More Thorny Problems

Texas higher education is losing the service of a conscientious and capable servant in the person of Dr. Bevington Reed. He has resigned effective Jan. 1 as commissioner for the Texas board for the coordinating

board of Texas Colleges and Universities.

A native of West Texas (Cisco,) Dr. Reed had a fine record of service in San Angelo College (now Angelo State) and Sul Ross University. When Dr. Jack Williams became president at Texas A&M University in 1968, Dr. Reed was summoned from academic nship in the Midwest to become the commissioner.

Although the big brothers of the system often sought to ignore the coordinating board, Dr. Reed is due much of the credit for patient, quiet action which gradually

helped the board assert its perogatives.

Because he succeeded, there is some head-knocking ahead. One is the possibility the coordinating board will have the final say on all building by the statesupported institutions which goes against the grain of many administrators and particularly the major universities. Equally thorny is the matter of offering off-campus courses. Once upon a time, gaining credit off-campus was grudgingly related to a few correspondence courses, provided certain on-campus

tenure requirements were met before degrees were granted.

Now all that has changed. Senior institutions have proposed 210 lower division freshman-sophomore courses at 49 off-campus locations, and 1,510 upper-level or graduate courses at 177 locations. Just as the older procedure was foolishly restrictive so is the recent proliferation foolishly competitive.

Two-year colleges, such as our own Howard College, could be hurt by an unbridled expansion of this type of instruction, and upper-level universities such as the University of Texas, Permian Basin are being short circuited. Obviously, there needs to be some real coordination in this respect to protect both the institutions and the individuals who will benefit by this off campus services.

Harsh, Practical Way

One of the hard, but often soul-wrenching decisions of life is how to deal with terrorists who hold hostages. And yet, in the end, there is really but one way, as

harsh and cruel as it may seem. That is not to give in.

The British had been holding the vise on IRA suspects holed up in an London apartment suspected also of being killers of the Briton who offered a huge reward for the perpetrators of terror bombings in London. To demands they be furnished safe passage on an airplane back to Northern Irland, English authorities said a firm but polite no and kept an un-

ostentatious pressure on them. At the end of last week the gunmen surrendered, freeing the hostages.

Much the same is being done in and near Amsterdam

where Molucca nationalists, clamoring for in-dependence, seized hostages in a consulate and on a railway passenger train. Of course, it is to be hoped that the results will be the same, but even if not, the course is right. Terrorists and kidnappers will continue this reprehensible pattern of behavior just so long as they think the cowardly process of preying on other human lives will work.

DEAR MR. GRAHAM: I do not have many sins, and when I pray I blame myself for my sins and do not ask God for forgiveness. What do you think about this? — E.S.

DEAR E.S.: An unusual letter like this should spark interest, but I'm

Stronger Than Ever

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. - Instead of comfort, there is only anguish here for Democrats trying to per-suade themselves that Gov. George Wallace is slipping in his old bluecollar power center of an early primary state he must win.

WALLACE SLIPPAGE may be occurring elsewhere, as many Democratic politicians claim, but not here. Our house-to-house in-terviews of 50 registered voters in a Jacksonville working-class section actually show Wallace slightly stronger at this early stage in the Democratic primary campaign than he was on primary election day four years ago. Nor has his paralysis resulting from the 1972 assassination attempt apparently hurt him here.

unmistakable conclusion: former Gov. Jimmy Carter of Georgia, his principal challenger here, has an uphill climb in making good his predictions of defeating Wallace in the Florida primary

FIFTY-SEVEN per cent of the voters we interviewed who voted in the 1972 primary said they voted for Wallace (who ended up far ahead of a crowded field with 42 per cent of the statewide vote(. These voters now expect to vote 62 per cent for Wallace in 1976 — an actual gain over his phenomenal showing four years ago.

That gain comes despite switches of 8 of the 1972 Wallace voters, either to "don't know" or to one of the other two active candidates - Carter and Sen. Henry Jackson of Washington.

