## Pryor Honored By Vo-Ag Association

(From the Amarillo Globe-News)

Walking across the stage Wednesday night in Amarillo was one of the most memorable recent moments during Benny Pryor's 40 years of commitment to agriculture.

And the longtime Friona teacher said he wouldn't change it if he could. "It gets in your blood," Pryor said. "I've enjoyed it, and it's passed all two swiftly."

Pryor was honored Wednesday during the awards program of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas convention, meeting this week in Amarillo.

He received an honorary life membership in the association, along with his plaque commemorating 40 years as an agriculture teacher.

Pryor taught at New Home and Colorado City before spending the next 29 years teaching in Friona schools.

"I like interacting with people," he said, "and you can do it more easily in a smaller community."

Pryor likes the influence he has with his students most of all. During his stint at Friona, Pryor said he has influenced about 70 students per year although "some were repeats."

It's been rewarding to see the light dawn in a kiddo's eyes," he said. "As a teacher it makes it all worthwhile when they capture an idea or a philosophy."

Many of Pryor's students have gone on to agriculture-related fields in the Friona area, he said.

But Pryor doesn't measure his students' successes by whether or not they enter agriculture fields.

"I tried to lay the groundwork to give them the opportunity to succeed in whatever program they go into," he said.

Leadership and communicative skills are the most important lessons agriculture classes have to offer, Pryor said.

"You must be able to communicate in modern society," he said. "Other things are secondary, really and truly."

Pryor has few complaints about his 40 years of teaching. "It means a lifetime of work," he said. "It's your life, that's all there is to it. If I have a regret, it's that I didn't spend as much time with my wife and kids as I did with other kids."

Pryor and his wife Mary, who was with him Wednesday, have been married 40 years. They have two children, Keith and Vickie.

Pryor was honored earlier this year by the Friona Chamber of Commerce as its "Man of the Year." He has received numerous other awards, both on the local and state level, during his teaching career.

The girls will appear in the pageant in playwear, and later in dress wear. There is no talent act required for the pageant.

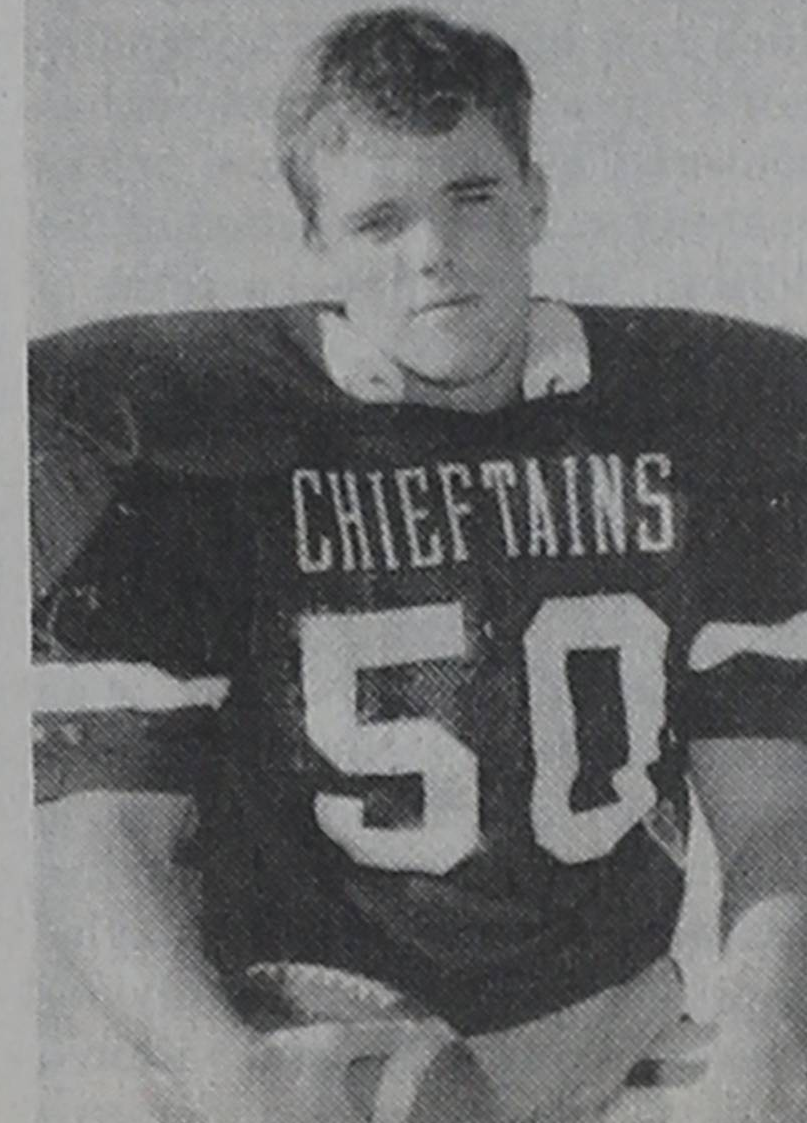

## Excel's Expansion Discussed

The \$11 million expansion project being undertaken by Friona's Excel plant should send a message loud and clear to the Friona community that the local slaughter plant is here to stay.

