## Vote Total Excellent

Three members were elected to both the Friona City Council and the Friona School Board last Saturday in a good voter turnout.

In the city race, where seven candidates were on the ballot, those elected were Mike Hanes with 252 votes; Jim Zorns with 170 votes and Joe Tongate with 165 votes.

Other totals were Doris Sears, 158; Cindy Butman, 87; Bill Stephens, 77, and Donald W. Wilson, eight.

A total of 313 people cast votes in the city election.

For the school board, Kathryn Goddard was re-elected with 338 votes, and also gaining spots on the board were Danny Murphree with 318 votes and Jerry Cass with 300 votes. A fourth candidate, Jim Atwell, received 189 votes.

The school's turnout was 398 voters, of which 56 cast absentee ballots. There were 35 absentee voters in the city election, both much higher than usual.

## Chamber Urging "Adopt A Spot"

A spokesman for the Friona Chamber of Commerce Spring Clean-Up Committee urges all residents to "Adopt-A-Spot" in order to improve the beauty of our town.

"Adopt-A-Spot" is a volunteer project developed to keep the City of Friona litter-free year-around. Why was this program developed? Because people care. The City of Friona and surrounding area is the permanent home of some 4,500 residents with many annual visitors. Because this community is our home, it is important to us to keep it as beautiful as possible.

ANYONE can "Adopt." Civic, church, youth, athletic, social groups can "adopt," as well as businesses, neighborhoods, individuals—especially individuals! The "Adoption" lasts a year, or until you inform the Chamber of Commerce otherwise.

Any spot can be "Adopted" that appears neglected within the city or adjacent to the City of

Friona. It can be a vacant lot, a street corner, twenty feet of city street, a two-mile stretch of highway, an alley, or any other choice you wish to make.

The amount of time you spend on your spot is up to you—just the amount of time it takes to keep it clean, neat, and litter-free. You need to obtain the owner's permission to prune, plant, or mow. Likewise, you need to check with city or county officials, or the Highway Department, before improving public property.

The way to "Adopt-A-Spot?" Simply go by the Chamber office and register your spot with them. Deadline is May 6.

All residents of the city are urged to drive into town from both directions, and down Main Street, as though you were a stranger, and this is your first time to see the town. Also drive around in the residential areas the same way—REALLY SEE what it really looks like—and decide what we can do to improve it.

"With everyone's cooperation, we can make our town a more beautiful and desirable place to live," the spokesman concluded.

A native of Oklahoma, Hatton was born in Mangum, Oklahoma, in 1954. She graduated from Mangum High School.

