



But for the 400,000 scholastics of West Texas the State of Texas maintains no A. & M. College. Query! How much more taxes do the parents of the 400,000 school children of West Texas pay than do the parents of the 226,000 negro children of Texas? Unfortunately it is practically impossible to secure statistics showing the comparisons as above. The Prairie View College refused to furnish this association with any data and would not answer letters sent them.-West Texas Today.






