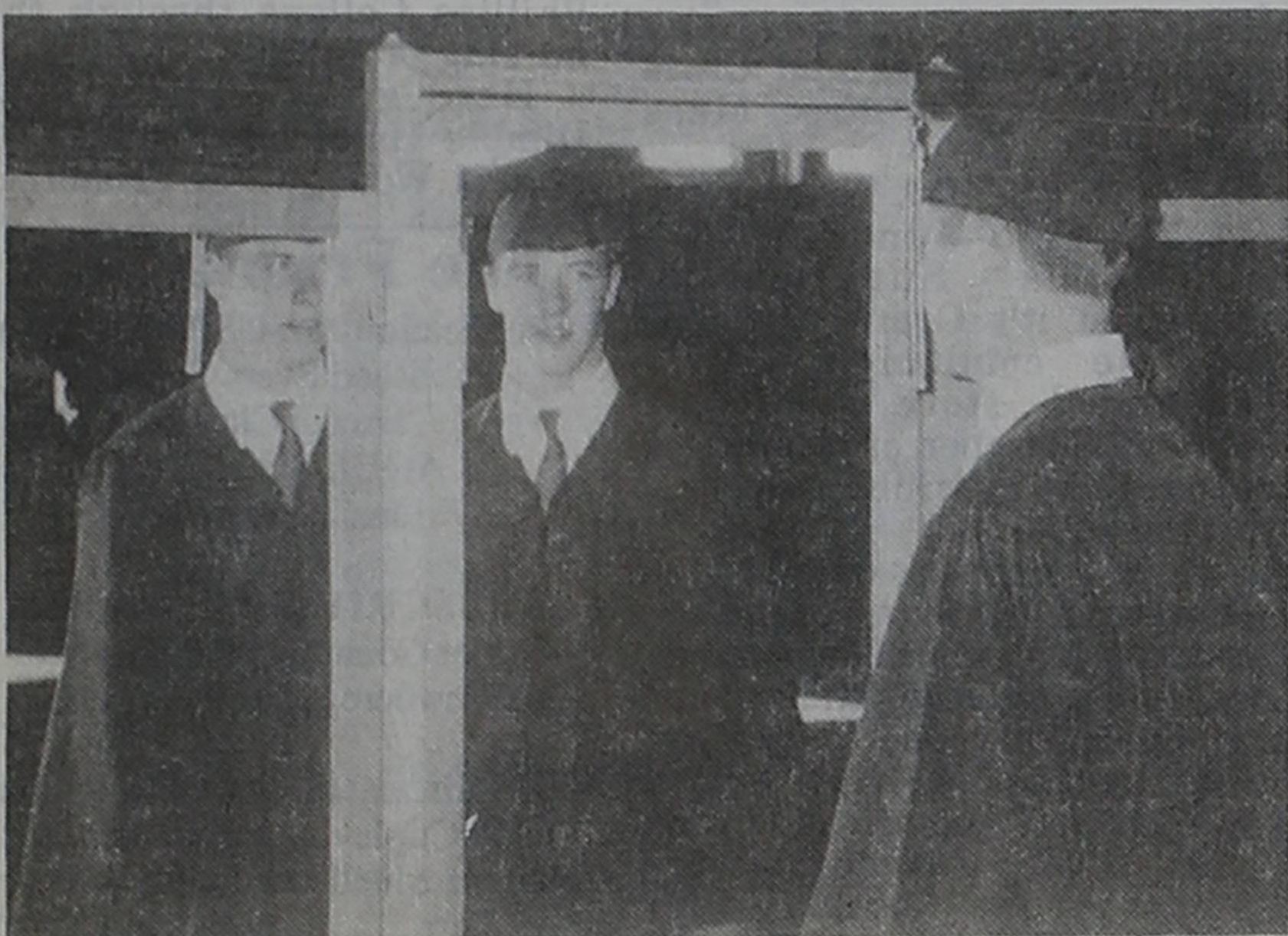

Children were reprimanded for displays of temper while playing with little friends. Fights at school were ended with severe discipline. The lesson of learning to control violent impulses was just part of growing up and maturing.

But violence in some form or other has always been with us. In my early years, even prissy little girls sometimes played cowboys and indians with the little fellows next door. Those cliff-hanger Saturday afternoon movies had their share of violence with Tarzan of the Jungle, big city gangsters, and shady characters from the "Wild West." We carved pieces of wood from tree branches into the shape of guns and played "war" while darting out from behind backyard bushes to mow down the enemy.

