A PEN SKETCH OF

I am setting alone in the room of the president in the executive office, and at the desk I have often seen him set at. I am writing for a few minutes until a document I have prepared for Mr. Tumulty is typed. And as I set here in this quiet place at a time when President Wilson is an invalid, I can but reflect upon the changes in the condition between the time I first knew him at this same desk and this day. Truly, it is an impressive reflection!

Then (1913) all was bustle, hurry noise, business. One after another. the senators, representatives, diplomats, office seekers, reporters, jostled about, made hasty intrances and early exits, each bent upon his task or purpose. To all alike, Mr. Wilson was most courteous, attentive, considerate. No man could have been more engaging in his personality. He was never profuse and never frigid His gentleness and quiet, unoffensive dignity were a complete mask. H. "llowed each person to know exactly what he chose to let hir: know. He vas a perfect ma ter of his expression. He argued in such conversations, either by keen and interested attention, but by silence, or largely by inquiry or remarks of indirection. Rudeness was foreign to his gentle.

and faced with consumate confidence PRESIDENT WILSON lay out before him.

Ten years before then and in 1919 made him one of the immortals of the ages. And, today, there is an air of the tomb here. Only his spiritthe air and feeling of him-is here. He is, in the flesh, over at the White House-broken, an invalid-his life and his work behind him, the lengthening, dark shadows ahead. He has broken himself upon the wheel of duty to others. No man since Lincoln has gone through with so much responsponsibility, so absorbing care so many or so great problems, such nerve racking experiences, so tremendious tasks. He wanted to make the world better-he did so! He yearned for suffering humanity to reach a higher peak; he litted up its eyes, held up its head, nerved its heart, lead it to the heights, where 1 caught its vision of a better life. He lead his own people to universal pros perity, equality of opportunity, to a practical democracy, equality, fraternity, and the vision dimmed the eves of the world for the first time with tears of tenderness and kindness and longing. So absorbed did he become in his work that he forgot the limita tions of human strength and worked until he feil, helpless, a physical wreck.



dividual roads make nothing at all. If the earnings on the combined railroad property of the region are under 6 per cent, it becomes the duty of the Commission to readjust the rates. The Santa Fe System lies in the central and western regions, and its property, therefore, is valued in two regions for rate making purposes. Some of the Santa Fe's neighbors made money prior to Federal control and some of them lost. That situation may continue to obtain under the new law. While the earnings for no road are guaranteed, the machinery of the law is supposed to work in such a manner that railroad credits will be improved, and will help the railroad industry generally, and give the public assurance of better service The government having taken the roads and used them for its own purposes for 26 months, did, after it got through with them and returned them to their owners, guarantee the earnings for half a year, to allow time for investigation of rates; but that period expired the last of August. The railroads now depend wholly on what they can earn on the rates fixed by the Interstate Commerce Commission.



CONDITIONS DESPERATE

Dallas, Nov. 20th .- Conditions in Armenia at the present time are desperate according to the statement today made by Chas. L. Sanger, of Dallas, State Chairman of hte Near East relief. Mr. Sanger's statement follow ed the receipt today of two cablegrams from the Near East. The cablegrams were forwarded by Bayard Dodge, son of the National Treasurer of the Near East Relief, now in charge of relief work in the Syria-Aleppo area, and read as follows: "Armenian refugees pouring into Aleppo from Turkish frontier. Severe weather commencing. Women and children homeless. Emergency work imperative. Present appropriations must continue throughout the winter.

The other cablegram further depicting the suffering and deprivation read:

"Roads from Central Armenia to the Black Sea jamed with Armenian women and children fleeing before the Turkish army, unfed and shoeless Half nacked refugee crowding into Tiflis for possible safety. Urgent appeal to committee to rush food, medicine, clothing,
