time of the JFK assassination? This is the question being posed this week on the eve of the 30th anniversary of the event.

we wanted to do the same thing. And since you seem to forget details as time goes by, I decided to quote myself from a column I wrote for the JFK anniversary 20 years ago, when the events were much closer than they are today:

WE'LL NEVER FORGET that Friday in November. It was truly one of the saddest days we've ever experienced, coupled with the chain reaction that resulted in the capture of Lee Harvey Oswald, and Oswald being killed by Jack Ruby two days later as he was being transferred by Dallas law officers.

It was an unbelievable sequence of events. We couldn't believe it was all taking place here in supposedly civilized America, right here in our beloved home state.

But the thing that brought the starkness of the situation so vividly to Americans was that it practically happened right before their very eyes. Especially Ruby's shooting of Oswald, which happened on nationwide television.

Like most Texans, we were on our lunch hour at the time of the Kennedy assassination.

When they came on with the bulletin, and identified it from Dallas, we were fearful of what we would hear--sort of like an instant premonition--and our fears were soon confirmed.

The first announcement reported that President Kennedy had been shot during the parade, and that he

had been taken to a Dallas hospital. Like most Americans, we breathed a silent prayer--"Oh, God, don't let him die. Not in Texas!"

But by then, the president most likely was already dead (1 p.m. officially). It was a very painful time for all Americans, and we still bear the scars of that day, after all these years.

At that time, Plains Publishers, the central printing plant, was flourishing in Friona, and for the first and only time in the city's history, an Associated Press news wire was feeding news locally.

We returned to the office, and followed the sequence of events leading up to Oswald's capture on the AP news wire at Plains

Publishers. The events left a strange, "scary" feeling with many people. We had intended to go to Muleshoe that night to watch a bi-district playoff game between Muleshoe and Denver City, but wife Carol persuaded me to stay at home. It was as if she felt there was a danger

in being out in public. We recall that we spent practically the entire weekend watching the drama unfold on television, and believe me, it was a

very depressing weekend. Several area folks were enroute to Austin, where the president had been scheduled to speak on Friday

night. But Lee Harvey Oswald had changed the course of history that noon hour in Dallas, shattering the beauty of Indian Summer in Texas, and spoiling what had started out to be a successful good-will mission

by the president to our state. The following spring, Governor John Connally was the main speaker at our Texas Press Assn. convention. He still had his arm in a sling from his wounds that day in Dallas. We felt we were touching

an historical event. We recall the tremendous "sinking feeling" we got when the news came across of Kennedy's death. It was akin to the feeling you get when you learn of the death of a loved one. Or perhaps when you

hear that our country is at war.... We sincerely pray that our nation never has to experience such a traumatic event again. After all this time, the events of that week are still very vivid to us.

# Combest Explains Why He Favored NAFTA Proposal

Congressman Larry Combest were opposed to NAFTA. Richard WHERE WERE YOU at the detailed the reasons that he was supporting the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) when it came before Congress on Wednesday, November 17, during a Since many folks are sharing telephone "press conference" on their thoughts and remembrances, Monday, involving several newsmen from his district.

Bill Ellis, publisher of the Friona Star and Bovina Blade, was one of those included in the 30minute discussion.

Congressman Combest started out with a two or three-minute dissertation, during which he explained that he had only decided last weekend to support NAFTA.

Negotiations on provisions of the treaty have been continuing in Washington, and there were at least a couple of areas where Combest had concerns for his district. He invited leaders from the sugarbeet and wheat industries to sit in on the negotiations. He said that following the negotiations, the wheat NAFTA doesn't pass, then there is representative was satisfied with the NAFTA agreement, and the sugar beet rep had switched from "against" to "neutral."

Combest said he decided to vote in favor of the issue because of the tremendous economic impact that NAFTA could have on Texas, and particularly the 19th Congressional District.