I don't think any of my little neighborhood pals grew up to be serial killers. The difference between then and now was a big dividing line between the good guys as the heroes and the bad guys who got their "just desserts" in the end. Lessons of appreciation for good over evil were reinforced on Sunday morning by our preachers and Sunday school teachers, who made sure we knew what the 10 commandments and the golden rule were all about.

If a couple of local nuts got loose and killed some people, the local law enforcement folks took care of the situation. The rest of the country didn't hear about all the gory details for weeks on end. It never entered people's mind that the federal government should "do something about it."

Did you know that the crime rate has been declining in the past few years? I thought not. The "media" does not consider this to be big news. The president has decreed that we shall have a year-long million dollar (taxpayer funded) study of violent video games which are played primarily by young teens. At the end of the year, someone will propose some sort of legislation. We already have so many laws on the books, that enforcing them has become an impossible task. The high-school boys in Colorado who shot their classmates were in violation of about 20 different laws at the time. That didn't seem to make much difference, did it?

We can save that expensive year-long million dollar study by simply adopting "Momma Carol's Five-Point Plan" for getting our country's children back on track:

1. Each city, community or county should decide (vote) whether or not to allow video games in their area. We already handle such problems as adult-theme night clubs, and local sales of alcoholic beverages in this manner.
2. Schools must teach kindness toward each other and the difference between good and evil, since parents don't seem inclined to do this anymore. The "good versus bad" theme should pervade every lesson in every classroom from K through 12th grades.
3. School uniforms would solve a myriad of problems and give young people a sense of pride in their school.
4. Adults know more about how to handle the complexities of life than children do. Adult decisions should take precedence over the desires of children under the age of 18. This includes discipline, when warranted, and the ACLU must not be allowed to interfere with the disciplining of children in schools.
5. Taking prayer out of schools was unconstitutional (First Amendment). Put it back the way it was!

Moisture For '99: Cautious Optimism

Although the total moisture for the month of May in Friona did not set any all-time records at 2.44 inches of rain, it never-the-less should provide at least a confidence boost to area farmers.

The month of May is traditionally one of the wettest months of the season, and local farmers, gardeners and yard buffs remember all too well that in 1998, the month "came and went" without so much as a trace of moisture.

May's total edged out January for the most moisture this calendar year, by a single digit, 2.44 inches to 2.43.

The monthly total brought calendar year 1999's total moisture to 8.83. This is a gain of 45% over the total from last year at the same time, which was 3.93 inches.

The month of May, 1999 may have seemed even wetter, due to the fact that moisture was received on seven consecutive dates, May 24 through the 30th, and eight days out of nine starting with the 22nd. Longtime residents recognize that this was a rare occurrence, as well, even though the daily moisture ranged only from .03 inches to .42 inches.

Here are the monthly totals for calendar 1999, with the comparative totals from the same month in 1998:

January, '99: 2.43 (1998: .01); February: .00 (.56); March 2.28 (2.26); April, 1.68 (1.10) and May: 2.44 (0.0) Total for 1999: 8.83 inches (1998: 3.93).

Principals, Band Dir. Leaving Friona ISD

Friona High School Principal Frank Belcher has accepted the position of superintendent at Texline, (TX). Texline is a 1A school district with about 190 students.

Belcher has been in education for 24 years, the last 7 years here in Friona. He was assistant junior high principal, athletic director, and for the last 5 years, high school principal.

Belcher's wife, Jeannie, has been Friona Primary school principal the last year. She will be teaching in the Texline schools.

Also, Friona's band director Zane Polson has accepted the band director's job at Sunray, located about 10 miles from Dumas.

Janis Polson, a junior high teacher here in Friona,

will become the head boys and girls golf coach at Sunray.

And first year Friona coach Cory Barnes has taken a coaching position at Lockney. Barnes, who came to Friona last year from Lubbock Monterey, chose the Lockney job so he could be nearer Wayland Baptist University.

Barnes plans to enroll at the Plainview school and continue his studies in school administration.

Friona PD Arrests Bootlegger

According to information from Police Chief Randy Gerles, Friona police raided a suspected bootlegging operation in the early hours of Saturday, May 29.

After conducting surveillance of the location at 503 Main Street, enough information was collected to process the warrant.

Alcoholic beverages were confiscated and a female suspect was detained for the offense of Selling Alcoholic Beverages in a Dry Area.

