## Kissinger Lashes Out At Kremlin

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger said today that Soviet support for the Communist minority in Portugal is contrary to the recently signed Helsinki pact on European security.

At the same time, he pledged that the United States "will oppose and speak out against the efforts of a minority that appears to be subverting the revolution for its own purpose."

"The Portuguese people should know that we and all the democratic countries of the West are deeply concerned about their future and stand ready to help a democratic Portugal," Kissinger said.

Kissinger said the Soviet Union "should not assume that it has the option, either directly or indirectly, to influence events contrary to the right of the Portuguese people to determine their own future."

"The involvement of external powers for this purpose in a country which is an old friend and ally of ours, is inconsistent with any principle of European security," he said.

Kissinger's remarks came in a major foreign policy address prepared for the Southern Commodity Producers Conference, one of a series of appearances in which the secretary hopes, according to an aide, "to bring his message home to the folks."

Kissinger did not specify in what way he feels the Soviet Union is attempting to improperly influence events in Portugal. But U.S. intelligence reports have put Moscow's financial support of the Communist party in Portugal at up to \$10 million per month.

"The United States has never accepted that the Soviet Union is free to relax tensions selectively or as a cover for the pursuit of unilateral advantage," Kissinger said.

Recalling that 80 per cent of the Portuguese people have voted for non-Communist parties, he said that "the attempt by an anti-democratic and doctrinaire minority to thwart this desire is meeting inevitable and growing popular resistance."

## Rich Dad Receives Tape Of Kidnaped Son's Voice

YORKTOWN HEIGHTS, N.Y. (AP) — A postman personally delivered the mail this morning to armed guards at the estate where the family of kidnaped wealthy heir Samuel Bronfman 2nd anxiously waited.

It was the first time since the vigil began that the postman did not leave the mail in the Rural Free Delivery box at the entrance to the estate, giving rise to considerable speculation among reporters clustered nearby.

There was no indication that a new communication from young Bronfman's kidnapers had been received. Edgar Bronfman, multimillionaire father of 21-year-old Sam, received a tape recording of his son's voice Wednesday night—the first word from the abducted son of the Seagram's fortune since his father agreed to pay a reported \$4.5 million ransom.

The 6-foot-3 young man telephoned his father here at 1:45 a.m. last Saturday saying he had been kidnaped by three men. On Tuesday, the family received a warning by mail that Samuel had been "buried" somewhere in Westchester County with only a 10 days' supply of water and air.

The family said immediately that it would comply with the demands of the kidnapers. Bronfman reportedly received a telephone call late Tuesday, instructing him to pick up a package in New York City. He flew to the city early Wednesday and went to an undisclosed location where he collected a tape of his son's voice and the kidnapers' instructions, sources said.

Details of the tape's contents could not be confirmed. The case became increasingly reminiscent of a Florida abduction seven years ago after virtually identical personal advertisements appeared Wednesday in New York City's three major newspapers.

The ads read: "Jack, please come home. Your mother is very anxious, we will be happier in the future." The ads were signed, "Fred Dollard."

The New York Daily News said the ads were placed by a Jack Mullaney, believed to be an FBI employe. The FBI refused to comment.

According to the paper, the advertiser filled out a form saying he was placing the ads for friend trying to locate a missing relative, but the address of the friend, "William McCrystal," turned out to be Mullaney's.

## Claims Sports Activist Offered 'Tania' To FBI

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Walter Scott, brother of sports activist Jack Scott, says he has twice seen missing newspaper heiress Patty Hearst and his brother has offered to deliver her to authorities.

Scott says he saw Miss Hearst twice last summer, once at his parents' apartment in Las Vegas and again at an unspecified place in New York City. In Las Vegas, Miss Hearst was disguised as a pregnant woman, he said.

He also indicated he may know where she is. "I think she is in the United States, as long as you remember there are 50 of them, not 48," Walter Scott told reporters Wednesday.

Scott also claimed that he and his brother had met recently with Miss Hearst's father, San Francisco Examiner president Randolph Hearst, and the meeting ended in a fist fight between Hearst and Jack.

Neither Hearst nor Jack Scott was available for comment. The FBI declined comment.

The interview, Walter Scott's first since his name was linked to the search for Miss Hearst, was arranged by the FBI and held in a downtown Philadelphia hotel. Four Philadelphia reporters and an FBI agent were present. Scott is being held in protective custody by the FBI at his request because he says he fears for his life.

Jack Scott rented a South Canaan, Pa., farmhouse last year where Miss Hearst reportedly stayed for a time. A Harrisburg, Pa., grand jury is investigating the incident and Jack Scott has vowed not to cooperate with investigators.

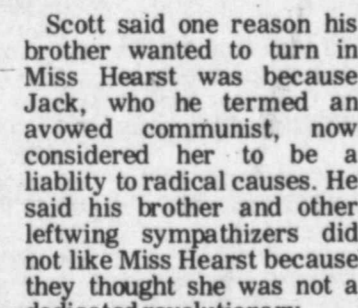
Walter Scott, said by his brother Jack to have a history of alcohol problems, said Jack offered to deliver Miss Hearst to the government in return for immunity from prosecution and \$100,000 to \$200,000. But Walter Scott claimed negotiations on the matter have broken off.

Scott said one reason his brother wanted to turn in Miss Hearst was because Jack, who he termed an avowed communist, now considered her to be a liability to radical causes. He said his brother and other leftwing sympathizers did not like Miss Hearst because they thought she was not a dedicated revolutionary.

Miss Hearst was kidnaped in February 1974 by the Symbionese Liberation Army. She later renounced her family, said she had joined her captors, and is now being sought on federal charges of bank robbery, kidnaping and various weapons offenses.

Scott indicated that one of the times he had seen Miss Hearst was now "in a position where she is being able to benefit comfortably financially ... I don't think that her economic condition is such that she has to live in a ghetto in Detroit."

Asked if he thought Miss Hearst's father financially supports her, he said, "I don't know, but I wouldn't be surprised one way or the other."

## The World At-A-Glance

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Dolph Briscoe and a group of Southern governors will make a precedent-setting trade mission trip to South America later this year, Briscoe announced Tuesday.

"This will be considered as one of the highest level governmental visits by United States elected officials to South America since the conference of the Organization of American States at Punta del Este, Uruguay, in 1965," the Briscoe announcement said.

Briscoe said his staff proposed the mission to members of the Southern Governors' Conference in July and further meetings have been held including one last week in Washington with senior State Department officials.

At the present time, governors of Louisiana, Alabama, Mississippi, Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and Oklahoma have expressed "serious interest" in making the mission, Briscoe said.

WASHINGTON (AP) — By the end of the 20th Century, the United States may be using the sun to generate nearly as much energy as now comes from the crude oil it imports, federal energy officials say.

Energy Research and Development Administration officials told reporters Wednesday that as early as the year 2000, solar power could provide about 7 per cent of the nation's projected energy needs, equal to 3.5 million barrels of oil a day.