He said that one study had shown that his district might expect 8,000 additional jobs, due to movement of companies from other parts of the nation into Texas.

The oil and gas industries are extremely excited about the possibilities of favorable business under NAFTA, Combest said. Their industries have lost more jobs over the past ten years than the automotive and textile industries combined. If NAFTA passes, American oil companies can go into Mexico and begin drilling oil

wells and producing. On the illegal alien issue, Representative Combest said that we currently have problems at the border due to bad economic conditions in Mexico. "If we can improve these conditions south of the border, then there should be less of a desire on the part of Mexicans to want or need to come across," he

A big beneficiary of the NAFTA should be Mexico's border area, and ironically, Combest pointed out that currently this is one of the areas in real bad economic shape.

On the aspect of the U.S. losing jobs to Mexico, Combest said he has never been worried about that. "There's nothing in the agreement that would encourage this situation. Companies have more of an advantage before NAFTA to move to Mexico than they will after NAFTA."

He said that many companies which had moved to Mexico hoping to save money through lower wages had discovered this was a bad idea-that productivity is the main key, and that several of these companies have, or are considering moving back to the U.S.

Combest said he understood why several of his comrades in Congress Gephart, a Demorat, is opposed, due to the fact that there some industries in his district that would lose their "protection" under the new treaty.

It was also mentioned that there was a distinct possibility that some of the "lost jobs" that opponents of NAFTA have been warning about might be jobs that would be lost by the so-called "rust-belt" of America, and might re-locate to Texas, which might prove to be our gain.

"I think it's a tremendous opportunity for Texas, since we're bordering Mexico. We also have the right, after six months, to withdraw from the treaty, but if we reject NAFTA at this time, Mexican President Salinas has indicated that it might be awhile before we could bring it back up for negotiations-and there is the possibility that we may never get to this point again."

All indications have been that if every chance that Mexico's economy might dip even further, which would increase their problems.

Combest stressed the fact that he considered the vote on NAFTA a long-range political decision.

"Nothing is going to happen overnight. It will take awhile for the trade barriers to come down. Too many times in Washington we consider short-term decisions, which in the long run may not be in the best interests of the country,' he said.

The congressman pointed out that Mexico is currently our thirdbiggest and fastest-growing trade partner in the export business. "We do \$18 billion in exports with Mexico each year, but Mexico has two and one-half times the tarrifs on our goods than we have on ours.

Friona's United Way campaign for 1993 reached \$7,434.94 as of Wednesday's close of banking hours, it was reported.


The board of directors urges businesses and individuals who have not done so to return their packets.

# SPS Thumbs Nose Friona-Bovina

Southwestern Public Service placed. Co. president Coyt Webb, and four (SPS is attempting to cut cormeeting with Friona and Bovina residents at the Friona City Council meeting room Wednesday concerning the closure of the Friona SPS office and the elimination of the Bovina collection station.

A standing-room crowd attended the meeting, but overall received little satisfaction with the electric company's elimination of local of-

Howard and Minnie Kelso of Bovina and B.K. Buske of Friona spoke for those residents owning rental property, and pointed out the big inconvenience the change will cause to many rental customers when they need to open an account.

In most cases, it will be necessary for these electrical patrons to drive to Hereford (44 miles from Friona and 70 from Bovina) to pay the required deposit.

"We have a trailer park with ten electric meters, and they change frequently," Kelso told Webb.

Buske asked Webb if he had an School will be out Thursday, estimate as to the amount of proposed savings from closing the Friona office. "You spend thousands of dollars on P.R. (public relations) every year, and it seems to me that you're going to lose more on P.R. than what the savings will amount to," Buske said.

Webb indicated in a slide presentation to begin the meeting that electrical sales for Friona and Bovina amount to \$4.6 million per

Friona mayor Clarence Monroe voiced the concern that the closing of the Friona office would cause the company's service to be poor. "We have had this happen with another utility company that closed it's local office, and the service has really suffered," Monroe said.

