Rebels Spark Violence In Spain, Portugal

Terrorists Attack Police In Spain

MADRID, Spain (AP) — Terrorists attacked a Barcelona police headquarters early today, sparking a gunbattle in which police fire killed three innocent civilians in a passing car and two of their own officers, police said.

Two other persons, including one policeman, were seriously wounded in Spain's bloodiest day of violence this year. The attack raised the death toll to eight policemen and four civilians in seven days of political violence since Spain was plunged into crisis at home and abroad by the executions of five young terrorists Sept. 27.

Police said the latest deaths, in the working class district of La Vermeda, came after a group of gunmen drove past the police barracks firing with submachine guns. Police guards, untouched

by the bullets, returned fire and in error riddled a second car, killing a couple and their 22-year-old son and seriously wounding a fourth person in the car, police said. The civilians were reported returning home from a wake for a friend.

Continuing to fire, police hit three policemen returning from a night call. Two died instantly, and a third was seriously wounded, police said.

Authorities said later the killing of the two policemen was due "to lack of visibility at the time and the interposition of vehicles" — the patrol car and the automobile of the civilian victims.

Barcelona is a stronghold of the urban guerrilla organization FRAP — the Patriotic Revolutionary Anti-Fascist Front — which lost three militants to police

firing squads 12 days ago. The three had been convicted of killing policemen.

Four days after the executions, FRAP commandos were blamed for killing another three policemen in Madrid, bloodying celebrations marking the 39th anniversary of Gen. Francisco Franco's rise to power in Spain.

Two Basque separatists also convicted of killing policemen were executed in addition to the three FRAP militants Sept. 27.

On Sunday, terrorists in the northern Basque country killed three civil guardsmen by blowing up their jeep in apparent retaliation for the executions of the five terrorists.

Seventeen policemen had died prior to today as a result of political violence, six in the past week.

Tax Appraisal Directors Discuss New Contract

Six of the nine governmental agencies represented in the cooperative tax appraisal board of directors met in a called meeting at Howard College this morning and set groundwork for a new contract.

The meeting, which was held in lieu of the regular monthly meeting called for Thursday, was for the purpose of discussing changes in the new contract prior to considering it for adoption in November.

The changes will be discussed at each individual governmental agency prior to bringing it back to the board.

Basically, it replaces last year's contract and allows the agencies to again contract with a firm for tax appraisal services. It may or may not be the same firm used last year, with the decision left to the board.

The budgeted figure for

the new year is \$49,645 instead of the \$41,138 collected from the agencies last year. There is a balance on hand of \$4,038.75.

"This is not a lot higher, considering inflation," Dr. Charles Hays, board chairman, said this morning. "I think that we have done a good job this first year and learned to work together and this is a tribute to the community."

The new recommended contract will call for the board to hire a firm and then let them handle the details of salaries and personnel. This would replace running it through the college payroll and would be more like the contract held with Southwest Appraisal in former years.

The nine agencies on the board are Howard County, Howard College, the City of Big Spring, Big Spring Independent School District, Forsan Independent School District, the City of Coahoma

and Howard County Water Control and Improvement District 1.

Representatives at today's meeting were Dr. Hays and Dr. Charles Warren, Howard College; Mrs. Zarah Bednar and Cy Terrazas, Howard County; James Gregg, the City of Big Spring; Don Crockett, Big Spring schools; Mrs. Nova Scudiday, Forsan Schools, Mrs. Susa, the City of Forsan; and Richard Fleener of the tax appraisal service.

Portuguese Army Regiment Rebels

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — An alert by all military units in northern Portugal was called off today and senior officers said they were trying to convince a mutinous artillery regiment in Oporto "with words, that they are misguided."

The 650 heavily armed mutineers at the Serra do Pilar regiment ran a red banner up a flagpole Tuesday and demanded dismissal of the region's new military commander, Gen. Antonio Pires Veloso. Oporto, Portugal's second largest city, is 175 miles north of the capital.

They also demanded an end to what they called purges of leftists from the barracks and the reopening of a leftist-dominated military driver training center which was closed last Saturday on Veloso's orders.