The offense carries with it a fine of not less than \$100 or no more than \$1,000 and/or jail time not to exceed one year.

Raid Nets Drugs Near Lazbuddie

According to a press release from the Parmer County Sheriff's office, a search warrant was executed in Lazbuddie on May 27.

The warrant, as a result of a Crimestoppers tip, was issued for a residence 2 1/2 miles north of Highway 145 on FM1172.

During the search about 1 1/4 grams of methamphetamine was confiscated. A number of stolen items, including a carpet shampoo machine and a two-wheel hand truck were also recovered.

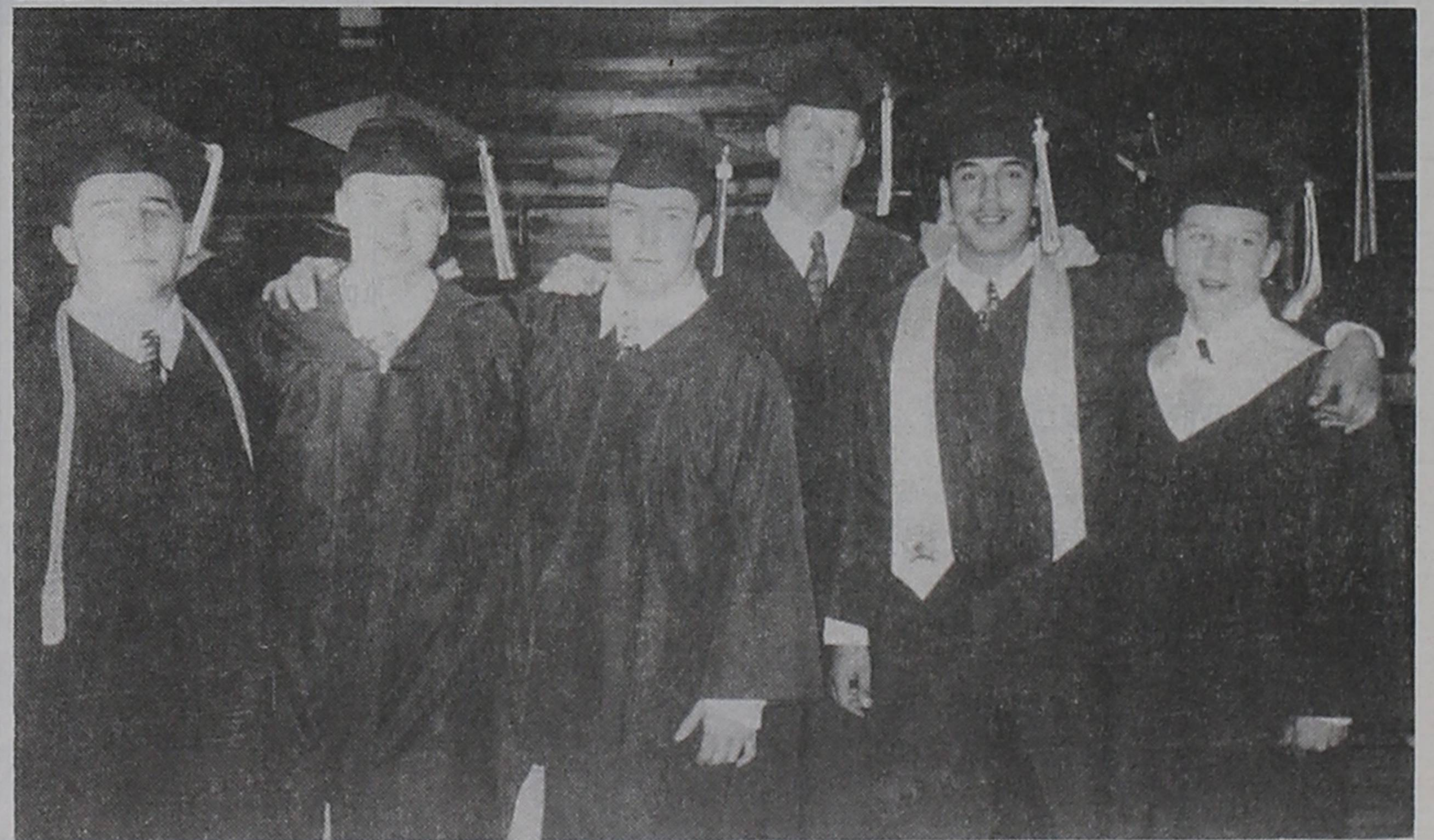

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

...from the files of The Friona Star

70 Yrs. Ago--June 5, 1929

It now appears to be an established fact that Friona will be the center of a system of rural telephones, which will be connected with and operated by the same system that will be in use in the city.