Monroe pointed out that many electrical customers who pay their monthly bills do so with cash, and with the office closing, this will be a big hardship.

The SPS officials indicated that they planned to get with representatives of Friona State Bank and First Bank in Bovina/Muleshoe, to see if something can be worked out to allow patrons to pay their bills, both by check or cash, locally.

"We have done this for you the past 16-18 years, and haven't charged you a dime," said Jerry Hinkle of Friona State Bank. "But we got a letter from SPS the other day saying that would be eliminated."

Service complaints or questions will now be handled through an 800 number, answered in Hereford. Servicemen will then be dispatched by radio or FAX machine, out of Friona.

Concern was voiced as to what would happen when and if either of the two service people stationed at Friona were to change jobs or quit. Doyle Moore, service director for SPS, said that this situation had been addressed at Friona last summer, and the serviceman was re-

pointed out that SPS has previously closed offices in Texhoma, Oklahoma, Sudan, Silverton and Vega, with the closure of its McLean office pending.

SPS serves 96 communities and provides wholesale power to 16 rural electric cooperatives in the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

"It's possible. We would hope that we can handle it with the people we already have, but we just don't know," Webb responded.

A question was asked why a charge of a dollar per electric bill or so couldn't be applied so as to pay the salary and keep the local facility open. Moore answered, pointing out that SPS couldn't make such a charge without having it approved by the Public Utilities Commis-

Also attending from SPS were John McAfee and James Bagley of Amarillo, Lewis McDaniel, SPS district manager from Hereford (former Bovina SPS manager), and Danny Fiel, manager of the Friona office until it closed this week.

Fiel and Jon Hendrickson will remain as servicemen for Friona-Bovina.

In his preliminary remarks, Webb pointed out that Southwestern Public Service Company's service area covered 96 communities, 52,000 square miles and 350,000 customers in a three-state area.

Out of the 96 communities, 47 have offices, and 22 of these have 1 person on duty (besides the servicemen), as was Friona's case.



### Holiday Meals Can Be Low-Cal

For as long as I can remember, holidays have meant food--lots of food. And, for as long as I can remember, most of the people I know have been trying to lose weight.

Although I doubt our family get togethers will ever have less food, they can have less fattening food. With a few simple changes, we can serve basically the same foods but with less calories.

Thanksgiving meal, try the stirring frequently, until liquid is following:

\*Substitute low-calorie margarine (preferably the type that comes in a tub) for butter or regular margarine.

\*Use skim milk instead of whole milk.

instead of real eggs.

\*Use less sugar or use a sugar substitute in appropriate recipes.

\*Substitute "lite" bread for regular bread.

\*Offer more fresh fruit and less Salt and pepper, to taste heavy desserts.

\*Serve cider-based punch and bottled water in place of higher calorie soft drinks and alcohol-based drinks.

salad dressings. \*Put out large bowls of air-

popped pop corn and fresh vegetables with a bowl of chunky salsa rather than the more fattening mixed nuts, and chips and dip.

Try the following lower-calorie versions of your holiday favorites: LITE STUFFING

1/4 cup low-calorie margarine, divided

2 cups chopped onion 1/2 pound apples, cored, pared and

chopped 1/2 cup chopped celery 1/2 cup chopped green bell pepper

1 small garlic clove, minced 1/4 cup golden raisins, plumped by soaking in warm water

We have an opportunity to even this out," he said.

Mexico is one of the few nations with whom the U.S. enjoys a favorable balance of trade. There are over 700 American manufacturing jobs today that depend on exports to Mexico.

"This has been one of the most evenly-divided issues that I've had to deal with since I have been in Congress. There are some varied opinions on the issue. Some people strongly favor it, and some strongly oppose it," Combest said.

"This is not an issue that I feel really enthusiastic about, but I feel It also has been pointed out that like it's a good opportunity for us in the long run. It supercedes political boundaries, and is not at all partisan in nature. I finally decided that it would be better than the status quo," he added.

