TWO STATES CLAIM TOWN WITH MINERAL RICHES

Hurley, Wis., Declared to Be Rightfully Michigan's.

Tremont, Mich.—On the arm of the attorney general of Michigan, the town of Hurley, Wis., appears in its past. It has been asked before the Supreme court of the United States. Born its territory in the days of the north country's "train road." Hurley, nevertheless, is desired by Michigan, with Wisconsin just as firm in fighting the attempt to remove the town from its jurisdiction.

Hurley is on the small strip of land that Michigan claims as its own, despite the fact that the land, situated in Iron and Vias counties, has been Wisconsin territory since 1836. Michigan's contention, as presented to the Supreme court is, that the boundary line between Michigan and Wisconsin was established originally as "through the middle of the main channel of the Montreal river." Later it was discovered that the original survey was incorrect, that the river meandered. Michigan asserts that the correct boundary is in the west branch of the river, Wisconsin, the east branch.

The territorial acquisition that would result to Michigan if this state's contentions are recognized by the high court, would be small, including besides the land in the two Wisconsin counties, several islands in the Menominee river and Washington island in Green Bay. Valuable deposits of iron and coal, however, make the disputed terrain a tempting home for the two commonwealths to wrangle over.

Michigan's bill of complaint charges that Wisconsin has refused to settle amicably the boundary dispute. Wisconsin is required to file answer by January 7.

Michigan officials have explained the present court action is not as much directed to the extension of the territorial limits as it is to the settlement forever, one way or another, of the boundary question.

Find New Earth Data in Arctic Wilderness

The Pas, Manitoba.—Bringing back data of scientific observations of radiation of the earth's magnetism and movement of the north magnetic pole, R. G. Maddill, assistant magnetician of Dominion observatory, Ottawa; C. G. Nagy of Winnipeg and Phillip Rose of The Pas have returned from a 4,000-mile trip through Canada's farthest northern wilderness. They told a tale of harrowing experiences and of a summer-long struggle against starvation.

In the course of the journey, which led the party over 4,000 miles of wilderness, mostly by canoe, over a period of two summers, the scientist made a complete study of the magnetic pole, which lies almost due north of here.

At many times, according to Mr. Maddill, the party faced starvation and were forced to chew old moccasins, discarded socks and dried snickers.

U. S. Sailor Is Rescued After Plunge Over Cliff

Honolulu.—After falling 1,000 feet from the top of the Paik, a rocky cliff near here, over which thousands of thousands met death in the early history of Hawaii, when they fled from the invading army of the king of Hawaii, John Andrews, a water tender stationed on the U. S. S. Bangall, was rescued from a narrow ledge on which he had landed.

Rescuers climbed 500 feet up the precipitous summit with ropes. The last required four hours and was finished after darkness fell, by the light from torches made from the clothing of the rescuers.

Andrews' legs were broken and his skull fractured, but he may recover, physicians said.

Woman Police Officer Braves Bandits' Fire

New York.—Braving the fire of two hold-up men at bay in an open field in Harlem and exchanging shots with them, Miss Jean Barnes, recently proved herself worthy of her rank of major in the police reserves.

Engaged in the bandit hunt with Major Barnes were four policemen. Ignoring their pleading that she seek safety, the policewoman, 5 feet 2 inches tall, maintained her stand at their sides, lent a steady hand as bullets dug in the ground at her feet and whizzed by her head, and stayed in the fight to the finish. More than forty shots were exchanged. The bandits escaped.

U. S. POST OFFICE IS 284 YEARS OLD

First Station Organized in 1639 at Boston to Sell Wine and Strong Water.

Boston.—Two hundred and eighty-four years ago the first post office in the United States was established in Boston, and the celebration of the anniversary this month recalled the manner of its founding.

It had been the custom in those days for the citizens of Boston to troop on board the packets which arrived from overseas in quest of letters and other tidings from England. That was all very well for a while, but as the population grew the habit became a nuisance to the shippers, who objected to having their decks made impromptu delivery offices and the more two spacious quarters below crowded with men and women.

First Postmaster Named. So the general court (as the Massachusetts legislature always has been called) stipulated. In 1638 it ruled that Richard Fairbanks (not the site of whose home the Boston Globe building now stands) was to take charge of and distribute letters from abroad.

"For preventing the miscarriage of letters," the quaint order read, "and it is ordered that notice be given that Richard Fairbanks his house in Boston is the place appointed for all letters which are brought from beyond the seas, or are to be sent thither, are to be brought unto. An hour is to take care that they be delivered or sent according to their directions, and he is allowed for every such letter a penny."

John Winthrop was governor when Fairbanks was appointed. The latter had a permit to sell wine and strong water, and over his bar the men of Boston slipped their ale and read their mail and talked of the tidings from far away.

Fairbanks acted as postmaster until 1677. In January, 1678, the general court made provision for a domestic postal service, the carriers to be paid three pence per mile for their services. Twenty years later the American post office was established and in 1825 a coach and mail service was begun between Boston and Hartford.