A spokesman at regional military headquarters said the general alert for the region was called off as part of an effort to reduce tension. The spokesman said 500 soldiers from the regiment were taking part in the mutiny, plus 150 soldiers from other units inside the campment. He said another 150 officers and men in the regiment were

remaining loyal to the government.

Veloso had first threatened to bomb the regiment, encamped on a bluff across the deep Douro River gorge from Oporto, but later backed off and ordered the strict military alert.

The revolt was seen as the most serious challenge yet to the government's efforts to restore military discipline sapped by Communist infiltrators. On Monday, the 1st Light Artillery Regiment in Lisbon said it would resist any such effort.

In other developments Tuesday:

—Foreign ministers of the European Common Market countries approved more than \$200 million in emergency aid for Portugal. The aid offer had been frozen last summer pending a return to "pluralistic democracy" in Portugal. Since then the Communist-leaning government has been replaced by a more moderate one.

—A radio broadcast from the town of Santa Maria on Portugal's Azores Islands, 1,000 miles west of Lisbon, said the Azores Liberation Front had informed Lisbon it wants a referendum on independence and would declare independence in eight days if it did not receive a reply.

—A radio station on Madeira Island, 600 miles southwest of Lisbon, was occupied for several hours by former employees demanding that five Communists be purged from the staff.

Gramm Will Oppose Bentsen

AUSTIN (AP) — Dr. Philip Gramm, a Texas A&M economics professor who describes himself as a free market man, announced today he will oppose Sen. Lloyd Bentsen next year for the Democratic nomination for the U.S. Senate.

Bentsen also is seeking the party's presidential nomination and will have a slate of delegates on the 1976 presidential primary ballot. Asked if he would make the double candidacy a campaign issue, Gramm replied, "It already is an issue."

Gramm, 33, said that Bentsen, in his quest for national standing, had taken positions that are "out of step with the views of the people of Texas."

IMPEACHMENT TRIAL POSTPONED

Witnesses Tell: Carrillo Got Welfare Groceries

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — The impeachment trial of South Texas District Judge O. P. Carrillo has been postponed for six weeks over the strong objections of several senators and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby.

Sen. A. R. Schwartz, D-Galveston, who lost, 12-14, on an attempt Monday to have the trial postponed until Dec. 1, persuaded the Senate to change its mind Tuesday and postpone the trial until Nov. 18. The vote was 16-13.

Of the 14 who voted no Monday, only Sen. Glenn Kothmann, D-San Antonio, voted yes Tuesday. Three other senators, who were not present for the vote Monday, voted with the majority Tuesday.

The Senate first voted 15-13 to adjourn until Nov. 17, but changed it to Nov. 18 after it learned Carrillo, convicted on income tax evasion charges last Thursday in Corpus Christi federal court, will be sentenced Nov. 17.

The 15-13 vote followed a

35-minute closed-door session requested by Schwartz, and after a spirited open-session debate in which Hobby argued against postponement.

Hobby supported Sen. Don Adams, D-Jasper, who shouted to Schwartz that the statute on impeachment trials says they shall be conducted "expeditiously."

"If words written down on paper mean anything, they mean what the senator from Jasper said," Hobby told the Senate.

Schwartz made the same argument he used Monday in an unsuccessful effort to get the trial postponed until Dec. 1. That motion lost, 12-14.

The voters amended the Texas Constitution to establish the Judicial Qualifications Commission to handle just such cases as this one, Schwartz said.

Hobby said, "If the Judicial Qualifications Commission functioned, as I believe it ought to do, we wouldn't be here today."

Schwartz also argued that Carrillo's federal court trial in Corpus Christi would not be completed until Carrillo is sentenced. Schwartz said the trial stage of that proceeding comes to an end only with sentencing.

Carrillo could get up to 14 years and a fine up to \$25,000 in the federal case.

The senators agreed without objection to forego until Nov. 18 the \$30-a-day expenses each is entitled to during the impeachment trial.

