BROWNFIELD HAS LIVE COMMERCIAL ORGANIZATION

The meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Monday night was well attended considering that no more than did know of the meeting, and the Chamber is now getting itself in shape to do some real and lasting good for the old town, and the live wires at the back of the movement have set a high nitch to reach in progress and development, but not the least too high if each and every citizen of the town will just put a strong shoulder to the wheel and help shove it along.

The following was the order of business for the evening.

Judge Neill was elected temporary chairman, as Judge Graves was out of town.

After some discussion, the membership fee was placed at \$2.00 per annum, and a strong effort will be made to induce every citizen of the town to become a member.

A strong effort is going to be made to get the schedule changed on the south bound, and Ropes, Meadow, and Seagraves, together with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will be asked to help. As it is now, the train for this place and the other towns mentioned above, leaves Lubbock just a bare hour before the passenger train from Sweetwater and Fort Worth, thus throwing us practically 24 hours behind with lots of important mails that could be answered and returned next day. Aside from this, it delays passengers bound for points on this line 24 hours, and needless to say is both exasperating and inconvenient. The committee on this item were, Dr. W. N. Lemmon, M. L. Copeland and Raymond Barrier.

The goal for growth for the town by 1922 was 1000 more people than is here now, and to start the matter right several hundred dollars were subscribed at the meeting as a starter toward a building and loan association. It is the aim of the as-

sociation to put enough in it to build at least one house at a time, and when it is sold, use the money immediately in the construction of another, and so on, but to see that all who want to come to Brownfield shall have a house to live in. Messrs. H. H. Copeland, John B. King and Tom May were put on this committee.

The committee to lead the drive for membership consisted of the following hustlers: Dr. W. N. Lemmon, A. W. Endersen and R. Barrier.

Among the other things taken up at this meeting was the question of a warehouse for cotton, wholesale grocery; road and street work. The latter item (road work) was discussed at some length, and the Chamber will work in conjunction with the Commissioners to see that a good clay road is built west, and to get the three mile gap connected near Lou, so those folks can get to this place more readily.

Among the other things that will be sought for the city by the business men for the immediate future, will be a Sales and Tradesday, Water Works, Ice and Electric Light Plant, and a good hotel.

Holding cotton was discussed and agreed that it is the thing to do just now. Committees were appointed on income tax, mail and schools.

The Secretary was authorized to draw on Treasury for expense account.

The next meeting was called for next Tuesday night at which time every citizen that has the welfare of the town and county at heart are expected to lend their presence.

LOCATING BROWNFIELD

Probably half our readers do not know where Brownfield is—they do not even know where Terry county is—but that's W. A. Shepherd's old home, and as soon as he received a copy of his old "home paper," he made a bee line to the San Marcus Times, and read us off a list of the winnings at his county fair. There was much to enthuse over and much to brag about; but what got us was that large kershaw that looked like the letter "U" on which was printed (whether by nature or man, the cute writer did not recite) the legend, "Terry County, where they make both ends meet. The mere fact that they had a county fair is enough to put Terry county on the map any time; and we thank Mr. Shepherd for being so kind as to come around and show us where the place was.—San Marcus Times.

Once a Terryite, always a Terryite. That accounts for Mr. Shepherd's enthusiasm. When this editor arrived in Brownfield eleven years ago last January, overland from Big Springs, (100 miles away, the closest railroad point then), Mr. Shepherd was our Tax-Assessor, and regarded as one of our best farmers, and would be here today if his wife could live in a 3000 feet altitude. Put to tell the Times a little about old Terry. She is one of the counties of the South Plains section that made more than fifty percent gain in population in each of the last two decades. In fact in 1900 she had 47 people; 1910 1490, and in 1920, 2300 people. Also probably the Times knows that cotton and corn are the two principal crops of this grand old Lone Star State, and if it had been keeping close tab on the greatest State Fair in the World, it would have noticed last year that Terry county took first prize on both corn and cotton at the Dallas Fair, and has carried the corn honors for a number of years. That it shipped 160 cars of corn to east Texas and the old Southern States last year,

Tahoka Farmer Shot and Killed; Wife is Arrested

Tahoka, Oct. 9th.—B. W. Turner, 55, a farmer living near Wilson, Lynn county, was shot and killed late yesterday. His wife was arrested in connection with the shooting.

Mrs. Turner and a sister-in-law had just returned from a visit in Amarillo. Turner had been away and upon his arrival home found the house locked, whereupon he proceeded to force his way inside. It was then that the fatal shooting occurred. The women were brought to Tahoka by officers and an examining trial will be held before District Attorney, Gordon B. McGuire.

It is claimed that the woman fired believing that an intruder was attempting to force his way into the house.