By comparison, U.S. imports last month averaged 4 million barrels a day.

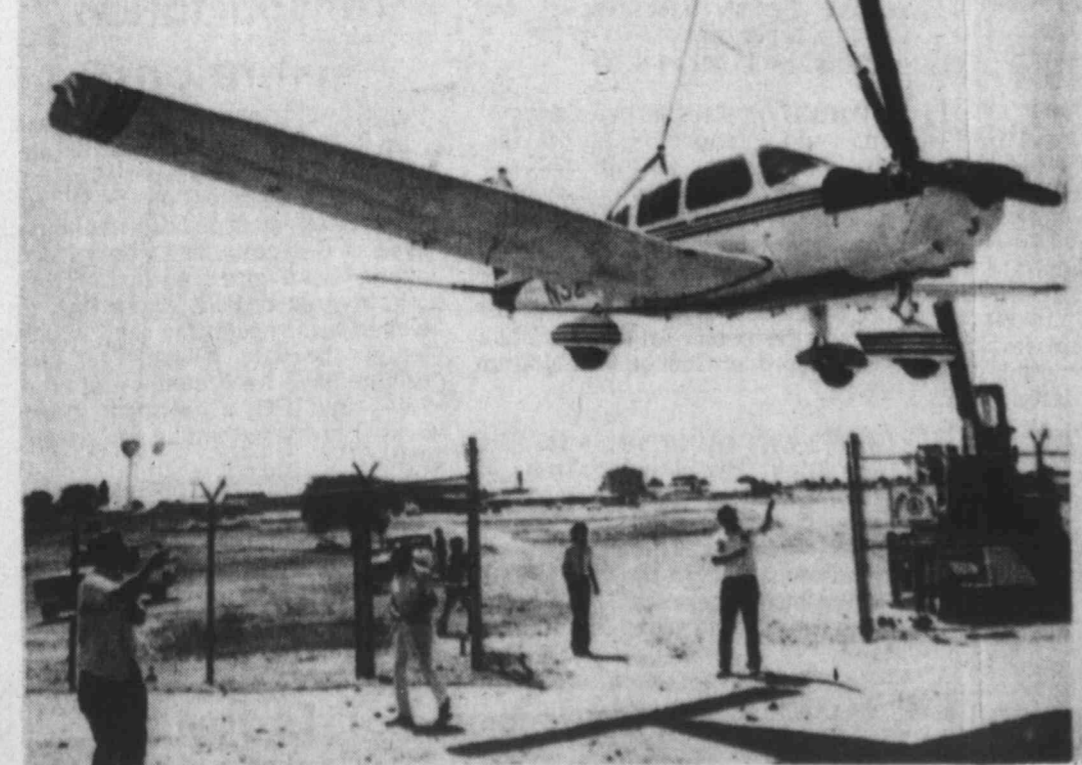

### Manslaughter Conviction Hikes Practice

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Dr. Kenneth C. Edelin says his private practice has expanded tremendously since his conviction of manslaughter for performing an abortion in Boston. But Edelin said the conviction may still hurt his career.

"There's a stigma attached to me now," he said. "I'm a convicted felon. Any aspirations I have to establish (a hospital) department on my own basis have got to be affected."

Edelin, 36, was in Miami Beach for the meeting of the National Medical Association. He was convicted six months ago in the death of a 20-to 24-week-old fetus. He is appealing the conviction.

## CASINO IDEA FIZZLES Wheat Farmer Owns Missile Dinosaur

EGYPT, Wash. (AP) — Ed McCaffery owns a dinosaur of the missile age. McCaffery, a wheat farmer, owns an Atlas missile site, one of nine built in eastern Washington in the early 1960s and abandoned almost before the paint had dried.

The sites were built for \$150 million in an effort to help convince the Soviet Union not to fight a nuclear war. McCaffery's 22-acre area cost between \$13 million and \$20 million to build and equip.

He bought it in 1967 for just under \$5,700.

"I don't know what to do with it," said McCaffery. "My idea is to turn it into a casino."

The nine sites are like small, underground cities, each capable of withstanding anything other than a direct nuclear hit. They were built as part of the Atlas network and surrounded Fairchild Air Force Base just west of Spokane.

Each site was in operation 24 hours a day, with a crew of 12 always ready to fire the device. The Atlas rocket, fueled by liquid oxygen and a chemical like kerosene, lay on its side inside an enormous, buried "coffin." Around it, also underground, were the steel-encased firing control centers and living quarters.

None of the rockets was fired and the Atlas system

was superceded by new kinds of missiles. In 1965, the 567th Strategic Missile Squadron was deactivated and the missiles and tracking equipment were removed.

The General Services Administration sold the sites two years later.

The buyers included farmers seeking to reclaim land, and companies hoping for the bargain of a lifetime.

Power has been turned off at most sites. Cows graze, grasshoppers bound through tall grass and debris is everywhere.

McCaffery finds that sheep like to graze inside his Atlas base. He also stores an antique truck inside the base and his combine sits where a

missile once lay. McCaffery got a Quonset hut with his purchase and provides free storage for boats and campers for his neighbors. But primarily the place is wasted, he said.

### To Eliminate Smoking Areas

NORTHWEST, Tex. (AP) — Smoking areas for pupils at Northwest High School are being eliminated—partly because of smoking marijuana on campus, Supt. Truett Wilson said.

"We expelled four students last year for passing and smoking marijuana here," Wilson said.

Northwest, which includes pupils from Haslet, Justin and Roanoke, prohibits smoking by teachers too, except in special areas.

### Elderly Man Robbed By Teen

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — A 16-year-old boy has been arrested and placed in the county juvenile detention center in connection with the robbery of a 92-year-old man.

The victim, C.H. Jones told police he allowed the youth to enter his home.

A few minutes later the boy spied Jones' change purse on a table and grabbed for it, Jones said. When he tried to stop the theft, the youth knocked him to the floor and fled with the purse, which contained a \$50 bill.

### C-City Council Tosses Issue To Parks Unit

COLORADO CITY — The Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife is responsible for control of fast boats and water skiing at Colorado City Lake, decided the Colorado City city council as it washed its hands of the sticky matter.

The Mitchell County game warden, Ronnie Astin, had requested in June that the city pass some kind of ordinance to control boat speeds and skiing.

The council studied the matter for two months and was prepared to pass an ordinance which would have

eliminated skiing on part of the lake, would have set a five mile-per-hour, no-wake speeds, on Cherry Creek and the upper part of Morgan Creek, and would have prohibited air boats and boats without mufflers.

The proposed ordinance became an object of considerable controversy, with lakeshore owners pitted against water skiers and fast boat owners.

City Manager James Campbell reported that the Parks Department, which operates at State Park at the lake, had been given control over the lake recreation and enforcement.

