Cop, Trio Die In Shootout

HOUSTON (AP) — Four men, including one policeman, were killed today in an east side shootout between officers and three convicts who escaped Wednesday from a state prison farm

Another officer, a member of the Houston police special weapons unit, was shot in an ankle in the exchange of gunfire at a house near the Houston Ship Channel

About 100 officers had surrounded the house after the Harris County sheriff's office recieved a tip from an informant that the three convicts would be found

The shootout ended after tear gas was lobbed through windows and the house

The dead officer was identified as Richard Howard Calhoun, 35, a fiveyear veteran of the Houston police force and the father of four small children. The wounded officer was Phillip D.

Hawkins of the police SWAT or Special

Weapons and Tactical Team Of the other three bodies, Scott Ballantine of the Texas Department of Corrections identified one as that of Michael Robbins, 37, one of the three prison escapees. Robbins was under a 40-year prison sentence from Dallas for

Ballantine said the other two bodies, both found on the second floor of the house, were burned too badly for immediate identification. Police believed, however, they were the other two convicts.

"We are assuming they are the other two," said police detective David

Medical examiners later reported there was indication one of the unidentified men had been dead about a day. The cause of death was not known but police speculated the man may have been killed during an argument among the three escapees.

The other two escapees were Noel F. Smith, 29, under a 30-year sentence for murder from Houston, and Benjamin F. Windberry, 29, under a 15-year robbery sentence from Houston.

The trio escaped Wednesday afternoon from the prison system's central unit near Sugar Land, about 20 miles southwest of Houston.

A prison maintenance supervisor and a Houston construction worker were abducted by the escapees as they made their way from Sugar Land to Houston. Both hostages were released unharmed Wednesday and police believed the convicts were in hiding in Houston's

In the early phases of the two-hour showdown, seven sheriff's deputies and several policemen surrounded the house before the special weapons unit arrived and took charge.

Calhoun, an early arrival, was among the first officers to enter the house.

Ford's announcement at a Thursday night news conference that he would not attend a Republican fundraising dinner in Louisville next week marked the first time that "security reasons" officially had been cited for cancellation of one of his many trips.

However, other aspects of Ford's security arrangements have been tightened since two alleged attempts on his life in California last month.

Taking issue with Ford, Kentucky Gov. Julian Carroll, a Democrat, said Ford's decision to avoid the Louisville trip was based on the fear of political embarassment over the issue of school busing and over idenification with a local Republican candidate who Carroll said was going to

to meet with Norway's King Olav V and with Portuguese Foreign Minister Melo Antues before flying to Detroit for a regionally broadcast news conference and a GOP fund-raising dinner.

At his news conference, Ford noted that "there has the public schools," adding that "I was advised by local officials as well as others that under the current circumstances I should cancel

the trip to Louisville. The Secret Service said it had advised that large-scale, antibusing demonstrations were likely in Louisville in connection with Ford's visit, and a Louisville police spokesman said, "It was agreed it could be a potentially dangerous situation."





WASHINGTON (AP) -Israel today signed the final with Egypt. document of the Israeli-Egyptian Sinai accord, just seven hours after the Senate approved a provision of the pact that calls for 200 American technicians to

monitor the peace. Israel's formal approval, which was delayed pending final congressional approval of the monitorship, clears the way for a pullback of Israeli troops in the Sinai Desert and the return of captured Abu Rudeis oilfields to Egypt.

The Senate approved the use of U.S. civilians in the Sinai on a vote of 70 to 18. The House approved the the arrangement 341 to 69 on lednesday.

The civilian technicians will be stationed between Israeli and Egyptian forces in a demilitarized buffer

President Ford, who had sought approval of the peace pact provision last week, was expected to act quickly to establish the small force at electronic monitoring

stations in the buffer zone. Israel's signature came today in Jeruselum. The pact was initialed by Israel and Egypt on Sept. 1. Egypt fully signed the pact on Sept. 22, but Israel refused to sign it until after Congress had

Both Israel and Egypt conditioned their pact on approval by Congress of the use of Americans to monitor movements to both sides and to the 5,000-man United Nations peacekeeping force stationed there.

Final congressional action also cleared the way for signing of four additional United States agreements,

three with Israel and one

They pledge continued U.S. diplomatic efforts to settle Middle East differences.

