## BETTER SCHOOL CAMPAIGN

For the Information of the Business Men of Texas

On November 2nd, there will be passed upon at the polls, the Better School Amendment to the State Constitution, a measure which will permit each school district to vote for its schools such support as it may deem necessary.

This privilege is now enjoyed by the large cities incorporated under the general law, but is denied the country districts and to those of small towns. It is the opinion of authorities on education that State and local support of schools should be on a fifty, fifty basis—that local support should equal that provided by the State. In rural and village districts, this can never be done under the present constitution. While Texas ranks tenth in State support of schools, our rank in local support is fourth. Shall this continue? Shall the productive capacity of Texas be lessened and the business enterprise of the next generation be run by better educated leaders from without the State, while our children do the menial and the unskilled labor?

The history of Mexico, of Russia, and of every other uneducated, or poorly educated nation or state, gives evidence that a people without education, soon lose possession of their most precious natural resources, to better educated and more skilled leaders from without.

The statistics of wealth shows that productive capacity rises and falls directly with the increase or decrease of education and training in a state or nation. England produced 3.6 times as much per capita per year as did Russia; she has had more than three times as much education. It is no accident that Massachusetts long produced 2.2 times as much wealth per capita as did Tennessee—she had 2.3 times as much education.

Aside from State pride, aside from any moral, religious or humanitarian considerations, on the purely commercial basis, the business men of Texas should support and work for this amendment. The problem of keeping workers on the farm is a business, an economic problem. Men able to leave the farm will not remain where they cannot educate their children. Texas must take the good schools to the country, if agriculture is not to suffer disaster. Our State is sixty-nine per cent rural. Every enterprise in Texas is now handicapped by lack of educated and skilled workers—farms, factories, mines, commercial enterprises, chemical and physical industries. There is no better way to build up any community than to let it be known as a place where good schools are provided. Many towns of our State are ambitious and eager to provide the best school facilities for their children, but progress is impossible for them because of constitutional restrictions.

We are discussing a serious situation, not a theory. Last session more than fifty thousand Texas children did not attend school, because no teacher for them could be found. Four hundred thousand children were taught by mere boys and girls whose preparation was not beyond that of the eighth grade, and who were totally inexperienced. Many teachers with no certificates, were employed, in violation of the law.

The four million dollar appropriation to increase teachers' salaries is a temporary stop gap, made to tide over the present session until this amendment can be passed and become effective. If the amendment fails, the schools have no recourse. Another year will probably not find a convenient surplus in the state treasury. Rather than see the schools closed, Texas, like California will be compelled to resort to increased corporation and inheritance taxes to provide the necessary reve-

every Texan should possess, we then should put it within their power to support their own schools. Many districts last year provided for the school term through private subscription; many are ready and eager to give their children the best teachers obtainable. Shall these be denied this privilege? The amendment does not raise taxes—it is a local option measure, permitting to each district local self government in this respect. Half of the states of the union have no restrictions as to what a district may vote for school purposes. In other states the limit varies from fifty cents to two dollars and fifty cents. Only two states—Texas and Virginia—have the fifty cent limit. Texas is now ranked as thirty-ninth in education. Shall we remain satisfied with this rating?

As a far sighted, influential business man who knows what dividends and investment in education pays, we beg you to put your influence behind the amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution. Will you not only go to the polls and vote for this amendment, but urge your business associates, neighbors and friends to do likewise.

## OLD TERRY DOES FINE AT PANHANDLE PLAINS FAIR

She Receives First County Prize of \$150.00 and Attracts Lots of Attention From Crowds

Owing to the large volume of job work just at this time of year, it is hard for an editor to get off to the fairs in neighboring counties, much less the State Fairs, and of course lots of the information, in fact practically all of it is therefore second hand.

We are told that the attendance was beyond the measure expected by the most optimistic of the promoters of the Panhandle and South Plains fair, that there was much fine exhibits of almost everything imaginable, and that the judges seemed to be competent parties and willing to follow the rules and do the right thing. It is said that the parade the first day was a thing of beauty and a joy forever.

For the rest we will give some extracts clipped from two of our popular dailies:

### Last Day of Lubbock Fair Huge Success.

Lubbock, Sept. 25.—The closing day of the South Plains Fair was the complete success of the first two days in spite of the continued high winds that have worried the visitors somewhat for the entire three days. Friday's attendance broke the record of the first day by fifty percent and Saturday surpassed Friday in every respect.

Saturday was South Plains county day and hat bands were struck for the counties having displays at the first fair for all visiting representatives of the counties, and considerably more than 150 were given out at the various booths. Perhaps the greatest single interest in this fair has been that of the county exhibits and the closest single competition now.