"Justice dictates that this court (the Senate) recognize other judicial proceedings," Schwartz said.

Adams responded that the Senate would be "shirking our responsibility" if it voted to postpone.

"Senator," Schwartz told Adams, "you're ignoring what billions and billions of your brain cells tell you—that you're wrong."

During the executive session, reporters asked Carrillo if it was worth

depleting his claimed \$1.5 million fortune to exonerate his name when the odds appeared to be against him.

"At least I would have the satisfaction of having tried," he said.

To a question about whether he continues the fight to buy time so he and other members of his family can raise money for back taxes and not lose their land, Carrillo said: "I'm doing it because I'm innocent."

The operator of the Benavides Cash Store testified earlier she knew Carrillo bought groceries with county funds "because he came by to pick them up."

Mrs. Lauro Yzaguirre said Carrillo's brother, Duval County Commissioner Ramiro Carrillo, told her the judge had a \$300-a-month county welfare budget for groceries at the store.

The judge paid her with a personal check for amounts exceeding \$300, she said. Carrillo's lawyer, Arthur Mitchell of Austin, angrily

asked Mrs. Yzaguirre if she testified before a special House investigating committee in May that she didn't know what happened to groceries charged to the judge by his employees and others.

She said yes.

Mitchell asked if she realized she had given conflicting testimony under oath. She saw no conflict.

"Do you even know what a conspiracy is?" Mitchell asked.

"I sure do," she snapped. "What is it?"

"Somebody enters into an agreement with somebody to do a crime to somebody else."

The Senate laughed at the blunt simplicity of her response.

Mitchell appeared to be laying the ground work for an argument that this was the way the Duval County welfare system worked: the judge and the county commissioners gave white welfare tickets to needy

persons, who redeemed them for groceries at the Cash Store, which then was repaid out of county funds after the commissioners' court approved the charges.

Mitchell asked Mrs. Yzaguirre, "The judge doesn't owe you money now, does he?"

She said he owed "less than \$5" for charges last June.

"Doesn't sound like a ripoff artist to me," Mitchell said. "We'll try to see you're repaid before the day is over."

"Don't worry," she said. The Senate heard the fourth and fifth witnesses in the case Tuesday afternoon.

Patricio Garza, who works on the judge's ranch, testified he never got groceries free at the Cash Store, despite the appearance of his name 26 times on county vouchers paid to the store. His wife never did either, he said, despite the appearance of her name 29 times on county vouchers.

Rosa Chapa testified she received no free groceries after 1967, even though her name appears on county vouchers numerous times after that.

Mitchell, frequently impatient and angry with House witnesses, reached his hottest temperature with Mrs. Chapa.

"Didn't he pay for the delivery of your first and second babies?" he demanded.

"The first one—not the second," she said in a tone that indicated she gave the correction great significance.

Mitchell said the judge got a doctor for her for the Caesarean delivery of the second when she couldn't find a doctor.

Mrs. Chapa conceded that Carrillo had gotten her a doctor for the operation.

"Well, I want to communicate his thanks," Mitchell said sarcastically.

'I THINK I WAS RAPED' 'First Time' All Sold Out

NEW YORK AP — Karl Fleming lost his virginity at age 17 to a Baptist minister's daughter under the moonlight in a corn patch. His "First Time" wasn't very thrilling, Fleming recalls.

His wife, Anne Taylor Fleming, remembers her "First Time" (she was 19) as tender and romantic. It happened in a room at the Waldorf-Astoria.

Three years later, Anne married that first love, and now the Flemings have collaborated on a book that catalogues the "First Times" of some other people, most of them celebrities.

The book, called "The First Time" in case you haven't guessed, sold out its first printing before its Sept. 19 publication date. It's a series of interviews with 28 lovers, including the likes of Clifford Irving, Debbie Reynolds, Bobby Riggs, Mae West and Dr. Benjamin Spock.

Karl's and Anne's replies to queries about their own first sexual encounters were relatively discreet one-liners. "I'm glad I was there for yours," Karl said, beaming at Anne. But the answers their subjects gave were lengthy narratives about family and school life. The stories spanned several generations, from Alice Roosevelt Longworth's deflowering at age 24 in 1908 to actress Victoria Principal's as a teen-ager in the '60s.