Gypsies, Beggars Barred by Constantinople Police

Constantinople.—Since the municipal authorities have taken control of this city they have effected the abolition of many abuses that were unthought during the years of the allied occupation.

Most striking is the crusade against beggars who have always infested this place. Under strict police orders they have begun to disappear, and it is now possible to walk the streets without filthy men, women and children begging at one's cost in impudent impudence. Now the order is out that the city is to be rid of its gypsies, who are said to constitute the majority of the beggars, snook-theives and pickpockets that have infested the thoroughfares.

London Police Showered With Gifts by Admirers

London.—The interest and courtesy shown by the London police in the welfare of the public constantly brings its reward. This is manifestly expressed in logistics to policemen's funds, box plates and bouquets by persons of varying circumstances, who at one time or another have been aided by police-men.

The birthday day occurred recently when seven sums ranging from \$10 to \$100 were left to these organizations. One donor sent the following note with his gift:

"I do this because I have always admired the unflinching sympathy and tact of the police to both rich and poor alike."

Women Demand Right to Be Arrested Like Men

Omaha, Neb.—Women of Omaha are demanding the right to be arrested and sent to jail just like men.

The police department received orders not to arrest women traffic law violators. The women, in a petition to the police, demanded equal rights with men. "What's good for one is good for all," the petition said.

Guns Sink Blazing Ship.

Boston, Conn.—The Dutch steamer Rymerbeck was sunk in port here by gunfire of the Dutch naval training ship Trom. The Rymerbeck had been burning several days and efforts to extinguish the blaze in her cargo of cotton, wool, skin, silk and nuts had failed.

GREEKS MOVE FROM KARAGACH

Turkish Flag Floats Over Suburb of Adrianople.

KNOWN AS STRATEGIC POINT

"Karagach, which recently saw the Greek flag furled from its flagstaffs and the Turkish crescent flung gayly in its place, has long been a chateau or suburb of the larger city, Adrianople. And Adrianople, down at the heels though it is, has been the apple of the eye of many a Turkish sultan, because it was the first city of any size which the Turks ever captured in Europe," says a bulletin of the National Geographic society issued from its Washington headquarters.

"Karagach is a strategic point along the Constantinople-Sofia-Belgrade railway, which is Bulgaria's outlet to the Aegean. Recent reports say that the Greeks have moved out bag and baggage, leaving Karagach dead and the corpses abandoned, their galleys hauled down in their ruin and desolation upon the naked streets. They have gone out on the plain beyond to build near Ourl, a city of their own, and have called it Orestias after one of their heroes at Troy, the name which they had formerly given to Karagach.

Was Home of the Sultan. "Karagach, one of the five suburbs of Adrianople, which lies to the west of the city near the confluence of the Arda and the Maritza, is Western in its general design, with detached residences in gardens, of the modern European type. Adrianople, however, is distinctly oriental in character and has for many years been a strongly fortified outpost of the Turks on the frontier of the Balkans.

Many of history's pageants have been staged in the ancient city. Hadrian gave it his name; the Roman emperor of the East, Valens, met his death at the hands of the Goths before it; Huns, Greeks, Bulgars and Crusaders have swept over and around it. The Turks captured it in 1361, and after that time until the fall of Constantinople it was the home of the sultan, the basis of the sentiment which the Turks profess for it.

"Though many travelers think that the great Sultan Mehmet at Constantinople is the most magnificent of the mosques of the East, the architect Mehmet considered the mosque at Adrianople his best work. He is reported to have said that he designed the Shahzadeh in Constantinople when he was an apprentice, the great mosque of Sultan Mehmet when he was a journeyman and the Sultan Mehmet of Adrianople when he was a master builder.

Removing Hats an Affront. "Some delightful stories, too, have been linked with the dramatic history of the city. Once during the time of Sultan Mehmet the Magnificent, his son, the first Adrianople and the ambassadors from the courts of Europe came to present their respects. The last diplomatic representative to arrive in the city was the Persian, who was astonished and angered by the fact that the Europeans took off their hats to him. It is a serious breach of etiquette for a Mohammedan to uncover his head in public, so he demanded an explanation. The master of ceremonies poured oil on the troubled waters by telling him that the Christians thereby indicated their willingness to lay their heads at the feet of the sultan.

"Karagach was a Bulgarian suburb of the main town in the days before the World war, and the Maritza, on which it stands, flows picturesque through Bulgarian legends and the national hymn of that country. The town is lighted by petroleum lamps and from it there is a continual tramp of traffic over its two-mile causeway to the main part of the city.

Costumes Are Heavy Burden. "Back in the old days Bulgarian girls, and occasionally a married woman, a little more daring than the rest, used to gather in some convenient place out of the youths of the town and the village proper, for their favorite pastime—songs and dancing.

"They were formed in line with the horovodka, or dance leader, at one end. This young lady started the song and half the performers accompanied her, the other half repeating the verses after them. Then the next young lady in the line started another song, and so the fun continued until everyone had had a chance.