That's what plant manager Terry Wilkerson told members of the Friona Lions Club at the club's meeting last Thursday evening.

"Excel is re-investing \$11 million in our community, and this is quite a change from about a year ago when we were having all the trouble with the workmen's comp claims," Wilkerson said.

At that time, Wilkerson said it was feared that due to the high loss ratio, the Excel Corp. might have considered closing its two Texas plants (Excel also operates a slaughter facility in Plainview).

But the plant opted to drop workmen's comp in favor of its own insurance program, at a saving of \$6 to \$8 million per year.

The new construction will add 60,000 square feet of cooler expansion, Wilkerson said. "This will allow us to store the beef 48 hours in the cooler as opposed to the present 24 hours, and should be a tremendous benefit to the grade and quality of the meat," Wilkerson said. The difference between good and choice beef at the present time is about \$6 per hundred, of \$45 per animal, he said.

The additional time will also effect a saving of 1/10 of one per cent in shrink, which will amount to \$800,000 in a year's time at the Friona plant, the Excel official said.

The additional space could allow the plant to add jobs in the next three to five years, as it could increase the plant's kill capacity by three per cent per year. "We could be a major processor in the area," Wilkerson said.

Excel is also in the process of spending \$2 million to cool the plant for the comfort of its employees (also more heating for the winter time).

None were seriously hurt.

50 YRS. AGO--JULY 25, 1941

The members of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society, and the City of Canyon will inaugurate a Victory Campaign, for the completion of the proposed addition to the present building, which now houses the Panhandle-Plains Museum. The museum has sponsored a drive to have bricks donated for the construction of the addition, and to date, a total of 175,000 bricks have been received. 30 YEARS AGO--JULY 20, 1961

Plans for Friona's Country Club building have been completed, and within the next week, the board of directors will start seeking bids on the structure. The proposed clubhouse, on which bids will be sought, will be constructed of brick veneer. Overall dimensions will be 41x82-feet and will include a 41x82-foot social room, pro shop, cloak

room, kitchen and rest rooms.

25 YRS. AGO--JULY 21, 1966

Cecil Maddox of Whiteface has been employed as head boys basketball coach at Friona, it was announced this week. Maddox replaces John Anglin, holder of the position the past two years. Maddox will also be a math instructor at Friona High School.

20 YRS. AGO--JULY 22, 1971

Howard McLean, 37, is the new general manager of Missouri Beef Packers' Friona Division. McLean replaced Dave LaFleur, who became company president on July 1, and has moved to MBP's Amarillo office.

15 YEARS AGO--JULY 18, 1976

For the second straight year, residents of the Friona Independent School District will feel the sting of a tax increase, due to the new Public School Financing Law (HB 1116). The tax increase will be 20 cents per \$100 evaluation, making the tax rate \$1.75 per \$100.

Mid-year figures released this week by Friona State Bank indicates that the community is in a healthy condition. According to the

quarterly statement published by the bank, its depositors had on deposit as of June 30, 1976, a total of \$23,147,000. This represented an increase of \$2,304,000, or 11 percent, from the same date a year earlier.

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# T for TEXAS

## “Model T Graffiti”

 “Little Go-Creep,” “Leaping Lena,” “Puddle Jumper,” and “Public Enemy No. 1”—what are they?

These are all names that Texas teenagers gave to their Model T Fords sixty years ago.

By the end of the 1920's, millions of Model T Ford cars were scattered around the country. Fifteen million of them had been produced from 1908 to 1927, and many of them had been cast aside by their owners in favor of shiny new Ford Model As, Chevrolets or Dodges. This made the broken-down Model Ts available and within the price range of teenagers—the first generation of American adolescents able to buy cars in large numbers.

No sooner did the teenagers start buying the old Model Ts than did they start covering them with graffiti, including such painted-on names as those above. The spontaneous painting, however, did not end merely with names. The flippers often became virtual canvasses for their creative owners.

One of the characteristics of the Model T was that its engine often far outlasted its body. Consequently the cars didn't necessarily look bad, although they didn't look completely disreputable either. For many of the teenaged

drivers, the latter state was far preferable to obscure mediocrity, so they began covering their car bodies with painted-on epigrams and graffiti.

The painting usually began with a name. A sophomore at T.C.U., for example, called his car “A Chemical Disturbance.” West Texas State University professor Fred Rathjen told me that he remembered a flivver in Corpus Christi named “Bored of Education.”