"We wanted to do a book that would tell what this country is all about," said Karl, 48 and handsome enough to be seduced by anybody in a corn patch. "What better question to ask than about our bizarre tribal initiation rite?"

The idea for the book came two years ago as a money-making project for the two unemployed Los Angeles journalists. The Flemings said it was a delicate process to convince the 28 to talk for a book.

Most of the first sexual fumbblings portrayed in the book were awkward, confusing and, in most cases, not terribly satisfying.

"The accomplishment far surpassed the physical pleasure," said Art Buchwald, describing his first time when he was 15 with a chambermaid twice his age.

"I think I was raped," said Liberace of his adventure at age 13 with a chesty blues singer.

"My God, is this it?" writer Nora Ephron asked. The Flemings originally drew up a list of about 200 people, which was pared down to the final selections. No one was paid for their account, although Linda Lovelace of "Deep Throat" fame did ask and was eliminated.

Every sports figure the Flemings approached turned them down, as did most politicians.

Both Flemings had their favorites. Karl found Jack Lemmon's story complicated and touching and was most moved by Dr. Benjamin Spock's and analysis of his impotency until age 20.

"For everybody it was a very significant, powerful and frightening time," said Anne. "I think a lot emerged from the interviews about people that tell what they're really about."

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Sophia Loren Donates Ring To Benefit Small Texas Church

LLANO, Tex. (AP) — "She has charity and compassion for poor people and that is why she had time to establish a friendship with a poor parish priest in the heart of Texas," says Father Anthony Goossens, of the woman whose generosity may mean a new church in his parish.

The woman is movie actress Sophia Loren who became acquainted with the 61-year-old Catholic priest through a series of circumstances, involving the priest's work visiting the sick and Miss Loren's help to a heart patient.

As a result, Miss Loren recently sent to Father Goossens one of her rings—a harem ring topped with rubies—to auction them off

and collect money for the rebuilding of the old Holy Trinity mission church at Llano.

A harem ring is a cluster of rings worn as one ring. Legend has it that the number of rings a sultan wore represented the number of wives he had.

"I really do not know how much the rings are worth," Father Goossens said in a telephone interview Tuesday from his parish church in nearby Mason. "The real value of the rings is that they come from her ... but, of course, she doesn't buy jewelry at a dime store."

Father Goossens, an Oblate missionary, said his friendship with Miss Loren dates back ten years when he was in Houston and was

visiting patients at Houston hospitals. One of them, he explained, was a woman from France whose trip to Houston had been paid by Miss Loren. After talking to the woman he wrote to Miss Loren to tell her of the satisfactory results of the operation.

That, he said, started the friendship. "She wrote back to thank me and then I wrote back and told her about our work."

During one of his trips to his homeland, Holland, Father Goossens visited Miss Loren near Rome. He saw her again last December.

"It was then that I told her about the missions and mentioned casually that we were trying to raise money. I

suggested she give something of her own and she asked me what that could be."

After I returned to Texas, I wrote to her suggesting she donate a ring. She sent the rings saying she had used them in a picture very dear to her. She said: 'I hope your auction is a smashing success. Please keep me in your prayers.'"

Father Goossens' parish covers 3,000 square miles of sparsely populated Texas Hill Country just west of Austin with only about 350 Catholic families, many of them Mexican-American.

"It is a poor parish," said Father Goossens who drives around the parish in an old Volkswagen. About 40

families attend the Holy Trinity mission church in Llano.

"I gave them (the parishioners) the good news last week," he said. "They all want to write to Miss Loren and thank her."

Father Goossens still does not know how he is going to auction off the rings. "I have had calls from around the country from people who want to buy them. We are going to have to go out of the parish, or the state, to get enough money to rebuild the church."

Miss Loren is expected to arrive in Dallas later this week for a movie premiere. And the old priest and the movie star may get a chance to renew their friendship.

