KATY MAY EXTEND WEST

Samford, Texas, Oct. 29th.—It is reported in high Katy railroad circles here that that line is planning an extension of the Texas Central from Rotan, the present terminus, to Roswell, N. M., through the towns of Snyder, Gail, Lamesa, Seminole or Seagraves and Lovington, N. M.

The proposed line will open up a territory fertile as any in the nation, and give a direct haul of the immense products of the Pecos Valley and West Texas, to the big markets, including Fort Worth.

With the completion of the proposed Fort Worth and Northwestern railroad from Fort Worth to Stamford, Fort Worth people would have a direct "shoot" to Roswell, and important New Mexico points.

It would also provide a new jobbing center for the rapidly expanding interests of the Panther City.

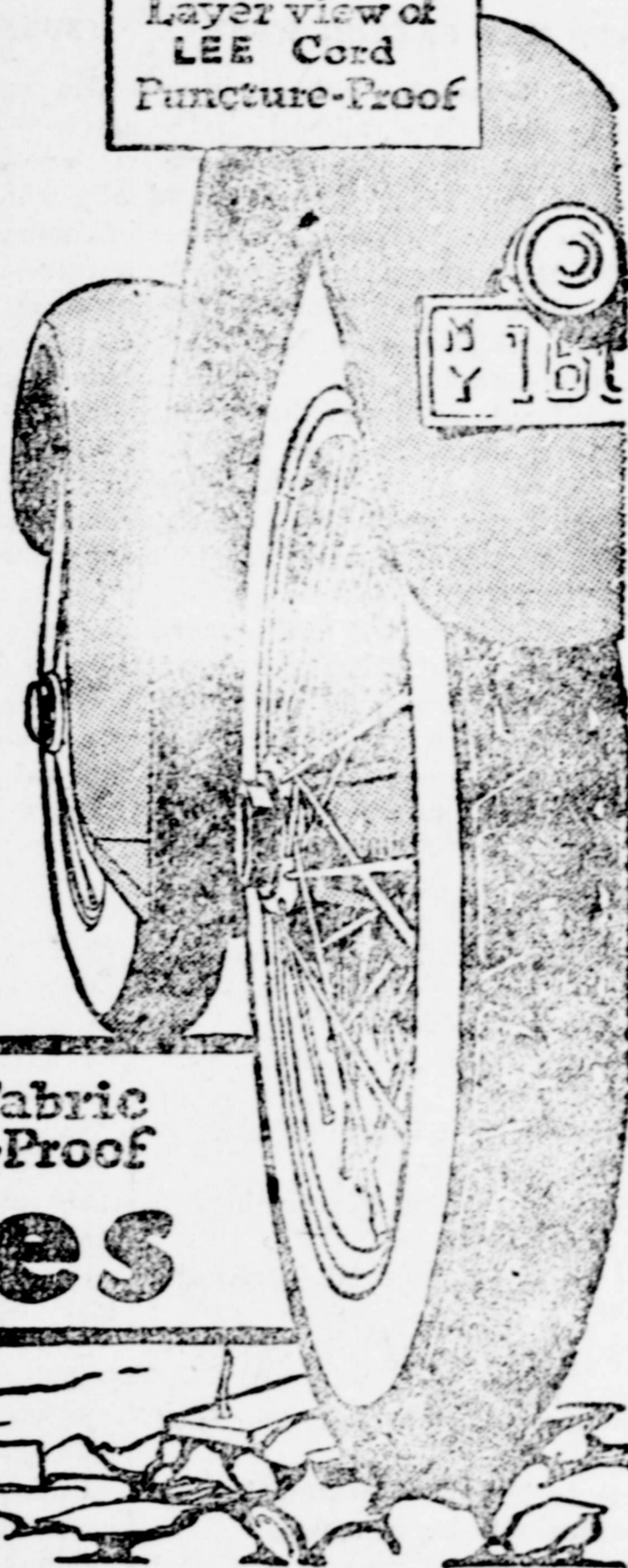

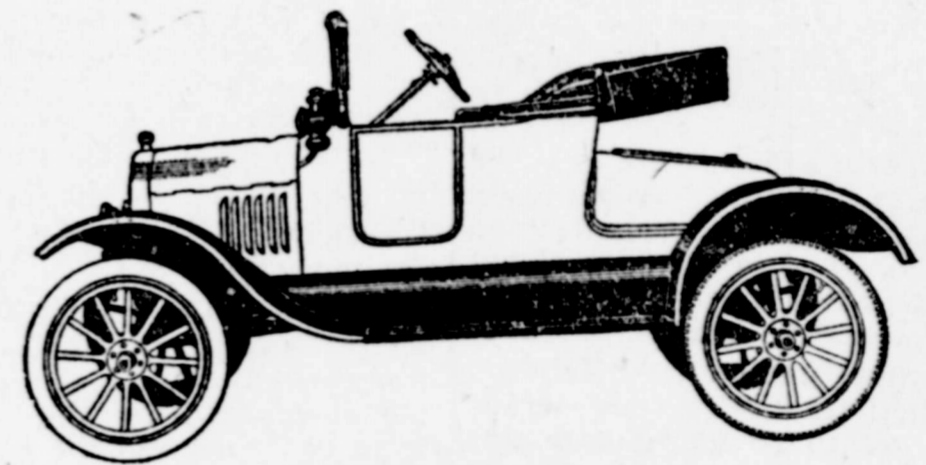

ORDINANCES

Of the Town of Brownfield, Texas
Effective November 10th, 1920

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council, of the Town of Brownfield, Texas, That from and after November 10th, 1920, all horses, mules, Jacks, Jennets, cattle, sheep, goats and hogs are prohibited from running at large within the corporate limits of the Town of Brownfield, Texas. It is hereby made the duty of the Town Marshall and he is hereby authorized to impound such animals so found running at large, and to feed and water same until called for by the owner, or his agent, and deliver same to him upon paying \$1.00 per head, per day or part of day, together with the cost of such feed, not to exceed \$1.00 per day. Provided that if such animal is not claimed by some one, or the above charges are not paid within ten days of such impounding, then the Marshall shall advertise same for sale, at Public Auction for cash, by giving ten days notice, by posting three notices at three public places in town, and if not claimed and paid for by the day of the sale, to sell same, and after paying the sums above stated, feed bills and cost of sale, deposit the remainder of the sales, if any, with the Town Secretary, who shall refund the remainder of the proceeds to the person establishing by competent proof that he is entitled to receive same.