The council passed a resolution embodying the proposed ordinance and will forward it to the Parks Department as a recommendation.

### Pay Raise For Teachers To Up Taxes In Austin

AUSTIN (AP) — Austin school trustees agreed late Monday to a school salary package that will bring on a two-cent tax increase.

The agreement, reached after several days of negotiations, calls for a pay hike of 14 per cent for classroom teachers and librarians, a 7 per cent increase for counselors and a 12 per cent increase for administrators and classified personnel.

Spokesmen for the administrators immediately criticized the package as breaking down the ration

between teachers' and administrators' salaries and, they said, sets Austin back in comparison with other school districts in the state. The administrators wanted the same 14 per cent increase that teachers got.

Trustees said the \$5.5 million package will make it possible to start Austin teachers with a bachelors degree at \$8,664 next year and \$9,576 for teachers with a masters degree. The statewide minimum teachers salary, with a bachelors degree, will be \$8,000, effective Sept. 1.

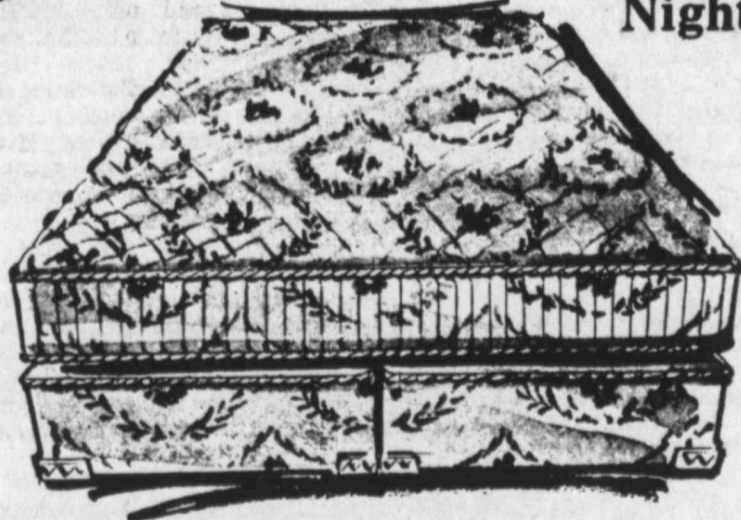

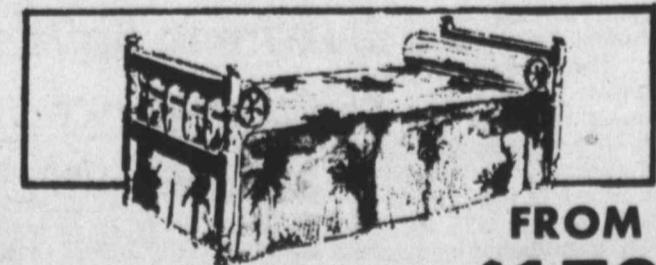

# Testify Cuban Shrimper Seized In U.S. Waters

HOUSTON (AP) — Two witnesses have testified that a Cuban shrimp boat was in U.S. territorial waters when it was seized by the Coast Guard Aug. 2.

Velasco said he boarded the Cuban boat along with North and two other men with the Coast Guard.

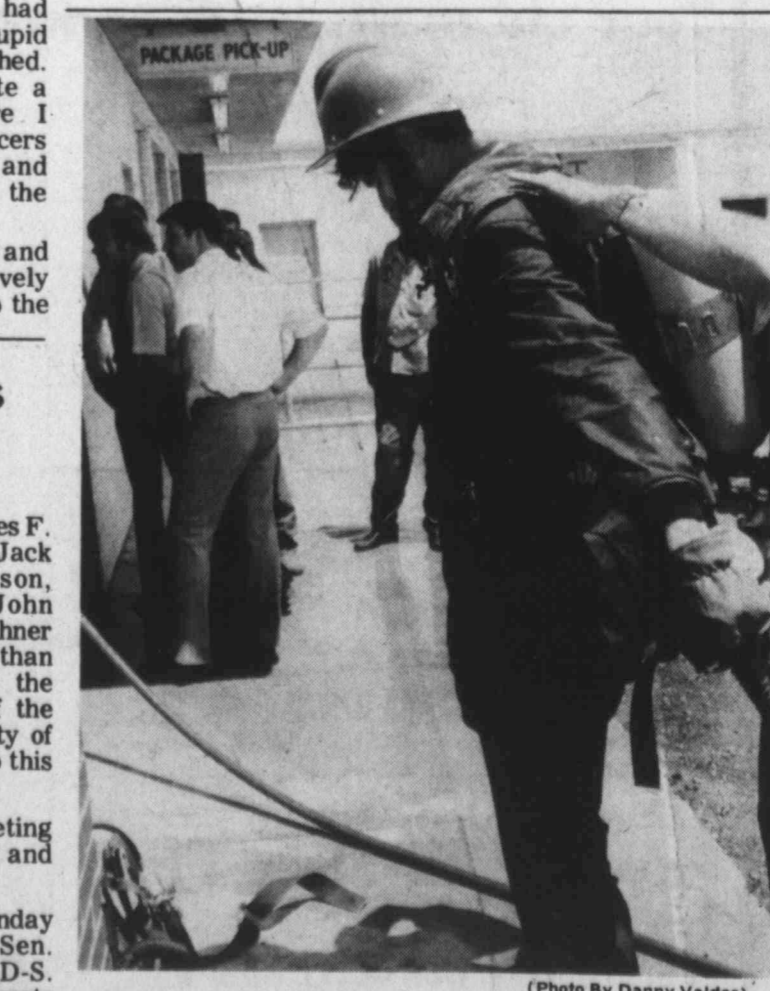

**GOALS FOR BIG SPRING  
Expansion Of Cultural  
Facilities Is Suggested**

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** This is the third in a series of articles concerning what is needed for Big Spring in the future, using facts and recommendations compiled by sub-committees of Goals for Big Spring.

 A multi-purpose community building, improvements for the amphitheater, and larger quarters for the Heritage Museum were recommended by the culture and entertainment sub-committee of the Goals for Big Spring program in their report compiled for use in drawing up the goals.

The community building, recently approved by voters in a Howard College bond election, appears to be nearing a reality, but more is needed, according to the report.

The community building could be used for ice shows, exhibitions, banquets, conventions, and concerts, the sub-committee suggested.

**ADD TO AMPHITHEATER**  
 Major improvements at the amphitheater in Comanche Trail Park was another suggestion forwarded by the committee, saying that the facility has very small storage rooms, no dressing rooms, restrooms or provisions for concessions. The 6,500 seat facility should be upgraded with improvements in sound and lighting systems and groups should be encouraged to use it for teenage concerts, church revivals, singing groups, and plays and dramatic presentations.