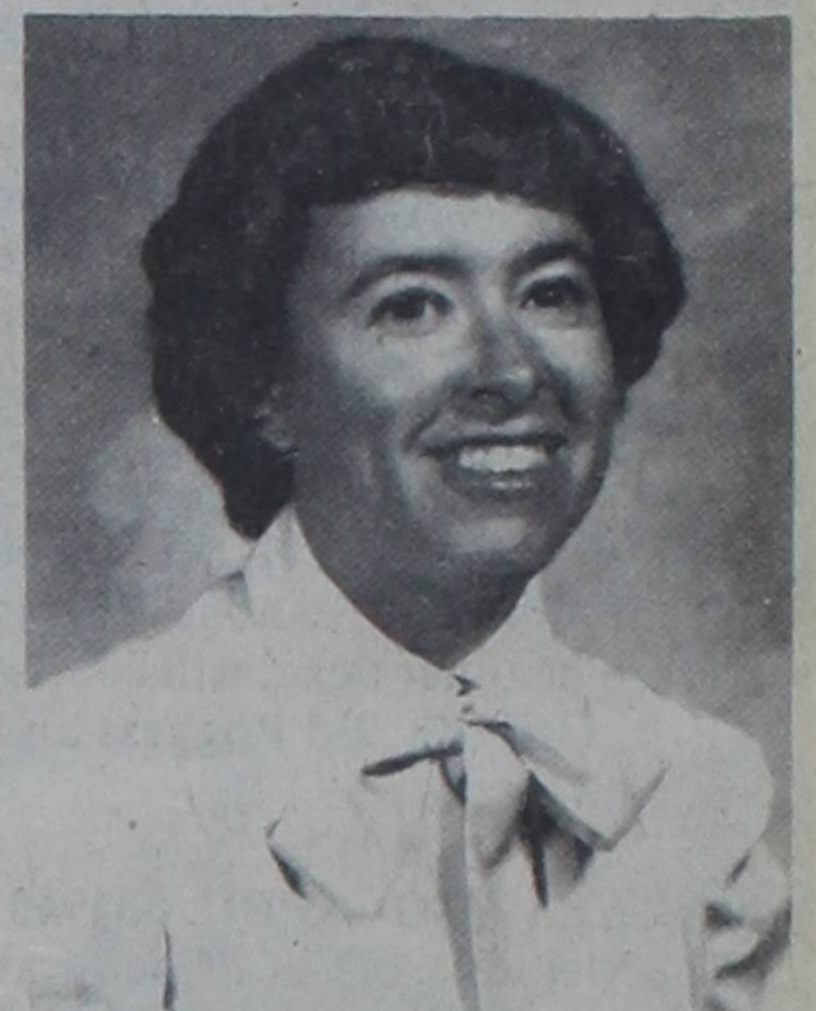

While in college, Hatton was a member of the basketball, tennis, volleyball and field hockey teams.

Also while in college, she was on the Dean's honor roll, the President's honor roll, was in Who's Who, was president of the physical education majors and minors and of the women's recreation association.

## Youth Killed, Two Hurt In Accident

Funeral services for eleven-year-old Andy Serna, Jr. of Bovina were held Friday afternoon in Clovis, N.M. at the Calvary Tabernacle United Pentecostal

Church. Boyd Cates, pastor, officiated.

Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Young Serna was killed Monday afternoon in an accident involving a car and a four-wheel "all-terrain" vehicle.

Two other youngsters were seriously injured in the accident, which happened five miles south and a mile west of Bovina on FM 3333 about 5:45 p.m. Monday.

Also injured were Serna's brother, Ralph, ten, and Steven Heard, 11, both of Bovina. Heard was driver of the motorbike. Late in the week Ralph Serna was listed as "serious but stable" condition at Clovis' High Plains Hospital, and Heard was listed as "stable and improving."

DPS Trooper Richard Diegelman said that there were four riders on the motorbike originally, and that the boys had

**55 YEARS AGO--APRIL 4, 1930**  
Armour and Company takes this method of announcing to the people of Friona and vicinity that they will open an up-to-date cream station in the H.P. Eberling Building on Main Street. Will Langfeldt of Lockney is in charge as manager. The company is prepared to pay top prices for cream, eggs, poultry, hides, etc., and will handle a full line of all kinds of feeds.

**50 YEARS AGO--APRIL 5, 1935**  
Saturday of this week will be school election day for the purpose of choosing three members of the school board of trustees. There are six candidates, forming two tickets. The first ticket will consist of F.W. Reeve, J.B. McFarland and David Moseley, the three present trustees whose terms expire. The other ticket will consist of P.B. Griffith, Ed Boggess and E.R. New.

**40 YEARS AGO--APRIL 6, 1945**  
The Melody Club of Friona was represented by 18 voice students of Miss Mattie Mae Swisher at Hereford recently. Ten rated superior, seven excellent and one very good. **35 YEARS AGO--MARCH 31, 1950**  
Bert Neelley, former advertising and assistant manager of the Hereford Brand, has purchased the Friona Star and will assume duties as publisher and editor effective Saturday, April 1. A former news editor of the Tula Herald, Neelley and his wife have two sons, Robert 7, and Richard, 3.

**25 YEARS AGO--MARCH 31, 1960**  
For the first time since 1949, John (Indian) Crim of Lazbuddie,

acknowledged scion of weather forecasters in Parmer County, has predicted a good year. His annual forecast, made at sunrise March 22, found the wind blowing gently from the north by northwest. He expects 1960 to be a good bit like 1949, which was the last year High Plains farmers made good dryland crops.