> "A lot will depend on how well the program is implemented, of course," was his final comment.

The congressman took time to answer all of the questions put to him by those newsmen included on the conference call.

Understanding Retirement Withdrawal Options

(Editor's note: the second of two columns on the 20 Per Cent Withholding Rule)

Any employee who plans to take a lump-sum distribution from an employer-sponsored retirement plan may be in for a costly surprise unless he or she knows about the 20 Per Cent Withholding Rule, which became effective January 1, happens if Jane takes possession of 1993.

possession of a lump-sum distribution from your employer's retirement plan: (1) your employer is required to withhold 20 per cent of the distribution for taxes; (2) any amount not rolled into an IRA or another qualified retirement plan within 60 days is taxed as ordinary income; and (3) if you are under age 59-1/2, an additional ten per cent penalty applies to any portion of the distribution not rolled over. (One exception: if you are between 55 and 59-1/2, and no longer employed, the ten per cent penalty will not apply to the qualified plan distribution.)

Following are three examples of the effects of the 20 Per Cent Withholding Rule:

Example #1: no rollover--Jane Doe, age 45, decides to change jobs after ten years with her employer. She has accumulated \$50,000 in her employer's qualified retirement plan. Jane decides to take her \$50,000 in a lump-sum distribution to help launch a new career. Because she does not roll the distribution into an IRA or other qualified retirement plan, her employer will withhold 20 per cent, or \$10,000, immediately, and she must pay income taxes on the entire amount.

> additional eight per cent, or \$4,000, in taxes, for a total of \$14,000. Because she is not yet 55, the total distribution is subject to an additional ten per cent penalty, or \$5,000, for early withdrawal. After taxes and penalties, Jane has only \$31,000 left from her original \$50,000 nest egg. What is left also has lost its tax-sheltered status, so any future earnings are subject to income tax.

Example #2: rollover--what her \$50,000 retirement fund in a The law states that if you take lump-sum distribution and rolls it over into an IRA? Because she took possession of the funds, her employer must withhold 20 per cent, or \$10,000. Jane now has only \$40,000 to roll over into her IRA. Since \$10,000 was not rolled over, Jane owes a ten per cent early withdrawal penalty and income taxes on the \$10,000 withheld. The only way for Jane to avoid this tax and penalty is to come up with \$10,000 from another source to make a total rollover of \$50,000. She can recoup the \$10,000 her employer withheld only when she files her tax return for that year.

Example #3: direct rollover--Jane decides that rather than taking possession of the funds, she will instruct her employer to make a direct rollover to her IRA. Jane's employer makes the \$50,000 check payable to "XYZ Trustee for the IRA of Jane Doe." The funds go from the former employer directly into the IRA--Jane never takes possession of the funds. There is no 20 per cent withholding or penalties, and the entire \$50,000 contiues to grow tax-sheltered.

These examples illustrate the importance of understanding your retirement withdrawal options under the new 20 Per Cent Withholding Rule. Consult a professional before you withdraw any retirement Assuming a 28 per cent funds. A little caution may save

#### Diabetes And Your Eyes

Diabetes is more than out-of-control blood sugar. It can affect the heart, the kidneys, the skin, the blood vessels and, most especially, the eyes. That's why a diabetic's eyes should be examined on a regular schedule, ranging from every three months to

every year. Temporary blurring may be caused by a blood sugar imbalance and usually clears up when blood sugar returns to normal, though temporary

glasses may be needed. The optometrist pays particular attention to the special vision risks--such as diabetic retinopathy--that accompany advanced or long-term diabetes. Sometimes, the leaking of retinal blood vessels will cause changes that permamently affect vision. In order to spot any changes before the patient even notices blurring or other symptoms, the eye doctor may dilate the patient's pupils in order to view the retina fully.