If any person shall willfully or negligently turn loose, cause or permit any such animals to be turned loose with the corporate limits of said town, or cause it to be driven, or permit it to wander into the town limits, shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance and upon conviction fined in the sum of not less than \$5.00 or more than \$25.00, and each separate animal, day or instance, shall be a separate offense.

Providing herein is not intended to prevent or interfere with persons driving such animals into or through town for shipping purposes, or removing same from one place to another, providing the stock are carefully herded, guarded and driven.

That from and after November the 10th, 1920, it shall be unlawful for any person to drive any Truck, Automobile, Motorcycle or any other motor power vehicle, on any street, alley, or across any lot or block in the corporate limits of the Town of Brownfield, at a greater rate of speed than 12 miles per hour. Any person violating this ordinance, shall upon conviction be fined in the sum of not less than \$6.00 nor more than \$100.00, and each separate act or instance shall contribute a separate offense.

It shall be unlawful for any person to drive, operate or manipulate any vehicle above named, upon any street, alley, or block, when said street, alley or block is unusually crowded with other vehicles, or people, or near the public school grounds or churches, or any place where people are gathered, or gathering, or a crowd is leaving, while driving or operating of such machine shall be in a reckless or careless manner, such as might endanger the life, limb, safety or convenience of any person assembled or assembling thereabouts, or liable to damage any other vehicle. Any person violating this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined in the sum not less than \$6.00 nor more than \$100.00, and each separate act or instance shall constitute a separate offense.