It is reported on the best of authority that Friona will have a first class and strictly up-to-date "M" System store, which will be open for business on or about the fifteenth of June.

65 Yrs. Ago--June 8, 1934

Mrs. A. H. Boatman was appointed to membership on the Texas Centennial Advisory Board as one of four members from Parmer County, according to a letter Mrs. Boatman received from Will H. Mayes, temporary secretary of the Texas Centennial Commission.

60 Yrs. Ago--June 9, 1939

The City of Friona is soon to have a new fire truck, which is now being built and nearing completion in the work shops of Reeve Chevrolet Company, with Charles Bainum, one of the firemen, doing and supervising the work of building.

55 Yrs. Ago--June 9, 1944

On Saturday afternoon, June 10, Friona will be featured on a historical broadcast over station KGNC by Miss Laura V. Hamner of Amarillo.

Some time Monday afternoon, Mrs. Pearl Kinsley was uninjured when her car overturned while enroute to Friona. Mrs. Kinsley sustained only a few minor bruises, but the car was considerably damaged.

50 Yrs. Ago--June 10, 1949

On Monday of last week, Day Brothers, house movers of Hereford, arrived in Friona and began preparations for moving the home of Rev.

Tommie Allen, pastor of the First Baptist Church, from its old location to make room for the proposed new auditorium to be built on the ground it formerly occupied.

45 Yrs. Ago--June 4, 1954

The city has begun making street markers for Friona, a badly needed commodity to assist strangers in finding addresses. The Lions Club set up 64 of the markers on Wednesday, and still have 52 to place on the corners.

Thirty-four cars of a Santa Fe freight train were derailed Sunday at the east switch at Summerfield. The cars were filled with perishable goods. Five or six carloads of fruit were taken to Hereford to reload on other cars.

40 Yrs. Ago--June 4, 1959

W. O. (Bill) Wright, 39, drowned sometime Friday night following an unexplained accident at Lake Conchas in New Mexico.

Hail cut a destructive swath through Parmer County, in the shape of a new moon from Rhea to east of Hub. Hail was stacked up a foot deep next to buildings on some farms following the storm.

35 Yrs. Ago--June 4, 1964

Peggye McNair, who is the reigning "Miss Wool of Texas," paid a visit to the Otho Whitefield sheep ranch this week. Whitefield is an official in both the Columbia Sheep Breeders of America and the Texas Columbia Breeders.

30 Yrs. Ago--June 5, 1969

Joe Bob Mann, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Mann of Friona, was aboard the USS Frank E. Evans when it was cut in half by an Australian aircraft carrier in a pre-dawn collision early Tuesday morning.

Airman Kirk Matlock, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Matlock of Friona, is in a hospital in Japan after

suffering a hand wound while in Vietnam, it was reported after the Matlocks talked with Kirk by telephone this week.

25 Yrs. Ago--June 2, 1974

A contract for the Highway 214 project, to include widening the road and construction of an overpass, was awarded this week by the Texas Highway Department.

Kay Riethmayer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Riethmayer of Route 3, Friona, has been placed on the Dean's honor Roll at Lubbock Christian College for the spring semester of 1974.

Darrell Mason, a junior student at New Mexico Military Institute, compiled a 3.7 grade point average on a 4.0 grading system for the semester just ended.

20 Yrs. Ago--June 3, 1979

General Telephone Company of the Southwest has over 1.5 million telephones in service, according to O.D. Hearn, Brownfield division manager.

Donna Rector presented the valedictory address at the High School graduation ceremonies last Friday night. Jan Mason gave the salutatory address and Chris Barnett gave the class history.

15 Yrs. Ago--June 3, 1984

White's Supermarket observed its Grand Opening at the company's newly expanded store, and the Friona Chamber of Commerce provided a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

The parents of Masayo Okamoto, foreign exchange student for the 1983-84 school year flew in from their home in Osaka, Japan, to be here for the Friona High School graduation exercises. Mr. and Mrs. Okamoto were guests of the Robert Neeley family while they were here. Of all the exchange students Friona has had, it is believed

that the Okamotos are the first parents to visit their child while the student was still here.

