Portuguese Army Regiment Rebels

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — An alert by all military units in northern Portugal was called off today and senior officers said they were trying to convince a mutinous artillery regiment in Oporto "with words, that

they are misguided."
The 650 heavily armed mutineers at the Serra do Pilar regiment ran a red banner up a flagpole Tuesday and demanded dismissal of the region's new military commander, Gen. Antonio Pires Veloso. Oporto, Portugal's second largest city, is 175 miles north of the capital.

They also demanded an end to what they called purges of leftists from the barracks and the reopening a leftist-dominated military driver training center which was closed last Saturday on Veloso's orders. A spokesman at regional

military headquarters said the general alert for the region was called off as part of an effort to reduce tension. The spokesman said 500 soldiers from the regiment were taking part in the mutiny, plus 150 soldiers

remaining loyal to the government

Veloso had first threatened to bomb the regiment, en-camped on a bluff across the deep Douro River gorge from Oporto, but later backed off and ordered the strict military alert.

The revolt was seen as the most serious challenge yet to the government's efforts to restore military discipline sapped by Communist in-filtrators. On Monday, the 1st Light Artillery Regiment in Lisbon said it would resist any such effort.

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Argentine security forces and leftist guerrillas clashed in widely scattered areas Tuesday, leaving 28 persons dead and Isabel Peron's future cloudier than ever. The casualties raised to about 800 the number of persons killed in Argentine political violence since Mrs. Peron assumed the presidency on the death of her husband 16 months ago. Citing nervous strain and intestinal disorders, she turned over her presidential powers to Italo Luder, president of the senate, on Sept. 13 and began a month-long vacation in Cordoba province.

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Ford, defeated in his battle with Congress over child nutritional programs, is having a higher percentage of his vetoes overridden than any chief executive since Andrew Johnson served in the White House more than a century ago. IMPEACHMENT TRIAL POSTPONED

Witnesses Tell: Carrillo Got Welfare Groceries

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - The impeachment trial of South Texas District Judge O. P. Carrillo has been postponed for six weeks over the strong objections of several senators and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby

Sen. A. R. Schwartz, D-Galveston, who lost, 12-14, on an attempt Monday to have the trial postponed until Dec. 1, persuaded the Senate to change its mind Tuesday and postpone the trial until Nov. 18. The vote was 16-13.

Of the 14 who voted no Monday, only Sen. Glenn Kothmann, D-San Antonio, voted yes Tuesday. Three other senators, who were not present for the vote Monday, voted with the majority

The Senate first voted 15-13 to adjourn until Nov. 17, but changed it to Nov. 18 after it learned Carrillo, convicted on income tax evasion charges last Thursday in Corpus Christi federal court, 35-minute closed-door session requested by Schwartz, and after a spirited open-session debate in which Hobby argued against postponement.

Hobby supported Sen. Don Adams, D-Jasper, who shouted to Schwartz that the statute on impeachment trials says they shall be conducted "expeditiously." "If words written down on paper mean anything, they

mean what the senator from Jasper said," Hobby told the Schwartz made the same argument he used Monday in

an unsuccessful effort to get the trial postponed until Dec. 1. That motion lost, 12-14. The voters amended the Texas Constitution to establish the Judicial Qualifications Commission

to handle just such cases as this one, Schwartz said. Hobby said, "If the Judicial Qualifications Commission functioned, as I will be sentenced Nov. 17.

The love affair of Americans for their cars has had cars in fuel economy one poorly examined premise. It was enunciated by the automobile industry substantially in these words: We are building the kind of cars Americans want.

But in recent years the industry appears to be an follow suit. example of the tail wagging the dog. The cars became heavier and heavier, ever more luxurious in their appointments and their decor, and increasingly more uneconomic. Their performance in terms of miles to a gallon of gasoline became horrendous.

Nevertheless we continued to hear one of the basic articles of dogma of the free enterprise system: Customers determine the market for goods and services. But it just didn't seem to be working right in the market for automobiles.

