The World At-A-Glance

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's home building industry appears destined for its slowest year since the economy emerged from World War II, but signs are that the worst is over. Industry economists say the key now is how fast the federal government can convert into bricks and mortar its paper promises to support construction of new lowincome housing units. The Commerce Department said Monday that builders reported July con-struction of new housing at an annual rate of 1,238,000 units after adjustment for seasonal factors. That was a monthly advance of 14 per cent, but left activity 6 per cent behind a year earlier.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal judges now can look to retiring at full pay with guaranteed automatic pension increases to keep up with increases in the cost of living. Pension immunity from inflation for the more than 600 federal judges is one effect of the pay-raise bill signed recently by President Ford and brings the federal bench to a par with a number of state courts.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Blacks are refused home loans more than twice as often as whites and their applications are rejected at a higher rate than those of any other racial or ethnic group, according to a new federal study. The Federal Home Loan Bank Board, which regulates savings and loan institutions that lend most of the nation's mortgage money, studied lending practices in five cities in its survey, released Monday. The board included all types of home-loan institutions and covered 53,705 loan applications in Buffalo, N.Y.; Chicago; San Antonio, Tex.,; San Diego; and Washington.

MINNEAPOLIS (ÅP) – President Ford warned the Soviet Union today that detente "is not a license to fish in troubled waters" and said he will seek additional strategic weapons if there is no new agreement on limiting nuclear arms. The President chose a strongly anti-Communist audience, the American Legion's national convention, to declare that the United States is keeping a wary eye on the Soviet Union, especially in Portugal, to determine its true intentions on detente. The speech highlighted a second busy day of a two-day swing through four states.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - San Francisco policemen have unpinned their badges and hoisted picket signs, but city officials pledge that a strike by cops for more pay will not lead to a reign of lawlessness. More than 90 per cent of the 1,935-member force struck late Monday after the San Francisco Board of Supervisors refused to meet pay hike demands by the 1,800-member Police Officers Association. Picket lines immediately went up outside the city's nine police stations, including headquarters at the Hall of Justice.

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - The newspaper Ha'aretz reported today that Israel and the United States will sign a secret agreement of un-derstanding containing about 40 clauses as part of a second-stage Sinai pact. The paper said the pact will cover three years. It said that the United States would ensure that another force independent of the U.N. Security Council would replace U.N. troops in the Sinai buffer zone if renewal of the U.N. peacekeeping mandate is vetoed in the Security Council. The Foreign Ministry would not comment on details of the report.

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — A sharp escalation in political violence has left eight persons dead. The confrontations between presumed leftwing guerrillas and army troops were Argentina's most serious in a month. In Tucuman province, 800 miles north of here, six alleged guerrillas and an army corporal died in a weekend skirmish, according to an army communique issued Monday. Guerrillas disguised in military fatigues held up an army transport vehicle in a residential section of Buenos Aires, killed a captain and made off with the truck and 76 rifles, another communique said.

MRS. HEARST TESTSIFIES We Love Her, Want Her Back

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) - The mother of fugitive newspaper heiress Patricia Hearst said today that she was only interested in her daughter's safety and refused to discuss "anything that might endanger her."

Catherine Hearst made the comment after spending 22 minutes appearing before a federal grand jury in-vestigating the alleged harboring of her missing 21year-old daughter.

'Wherever Patty is I hope she'll realize we love her and want her back and that we will help her resolve whatever legal difficulties she faces," Mrs. Hearst said as she prepared to leave the federal building here. She refused to discuss her testimony, adding: "That is entirely secret."

Brandon Alvey, special Justice Department prosecutor who is handling the Hearst matter, said Mrs. Hearst "cooperated with us, she was very helpful." Alvey insisted that the

questioning of Mrs. Hearst centered only on allegations that her daughter, sought by the FBI on bank robbery and weapons charges, may have been in hiding in Pennsylvania last summer.

King Hussein's Leverage

King Hussein of Jordan is threatening to buy an air efense system from Moscow in a crude attempt to The United States must not place itself in the position defense system from Moscow in a crude attempt to pressure Congress into selling him just what he wants -14 Hawk missile batteries. It may work, but it shouldn't.

There was nothing subtle about Hussein's remarks at a press luncheon in Amman recently. Either Jordan must get all the Hawks it seeks, he said, or "we will probably have to go to our friends in the Soviet Union." To make sure everyone understood the implications of this he added, "We prefer to send our officers abroad for training in weapons systems, but if we have to receive expert technical advice here we will do so for a limited time.

This does not appear to be an idle threat. The likelihood of its being carried out must be taken into consideration when Congress debates the proposal in September.

It does not follow that Congress must necessarily give in and agree to supply all 14 batteries. Obviously it would be preferable not to have Jordan fall into the Soviet orbit. However, this possibility must be weighed against the danger of yielding to the sort of pressure

of being dictated to by prospective arms customers. It already is in somewhat similar position in Turkey where American bases have been taken over by the Turks after Congress refused arms aid.

Weapons systems such as the missiles Jordan wants should be considered in light of our broad national






One hates to respond, or even to comment, on casual effluvia of spouses of important people, but what, really is the alternative other than to take it lying down, a posture recommended by Mrs. Ford for young unmarried American women? Mrs. Ford's interview (on CBS 60 minutes) was in fact an act of aggression.