Subject to congressional appropriations, the United States also promised consideration of stepped up military and economic aid to Israel, economic aid to Egypt and aid to help Israel obtain oil in the event of an Arab boycott after the return of the Abu Rudeis oil field to

Senate backers of the Sinai resolution hailed its passage as the opening of the road to peace in the Middle East.

Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., was among those with misgivings about the first American involvement in the Middle East.

Mansfield said it increases chances for U.S. involvement in Middle East fighting, should it occur again, and the danger of confrontation with the Soviet

ween Lebanese Christians and Moslems abated at dawn today under a Syrian-sponsored cease-fire personally supervised by Palestinian guerrilla leader Yasir Arafat. Premier Rashid Karami did not announce what new security measures were agreed to by himself, Arafat and Syrian President Hafez Assad. But he returned from Damascus Thursday saying "the worst is over."

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) - Latin refugees holding five hostages and demanding a home in another country barricaded themselves in a United Nations office for a second night as a U.N. official expressed hope for a solution sometime today. "We will stay here a month if necessary," a tired-sounding spokesman for the refugees said by telephone. "If authorities move against us we will take violent action."

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford and the Democratic-controlled Congress appear headed for a politically crucial showdown later this year over Ford's insistance that any tax cut be tied to a ceiling on next year's federal spending. Both sides see themselves as the winners. Democratic strategists say privately they are convinced they will either get credit for a tax cut, or be able to blame President Ford for blocking it. The President claims the voters favor his package approach.

The New York state legislature agreed recently to loan NYC \$2.3 billion, but not without strings. As a condition of the loan, the state ordered that the budgetary power of the city be taken over by a sevenmember board. The city retains a pipeline into the board sessions, however, because Mayor Beame is to be a member of it. The other trustees are appointed by Gov. Hugh Carey.

The city has a \$3.3 billion deficit. The banks which picked up the municipality's paper are in the deep fry because they held hundreds of millions of dollars in bonds and were faced with huge losses.

Up until recently, no one had ever considered the city as a bankruptcy possibility, which shows one how indifferent some elective officials can become to a city's real needs.

Although it is not empowered to raise its own debt limit when it sees the need, the City of New York obviously has been taking lessons from Congress and the federal government — that of operating deep in the red.





Home Insurance Three new confirmed Rises By 8.3 Pct.

Homeowners insurance rates will increase by a statewide average of 8.3 per cent on Feb. 16, but this is less than the insurance industry wanted.

The State Board of costs 14 per cent. Insurance issued the new rates Thursday. Fire insurance rates on

homes will increase an average of 7.9 per cent for one-year policies and 14 per cent on threeyear policies. The 8.3 per cent average statewide increase on homeowners policies will be the same for both one-year and three-year policies.

Insurance companies had requested a 13.8 per cent homeowners increase for one-year policies and 21.8 per cent on coverage written for three years.

Rates for homeowners policies and extended coverage—which pays for damage resulting from storms, hail, riots and out-ofcontrol vehicles-vary

among the three territories. Average homeowners increases, by territory, for both one-year and three-year

policies, are: Seacoast 7.6 per cent. -Central 7.6 per cent. -North-Northwest 12 per

Extended coverage rates on homes will rise 12.7 per cent in the Seacoast Territory, which includes Houston, for a oneyear policy and 19 per cent on threeyear coverage. They will increase 6.4 and 12.4 per cent, respectively, in the Central Territory, which includes Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Austin and El Paso. The increases will be 26.5 per cent for a oneyear policy and 33.6 per cent for three-year coverage on dwellings in the North-Northwest Territory.

Board chairman Joe Christie said existing rates, which were set Jan. 20, were inadequate even though they were 19.3 per cent higher than the year before for homeowners coverage.

"Inadequate rates were beginning to bring about pressures that could have contributed to a major shortage of insurance available to the public, and I think the board's action will head off that possibility with a minimum of financial strain to the consumer,"





school, such as paper and

pencils. "Fees charged to buy such materials as workbooks, etc., are covered under the ruling. Fees for typing, labs, etc., are also covered by the ruling," Brockette said.

He said rentals may not be charged for band uniforms, and school districts must provide materials 'necessary for the student to acquire basic skills in vocational education courses.'