Therefore it is a relief to report that Detroit has indeed been influenced by customer preferences and not just by what it decided Americans wanted. A change amounting to a revolution has occurred in the auto industry, caused in part by the growing competition from compact foreign cars and in part by the rising cost of gasoline.

Detroit's 1976 models, the Environmental Protection Agency reported, give 12.8 per cent better fuel mileage than 1975 models. The improvement over 1974 models is 26.6 per cent, the agency reported. BAYH, THE active presidential candidate considered best equipped to unite the party's left and center, felt constrained to vote against all anti-busing amendments. Humphrey, who may be the consensus nominee if the primaries produce no winner, not only opposed the amendments but did so with an oldfashioned HHH stemwinder on the Senate floor.

Bayh and Humphrey were defending the most unpopular and ineffective federal practice since Prohibition. But hard-boiled Democratic operatives, while conceding the biracial unpopularity of busing, believe the two Senators voted the only way possible for Democratic national leaders.

"No Democrat can hope to run for President from an anti-busing stance," says one savvy liberal Democrat who personally - and very privately — views busing as a catastrophe. Such reasoning is based on fear that black leaders and their doctrinaire white liberal allies will block an anti-busing Democrat's nomination or prevent his election. Such stubborn ideology puts the Democratic party in thrall to a black minority, even at the risk of losing the white majority to Gov. George Wallace in the primaries or the

Some Democrats are escaping thralldom. Sen. Joe Biden of Delaware, 32, is a liberal (rated 81 per cent in 1974 by Americans for Democratic Action). But Biden compared liberals to lemmings

ago decided that only a lemming could support busing. AFTER HUNDREDS of hours of conversations over the problem, Biden months ago abandoned the

liberal cliche that busing should be the intergration remedy of last resort. Rejecting arguments from civil rights lobbyist Clarence Mitchell of the NAACP, Biden determined that busing is no remedy at all. On Sept. 17, he introduced an amendment barring busing ordered by the federal administration, which passed in amended form on Sept. 25.

Biden consequently posed a painful dilemma for Bayh, who says he opposes busing and talked that way during his eyelash reelection in conservative Indiana last year.

Many labor leaders see him as the antidote to Wallace among their

anti-busing rank-and-file. But Bayh's presidential strategy is based on convincing liberals he can win. With former Sen. Fred Harris making an open-throttled left appeal with unrestrained support for busing, gay rights, abortion and the like, Bayh felt he must cast one probusing vote after another. He was thereupon picketed by anti-busers in New Albany, Ind., and forced to cancel a speech in busing-torn Louisville, Ky., but his credentials with the left stayed pure.

VA To Screen Patients For High Blood Pressure

Eight additional Veterans Central Administration Hospitals Washington are joining the agency's specialized hypertension program. They will establish model clinics to screen patients for high blood pressure and treat those who would benefit from medication, bringing the total of VA hospitals with such programs to 32.

All are expected to be in operation by January 1976. By that time the agency expects to have about 300,000 veterans in the program.

The new hospitals are in Buffalo, N.Y., Indianapolis, Ind., Minneapolis, Minn., New Orleans, San Francisco, Seattle, Wash., Topeka,

Kans., and Wood, Wis. Each of the eight hospitals has chosen, or is in the process of choosing, a physician as coordinator for its clinic, and each clinic will train two nurses as technical specialists in hypertension screening and treatment.

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
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



(a) In every case where any person desires connection with the city's water system, the city will, upon written application accompanied by proper payment, furnish to the consumer, install, inspect, and test a connection with the city water main, which shall include all pipe and fittings necessary to run a service line to the meter, which shall usually be placed within twenty-four (24) inches of the back of the curb. The maximum amount of pipe furnished by the city shall be one hundred (100) feet. The consumer shall be required to run his service line from the meter to the house.

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


