THE COW, SOW AND HEN TRAIN VIEWED BY CROWDS

The Santa Fe Officials were Pleased With Crowds Here and at Seagraves that Came Despite the Raging Storm.

The citizens of Brownfield and especially the Chamber of Commerce were disheartened to say the least when a raging storm and overcast skies greeted them Monday morning when they were hoping that the day would be like Sunday—a balmy, ideal spring day. They could not figure on but a few hundred at best, but when the special hove in sight 1500 people were on hand to greet it. So fierce did the blinding northeast wind rage that lots of people hunted fires down town instead of standing in line for two hours in order to go through the train. Just 1392 people went through the train here and 722 at Seagraves.

Officials of the train said that this was the first town to greet them with a brass band on the entire trip, and they were profuse in their compliments of the music rendered, and especially when they learned how long the band had been organized. The official of the road were especially struck with the sign carried by the band which pictured a cow, sow and hen, under which was these words: "This Band is Blowing for the Cow, Sow and Hen." The official photographer made a picture of the band boys and the banner which will ap-

pear later in the Herald, official publication of the Santa Fe, according to Mr. Hove, assistant editor of the publication, who was along. Mr. Hove also gathered numerous other statistical facts about Terry county to be used later in that paper.

The milk cow, the hog and poultry are reliable sources of income on the farm is the message of the Santa Fe Railway—A. & M. Cow, Sow and Hen Demonstration Train to the people of Terry, Gaines, Yoakum and Hockley Counties. The train carried an able staff of lecturers, but owing to the high wind, and cold weather, but few people got much real good out of it. These lecturers from the College had three splendid car exhibits of milk cattle, hogs and poultry.

The first meeting on Monday was held at Seagraves in Gaines county, and the second at Brownfield in Terry county. Farmers, their wives and came from far and near. The interest manifest was very marked both in the lectures and exhibits.

The exhibits included a Holstein bull of national fame, weighing 2700 pounds; a Holstein cow with a record of 26,000 pounds of milk and a net profit of \$1,000.00 in one year; a Jersey cow with a record of 10,000 lbs. of milk and 600 pounds of butter in one year; five Guernseys and Ayrshires; big hogs and fine poultry.

J. D. Tinsley, agricultural agent of the Santa Fe Railway, opened the meeting with a general statement that farmers who milked a few cows,

raised brood sows, and kept a bunch of chickens came through the depression in better shape than the one crop farmer. Mr. Tinsley called attention to the splendid work of the A. & M. College is doing to help farmers of the state and said that the Santa Fe believed it was worth while to bring the college to the farmer's door by the train.

Geo. P. Gout, head of the Dairy Department of the College urged the importance of increasing the production of milk and butter and said this could be surely and quickly accomplished by the use of good dairy sires in the farm herd. Raise better cows from the present herd by the use of high class sires," said Mr. Gout.

"The hog is the farmer's mortgage lifter, if you have a fair chance," said D. W. Williams, professor in the Animal Husbandry department in charge of swine. "He has come rightly to this title in sections where he is properly understood. He is more; he furnishes the summer supply of cured meat; he turns into meat a lot of feed around the farm which otherwise would go to waste. The hog gains on less feed per unit of grain than any other farm animal, and when ready for the market he sells for an average price higher than the average of any other classes of animals. Just give the hog a chance and he will repay you handsomely."

The following are with the train from the A. & M. College: Geo. P. Gout, head of the Dairy Department; D. D. Williams, professor of Animal Husbandry in charge of swine; J.W. Jennings, of the Extension Service; T.B. Wood, district agent of the Extension Service; J. W. Ridgway, director of the Extension Service of the Mistletoe Creamery Company.

The Santa Fe men in the party are J. D. Tinsley, Agricultural Agent in charge of the speaking program; T. B. Gallaher, General Freight and Passenger Agent in charge of the train; W. E. Goodloe, division freight and passenger agent; J. F. Anton, division superintendent; Dan Trahey, trainmaster; A. M. Hove, assistant editor, The Herald.

The attendance at Seagraves included delegations from a number of country schools, three different ones alone brought in 112 children from the upper grades. About 500 school children saw the exhibits in Brownfield, but owing to the inclemency of the weather, the schools out of town around Brownfield did not dismiss.

In view of the rumors that are being spread, we, the members of the Brownfield Independent School Board hereby give the following information:

The bonds for \$25,000.00 only have been contracted for at a premium of \$550.00 above par, subject to the election. Contract for the six room addition to the school building has been let at a figure which we consider a saving to the district, and to a contractor who is highly recommended and who has been requested to make bond for 50 per cent of the cost of the building. The contract was let for \$13,625.00. This includes not only the building of the six rooms, practically one-half the size of the present building, but also the two rooms and hall in basement are to have concrete floors and covered with yellow pine flooring, and the old building re-covered. This price also includes plans, blue prints and specifications of the building. No commission has been considered. There were two other bids made on the building.