10 Yrs. Ago--June 3, 1989

Rachael Knowles and Nina Constancio sang "Forever Friends" at the FHS commencement. Daylen Gallman and Deena Willard sang "So Far," as part of the commencement program.

The post-graduation senior party, sponsored by the community of Friona for the 1989 Friona High School graduates, was acclaimed a big success this week, with 47 seniors, along with their guests, and a number of parents, taking part in the party.

Her grandparents are Dimple Hand and Noyle and Lorena Wood, all of Friona.





Out Here

"Focaccia & Panini Are Not Opera Stars!"

You can't order a chicken fried steak at Holly's Cafe.

Fried foods are not on the menu. So if it's burgers and fries you crave, better crave somewhere else. Holly Smith doesn't have a deep-fryer in her place.

Thanks to some financial help from the Friona Economic Development Corp. (FEDC) and some business advice from the WTAMU Small Business Development Center in Canyon Holly Smith has opened what she describes as a healthy cafe.

If you have stopped by and seen the cinnamon rolls, brownies, and the luscious cakes and desserts, you might be inclined to wonder just how healthy an upside down carrot cake with cream, chocolate, and nuts on top can be.

That means no fried eggs and bacon for breakfast. The breakfast is full of fruit, French toast, or pastries.

The oatmeal special is a bowl of old-fashioned oatmeal served with sliced apples, banana, raisins, walnuts, brown sugar, and milk or cream.

It's enough to make a sausage and hash brown cowboy run back to the truck.

I couldn't help but notice that Holly's Cafe was written up in an article in the Amarillo-Globe News last week. Maybe you read it too.

If you read it, did you wonder what a panini sandwich on a focaccia roll was? You probably do what people do sometimes when they don't want to appear less than educated and worldly.

Throw in a little pesto sauce and creamy cilantro dressing, topped off with a cup of cafe au lait or Chai tea and you can have a thoroughly confusing lunch at Holly's for under \$10.

She might even throw in a Viscotti cookie to dunk in your latte or mocha.

I stopped by this week for a little research to assist you with menu interpretation. This way you can order with some self-confidence. We'll keep it simple.

Focaccia is an Italian flat bread roll with herbs in it (healthy). A panini sandwich is actually a ham or grilled

chicken sandwich served on a focaccia roll.

Panini is the name of the grill it is cooked on. In other words, a panini is an Italian stove. See, you can't just order a panini sandwich because there is no such thing as ordering a panini.

You've got to put the focaccia on the panini first, then add the good stuff later. Got the picture? Now there is no need to embarrass yourself when you order.

This summer you will find the entire Smith family working at the little yellow and blue cafe on Main Street.

Holly is the chief cook, the boss mom. Daughter Blair is the soup and sandwich chef.

She is home from Texas Tech. Dad Tim Smith fills in at noon, which is the busiest time so far. Then there is son Hayes, a 13-year-old coffee chef who has developed his own coffee-bar creation, the Hayes Special.

I tried one and it was really good. At \$2.65, the large cup creation was a bargain. Sort of like having our own Starbucks right in downtown Friona.

At the always open coffee bar, you might ask Hayes for an Eye-Opener (has espresso), an Americano (hot water with two shots of espresso), or a Mom's Cappuccino (with strawberry).

The Chai Indian tea

comes in several flavors of herbs and spices and can be ordered with foamy milk.

Ashlee Hunt and Heather Martin round out the crew, handling orders, bussing tables, cutting up vegetables, and delivering big smiles to all who enter.

Holly's Cafe is open Monday-Friday, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Take-out is available for any item on the menu. The phone number is 250-5800. There is enough seating for 32.

Bring me a double order of brownies, a bagel with cream cheese, and a Hayes Special while I try to make up my mind what healthy dish to order.