The Heritage Museum, now being housed in a former residence, should have larger, more suited facilities. The sub-committee found that the most serious drawbacks of the present site is a lack of parking space for visitors. Little Theater groups, concert series, youth coun-

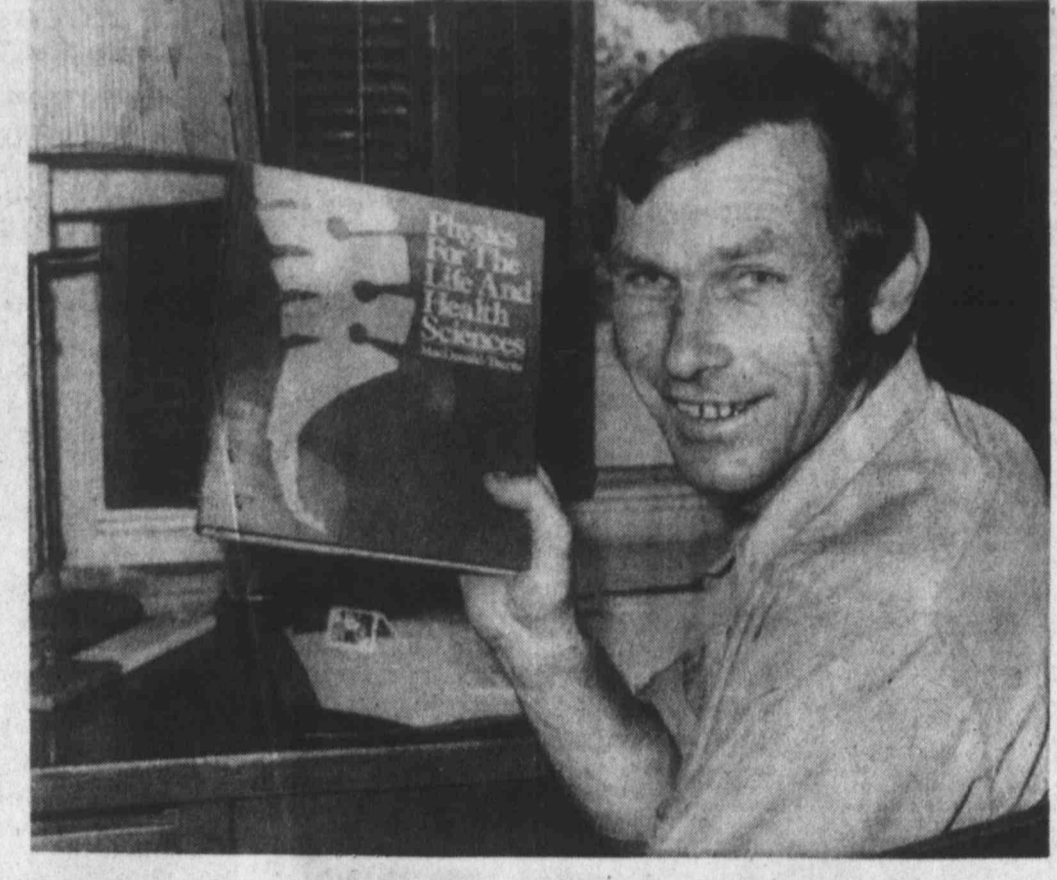

VETO VETO SESSION BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Louisiana legislators have vetoed a veto session. The new state constitution makes a five-day veto session automatic unless opposed by a majority of lawmakers in a mail ballot. They were asked last week to advise if they wanted to convene to override 14 vetoes by Gov. Edwin Edwards on bills passed in the regular session which ended July 14. Senate Secretary Bill Roberts announced Wednesday that a majority replied they did not want a veto session. Under the old constitution, there could be a veto session only if requested by a majority of lawmakers.

Imperial Wizard Gets Out Of Race For Veep Post HOUSTON (AP) — Blaming lack of interest and no financial support, Scott Nelson says he has decided not to run for vice president as the Ku Klux Klan candidate in the 1976 presidential election. "I'm sick and tired of these phony conservatives who talk about saving the country but won't get behind anyone," said Nelson, who is the imperial wizard of the Texas Fiery Knights of the KKK. He said Monday he does not expect to even support the Klan ticket in 1976 because "I feel like it just won't be the right thing to do."

Chapin Begins Prison Term LOMPOC, Calif. (AP) — Former White House official Dwight L. Chapin has begun serving a 10-to-30 month prison term for lying to the Watergate grand jury. Chapin surrendered to officials at the federal minimum security prison here just before noon on Monday. Chapin, White House appointments secretary under former President Richard M. Nixon, was convicted of perjury for lying to the grand jury about his knowledge of the activities of Donald Segretti, a political dirty tricks agent of the Nixon 1972 campaign who was fired by Chapin.

Percy Foreman To Prosecute HOUSTON (AP) — Widely known defense lawyer Percy Foreman is going to court again—but this time as a prosecutor. Foreman said Monday the family of Juan Rodriguez Aguilar retained him to assist in the prosecution of Pedro Cerda Castillo, 31. Castillo is charged with murder in the shooting death last Dec. 28 of Aguilar, 48. "It is basically the same no matter which side of the table you are on," Foreman said. "There shouldn't have to be any adjustment."

Nixon Nixes China Trip WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Richard M. Nixon has declined an invitation from Chairman Mao Tse-tung to pay a second visit to China, columnist Jack Anderson has reported. Anderson said Nixon told friends about the invitation and said he had to decline it because he wants to finish his memoirs before doing any traveling from his San Clemente, Calif., home. Nixon was not available for comment.

# Proposes Tight Controls On Techniques Of FBI

MONTREAL (AP) — U.S. Atty. Gen. Edward H. Levi has proposed tight controls on techniques the FBI may use in domestic surveillance as well as on the length of investigations and the time the agency may hold certain information. Levi said Wednesday he was seeking to balance the interest of individual liberties, abused by the FBI in the past by "sometimes outrageous" activities, with the legitimate needs of domestic intelligence inquiry. He spoke at the American Bar Association's annual meeting — the same forum which FBI Director Clarence M. Kelley told Saturday that Americans "must be willing to surrender a small measure of our liberties to

preserve the great bulk of them." "I do not think it is a question of giving up individual liberties," Levi told newsmen after his address. "I do think it is a question of fulfilling them." The proposed guidelines would restrict FBI domestic intelligence investigations to activities that may involve the use of force or violence in the violation of federal law. They would require the FBI to report immediately to the attorney general full-scale investigations. The attorney general would review the investigations periodically and order an

U.S. Is Taking Look At Damage To Coffee Trees BRASILIA, Brazil (AP) — The United States, Brazil's main coffee customer, is taking a careful look at results of a frost that caused widespread damage to Brazilian coffee trees. Since the July 18 freeze, the U.S. Embassy here has cable a series of private reports to Washington on the after-effects. Now two coffee experts from the U.S. Department of Agriculture are on a two-week tour of frost-stricken Parana, Sao Paulo and Minas Gerais — the three states that produce most of Brazil's coffee. They are expected to report to the department next week. U.S. interest is high because whatever happens to coffee in Brazil, the world's top producer, can be felt economically by importers, distributors and consumers in the United States and other coffee-importing countries. News of the Brazilian frost already has caused prices to soar on the world coffee market.