A number of epigrams referred to the sheet iron from which the Model T bodies were made. “Beauty is only tin deep,” “The tin you love to touch,” “The spirit is willing but the body is weak,” and “Don't laugh; you may be old yourself some day,” were widely popular. “Fishy Body,” on the side of the car, referred to the Fisher Bodies used on General Motors vehicles.

The broad rear body panels on the Model T cars offered a wide canvas for painting. Some of the typical teenagers' comments included “My rear is no bumper,” “To pass right, pass left,” “Don't rush me, Big Boy,” and “If you hit this car, you have gone too far.” One of the Model T epigrams which survives on present-day cars is the occasionally seen, “Follow me for parts.”

Almost everywhere on a Model

T might be seen such inscriptions as “A wreck but nobody killed,” “An accident ready to happen,” “Don't laugh; I once was the property of a Detroit millionaire,” “Almost human,” and “Beauty in every jar.” If a door refused to stay closed, it might be marked, “Open at all hours.” Convertible touring cars frequently bore such inscriptions as “Fresh Air Taxi,” “Sun Parlor,” and “Sun Tan Special.”

By the spring of 1929, the Model T epigrams had grown more and more off-color, perhaps a sign of adolescent rebellion against parental and societal restraints. Some of these taunting words included, “I'm old, but I still get hot,” “Experienced women wanted,” and “Constipated—can't pass a thing.”

The situation grew so nettling to local police officers in Fort Worth that they complained to the press of “numerous rickety machines...being driven through the streets...‘decorated’ and lettered” with objectionable language. “The practice of driving in such cars must be stopped,” declared a huffy Police Lieutenant Robert Dysart, who was looking for charges which he might place against the most offensive of the adolescent drivers.

Lieutenant Dysart undoubtedly would have been equally upset had he gone thirty miles south to Cleburne, where my father, Garnell A. Baker, was a teenager at the time. There one of his good friends scandalized the town with his Model T emblazoned on the side, “Girls who smoke, throw your butts in here.”

# Absentee Voting Is Underway Locally

Absentee voting is underway at the Superintendent's office, 909 E. 11th Street in Friona, for the special election allowing taxpayers to vote on tax exemptions for the Parmer County Education District.

The election will be held on Saturday, August 10. Polling place will be the Friona Fire Station.

Two elections will actually be held on August 10, one being a county-wide and state-wide election which is the enabling vehicle for the County Education District to make the tax exemptions.

The polling places for this special election will be the regular polls (Calvary Baptist Church, Friona Fire Station and Friona Community Center).

In addition to the constitutional amendment election, voters in the county will vote on three tax exemptions which have been drawn up by the newly-formed County Education District.

The County Education District was created from recently passed legislation concerning the school financing in Texas. Under the new laws, Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie school districts will be lumped together into one taxing unit that will have to adopt a common school tax rate.

Everyone used to be a resident of just one school district, but now in essence they will be residents of two—their regular district and the County Education District.

The maximum tax rate the County Education District can charge is 72 cents per \$100 of assessed evaluation. That figure is based upon state property tax values. If a school district's normal tax rate is set at \$1 per \$100 of assessed value, then the school district will have to tax 28 cents per \$100 to make up the difference.

The actual dollar amount taxpayers owe won't change that much, but it will be divided and paid to two different taxing entities.

The exemptions voted on will help determine at what rate the County Education District's tax rate will be set.