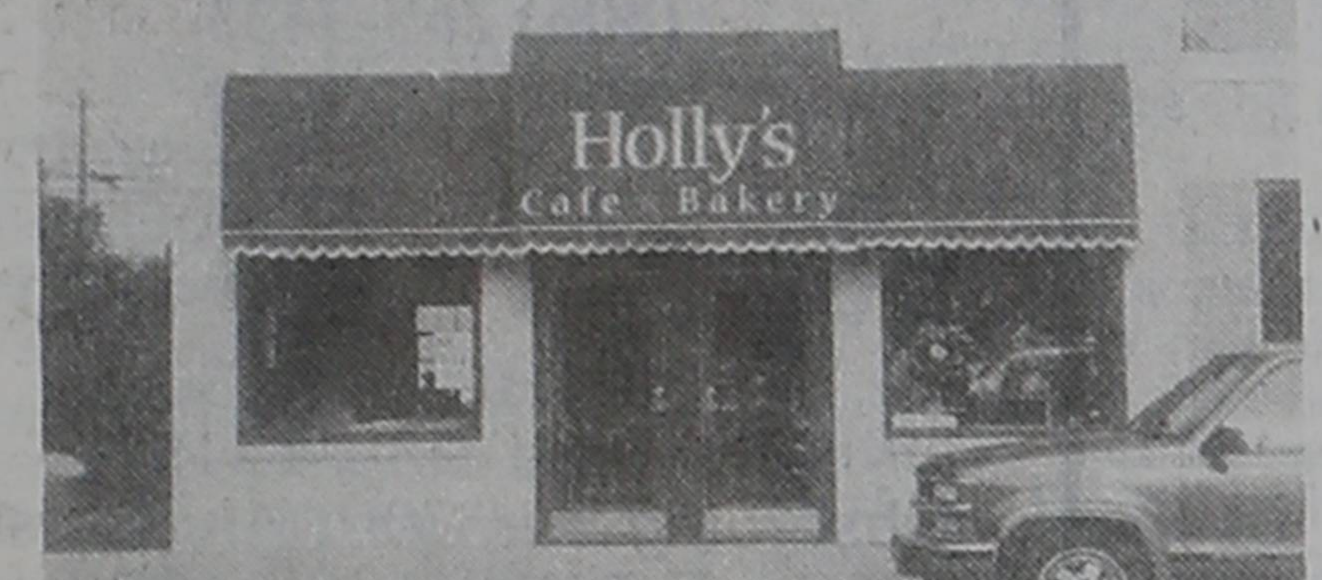

Air Race To Visit Hereford

The Marion Jayne Air Race, featuring some 35 different airplanes, will land at the Hereford Municipal Airport on Monday, June 7, from about 10 a.m.-5 p.m.

The actual race for small airplanes, begins in Gallup, New Mexico on June 5 and ends 2,000 miles later in Bloomington, Indiana on June 10.

Dear Governor,
When I heard that HB 2107 had made it through the House and the Senate only to be vetoed, I was absolutely shattered.

HB 2107 was our last hope. Etoile Volunteer Fire Department, as do most VFDs in Texas, runs on a stringent budget, sustained by the sale of sweets and barbecue. We are a small band of people, many over the age of 55, who donate personal time and money to protect the homes and lives of around 2,000 people. Most of us have jobs and families, which we leave at all hours of the day and night, as we can, to risk our lives for nothing more than satisfaction of knowing we have helped. And this we do with used, broken equipment, little or no protective gear, and very little support.

We backed HB 2107 in hopes of obtaining the protective clothing and gear NECESSARY to fight the fires that threaten our community.

We were optimistic that this legislation would pass because it only became active the two times a year people buy fireworks. It would have assisted more than 1800 volunteer fire departments and helped save the lives of ALL TEXANS.

I cannot help but express my disappointment in you; I feel you should be ashamed of yourself for vetoing this bill. By vetoing 2107, you put the lives of over 40,000 firefighters at risk and turned your back on Texas.

Governor Bush, I was so proud of you in the past (ref. support letter dated 3/8/99), thinking you had the little guy in mind. **WHAT DO WE DO NOW?** If this fireworks bill is not the answer, **WHAT IS?** Do you have an alternative plan to help protect the Citizens of Texas, your constituents, for the certainty of fire?

I look forward to your response.

Minnie A. Knight was born on February 19, 1915 at the Star Ranch in Parmer County. She grew up the fourth of ten children and spent all her life in Parmer County. In 1933, Minnie met James Eggleton Knight, formerly of Logan County, Kentucky. J.E. was working for the Rafter S Ranch at the time they met. They courted and married August 22, 1936.

J.E. and Minnie continued to work at the Rafter S and lived in a house at the ranch. Their "running" water was a faucet just outside the back door. They did have an icebox and a coal burning range. In 1940, they remodeled the house and added running water along with more room.

Minnie is the mother of five children. James Ronald (J.R.) was born November 4, 1937; Gayle Greeson was

born January 12, 1943; Mary Yaksich and Martha Mars were born October 31, 1944; and Vickie Knight was born April 4, 1952. The family built a home in 1959 just outside the city limits of Friona.