THIS DECLINE is more than matched by Wallace gains among voters too young to vote four years ago or outright switchers. "He's changed," a retired plumber told us. 'He's not so radical as he used to be on race, and I'm going to back him this time.

Armed with a questionnaire prepared by Pat Caddell's Cambridge Survey Research and with the help of Caddell poll taker Stuart Robinson, we sampled two Wallace strongholds in lower-income, bluecollar precincts in Jacksonville's northern suburbs, an area where

Wallace was an overwhelming winner in 1972. We found Wallace strength not only still intact but buttressed by an extraordinary intensity no other politician in this country can claim.

OF THE 26 voters who now say they intend to vote for Wallace next
March, 20 told us they feel "very
strongly" in his favor, 6 "somewhat
strongly." Not one of the 26 was equivocal.

By contrast, Carter's 11

prospective voters broke down thisk way: 5 "very strongly," 4 "somewhat strongly" and 2 "not strongly at all." Running far behind was Jackson, with 5 voters, 2 of whom felt "somewhat strongly" and 3 "not strongly at all." The

remaining 8 voters we interviewed were undecided.

THIS INTENSITY factor for Wallace measured high in every question we asked. Only 6 voters disagreed with the statement that "Wallace really cares about people like me"; only 4 disagreed that Wallace "is one of the few politicians who really isn't afraid to say what he

Most significant in measuring the all-important intensity factor for Wallace were replies of voters pressed hard to choose between backing him to "protest the way things are going" or because "Wallace has the ability to solve the complex questions." Wallace the problem-solver outdid the protest vote by better than two-to-one; only 8 of the 50 voters said they "would not vote for Wallace under any circumstances."

WALLACE RAN far ahead of President Ford, Gov. Reubin Askew of Florida, Ronald Reagan, Jackson and Carter, in terms of th voter's "favorable" or unfavorable." opinions. Wallace received only 13 unfavorable" opinions, fewer even than Florida's highly popular Askew. Although the large new factor here since the 1972 primary is Wallace's paralysis, not one of the 8 voters who have switched away from Wallace gave health as the

While these expressions of the spirit are as observable as they are expectable, you might not realize that in more subtle ways Santa Claus also works his magic on the business world.

In Wall Street, for instance, they are talking up the year-end rally as if it was just another of the gifts in Santa's bag. The spirit of the season prevails, so why

shouldn't stocks benefit? The truth is that there

often is a year-end rally, for a variety of reasons, in-cluding the rearranging of portfolios for tax reasons. But like Santa himself, is the rally all it's publicized to be? The Stock Trader's

Almanac says no, it isn't an exaggeration, but perhaps you should be the judge of that. In only three or four years in the past two decades has it failed to materialize, but that's not the whole

Says the Almanac: "The rally occurs within the last four days of the year and the first two in January and is good for an average 1.72 per

A 1.72 per cent gain? What

does that amount to? The answer: a little bit more than two points a day on the Dow Jones industrial average, or a gain that might go almost unnoticed these

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What can you tell me about femoral hernia? I've been told I have one. It seems to have diminished as time has passed. Is this a condition that demands surgery? — Mrs. R. M.

Because the term hernia is a source of some misunderstanding, let's define it. It is an abnormal protrusion of part of an organ through the walls of a compartment of the body that is supposed to contain it. Usually a weakening in the wall muscles allows the

protrusion. A femoral hernia involves the femoral canal, a passageway that carries the large femoral artery and associated nerves downward to the thigh, beginning just below the groin on the upper, inner sides of the thighs. A weakening in the canal allows a portion of the lower intestine to push through, creating a bulge just below the groin.