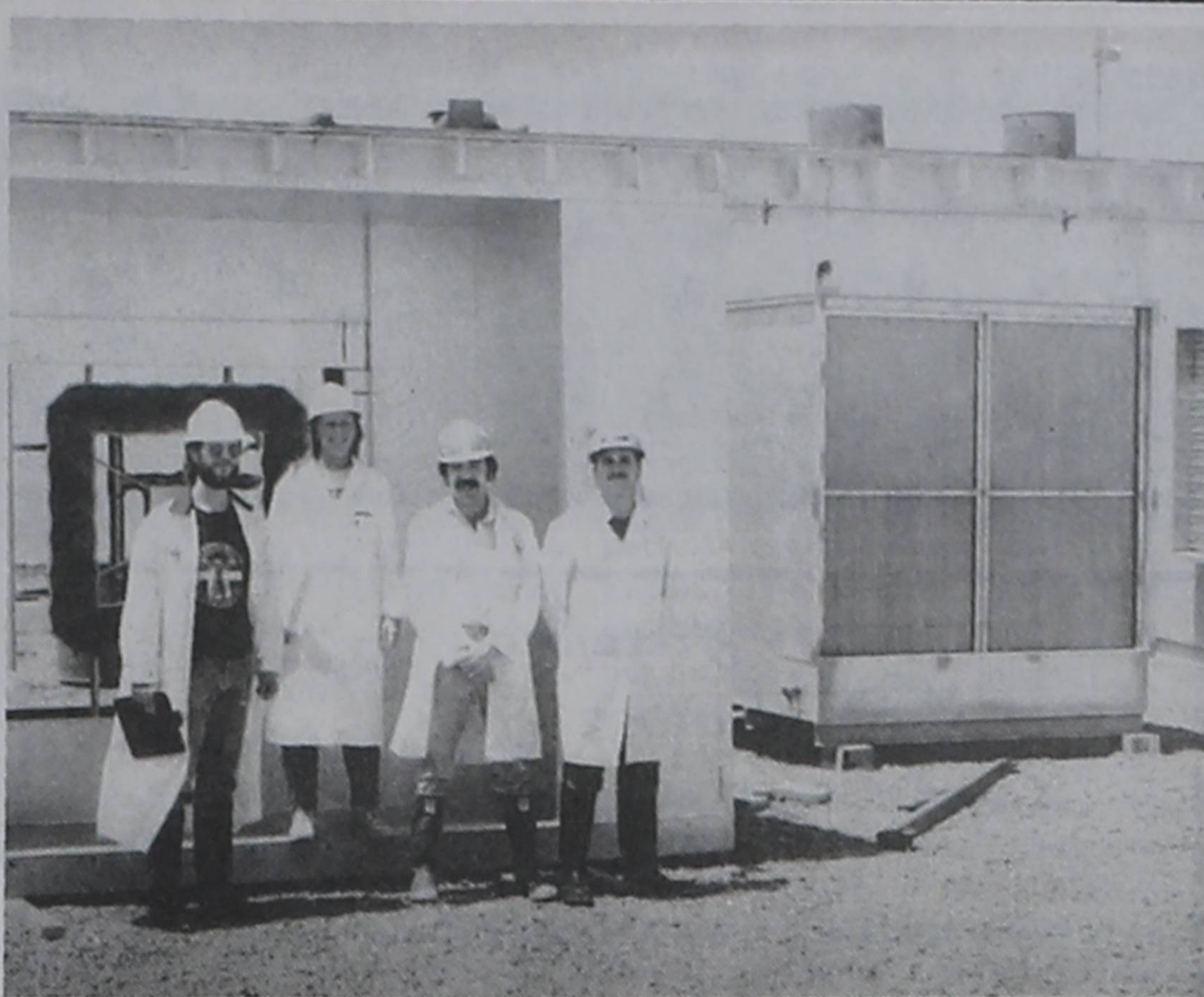

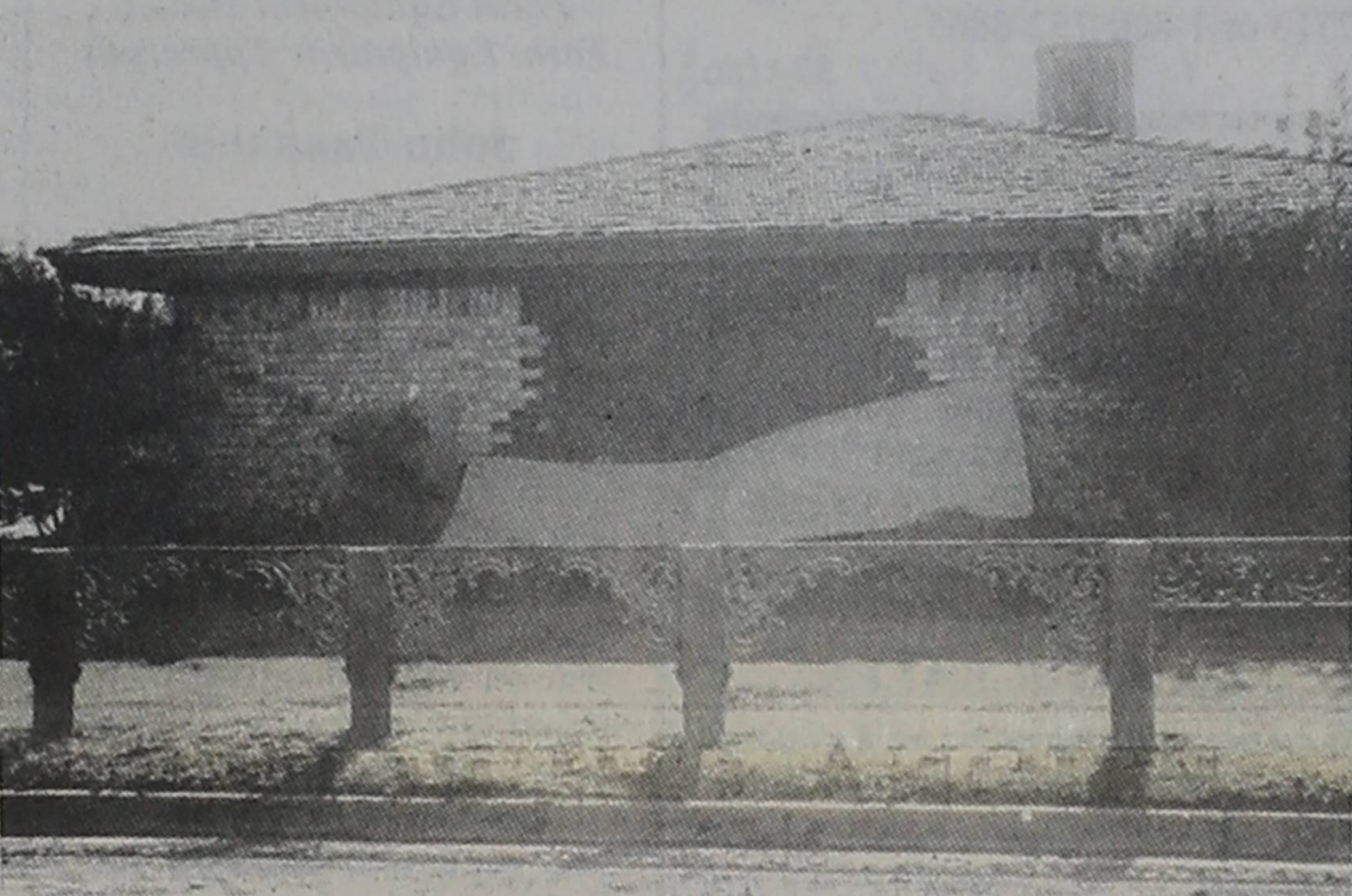

# Excel Slaughter Div. Gets New Cooling

Excel Friona is in the process of installing two evaporative cooling units on the slaughter floor. The contractor installing the units, Central Air Control, is from Wichita, Kansas.

The gigantic air conditioners will cool the slaughter floor temperature twenty degrees below the outside air temperature. The cooling units will move 120,000 cubic feet per minute of cooled air.

Roughly translated, that means there will be a complete circulation of air once every two minutes. The units will be equipped with heating elements which will heat the slaughter floor in the winter.

"The people of Excel have earned this one with their number one safety record and quality work!" says Terry Wilkerson, general manager of Friona's Excel plant. One Excel employee stated "This is a great improvement for us at Excel. It's a good deal for the slaughter floor workers!"

Friona's Excel plant has come from last place to first place in safety within Excel the last two quarters running.