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Four Former Patrolmen Indicted In Kidnaping

GREENVILLE, Tex. (AP) — Four former highway patrolmen charged with the robbery of the Caddo Mills State Bank and the kidnaping of the bank president's daughter a month ago have been indicted by the Hunt County grand jury.

Those indicted for aggravated robbery with a deadly weapon and aggravated kidnaping were Tommy Lee Deal, George Patton Marshall, Donald Ray Morris and Kenneth Aubrey Hinshaw. The men are being held in the Hunt County jail under \$100,000 bonds each.

Deal was a former state trooper and former chief of police at Webster and at the time of the bank robbery was working in a sporting goods store in the Houston area.

Morris and Hinshaw were

former troopers assigned to Rockwall County and Marshall, also a former trooper, was working in the identification division of the Dallas County sheriff's office.

Deal and Marshall were captured after a high-speed chase by citizens of Caddo Mills a short time after the bank robbery. During the chase, Mrs. Cherrie Johnson was thrown from the car after being abducted at the bank.

Morris was arrested early the next day and charged with the same offenses as Deal and Marshall. Morris had been seen along the chase route by Caddo Mills citizens.

Hinshaw was arrested eight days later as the result of an investigation carried out by the Department of Public Safety and Texas Rangers.

The money taken in the robbery, \$15,775, was recovered. A statement from one of the suspects has involved one or more of them in four other bank robberies in Texas, including one in Roysse City on Sept. 4, 1974 and three in the Houston area in 1973-74, authorities said.

Woman Found Shot To Death

STEPHENVILLE, Tex. (AP) — Mrs. Carrie Belle Stewart, 46, of Hico, was found shot to death about Tuesday at the rear of her farm home in the Millerville community southeast of Stephenville.

The body was discovered by a son when he and his father returned home from hauling hay. A small pistol was nearby.

Moran Voters Approve Bonds

MORAN — Moran voters Tuesday voted overwhelmingly to authorize bonds for the construction of a new high school building here.

With 75 per cent of the registered voters participating, the issue was approved, 182-44. The new structure, which will cost approximately \$250,000 will replace a 52-year-old building which was razed the past summer after inspectors found the structure unsafe.

The school tax rate, which has been \$1.4 per \$100 valuation, will go to \$2.03.

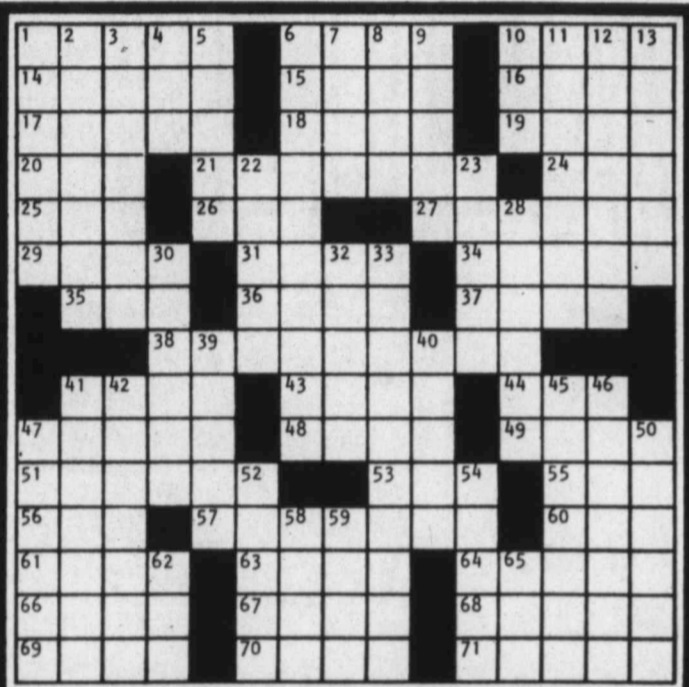

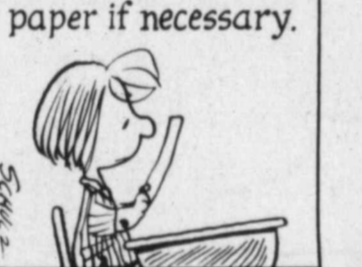

VA To Screen Patients For High Blood Pressure

Eight additional Veterans Administration Hospitals are joining the agency's specialized hypertension program. They will establish model clinics to screen patients for high blood pressure and treat those who would benefit from medication, bringing the total of VA hospitals with such programs to 32.