**20 YEARS AGO--APRIL 1, 1965**  
Sam P. Barnes, who is currently Business Manager and Assistant Superintendent at Dumas High School, has accepted the position of superintendent of schools at Lazbuddie, effective July 30.

**15 YEARS AGO--APRIL 9, 1970**  
Pouring of concrete began in earnest at the new Friona State Bank site on Monday, as the contractor used a giant steel container and a crane to get the concrete to the critical places. Concrete was poured for the Bank vault and foundation. Some 100 yards of concrete were poured on Monday at the site.

A 20-year-old resident of Friona, Allison Precure, was dead on arrival at Lubbock's Methodist Hospital following a two-car crash near the SIB Gin south of Friona. Hurt critically in the wreck was a Hub community man, Roy Bridgeman, 36. The victims were taken to West Plains Memorial Hospital in Muleshoe and later transferred to Lubbock. The accident occurred about 7:45 p.m. Both vehicles were totally destroyed. Precure, a lifelong resident of the area, attended school at Lazbuddie and Muleshoe. He was employed at Missouri Beef Packers in Friona.

**10 YEARS AGO--APRIL 6, 1975**  
The City of Friona has called a \$350,000 bond election for Tuesday, April 22, for the purpose of constructing a 60-bed nursing home facility in Friona. The city council called the election in a special meeting of the council Monday, March 31 with the nursing home steering committee. Jim (Hack) Corbell, 37, escaped

with chest injuries after his plane was totally demolished on the Bruce Parr farm east of Friona around sundown Monday, March 31. The setting sun was the factor in the crash, as Corbell, an employee of Benger Air Park, did not see a sprinkler system on the wheat he was spraying for green bugs.

**5 YEARS AGO--APRIL 13, 1980**  
The City of Friona has called a new election for the position of mayor, following an unusual turn of events during and following the annual city election last Saturday. In the election, 84 voters wrote in Charles Caudill for the mayor's position, with the incumbent mayor B.K. Buske receiving 55 votes. Caudill declined to serve, however, leaving the city without an elected mayor.

The city of Friona's 1980 census mail return percentage looked "real good," Bill Soule, manager of the 1980 census office for this area, said Wednesday. No census figures can be released at this point, but the district census chief said that judging by the number of returns, Friona's 1980 count could top the 4,000 mark. Friona's official count in 1970 was 3,111.