Chapin Begins Prison Term LOMPOC, Calif. (AP) — Former White House official Dwight L. Chapin has begun serving a 10-to-30 month prison term for lying to the Watergate grand jury. Railroad Retirement To Increase Some Payments In September, the U.S. Railroad Retirement Board will begin soon paying increased unemployment and sickness benefits under recent legislation enacted by Congress amending the federal Railroad Unemployment Insurance Act. This legislation was based on joint recommendations negotiated by railway labor and management. Under the amended Act the maximum daily benefit rate increases from \$12.70 to \$24 retroactive to July 1, 1975, and maximum biweekly benefits will go up from \$127 to \$240. Starting July 1976, the maximum daily benefit rate increases further to \$25. An individual's daily benefit rate is figured as 60 per cent of his last daily rate to pay subject

to the \$24 (or \$25 maximum rate but in no case can it be less than \$12.70. The new law also provides extended unemployment benefit periods of up to 13 weeks to employees with less than 10 years of service during periods of high unemployment. Such conditions are in effect at the present time. Under previous law, extended benefits were payable only to employees with 10 or more years of service. The law also changed the provision for payment of sickness benefits. Basic eligibility requirements for new employees are liberalized.

## Rubbish Higher Tax Investment Recycled Credit May Aid Farmers

EL CAJON, Calif. (AP) — If San Diego County's experimental waste recovery plant works as planned, garbage will be its biggest asset.

Construction starts today on a \$10-million plant designed to transform 200 tons of solid waste daily into heating oil, glass and reusable metals. It is scheduled to start operations in August 1976.

The project is a joint venture of the county, the Environmental Protection Agency and Garrett Research and Development Co. of La Verne, Calif.

Using a process called flash pyrolysis, the facility should be able to produce about 42 gallons of fuel, 110 pounds of glass and 140 pounds of metals from each ton of trash.

If it succeeds, officials say it may be the solution to the problems of waste disposal and recycling of resources.

Incoming garbage will be shredded first, with light organic garbage, mostly food waste, separated from heavier inorganic matter such as glass and metal.

The organic material will then be dried, re-shredded and placed in a pyrolysis reactor. The high heat in the absence of oxygen will liquefy the organic waste into heating oil.

How the higher income tax investment credit has affected farm implement sales locally this year is hard to determine, local observers said today.

"I think a greater advantage (of the investment credit provision) will be taken in the oil patch, rather than in farming and ranching," Max Green, a local Certified Public Accountant, said. All businesses may use the tax provision.

"The larger profits have been made in the oil patch this year, rather than by the farmers and ranchers," Green continued. "They've had a pretty hard year."

How much profit a business or farm will make determines how much is invested in new equipment and property, Green said. The size of the profit for the year generally is not apparent until late in the year.

MOST AWARE  
Are most farmers and ranchers aware of the 10 percent tax credit allowed? Yes, local salesmen said.

"All farmers that are farming on any scale at all are businessmen," Leon Davis, one sales manager, said.

The incentive may influence purchases when they are "on the border line of

buying or not buying," Davis said.

"As expensive as these machines are now, it's quite a factor," Davis noted.

"Very definitely, it helps the overall economy in the agri-business," Curtis Smith, a local implement dealer, commented.

The increased tax credit aids sales, Smith said. But it is difficult to pin down how much directly or indirectly the tax credit affects sales.

Merchandise is so short, it's just when they can find it that they buy it," Honea said.

"The 10 percent investment tax credit applies to eligible equipment purchased and placed in service after Jan. 21, 1975, and before Jan. 1, 1977, the rate reverts back to 7 percent if Congress does not extend the new rate," one agri-business writer explained.

"This is one of the biggest tax breaks for farmers," the writer observed.

"In addition to the usual array of machinery and equipment, breeding stock also is eligible. Buildings generally are not, but credit may be claimed on storage tanks,"

HOW IT WORKS  
Green explained the "complex field" this way:

"You are allowed a 10 percent investment tax credit for capital items purchased for the year of 1975 for those items with an estimated life of seven years or more."

Turning his attention to a related area of tax law and regulations, Green said:

"You are also allowed a special 20 percent, first-year allowance on capital items with a life of six years or more up to the first \$10,000 of purchases."

"On new equipment purchases, you can elect to use accelerated depreciation."

But Philip Morris Inc., which sent the American tobacco to the Yava factory in Moscow where the cigarettes are manufactured, said U.S. smokers are buying very few.

For one thing, the company said, the cigarettes cost too much: \$1 a pack, \$10 a carton, which figures out to a nickel apiece.

For another, commemorative smokes — fairly commonplace in Russia —

never have gone over well in this country and thus are seldom sold.

Apollo-Soyuz is a "one-shot deal... We have no intention of getting into the commemorative cigarette business... Commemorative issues have a very short life span," a Philip Morris spokesman said.

About 750,000 packs of the cigarettes are available across the United States. Smokers in Europe, Latin America and Canada were allocated 1,750,000. Most are being sold in the Soviet Union.

Apollo-Soyuz cigarettes have all but disappeared in Moscow, where they sold for 60 kopecks or 84 cents a pack. The only places where they can still be found are the hard-currency stores frequented by foreign tourists.

Milder than the general run of Russian-made cigarettes, Apollo-Soyuz contains 75 per cent American tobacco, has an American-made filter and tastes not unlike a standard American nonmenthol brand.

Although nearly 60 years ago Vice President Thomas R. Marshall bemoaned the passing of the good 5-cent cigar, nobody's ever agitated for a good 5-cent cigarette, the company noted.

Hofheinz said completion of the plans, expected in mid 1977, "would result in a HouTran fleet of 500 fully modernized vehicles."

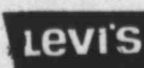

## Americans Still Haven't Found Shimmer In Gold

NEW YORK (AP) — One year after President Ford signed the law permitting private gold bullion ownership, the shimmer of the precious metal is attracting few Americans.

The law allowing Americans to purchase and own pure bullion was signed last Aug. 14 in one of Ford's first acts as president. The 41-year ban on gold ownership officially ended last Dec. 31, but gold dealers who last year had high hopes for an American "gold rush" have had those hopes disappointed, U.S. Treasury statistics indicate.

Thomas W. Wolf, senior consultant to the Treasury Department on gold affairs, says that last year dealers with high hopes for strong consumer gold interest imported a record 4.2 million ounces of bullion and 3.1 million ounces of gold coins.

But the 1975 gold rush was more like the party to which no one came and these same dealers, stuck with a hoard of unsold gold have been net exporters of bullion in the first six months of 1975. They have shipped back 168,000 ounces to foreign dealers.