All are expected to be in operation by January 1976. By that time the agency expects to have about 300,000 veterans in the program.

The new hospitals are in Buffalo, N.Y., Indianapolis, Ind., Minneapolis, Minn., New Orleans, San Francisco, Seattle, Wash., Topeka, Kans., and Wood, Wis.

Central Office in Washington, D.C., said the VA model clinic system is providing a high quality detection and treatment method for this disease. He is encouraging other hospitals, among VA's total of 171, to develop similar programs.

One out of every three veterans screened thus far by the VA model clinics has high blood pressure considered severe enough to require treatment or periodic rescreening.

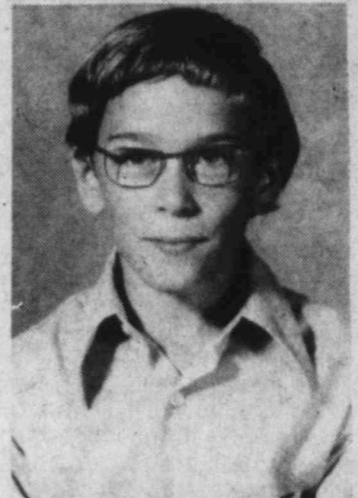

Says Condemned Man Is Innocent

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Claudius J. Giesick, convicted of manslaughter in the death of his bride, says another man sentenced to death in the case is innocent.

Giesick, chief prosecution witness against Sam C. Corey, has written letters saying he can prove Corey's innocence. Giesick also said he fears for his life at Louisiana's Angola State Prison where he is serving a 21-year term.

In a letter to Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez, D-Tex., Giesick wrote, "An innocent man may yet die."

Giesick and Corey were convicted in the hit-and-run death in New Orleans of Patricia Albanowski Giesick on Jan. 16, 1974.

Corey, whose conviction is being appealed, is on death row in Louisiana for conspiring with Giesick to kill the woman.

Giesick testified at Corey's trial at New Orleans last April that Corey drove the car and he tripped his bride so she fell into the path of the speeding auto.

San Antonio police detective Bernard Coby said an ex-convict who knew Giesick at Angola called him recently and said Giesick told him another person, not Cory, had driven the car.

A spokesman for the Louisiana Department of Corrections said precautions had been taken against anything happening to Giesick.

The judge in the case and Orleans Parish Asst. Dist. Atty. Richard Whalen have both recommended that Giesick be transferred to the prison at De Quincey, La., where many first offenders are sent.

To Discuss Leukemia

SAN ANTONIO — Although the "quality of life" for leukemia patients has improved with newer treatment concepts, there is still no definitive cure for the disease.

Health professionals at Big Spring State Hospital in Big Spring will discuss "Leukemia — Current Approach" during a therapeutics seminar Thursday at 12:30 p.m.

The local participants will utilize a two-way communication hookup with The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio, from which the seminar will originate.

Discussion panelists at the San Antonio site will include guest participant Dr. Joseph Burcheal, director of clinical investigation at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York City.

Additional panelists from the UT health science center will be moderator Dr. Howard Britton, clinical professor of pediatrics; Dr. David Sears, associate professor of hematology; and Dr. John Whitecar, clinical assistant professor of hematology.

Newer treatment concepts such as multiple drug therapy and blood component therapy, as well as the emotional and financial problems for long-term patients will be considered.

Good Records Necessary, IRS Points Out

DALLAS — Inefficient record-keeping habits can do more to destroy a small business than inflation and fickle customers combined, according to an official of the Internal Revenue Service IRS here.