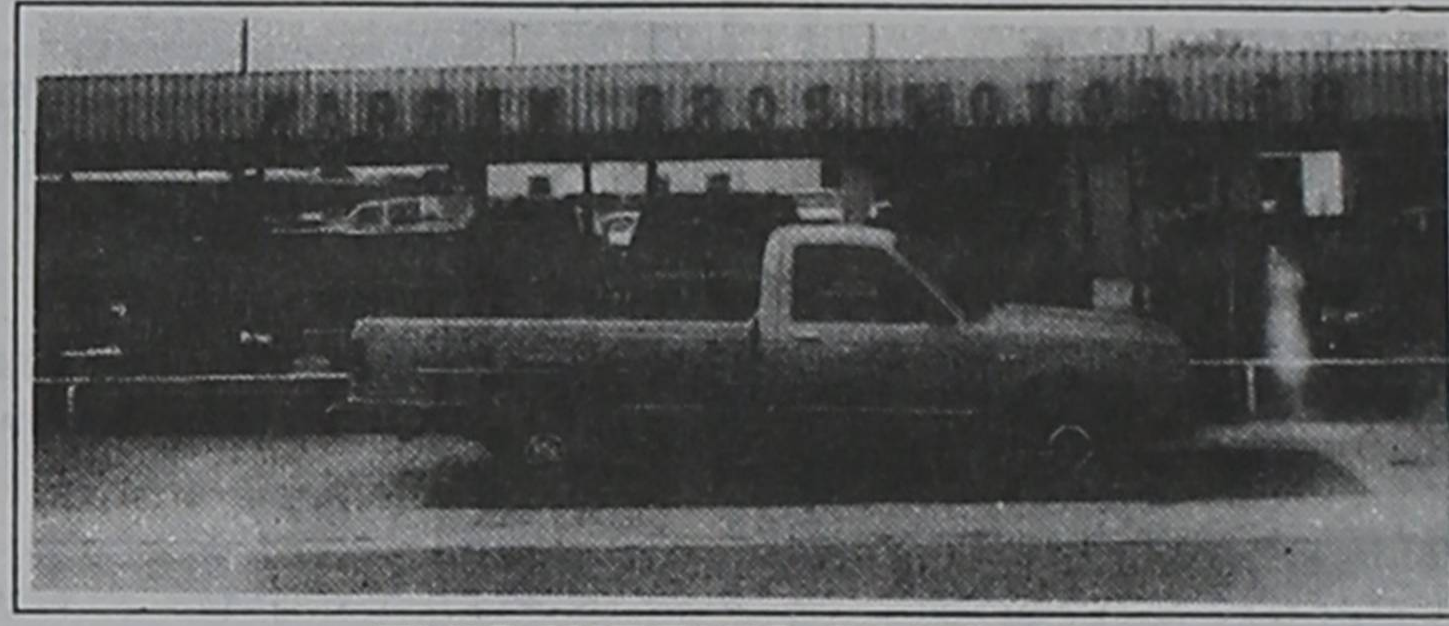

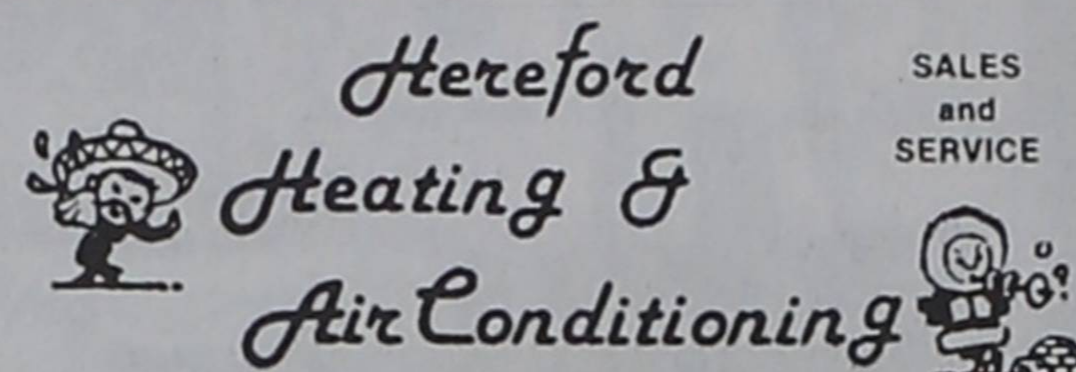

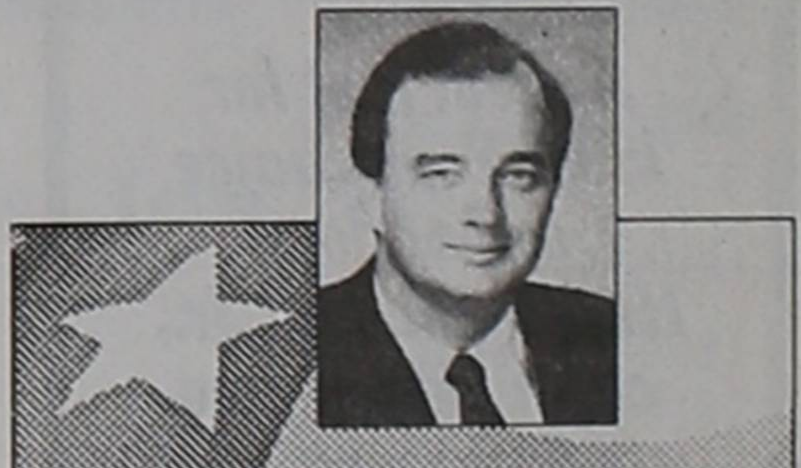

**Winning**

Funny, how memories creep upon you when your mind rests quietly. Recently, on a trip to visit my daughter, Wende, at Texas Christian University, a memory of her middle school popped into my mind.

Wende was thirteen when she tried out for cheerleader. The first day of practice, she came home and enthusiastically showed me all the difficult gyrations and body distortions she was going to exhibit in an attempt to win a place on the cheerleading team.

I asked her what she thought her chances were. "About 40%," she replied with an awkward smile. "But," she said, "I'm going to have fun trying, and if I don't make it this year, I'll have a better chance at it next year."

My goodness, I thought to myself, where did she learn that? With that kind of attitude she was always going to be a winner. Whether she wins the crown or the wreath or the cheerleader's sweater, or whether she fails to win any rewards or prizes, she is still going to be a winner because of her tremendous attitude.

Now, I guess you think I'm going to tell you that she tried out for cheerleader and made it. But she didn't. When I picked her up at school, she was disappointed, but not discouraged. She had succeeded in having fun and was convinced she'd be better next year. "Besides," she said, "the other girls were better." She showed no sign of envy or jealousy. She was too busy enjoying herself by competing. Now that's a winning attitude. And that's the way she's been all of her life.