It shall be unlawful for any person driving, operating, manipulating any vehicle name herein above, to willfully or negligently or carelessly collide with any other vehicle, or person, and any one violating this ordinance, shall upon conviction be fined a sum not less than \$6.00 nor more than \$50.00.

It shall be unlawful for any person to drive, operate, or manipulate any motor vehicle herein before named, with the muffler cut out, or disconnected, or shall race the engine there in in such a way as to make an unnecessary loud and obnoxious noise. Any one violating this ordinance, shall upon conviction be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$10.00.

AFFRAYS: If any two or more persons shall fight together, within the corporate limits of said town, each shall upon conviction, be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$25.00.

DISTURBING PEACE: If any

person shall, in or near any place of business, public business, private residence or upon the streets or alleys of said town use loud or vociferous or obscene, vulgar, or indecent language, or swear or curse, yell or shriek, or rudely display a pistol or any dead y weapon or make or cause to be made any unseemly noise calculated to disturb the inhabitants thereof, or other persons lawfully assembled or lawfully passing thereby he shall upon conviction be fined in a sum of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$25.00.

DISTURBING PUBLIC GATHERINGS: If any person by loud talking, swearing, or by any other noise or in any other manner, disturb any congregation, audience or assembly of people, or any part of same, where they are assembled in lawful manner and purpose, he shall be fined in a sum of not less than \$6.00 nor more than \$25.00.

CARRYING WEAPONS: If any person shall carry on or about his person, any pistol, dirk, dagger, slingshot or knuckles, made of hard substance, or any knife made for the purpose of offense or defense, he shall be fined not less than \$6.00 nor more than \$100.00. The above shall not apply to persons authorized by the laws of the State of Texas or the United States to carry such weapons.

GAMING: If any person shall play at game with cards, where money or any thing representing money, or anything of value, is bet or wagered, at any place within the corporate limits of this town, other than at a private residence occupied at the time by a family, and which residence shall not have been commonly resorted to for like games, he shall be fined in a sum of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00.

Any person who shall remain present at such games, and watch or sweat-the-game, shall be fined in a sum of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00.

Any person who shall play at a game with dice, commonly known as "shooting-craps," where money or anything representing money, or anything of value is bet or wagered, he shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$50.00.

Any person who shall bet or wager any money, or anything representing money, or anything of value upon any horse race, automobile race, baseball, basketball or football game, or any part of such games, or upon the city election, or upon any candidate for city office, in the limits of this town, shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$50.00.

SELLING INTOXICANTS: If any person shall sell any intoxicating liquors as the same are now defined and prohibited by the laws of the State of Texas and the United States within the town of Brownfield, he shall be fined not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00.

VAGRANCY: The following persons are, and shall be punished as vagrants:

Persons known as tramps:
All able bodied persons, who are able to work, or carry on some reputable, fair and honest means of livelihood, who do not work, and are without visible means of support:

Every common gambler, who for the most part maintains himself by gambling:

All persons who maintain themselves mostly by telling fortunes:

Every common prostitute:
Every panderer:

Any person found in the town of Brownfield who would come within any of the above definitions, shall be deemed a vagrant and shall be fined not less than \$6.00 nor more than \$50.00.

ASSAULT AND BATTERY: Any person who shall use violence upon the person of another, with intent to injure him, or make any attempt to commit a battery, or make any threatening gestures showing in itself, or by words accompanying it an immediate intention, coupled with the ability to commit a battery, shall be fined in the sum not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00.

ABUSE TO ANIMALS: Any person who shall beat, bruise, or injure animals, or abuse the same in an inhuman manner, within the limits of this town, shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00.

DEAD ANIMALS: It shall be unlawful for the owner of any animal,

or the person in charge of same, and responsible for its being within the limits of the town, to leave the body of such animal after its death, within the limits of the town, more than 12 hours after its death. Any person violating this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$50.00.

