that while there I served two masters."

"Those serious allegations are altogether false," Butterfield said. "Moreover

The Soyuz, guided by cosmonauts Alexei A.

Kubasov, will blast off at 8:20 a.m. EDT from the into orbit for a historic Baikonur Cosmodrome on the edge of a central Russian desert 1,400 miles southeast of Moscow.

Apollo astronauts Thomas P. Stafford, Vance D. Brand and Donald K. Slayton will take off from Cape Canaveral 7½ hours later at 3:50 p.m. to begin a celestial chase that will end with the two ships joined together 140 miles above West Germany at 12:15 p.m. Thursday.

Three hours later, a tunnel connecting the vehicles will open, and American commander Stafford and Soviet commander Leonov will shake hands.

SPEED UP HOPED

It will be an emotionally charged moment, not only because of its symbolism but because the two men - both veterans of space - have become such close friends during two years of training for this mission. Both believe that moments like this, high in space, can speed detente between Soviets and Americans on earth

Ham Was Pioneer

WASHINGTON (AP) - If he weren't a chimpanzee, Ham might be expected to take more than a passing interest in Tuesday's joint

U.S.-Soviet space mission. Ham, a resident of the National Zoo since 1963, proved that animals or men could perform mental and manual tasks in suborbital space flights.

It was on January 31, 1961 that the space ape was strapped into an 83-foot Redstone rocket, like one which made the first manned space flight five months later

The rocket carried Ham 155 miles high on a 422-mile flight that lasted 16 minutes before splashdown in the Atlantic Ocean, downrange from what was then called Cape Canaveral.

National Zoo officials say Ham is as healthy today at age 18 as he was at the time of the flight when he was four.

Ham lives in bachelor quarters at the zoo. A spokeswoman says the chimp shows no interest in female companionship, but there is no known connection to his experiences in space.

The zoo spokeswoman, Billy Hamlet, described Ham as a favorite among visitors. "He's very active. He shows off by charging around his cage and beating on the walls.



Let The Sunshine In espousing devotion to the ideal of the "Sunshine Law"

Senate Bill No. 5, which would require that congressional and most agency commissions to make their bill-drafting meeting open to the public, has considerable backing. Thirty-senators have signed as co-authors.

But it also will substantial opposition for a number of reasons. One is that Common Cause, a reform which aims at letting in a little more light and air into governmental processes, is one of the backers of the proposal. A lot of hide-bound solons have a natural reflex on this score.

The two main hurdles, however are these: 1) Many members of the Senate and the House simply do not want the public to know what might be influencing the making of decisions, or to put it another way, they do not want to be clearly accountable; and 2) the op-position of some members of Congress is mile com-pared to that of entrenched bureau chiefs.

For instance, the Department of justice objects to the forthright declaration in the act that it is "to be the policy of the United States that the public is entitled to the fullest practical information regarding the decision-making process of the federal government." It says flatly that it has "doubts" as to whether this

We Hold These Truths A Chronicle of America

July, 1775:

The news of Lexington and Concord reaches Savannah on May 10, and quickly aligns hitherto reluctant Georgia with the other colonies. On July 4, meeting in the Great Room of Tondee's Tavern in Savannah, the Provincial Congress convenes with representatives from all but two small parishes - contrary to the sparse attendance at prior conventions. The Provincial Congress agrees (on the 6th) to adhere to all measures of resistance approved by the Continental Congress; elects (on the 7th) its first delegation to the Continental Congress; and writes (on the 11th) to Royal Governor James Wright, saying that Georgia is "no more the defaulting link in the American chain." In a letter to Lord Dartmouth, Secretary for the Colonies, Governor Wright laments that "a King's Governor has little or no business here."

Many Causes For Sciatica Dr. G. C. Thosteson

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Please discuss sciatica. I have had it three or four times in about two years. The flare-ups usually last only a few days, but the last one lasted five weeks.

I put a board under my mattress to relieve the back pain, and I apply heat and rest for about a week when it happens. I still worry about what causes it. I am 30 years old, five feet tall and weigh 135

Mrs. R.H. The sciatic nerve is the large one going from the lower spine and branching out into the legs. Since the roots are at the spine, any disorder that puts pressure upon this area can cause sciatica, a pain or discomfort along the entire nerve network.

You may have suffered an injury that distorted the fibrous disc between a pair of lower vertabra, or you may have even injured one of the vertebra itself.

Some structural changes caused by osteoarthritis can exert pressure on the roots of this nerve. However, at 30, you seem a bit young for this.



Hurting Cause'

NEW YORK (AP) -Exiled Russian author Alexander Solzhenitsyn says American eagerness for detente with the Soviet Union may hurt the cause of freedom in his native land.

Asserting that "the liberation of the human spirit from the rubbish of Communism has absolutely no connection with detente, the 1970 Nobel laureate for literature cautioned that, "You, perhaps accidentally, are not helping us toward liberation, but helping bury us in the ground."

Solzhenitsyn spoke Sunday on NBC-TV's "Meet the Press" in a studio near St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Cathedral where a special mass was being said to mark the opening of "Captive Nations Week." The week commemorates the fall of 29 nations to Soviet dominance.

300 Die Funds For Bridge In Angola LUANDA, Angola (AP)-Heavy shooting and mortar bembardments broke out in the Angolan capital today as

the Angolan capital today as fighting between rival liberation African movements intensified. Officials estimate that 300 persons have been killed in the flareup that began Wednesday.

The government palace was surrounded by Portuguese troops in armored cars as rumours spread of an attempted coup by the Soviet-backed Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola - MPLA.

The armored cars were later removed, but heavily armed Portuguese military police remained to guard Angola's military-administrative headquarters.

A large column of guerrilla troops of the Front for the Liberation of Angola -FNLA - backed with Chinese arms, were reported moving on the capital from northern Angola.

At least 1,000 persons displaced by the violence, which has also wounded another 1,000, demonstrated in front of the palace demanding protection. They were pushed back by security forces.

MILWAUKEE (AP) The last time the American League won an All-Star Game was in 1971 when rookie Vida Blue was the starting and winning pitcher. Blue, who went on to win the Cy Young and most Valuable Player awards that year, is being counted on to help get the American League back on the winning track Tuesday night at the 46th All-Star Game at County Stadium.

AL Manager Alvin Dark who also manages Blue with the world champion Oakland A's, last week named the 25-year-old left-hander to oppose the National League winner of 11 of the last 12 of these prid-season classics.

Walter Alston, manager of the National League, also was expected the the second southpaw stacting pitcher — John Matlack of the New York Mets - at today's news conference to give the starting line-ups. Matlack last pitched Friday and is known to be highly regarded by Alston, whose own Andy Messersmith — pitched

(County HD Agent) To offset spiraling food costs, many people are turning to home grown fruits and vegetables. As more and more food begins to ripen, canning procedures closely. A recent problem in hong canning tomatoes is the produce which can't be eaten or given away is usually canned.

Home canning provides safe, inexpensive, quality products — but only if the fruits and vegetables and especially tomato products, have been carefully selected and properly processed.