A community values what it works

for, and takes in it a local pride. If we are to develop in the citizens of Texas the regard for education that for a place in the premium money was between two counties for the first place and the \$150 premium that went with the place.

Terry county won over Lynn county by the small margin of 25 points out of a total possible score of 4000 points. All the counties report a fixed determination to win the first place next year. The arrangements made by the South Plains Fair Association for the South Plains counties to show here are based upon same score card used at the Dallas Fair. The practice and experience to be had from one practice arrangement of the exhibition is expected to greatly improve the quality of the exhibit at Dallas by allowing them to fill in the possible weak spots in their display while they are close to home and to profit by their mistakes in the first showing, it is pointed out.—Amarillo Daily News.

### Terry County Prize Winner at Lubbock

Lubbock, Texas, Sept. 24.—The Terry County exhibit, arranged to prove that the high cost of living is a myth in Terry county, took the first premium at the Panhandle South Plains fair being held here. Awards were made this morning and the judging of the individual farm and community exhibits is now under way.

The Terry County exhibit took the first premium with a margin of 24 points, judged on the basis of the points established at the State Fair of Texas. All of the staple crops of the Panhandle and Plains country were represented in the Terry County exhibit, but the feature of it was the showing of garden and truck crops.

Melons took up a large portion of the Terry County booth. A large

## SANITORIUM REPORTS ON CONDITION OF EX-PATIENTS

Sanitorium, Texas, Sept. 23.—The State Tuberculosis Sanitorium in its biennial report issued September 1st, gives out some interesting figures on its ex-patients. 354, or 37 1/2 per cent of the ex-patients are working at some gainful occupation earning salaries ranging from five hundred dollars per year up to fifteen thousand. Two patients reported that their earnings amounted to more than eight thousand per annum, two reported ten thousand or more, and one his earning to be \$15,000.00. 303 patients had died, 323 were classed as "well" 354 were chronically ill, 141 or 12 1/2 per cent were not heard from, and three were non-tuberculous.

Of the 303 that died, 211 died from tuberculosis, forty-five died of acute conditions, and forty-seven died of causes unknown.

Of the different races 1046 patients classed themselves as "American", thirty-five German, ten as Irish, eight as Jewish, nine as Swedish, six as French, the balance being divided among Mexicans, Italians, Greek, Belgians, Austrians and Poles.

Vocationally, thirty eight were office workers, fifty-five were farmers, 174 housewives, 42 salesmen, 26 laborers, 27 nurses, 12 were students. The balance were working at almost every other known occupation.

Men predominated over women among the "graduates" of the institution 637 being males while there were only 492 females.

The total earnings of ex-patients amounted to \$385,000.00 during the fiscal year ending September 1st, 1920. The amount expended by the Sanitorium for maintenance and salaries during the same period was approximately \$200,000.00.

### Extinction of Quail is Feared

Seagraves:—The extinction of the quail is forecast if sportsmen and hunters do not stop for a year or two the wholesale slaughter of the valuable birds, says J. E. Farrow.

During the severe drouth of 1917-18 the quails were almost totally destroyed. Today in parts of this section one sees a covey or so of them, but the ambitious hunter is on the trail.

The farmers of West Texas have never had a greater or more faithful friend than the quail. It destroys many insects and larvae, and is one of the indirect producers of the land. There should be a closed season for two years on these birds.

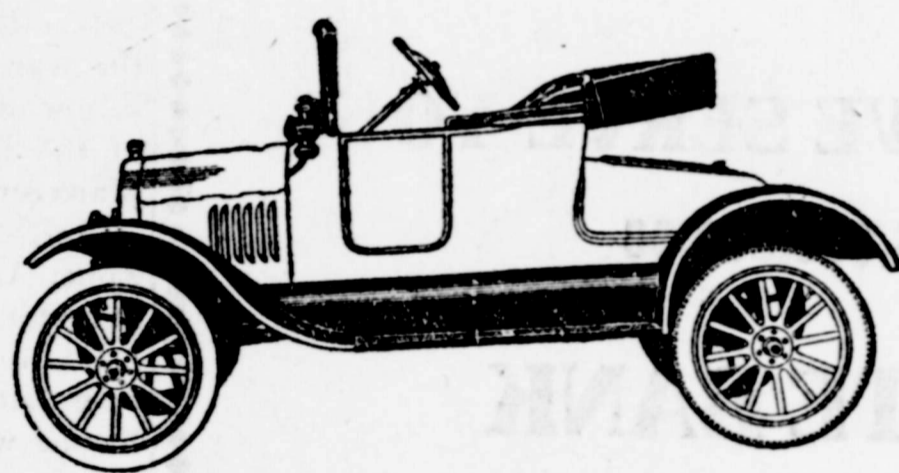

### THE McSWINEY CASE