NUISANCES: Placing or permitting to be placed, or scattered upon the street or alley, or outside of an inclosure, any paper, trash, filth, refuse, polluted water or any other substance of a filthy, unsightly or unhealthful nature is hereby declared a nuisance, unsanitary, and is hereby prohibited, in said town. All outside closets or privies are requested to be kept well inclosed or well screened, and the owners required to use lime or other disinfectants at frequent intervals as may be necessary to keep same in a sanitary condition. Keeping hogs or blocks 21, 22, 23, 24, 33, 34, 50, 51 and 52 or either of them, are hereby prohibited, without special permit from the town council. Any person violating this ordinance or any part of same shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$50.00.

DOG TAX: There is hereby levied and required of each owner or keeper of a dog within the limits of the town, a license of \$5.00 per year for each dog, and any person who shall keep a dog, without paying said license after being notified by the town marshal, that same is demanded, shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$25.00.

HEALTH HINTS

For Everybody

By the State Board of Health, published in the Herald from time to time that our readers may prevent and not have to cure. No state can thrive while its citizens waste their resources of health, bodily energy, time and brain power, any more than a nation can prosper that wastes its natural resources.

Common politeness and a decent regard for the health of others should make us muffle the sneeze and smother the cough.

The human body is able to take care of itself, if given a chance. This means obedience to simple rules—plenty of fresh air, especially at night; sunshine in the home, especially in the sleeping rooms; plenty of sleep, plenty of good, simple wholesome food—bath when needed, recreation.

Typhoid fever is a synonym of ig-

norance, indifference, carelessness, insufficiency, insanitation and overcrowding.

Exercise being necessary to good health, communities should supply easily accessible facilities for exercise, namely public gymnasia, swimming pools, recreation and health centers.

Texas women would do well to adopt fashions of dress consistent with freedom of movement, physical development, and fitness for the wearer's particular occupation.

A city is a mirror—it reflects the people in it. Does our city show cleanliness?

Nearly 20,000 children of Texas are exposed to tuberculosis every year. These figures are a result of research work by the National Tuberculosis Association. This statement was made by the Texas Public Health Association.

Research by the National organization shows that at least one per cent of the normal population of an American community has active tuberculosis, and that an additional one per cent has the disease in a relatively negative form. This would mean that Texas, with a population of 4,661,027, would have 46,000 with the active disease, and the same number with it in the negative form. This is a total of 93,000 cases of the "white plague" in the State, according to the figures of the National Tuberculosis Association.

"In order to control the disease," said D. E. Breed, executive secretary of the Texas Public Health Association, "the anti-tuberculosis agencies of the country are advocating three definite policies: First, the prevention of infection, especially from adults to children; second, the building of bodily resistance; and third, the cure and restoration of the curable to working efficiency.

"To carry out these policies we must discover the cases by means of tuberculosis nurses, dispensaries, clinics, private physicians and general education. Then we must work for hospitals and sanatoria to care for the cases. These things our Association and local authorities are advocating to stamp out tuberculosis in Texas.

New Receiver Appointed for Midland & Northwestern

B. C. Girdley, cashier of the Midland National Bank, of Midland has been appointed receiver of the Midland & Northwestern Railway Co., to succeed N. G. Pearsall.

Mr. Girdley was called over the phone Friday by the secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce, and stated that they would be in position to handle car load lots of cattle and freight within the next fifteen days.

It is understood that a force of Mexicans have been put to work on the track and that it will be in good shape in a few days, and that service will be given soon.—Seminole Sentinel.

COAL SHORTAGE IN LUBBOCK

He states that fuel which has been ordered by many of the local dealers has since been cancelled because these buyers were afraid of the market at the present time. Bituminous or Anthracite coal users in Lubbock are also in bad, that is, of course, they did not supply their needs earlier in the season, however, we are informed that many of these users are reverting to the use of coke, which is and will likely answer the purpose for a limited time. The probability of Anthracite coal seeking a lower price is holding back many local purchases.—Lubbock Avalanche.

Brownfield dealers are pretty well stocked on coal that was purchased and stored in the summer months, and lots of the town and country folks have their winter fuel stored, and ready for hog killing weather. Local dealers had rather loose just a little on coal than to see the people suffer. They are not afraid of the market.