WHAT SHE did was to use her high office as First Lady, achieved by a concatenation of romantic and felonious coincidences, to rewrite the operative sexual code of western civilization. It is bad enough to hear the same kind of thing from Margaret Mead, returned from a winter in Samoa and over-whelmed by the spontaneity of it all.

But the role of the civic leader is to defend standards, even if the barbarians are at the gate; which they most definitely are. Her husband's policies of detente with the Soviet Union may, by some, be excused as a necessary capitulation to overwhelming force. But Hugh Hefner of Playboy Magazine does not dispose of hydrogen bombs, leaving Mrs. Ford without a practical reason for insouciantly undermining the traditional presumption in favor of chastity, and fidelity.

WHAT SHE did not say was that if her daughter Susan had an affair, she would understand, and forgive her. What she said was that she would not be "surprised;" that, in effect, she would approve, subject here was a strange qualification — to an investigation of the boy-lover who took Susan to his bed. "I'd want to know pretty much about the young man that whe was planning to have the affair with - whether it was a worthwhile encounter or whether it was going to be one of those....

One of those what? What qualifications would Mrs. Ford look for, in a suitor who aspired to be the lover of her 18-year-old daughter? That he be a moderate Republican?

PRESIDENT FORD, who was suddenly cast into the role of poor John Mitchell a few years ago, authorized a spokesman to say limply that he had always encouraged his wife to "speak her mind." Well, clearly the Republican platform of 1976 should commit the president to discouraging his wife from speaking her mind. It is a rationalist and psychological superstition that it is always a good thin to speak your mind. It is nothing

of the sort. It makes no difference that some people harbor prejudice against blacks — they should suppress this bias - any more than it makes any difference at all that it is an acknowledged fact that all of us are sinners and that sexual permissiveness is in vogue. Hypocrisy, La Rochefoucauld said, is the tribute that vice pays to virtue.

MRS. FORD reminds one, sadly, of the long reach of the behaviorists and situational ethics people. The commonplace that they infect primarily only themselves and immature students is long since exploded.



Lovlost B ardot ····· Art Buchwald

Many people are still not too clear about what exactly is happening with the gold reserves in the United States. It appears from what the President has said, and what the corporal's wife. secretary of the treasury has tried to do, that the situation is serious.

NOTHING COULD dramatize the plight better than what has happened in Lovlost-by-the-Sea, the tiny European country that has been a bulwark against communism and a friend of the United States since the early days of 1946.

As everyone knows, Lovlost was on the side of the Germans in World War II and was therefore entitled to immediate financial aid from the United States once the hostilities had ceased.

SINCE 1946 Americans have poured in \$150 million until today she has one of the strongest economies in Western Europe. Just before the Marshall Plan went into effect, Lovlost's currency, which is known as the "bardot," was one of the weakest in the world and it took 500 bardots to make a dollar. Now it takes 500 dollars to equal one bardot. It is this strengthening of the bardot that has caused a drain on the U.S. gold reserves.

TO MAKE MATTERS worse, Lovlost is a vital link in the chain of Western European defenses, and it has the only carrier pigeon station in NATO.

While the bodies of the pigeons can be handled by Lovlost, only the beaks may be touched by the Americans. It is for this reason that American troops, a private and a corporal, have been stationed in Lovlost.



In one of the worst slaps to American prestige, the prime minister turned down the assistant secretary flat and said, "Thanks to American aid, the bardot is now the strongest currency in the world. If we helped share the military burden, the bardot would be weakened again and then we would have to ask for an increase in American dollar aid, something we don't want to do, as you yourself say the dollar is in trouble."






The companies object to the state's interpretation of the State Securities Act as requiring anyone selling a security from Texas to a person outside the state to obtain a dealer's license and to register the securities.


None of the firms has registered its securities with the State Securities Commission because none sells interests in wells to Texas residents, according to the Dallas Morning News.







A mammoth conference of approximately 75 of the nation's major football powers has been formally proposed to the National Collegiate Athletic Association and could become a reality as early as next season.

The plan was presented to the policy-making NCAA Council last week at the special convention on ***

'Inevitable,' Says Broyles

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (AP) — Coach Frank Broyles of Arkansas said Monday that the formation of a college football division for the major powers is inevitable.

Broyles said the colleges with "accelerated" athletic programs have little in common with the smaller schools and need to be in a separate division under separate policies. He said that the formation

of a new division was discussed among coaches at the recent NCAA convention at Chicago. He said for-mation of a division might have happened at that convention if it had gone further with measures touted as cost-cutting devices but opposed by some of the major football powers.

Broyles said the idea is not to split away from the NCAA but to move the major powers into a separate division under the umbrella of the organization.

The NCAA split into three divisions two years ago, but talk of a super conference surfaced again in Chicago last week when the special convention passed new recruiting and personnel regulations that put all 134 of the current Division I

schools on equal footing. A preliminary plan calls for what basically would be a football conference composed of 75 schools - seven conferences plus 15 independents. The conferences are The Big Eight, Southeastern, The Big Ten, Pacific-8, Southwest, Atlantic Coast and Western Athletic. The independents are Notre Dame, Penn State, Pitt, Georgia Tech, Miami of Florida, Florida State, South College, Syracuse, West Virginia, Air Force, Utah State, Memphis State and
