### SOUTH PLAINS AND PANHANDLE COUNTIES COP PRIZES

Three Plains counties, Lubbock, Potter and Crosby swept all before them at the Dallas Fair this year. Out of the 22 exhibits from counties there this year, 15 of them was from the Plains country.

The Dallas News says: "Three counties from above the cap rock in the Panhandle-Plains country are reigning monarchs in agriculture in 1922 in so far as it is able to determine kings in the agricultural department of the State Fair of Texas. It was a sweeping triumph for West Texas when the list of winners was given out to the News exclusively, late Monday evening by the judges. Nine West Texas counties and most of them belonging to the Panhandle-Plains group, held undisputed sway at the top of the list before Hill county broke into the winning."

Prizes were provided for thirty winners but there were no claimants for the \$100 prizes. Twenty-two counties were represented, but El Paso county, because it made no effort to comply with the score card, was not in the competition.

Failure of a good many of the counties to comply with the accepted interpretation of the score card caused some of the counties to lose heavily in the scoring, it is said. There was a general misunderstanding about the provision requiring the showing of five kinds of fruits preserved. Only about three counties complied. The remainder showed five kinds of fruits in jars without regard to those they had shown as raw varieties.

Simplification of the rules has been under way for many years and some of the uncertainties will be cleared up when the exhibitors meet late in the week. Rules are made by the exhibitors in conference and then passed on to the Fair Association officials for approval and acceptance.

Last year's winners were noticeably absent from the top of the list this year. Hunt county, first winner last year was not represented. Haskell county, third place winner, last year, dropped out, and Ellis county, second place winner last year, was reduced to eleventh place.

B. M. Whitaker, who had charge of the Haskell county exhibit last year, is attending the show this year as exhibit manager for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and is collecting a choice representative exhibit for West Texas, that will be shown at the Houston Fair, the Cotton Palace at Waco and the Louisiana State Fair at Shreveport.

West Texas county exhibitors were in conference yesterday morning and accepted an invitation of R. B. Ellifritz, manager of the Adolphus Hotel, to attend a banquet for the exhibitors.

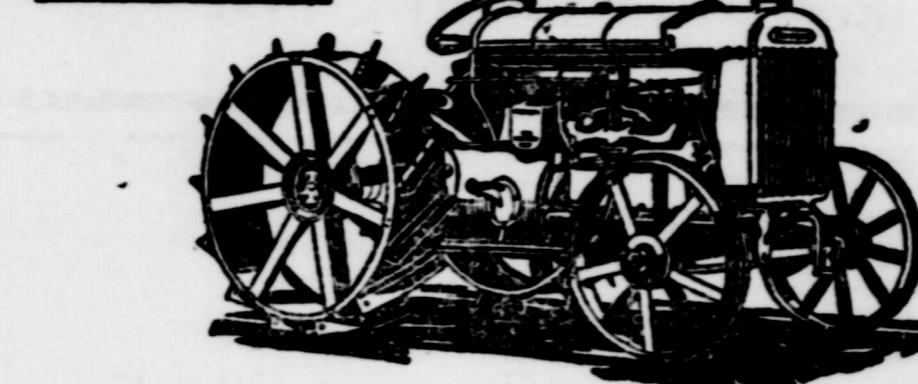

How Uncle Sam Spends Your Money in Conducting Your Business

### XVI. WHAT OF THESE OLD MEN?

Congress enacted a law in 1890 requiring all heads of departments and independent establishments in the federal service to report to the secretary of the treasury the number of employees under them who were below a fair standard of efficiency. Every year this is done and the letters to the secretary of the treasury from the various departments and bureaus are printed in the report of the appropriations committee for use by congress in making up the annual supply bills. Congress never pays the slightest heed to these reports. They are made up year after year, but the inefficient are never fired.

For example, last year the chief clerk of the treasury reported 170 employees of the Treasury department as below a fair standard of efficiency. But nothing will be done about it. The interior department reported 139 inefficient, and will probably go on reporting them as they die of old age. There are employees of the government in Washington who are totally blind and who are let from their homes to their offices each day and back home again in the afternoon.

I knew in 1920 one gentleman of ninety-two years who had been in the government service for seventy-two years. He was being paid at that time \$800 a year. His maximum pay during his long service was \$1800 a year. James K. Polk was President when this old gentleman came into the service.

He was born on January 10, 1828. His father was a captain of the regular army in the war of 1812. After that service he led an active life in other occupations until 1848, when he died, leaving a dependent family of nine persons, three of them boys. It fell to the lot of one of them to be the chief singer of the family.

It came to pass, then, that at the age of twenty he received through the influence of navy friends of his father a small clerkship at the naval observatory, then under the superintendence of that accomplished officer, Matthew Fontaine Maury, whom he served as amanuensis for ten years, accounting it a great privilege and pleasure to have heard Maury's voice dictating the words of sense and wisdom which make up the sailing directions, the wind and current charts and other publications issued from the observatory for the benefit of the world.

From a copyist at first, November 9, 1848, at \$3 a day, the young man was advanced as follows:  
July 1, 1853, clerk at \$1,200 a year; July 1, 1854, clerk at \$1,500 a year; July 1, 1870, principal clerk at \$1,800 a year; December 6, 1911, clerk at \$1,400 a year; May 1, 1918, stenographer and typewriter at \$900 a year. It will be seen that he was demoted in December, 1911, and again in May, 1918, to lower positions, involving less work and responsibility. These demotions were at his own request. In October, 1917, he received from the assistant secretary of the navy, Mr. Roosevelt, the following letter:

"I have to inform you that you have been granted leave without pay for six months beginning October 15, 1917. As you have been in the employ of the government now nearly sixty-nine years, and during all that time your record has been excellent, I re-

gret that there is no way in which the department could continue you on the rolls with compensation.

"I desire at this time to express the appreciation of the department for your long and satisfactory service, and the hope that you will be so benefited by this leave that you can return and resume your duties at its expiration."

I talked with one of the cabinet officers about the old and feeble employees. He said: "I don't know what congress intends to do about them, but I know what I intend to do with those in my department. I intend to leave them alone. They can stay here as long as they like, until some provision is made for them. When I was in the department I dismissed two of these old people and demoted another on the ground that they were superannuated and inefficient and were a hindrance to the work."

"All three of them wrote me sad letters and promptly committed suicide. That was enough and more than enough for me. Never again will I disturb one of them. I do not choose to have it on my conscience that I pronounced sentence of death on an old man or an old woman in the service of the government. They can all stay on here as long as they like. I found them here and some of them will be here when I leave. If congress chooses to provide for them that is its obligation. But I will never sentence another one of them to self-destruction, no matter what the cost to the taxpayer and the government."

### CLARKE QUITS AS KU KLUX KLAN WIZARD

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 4th.—Edward Young Clarke, acting imperial wizard of the Ku Klux Klan, has resigned. The United Press was informed today. No details were made public at the time his resignation was announced. Clarke is said to have become very wealby through his organization work of the Klan. The investigation of the Klan by Congress disclosed he and Mrs. Elizabeth Taylor accepted the promotion plan of the Klan on a commission basis.

An investigation of Clarke's record in Atlanta showed that he stood convicted of abandoning his wife and child and also that he pleaded guilty of disorderly conduct with Mrs. Taylor in an Atlanta rooming house.

Clarke is at present facing charges of violating the Volstead act in Intianapolis. He was arrested there after having made an address on law enforcement for having liquor in his grip. Clarke claimed the liquor had been "planted" there.

Several months ago Clarke visited Dallas and while here announced a plan to organize a Ku Klux militia for Dallas, the services of which would be offered the city and state government.