Later, as my wife and I arrived in Ft. Worth and were sitting down in a quiet restaurant to have dinner, I shared my memory with Wende. She recalled the disappointment, but said she didn't get discouraged because she saw the tryout as a test of her will power and determination. I then asked Wende, for fun, to list factors that she felt marked a winner. She came up with seven:

\*The first principle for becoming a winner, the first rule of success, is to be able to work hard. Work hard, enjoy your work.

\*The second key is a good attitude. Wende likes the axiom: the tougher the job, the greater the reward.

\*Rule number 3: get emotional support from your family and friends.

\*The fourth factor for a winner: feed your mind positive thoughts. If you don't think positively, pretty soon your mind is ruminating on your problems.

\*Rule number five: do something to improve every day. If you don't, you're going to slide. Do something, however small. Act.

\*Remember: no one can beat you unless you beat yourself. The other person won't continue to work that hard. Want success badly enough to persist despite set-back after set-back.

\*Finally: keep in mind that success is measured in doing your best, not by results in competition.

Winning, that period of excellence that sets one person aside from the rest, is the ability to persist despite defeat. Ask, seek, knock. The winning comes from seeking and knocking, from persistence in the pursuit of excellence.

Instead of criticizing or complaining, winners try to improve a situation. They are generous with praise. They express love and appreciation to others. Because winners expect good things to happen, they are seldom disappointed.

Winners are too busy for envy and jealousy. They're too busy developing their talents and skills to resent the success of others. Indeed, winners use others' successes as an inspiration to their own achievement. Winners think, "If he or she can do it, so can I."

The winners, the champions of life, show up ahead of time, ready to go. They are clear-headed, excited, open-minded, ready to learn and give. Their plans are made but they are flexible enough to change if necessary. They know that others make way and move aside for those who know what they want and move confidently toward it.

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## Killing The Spirit Of The Child

 (Editor's note: Diane Rodgers is a former Friona resident who has worked with abused children for the past eight years. She is currently working on a degree in education. She plans to write a series of columns dealing with child abuse, and how to prevent it.)

This crime is committed every day. What does it mean? While attending a class on Eliminating Self-defeating Behavior, taught by Dr. Terry Waldren, a psychologist in Lubbock, he said that child molesting immediately kills the spirit of the child.

The book, "The Courage to Heal, a Guide for Women Survivors of Child Sexual Abuse," explains this further. "When children are sexually abused, their natural sexual capacity is stolen. The child was introduced to sex on an adult's time-table, according to an adult's needs. They never had a chance to explore naturally, to experience their own desires from the inside. Sex arousal became linked to feelings of shame, disgust, pain and humiliation. Pleasure became tainted as well. And desire (the abuser's desire) was dangerous, an out-of-control force used to hurt you." The child's innocence was stolen. It is absolutely the responsibility of the adult not to be sexual with children.

Dr. Gene G. Abel, a professor of psychiatry at the Emory University of Medicine and director of the Behavioral Medicine Unit, did an eight year study of 403 child molesters. He found that more than 67,000 children had been molested by these 403 abusers.

One out of three girls and one out of five boys will be molested by the time they are 18 years of age.

The characteristics of a sexual abuser do not portray the sleazy slimy man standing at the playground bribing children with candy. He is usually 20-40 years, caucasian, has college experience, and a full-time job. The probability is he will be married and have children of his own. He seeks employment where he can work with children and not be

suspected. Some of these employments are Boy Scout leader, teacher, youth minister, and so on.

A molester was asked how he began committing the crime, the molester claims he wants to first gain the love and respect of the parents of the targeted child. One teacher told that first he would tell the kids a secret and see who were the ones to keep it. The next step was to see which child followed orders. If they couldn't keep the secret or were hard to control, he would stay away from them. He was always looking for the child who was well-behaved, kept a secret, and did what he was told. Molesters will spend months selecting and preparing victims.

A well-known Boy Scout leader was loved by all the parents. He ate meals at the parents' house, while sexually abusing their sons on the campouts. He is a great manipulator.

Sex abuse is an addiction. It can't be cured overnight. It will not stop if gone untreated. It is like an alcoholic who always needs a drink; the desire to sexually abuse a child is always with the sex offender. The only treatment is counseling and a strong desire within the person to quit.

In the case of the Boy Scout leader, the boys finally told. The parents did not press charges, but made him promise to never be a Scout leader again and to move out of town. He moved out of town, but this man is sexually abusing other children. He won't make the same mistake twice. He is better and wiser. He could be preparing your child to be his next victim.

It's great to be back in Friona, Texas after an absence of about two weeks and...no telling how many miles spent travelling in seven states. I'm sure that one of the nicest things about taking a trip is getting home, un-laxing and enjoying pleasant memories.