A. W. McCanless, district director of IRS operations in North Texas, said recently that the IRS is going all out to impress this fact on owners and operators of small businesses. "Good records are essential to keeping businesses in operation," he said. "They enable the owner-operator to keep track of profits and they will show which business property is depreciable, allowing a businessperson to get full tax deductions."

McCanless said good records are also necessary to show which business income is taxable and which is not taxable, to substantiate information provided on tax returns filed, to help answer a tax examiner's questions in the event of an IRS audit, and to establish reportable earnings for social security purposes.

The IRS does not specify any particular style of record-keeping, as long as the records clearly establish all income, deductions and credits. For advice and assistance to small business owners, the IRS has experts standing by ready to help, as well as free booklets on record-keeping and other facets of business operations.

Army Probes Drug Traffic

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — U.S. Army narcotics investigators are conducting a probe into drug trafficking around Ft. Sam Houston, a Criminal Investigation Detachment officer said Tuesday.

Maj. Michael Chester, CID commander for a 68-county South Texas area, said the month-long probe is part of the Army's drug suppression program that has been in existence since 1970.

Page Apologizes For Wrong Name

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Minnesota Viking all-pro football player Alan Page has apologized to land developer Sid Jagger for suing him for racial discrimination. Jagger was the wrong man.

Page, a summer student at the University of Texas Law School, and his wife Diane sued Jagger in federal court Aug. 11, alleging that they had been denied an apartment on the basis of their race.

The suit received widespread national publicity.

Page identified Woodhollow Apartments as the location of the alleged discrimination, and Page's lawyer, student lawyer Frank Ivy, asked one of his clerks to find out who owned the apartments.

The clerk, Joe Crews, said he was told by the city tax office that the apartments were managed by Jagger and Associates, which operates in Austin, San Antonio, Houston and Dallas. The county tax office verified that Jagger was the agent.

Jagger had built and sold and manages a complex down the street from Woodhollow Apartments called Oak Hollow Apartments, and this complex apparently was confused with Woodhollow.

NUEVO LAREDO, Mexico (AP) — A policeman's bullet halted an attempt to escape Monday by a young Texas man jailed the night before in a marijuana and concealed weapons case.

Nuevo Laredo police identified the wounded prisoner as Douglas Stuart Huntington, 29, and his companion as Ann Coulbert Ting, 21, both of San Antonio.

Mexican customs agents arrested the two Monday evening after they crossed the border in a 1975 model pickup truck. Customs chief Manuel Garza Adame and local police gave these details:

Huntington, at the wheel, refused to stop at a customs check point on Kilometer 26 on the road to Mexico City.

Customs agents forced the truck to halt and found 168 grams of marijuana, a .22 carbine, a .38 caliber pistol and \$69,608 cash hidden in the vehicle.

The two were brought to jail here and at 5 a.m. Huntington, on the excuse that he wanted to go to the bathroom, jumped over the wall and tried to escape.

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LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF COAHOMA, TEXAS, MAKING IT UNLAWFUL FOR ANY PERSON TO DISCHARGE ANY GUN, PISTOL OR FIREARM OF ANY KIND WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS EXCEPT SUCH DISCHARGES BY LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS ACTING IN THE LINE OF DUTY AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE.

WHEREAS, on several occasions recently persons have discharged guns, pistols or firearms within the city limits of Coahoma, Texas; and

WHEREAS, such discharges have constituted and do constitute a threat to the safety and well-being of all citizens of the City of Coahoma, Texas, and others who may be located within or without the city limits of such City; and

WHEREAS, law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty are the only persons who should find it necessary to discharge guns, pistols or firearms within the city limits of Coahoma, Texas; and

WHEREAS, it would be in the best interest of the citizens of Coahoma, Texas, and others if it were made unlawful for any one other than law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty to discharge any gun, pistol or firearm of any kind within the city limits of Coahoma, Texas;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF COAHOMA, TEXAS:

That it shall be unlawful for any person to discharge any gun, pistol or firearm of any kind within the city limits of Coahoma, Texas. This ordinance shall not apply to law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty.

Any person violating this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$12.50 nor more than \$50.00.