"But the American girl would be utterly astonished to understand how the peasant women could dance because of the ponderous weight of their silver ornaments and their garments. One active English woman who invested in a full Bulgarian costume for a masquerade party found that she could endure the weight of it for only half an hour at a time."

FARM LABOR UNION TO NAME COUNTY TICKET

The Farm Labor Political Conference of Terry County will meet at the Courthouse in Brownfield, on the 4th Friday in January, 1924, at 10 o'clock in the morning for the purpose of endorsing a County Ticket to be voted on in the July primaries.

All Farm Labor Union locals and all locals of labor unions in the county will immediately call all their membership together and organize a Farm Labor Political Conference in their respective places of meeting, by electing a Chairman and Secretary, and selecting one member of their local conference to represent them at the County Conference. Each local may instruct their delegates to nominate their choice for the various county offices at the county political conference. The delegates and the officers of the County Political Conference are the only ones eligible to vote in the County Conference.

Those receiving the majority vote in the County Conference, shall be declared the nominees of the Farm Labor Political Conference of Terry County for the various county offices. In casting this ballot, the lowest man shall be dropped each time after the ballot is taken, until a majority is received. This meeting will be open to the public and all who care to attend are cordially invited. There will be no nominating speeches made by anyone, neither will anyone, except the delegates and officers of the County Conference have any voice in the meeting. If there are any members of organized labor of any craft residing in Terry County, they are urged to be represented in this meeting.

The ticket to be endorsed at this meeting will be unanimously supported by all Union voters in the county, both male and female. No union man or woman, who makes an announcement, prior to the meeting, will be considered at all. Our motto is for "the office to hunt the man, and not the man the office. This applies only to union members, as this conference is at liberty to endorse anyone which or they have previously announced for office or not. This office will not endorse anyone that is known to oppose organized labor. Non-Union aspirants for the various County Offices, are advised to state publicly how they stand on Organized Labor, and whether or not they are in full accord with our political program or not. It will be absolutely necessary for us to know these things before we could intelligently consider them in this nominating conference, on Friday, January 25th, 1924.

AUTO OWNERS

The license fees in Texas on automobiles for the year 1924 is changed from what they have been heretofore, and the fees are by horsepower rating; also by weight. The horsepower fee on passenger autos is 17 1/2¢ per rated horsepower with a minimum fee of \$4.00.

The weight fees are:
Class 1—1 to 2000 lbs, 40¢ per cwt.
Class 2—2001 to 3500 lbs, 50¢ per cwt.
Class 3—3501 to 4500 lbs, 60¢ per cwt.
Class 4—4501 and up, 75¢ per cwt.

Commercial Motor Vehicles: The horsepower fee is 17 1/2¢ per rated H. P. with minimum fee of \$4.00.

The weight fee is determined by the weight of the truck, plus the carrying capacity, equipped with pneumatic tires as follows:
Class 1—1 to 6000 lbs, 30¢ per cwt.
Class 2—6001 to 8000 lbs, 40¢ per cwt.
Class 3—8001 to 10,000 lbs, 50¢ per cwt.

Solid tires 10¢ per cwt. additional in each class.

On and after the 1st of February, 1924, there will be added a 25 per cent penalty on all cars that have been used during the year 1924.

Man Can Add Years to Life by Careful Living

Lima, O.—By careful living the most man can add at least ten years to his life. Dr. Charles Mayo, famous surgeon of Rochester, Minn., declared in an address here recently to physicians, surgeons and dentists from all parts of northwestern Ohio who came here to attend a clinic as guests of the Allen County Academy of Medicine. The way to attain the extra years, Doctor Mayo said, is to be examined at least once a year by a competent physician and follow his advice.

He declared that a physical examination of men would disclose within a year or two just when they will die and what will cause their deaths, provided they do not change their habits or meet with accident.

Doctor Mayo was the chief clinician at a winter clinic and the guest of honor and principal speaker at a dinner given by the medical society.

All Preserved Food Should Be Boiled

Chicago. — Medical science knows no cure for botulism, but lives may be saved by boiling home-preserved foods. Dr. Joan C. Geiger, epidemiologist of the United States public health service attached to the University of Chicago, warned recently. He called attention to eight deaths within two weeks throughout the country, which he attributed to that poisoning. It is not possible for the inexperienced to detect the spore, either by sight or taste. Doctor Geiger warned, and the only safe method is to boil the food before using it.

Frank Pira, "killed in action" in France five years ago and for whom a memorial day exercises at Madera, near Fresno, Cal., has appealed to S. D. Fern, commander of the Madera post of the American Legion, for aid in recovering his citizenship and establishing himself on army records as a living man.

Pira declared that he had been denied the privilege of rejoining his company in France because he was reported dead, and that he refused his own 10,000 life insurance while visiting his parents in Italy. He later returned to the United States as an immigrant, after being refused entry as a citizen. The Madera post has taken the case up with Washington authorities.
