15,000 PHYSICIANS **HAVE BOGUS LICENSE**

BELIEF OF FORMER EXAMINER, Diplomatic Relations Severed as So-WHO ALLEGES FRAUDULENT DIPLOMA "RINGS."

Diploma Mills Are Operating in the Eastern Part of the Country and in California.

St. Louis, Mo.—The belief that ap ment. proximately 15,000 physicians are practicing in the United States under bogus licenses obtained through the fraudulent issuance of high school and medical school diplomas by "rings" in various parts of the country, was expressed here by William F. Saens, former examiner for the Missouri School Department, in a statement to Howard Sidener, circuit tatorney.

Sachs, who was sought by police since Monday in connection with the expose here of a "diploma ring." which was alleged to be selling diplomas to unqualified persons, voluntarily appeared at Circuit Attorney Sidener's office and in a long conference admitted his part in the "mill." He named Dr. Robert Adcox of St. Louis and Drs. D. R. Alexander and Ralph Voight of Kansas City as members of the "mill." The three physicians named have been arrested and released on bond.

During the conference Sachs said he had evidence of at least 100 physicians practicing throughout the country without genuine licenses and would later present these names to Sidener together with those he believes are operating in Missouri

under fraudulent licenses. Sachs told Sidener that he had sold principally the high school certificates, although he admitted having sold a few medical school diplomas. He said during the last ten years he had sold approximately 1,000 high school diplomas for sums ranging from \$5 to \$100.

Sachs added that "diploma mills" also were operating in the eastern part of the country and in California.

HOLD LIQUOR MAY BE MADE AS A MEDICINE

Status of Manufacture Must Be Settled by Jury Under Facts, Says Appeals Tribunal

Austin, Texas.-Nowhere in the Dean liquor law, as originally enacted by the Thirty-Sixth Legislature, or amended by the Thirty-Seventh Legislature, can there be found a provision making it a penal offense or fixing the punishment for manufacturing intoxicating liquors for medicinal purposes without a permit, the Court of Criminal Appeals held in reversing and remanding the case of Gabriel Horak, from Milam County, convicted on a charge of manufacturthe Stresemann Government if the ing liquor and sentenced to eighteen

Also it is the opinion of the court that permit is not required for the transportation of liquor to be used for medicinal cases. This was held in reversing and remanding the case Premier Zeigner of Saxony ignored of L. A. 



MONUMENT ERECTED TO THE SCRUB HOG

Th records show that among farmr followers in Texas the scrub hog outnumbers the purebred twenty-one to one, or 300,000 to 17,000 approxi-

Realizing that the scrub undermines and depresses the Fort Worth. Houston and San Antonio hog markets and through these every local market in Texas, the livestock men of Collin County began to make investigations and found that in 1922 the inferior carcus of the scrub hog. while costing the farmer more to produce sold for \$4,000,000 less than a similar number of well bred market hogs would have brought. As a result of the Purebred Livestock Association of Collin county, the leading farmers, business men, Chambers of Commerce, etc., of the county determined to wage a war on the scrub hog. The leading breeders offered o give a purebred boar to any farmer in the county in exchange for his scrub boar, and the proposition met with such universal response that the co-operating interests of the county determined to have a celebration at McKinney, Texas, October 11th, and erect a monument to the scrub hog. On this occasion T. O. Walton, direcor of the extension service, A. & M. College of Texas, spoke in part as ollows:

"There are 6000 farmes in Collin county according to the 1920 census. total acreage planted to corn in 1920 was 73,528, the remainder being plant ed to small grain, the larger part of which was sold as a cash crop. Perhaps three-fourths of the total acreage in cultivation is planted each year to what is regarded by the farm er as a cash crop to be marketed during the year. 

RAPID GROWTH HAS COME TO BAPTISTS

& MILLION CAMPAIGN HAS LENT STRENGTH TO EVERY DE. PARTMENT OF WORK

RESULTS IN SOUTH NOTED

Home and State Missions, Schools, Orphanages, Hospitals and Relief Report Marked Advances Under Forward Movement

Suggesting the growth which the Baptist 75 Million Campaign has brought to the general work of Southern Baptists, it is reported by the general headquarters of the movement that during the four years that have intervened since the Campaign was inaugurated in 1919, the denomination has gained 57 district associations, 881 active ministers, 3.068 local churches, 3,287 Sunday schools with 659,223 pupils, 8,688 Young People's Unions with 233,917 members, and 7,094 Woman's Missionary Union organisations, and baptized 762,880 persons. At the same time the churches have given \$28,776,937 more to missions, Christian education and bender cleaces than they did during the corresponding period prior to the Campaign, and have increased their investment in local church property by \$45,405,118.

The larger resources made possible for missions and benevolences through the channels of the Campaign have been responsible for great advances in every form of denominational work toth at home and abroad.

Complete Church Building Fund Among the outstanding achievements of the Home Mission Board. operating throughout the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention, are noted the completion of its million dollar church building loan fund, the baptism of 173,602 persons, reception into the churches of 277,968 persons. enlistment of 11,772 young people in the dedication of their lives to some definite form of Christian service, building or improvement of 1,872 church houses, and organization of 935 Baptist churches and 2,898 new Sunday schools.

Practically twice the state mission results have been accomplished in many of the states since the Campaign began as were had for any corresponding period of time prior to that movement.

Southern Baptists own 118 Baptist schools, colleges and seminaries. where nearly 40,000 young people are atudying to fit themselves for larger usefulness. The number of students has been greatly increased through the Campaign making possible the larger equipment of the schools, and the investment which that movement has made possible in the schools is equal to about 45 per cent of their total value at the time the Campaign was inaugurated.

4,000 Orphans Cared For

Nearly 4,000 orphan boys and girls are cared for in the 19 Baptist or chanages of the South. Two new or phanages have been provided by the Campaign and practically all of the older ones have been given better equipment by this movement. The equipment is not large enough yet, as 2.000 boys and girls had to be turned away last year because the institutions had no more room.

When the Campaign was launched Southern Baptists bad only 12 hospitals. Today that number has been increased to 21. Last year over 47, 600 patients were treated in these hospitals, a large number of these being charity patients who could not have had an opportunity to get well except through some such assistance.

The Relief and Annuity Board, serving aged ministers, is now aiding more than 925 beneficiaries and has expended in direct relief since the Campaign began the sum of \$414,-

each to complete the Campaign by the end of the period in 1924, and every effort is being made to enlist Southern Baptists in having a to be this task.


