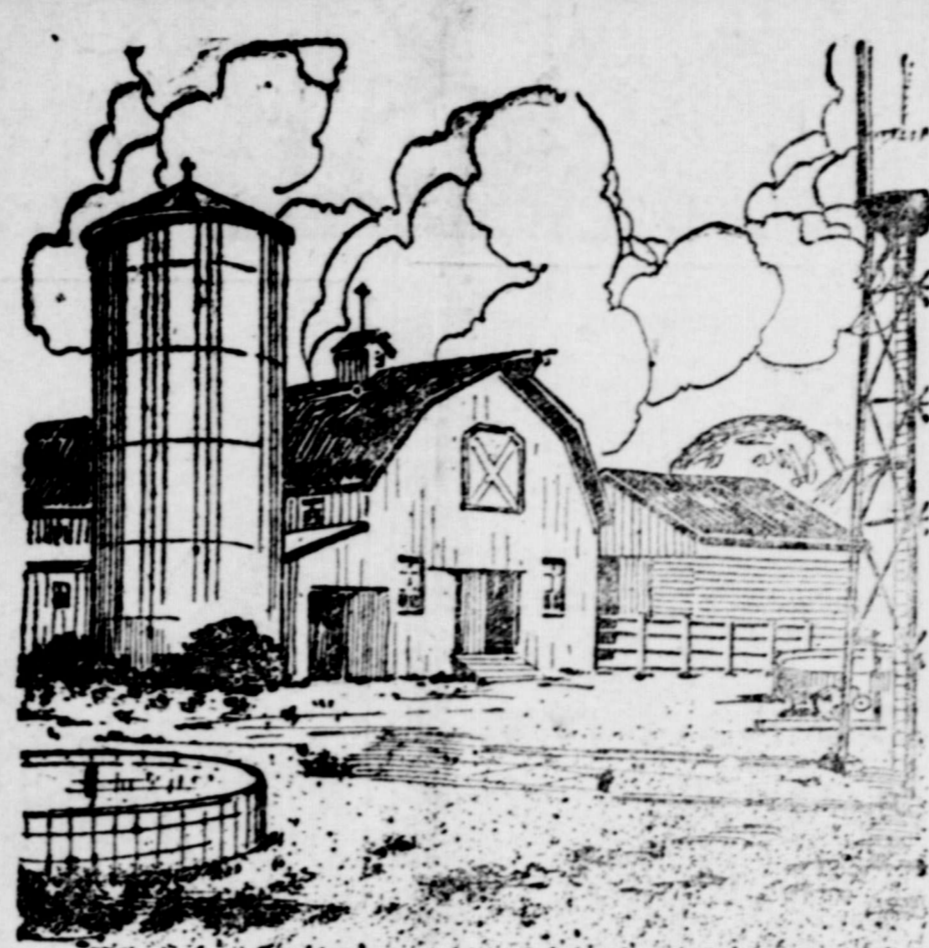
MR. LEWIS KILLED LAST WEEK—WAS BURIED HERE

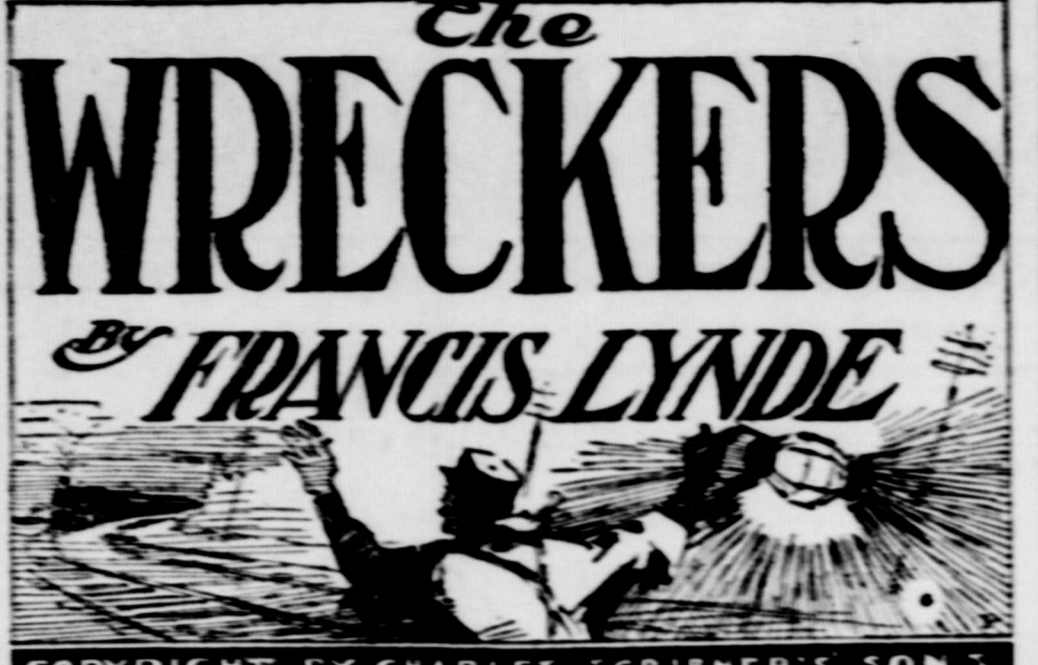
Rich Bennett and J. N. Lewis left last week for Breckenridge, where they went on business.
