

NEFF VEToes WEST TEXAS A. & M. BILL

Austin, April 2.—The Governor announced he had approved the University of Texas land expansion bill, the anti-Japanese land ownership bill, the bill making an appropriation of \$3,000,000 to supplement the available school fund, the bill making an appropriation of \$30,000 to build a monument to the soldiers from Texas who lost their lives in the World War and the bill making an appropriation of \$2500 to erect a monument over the grave of Cynthia Ann Parker. All of these bills were signed and filed in the Secretary of State's Department. The Governor vetoed the West Texas A. & M. College Bill and the bill carrying an appropriation of \$4,000,000 to aid the rural schools in this State. This disposed of all the bills laying on the Governor's desk. The Governor vetoed the West Texas A. & M. bill for two reasons. One is that a resolution recommending that this college be established by

the present legislature was rejected by the platform committee at the State Democratic Convention held last September at Fort Worth and that when a political party speaks a matter of policy or expediency, the administration, created by that party must obey."

The other reason is that this is not the time to lay new foundations for State institutions, especially on account of present financial conditions.

ANOTHER BIG RAIN

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A high French official, Mr. Vivian, we believe, is now in America to see how the new administration is lined up on peace. It is believed he wants the United States to endorse the payment of the endemity against Germany agreed on by the powers.
We imagine the Bryanites pulled a big celebration when they received word that the healthy boys from the Western portion of the State would have to come on there are go to the A. & M. Colleges of New Mexico, Kansas or Oklahoma, either of which are better suited to the needs of the

West Texas youth. And the Bryanites need no band. The frogs and mosquitoes furnished the music.
It has been announced by Washington dispatches that the new administration will closely follow the Wilson administration on several well defined policies, among them the Mexican and Japanese policies, the income tax, the post office department and the tariff question. Don't you bet this is a bitter pill for those who voted for a "change?" But the new president has a long head, and probably believes in letting "well enough alone."

The Enterprise informs us that a car load of "Smart Elecs" visited that town recently, and gave them a serenade with the auto horn, and made the little ones run over the "biguns" getting out of the way of their car. But the "Elecs" are cited to appear in their town again—at court. Once in awhile strange characters blow in to towns. One came here Monday on the train that needed another grip to balance him. Sheriff Johnson and City Marshal Brown relieved him of the burden.

Talking about Neff being in sympathy with the higher institutions of learning, when he approved a bill for the expansion of the University of Texas running into seven figures and at the same time vetoed the rural school appropriation, reminds us that the best people of Texas are going to be right at the point, and we believe that point has done been reached where the people are going to have to support and build up their denominational schools, for two reasons: First that the cost is getting too high for the common people in the private and even the State schools, and second, those of us that believe the Bible story of the creation will have to in order to save our children from pure, unadulterated atheism. The University of Texas was a hot bed of atheism just a few years ago, until the popular sentiment got so strong that they were forced to oust their agnostic German professor that were filling our children full of "kultur" and put at the head of the institution a Presbyterian minister. Now comes a Rice Institute professor, of Houston announcing that elephants roamed over the Texas prairies five hundred thousand years ago, and he is followed by a John Hopkins (Baltimore) professor who says Noah and family merely saw some peacock feather fly swatters instead of a rainbow after the deluge. If a kid of ours never got higher than the third grade, we would not send them to such a school if the tuition, board, lodging and clothes were gratis. We must support our denominational schools or revert to heathenism.

Almost overnight Governor Pat M. Neff killed himself with the very best and most influential people of West Texas. On March 31st, he could have carried the western portion of the State for most any office in the gift of the people; but on April 2nd any ward-heeler from Tumbuctoo could beat him a three to one race in that portion of the State laying West of the 98th. The "reason" given by Mr. Neff for the veto are no reasons at all, except a play for the political support of the eastern half of the State. The first one being that the Democratic State Convention at Ft. Worth failed to declare for it, and Mr. Neff knows as well as any one that the Ft. Worth Convention delegation was based on the old twenty-odd year ago districting, just like the senatorial districts are now, and of course East Texas controlled matters. But despite this, the resolution came very near carrying and it did carry at the city of Austin by both branches of the people's elected representatives. The other "reason"—financial—was no less a travesty on consistency. For on the same day he approved a bill for one and one-quarter million dollars for the expansion of the University of Texas. The people of the western portion of the State were not asking that the A. & M. College be established this year, but only for an appropriation of \$50,000 for a location and it was generally expected that no appropriation for its erection fill the next regular session of the legislature. But now the fight must all be made over from the ground up before a new legislature, and we hope a new governor. But to our notion the best thing for us is to get together solidly as one man and one woman for a new State, and stay with it till we have it. The frog ponds of the east are never going to grant anything or any justice to the blooming prairies of the West, and we had just as well get that in our noddies right now as twenty years from now, and the better for us. Two million of the WHITE cream of Texas with no adequate representation and paying the most of the taxes? That is exactly why our forefathers fought England during the revolution. Twenty-odd years is a long time to be patient and to expect justice of the older portion of the State, and it would take a man of a sublime lot of patience and confidence to expect anything in the next twenty years. But west Texans are

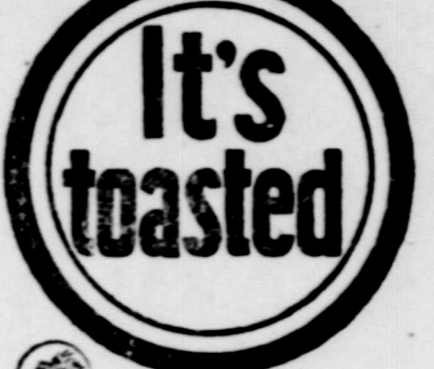

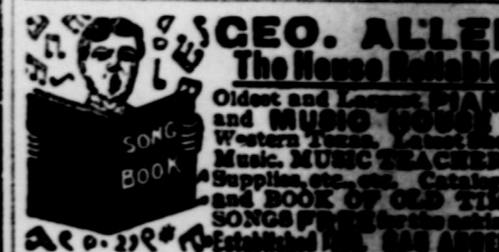