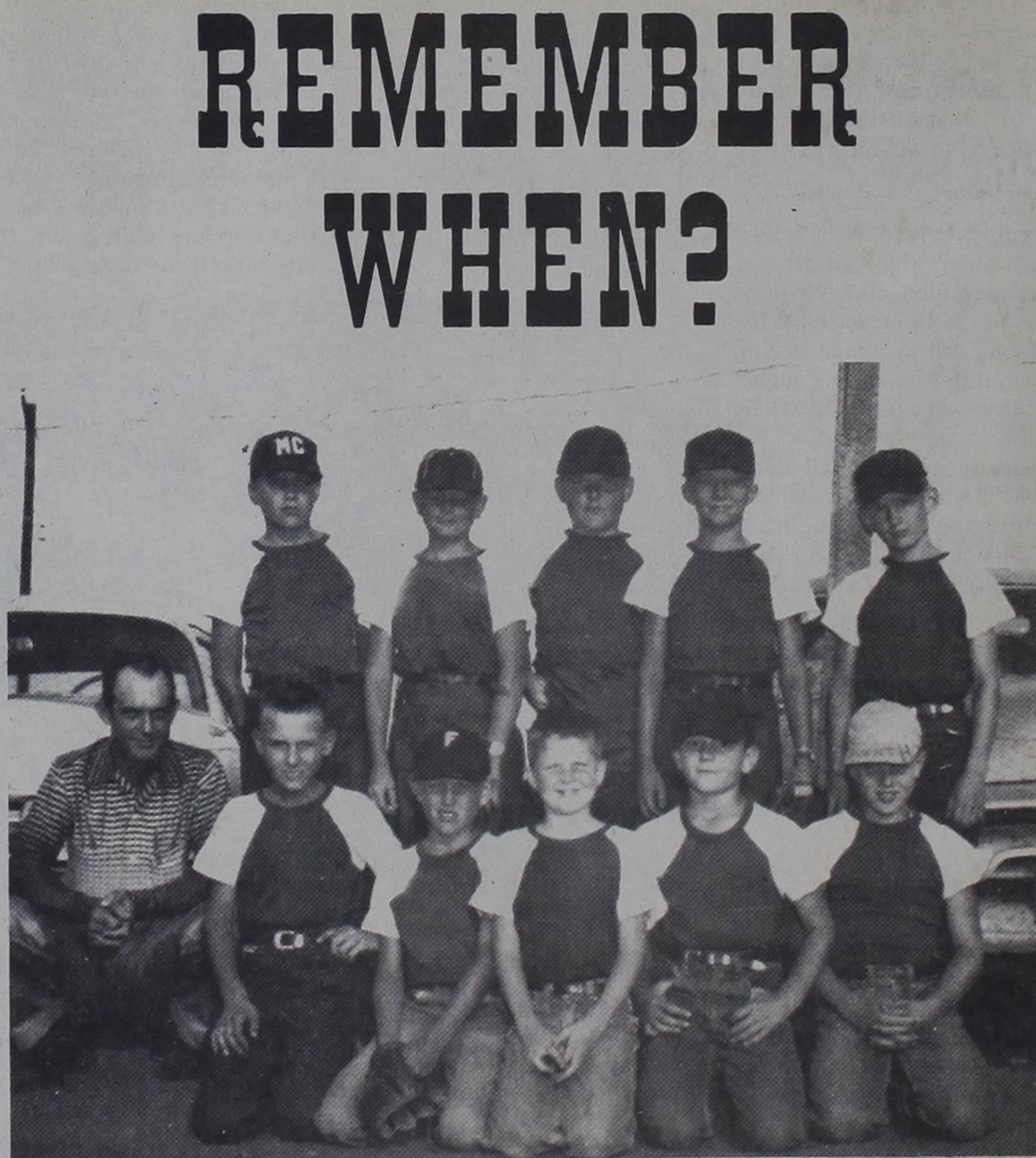

stopped to let another friend off at his home. When they attempted to get back on the Farm-to-Market Road from the private drive, the accident happened.

The motorbike was struck by a vehicle driven by Sharmy Dawn Christian, 22.

Diegelman said that the youths pulled onto the highway in front of the east-bound auto, a 1984 Lincoln. Complicating the situation was the fact that the Christian automobile was meeting another car in the westbound lane, and could not swerve to the left.

With her daughter in the car was Lilly Christian. The two were returning home from shopping. The wreck happened about 1/4 mile west of FM 1731 on the new farm road. Sharmy Christian is a junior student at Texas Tech University who was home for the Easter holidays.

Young Serna was pronounced dead at the scene by Bovina Justice of the Peace Wayne Spears. The other two youngsters were taken to Clovis Hospital by Bovina Ambulance.

Also investigating the accident was DPS trooper Craig Hunt.

Andy Serna was born June 24, 1973 in Weslaco. He was a fifth grade student in Farwell.

He was a resident of the Bovina and Farwell area for the past six years moving here from Weslaco. He was a member of the Calvary Liberal United Pentecostal Church in Clovis. He was a member of the Farwell Grade School Band and also active in the Bovina Little League baseball.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andy Serna of Bovina; two sisters, Maria Serna of Bovina and Lisa Serna, also of Bovina; and one brother, Ralph.

## Aguirre, Neelley Shine At Amarillo

The performances of John Aguirre in the 400-meter dash and Ben Neelley in the 110-meter high hurdles highlighted the Friona Chieftains' appearance at the Amarillo Relays last weekend.