They used to tell us that one of the reasons to do away with the House Committee on Internal Security was that the Senate had a perfectly good Committee on Internal Security of its own, so why the duplication? After a good many years, the critics won that battle. And now, without anybody much really noticing, they may be about to win the battle to eliminate the last significant legislative watchdog over internal security, unless the fall Senate wakes up. At this writing, the budget of the Senate subcommittee has been cut in half, from \$36,000 a month to less than \$20,000, which is barely enough to pay the overhead, and not enough to permit it to hold its vital hearings. This economy was effected at a desultory meeting of the Senate on a sleepy Saturday in late July, with only a dozen members of the floor.

THERE ARE, here and there in America, citizens who are upset by the creeping indifference to the continuing and awesomely complex question of internal security. One of them wrote to one of the senators who had participated in the budgetslashing. Now Sen. Mark Hatfield of Oregon

is among the most conscientious men in the Senate. His instincts are adamantly civilized, whatever one feels about the nostrums that attract him. Out of his office went a letter to one correspondent disparaging the work of the Committee in language utterly unrelated to reality. The senator's letter said that the Senate committee's work had reduced to the staff's "drawing, its, own

THE SENATOR, suggesting the Stakhanovite schedules of other senate committees between 1970 and 1975, drew an invidious comparison. 'During this same period of time, which covers six years, this sub-

It is called 'Subcommittee to Investigate the Administration of the Internal Security Act and Other Internal Security Laws of the Committee on the Judiciary."

A CONGRESS THAT has suddenly become so alert to investigating the conduct of the executive agencies should not find this the appropriate moment to be different to the administration of its own laws. Let alone to the necessity of new laws. 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
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

SAN DIEGO (AP) - Quarterback Joe Namath of the New York Jets was punished from starting against the San Diego Chargers for missing a weekend curfew. But his belated entrance in the second quarter entry

did little to affect the final outcome of the nationally televised contest.

After dropping 11 National Football League games in a row, the Chargers won their second straight Monday night, beating the Jets 24-16.

Running backs Rickey Young, Tony Baker and Bo Matthews each scored on short touchdown runs and Young rushed for 111 yards in 21 carries, his second consecutive 100-yard game.

Steve Davis and John Riggins scored on one-yard plunges for the Jets and Riggins moved to within 67

yards of a 1,000-yard season.

But all that was overshadowed by the 20-minute, 29-

second absence of Broadway Joe, which was Coach Ken Shipp's way of punishing Namath for staying out past the 11 p.m. Sunday curfew.

A crowd of 52,446 San Diego fans booed bitterly when young J.J. Jones opened at quarterback instead of Namath. Jones completed only one of five passes for 13 young J.D. yards and was intercepted once before Namath finally made his appearance with 9:31 left in the second

Namath took the field to a thunderous ovation, but the Jets were already behind 7-3. They never caught

Afterward, a contrite, disheartened Namath took the blame for what had happened.

"It's no one's fault but my own," he said. Namath completed 15 of 29 passes for 181 yards, but was outshone by San Diego quarterbacks Dan Fouts and Jesse Freitas, who combined for eight completions in 16 tries for 109 yards and kept scoring drives alive with clutch passes.

The Chargers scored on the first possession of the game, driving 68 yards in eight plays. Fouts scrambled for 20 yards, then hit wide receiver Gary Garrison for 23 yards to the Jets four yard-line, from where Baker

ran it in on the next play.

After Pat Leahy kicked a 20-yard field goal for New York, Godwin Turk was penalized for running into Charger punter Dennis Partee, giving San Diego the

Fouts hit Pat Curran on a 33-yard passing play, then hooked up with Garrison for 12 more. A nine-yard Baker run put the ball on the Jets two, from where Young dived over the middle for a score to give the Chargers a 14-3 lead at halftime.

Namath led the Jets back in the third quarter, setting up Davis' scoring dive with passes of 29 yards to Carl Garrett and 21 and 16 yards to Jerome Barkum.

But after Fouts went out with a sprained neck in the third quarter, Freitas came in to guide the Chargers to their final 10 points of the game.