"However, the school district may allow a student, at his option, to furnish costlier or different vocational materials for approved projects undertaken for credit in such courses without incurring any obligation to pay for such materials, so long as the materials and the projects created from them remain the property of the

In some districts the question arose whether the ban on fees meant students had to be admitted free of

charge to athletic events. 'A school district may charge nonparticipating students admission to extracurricular activities where attendance is voluntary," Brockette an-

swered. . While no fee may be charged for driver education during a pupil's normal three quarters of attendance, districts may collect such fees from pupils who take driver training in a fourth quarter. Tuition already is authorized by law for pupils attending school in a fourth quarter.

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The attorney general cannot enforce his legal opinions, which are considered to be the law on a matter until the courts rule otherwise. Brockette, however, said in an interview Thursday his agency can withhold accreditation from a school that does not comply or can even hold back state funds if an audit shows a district continued to charge the pupil fees.



Sec. 29-1. Water connections.

(a) In every case where any person desires connection with the city's water system, the city will, upon written application accompanied by proper payment, furnish to the consumer, install, inspect, and test a connection with the city water main, which shall include all pipe and fittings necessary to run a service line to the meter, which shall usually be placed within twenty-four (24) Inches of the back of the curb. The maximum amount of pipe furnished by the city shall be one hundred (100) feet. The consumer shall be required to run his service line from the meter to the house.

(b) The fee for water connections will be as follows: (1) For a 34" tap, \$135.00. (2) For a 1" tap, \$285.00. (3) For a 2" tap, \$525.00.

(c) The rates in Subsection (b) of this Section would be adjusted annually or as necessary. Such adjustments would be required on cost plus 20 per cent of the average expenditures for each tap.

(d) No person other than properly authorized agents of the water department shall be permitted to tap or make connection with the main or distributing pipes of the water works system or private supply lines.

No person shall tap, connect to, or otherwise extend a sewer line located within the public right-of-way or in an easement held by the city, or tap or connect to any sewer line which is owned or maintained by the city, without first having secured a sewer tap permit. Any person desiring service connection to the city sewer system shall make application for a permit at the office of the plumbing inspector. The fee for the sewer tap and permit shall be one hundred and thirty dollars (\$130.00) and shall include the following:

(1) The city forces will determine the location and grade of existing sewer mains and will decide if sewer service can be made available.

(2) The city forces will make the tap to the sewer main, furnishing all necessary labor and equipment.

(3) The city forces will construct the sewer service line from the sewer main to the applicant's closest property line. This sewer line will be constructed according to the line and grade as established and approved by the department of public works.

The provisions of this section shall be applicable only where sewer service is available from existing sewermains immediately adjacent to the property to be served. All other applications for sewer service shall be considered as sewer line extension policies set forth in this chapter.

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BEEN DEAD TWO WEEKS'

Pair Want Son To Die Mercifully

ELYRIA, Ohio (AP) -The parents of a 17-year-old boy who has been in a coma for two weeks say they want their son to die "mercifully," but hospital officials refuse to disconnect his life-support

Mr. and Mrs. Richard K. Carmen of Wellington have asked Elyria Memorial Hospital to take their son, Randal, off a respirator

which is keeping him alive.

But James C. Brown,
hospital administrator, said hospital policy is that "we do everything in our power to maintain lifesaving procedures regardless of the condition of the patient."
He said the hospital will

try to keep the boy alive until all vital signs have disappeared. "He's dead," the youth's father said. "He's been dead

for two weeks." The boy was injured during a football game in a friend's yard on Sept. 21. He finished the game but complained of a headache when he returned home, his

parents said. He lapsed into a coma while X-rays were being

Besides the respirator, the youth is being kept alive by a machine that controls his

temperature and tubes that pump food into his body.

"We want legislation to make a decision on what constitutes death," Carmen said. "To me, if the brain is gone, that is death."

Carmen said he and his wife "talked to a lot of preachers and prayed a lot... I don't think parents should have to go through

The Carmen case is similiar to that of Karen A. Quinlan, 21, who has been in a coma for five months in a Denville, N.J., hospital. Her parents have asked the hospital to let her die, but the state has raised legal objections.

The medical and legal communities have been embroiled for several years in a controversy over when death occurs. Death is generally considered to occur when the heart stops beating, but there has been a growing movement toward redefining death as when brain activity ceases, despite a continuing heart-

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