Aguirre equalled his school record in the 400-meter race, 49.7, in the Friday preliminaries. At the completion of that race, the Chieftain runner had the fastest time for the race this season in the Panhandle area.

On Saturday, Aguirre was not feeling up to par—he still ran a 49.9—but came in third in the race.

Neelley, who likewise has his name on the Panhandle's top ten times for his hurdles race, had a strong showing, finishing second in the finals with a time of 15.4. Darron Nash finished third in the race with another good time, 15.6.

Coach Steve Williams was also proud of his 400-meter relay team—Lonnie Phillips, Daniel Echols, Neelley and Aguirre—who toured the lap in 44.3. "The first time we ran the race this season, our time was 48 seconds. Now I think we can get it down to 43," Williams said.

Aguirre tied his own school record in the quarter-mile. He equalled his time of 49.7 that he ran last year in the regional class AAA meet at Odessa. That performance erased one of the oldest records on the FHS record book.

**LANDWEIN**

Landwein is a relatively new (1982) category of German table wine. It was introduced as a response to the success of the French "vins de pays." It was to be a standard drinking wine but of some local character and with more style and flavor than the relatively anonymous tafelwein (table wine). Fifteen regions of Germany have the right to christen a landwein if the wine in question meets certain simple requirements. The alcohol content, for example, must be 0.5 percent higher than that of tafelwein. Another important regulation is that the sugar content should not exceed the acidity by more than 10 grams per liter of sugar. Landwein is therefore intended as a relatively dry and briskly acidic wine suitable for meal-times.

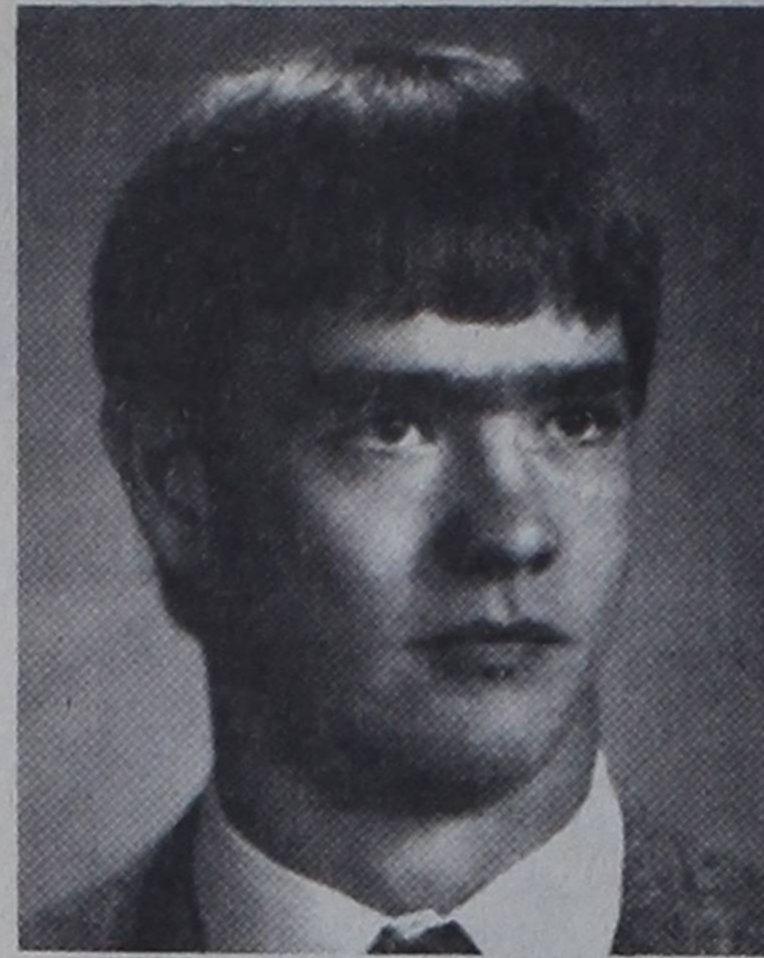
He placed second in the district UIL contests in informative speaking this year, and also was