The dealers, though, have imported 858,000 ounces of gold coins which have proved more popular than gold bars.

Some of the nation's big dealers in bullion bars like broker Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith Co. and New York's Republic National Bank confirm that sales have remained less than expected.

Total national sales estimates are hard to come by, but Wolf believes "no more than 100,000 bullion ounces" have been sold to small investors so far this year.

Consumer interest, where it exists at all, has been in

pure gold coins like the one-ounce South African Kruggerand and in gold futures contracts, according to gold experts.

"Most people don't buy hard metallic bars," says Wolf. "The Kruggerand sells at about 4 per cent markup and that's the sort of charge you'd pay for a one-ounce bullion bar."

"Coins are the better deal," says the Republic Bank spokesman, even though he says the quoted retail price including markup is now about \$175 a coin, compared with about \$166.50 for an ounce of pure bullion.

Coins are more in favor with the small buyer, experts say, because they're easily marketable and less subject to adulteration or forgery.

### Drilling Gains

Oil well drilling in Texas is running ahead of last year by 20 per cent, and the nation as a whole by much less. According to the Aug. 11 report of Hughes Tool Company to the International Association of Drilling Contractors, there were 627 rigs turning in Texas, up by 107 or 20.57 per cent. The U.S. total was 1,658, up 142, or 14.2 per cent.

Miss Mellendorf, who is the roving outfielder for the Port Huron L-and-M Rascals softball team, had long ago scheduled her wedding for this Saturday in Port Huron. But the Rascals made it to the state finals of the Class C Womens' Slo-pitch Softball Tournament in Petoskey this weekend.

So, rather than postpone the wedding, Donna and Dave will be married in centerfield Saturday between games. And the bride says she'll wear her uniform.

Stick into tomato to form the hat. Cut two (3/4 x 1/4) pieces of pickle and place each on a food pick. Press one into each side of pickle "body" to form arms. Stick three cloves into body to form "buttons".

Miss Pickle: Select a 1 1/2 inch long pickle to make "body". To make the head: secure a scalloped radish to narrow end of pickle. Cut two (3/4 x 1/4) pieces of pickle and place each on a food pick. Press one into each side of pickle "body" to form arms. Use wooden food picks to secure "pickle people" to sandwich.

3 lbs. pure vegetable oil  
1 onion, chopped  
1/2 cup chopped green pepper  
1/4 cup diced celery  
3 cups chicken bouillon  
1 (8-oz.) can tomato sauce  
1/2 cup uncooked rice  
1 (8-oz.) can kidney beans, undrained  
2 tbsps. chopped parsley  
1/2 tsp. salt  
Dash pepper  
3-4 frankfurters, sliced  
Saute onion, green pepper, and celery in oil. Add all other ingredients. Bring to boil; reduce heat and simmer, covered, 20 to 30 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

**HAMBONE SOUP**  
FRANCES  
1 hambone with a little meat on it  
1-3rd cup (1 lg.) grated onion  
1/2 cup (1 large) grated carrot  
1/2 cup diced celery  
3/4 cup (1 small) cubed pared potato  
1 can (1 lb.) tomatoes  
2 tbsps. catsup  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. pepper  
1 small bay leaf  
6 whole cloves  
Put all the ingredients in a kettle, tying the bay leaf and cloves in a piece (1 thickness) of cheesecloth. Simmer about 1 hour; remove hambone and spices. Cut away pieces of meat from bone and return to soup. Makes 4 servings. If ham is very salty, you may need to reduce amount of salt called for.

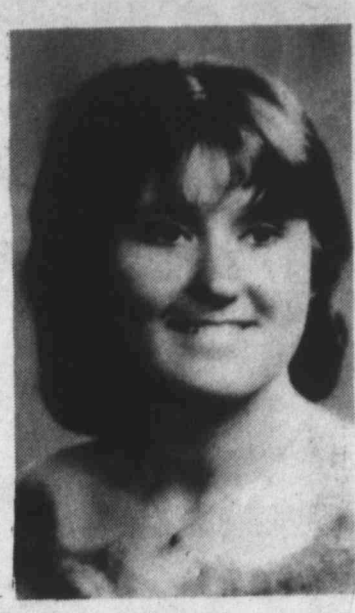



# Vibrant Nigeria Divided By Religion, Culture

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP) — This nation is being strangled by its own prosperity. It's like a newly wealthy man switching from a meager diet to a rich one. His arteries start clogging up, and he is in danger of suffering heart failure.

The African diplomat was bewailing the endless frustrations and complications of life in the capital city of Black Africa's richest and most populous nation.

As he talked, a stream of cars inched its way along the road outside. In the sea lanes leading to Lagos, Nigeria's most important port, more than 280 ships, laden with commodities essential for Nigeria's existence and growth, queued for berths.

In the crowded, vibrant streets of the city, a new breed of Nigerian entrepreneur who has managed to cash in on the nation's massive oil wealth rubs shoulders with peanut vendors and impoverished inhabitants of shanty towns who are finding it daily more difficult to make ends meet as the cost of living soars.

There are constant shortages of milk, gasoline, beer and other items of daily life here despite the fact that last year Nigeria earned \$9.8 billion dollars from oil. Lagos is not entirely representative of life in the rest of the country. But it is here that the dreams, aspirations and fears of the nation crystallize. And over the past few months many residents of the capital have been predicting that something had to give.

Late last month their forecasts came true. As he attended the organization of African Unity summit in Uganda, Gen. Yakubu Gowon was ousted as Nigerian head of state. After nine years of uninterrupted power he was toppled by a handful of dissatisfied brigadiers and colonels who no longer felt he had the authority or capacity to rule.

The new military rulers, headed by 38-year-old Brig. Murtala Muhammed, charged that he had become isolated from the people and was allowing the direction of state affairs to drift to such an extent that the nation's 65-70 million people were again threatened by "bloodshed and chaos."

Nigeria is a conglomeration of some 250 often quarrelsome tribal groupings, divided by religion and culture.

The arid, windswept north is predominantly Moslem, but Christians predominate in the tropical south. Other Nigerians follow their traditional religious customs.

It was Gowon's repeatedly stated desire to weld them irrevocably into one nation. Even his critics agree that he laid the foundations. Part of the key to his success was Nigerian oil. Fueled by international increases in oil prices, Nigerian coffers were flooded by foreign exchange. But this year falling demand for oil worldwide is expected to cut Nigerian revenues by some \$2 billion.

It was the spurt in oil revenues that earlier this year allowed Gowon to award massive pay hikes to civil servants and also launch an ambitious \$48 billion, five-year development program. It was designed to create an industrial revolution, boost stagnant agriculture toward self-sufficiency and open up equal opportunities for all Nigerians.

MEMPHIS (AP) — Police say entertainer Elvis Presley came to the assistance of his stepbrother, paying an early-morning visit to police headquarters.