She is the grandmother of twelve grandchildren, five of which she gained through their marriages and seven great-grandchildren. She is also the oldest living of her four remaining siblings.

Her son, J.R. Knight, passed away in 1986 and she lost her husband, J.E. Knight, in 1991. Minnie came to live at Prairie Acres in the fall of 1998 when doctors said she could no longer stay by herself.

Older Drivers

Older drivers with vision problems are three or four times more likely to have automobile accidents--and 15 times more likely to have accidents at intersections, according to a study published in the journal, *Psychology and Aging*. Some vision tests are now designed to measure the useful field of view (UFOV), the visual space within which the individual can be alerted quickly to visual stimuli--like fast-moving traffic. Scientists at Western Kentucky University who designed the new UFOV test say it accurately identified drivers at risk of accident in nearly 85 per cent of cases.

Smart seniors know that driving makes extra vision demands on them and see their optometrist regularly for testing. Very often a stronger prescription may make driving safer and less stressful. Many older drivers also find it helpful to compensate for increasing vision problems by modifying their driving habits: avoiding heavy traffic and night driving, and spending less time on the road.

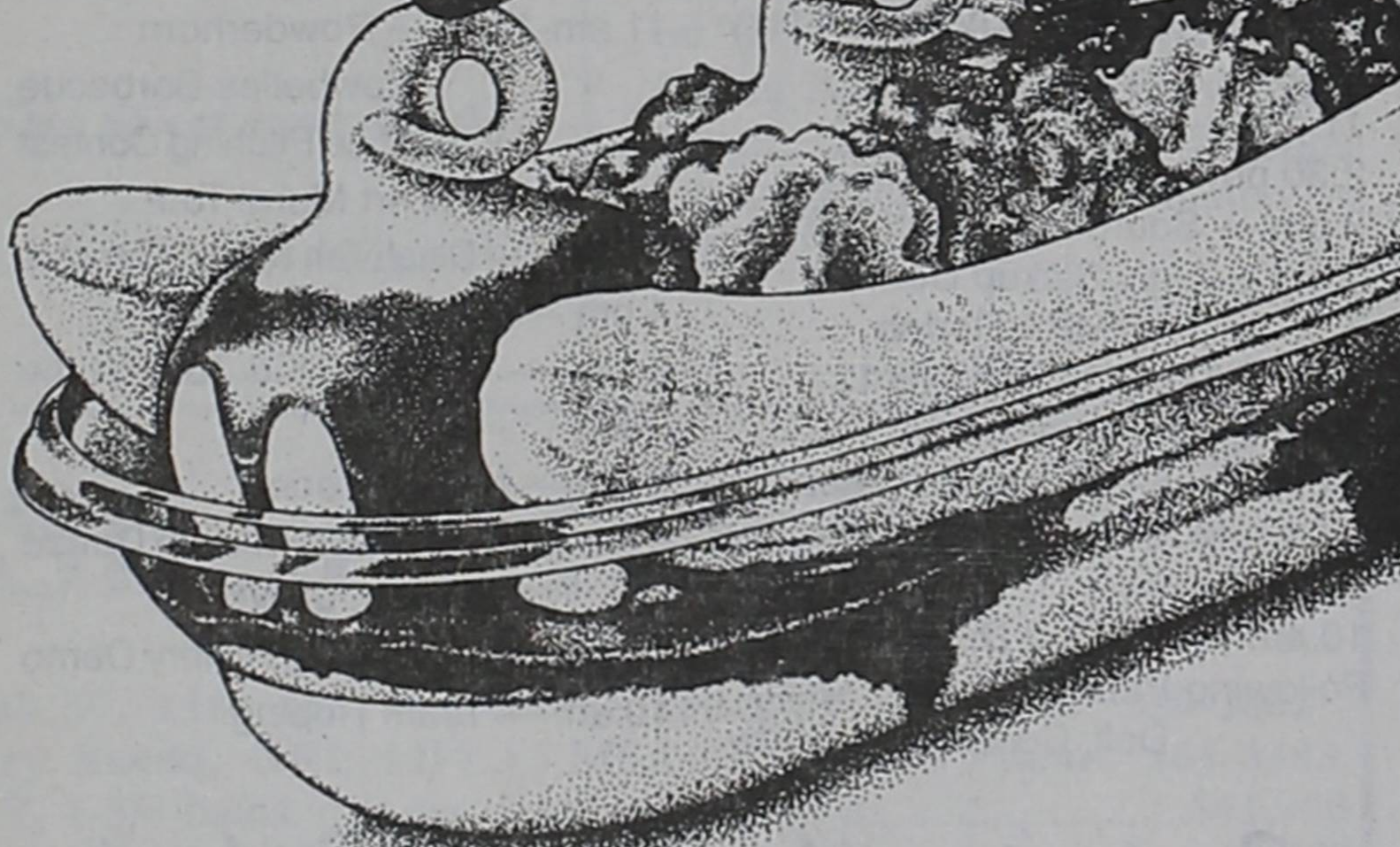

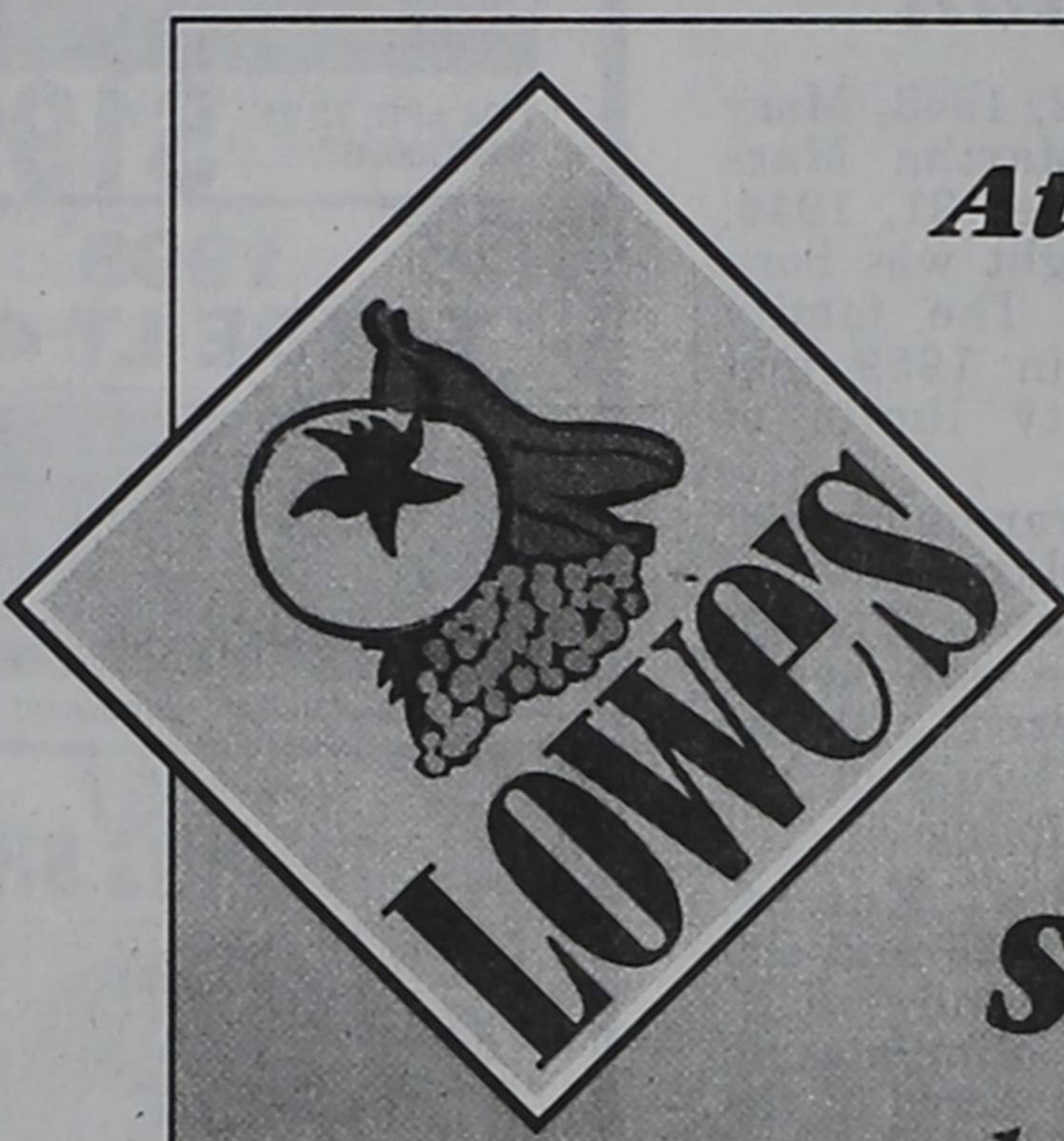