After having a grandson, Brandon Dickson, visiting in my home a couple of weeks, he and I drove to Elkhart, Kansas, where he met the rest of his family, Richard, Frieda and Barrett, at the home of Gerald, Jana and Sarah Floyd.

Enroute we saw many beautiful fields of growing crops on each side of the Canadian River breaks, where grass, mesquite and wild flowers were growing in abundance.

The second leg of our journey took us through the eastern part of Colorado across the state to Julesburg and into Nebraska. We had travelled Highway 385 before, but we had never stopped at Burlington, which is the county seat of Kit Carson County and a very pretty town.

Signs along the way advertising the Kit Carson County Carousel attracted our attention and we followed them to satisfy our curiosity and were not disappointed when we reached our destination.

The Kit Carson County Carousel is a beautifully colored fully operating wooden carousel, which is housed in a twelve sided building, located on the Carson County Fairgrounds.

The carousel, which was manufactured in Philadelphia in 1905 for Elitch's Gardens, an amusement park in Denver, was operated there until 1928 when it and a 1912 Wurlitzer Monster Military Band Organ were sold to Kit Carson County.

Forty-six hard carved animals, which have had their original paint restored, and four chariots are mounted on a 45 foot diameter platform in rows of three. Included in the line-up, which marches counter clockwise, are a seahorse, a lion, a tiger, a dog, several zebras, camels, goats, deer, giraffes and a large number of magnificent horses. The animals do not go up and down.

The sixteen outside row animals are the largest and most intricately carved. The texture of the individual animal's coats has been authentically detailed and some of the antlers and tails are real. The glass eyes appear to be real.

The machinery which operates the carousel, is covered with oil paintings of various sizes and most of them reminded me of some of the first manufactured Valentines I ever saw.

The carousel is open each day from 1-8 p.m. from Memorial Day to Labor Day.

The area around the carousel has been developed into a turn-of-the-century Victorian park. If you are ever in the area, be sure to stop and take a look for yourself.

Soon after we drove into Nebraska, we turned east and west to Cheyenne, Wyoming. We didn't stop in Wyoming's capital city going up, but on our return trip, we viewed the Frontier Days Parade, which took about two hours to pass a given point.

This was by far the most elaborate parade I have ever seen. It surprised me that there were so many antique cars, horse-drawn vehicles, bands, horses, riders and elaborate floats. There were also mules. Some of them carried saddles and riders and others carried packs.

The bottom line is that it is one of those things that a person has to see for himself before he can believe it.

Our next stop was at Custer's Battlefield. We had been there several times before but learn something new every time we are there. At the present time, there's talk of changing the name, but some staff members reported doubts that this would ever come to pass.

We spent about ten days on the Phillips Bar Diamond Ranch, where Wes, Susan, Clint, Kory and Ty live. Joel Osborn of Abilene, Texas (my number one grandson) is part of the hay making crew this summer, so we had eleven family members together.

Central Montana has had an ample supply of moisture this

year, so ranchers are busy harvesting a bumper hay crop. The winter wheat was beginning to ripen and most of the spring wheat had headed.

We concluded our trip by getting back to Amarillo in time to meet Susan, who had flown down for the reunion of Friona High School's 1971 graduating class. She had a few extra days, so we spent it visiting in the homes of John and Geneva Osborn in Tipton, Oklahoma and Gerald, Jana and Sarah Floyd.

Of course, these trips included stops at several different places to visit relatives and friends. All of this added up to a wonderful eighteen days, with being at home adding icing on the cake.

### One Solution To The Program Trading Controversy Is Education

Program trading--high-speed computerized institutional trading--is a highly emotional, controversial issue. Critics of program trading press for more government control and urge investors to write their members of Congress to not just limit the practice but to abolish it entirely. Many experts even blame program trading for the market crash of October, 1987.

As with most issues, the truth about program trading is somewhere in the middle. For example, completely eliminating program trading could destroy the U.S. market's competitive edge in our increasingly global economy. Some experts say that if program trading were not allowed in the United States, the traders would simply move their activities to

Tokyo, London or elsewhere. Although your first reaction may be indifference, the fact is that in order to maintain liquidity, the stock market needs the volume generated by program traders.

The key to coping with program trading seems to be education. Most informed investors are reluctant to substitute legislation for education. Once the emotional hurdles are overcome, market declines, caused in part by program trading, can be used as buying opportunities for undervalued securities. An informed investor who has done enough homework can anticipate unreasonable surges due to program trading and place order limits well below the market.

Long-term investors are generally less concerned about erratic market movements than are short-term traders. Although quality stocks suffer during a market loss, their value as an investment remains intact. Investors recognize this, hold onto their stock and wait for it to inevitably regain its market value.

Program trading is an issue that is being closely studied by the investment community. The jury is still out, so there's time to make your feelings known.