We have taken these actions subject to the election, and in order that if the election results in favor of the bonds, that the building might be ready for the next term of school.

The board had nothing whatever to do with the purchasing of material. Our actions have been for what we thought to be the best interests of the school without any favors to any individual, firm or corporation.

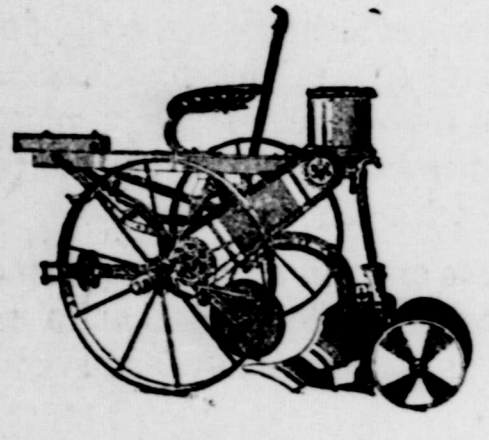

THAT SCHOOL SCANDAL

Mr. Street Talk has it going. There is something dead up the creek there is a bug under the chip; there is a lot of crooked work; that school board must be a bunch of crooks.

Misdam Gossip has it going every year I have lived here (four) years and such rumors are circulated about the board each year. The election comes around and the voters go to the polls and elect new trustees—men who have always been of good repute—honest, honored and loved by their fellow citizens and neighbors, but as soon as they get on the school board they degenerate, become dishonest, begin grafting, pulling crooked deals, they lose the respect and esteem of their once friends and neighbors. Election time comes around again: a new board is elected, true blue, honest and tried men, but as soon as they get on this august and dignified school board, they likewise become polluted, corrupt and degenerate, and the same program is repeated each year. I was just thinking if the community could evolve some plan by which our school board's character could be strengthened instead of destroyed, a plan by which we could start good reports instead of bad ones, by which we could hand a few bouquets instead of clubs, that we might build up and strengthen the citizenship of the entire district.

Now just a word about our school bonds. More room is badly needed. Twelve teachers and only eight rooms. We must have more room if our school is efficient.

We supply our children with food and clothing so their bodies may develop, and every parent delights to see his child's body develop properly.

by. How about the child's mind? We can dwarf, starve or hypo a child's mind the same as the body.

When we made our solemn marriage vow, that vow carried with it the responsibilities of fatherhood and motherhood. If a parent refuses to provide food for his child he is a criminal. What is he if he dwarfs, starves or hypos his mind? The mind needs the same careful attention for development as the body, and after all, the best paying investment any parent or community can make is in the lives of their children. 116,080 Fords For February Shortest Month Brings New Sales Record

Acute Situation Certain As 6,000 Cars A Day Production Fails To Meet Demand

Detroit Michigan: With 116,000 Ford Cars sold at retail in February, a new record for the shortest month in the year has been established. February sales exceeded those of January by more than 15,000 and marked the eleventh month in which Ford sales have topped the 100,000 line.

This sales record bears out predictions made at the opening of the year that an acute shortage is expected to be felt within the next two months with the increased volume of car buying which is always attendant upon the spring months.

Even the high production schedule set at the Ford Motor Company's factory here, which will reach 6,000 cars and trucks a day about April 1, will be unable to meet the apparent demand for Ford products.

Anticipating a great increase in the demand for Ford Cars during the present year, the factory here laid plans for increasing production to 6,000 cars a day schedule and since January first had been constantly speeding up manufacture to reach this figure. Demand so far has been of such great proportions as to absorb nearly all production, and stocks in hands of dealers are at present the lowest they have been in months.

February sales of 116,080 cars were made in the face of unfavorable weather conditions in many sections of this country which tied up freight traffic and prevented many deliveries. This was particularly true throughout the Northwest, the northern tier of states and in New England. In California too, cold weather during part of the month had its effect upon car sales.

Yet with even these unfavorable conditions, the February sales topped those of January by 15 per cent and set a new high record for mid-winter selling.

With February the eleventh month in which Ford Car sales have gone over the 100,000, the total for this period is close to 1,250,000 cars.

Peak car sales are usually reached during the summer months which drops in the fall and winter. This feature of automobile absorption by the buying public has been completely changed during the last few months through the activities of the Ford dealer organization which has raised the "peak" to include every month in the year.

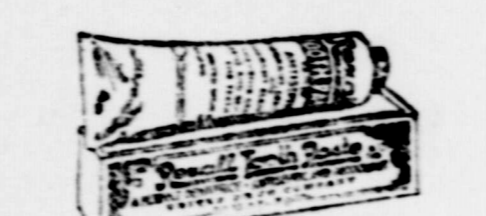