Officers said Presley showed up about 5 a.m. Wednesday and sought release of Richard Stanley, 21, who had been charged with attempting to obtain a drug through fraud or forgery.

Stanley and Richard Gordon, 23, were released on their own recognizance later in the day.

The two had been arrested Tuesday night at a hospital pharmacy where officers said they attempted to get a prescription for the drug Demoral filled.

Vicki Returns

CAMDEN, N.J. (AP) — Miss Vicki, the former usherette who married singer Tiny Tim and then left him, has returned from a sojourn in London to her old job as a go-go dancer.

But the pay increases, ranging from 30 to 130 per cent, sparked a series of strikes for similar awards in the private sector, which were met under government pressure.

Yet at least 90 per cent of the nation, reliant on a hand-to-mouth existence from the land, derived little benefit. As the minority went on a spending spree, inflation soared from 13 to more than

30 per cent. In addition, as newspapers here have been pointing out in the past week, disillusionment with Gowon's government was further accentuated by a

string of broken promises. These included undertakings to return Nigeria to civilian rule next year, to replace or reshuffle Nigeria's governors then under fire for corruption,

and to create new states to make the existing 12 more representative of local aspirations. Most Nigerians welcomed Gowon's removal. They are biding their time, however,

before embracing the new rulers. One Nigerian summed up the situation: "We are in the position of a man sitting back with his arms folded. We are awaiting events. We

very much want the best for our country. We hope the new military rulers will not let us down. We hope they will overcome the crisis of rising expectations and unfulfilled desires."

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Defense attorney Marvin Miller says he plans to point out evidence in closing arguments today that supports Joan Little's contention that she killed a white jailer in self-defense

and not as part of an escape plot. The defense began closing arguments late Wednesday afternoon in the 21-year-old black woman's murder trial after the state concluded rebuttal testimony.

One of three prosecutors was to follow Miller as the defense and the state alternate closing arguments. The case is expected to go to the jury about noon Friday. In the first closing argument for the defense,

attorney Jim Rowan told the jury of six whites and six blacks that Miss Little surrendered to face charges after Clarence T. Allgood, 62, in self-defense against a sexual attack. Allgood's body, naked

from the waist down, was found in Miss Little's cell in the jail last Aug. 27. She had fled, but turned herself in to state authorities in Raleigh eight days later. Rowan said the investigation of the killing had

been handled poorly and that "preservation" of the evidence was a shambles. He said prosecutors had shown the jury only some of the items found in Miss Little's cell. He said other items "are mysteriously not available." He said the prosecution presented only the physical evidence to support its theory that Miss Little killed Allgood to escape.

Miss Little testified that she stabbed Allgood with an ice pick, without intending to kill him, after he forced her to perform oral sex on him. During rebuttal testimony Wednesday, the state succeeded in contradicting Miss Little's testimony for the first time.

# Council Makes News: No Federal Funds Approved

In a rare meeting for the board of directors of the Permian Basin Regional Planning Council, no funded projects were included on the agenda Wednesday, except one which eventually will be privately funded.

For the first time, under a new law, the board was called upon to approve the housing projects in Midland for Magnell Associates, Inc. since projects that are federally insured will now have to be approved through the regional council.

The project is for 99 single family units at a cost of \$2,574,000. Eventually the profit will be sold to the public.

The board also passed a resolution authorizing the executive director to sign subcontracts for the delivery of manpower programs.

**ALLOWS SUBCONTRACT**  
This is the program which had one unit subcontracted to the City of Big Spring this week. The CETA program for Howard County has operated out of the Big Spring City Hall since its inception, but was only this week transferred to the city's jurisdiction.

The resolution passed Wednesday at the meeting in Terminal will allow the executive director to subcontract programs of this nature without taking each one individually to the board for approval. The approval will be at the other end, where individual counties or cities accept the subcontract.

Ernie Crawford, executive director of PBRPC, and Harley Reeves discussed the Emergency Medical Services System. A 12-foot chart was explained to the board, outlining the areas to be implemented during the coming year. These include personnel, training, facility, transportation and communication.

**HOSPITAL CONSOLE**  
A picture of the communications console which is being developed by NASA engineers for use in hospitals, was presented to each board member. To be employed next week will be a director of the program as well as a former NASA engineer, who will help set up the program in the Permian Basin.

Only two regional planning councils were funded for the program including the Permian Basin council and the one in Amarillo.

**AT LEAST FOUR PERSONS KILLED Bomb Blast Rips Bar**

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP)—Ambulance men say more bodies may be found in the rubble of a bar blown up by a bomb. At least four persons died in the terrorist attack on the haunt of militant Protestants.

The dead included a security guard gunned down at the door and a woman. More than 40 persons were injured, some of them seriously. No group immediately claimed responsibility for

Wednesday's attack on the Bayardo Bar in the Protestant-dominated Shankill Road area. Police and witnesses gave the following account: Just before closing time a gunman opened fire from a

dark-blue car on two security men posted at the door of the bar, killing one and wounding the other. A companion flung the bomb through the unguarded door of the bar. It exploded quickly, almost wrecking the building decorated with the flags of Ulster and of the Ulster Defense Association, one of the largest Protestant paramilitary groups.

A woman, customer injured in the blast said: "It was terrible. The bomb went off almost immediately and the building was shaken to its foundations."

The car raced off in the direction of the Crumlin Road, an Irish Republican Army stronghold. The gunmen fired at people waiting at a bus stop, but no one was reported hit.

At about the same time another bomb exploded in the Shankill Road area, but no injuries were reported.

The last serious bomb incident in the Shankill Road occurred April 5 when five persons were killed in an explosion at the Mountain View Tavern.

The four latest deaths raised to at least 1,271 the number of persons killed in Northern Ireland's past six years of sectarian feuding between the IRA and militant Protestants. The IRA wants to drive the British from the predominantly Protestant province and unite it with the largely Catholic Irish Republic to the south.

# Social Security Faces Stiff Tests

WASHINGTON (AP) — Social Security, which marks its 40th anniversary today, may have to change its benefits structure drastically in the next 40 years to keep up with social changes, Commissioner James B. Cardwell says.

"I don't think the system is any longer in the experimental stages," Cardwell said in an interview. "It's deeply ingrained in the fabric of the country and the world."

"I think future benefits will change a great deal," he said. "Social Security will treat men and women more equally than today. There's a good chance it will treat the family differently, too."

Prodded by Congress and the courts, Social Security is already moving away from the old custom of basing benefits on the presumption that men are the sole breadwinners in the family.

Cardwell said the day may come when marriage no longer automatically establishes right of a man or woman to claim a share of the partner's benefits.

He did not elaborate on other structural changes needed in the future.

The Social Security Administration this year expects to pay out \$82.7 billion to nearly 32 million men, women and children for retirement benefits and health care.

Money remains Social Security's biggest and most immediate problem. Without more of it, and soon, experts say high inflation and

unemployment will drain trust fund reserves by the early 1980s. The deficit in 1975 alone is projected at \$3 billion, and that deficit will grow proportionately larger in succeeding years if no action is taken.

But, in Cardwell's view, "the financing problem is not as severe as it appears to be."

If Congress moves by 1977 to boost either Social Security taxes, or the wage base upon which the taxes are levied, or a combination of the two, that short-term crisis can be overcome, he said.

The more perplexing problem, however, is how to keep Social Security solvent if the nation's birth rate continues dropping, as projected, until there are eventually just two workers

supporting every retiree. Now there are 10 supporting every three retirees.

The current tax rate, 5.85 per cent each on the worker and his employer up to the first \$14,100 of annual income, "seems to be tolerable," to the majority, Cardwell said.

But as Social Security's need for additional financing continues to grow and meets head-on competition from other demands on the worker's paycheck "who knows what will win out?" he said.

The Social Security Act creating old-age pensions, unemployment compensation, child welfare and public health programs was signed on Aug. 14, 1935, in the Great Depression, when there were 11 million unemployed.

all the principal shipping and receiving points in the area between Victoria and Brownsville.

The ICC application also seeks authority for the sale of Southern Pacific trackage and facilities at Mathis to Missouri Pacific.

Also proposed is the shifting of the Southern Pacific-Texas Mexican Railroad interchange at Alice to Robstown and the upgrading of track and facilities between those two points.

Some of the trackage Southern Pacific proposes to retire was built originally in 1888 and 1889.

Southern Pacific is seeking authority to retire 51.3 miles of line between Victoria and Beeville, 39.9 miles between Skidmore and Alice, and 58.7 miles between Falfurrias and Edinburg.

## FORMER TROUBLESHOOTER Feels Hoffa Planned His Own Disappearance

DALLAS (AP) — A one-time associate of former Teamsters boss James R. Hoffa feels Hoffa is alive and will surface "real quick."

Don Vestal, who identified himself as a former president of a teamsters local in Nashville, Tenn., said early Wednesday he thinks Hoffa dropped out of sight to avoid having to testify about the union's association with the Nixon administration.

"I've known Jimmy since 1941 and this (disap-

pearance) is like something he would do— then make a dramatic reappearance," Vestal said.

Vestal, now a Dallas resident, left his Nashville post to run unsuccessfully against national Teamsters President Frank Fitzsimmons in 1971.

"Hoffa knows many things...about how money was laundered before and after the Nixon administration," plus deals between the union and former President Richard Nixon, he said.

"He (Hoffa) was going to be called in connection with several suits in connection with Watergate," Vestal said. "I still believe they couldn't have come and got Jimmy without a struggle outside that restaurant."

"It began to look more and more like organized crime was going for Fitzsimmons" for union president, he said.

Police have said Hoffa may have been abducted or killed to prevent his taking power once more in the union.

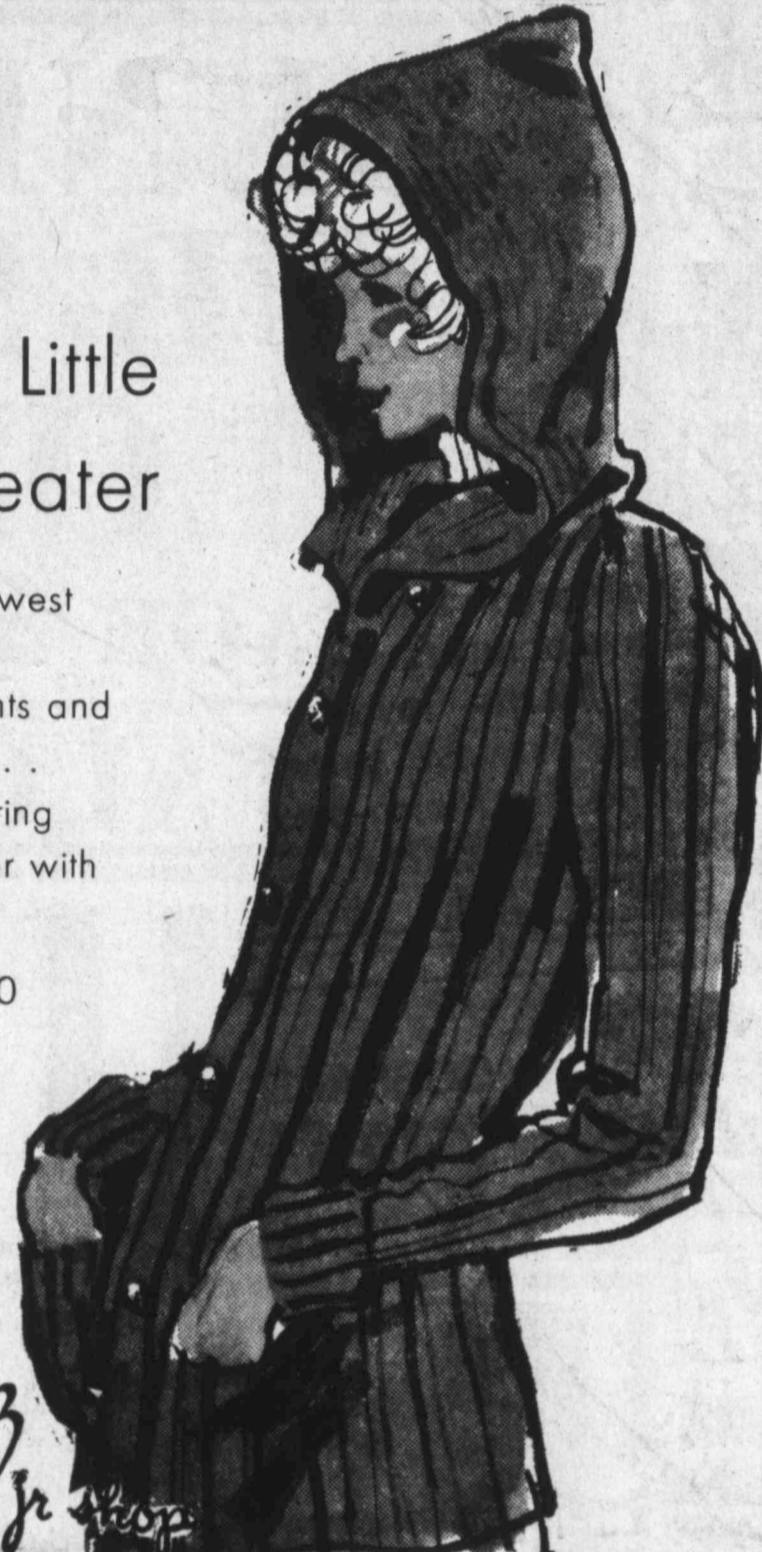
Vestal said he was once Hoffa's troubleshooter and personal representative until they broke in 1960.
